WHEREAS by section 34 (1) of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to declare by Proclamation any road or path which the railway may cross to be a "minor crossing" and whether such "minor crossing" shall be closed by gates or not:

And whereas it is expedient to declare a certain portion of a road which the railway crosses to be a "minor crossing" for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and that such "minor crossing" be closed by gates:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, do hereby declare that the portion of the road which the Ceylon Government Railway crosses between the stations of Siduwa Road and Katunayaka, in the Western Province, which is set out in the schedule hereto, shall, from September 17, 1926, be a "minor crossing" for the purpose of the said Ordinance, and that such "minor crossing" be closed by gates, such gates to open across the railway.

BY-LAW REFERRED TO.

It shall not be lawful for any person to erect, re-erect, or add to any hut or house within the limits of the Local Board of Trincomalee, except under the following conditions:—

The following clear air space shall be left around any hut or house which is erected or re-erected, or around any hut or house which is added to with respect to such addition, and no portion of the walls of such building, and not more than 2 feet 6 inches of the projecting eaves of such building, shall come within such space—

(1) On the side of any road or street 25 feet to the centre of such road or street.

(2) Behind such space up to 50 feet to any other hut or house, except a kitchen, bathing place, or latrine, as the Chairman may require, of which prescribed space at least half shall be land belonging to the same owner as the land upon which the house stands which is erected, re-erected, or added to.

(3) To the side such space up to 15 feet to the nearest building as the Chairman may require, of which prescribed space at least half shall be land belonging to the same owner as the land upon which the house stands which is erected, re-erected, or added to.

Provided that the Chairman may, in his discretion, relax the operation of this rule in any special case, but he shall not do so unless he is satisfied that (1) no detriment is caused thereby to the sanitary condition or amenities of the house or hut to be erected, re-erected, or added to, or of any other neighbouring house or hut used or intended to be used as a human dwelling place; and (2) that the future alignment, widening, or development of any road or street, or the convenience of the public using such road or street will not be interfered with by such relaxation of the rule.

Provided further, that the Chairman may allow the erection of a kitchen, bathing place, or latrine upon the portion thus reserved for air space on the side of any house furthest from the road or street in such place as the Chairman shall

approve

Provided further, that where a conservancy lane shall have been provided or laid out, or projected by the Board, such latrine shall adjoin such lane or projected lane.

Regulations referred to.

BAKERIES.

I.—General Regulations.

1. No person shall within the limits of the Small Towns of Point Pedro, Valvedditurai, and Kayts keep a bakery without a licence from the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, Jaffna.

2. The Chairman shall subject to the provisions of regulation No. 4 issue such licence to any applicant on compliance with the conditions hereinafter specified for the issue of licence and on payment of such fees as may be fixed by the Board with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

3. Such licence shall remain in force for the period stated on the licence or till cancelled by a competent court.

4. On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee of a breach of the regulations relating to bakeries, the court recording such conviction may cancel his licence and the Chairman may in his discretion refuse to issue him a fresh licence.

5. It shall be lawful for any Sanitary Inspector or other person duly authorized by the Chairman at all times when the process of baking is being carried on and at other reasonable times to enter upon and inspect the bakery and all furniture, equipment, stores, articles, and things used in the making or storing of bread.

6. Any person acting in contravention of any of the regulations relating to bakeries shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50.

II.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a bakery unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the walls of every room in every part are not less than 7 feet in height, and are built of brick, stone, or cabook, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.(e) That all the woodwork is oilpainted or limewashed.

(f) That the floor is cemented throughout.

(g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

(a) That the room in which kneading takes place has a superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 15 feet and that the lower 4 feet of the internal surface of the walls is covered with glazed tiles or plastered with cement.

(b) That there is a free external air space on at least two sides of the kneading room not less than 7 feet wide to

permit of thorough ventilation.

(c) That the door of the oven does not open directly into the kneading room.

(d) That every kneading room is provided with a ceiling which is either plastered and limewashed or made of closely fitting boards which are either limewashed or oilpainted.

3. (a) That the troughs, tables, and all the utensils used in the making of bread are capable of being moved about

for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

- (\bar{b}) That the tops of the tables used in the making of bread are made of well seasoned closely fitting planks, or of some non-harmful impervious material.
- 4. (a) That the bakery is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
 - (b) That the bakery is at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.
 - (c) That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the bakery.

III.—Regulations for Licensed Bakeries.

1. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of the licensed premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Bakery" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

2. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause a copy of these regulations in English and Sinhalese or Tamil, and the

licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees (including the vendors of bread) to be kept in the bakery so as to be available for inspection at all reasonable times by the Chairman or any person authorized by him.

3. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the bakery to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oilpainted to be washed with hot water and soap

at least twice a year in the months of June and December and at any other time if so ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the floor and the tiled or cemented portions of the walls and the tops of the tables to be washed every day at such hour as shall be specified in the licence. He shall cause every part of the bakery, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of bread to be kept in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises. He shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle, which shall be removed from the bakery and cleared once a day. The receptacle shall always be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

Every licensee of a bakery shall use for the manufacture of bread good and wholesome flour, water, and other materials. He shall store the flour on a platform placed at least 3 feet above the ground, so constructed as to provide no harbour for rats. He shall keep the space beneath the platform clean and free from all obstructions.

6. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide a sanitary dust bin, and at least two spittoons to be kept on the licensed

He shall keep the spittoons so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread, but shall not keep them in the kneading room.

Every licensee of a bakery shall keep the bakery free from rats and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as found.

No person shall on any pretext whatsoever keep any animal or bird in a bakery. No person shall spit within the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

(a) No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contageous, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall enter the licensed premises or take part in the manufacture or sale of any bread therein, or engaged in the transport of any bread therefrom.

(b) Every licensee of a bakery who knowingly permits any person to contravene the provisions of regulation 10 (a) shall be guilty of an offence.

- 11. No licensee of a bakery shall store or keep or allow to be stored or kept in the room where bread is kept or prepared for packing or in which the materials for making bread are stored any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or any articles other than those used in the manufacture of bread.
- 12. No licensee of a bakery shall use or allow to be used as a sleeping place any place in the same floor as the bakery or forming part of the same building, unless such place is effectually separated from the place, where bread is packed or prepared for packing or in which the materials therefor are stored, by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

All persons employed in the preparation and making of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the

process of making bread and shall wear white aprons covering the chest and body and a white cap or turban.

Every licensee of a bakery shall provide clean water, clean towels, nail brush, and soap" and keep them so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread.

Every licensee of a bakery shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

No licensee of a bakery shall expose or cause to be exposed for sale in the licensed premises any bread unless such bread is kept in clean properly constructed glass cases free from flies, dust, and vermin.

Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all bread, except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, to be stamped with figures denoting one or the other of the following weights, viz:-

½ lb., ½ lb., 1 lb., 2 lb., or 4 lb.

He shall not sell or expose for sale any bread, except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, which shall not have one of the aforesaid weights stamped on it or which shall be found to weigh less than the weight stamped thereon.

18. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause to be fixed in a conspicuous place in the licensed premises a beam and scales with standard weights, and if required by the purchasers shall weigh any bread sold or exposed for sale in the said premises.

No licensee of a bakery shall allow any person to transport bread from his bakery for sale unless such person

is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of a bakery.

20. No licensee of a bakery shall allow any bread to be transported from his licensed premises for sale except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. The licensee shall examine such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle, and shall satisfy himself that it is thoroughly clean and wholesome before he allows such transport.

All owners or occupiers of premises furnished with closets or latrines within any specified area shall pay monthly to the Board such conservancy fees as shall be fixed by the Board for the removal of their night soil. The sum payable, if not paid on or before the tenth day of the month following that in respect of which it is due, may be reported by the Chairman to the Police Court and recovered in the same way as if it were a fine imposed by the Court.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

I.—Regulation and Conduct of Business, &c.

The Committee shall hold its meetings at the Town Hall in Kandy on dates to be appointed by the Committee. There shall be six ordinary meetings of the Committee to be held at intervals of two months in every year.

3. The Chairman may at any time summon a meeting of the Committee, and on a requisition signed by any three members, he shall summon a meeting of the Committee. The requisition shall state the object for which the meeting is required to be summoned.

4. Notice of the business to be transacted at meetings, whether ordinary or special, shall be served on each member at least three days—exclusive of Sundays and Public holidays—before each meeting.

5. The Chairman shall preside at each meeting, but in his absence from any meeting the members of the Committee present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

The Chairman, or in his absence the member presiding, shall maintain order, and his decision on all disputed points shall be final and conclusive.

Three members of the Committee present shall form a quorum at any meeting.

8. If there is not a sufficient number of members present at any meeting to form a quorum, the meeting shall stand adjourned to a day before the date of the next ordinary meeting as the Chairman of the Committee may decide.

The Chairman of a meeting, whether ordinary or special, at which a quorum is present, may, with the consent

of the meeting, adjourn it from time to time for sufficient cause.

- 10. Except in the course of discussion or when in case of emergency, the Chairman, on cause shown, permits a question to be put or a motion to be made, any member who desires to ask a question or to submit a motion shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Committee or in writing at least four days exclusive of Sundays and Public holidays—before the day on which the question is to be asked or the motion made.
 - Every member in giving such notice shall deliver to the secretary a copy of such question or motion.

 No motion shall be considered unless it is seconded by a member of the Committee present at a meeting.
- 13. A motion which is not seconded or is negatived by a majority of votes shall not be again made until after the expiration of six months thereafter, except with the special permission of the Chairman.

Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being 14. throughout respectful.

When a petition or other communication is presented, the purport thereof should be concisely stated, and on the motion of any member, duly seconded, the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.

The business at ordinary meetings of the Committee shall be conducted in the following order:

(1) The Minutes of the previous meeting shall be confirmed, after being, if necessary, amended;

(2) Petitions or other communications addressed to the Committee shall be laid before the meeting, and orders made thereon:

(3) The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the "Order of the Day."

All matters laid belore the Committee for its consideration shall be decided by a majority of the votes of such members of the Committee as may be present at any meeting subject to the condition that, in the event of there being an equality of votes, the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

18. Unless a poll is demanded by a market of the control of th

Unless a poll is demanded by a member, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried or lost and an entry to that effect in the Minute Book of the Committee shall be conclusive evidence of the fact without reference to individual votes.

19. If a poll is demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner as the Chairman at the meeting may direct, and the result of such poll shall to all intents and purposes be deemed to be the decision of the Committee.

20. The Secretary of the Committee shall keep a Minute Book and record therein the proceedings of every meeting.

II.—Education of Children.

1. Definitions.-In these by-laws the following terms shall have the meanings assigned to them unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context :-

The term "boy," "girl," and "child" shall mean a boy or a girl or a child residing within the limits of the Municipality of Kandy.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the legal or actual custody of a child.

The term "householder" shall mean the owner, or part owner, or lessee, or principal occupant of a house in which a child resides.

The term "Code" means regulations for aided schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an attendance register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "school" means one of the schools named in the schedule hereto annexed and shall include any elementary English or vernacular or Anglo-vernacular school that may hereafter be established and certified by the Director of Education to provide adequate and suitable education.

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector appointed by Government, and includes a Sub-Inspector of Schools.

The words "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" shall have the same meaning as in section 25, sub-sections (2) and (3) of the Education Ordinance, No. 1 of 1920.

The area covered by the Municipality of Kandy as defined in the Schedule of the Proclamation dated February

The area covered by the Municipality of Kandy as defined in the Schedule of the Proclamation dated February 19, 1902, and published in the Government Gazette No. 5,834 of February 21, 1902, shall be to all intents and purposes taken and recognized as the area within which efficient provision has been made for elementary education by means of schools.

- 2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 or more than 14 years of age and the parent of every girl other than Muslim or Tamil of not less than 6 or more than 12 years of age and the parent of every Muslim or Tamil girl of not less than 6 or more than 10 years of age shall cause such boy or girl to attend a school, unless he has made other adequate or suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is reasonable excuse for his or her non-attendance. Provided that (a) no child shall be compelled to attend school from a distance of more than two miles; (b) no boy less than 8 years of age shall be compelled to attend a school more than three-quarter mile from his residence; and (c) no girl shall be compelled to attend a school more than three-quarter mile from her residence or a school in which no female teacher is employed.
- 3. The Time of Attendance.—The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.
- 4. Course of Instruction to be given.—The course of instruction to be given in the school shall be that prescribed by the Code for the time being in force.
 - 5. Religion.—Provided always that nothing in these by-laws contained—

Shall compel the presence of children at school during the hours when religious instruction is given from which instruction he may be withdrawn by his parent or guardian; or shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the child's parent may belong.

- 6. Provided further that a boy between 10 and 14 years of age, who is beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Director of Education and has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, the examination prescribed by the Code for the Fourth Standard shall be exempted from attendance at school.
- 7. Provided, however, that all boys between the ages of 10 and 14 who regularly attend a night school certified by the Director of Education to provide adequate and suitable education shall also be exempt from attendance at a day school.
- 8. For the purpose of ascertaining the number of children from the age of 6 to 14 resident within the limits of the Municipality, it shall be lawful for the Committee to cause schedules to be served on householders within the said area requiring each of them to fill up the said schedule with the name, nationality, sex, and age of every child in his or her house together with the names of the child's parents and the name and situation of any school which the child attends and to return the said schedules with full particulars of all the information required within a period of 21 days from the date of service of such schedule.
- 9. No elementary school shall be kept open for the purpose of giving instruction to pupils for more than 6 hours a day including intervals for meals. The hour at which the school work should commence may be left to the discretion of the Managers or Headmasters, but no school should open earlier than 8 A.M. or later than 10 A.M. The school time tables should be approved by the Inspector of Schools.

tables should be approved by the Inspector of Schools.

10. No elementary school shall. except with the special permission of the Divisional or District Inspector of Schools, be kept open for school work on more than 5 days a week or less than 190 days in a year.

11. Penalties for Offences.—Every parent or householder who shall fail to comply with or shall neglect or violate these by-laws, or any of them shall, upon conviction. be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding Rs. 5, and an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 1 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

Definitions.—In these by-laws-

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the legal or actual custody of a child. The term "Codes" mean the Codes for aided schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the

Governor in Executive Council.

"The Committee" shall mean the Education District Committee for the Colombo Municipal area appointed

under section 18 of the Education Ordinance, No. 1 of 1920.

The term "school" means one of the schools named in the schedule hereto annexed, and shall include any elementary schools that may hereafter be established by the Committee within the Colombo Municipal

area. The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by Government, and shall include

Assistant Inspectors and Sub-Inspectors of Schools.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the meanings given to them in sub-section (2) and sub-section (3) (b), respectively, of section 25 of "The Education Ordinance, No. 1 of 1920."

Funds.—Moneys allocated by the Director to the Committee and moneys at any time belonging to the Committee shall be placed in a Bank from time to the selected by the Committee in the name of "The Education District Committee, Colombo Municipal area," and the said account shall be operated on, and all cheques in favour of the Committee be endorsed by the Chairman and one other member who shall from time to time be selected by the Committee for the purpose.

The portions of the Colombo Municipal area within a radius of two miles of any schools shall be regarded as areas within which efficient provision has been made for elementary education for the purpose of the said Ordinance.

3. Children to attend School.—The parent of every child between the ages of 6 and 14 years and in the case of Muslim and Tamil girls between the ages of 6 and 10 residing within any one of the areas aforesaid shall cause such child to attend a school unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such child, or unless there is reasonable excuse for his not causing such child to attend school. Provided that—(a) no boy of 8 years or over shall be compelled to attend school from any distance exceeding two miles; (b) no boy less than 8 years of age shall be compelled to attend a school more than one mile from his residence; and (c) no girl shall be compelled to attend a school more than one mile from her residence or a school in which no female teacher is employed.

Provided also that nothing in these by-laws-

(a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given as provided by sections 14 and 15 of the Education Ordinance, No. 1 of 1920.

(b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the

religious body to which its parents belong.

(c) Shall require a boy between 12 and 14 years of age to attend school who is beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Director of Education and has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic the Fifth Standard prescribed by the Codes for the time being. The attendance compulsory under this section shall be for at least half the number of school days in a month.

4. Time of Attendance.—No school shall be kept open for the purpose of giving instruction to pupils for more than 6 hours a day including intervals for meals, &c., and no school shall open earlier than 8 A.M. or later than 10 A.M. The school time table shall be approved by an Inspector of Schools.

No school shall also, except with the permission of the Divisional or District Inspector of Schools, be kept open

for school work on more than 5 days a week or on less than 200 days a year.

5. Course of Instruction to be given.—The course of instruction to be given in a school shall be that prescribed by the Codes for the time being in force, subject to such variations as the Committee may make from time to time with the approval of the Director of Education.

Penalties for Offences.—Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate these by laws or any of them, shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding Rs. 5, and in the case of a continuing offence an additional fine not exceeding Re. 1 per day.

CODE FOR ASSISTED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

THE following Code of Regulations for Assisted Industrial Schools, which has been approved by the Board of Education, is hereby published for general information in accordance with section 10 (2) of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920.

A. G. M. FLETCHER, Colonial Secretary CODE FOR ASSISTED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Applications for registration of Industrial Schools will be entertained on the following conditions:

Conditions of Registration for grant.

(a) That the school shall teach one or more of the following trades on the lines of the syllabuses of work published by the Department, or a special syllabus approved by the Director:

In Boys' Schools.—Carpentry, Printing, Bookbinding, Shoemaking, Metal work, Cloth weaving, Ratton work, Basket-making, Pottery, Lacquer work, Agriculture, or any other industry or art approved by the Director.

In Girls' Schools.—Cloth weaving, Dressmaking, Lace-making, mbroidery, Grass mat weaving, Ratton work, Basket weaving, Embroidery, Spinning, Nursing, Cooking, or any other industry or art approved by the Director.

(b) That the Manager shall-

(i.) provide a suitable building and a teacher, who must be approved by the Director

(ii.) guarantee the stability of the school for five years

(iii.) promise an average attendance of at least six full-time or ten half-time pupils;
(iv.) state that there is the possibility of his pupils finding employ-

ment in the industry which they will be taught;

(v.) submit the probable cost of buildings, tools, and equipment.

(a) The Department, after approving the establishment of the Grant. school, will give a certain lump sum towards the initial expenses of the This amount will be decided after a scrutiny of the probable cost of tools and equipment or of raw material, when the cost of tools and equipment is small. If the school fails to continue for five years, the Manager shall pay back to the Department one-fifth of this amount for each year which the school shall fail to complete.

(b) An annual grant based upon the cost of wear and tear of equipment will be paid. In order to be eligible for this grant, pupils in a Registered Industrial School must have received instruction in the workshop in any particular industry for not less than two hours daily on ordinary school days if a half-time worker, and for not less than five hours daily if a full-time worker, for not less than 100 days in a year. The Inspector must also be satisfied with the efficiency of the instruction given and with the results of the annual examination.

Provided that the maximum number of full-time pupils (not to exceed ten in any particular trade) shall be fixed by the Director for each particular school having regard to its accommodation and to the efficiency of the instruction given.

Provided further that no grant will be paid for half-time pupils in excess of twice the number of full-time pupils in the school.

(c) In certain industries like Printing and Bookbinding which are run as a business concern apart from the training of pupils, grant will not be given for equipment or materials, but an annual grant of Rs. 50 will be given for each full-time, and Rs. 20 for each half-time, pupil who satisfies the condition in 2 (b).

No pupil can qualify for full-time grant for more than three years, and no pupil can qualify for half-time and full-time grant for more than five years in all.

The raw material must be supplied by the Manager except as provided for in 2(a).

One teacher's salary at the rates sanctioned for Industrial Teacher's Teachers in Government schools will be provided if at least six fulltime workers or ten full-time and half-time workers fulfil the conditions in 2(b)

The difference between the cost of the raw material and the Remunera selling price of the finished article shall be distributed at the rates prevailing in Government schools, in the following proportions:-

Sixty per cent. to the pupils, 20 per cent. to the teacher, 20 per cent. to the school.

In order to encourage the pupils to possess, by the time they finish their training, their own tools or looms in such industries as Carpentry and Weaving, a certain proportion of the amount earned by the pupils may be devoted by the Manager to this purpose.

7. The Manager of an Industrial School will be required to prepare Statement a statement of accounts for the annual examination on the prescribed of accounts

9. No grant will be paid for a pupil who has not attained the age of Age limit. 12 years or is over 21 years of age.

10. The articles mentioned in the syllabuses are only suggestive. Articles in Other models may be substituted with the approval of the Director.

(c) Every part fit for firewood of every tree felled shalf be delivered as firewood.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 11, 1926.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 137 (3 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 87 Sinhalese, 15 Tamils, 16 Moors, 5 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1926, viz., 258,905) was 27.6, as against 31.2 in the preceding week, 27.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 136 (2 Europeans, 3 Burghers, 92 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 20 Moors, and 3 Malays). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 27·4, as against 25·2 in the previous week, 35·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30·3 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 136 total deaths, 28 were of infants under one year of age, as against 34 in the preceding week, 35 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 15.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Sixteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in Kotahena North, Maradana East, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. The same number was registered in the previous week, against 18 the weekly average for last year.

- 3. Three deaths from Enteric Fever were registered in Maradana hospitals (of non-residents), as against 1 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- 4. Nine deaths were registered from Debility, 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 5 each from Dysentery and Enteritis, 4 from Diarrhoea, 1 each from Worms, Tetanus, and Puerperal Septicaemia, and 59 from Other Causes.
- 5. Ten cases of Chickenpox, 6 of Measles, and 5 of Enteric Ferer were reported during the week, as against 7, 4, and 6, respectively, of the preceding week. No case of Plague was reported either this week or in the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81·3°, against 82·3° in the preceding week and 81·4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·842 in., against 29·860 in. in the preceding week, and 29·880 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2·68 in., against 0·04 in. in the preceding week, and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.

IT is hereby notified that the following amendments and modifications have been made to the regulations relating to the Matriculation, Intermediate in Arts, B.A. Honours in History, B.A. Honours in Geography and B.Sc. Special Examinations, and LL.B., LL.D., and M.A. Examinations, 1927, published in September, 1925:—

Prescribed Books in English for the Matriculation Examination.

The following books have been prescribed in English for the Matriculation Examinations for 1929:—

Shakespeare: Macbeth. Milton: Paradise Lost, Book II.

Essays and Essayists: edited by Newbolt, published by Nelson.

Prescribed Books in English History at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

The title of the book "Anglo-Saxon England" prescribed for Syllabus A in History at the Intermediate Examination in Arts in 1927 has been amended to read "England before the Norman Conquest," and as an alternative thereto has been prescribed M. Bateson's "Mediaeval England" (story of Nations Series, No. 62, published by Fisher, Unwin & Co.).

Prescribed Books in English at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

At the examination in 1927 questions on Palgrave's Golden Treasury will be restricted to such poems as are common to both Macmillan's edition and the edition in the World's Classics Series.

Amendment of Regulations for the B.A. Honours Examination in History.

The regulations for the B.A. Honours Examination in History in and after 1928 have been amended by the substitution for "Special Subject 10. The Eastern Question, 1774–1831," of "The Eastern Question, 1856–1878," to be studied in the following authorities:—

(Note.—Candidates will be expected to attempt translation of passages from at least two of these languages. use of dictionaries will be permitted in the examination.)

Amendment of Regulations for the B.A. Honours Examination in Geography.

The regulations for the B.A. Honours Examination in Geography (vide page 99 of the September, 1925, regulations) have been amended by the substitution for section (iii.) of the following:

General Regional and Historical Geography with a special study of Europe, and of one of the following: (1) Africa, (2) North America, (3) South America, (4) Asia, (5) Australia, New Zealand, and the Pacific Islands.

Amendment of Regulations for the B.Sc. (Special) Examination.

The regulations have been amended by the substitution for the first four paragraphs on page 349, September, 1925, regulations, of the following three paragraphs:-

In each branch of science not less than six papers shall be set, and in experimental subjects there shall be a practical examination extending over not less than two days.

In each branch of science, except Mathematics, one of the papers will consist of subjects for an English Essay; a wide choice of subjects will be allowed (not less than six). the object of this test being to ascertain whether the candidate can explain himself with accuracy and lucidity.

In every branch questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French and in German and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French and in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

Definition of subject for the M.A. Examination in Philosophy.

The following note has been added to section E 3 of the regulations for the M.A. Degree in Philosophy, page 117. September, 1925, regulations:-

"A Comparative Study of the Laws and Customs of different peoples treated from a general point of view."

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, August 4, 1926, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated July 28, 1926.

Present: Mr. H. E. Newnham, C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias, M.B.E., J.P.; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cador, M.L.C.; Mr. H. L. De Mel, C.B.E., J.P.; Dr. E. V. Ratnan; Mr. A. E. de Silva; the Hon. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando, M.L.C.; Mc. G. Adamjee Lukmanjee; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy; Mr. G. W. Dodds; Dr. G. Thornton; Mr. J. S. Collett, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene, V.D., J.P.; Mr. N. R. Blande; Mr. T. R. Mitcheli; and Lieut. Colonel N. Dunbar Walker, O.B.E. M.B., R.A.M.C.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 7, 1926, having been previously printed and copies thereof having

been sert to each Member of Council, were taker as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of July 7, 1926, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene asked the Chairman the following questions:—

(1) Will the Chairman be pleased to call on the Municipal Engineer to submit a plan and estimate for converting the land between Skinner's road south and the canal, which at present is very little built upon, into a playing ground

for children of the residents of Hulftsdorp, Skinner's road south, Panchikawatta, and 1st Division, Maradana.

(2) Now that a road is being constructed from opposite the New Town Hall into the enclosed area of Victoria park,

will the Chairman be pleased to consider the advisability of having the gardens laid out more artistically than they are at present, placing the Band Stand on more central and elevated ground, as the lawn round the present stand is far too low and damp and unhealthy for children to play on? Will he also lay a plan and estimate for the work, before the appropriate Standing Committees for consideration?

(3) Will the Chairman be pleased to state if up-to-date humane methods of handling and slaughtering of all animals intended for food are carried out in this city; and if he does not consider that the time has arrived for the establishment of an up-to-date abattoir in this town as erected in Western Countries, even in small towns with populations of about 10,000

(4) With reference to the reply to my question No. 4 at the last Meeting of Council, where it was stated that there was a very serious shortage of broken metal, will the Chairman be pleased to say (a) if broken metal is now being turned out of the Biyagama Quarry? (b) if the sum of Rs. 134,717 voted for expenditure this year on this quarry will all be spent this year. If so, in what manner?

(5) Will the Chairman here.

(6) Will the Chairman be pleased to state the quartity of work done, and the amount spent or each of the following items of the estimate submitted by the Works Engineer for Rs. 100,000 under which the work of the Kirillapone Cemetery was taken in hand? (a) boundary wall and entrance gates Rs. 34,000; (b) 6,000 cubes earthwork, Rs. 18,000. In this connection, will the Chairman also explain more fully the statement in his reply to my questior at the Meeting of this Council of October 7 last, that one-third of the filling had been completed, and that further provision has to be made for about 9,000 cubes of filling, when the Works Engineer has stated in his estimate dated July 26, 1923, for Rs. 200,000 for all works on this cemetery, that only 8,000 cubes of filling were all that were necessary to complete the whole work?

The Chairman replied as follows:-

(1) Since receipt of the question the matter has been investigated. The first problem is to find a site which will not require much expensive filling. The plan of the area and the valuations will be sent to the Ward Member for his advice.

(2) The improvement of the lay out of Victoria park in connection with the New Town Hall and the Park road leading thereto has already been considered by the Chairman and the Committees, and a fair amount of work has already been done. The question of further elaboration in this area awaits the return of Mr. Edwards, who is understood to prefer a lay out on broad lines rather than a detailed and more artificial design. It was desired that the Committees should have the benefit of his advice on this point. The only drier sites available in the park for the Band Stand and children's playground are those at present occupied by the public tennis courts, and to make this suitable would involve the removal on ground are those at present occupied by the public tennis courts, and to make this suitable would involve the removal on a numner of trees which would probably not meet with general approval. Other sites would then have to be found for the tennis courts. It would seem that the present site of the Band Stand is the most suitable, both from the point of view of the general lay out, and because its proximity to the entrance enables a number of people to listen to the Band from their conveyances on the approach road. It is true that the sorrounding lawn is low-lying and liable to be damp in wet weather as is practically the whole of the park. The tost of raising it will be ascertained, but the work, if sanctioned, cannot be undertaken for some time, as all the available filling and transport are urgently needed for other works already sanctioned and uncompleted, such as the Maligawatta road.

(3) The methods of handling and slaughtering of animals at the Slaughter-house can hardly be described as up-to-date. Whether they are humane is a question on which opinions differ and largely depends on the skill of the slaughtermen. The cattle awaiting slaughter are housed in walled sheds over 100 yards distant from the place of slaughter. The animals are cast. The legs of cattle and buffaloes are tied together, sheep are held down. In all cases the throats are cut. In 1910 and 1917 attempts were made to introduce the use of a pistol known as a "humane killer," but they were discontinued. Not only was it not entirely successful but the butchers objected in a petition in which they stated that it destroyed the brain and thereby caused a loss of 40 cents on each animal. The Muslims also objected on the ground that it was contrary to the rules of their religion to stun or otherwise injure an animal before cutting its throat. All the present butchers who slaughter are Muslims except one and all employ the method of cutting the throat because they all have Muslim customers. Until, therefore, at least the religious objection is withdrawn it appears to be useless to attempt to alter the present methods. It seems desirable to postpone the question of erecting a new Slaughter-house until Government has designed and possibly erected the New Quarantine Station which is at present under consideration.

(4) (a) No; but a contract has recently been let and rubble is being collected with a view to transporting it by boat as the state of the river permits and to breaking it into 2-inch metal at this end. (b) No; but it is hoped that the greater

(b) No; but it is hoped that the greater part of it will be spent on the following items:—Locomotive, trucks and bodies; permanent way; launch and barges and their assembly and rivetting up; cranes and their erection; loading and unloading platforms; store and magazine; cooly lines; overseers quarters; and fencing. About Rs. 75,000 has already been spent.

(5) (i.) According to the distribution rolls the amount spent on the boundary wall was Rs. 60,366·70. 4,430 feet of wa'l was built, but it is still not complete in certain parts. The value of the labour and material recorded against items representing filling is Rs. 25,851·19. The amount of work done is estimated at 6,000 cubes. (ii.) The quantity of filling required as shown in the estimate of July 26, 1923, is 18,000 and not 8,000 cubes. The 6,000 cubes already provided appropriate one-third of this quantity. A revised estimate recently prepared indicates that 10,000 cubes should be represents one thir of this quantity. A revised estimate recently prepared indicates that 10,000 cubes should be sufficient to finish this work.

With the permission of the Council, Mr. H. L. De Mel, asked the Chairman whether the Colombo Electric Lighting Company paid the Council any sum of money annually as way leave for laying mains along streets or roads within the Municipal limits of Colombo?

The Chairman replied as follows:-

No such annual payments have been made.

4. Bursuant to notice, Dr. E. V. Ratnam moved that this Council do respectfully request His Excellency the Governor to direct, that necessary legislative measures be taken early to give effect to the reform of the constitution of the Colombo Municipal Council recommended in the Report of the Special Committee of this Council forwarded to Government on December 12, 1922. The Hon. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando seconded. Mr. T. G. Jayewardene, Mr. H. L. De Mel, the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, Mr. C. P. Dias, and Mr. A. E. de Silva supported the motion. The Chairman commented on some of the statements made by the previous speakers and pointed out that the Report forwarded to the Government was sent as the Report of the Special Committee of the Elected Members and not as the Report of the Council.

The Chairman moved, as an amendment, that the motion be adopted omitting the last portion beginning with the word "recommended." W. E. V. de Rooy seconded. Dr. E. V. Ratnam accepted the amendment. The amendment

was then put as the substantive motion and carried.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on Saturday, August 21, 1926, at 1.15 p.m., pursuant to Notice dated August 16, 1926.

Present:—Mr. L. W. C. Schrader, Chairman; Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E.; Mr. D. I. Duraham; Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe; and Dr. E. P. Aserappa.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 10, 1926, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. The Chairman moved that Mr. W. W. Morgan who has ceased to be a Councillor by having failed to attend three consecutive General Meetings be restored to his office.

Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E., seconded.—Carried.

- 3. Pursuant to notice Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E., asked the following questions:—
- (1) How many times was the Keppu-ela cleaned during 1925? (2) On what dates was such cleaning done and at what cost? (3) Was it cleaned this year? (4) If so, when and at what cost? (5) How is the work done, by day labour or by contract? (6) If by contract what is the system of payment? (7) When was the Templer's road metalled and repaired last?

The Chairman replied as follows:--

(1) and (2) The Keppu-ela was cleaned once during 1925, in February-March, at a cost of Rs. 419.85.

(3) and (4) It was cleaned in February-March, 1926, at a cost of Rs. 379.32

(5) and (6) The work is done on agreement, and is paid for at an agreed rate of Rs. 2 per cube of silt piled on the banks. The Superintendent of Works reports that after measurement the silt is spread out in the adjoining gardens.

(7) Templer's road was last metalled in 1921 and it has been gravelled yearly thereafter. Provision has been made

for metalling it this year.

4. Pursuant to notice Mr. Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E., moved that the Superintendent of Works may be directed to clean the Keppu-ela twice a year at regular intervals, removing from the bed all mud and other accumulations exposing the hard bed.

Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe seconded.—Carried.

5. To consider the amendment of the by-law prohibiting motor omnibuses on certain roads.—Resolved (a) to delete Customs road and Jail road from the list of prohibited roads; (b) that the Fort roads be prohibited, excepting (1) Hospital street, from the Old Gate to the junction of Pedlar street; (2) Pedlar street, from its junction with Hospital street to its junction with Church street; (3) Church street, from its junction with pedlar street to its junction with Queen street; (4) Queen street; (5) Leyn Baan cross street.

6. To recommend the payment of gratuity to the widow and children of the late Inspector, Anthonisz.—Resolved to grant, under section 23 of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, a pension of Rs. 150 per annum to the widow, and a

gratuity of Rs. 280 to the children of the late Inspector C. A. Anthonisz.

- 7. To consider an application for the erection of a petrol pump station.—Resolved that the site be not approved. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

(3) (c) Estimate of Rs. 200 for providing a new platform at the Pavilion.—Recommended.

Resolution.

With regard to item (2) resolved that ten per cent. of the estimated value of the work executed by the contractor and of the materials supplied by him, be retained by the Chairman from each payment, until the completion of the contract, as the security to be furnished by the contractor.

The recommendation of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining item was adopted.

Standard Oil Company.

Method of producing low boiling point oil from a relatively higher boiling point oil or fraction.

Abstract.—A solvent oil is continuously circulated, conjointly with the oil to be cracked, through a closed system in which the pressure is maintained throughout. The solvent oil is of lower boiling point than the oil to be cracked, and remains substantially uncracked and unvaporized at the temperature and pressure in the said system, while the heavy derivatives of the cracking are taken into and maintained in solution by the said solvent oil.

The claims are :--

1. A process of producing a low boiling point fraction of a petroleum oil from a relatively higher boiling point oil which consists in continuously circulating through a closed system conjointly with the oil to be cracked a solvent oil of lower boiling point than the oil to be cracked, which solvent oil is substantially uncracked and unvaporized at the temperature and pressure required to crack said first-mentioned oil, and maintaining a pressure and temperature to crack the high boiling point oil, said pressure being maintained throughout said system, and whereby the heavy derivatives of cracking are taken into and maintained in solution by the solvent oil.

2. A process as claimed in claim 1 in which the low boiling point vapor from the cracked oil is continuously passed out of the system and the solution of the solvent oil and heavy derivatives from the cracked oil is continuously discharged

to prevent deposition of carbonaceous matter in the system.

3. A process as claimed in claim 1 or 2 in which a substantially constant volume of oil and substantially constant temperature and pressure are maintained in the closed system wherein cracking takes place, whereby a substantially uniform low boiling point fraction is continuously produced.

4. In a process as claimed in the preceding claims maintaining the solution of solvent oil and heavy derivatives from the cracked oil by dilution with additional solvent oil and by discharge from becoming sufficiently concentrated to

cause deposition in the system.

5. A process as claimed in claim 1, 2, or 3, in which a relatively low boiling point fraction present in the original oil and unaffected by the cracking or produced from the original oil as a result of the cracking is utilized as the solvent oil, additional solvent oil being added as necessary to maintain a sufficient proportion of solvent oil.

6. The process of producing a low boiling point fraction of a petroleum oil from a relatively higher boiling point

oil substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

Process for the continuous production of low boiling point hydrocarbons from petroleum oils.

Abstract.—The high boiling point oil is distilled under reduced pressure, so that the temperature of boiling is lowered and no cracking takes place at this stage; the distillate obtained is then condensed and submitted to a temperature and pressure sufficient to crack it.

The claims are :-

1. A process for the production of low boiling point oil from higher boiling point oil which comprises distilling the high boiling point oil under a reduced pressure, such as to lower the vaporizing temperature below the decomposition temperature of the oil undergoing distillation, condensing the vapors of distillation and subjecting the condensate so produced to a temperature and pressure sufficient to crack it to produce a low boiling point distillate.

A process as claimed in claim 1 in which the high boiling point oil to be treated is continuously supplied, the distillate produced is continuously removed and continuously circulated through a closed system conjointly with a solvent oil of lower boiling point, under conditions of temperature and pressure adapted to crack only the said distillate whereby the heavy residues of cracking are taken into and maintained in solution by the solvent oil which remains substantially uncracked and unvaporized.

3. A process as claimed in claim 2 in which the low boiling point oil produced by the cracking of the distillate is continuously passed off as vapour from the system and the resultant solution is maintained by dilution with additional solvent oil or by suitable discharge from becoming sufficiently concentrated to cause deposition in the system.

4. A process as claimed in claim 2 or 3 in which the volume of oil, temperature and pressure in the closed system are maintained substantially constant.

A process for the continuous production of a low boiling point distillate from petroleum oil, substantially as hereinbefore described, with reference to the accompanying drawings.
