KNOW Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, in exercise of the power in Us vested by section 85 of the Ordinance No. 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for the General Regulation of Customs in the Island of Ceylon," do by this Our Proclamation appoint Dodanduwa, in the Southern Province, to be a port in this Colony from and after November 1, 1925, and declare the respective limits thereof to be those set out in the schedule hereto, and We do further appoint the place set out in the said schedule to be the legal quay within such limits for the lading and unlading of goods, and declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as set out in the said schedule.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-five.

SCHEDULE.

Dodanduwa.

The limits are as follows:—

- North and east : The seabeach between Waldutuduwa Point and Paratallegala rock.
- South : A line drawn due west from Paratallegala rock on the beach to a distance of 2 geographical miles.
- West : A line connecting Waldutuduwa Point with the western end of the southern boundary.

Legal Quay.

The foreshore opposite the Customs buildings extending from the southern boundary wall to the mouth of the Ratgam-oya.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

1. It shall be lawful for an Education District Committee, appointed under section 18 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920, to appoint one or more attendance officers to secure the attendance of children at elementary schools in districts in which by-laws for their compulsory attendance are in force. The salaries of such attendance officers shall be fixed by the Education District Committee and shall be paid out of their funds.

2. An attendance officer appointed under section 1 of these regulations may require the occupier of any premises to give full information with regard to the children residing in such premises and with regard to the provision, if any, which is made for their instruction.

3. Any person who refuses to give an attendance officer any information which such attendance officer is authorized by these regulations to require, or wilfully gives any information which is false in any particular, or wilfully obstructs any attendance officer in the discharge of his duties, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction thereof to a fine not exceeding twenty rupees or in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding one month.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1926.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service will be held in London in 1926. The *vivá voce* test (Subject 6) will be held in July and each candidate will in due course be informed when he is to appear. The question papers for some written tests that are taken by small numbers of candidates may also be set in July. The examination in Section A subjects which are taken by all candidates will begin on August 2.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before *May 15, 1926*, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners, unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office certificate of posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W. 1. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

Candidates will be notified in June of the date and place fixed for their *vivá voce* test and of the manner in which the fee (£8) is to be paid. The time table of the written part of the examination will be posted early in July to the address given on the form of application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend.

NOTE.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following services, viz. :—

- Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service ;
- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service ;

should be held in 1926 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Indian Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, &c. will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these services, subject to the following conditions :—

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or the Colonial Service (or both), as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Colonial Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Colonial Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Colonial Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Colonial Service.

(3) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(4) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

REGULATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

* * The following regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year :—

1. An examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in July and August of each year for such number of appointments to that service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. Save as hereinafter provided a candidate must be a British subject. If the candidate (being a British subject) or his father or his mother was not born within His Majesty's Dominions and allegiance then at the time of his birth his father must have been a British subject or the subject of a state in India and such father must be or must have continued to be until his death a British subject or the subject of such state in India. Provided that a ruler or subject of any state in India in respect of whom the Governor-General in Council has made a declaration under section 96A of the Government of India Act may be considered eligible.

3. A candidate must have attained the age of twenty-one, and must not have attained the age of twenty-four on the first day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

4. A candidate who is a native of India must obtain a certificate of age and qualification under regulations 2 and 3 issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 1,114, dated September 12, 1918, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the province, or the Commissioner of the division within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a native state, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the state in which his family resides.

5. A candidate must be free from disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him, or likely to unfit him for the Indian Civil Service.*

6. A candidate shall satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Indian Civil Service.

7. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a selected candidate for the Indian Civil Service and subsequently resigned his position as a selected candidate, will be admitted to the examination.

8. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries in the case of any candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects he will be ineligible for admission to the Indian Civil Service, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

11. In subjects 50 to 67 the civilization subject associated with a language can only be taken by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.§

* The Civil Service Commissioners will regard no person as constitutionally fitted for appointment to the Indian Civil Service who has not been satisfactorily vaccinated within the last seven years.

† Syllabus defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects is sent herewith.

§ E.g., a candidate desiring to offer subject No. 51 (Roman Civilization) must also offer subject No. 50 (Latin Language).

12. A candidate desiring to offer any of the subjects 30 to 42 or subject 47 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (28), Geography (43), Physical Anthropology (44), and Agriculture (46), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

13. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

14. Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.*

15. A list of the competitors shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each competitor, and in that order so many competitors, up to the determined number of appointments, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination, shall be designated to be selected candidates for the Indian Civil Service, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any selected candidate become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled or not. In the former case the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate.

16. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

Procedure.

Immediately the results of the examination are known, successful candidates will be summoned to attend at the Civil Service Commission to be medically examined and to state their choice among the services open to them and among the various Departments, Provinces, or Colonies. That statement of choice is irrevocable.

Evidence of Age.

A candidate born in the United Kingdom must not send in a birth certificate with this form, but must be prepared to produce it when required.

A European or Anglo-Indian who was born in India must be prepared to produce when required a certificate of baptism from the district in which he (or she) was baptized. (c) The supplies under each service should be delivered as follows:—

Service A.—Halmilla timber in the log—50 per cent. of the contracted for quantity before end of April, 1926, and the balance 50 per cent. before end of July, 1926.

Services B and C.—Halmilla and na poles—60 per cent. of the contracted for quantity before end of March, 1926, and the balance 40 per cent. before end of May, 1926. In the case of Services B and C the successful tenderers will be required to supply for the inspection of the officers of the Telegraph Department, half a dozen sample poles of each species before they are finally allowed to sign the contract. If at such inspection the poles are found to be unsuitable for the purpose of the Telegraph Department, it will be open to the Forest Department to reject the tenders. Further, the Forest Department does not bind itself to pay any compensation for any expenses incurred by tenderers for the supply of sample poles.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

19. (1) The following species shall not be felled unless stamped by a Forest Officer:—

(a) Promising seed bearers and sound and healthy saplings of satin, pahu, milla, ranai, halmilla, ebony, kon, ehela, kolon, and other superior species and valuable re-growth.

(b) All trees under 12 in. in girth unless otherwise ordered by the Divisional Forest Officer.

(2) The following species shall be felled and converted into firewood:—

(a) All inferior species above 12 in. in girth (6 in. above ground) unless otherwise ordered by the Divisional Forest Officer.

(b) All crooked and unsound trees of the superior species stamped by a Forest Officer with due regard to a uniform distribution of standards not less than 50 and not exceeding 100 to an acre.

(3) Natural undergrowth to be left undisturbed except in portions where the Divisional Forest Officer orders it to be removed. Brushwood should be spread evenly over the area in which completed block and before a new block is entered. When the whole area is completed brushwood must also be spread over the cart tracks. No brushwood, however, should be spread within 10 ft. of any standard.

(4) There will be no restrictions about carting inside the 5-acre blocks.

(5) Coppicing of stumps will not be done.

(6) A percentage of the standards to be left standing on the area will be marked beforehand by the Forest Department, and the balance marked as the contract progresses according to silvicultural requirements. The number of such standards to be retained will be between 50 and 100 per acre.

(7) For this year, in view of the less exacting conditions than those which have hitherto prevailed.

15. The extent of landed property and the nature and extent of other interests should also be given.

The contract shall be entered into by the contractor with the Head of the Department acting for and on behalf of His Majesty the King, and the designation of such officer shall mean and include the officer for the time being holding such office and his successors in office for the time being under the Government of Ceylon.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 24, 1925.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 137 (4 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 26 Moors, 3 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1925, viz., 256,049) was 27.9, as against 31.4 in the preceding week, 28.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 154 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 83 Sinhalese, 34 Tamils, 23 Moors, 4 Malays and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31.4, as against 26.3 in the previous week, 28.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 154 total deaths, 29 were of infants under one year of age, as against 21 in the preceding week, 28 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 17.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. Twenty-two deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 4 in Kotahena South, and 2 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana North, as against 16 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Twelve deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals, 3 in Maradana North, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, and Kotahena South, as against 21 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in Kotahena South, Maradana hospital, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 3 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in San Sebastian and Maradana North, as against 8 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

3. Six deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in Kotahena South and Maradana East, as against 5 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

4. One death from *Plague* was registered in Maradana North, against nil in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

5. Twenty-two deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 8 from *Debility*, 6 from *Enteritis*, 4 from *Diarrhoea*, 2 from *Dysentery*, 1 each from *Worms* and *Tetanus*, and 61 from *Other Causes*.

6. Eleven cases of *Measles*, 8 of *Chickenpox*, and 6 of *Enteric Fever* were reported during the week, as against 11, 7, and 4, respectively, of the preceding week. No case of *Plague* was reported either this week or in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.5°, against 81.4° in the preceding week, and 80.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.941 in., against 29.877 in. in the preceding week, and 29.872 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 6.23 in., against 2.09 in. in the preceding week, and 6.29 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Sinhalese or Tamil : The standard will be that of the Cambridge Senior Examination.

Needlework : Questions will be set on the work prescribed in the Code for Standards III. to VII.

(6) *Vivá Voce :* Candidates for the Kindergarten Course may be required to relate a story suitable for children from 5 to 6 years of age. Three stories should be prepared.

N.B. 1.—Candidates for the Kindergarten Course may omit the subject under (5).

2. Candidates for the one year Course will take sections (1), (4), and (6) only.

Conditions of Studentship Examinations.

1. Candidates must be at least 18 years of age.

2. Candidates must forward with their applications (i.) a medical certificate stating that he or she is physically fit for the teaching profession ; (ii.) a certificate of recommendation from the Manager of a school or an Inspector ; (iii.) two certificates of character.

3. Candidates must be prepared to execute a bond pledging themselves to serve not less than five years (men) and three years (women) in a Government or grant-in-aid school after training.

4. It must be understood that all students are appointed on probation for the first three months, but that even after the probationary period they are liable to be discontinued, unless a reasonable degree of promise is shown.

5. All students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work.

6. Students are expected to reside within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their place of residence is suitably situated for study. Board and residence will be provided for a limited number of students, on payment of the prescribed charge, during the time the College is in session. Students may be required to reside in the College at the discretion of the Principal.

7. All students will receive free passes by rail to and from their homes during vacations.

**UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.—INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS IN ARTS, SCIENCE, AND
SCIENCE (AGRICULTURE), 1926.**

(These examinations commence on the first Mouday in July.)

NO candidate shall be admitted to them unless he have passed, or been admitted under Statute 116 (see Appendix) as exempt from, a Matriculation Examination not later than that of the preceding January.

A candidate who has sat for the January Matriculation Examination may, if he so desire, enter provisionally for an Intermediate Examination, pending the results of the Matriculation Examination.

Application for admission to the examinations should be made to the Director of Education not later than January 31, on the prescribed forms, which can be obtained from the Education Office.

The subjects for which a candidate desires to enter, the date of his matriculation, his name in full (initials not sufficient) should be stated on the application form.

The admission fee—*vide* particulars in footnotes *—must be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Chartered Bank of India, &c., Colombo, and the receipt of the Bank and a certificate of good conduct sent with the form of application. *No cash or Bank draft or Money Order or Cheque will be accepted.*

All payments to the Bank must be forwarded with the form giving particulars of payment. This form can be had on application to this office.

N.B.—The University fee should not under any circumstances be remitted direct to the University of London or to the Education Office.

A candidate whose entry for an Intermediate Examination has been accepted provisionally pending the results of a January Matriculation Examination, but is found ineligible owing to his failure in the latter examination, will be credited with Rs. 94.50.

Every candidate who is credited with a portion of the fee in accordance with the preceding paragraphs, when re-entering, must pay the extra amount necessary to make up the fee due, particulars of which are given in footnote *.

If a candidate retire after the commencement of the examination, or fail to pass it, the full fee shall be payable upon re-entry.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of a candidate to pass, the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting *visd voce* questions to any candidate.

In the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Geology papers, questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some

books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination. These questions will be optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

Scheme of Examination.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN ARTS.

Candidates shall be examined in four subjects as follows:—

(1) Latin with Roman History†, or Greek with Greek History†, or Pali with Early Indian History, or Sanskrit with Early Indian History.)

(2) One of the following subjects:—Latin with Roman History, if not already taken under (1); Greek with Greek History, if not already taken under (1); Pali with Early Indian History, if not taken under (1); Sanskrit with Early Indian History, if not taken under (1); English; French; German; Sinhalese; Tamil. Advanced Modern English Literature; British Constitution†.

Note.—Candidates taking Sinhalese, or Tamil, or Sanskrit, or Pali must forward their entries so as to reach this office not later than November 30.

(3) One of the following subjects‡:—Pure Mathematics‡; Applied Mathematics‡; Logic; Ethics; Physics; Chemistry; Botany; Geology; History of Architecture; Geography; Economics; Zoology; Law.

(4) Any one of the previous subjects not already taken, or English History or Modern European History or Ancient History.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them.

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only, at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Arts. Referred candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects within the above stated limits will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again†.

The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A candidate who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Arts may enter for examination in an additional alternative subject.

SYLLABUSES.

Latin with Roman History (Two Papers).

(1) Prepared prose book** with questions on Roman History (including Historical Geography) from 280 B.C. to 14 A.D. Translation of English sentences into Latin. As an alternative to Roman History, 280 B.C. to 14 A.D. Candidates may offer Roman Life with outlines of Roman Political History††.

(2) Prepared verse book**. Questions on Grammar. Translation into English of easy passages not prescribed.

Greek with Greek History (Two Papers).

(1) Prepared books or portions of books, prose and verse** with questions on Greek History (including Historical Geography) from 660 B.C. to 323 B.C. As an alternative to Greek History 660–323 B.C., candidates may offer Greek Life with outlines of Greek Political History††.

Composition: History of Literature; Texts.

History of Literature to include the outlines of Literary History from 1579 to 1800 with selected works.

French, German (Two Papers in each).

The examination will include a test in writing from dictation, in correct reading, and in simple conversation.

(1) Translation from specified texts†, with questions on their language and subject-matter.

(2) Translation from unspecified texts; translation from English into Sinhalese; questions on Grammar.

Tamil (Two Papers).*

(1) Translation from specified texts†, with questions on their language and subject-matter.

(2) Translation from unspecified texts; translation from English into Tamil; questions on Grammar.

Advanced Modern English Literature (Two Papers).

I.—History of English Literature from 1660 to 1900, with special study of prescribed books†.

II.—Shakespeare, with selected plays to be specially studied†.

The British Constitution (Two Papers).

Outlines of the Constitution and Public Administration of the United Kingdom at the present day, including the Organization and Working of Parliament, the Executive (Crown, Ministers, and Civil Service), and the Judiciary; the Constitution and Powers of the Local Authorities in England; the relations between the United Kingdom and its Colonies and Dependencies.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

Pure Mathematics (Two Papers).

Geometry.—The Geometry of the Matriculation Examination, together with the Geometry of Similar Rectilineal Figures, Mensuration of Plane Rectilineal Figures and of the Circle, the Elementary Properties of the Plane, including those of the angles made by planes with straight lines and with one another, the Elementary Properties of the Sphere and Plane Sections thereof, Mensuration of Simple Solid Figures, including the Cylinder, Cone, and Sphere.

Logic (Two Papers).

[This Syllabus is intended to indicate the general scope and character of the curriculum, without being exhaustive of all parts of the subject.]

Tracing the lines of force in the neighbourhood of a Magnet.
Comparison of Magnetic Moments and Fields.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their Notebooks certified by their teachers as being the record of their work carried out by the candidate in the laboratory, so that the Examiners may inspect them if they so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:—

I.

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.
The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ.
Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme.
General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts.
History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most familiar compounds.
The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis: the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.
The whole to be treated in an elementary manner.
Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.—*Practical Examination.*

(Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis, provided it do not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.)

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallisation, distillation, &c.: Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissues; cell formation and the development of the tissues. The plant body; its structure, development, and various modifications.

Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Angiosperms, as exemplified by plants belonging to the following natural orders:—Dilleniaceæ, Malvaceæ, Portulacaceæ, Myrtaceæ, Leguminosæ, Cucurbitaceæ, Compositæ, Convolvulaceæ, Acanthaceæ, Scrophulariaceæ, Euphorbiaceæ, Palmaceæ or Commelinaceæ, Orchidaceæ, Gramineæ.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Gymnosperms, as exemplified by *Cycas*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteridophyta, as exemplified by *Selaginella*, *Aspidium*, *Asplenium*, or *Adiantum*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Bryophyta, as exemplified by *Polytrichum* (or *Funaria*) and by *Marchantia* (or *Lunularia*).

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Algæ, as exemplified by *Fucus*, *Oedogonium*, *Pleurococcus*, and *Spirogyra*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Fungi, as exemplified by *Agaricus*, *Eurotium*, *Pythium*, *Saccharomyces*, *Bacillus*.

Elementary Physiology.

The Chemical nature of the food elements of plants. Their sources, the modes in which they are respectively absorbed by the organism.

The absorption of water—turgescence, transpiration, root-pressure.

Movements of water in plants.

Aeration and respiration.

Photosynthesis. Outlines of metabolic changes within the plant.

Growth.

Irritability, Geotropism, Heliotropism.

Elementary aspects of Evolution and Genetics.

Practical Examination.

The practical work will include the dissection and examination of plants or parts of plants, and the reference to their systematic position of plants or parts of plants comprised in the foregoing Syllabus*. Simple experiments in Practical Physiology may be set.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Geology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

I.—*Physical Geology*.—The Earth as a Planet. Its larger surface features.

Atmospheric Agents and their effects. Action of surface and underground water and of ice.

The Ocean, its Movements and Work.

Distribution of Temperature and Pressure in the Earth, and its Density. The Internal Forces and their Effects.

Subsidence and Elevation. Volcanoes and Earthquakes.

Characters and Relations of Rock Masses. The nature of Aqueous and Igneous Rocks and their Modes of Occurrence (Strike, Dip, Joining, Folding, Faulting, Cleavage, Foliation; Interbedding, and Intrusion of Igneous Rocks). Features produced by Denudation (Outcrop, Escarpments, Outliers, Inliers, Unconformity, Overlap).

II.—*Mineralogy relating to the important Rock-forming Minerals*.—The common crystal forms and combinations, with the principles of crystallographic notation.

Minerals, their Physical Properties and Chemical Composition. Silica in its different forms. The chief minerals of the following groups:—Pyroxenes, Amphiboles, Felspars, Micas, Garnets, Zeolites, Chlorites. Also Olivine, Zircon, Beryl, Epidote, Zoisite, Cordierite, Leucite, Nepheline, Sodalite, Nosean, Haüyne, Tourmaline, Andalusite, Fibrolite, Kyanite, Staurolite, Spheene, Serpentine, Talc, Kaolin, Native Elements [Carbon, Sulphur]. Oxides [Iron Oxides, Spinels, Corundum, Rutile]. Rock Salt. Fluor Spar. Apatite. The Rock-forming Carbonates, Sulphides, and Sulphates.

Practical Examination.

Interpretation of Weather Charts. Physical Maps with contour lines and the method of drawing sections across them.

Drawing sections across some simple Geological Map.

Identification and Description of simple crystal forms and combinations by means of models or from actual specimens. Determination of the important Rock-forming Minerals in hand specimens, and in thin slices under the microscope.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

In and after 1927 the syllabus in Geology will be as follows:—

- I.—*Physical Geology*.—(a) The Earth as a Planet: Origin and general characters of its chief surface features.
(b) The physical condition of the earth's crust and interior: Evidence of internal activity such as volcanic, seismic, and diastrophic phenomena.
(c) General characters and inter-relationships of rocks.
(d) The work of geological agents: The circulation of rock material, including the processes of denudation, transport, deposition, and deformation.
- II.—*Mineralogy and Petrology*.—(a) Elements of crystallography and crystallographic projection and notation.
(b) The common rock-forming and vein-forming minerals: Their physical characters, chemical composition, and modes of origin and occurrence.
(c) The simpler optical properties of the common rock-forming minerals and the physical principles on which these properties depend.
(d) The general characters and relationships of the chief types of sedimentary, igneous, and metamorphic rocks.
- III.—*Historical Geology*.—The disposition of rocks and its representation on maps; Evidence of relative ages of rocks; Fossils, their preservation and distribution in rocks of different ages; The geological systems, their broad characters and distribution in Great Britain.

Practical Work.

Interpretation of simple geological maps in terms of rock-structure and its relation to topography; Expression of this interpretation by means of sections; Graphic methods of finding thickness, dip and strike of beds, of completing outcrops, and of tracing the underground extension of strata.

Identification and description of common minerals and typical rocks, with and without the microscope; Exercises in projection of crystals; Identification and description of crystal forms of common minerals, both on models and on actual crystals.

Reference of fossils to their broad biological groups and geological periods.

History of Architecture.

- (1) Greek and Roman Architecture (one paper).
 - (2) History of Greek and Roman Art (one paper).
- The characteristics of various periods and their course of development in Egypt, Assyria, Greece, and Rome.
- (3) Drawings of Greek and Roman Orders done during the session to be submitted and marked.

Two Imperial size sheets† of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., "Greek and Roman Architecture."

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

English History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to be prescribed two years previously‡.

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History, from about 1400 to the present day. One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text‡.

Ancient History (Two Papers).

Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.C.

Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.C. to 330 A.D.

A selected portion† of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

* The list of plants may be changed from time to time, but two years' notice of any change will always be given.

† Each sheet should bear a statement by the candidate's teacher to the effect that it is the *bona fide* work of the candidate himself.

‡ For prescribed books see Appendix to these Regulations.

Geography (Two Papers).

- I.—*General Geography.*—The distribution of land and water. The leading facts of wind and water circulation. The broad structural features of the continents, and the chief processes by which surface features are produced.
- II.—*Regional Geography.*—The great divisions of the world considered under the following heads:—
- Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils and rocks and minerals of economic importance.
 - The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates.
 - The river systems as related to configuration and climate.
 - The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture.
 - The sources of mechanical power.
 - The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land.
 - The localization of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors.
 - Transport. Trade centres and trade routes. States as conditioned by geographical circumstances—physical, economic, and strategic.

Economics (Two Papers).

I.—*Industrial and Commercial History.*—The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent to 1760.

To include:—The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in industrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

II.—*Principles of Economics.*—Economics, analytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom.

To include:—The scope of economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Syllabus may be had on application.

Law (Two Papers).

- (i.) The general conception of law, including various legal duties and rights treated in an elementary manner.
- (ii.) English Constitutional Law and its History, including:—
 - (a) The nature of Constitutional Law.
 - (b) The Liberty of the Subject.
 - (c) Parliament.
 - (d) The Crown.
 - (e) The Courts of Law.
- (iii.) The Law of Crimes, being the general nature of criminal liability, together with an outline of the more common crimes.

- (iv.) The general Principles of Tort and Civil Wrong.
- (v.) The main features of a Contract.
- (vi.) A general outline of the Law of Property with particular reference to the duties of Trustees towards their beneficiaries.

*Scheme of Examination.***SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE.**

Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Experimental Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General Physiology* or General Principles of Biology and Geography (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list must be taken from amongst the first three).

In each subject questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by means of *visà voce* questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects taken†.

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Science.

Referred‡ candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects according to these conditions will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science may enter for examination in one or more supplementary subjects.

† Candidates who in any year from 1880 to 1896 inclusive, have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science, and candidates who in and after 1897 shall have passed that examination taking the following subjects, viz., Experimental Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology, will, for the purposes of these regulations, be credited with having passed the First Examination for Medical Degrees.

Candidates who have passed an Intermediate Examination in Science or Agriculture with Chemistry, or Physics, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed.

Candidates who have passed the B.Sc. Examination with Physics, or Chemistry, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed.

No exemption in General Biology at the First Examination for Medical Degrees will be granted to candidates who have not passed an Intermediate Examination in Science, or the B.Sc. Examination with Botany and Zoology.

Candidates who passed in Chemistry at the Intermediate Examination in Science in 1904 will be exempted from further examination in Organic and Applied Chemistry at the Second Examination for Medical Degrees Part I.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering as External Students may, in order to obtain exemption from the whole of the Intermediate Examination in Science, complete that examination by taking an additional subject at the Intermediate Examination in Engineering. Such additional subject may be taken either at an entry for the Intermediate Examination in Engineering or at any Intermediate Examination in Engineering subsequent to that at which the candidate has passed; and a fee of Rs. 70/50 will be payable in respect of each entry in such additional subject.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering will be allowed to complete the Intermediate Examination in Science as above, and also, should they so desire, to enter for the B.Sc. Examination in the same year in which they do so complete, provided that they have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering not less than one year previously.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture may claim exemption at the Intermediate Examination in Science from subjects which could have been taken at the Intermediate Examination in Science.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Arts Examinations with Pure Mathematics will be exempted that subject at the Intermediate Science Examination. Candidates who have passed the B. A. Examination with Pure Mathematics or Applied Mathematics or both of those subjects will be exempted at the Intermediate Science Examination, the subject or subjects in which they have so passed.

Candidates who passed the Intermediate Examination in Arts for External Students in or after 1920, or who have passed the corresponding examination for Internal Students, under the conditions applicable to External Students in force since that date, with any of the following subjects: Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, Military Science, Geography may claim exemption, when entering for the Intermediate Examination in Science, from examination in such of the foregoing subjects as they may have taken.

Candidates who have passed the Second Medical Examination, Parts I and II, may claim exemption from examination in General Physiology at the Intermediate Examination in Science.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

1. The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.

2. The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified and an elementary knowledge of—

(a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate, including an elementary knowledge of heredity, variation, and evolution.

(b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.

(c) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Fœtal Membranes in the Bird and Mammal.

3. A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups:—

Protozoa:—Lobosa, Foraminifera, Radiolaria, Sporozoa, Flagellata, Ciliata.

Cœlenterata:—Hydrozoa, Anthozoa.

Platyhelminia:—Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda.

Annelida:—Oligochaeta, Polychaeta.

Articulata:—Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida.

Chordata:—Urochorda, Cephalochorda.

Craniata:—Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia.

Practical Examination.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregoing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of Lepus will be substituted that of Canis), and to determine the zoological position of specimens in accordance with paragraph 3 above. The list of animals may be changed from time to time, but two years' notice of any change will always be given.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Geology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

I.—Physical Geology.—Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

II.—Mineralogy.—Elements of Crystallography as exemplified by Crystals of Galena, Pyrite, Zircon, Beryl, Calcite, Quartz, Barytes, Gypsum, Albite. Twin Crystals. Crystallographic Notation.

Physical Properties and Chemical Constitution of Minerals; the relations existing between these and Crystalline Form (Isomorphism and Polymorphism), Crystalline Form, Physical Properties, Chemical Composition, and General Mode of Occurrence of the following Minerals:—Graphite; Diamond. Pyrite, Marcasite, Copper Pyrites, Galena,

Zinc-Blende. Rock Salts; Fluor. Quartz, Chalcodony, Opal; Zircon, Rutile, Cassiterite Corundum, Ilmenite, Hematite; Limonite. Spinel, Magnetite, Chromite. Aragonite; Calcite, Dolomite, Magnesite, Chalybite, Barytes, Anhydrite; Gypsum. Apatite. Felspars (Orthoclase, Microcline, Albite, Oligoclase, Labradorite, Anorthite). Felspathoids (Nepheline, Leucite, Sodalite, Nosean, Hauyne). Micas (Muscovite, Lepidolite, Biotite, Phlogopite). Pyroxenes (Enstatite, Hypersthene, Diopside, Augite, Diallage, Aegerine). Amphiboles (Anthophyllite, Tremolite, Actinolite, Hornblende, Riebeckite, Glaucophane). Olivine; Garnet; Kyanite, Sillimanite, Andalusite, Topaz; Staurolite; Cordierite; Tourmaline, Spheue. Zeolites (Analcime, Appophyllite, Natrolite); Kaolin; Epidote; Chlorite, Chloritoid; Tale; Serpentine.

The simpler microscopical and optical characters of common rock-forming minerals.

Practical Examinations.

General Physiology.

(Two Papers and a Practical Examination.)

N.B.—Candidates will be permitted for the present to offer "General Principles of Biology"—see syllabus below—as an alternative to "General Physiology"; after 1927, "General Physiology" will be withdrawn from the list of subjects that may be offered at this examination.

1. The Fundamental Phenomena of Life, including—

Movement, as exemplified in unicellular organisms, ciliated cells, and the different kinds of muscle, and in plants.

Chemical change, including the production of carbon dioxide and the absorption of oxygen in plants and animals, and the assimilation of carbon and the production of oxygen in green plants.

Irritability. The response of living cells and tissues to different kinds of stimuli.

Growth and reproduction.

2. The Form of Living Organisms, including—

The cell and its parts, and their significance.

The aggregation of cells to form syncytin or composite individuals.

The differentiation of structure and function.

3. The Chemistry of Living Organisms.

The elementary constituents of protoplasm.

The chemical compounds characteristic of living material, namely, carbohydrates, fats, and proteins.

The origin of these substances from inorganic material, and their fate and significance in living organisms.

4. The Physical Chemistry of the cell.

The properties of crystalloids and colloids.

The meaning of solution and the significance of this condition in living processes.

5. The Mechanism of Chemical Changes in Living Matter.

The mode of action of ferments and the effect on the cell of changes in reaction and inorganic content of the surrounding medium.

6. The Production of energy in Living Organisms.

The sources of energy and the relation between chemical, mechanical, and heat changes in cells.

7. Reproduction.

Cell division, and the physiological significance of sexual reproduction.

Development of a new individual from the fertilized ovum.

Heredity, variation, and natural selection.

Practical Examination.

Candidates will be expected to have made a practical study of the structure, functions, and life history of some typical unicellular organisms, of some typical multicellular plants, and of a limited number of animal types. Only such anatomical details should be studied as are necessary for the comprehension of the physiological principles. Candidates will be examined further in the histology of the chief tissues and organs in a mammal and a more detailed consideration of the part played by each organ in the life of the animal, e.g., the histology and the chemistry of the blood and connective tissues, the histology and function of muscle, the circulation of the blood, the lungs, and the part they play in respiration, the digestion and absorption of food, excretion by the kidney and by the skin, metabolism and the regulation of the body temperature, co-ordination of the functions of the body by chemical means and by the central nervous system, the organs of special sense and their significance.

General Principles of Biology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

1. The differences between living and not-living matter.
2. Cells. Cell-division and the building up of the multicellular organism. Individuals and colonies. Integration. Differentiation and division of labour.
3. The general structure of a flowering plant and of a mammal.
4. The elementary chemistry and physics of living substance Enzyme action.
5. The sources and transformation of energy in plants and animals, including bacteria. Nutrition. Photosynthesis Anaerobiosis.
6. Stimulus and response in plants and animals. The transmission of excitation. Nervous systems. Receptor and effector organs.
7. Movements in plants and animals.
8. Chemical co-ordination.
9. The mechanisms involved in :—
 - (a) The intake and distribution of food-material, water and oxygen.
 - (b) The elimination of waste.
 - (c) The storage of reserve material.
10. Growth (localized and general). Reproduction. Formation and conjugation of gametes.
11. The formation of the embryo in plants and animals. Segmentation and gastrulation. The genesis of organs.
12. Heredity. Outlines of the theory of organic evolution. Adaptation to the environment.

Practical Work.

- (a) Appropriate physiological and other experiments.
- (b) Dissection and microscopical examination of suitable animal and vegetable types.
- (c) Microscopical examination of cells and tissues.
- (d) Elementary embryology of plants and animals.

Geography (Two Papers).

I.—*General Geography.*—The distribution of land and water. The leading facts of wind and water circulation. The broad structural features of the continents and the chief processes by which surface features are produced. The objects and relative value of Mercator's, the orthographic and the conic projections.

II.—*Regional Geography.*—Same as for the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Scheme of Examination.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE (AGRICULTURE).

Candidates shall be examined for a pass in (1) Chemistry, (2) Botany, (3) Zoology, and (4) one of the following subjects :—

Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Geology.

Question will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read so ne books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by means of *visd voce* questions.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects of the examination*.

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only, may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at the next Intermediate Examination in Agriculture.

A referred candidate who does not pass in the referred subject at the next examination will be required when re-entering to offer all the prescribed subjects again†.

* Any candidate whether Internal or External, who has passed in all the subjects of the Intermediate Examination in Arts, Science, Economics, or Engineering, shall be exempted from examination at the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture in any subject in which he passed at such examination; and may thereafter be examined in any remaining subjects of the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, and, if successful therein may enter for the B.Sc. (Agriculture) Examination in the following year.

† Candidates who have passed an Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, with Chemistry, or Physics, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the

The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A candidate who either has passed the External Intermediate Examination in Science without qualifying for total exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, or has been referred in one subject at an External Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, may take the subject or subjects necessary to complete the External Intermediate in Agriculture at an External Intermediate Examination in Science on complying with the regulations in all other respects.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture may be examined in an additional alternative subject.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subjects chosen.

The nature and distribution of mineral or rock deposits of importance in agriculture.

First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed, but the full fee for that examination must be paid.

No exemption in General Biology at the First Examination for Medical Degrees will be granted to candidates who have not passed both in Botany and in Zoology.

† "Referred" Candidates must re-enter in accordance with the General Regulations.

APPENDIX II.

Statute 116 :—

116. Every candidate for admission as a student of the University shall pass such Entrance or Matriculation Examination, or fulfil such other tests of fitness to be admitted as a student, as may be from time to time prescribed.

REGULATION AS TO EXEMPTION FROM THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

Graduates of such British, Colonial, and Indian Universities as are approved by the Senate for that purpose, and those who have passed all the examinations required for a degree in those Universities, also women who have obtained Tripos Certificates granted by the University of Cambridge, and women who have obtained certificates showing that, under the conditions prescribed by the Delegacy for women students at Oxford, they have passed the Second Public Examination of that University or have obtained Honours in the Oxford University Examination for Women in Modern Languages, may on application be registered as Matriculated Students on payment of the registration fee of £3. 3s. without passing the Matriculation Examination.

For conditions under which the following examinations will give exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, see separate regulations obtainable on application to the External Registrar, University of London, South Kensington, London, S.W. 7:—

- Oxford Senior Local Examination.
- Higher Certificate Examination of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.
- School Certificate of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.
- Previous Examination of the University of Cambridge.
- Matriculation Examination of the Joint Board of the Northern Universities.
- School Certificate of the Joint Matriculation Board of the Northern Universities.
- Scotch School-leaving Certificate Examination.

For conditions under which the Cambridge Senior School Certificate Examination will give exemption from the Matriculation Examination, see regulations for Matriculation Examination.

The Standing of students registered under Statute 116 shall date, for the purposes of External Examinations, from the Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date of registration. (See Extract from Statute 120 below.) To secure that a registration under Statute 116 shall date from any Matriculation Examination, such registration must be completed before the commencement of the next Matriculation Examination.

N.B.—Applications for registration must be accompanied by the proper fee and official documentary evidence of qualification in accordance with the above regulation. Drafts must be made payable to the "University of London," and crossed Westminster Bank, Ltd., Brompton Square Branch." The fee and evidence must be forwarded together by registered post and addressed to the External Registrar, University of London, South Kensington, London, S.W. 7.

EXTRACT FROM STATUTE 120.

"No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases or special classes of cases otherwise determine."

Examination for the Admission of Learners to the Field Staff of the Irrigation Department.

AN examination for the admission of Learners to the Irrigation Department for training as Irrigation Sub-Inspectors will be held on December 16, 1925, at the following centres:—

Anuradhapura, Kurunegala, Tangalla, and Batticaloa.

2. Candidates wishing to take up the examination at Anuradhapura, Kurunegala, Tangalla, or Batticaloa should apply to the Divisional Irrigation Engineers in the respective centres. Candidates who were previously examined in any of the above-mentioned centres and not selected will only be allowed to attend examination again in the same centre. Applications for admission to the examination will be received not later than November 30, 1925, by the Divisional Irrigation Engineers mentioned.

3. Applications must be on the prescribed form, which can be obtained from a Divisional Irrigation Engineer.

4. Candidates must be between the ages of 18 and 25, and must furnish, together with their applications, the following certificates (original):—

(a) Birth certificate.

(b) Certificates of respectability from at least two persons, whose social or official position can be accepted as a guarantee of reliability, and who are not the candidates'

schoolmasters, and also conduct certificates from the candidates' schoolmasters.

(c) Educational certificate of a standard not lower than the Cambridge Junior School Certificate (with pass in Mathematics). The Elementary School-Leaving Certificate will not be accepted as an equivalent of the Cambridge Junior Certificate.

Candidates must also state whether they are single or married.

5. Candidates who are approved will be examined in—

(1) Mathematics.

(a) Arithmetic.

(b) Algebra (up to an including quadratic equations).

(c) Geometry (theorems and problems on the following: angles at a point; parallel straight lines; side and angle properties of triangles and parallelograms; areas of triangles and quadrilaterals; the chord, angle, and tangent properties of the circle; the properties of the right-angled triangle).

(d) Mensuration, elementary (of areas and solids).

(2) English Composition (Essay).

(3) *Vid voce* in English.

6. Successful candidates will be required, before final selection as Learners, to fill up a form (General 169), which may be obtained from a Divisional Irrigation Engineer, and handed to a Government Medical Officer, from whom a health certificate, testifying to the candidates' sound constitution, good vision, and hearing, and physical fitness for service in the jungle districts of the Island, must be obtained and produced to the Divisional Irrigation Engineer, for examination.

7. Security for the sum of Rs. 100 in two satisfactory sureties must be furnished to cover the cost of loss of stores or damage to instruments through neglect or carelessness. Candidates must also sign an agreement to the effect that they will serve, if so required by the Director of Irrigation, for a period of three years in this Department, failing which they will refund the cost of their training, if called upon to do so. After selection, they will be taken into a Divisional Office or sent on to works of construction or survey for about 9 months, and granted subsistence allowance of Rs. 30 a month during this period.

8. For and a half months of the period may be spent at the Training Classes of the Irrigation Department at Trincomalee, where free unfurnished camp quarters will be provided. A Learner proceeding to Trincomalee for training will only be allowed free railway warrants and actual fares by public conveyance between his home and Trincomalee, but when changing station afterwards, he will be paid in addition, daily subsistence allowance at the rate paid to Sub-Inspectors.

9. At the end of the training period a Learner will be examined as to his fitness for appointment as an Irrigation Sub-Inspector, but a Learner, who does not attend to his work, or shows no promise of becoming a satisfactory officer, may be discontinued at any time.

10. A Sub-Inspector will be eligible, on passing a further examination, for promotion to Irrigation Inspector (on vacancies occurring), and ultimately, after satisfactory service and approved ability, to Assistant Irrigation Engineer. The pay and prospects of these officers have been greatly improved, and at present are as follows:—

2. In a variable speed gear having an expanding pulley, a transmission member of variable pitch as claimed in claim 1 in which the elements are laterally movable automatically upon their support to form a series of compound teeth of the requisite width and at the requisite intervals so that the opposite ends of the elements in each tooth respectively engage projections and depressions on opposite faces of an expanding pulley irrespective of the diameter at which this pulley is working.

3. A transmission member as claimed in claim 1 or claim 2 in which the movable elements are in the form of plates, each independently movable in a plane parallel to the axis upon which the pulley rotates, these plates being prevented from movement along or around the support.

4. A variable speed gear having an expanding pulley provided with radial projections on one driving flange disposed opposite to corresponding depressions on the other driving flange, characterized by the transmission member comprising a ring carrying a series of laterally movable elements, the opposite ends of two or more adjacent elements respectively engaging the projections and depressions on the opposite faces or flanges of the pulley irrespective of the diameter at which this pulley is working.

5. A variable speed gear as claimed in claim 4 in which the transmission member comprises a flexible support or tension member carrying a series of plates, each independently movable upon the support in a plane at right angles to that in which the pulley rotates, the opposite ends of two or more adjacent plates respectively engaging projections and depressions on the opposite faces of the pulley in an automatic manner irrespective of the diameter at which this pulley is working.

6. In a driving gear, a transmission member comprising a flexible support or tension member carrying a series of sliding plates or elements as claimed in any of the preceding claims in which the support for the elements comprises a series of links pivotally connected together or one or more flexible bands, wires, or strips of woven wire having stops between each group of plates to prevent movement of the plates along the tension member as set forth.

7. A variable speed gear as claimed in any of the preceding claims in which the shape of the ribs on the pulley effects the lateral movement of each plate or element upon its support before such plates have to take up the driving stress.

8. A transmission member as claimed in claim 6 comprising a chain built up from a series of links each slotted to hold a group of plates which can be readily inserted or removed therefrom, these plates being adapted to slide across the length of the chain so that any two or more of these plates may form a compound driving tooth, as and for the purpose described.

9. A transmission member as claimed in the preceding claim in which the links of the chain are of wedge-shaped cross section and provided with arc-shaped slots to receive the ends of the plates.

10. A transmission member as claimed in claims 1 or 8 in which the plates are arched or otherwise formed flexible in the direction of their length whether formed of taper cross section or with parallel sides, as and for the purpose described.

11. A transmission member as claimed in claims 1 or 6 in which the number of plates carried by each link or packed between each pair of stops on the support is such with relation to the width of the ribs and depressions in the pulley flanges that at whatever diameter the pulley is working at least one compound tooth projects from each side of each group of plates.

"Improvements in method and apparatus for refrigeration and preserving perishable products."

Abstract.—The applicant describes a method of refrigeration and preservation of perishable products in which carbon dioxide snow is allowed to evaporate whereby cooling is produced, and the air and moisture in the apparatus are replaced by the heavy but inert gas produced. The solid carbon dioxide can be placed in the receptacle provided or can be prepared therein by the evaporation of liquid carbon dioxide in a suitable apparatus. Apparatus for carrying out the method is described.

The claims are:—

1. The method of refrigeration which consists in using in conjunction with a chamber containing the material to be refrigerated a suitably insulated solidified mass of an inert substance which at ordinary temperatures and pressures is a gas, and which on absorption of heat passes directly from the solid to the gaseous state, and permitting the gas as formed to permeate the chamber.

2. The method of refrigeration according to claim 1, characterized in that the substance employed is at ordinary temperatures and pressures a gas heavier than air, the specific gravity thereof being utilized to exclude air and moisture from the chamber containing the products to be refrigerated.

3. In a refrigerating system, means for containing carbon dioxide snow, said means including a sufficient extent of insulation to preserve the snow for the period of refrigeration desired, and to prevent over-refrigeration of the products to be refrigerated, and means permitting escape of the gas from the melting carbon dioxide snow for use both as a refrigerant and as a preservative by utilizing the escaping gas to prevent deterioration of perishable products.

4. A refrigerating system according to claim 3, characterized in that the carbon dioxide snow container is so proportioned to the total capacity and contents of the chamber to be refrigerated as to effect the required refrigeration by the escaping carbon dioxide gas produced by the evaporation of the carbon dioxide snow within the aforesaid container under normal conditions.

5. A refrigerating system according to claim 3 or 4, characterized in that the carbon dioxide snow container is substantially closed and insulated.

6. A refrigeration apparatus adapted for and using carbon dioxide snow as the refrigerant, said apparatus comprising an insulated refrigerating chamber, said chamber having its lower portion substantially air-tight, doors only in the upper portion of the chamber, an insulated container of carbon dioxide snow positioned in or near the bottom of the refrigerating chamber, whereby the temperatures of different portions of the refrigerating chamber are automatically controlled by the density of the carbon dioxide gas escaping from the insulated container of carbon dioxide snow at the bottom of the refrigerating chamber.

7. Refrigerating apparatus according to claim 6, in which said chamber is provided with shelves, the lowermost of which is provided with sliding doors to afford access to the lower compartment of the chamber through the upper doors thereof and whereby the user is afforded compartments of different refrigerating temperatures and whereby the chambers most frequently in use are the more accessible, said regulation of the temperatures of the respective compartments being automatically controlled by the density of the escaping carbon dioxide gas from the container of carbon dioxide snow in the bottom compartment substantially as set forth.

8. The method of refrigeration substantially as hereinbefore described.

9. A refrigerating system substantially as hereinbefore described and shown in the accompanying drawings.

10. Refrigerating apparatus substantially as hereinbefore described and shown in the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in or relating to the catalytic synthesis of ammonia."

Abstract.—The applicant states that industrial hydrogen can be freed from impurities such as carbonic oxide by mixing the hydrogen, nitrogen mixture under a pressure of 800 atmospheres with hot gas from the catalytic chamber containing, say 10–15 per cent. of ammonia: then putting the whole mixture through a condenser whereby the product of the reaction between the ammonia and the carbonic oxide, &c., are condensed by solution in ammonia.

The claims are:—

1. A process for the catalytic synthesis of ammonia under pressure in which the reacting gases hydrogen and nitrogen, containing gaseous impurities such as carbonic oxide, are freed therefrom by contact and reaction with excess of ammonia gas, the reaction products dissolved in condensed ammonia being removed from the circuit while the purified reaction gases deprived in whole or in part of ammonia pass on to catalysis.

2. A process for a continuous catalytic synthesis of ammonia under pressure in which the reacting gases hydrogen and nitrogen, containing gaseous impurities such as carbonic oxide, are freed therefrom by contact and reaction with excess of ammonia gas, the reaction products dissolved in condensed ammonia being removed from the circuit while the purified reaction gases deprived in whole or in part of ammonia pass on to catalysis.

3. For carrying out the process claimed in claims 1 or 2, the use of the reaction gases coming from the catalysis chamber as the source of the ammonia.

4. Synthetic ammonia when produced catalytically from its constituent gases with or without ammonia, said gases originally containing noxious impurities but freed therefrom (prior to catalysis) by means of ammonia in excess in the manner described or by any other obvious equivalent way.

5. A process for the catalytic synthesis of ammonia, substantially as described with reference to the annexed drawings.

The Salt Production Syndicate, Ltd.

"Improvements in the extraction of salts from aqueous solutions and apparatus therefor."

Abstract.—The applicants describe a process for the extraction of salts from solution and an apparatus therefor. The object of the process is to avoid as far as possible the scaling produced by certain salts on the heating surfaces. The process is described with reference to the extraction of salts from sea water in which the scaling is produced by the sparingly soluble calcium sulphate which separates before the sodium chloride. The sea water is raised to its boiling point and is concentrated to about one-third of its volume whereby it becomes saturated with calcium sulphate. The second step is carried out below the "critical point" 38° C whereby the calcium sulphate is precipitated as a mud instead of as a scale. The third stage, the separation of the sodium chloride is carried out either above or below the critical point therefor. A suitable apparatus is described.

The claims are:—

1. A process for extracting salts from solutions, which consists in first concentrating a solution of salts to remove the bulk of the water in excess of that required to dissolve the least soluble of the salts in solution, then continuing the evaporation at a temperature below that at which any of such salts are precipitated on heating surfaces as scale in order thereby to effect precipitation of such scaling salts in the body of the liquid and not on the heater surfaces and thereafter continuing the evaporation to procure the precipitation of other salts which on suffering precipitation do not attach themselves to the heater surfaces as scale.

2. A process for the extraction of a plurality of salts from solution, which characterized in that the process is conducted in stages, certain of them below a critical temperature which about 38° C or a little higher, and the others of them at temperatures determined by conditions of thermal economy.

3. A process for the extraction of salts from sea water which consists in conducting the evaporation at high temperature until a concentration point is reached below that at which calcium sulphate is precipitated, transferring the concentrated brine to another evaporator and continuing the evaporation therein below a critical temperature which is about 38° C or slightly higher, to procure the precipitation of the calcium sulphate as a mud, then transferring the strong brine to another evaporator, continuing evaporation therein for the precipitation of sodium chloride, and finally removing the residual liquor containing the bitters.

4. A process for extracting a plurality of salts from solution which is characterized in that the process is conducted in stages in the later of which precipitation is effected in progressive order of solubility so as to separately obtain pure salts and mixed salts which are respectively precipitated in different stages of the operation.

5. A stage process for the evaporating of water from saline solutions which is characterized in that it is conducted in calandria heated open top pans, each having a plurality of calandria contained in it.

6. Apparatus for the operation of a process according to claim 5 in which the calandria respectively associated with the evaporator pans are limited in depth so that the temperature required for the vaporization of water about the lower parts of them is not substantially different from the temperature required for the vaporization of water about the upper parts of them respectively.

7. Apparatus for evaporating water from saline liquids comprising an evaporator chamber and a plurality of shallow pans contained therein in tier arrangement with clearance spaces surrounding them, each of said pans fitted with a calandria of such limited depth that the temperature required at the bottom of it is not substantially different from the temperature required at the top of it to procure vaporization of water on all its immersed surfaces.

8. A process for the extraction of a plurality of salts from saline solutions which is characterized in that the extraction is effected fractionally in a continuous operation in vacuum, thereby to obtain segregation of pure salts from mixed salts.

9. Evaporating apparatus according to claim 7 utilizing vapor recompression, characterized in that one recompression pump is utilized to reheat the vapor produced by a plurality of calandria contained in one evaporator chamber.

10. Evaporating apparatus according to claim 9 in which circulating pumps and precipitation chambers with associated elements are inclosed in a casing surrounding an evaporator which contains a plurality of shallow pans and shallow calandria.

11. Apparatus for evaporating water from saline solutions, comprising a single evaporator chamber, a plurality of shallow pans arranged in tier therein with clearance around them, a calandria in each of said pans, said calandria limited in depth so that the vaporizing temperature required at the bottom of it is not substantially above that required at the top of it, a recompression pump having its delivery branched to each of the said calandria, a take-off pipe in the bottom of each pan, an air pump in the calandria pipe circuit, and means for transferring brine serially through the several pans.

12. Apparatus according to the preceding claim, in which continuous circulation of brine is maintained in the evaporator pans and through precipitation chambers disposed externally to the evaporator in combination with means for collecting salts precipitated in the external precipitation chambers and for transferring the brines serially through the several pans after extraction of a salt or salts therefrom at each stage of precipitation.

13. An evaporator according to any of the preceding claims, having delivery pipes from the bottom of the respective evaporator pans brought down into liquor sumps located at appropriate hydrostatic levels in relation to the pans respectively, and suction pipes from said sumps respectively to the following pans in serial order, thereby to procure automatic transference of brine from pan to pan whilst evaporation proceeds in said pans in stages so that the liquors in the successive pans are progressively submitted to concentration.

14. Apparatus for the extraction of salts from sea water, comprising three evaporators in serial order, the intermediate member of which is heated by a calandria of limited depth and operated below a critical temperature which is about 38° C, or slightly higher, delivery pipes depending from each of said evaporators other than the first one of them into separate sumps at hydrostatic levels, a suction pipe from the sump of the intermediate evaporator to the body of the final evaporator, a pipe connection from the body of the first evaporator into the body of the second evaporator, condensate drainage pipes from the several evaporators, an air pump piped through control valves to each of these condensate drain pipes, and a recompression pump associated with each of the said evaporators respectively taking vapor from the heads thereof and delivering said vapor under higher pressure to the calandria in the same evaporator.

15. Apparatus according to the preceding claim including cooling coils on the air pump suction pipes and a vapor shunt through a cooler coil associated with the circuit of the recompression pump of the intermediate evaporator.

16. Apparatus comprising a tier of shallow pans fitted with shallow calandria and with tubular drainage legs having their lower ends immersed in liquor sumps disposed at hydrostatic levels having regard to the depression within the evaporator chamber, suction pipes in serial order from said sumps to the pans, condensate drain pipes from the several calandria to drain sumps located at appropriate hydrostatic levels, an air pump connected into said drain pipes, and a vapor recompression pump taking vapor from the evaporator head and delivering it in recompressed condition into the several calandria.

17. Apparatus according to the preceding claim modified in that circulation is maintained through the evaporator pans respectively in circuit with precipitation chambers intermediate the pans and the liquor sumps, and that the circulation is maintained by centrifugal pumps in the connection between the several pans and their respective precipitation vessels.

"Improvements in spigot cocks."

Abstract.—The applicants describe a spigot cock with reference to drawings which show it adapted to an apparatus for measuring and discharging measured quantities of liquid. A taper plug is used provided with passages so that the liquid in the inlet (pressure) part is in contact with the two ends of the plug, since these differ in area the plug is forced into its seating. A light spring serves to keep the plug in its seating when the apparatus is not in use. The actuating spindle is not attached rigidly to the plug but is provided with projections which fit loosely into recesses in the plug: packing is placed between a flange on the spindle and the cock casing.

The claims are:—

1. In a spigot cock, the combination of a cock casing, a rotatable taper plug, an inlet to, and an outlet from, the said casing, a passage through said plug adapted in one position of the plug to register with the outlet, and in a second position to be shut off from the said outlet, the said passage being in communication with the inlet in both the said positions, a port leading from the said passage to the wide end of the plug, and means for actuating the plug, substantially as described.

2. A spigot cock as claimed in claim 1, in which the actuating means loosely engage the plug, substantially as described.

3. A spigot cock as claimed in claim 1 or 2 adapted to fill two containers alternately, the passage referred to in claim 1, being in one position of the plug in communication with one container and, in the other position, in communication with the other container, substantially as described.

4. A spigot cock as claimed in claim 3, in which the plug is provided with a second passage adapted in one position of the plug to place that container which is out of communication with the first-mentioned passage in communication with a discharge outlet in the cock casing, while in the other position the other container is put in communication with the discharge outlet in the cock casing by the said second passage, substantially as described.

5. In a spigot cock, the combination of a cock casing, a rotatable plug formed in one piece, an inlet to, and an outlet from, the said casing, a passage through the plug adapted to place the inlet or the outlet into, or out of, communication with one another, a port connecting the said passage to the wide end of the plug, and means for actuating the plug, the said means loosely engaging the plug, substantially as described.

6. A spigot cock as claimed in any of the preceding claims, and having a second port leading from the said or first-mentioned passage to the narrow end of the plug, the area exposed to fluid at the wide end of the plug being greater than that exposed at the small end of the plug, substantially as described.

7. The combination with the arrangement claimed in any of the preceding claims, of a packing through which passes a spindle for actuating the plug and which is subjected to the pressure of the fluid, substantially as described.

8. The combination with the arrangement as claimed in claim 7, of means such as a ring for imparting pressure to the packing, substantially as described.

9. A spigot cock substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in electric water heaters."

Abstract.—The applicant describes an electric water heater of the type designed to supply a continuous stream of hot water. In the simplest form described the resistance wire is wound on a hollow cylindrical refractory insulator. Concentric hollow casing surround the element so the water stream flows first over the outer surface of the heating element and then up through its core. In one modification the water passes in turn through a series of such heaters. In a second modification two concentric heating elements are used and casings are provided so that the water passes over the outside of the outermost element, then between the two heating elements and finally up the core of the inner element.

The claims are:—

1. An electric water heater comprising a hollow heating element for the passage of liquid therethrough and composed of a heat refractory substance, and an electric resistance applied to the exterior of said hollow element for the passage of an electric current.

2. An electric water heater comprising a tubular heating element for the passage of water therethrough and composed of a heat refractory substance such as silica and an electric conducting wire wound around the exterior of said tubular element for the passage of an electric current.

3. An electric water heater according to claims 1 or 2, wherein the hollow or tubular heating element is enclosed by casings forming a water circulating passageway, which surrounds said heating element and communicates with the internal passage thereof, whereby the liquid passes around and through the hollow heating element without coming into contact with the electric wire or resistance thereon.

4. An electric water heater according to claim 3, wherein said heating element is made in two or more tubular sections of different diameters, which are enclosed by cylindrical casings arranged concentrically between and around said sections of the tubular heating element to thereby provide a continuous water circulating passage which extends around the outermost tubular section, between the adjacent tubular sections, and longitudinally through the innermost tubular section of said heating element.

5. An electric water heater according to claims 3 or 4, wherein said casings are closed at their ends by end fittings a water circulating passage which surrounds and is spaced from the hollow or tubular heating element, said water circulating passage being in communication at one end with the adjacent end of the internal passage through the heating element.

6. An electric water heater as claimed in claim 5, wherein ports or passages are formed through one or both of said end fittings for the purpose set forth.

7. An electric water heater according to claims 5 or 6, characterized by a rod or rods extending longitudinally of the hollow or tubular heating element and means associated with said rod or rods for retaining said heating elements and the cylindrical casings in proper concentric relationship and in leakproof engagement with the respective end fittings.

8. An electric water heater as claimed in claim 7, characterized in that said longitudinal rod passes centrally through the hollow heating element and has an end portion of tubular formation adapted to communicate with the internal passage of the heating element to thereby provide for the withdrawal of the heated liquid.

9. An electric water heater as claimed in claim 8, wherein the said longitudinal rod has one or more orifices formed through its tubular portion near the inner end thereof for the purpose set forth.

10. An electric water heater according to claims 7, 8, or 9, wherein the said end fittings are provided with central apertures to pass said longitudinal rod and fixed and movable cap members are mounted on respective projecting ends of said rod, whereby the heating element, the cylindrical casings, and the end fittings may be contracted longitudinally and held tightly in operative position.

11. An electric water heater according to any of the foregoing claims 5 to 10, characterized in that the inner faces of the end fittings are adapted to form seatings for flexible jointing rings or washers, against which the respective ends of the tubular heating element and the cylindrical casings are pressed to form water-tight joints.

12. An electric water heater according to any of the foregoing claims 7 to 11, wherein one of the end fittings is provided with one or more longitudinally extending ports or passages affording communication between an annular water circulating passage, and a chamber formed between the said end fittings, and a cap member thereon, the aforesaid longitudinal rod being reduced in cross section where it passes through said end fitting to thereby afford communication between said chamber and the internal water passage of the heating element, substantially as described with reference to figures 1 and 4 of the accompanying drawings.

13. An electric water heater according to claims 1 or 2 comprising in combination a cylindrical casing or casings enclosing the hollow or tubular heating element, end fittings adapted to close the ends of said casing or casings and having ports or passages in communication with the interior of the heating element and one or more longitudinal rods adapted to draw said end fittings tightly against the opposite ends of said heating element and casings.

14. An electric water heater according to claims 1, 2, or 13, wherein the hollow or tubular heating element comprises a plurality of tubular sections arranged in side by side formations and connected at their ends by fittings adapted to form passages through which the water to be heated flows into and out of said tubular sections in succession.

15. An electric water heater consisting in the combination and arrangement of parts substantially as herein described and as illustrated in figures 1 to 4 of the accompanying drawings.

16. An electric water heater consisting in the combination and arrangement of parts substantially as herein described and as illustrated in figures 5 to 10 of the accompanying drawings.

17. An electric water heater consisting in the combination and arrangement of parts substantially as herein described and as illustrated in figures 11 and 12 of the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in means for and methods of enhancing the growth of plants."

Abstract.—The applicant proposes to use a flexible sheet to cover the ground and so reduce evaporation and the growth of weeds. Suitable openings may be provided for the plants and flaps for rain to drain from the surface of the sheet to the underneath.

The claims are:—

1. Means for enhancing the growth of plants comprising a flexible sheet having relatively small drainage openings distributed through the body thereof, said openings being guarded by upwardly closing flap-like elements.

2. Means for enhancing the growth of plants characterized in that the flaps co-operating with said openings are provided with marginal edge portions extending beyond and underlying the marginal edges of said openings.

3. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in claims 1 or 2 characterized in that said flaps are integral with said sheet.

4. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in any of the preceding claims characterized in that said flaps are maintained in depressed relation to the adjacent upper surface of the body of the sheet.

5. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in any of the preceding claims characterized in that said flaps and openings are formed by means of rents or tears in said sheet.

6. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in any of the preceding claims characterized in that said flaps and openings are of V shape.

7. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in any of the preceding claims characterized in that the flexible sheet contains a layer of waterproofing material and is provided with a layer of fibrous fabric on at least one side of said sheet.

8. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in any of the preceding claims characterized in that said sheet of flexible material comprises an inner layer of water-resistant material and two outer layers of fibrous fabric.

9. Means for enhancing the growth of plants as claimed in claim 8 characterized in that the inner layer of water-resistant material is formed of fibres treated with heat absorbing water-resistant material.

10. Means for enhancing the growth of plants substantially as and for the purpose described and as illustrated in and by the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in cultivators."

Abstract.—A wheel-less cultivating or hoeing implement having front and rear handles for manual operation comprises two or more vertical cutter blades depending directly from a transverse slide plate and having their front edges trailing backwards and their rear portions curved laterally. The cutters *g* are detachably and interchangeably attached to the angle-steel plate or beam *a* that slopes upwardly at the front and is connected to the two handle-bars *c*, *c1* by a hollow and diverging backing plate *b*, a flanged cheek-plate *f* and bolts or screws *e*, *f2*, *f3*. Some of the blades *g* may be curved towards the right and some towards the left. The tops of the blades may be flanged to facilitate bolting to the beam *a*, and a stay may be provided between one of the blades and the cheek-plate or one of the handles. The parts may be taken apart for transport, and the weight is such that normally the cross beam does not press on the ground with any considerable pressure.

The claims are :—

1. A wheel-less cultivator having front and rear handle-fitted shafts for manual operations, in which two or more vertical cutter blades depend directly from and below a slide plate and are secured to the latter in preferably a detachable manner, the front edges of these dependent cutter blades trailing backwards and their rearward portions being curved laterally in the manner of a mould board.
2. A cultivator, according to claim 1, comprising a plurality of dependent cutter blades detachably secured to and spaced along the slide plate in the form of a cross beam which is sloped upwardly at front and adapted to ride over the surface of the soil, said cross beam having a hollow backing formed of a metal plate, and a metal cheek-plate which has one edge fitting in said hollow backing and is detachably secured to the front and rear shafts.
3. A cultivator, according to claim 1 or 2, in which the cutters are provided with horizontal flanges whereby they may be bolted to the underside of the cross beam.
4. A cultivator, according to claim 2, in which the cross beam and the cheek-plate are made of angle-plate, the handle-fitted shafts are detachably secured to said cheek-plate, and the hollow backing is detachably secured to the cross beam and to the said shafts.

"Improvements in or relating to valve generators of electrical oscillations."

Abstract.—With the object of providing a generator of high frequency oscillations in which the frequency of the oscillations generated by the power valve shall be as nearly as possible completely dependent upon the drive, the applicants place the grid and the anode of the power valve in one arm of a wheatstone bridge, the other three arms of which are formed of condensers, the capacity of each of which is effectively equal to that between the anode and grid of the power valve. The power circuit is connected across the corner of the bridge which is connected to the anode and the opposite corner, the grid circuit which is coupled to the output circuit of the drive forms the other diagonal of the bridge, and both grid and power circuits are arranged symmetrically with regard to the earth.

The claims are :—

1. In an amplifier for high frequency oscillations, means for avoiding reaction between the anode and grid circuits of the amplifying valve or valves, the said means comprising a balanced wheatstone bridge of which one arm includes the grid anode capacity of the valve or valves, the said anode and grid circuits being connected as diagonals of the said wheatstone bridge, and arranged symmetrically with respect to the earth so that oscillations in either circuit produce no potential in the other circuit either in or between any parts thereof or to earth.
2. An arrangement as claimed in claim 1, in which the capacities of the arms forming the bridge are substantially equal.
3. An arrangement as claimed in claim 1 or 2, in which the effective self-capacity of a second valve is included in a second arm of the bridge, substantially as described with reference to figure 2.
4. An arrangement as claimed in any of the preceding claims in which the arms forming the bridge are provided with equalizing resistances as and for the purpose described.
5. A series of amplifiers for high frequency oscillations, as claimed in the preceding claims, arranged in cascade.
6. Arrangements substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

From literature on the subject it would appear that in the treatment of rubber latex by the action of electric current, laboratory experiments have already been made with a membrane of parchment inserted between the anode and the cathode as a means for preventing coagulation of the rubber on the anode, *i.e.*, for the specific purpose of obtaining merely an uncoagulated concentrate.

Closer investigation of this phenomenon has shown, however, that in spite of preventing the rubber deposit from coming into direct touch with the anode by a semi-permeable diaphragm, coagulated deposit can be obtained if the pressure

and density of the electric current is sufficient to obtain a really homogeneous rubber deposit. The rubber deposit obtained on a semi-permeable backing, leaving between the anode and the rubber deposit free escape for the gases liberated at the anode as a result of the electrolysis taking place simultaneously with the electrophoresis, is a really homogeneous one.

The new process is based on the circumstance that rubber can be deposited as a homogeneous, thick and smooth layer, if a supporting surface consisting of a permeable and non-conducting material serving as a backing or mould for the formation of the electrophoretic rubber precipitate is inserted between the anode and cathode and lowering the escape of the gases liberated at the anode either by the own porosity of said backing or mould or through a layer of electrolyte interposed between said backing and the anode. After removal from the bath and drying, said rubber layer is no longer peptisable when once dried and forms a transparent, homogeneous rubber skin of high elasticity and tensile strength.

The expression "non-conductive" as used above is not intended to imply that the substance of the backing should be deemed to be limited to an absolute non-conductor of electricity but merely that the resistance of the substance of the permeable backing when permeated with liquid electrolyte is greater than the resistance of the electrolyte filling the pores of the backing so that the current passes mainly through the electrolyte and not through the substance of the backing.

No fully satisfactory explanation for this behaviour of the rubber emulsion could so far be found, but extensive research on the subject would justify the assumption that the coagulation referred to may be due to acid anions liberated at the anode. This explanation will hold good, however, in certain cases only, but not in such cases where coagulation takes place and yet it has not been possible to demonstrate the presence of acid anions. In such cases coagulation is presumably caused by coagulating ions going into solution from the anode, or from the backing for instance, if this latter consists of gypsum.

If preferably clear rubber skins or articles are to be produced, the latex is first subjected to purification, if desired also to concentration, for example by centrifuging.

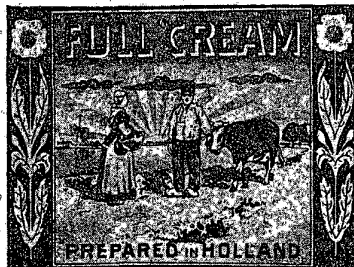

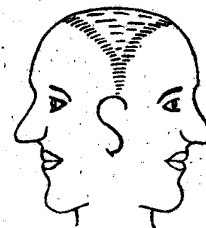

“THE RUBBER RESTRICTION ORDINANCE, No. 24 OF 1922.”

RULES made by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon in Executive Council under the powers conferred on him by the above-named Ordinance.

RULES REFERRED TO.

(1) The following rule shall be inserted immediately after rule 4 (3) (c) of the Rubber Restriction Rules, 1924 published by Notification dated October 3, 1924, in *Government Gazette Extraordinary* No. 7,422 of October 4, 1924, and shall be operative as rule 4 (3) (d) of the Rubber Restriction Rules:—

(d) For trees planted in 1921 the maximum assessment per acre shall be 60 pounds for the period November 1, 1925, to October 31, 1926.

(2) Rule 5 of the Rubber Restriction Rules, 1924, published by Notification dated October 3, 1924, in *Government Gazette Extraordinary* No. 7,422 of October 4, 1924, is hereby cancelled and repealed, and the following rule is hereby substituted in its place and shall be read and be operative as rule 5 of the Rubber Restriction Rules:—

5. In making any assessment under these rules where rubber is interplanted with other cultivation 100 rubber trees shall be taken as the equivalent of, and capable of producing as much rubber as, one acre on which rubber is the only cultivation, provided that in no case shall the allowance for such interplanted areas exceed the allowance permissible on an acreage basis.
