VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 7, 1925.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 119 (14 Burghers, 64 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 18 Moors, 6 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1925, viz., 256,049) was 24.2, as against 31.0 in the preceding week, 29.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 107 (1 European, 4 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 18 Moors, 3 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 21·8, as against 24·6 in the previous week, 30·7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 107 total deaths, 21 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 34 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 15.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Ten deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 3 in Maradana North, 2 in Maradana hospitals, and I each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, and Kollupitiya, as against 11 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly averages for last year.

- (b) Seven deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana North, and 1 each in Kotahena North, Maradana South, and Slave Island, as against 3 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) Four deaths from Bronchitis were registered, 1 each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Maradana East, and Kollupitiya, as against 2 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.
- Seven deaths from Phthisis were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and I each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, and Maradana North, as against 19 in the previous week; and 13 the weekly average for last year.
- Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including I death of a non-resident), and 1 in Maradana North, as against 2 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.
- One death from Plague was registered in Kotahena South, as against vil in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- Eleven deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Debility, 3 each from Diarrhaa, Dysentery, and Puerperal Septicamia, 2 from Enteritis, 1 from Worms, and 43 from Other Causes.

6. Twenty-two cases of Measles, 10 of Chickenpox, 9 of Enteric Fever, and 1 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 22, 15, 6, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.7°, against 80.4° in the preceding week, and 79.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.898 in., against 29.920 in. in the preceding week, and 29 · 803 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 9 · 74 in., against 0.98 in. in the preceding week, and 7.44 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, October 7, 1925, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated September 30, 1925.

Present:—Mr. H. E. Newnham, C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias, J.P.; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, M. L. C.; Mr. H. L. de Mel, C.B.E.; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Mr. W. Philps; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Mr.G. Adamjee Lukmanjee; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy; Mr. A. J. Wickwar; the Hon. Mr. L. Macrae, M. L. C.; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. A. H. Morgan; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. A. H. F. Clarke; and Mr. T. G. Jayewardene, V.D., J.P.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of September 9, 1925, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of September 9, 1925, be confirmed.

- 2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. P. Dias presented a petition dated September, 1925, to the Chairman and Members of the Municipal Council, Colombo, from Mr. D. H. P. Goonetilleke, late clerk of the Finance Department, and moved that it be referred to the Standing Committees on Law, Works, and Finance for inquiry and report. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded—Carried.
 - 3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene asked the Chairman the following questions standing in his name:—
- (1) Will the Chairman be pleased to state if it is the duty of any officer of this Council to visit building works in progress, and take steps to stop operations likely to endanger human life? If so, was such officer aware of excavations to an unsafe depth being carried out without shoring at York street, where a man lost his life on the 11th of last month, and what steps he took in the matter? If not, will the Chairman tell off an officer for such duty without delay?

(2) Will the Chairman be pleased to state if this Council has power to restrict the size of buses and forries using the roads in the town? If so, will he take necessary action without delay to have the size of the giant buses and lorries running on the Colombo-Galle road and other narrow roads reduced? If not, will he take early steps to have a by-law framed conferring such power on this Council?

(3) Now that the financial position of Government has improved greatly, will the Chairman be pleased to ask Government if it will see its way to begin payment for the continuation of the widening of Colombo-Galle road from 1926

instead of from October, 1927?

(4) Will the Chairman be pleased to state what action he proposes to take in regard to the neglect of the Tramway Company to keep in proper repair the tramway route between Kuruwe street and Armour street, and certain other sections of the line, after their attention had been drawn to the bad state of these sections month after month for the past five or six months? Is there a penalty clause in the contract? If so, when does the Chairman propose to enforce it?

(5) Will the Chairman be pleased to give information on the following points in regard to the laying out, and the preparation of the site for the proposed cemetery at Kirillapone to serve the Colombo south area:—(a) Total estimated cost; (b) Sums already voted and expenditure to date; (c) Nature of work (i.) so far completed, (ii.) remaining to be done; (d) Why and when work was suspended? If owing to exhaustion of funds, why no request was made for further funds? (e) What further provision is necessary to complete the work?

(6) Will the Chairman be pleased to state the circumstances under which the water supply to a stand post at Paranawadiya road was cut off as stated in the "Ceylon Morning Leader" of September 25, 1925? If the action of the Waterworks Engineer has his approval, and if similar action is contemplated in regard to stand posts in other poor quarters

of the town?

The Chairman replied as follows:-

(1) (i.) The responsibility of the Council in the matter of private building operations in progress appears to be limited to seeing that (a) they conform to the approved plan, (b) such hoards or fences are erected as the public safety or convenience requires; (ii.) Further, if any building be deemed likely to fall or to be dangerous to the inhabitants or to passengers the Chairman may put up a hoard or fence and shall notice the owner to repair or secure such building; (iii.) It is the duty of the "Prosecuting Surveyors" (who are really "Building Inspectors") to visit building work in progress and to take such action as is necessitated by the above requirements of the law. They have, however, no power to take action beyond that indicated; (iv.) The Council's officers have no power to exercise supervision over the building operations or the excavations of private parties working on private premises with a view to the protection on the labour thereon employed; (v.) In the case mentioned no one of the Council's officers was aware, until after the accident, that excavation was being carried on without sufficient shoring. Had one been so aware he would have had no power to interfere; (vi.) In the absence of such powers and in view of the very extensive and continuous inspections that the undertaking of such responsibility would involve it does not seem desirable to detail an officer for this duty.

(2) By-laws imposing restrictions on the weight and construction and use of mechanically propelled vehicles may be made under section 22 of the Vehicles Ordinance by the Governor in Executive Council and not by this Council which, however, may make representations as to its wishes in the matter. The question will be referred to the four Standing

Committees to ascertain their views.

(3) The procedure which the Council resolved to adopt for the further widening of the Galle road under the Town Improvement Ordinance is somewhat lengthy and has at the moment only reached the stage at which the numerous "objections" have been received. These objections the Chairman will hear this month and he will report on them to the Council. It will then remain for the Council to make its final determination on them, and if it approves the scheme to submit it for the sanction of the Governor in Executive Council and of the Legislative Council. Thereafter the acquisition and expenditure will begin. If and when the scheme reaches this stage it would seem equitable and fitting that the Council should request Government to meet the expenditure as and when it is incurred on what is a project for which the Government and not the Council is responsible. If the Council approves, the Chairman will request Government accordingly to include the necessary provision either in a supplementary vote in 1926 or in the Budget for 1926–1927, as suggested by the Member for New Bazaar.

(4) (i.) The Engineers of the Council have been in constant touch with those of the Tramway Company in regard to this matter. The conclusion arrived at is that a water bound macadam road will no longer stand up to the rapidly increasing bullock cart and lorry traffic. The Chairman has already represented to the Company the urgent need of providing a more permanent surface, and the Company made arrangements early last month to experiment with a new form of surfacing. The Company will be required to give its urgent attention to this matter; (ii.) The agreement with the Company provides that in cases in which they do not keep in proper repair the portions of the roads for which they

are responsible the Council may give them seven days' notice and do the work at the expense of the Company. The Council may also in such cases require the Company to lay stone setts; (iii.) These two courses of action have been from time to time considered, and neither is entirely satisfactory. The latter possibility has however been brought to the notice of the Company with the indication that though not entirely satisfactory it may be necessary to enforce it unless an improvement is shown and maintained by the use of surfaces more permanent than water-bound macadam.

- (5) (a) Rs. 200,000 was the total estimated cost; (b) Rs. 100,000 has been voted and of this Rs. 99,661 has been spent; (c) (i.) The following work has been completed:—One-third of the filling, 3,300 feet of boundary wall, barbed wire fence and concrete posts, one set of cooly lines with six rooms, 370 feet of concrete culverts. In addition 1,000 feet of wall is partly built and the excavation of the road to the quarry is nearly complete, 3,000 feet of open drains have been enlarged and diverted, (ii.) It remains to complete the above work partially finished, and in addition to provide about 9,000 cubes of filling, 300 feet of culverts, 1,400 feet of open drain with brick inverts, an office room, waiting room, mortuary, and more cooly rooms; (d) Funds ran short towards the end of 1924 and thereafter only minor work to expend the small balance was undertaken. The question of requesting further funds was considered in connection with the 1925 Budget, the work on November 8, 1924, and appeared to concur in this view; (e) It is estimated that Rs. 100,000 is necessary to complete the work.
- (6) (i.) The Waterworks Engineer himself had frequently noticed waste of water from the standpipe in question and on September 18 he saw the water running full bore, the push tap having been tied down and no one being near the standpipe; (ii.) He, therefore, gave orders that the water should be temporarily shut off in pursuance of paragraph 8 of the schedule to Ordinance 18 of 1907 which says that the Waterworks Engineer may suspend or stop the supply of water whenever the water of any public standpost is wasted. A notice giving the reason was posted on the standpipe; (iii.) On the day on which the water was turned on again to this stand pipe, the push tap was again interfered with and water was again found running to waste; (iv.) It has been the consistent policy of the department to carry out the provisions of the Ordinance, in the manner indicated, in all parts of the city when constant misuse of a standpipe is detected. It is an important part of the duties of the department to prevent such waste, which when it occurs in low-lying districts affects the supply to premises situated at a higher level; (v.) 2,600 notices have this year been served on occupiers of private premises to repair defective water fittings and in 120 cases water was shut off for failure to comply with such notices. It is incumbent on the department similarly to see that waste does not occur from public standpipes; (vi.) The Chairman approves of the action taken and the policy will be continued unless the Council decide to the contrary.
- 4. Pursuant to notice, Dr. E. A. Coorey, asked the Chairman the following question standing in his name:—Will the Chairman be pleased to state whether the prohibition of the grazing of milch cows on lands in charge of the Council is being enforced in pursuance of a resolution of this Council to that effect?

The Chairman replied as follows:—The Chairman is not aware of any specific resolution of Council on this point. The prohibition was enforced in pursuance of the policy of the Council, indicated in a number of resolutions, to purify the milk supply of the city.

5. Pursuant to notice, Dr. E. V. Ratnam asked the Chairman the following questions standing in his name:—(1) What quantity of 2-inch metal was turned out at Kirillapone from July 1, 1924, to August 31, 1925, both days inclusive? (2) What was the total cost of production of the quantity of 2-inch metal so turned out and what was the cost per cube? (3) What quantity of 2-inch metal was issued from this quarry during the same period, viz., July 1, 1924, to August 31, 1925? (4) What was the total cost and the cost per cube of the transport of the 2-inch metal so issued? (8) What was the amount paid to the contractor for the metal turned out by him during this period, viz., July 1, 1924, to August 31, 1925, and what was the rate of payment per cube? (9) Was the metal turned out by the contractor transported to different works by the contractor or by the department? (10) What was the total cost of transport and the cost of transport per cube of the metal so transported? (11) What was the total issue price and the issue price per cube of this metal?

The Chairman replied as follows:—(1) 3,186·27 cubes; (2) A statement is tabled showing the total quantity of each size of metal, &c., turned out during this period and the total cost of the whole output. The Municipal Engineer reports that it is not possible to give an absolute figure for the cost of production of 2-inch metal alone as part of the work of production and transport is necessarily common to all the grades turned out; (3) 3,298·72 cubes; (4) The total cost of the transport of all grades was Rs. 16,907·61, which gives an average cost of Rs. 2·88 a cube for all grades; (5) The total issue price was Rs. 61,399·93 and the issue price for a cube was, July, 1924, Rs. 17, August, 1924, to January, 1925, Rs. 18, February to July, 1925, Rs. 20, August, 1925, Rs. 21; (6) The figures for these 3½ years have not yet been worked out; (7) 1,684·45 cubes; (8) The total amount-paid was Rs. 21,244·20. July 1 to 23, 1924, Rs. 14, while the contractor paid for bailing water from the main pit. July 24, 1924, to August 31, 1925, Rs. 12·50; (9) By the department; (10) The cost of transport of all grades of metal was Rs. 6,295·80 with an average of Rs. 3·68 a cube; (11) The total issue price was Rs. 30,004·36 and the issue price for a cube was as follows:—July, 1924, Rs. 17 per cube, August, 1924, to January 1925, Rs. 18 per cube, February and March, 1925, Rs. 20 per cube, April, 1925, Rs. 21·10 per cube, May, 1925, Rs. 19·60 per cube, June, 1925, Rs. 20·95 per cube, July, 1925, Rs. 20·86 per cube, August 1925, Rs. 20·17 per cube. From April to August, 1925, average rates are given because a cart contractor was employed for tansport at rates which varied in accordance with the Ward to which the metal was transported.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene moved that as, since the resolution of this Council of August 2, 1918, motor and cart traffic on the Victoria Bridge road has increased to an enormous extent, and will continue to increase and it has also been recently brought to the notice of this Council that with a gradient of one in forty the increase in haulage expenses is as much as 50 per cent., this Council respectfully requests Government to ease the gradient on the road now under construction over the Harbour-Kolonnawa Railway line to take the place of the present Victoria Bridge road, by extending the road further towards Prince of Wales' avenue on one side, and the Victoria bridge on the other. The Chairman seconded and undertook to draft a letter to Government in consultation with Mr. Jayawardene.

The motion was put to the Meeting and carried.

Abdul Cader :- That in view of the existence of heavy traffic and congestion at Main street, and the prevalence of plague in Sea street, Pettah, the Chairman's scheme to open a new road from Wolfendahl to Reclamation road be approved by this Council.

With the permission of the Council, the Hon. Mr. Abdul Cader substituted for "approved by this Council" the words "considered by the Four Standing Committees in connection with the Budget," and moved the resolution as so amended. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded. Mr. A. E. de Silva opposed the scheme. Mr. T. G. Jayewardene spoke to the motion. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader replied.—The motion was put to the Meeting and carried.

ANNEXURE A.

Pension Minute.

Substitute the following in place of the existing rules:-

Officers or servants who have been paid from votes for services exclusive of Establishments shall, when transferred to appointments on the Establishment, be allowed to count for pension two-thirds of such service as may have been continuous with their subsequent service on the Establishment, provided that when an officer's service has been mainly on the Establishment, but has been interrupted by one or more casual periods during which he was paid from votes for services exclusive of Establishment, the Council may order that the whole period of the officer's service shall count for pension in full.
- 2. In place of rule 29 (1)—
 - 29. (1) The payment of pensions of deceased pensioners to the widow or next of kin up to the end of the month in which the pensioner died is allowable where the pension does not exceed Rs. 4,260 per annum.

"An improved system of drying or dehumidifying air to be used for the drying of tea and other products or for ventilating purposes and apparatus therefor."

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

1. A system of drying or dehumidifying air for ventilating purposes which consists in first drawing the air through an air filter into a heat interchanger, in which it receives a preliminary cooling from the cold air passed into the heat interchanger from a cooling apparatus, then drawing this partially cooled air into a fan and from thence to a damper which may divide the total volume thereof into two parts, one part passing directly to the main supplying the room to be ventilated whilst the other part is admitted to the said cooling apparatus, the cooled air passing back to the reverse side of the heat interchanger and from thence to an air heater and, if desired, an ozoniser from whence it flows to the main supplying the room to be ventilated where it is mixed with the flow from the fan, substantially as described.

2. Apparatus for carrying out a system of drying or dehumidifying air for ventilating purposes comprising an air filter, a heat interchanger, a cooling apparatus, a fan, an air heater, and ar ozoniser all combined and operating

substantially as and for the purpose described.

3. The improved system of drying or dehumidifying air for ventilating purposes and apparatus therefor substantially as hereinbefore described with reference to the accompanying drawings for the purpose specified.

"Improvements in process for treating hydrocarbons" (Non Residuum Case).

Abstract.—The applicants describe a process and apparatus for cracking oil under increased temperature and pressure whereby they claim to be able to prevent the deposition of carbon in the furnace tubes and to convert the oil completely to vapor and a coke-like solid with practically no liquid residuum. This result is obtained by mixing the crude stock with reflux condensate from the dephlegmator, passing this mixture through the cracking tubes and then into a large vaporization chamber and so to a dephlegmator and condenser. The temperature of the dephlegmator is controlled by the admission of crude stock or of condensate.

The claims are :-

1. A process of converting hydrocarbons which consists in heating a stream of charging stock in a heating coil to a cracking temperature without permitting the adherence of carbon to the walls of the coil, transferring the heated hydrocarbon to an enlarged zone, and effecting the separation of the hydrocarbon in said enlarged zone into vapors and a substantially non-flowing residue by controlling the character of the charging stock admitted to the heating coil.

2. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claim 1, in which during the transfer of the hydrocarbon

from the cracking coil to the enlarged chamber the transfer temperature is not raised substantially.

3. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 and 2, including the step of effecting the separation of the hydrocarbon into vapor and substantially non-flowing residue in the enlarged chamber while the hydrocarbon is substantially under it; contained heat.

4. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 to 3, including the step of maintaining a super-

atmospheric pressure on the hydrocarbon undergoing treatment.

5. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 to 4, in which the charging stock consists of a

mixture of oils of different boiling point ranges.

6. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 and 5, including in the step of controlling the character of the charging stock, the addition of a stream of reflux condensate to charging oil, the ratio of the reflux condensate to the charging oil and the amount of heat supplied to the coil being maintained sufficient to cause the separation of the charging stock mixture into said non-flowing carbon residues and vapors.

7. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 and 5, including the step of mixing a distillate

7. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims I and 5, including the step of mixing a distillate with a charging stock having a boiling range different from that of the distillate, the ratio of the distillate to the charging stock and the amount of heat supplied to the charging stock mixture while passing through the cracking coil being maintained sufficient to cause the separation of the charging stock mixture into said non-flowing carbon residue and vapors in the

reaction chamber.

8. A process of converting hydrocarbons, as set forth in claims 1 and 7, in which the distillate is a distillate that has once been subjected to a cracking treatment while the charging oil entering into the charging stock mixture has not been subjected to such treatment, the charging stock or mixture formed by the distillate and oil having a different boiling range than the distillate.

- 9. A process of converting hydrocarbors, as set forth in claims 1 and 8, including the step of introducing the vapors developed in the enlarged chamber to a reflux conderser from which the vapors after passage through the condenser are withdrawn, while the reflux condensate is being mixed with charging oil, and maintaining a superatmospheric pressure on the hydrocarbon in the heating coil, the reaction chamber and the reflux condenser.
 - 10. A process of converting hydrocarbons, substantially as described and shown, and for the purpose set forth. One sheet of drawings.

"Improvements in wireless telegraph and telephone aerials."

Abstract.—The applicants claim that a maximum radiation can be obtained at right angles to the aerial by annulling the radiation from alternate half wave lengths thereof. This can be done by doubling those portions of the aerial back on themselves or electrical equivalents can be employed such as an inductance coil with a condenser in parallel or an inductance coil having sufficient natural capacity.

The claims are :-

- 1. An aerial for wireless transmission or reception, electrically long in comparison with the wave lentgh employed, and so arranged that radiation from alternate half wave lengths is annulled or suppressed.
- 2. An aerial as claimed in claim 1, in which the annulment is attained by doubling back upon itself a length of the aerial corresponding to a half wave length, substantially as described.
- 3. An aerial as claimed in claim 2, in which there is employed the electrical equivalent of a length of the aerial (corresponding to a half wave length) doubled back on itself.
- 4. An aerial as claimed in claim 1, in which the annulment is obtained by inductance and capacity, substantially as described.

"Improvements in Titanium Pigments, and process of Preparation thereof."

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

- 1. The process of manufacture of a titanium pigment consisting in the formation of a slag of oxides of barium and titanium by heating a suitable barium compound with titanium ore such as ilmenite or rutile, separating the metallic iron produced, mixing the slag of barium and titanium oxides with sulphuric acid and heating the mixture to form barium sulphate and titanium sulphate, forming this into a paste with water and running it into boiling water in the presence of organic materials to prevent the precipitation of iron and cause the precipitation of titanium salt on to the barium sulphate, and washing and drying and heating this compound material, substantially as and for the purposes specified.
- 2. In the process set forth in claim 1, the employment of a mixture of barium carbonate with titanium ore with or without a flux and a reducing agent, these ingredients being fused to obtain a slag containing barium and titanium oxides and metallic iron and separating the bulk of the latter by any suitable means, substantially as specified.
- 3. In the process set forth in claim 1, the employment of a mixture of barium sulphate with the titanium ore, these ingredients being heated whereby sulphuric acid fumes and a mixture of barium oxide, titanium oxide, and iron oxide are obtained, such mixture being then fused with carbon to obtain a slag containing barium oxide and titanium oxide and metallic iron, and separating the bulk of the latter by any suitable means, substantially as specified.
- 4. In the process set forth in claims 1 and 3 the utilization of the sulphuric acid fumes produced as described for the formation by the admixture and heating thereof with the slag of barium and titanium oxides of an intimate mixture of barium sulphate and titanium sulphate, substantially as specified.
- 5. A titanium pigment, having a base of barium sulphate obtained substantially as described in the foregoing specification and set forth in the preceding claims.

"Improvements in machinery for the manufacture of cement-asbestos tubes."

Abstract.—The applicants describe a modification of their Patent No. 2,099. In the modification a single pressure cylinder acts upon the revolving cylinder and the latter rests on a single large supporting cylinder. A device is also described for automatically controlling the pressure exerted by the pressure cylinder.

The claims are :-

- 1. A machine for the manufacture of tubes from fibrous or other materials, such for example as asbestos and hydraulic cement, by means of a machine somewhat similar to that employed for the manufacture of paper as described in prior Ceylon Patent No. 2,099, characterized by the fact that the revolving cylinder upon which said tube is formed is suported by a single supporting cylinder, and is acted upon by a single pressure cylinder driven by toothed gearing.
- 2. A machine for the manufacture of tubes from fibrous materials according to Ceylon Patent No. 2,099, in which the pressure exerted by the pressure cylinder or cylinders is automatically controlled by a device serving to indicate the wall-thickness of the tube.
- 3. A machine for the manufacture of tubes from fibrous or other suitable material, constructed, arranged, or adapted to function or to be operated, substantially as described or substantially as described and illustrated.

"Method and apparatus for utilizing the heat of the sun."

Abstract.—In the applicant's apparatus the sun's rays are reflected by a movable mirror on to a fixed lens which may be spherical or cylindrical and may be made hollow so that the working substance may be passed through it to be preheated and at the same time to keep the lens cool. The rays are focussed through an opening into a spherical or cylindrical vessel which in one form is whitened on the inside and contains tubes, for the working substance which are heated in part directly and in part by reflection from the walls of the collecting vessel which in this case is insulated outside. In another form the collecting vessel is of metal, blackened on the inside and immersed in the boiler.

The claims are :---

- 1. Method of utilizing the heat of the sun, the distinguishing feature being that the rays of the sun collected by optical means are conducted direct into a collecting vessel and employed partly indirectly partly directly for heating a liquid to be vaporized, gas or a substance to be heated.
- 2. Apparatus for carrying out the method according to claim 1, the distinguishing feature being that the interior sides of the collecting vessel are made reflective and in the vessel hollow bodies of any kind are arranged for the reception of the liquid or substance to be heated.
- 3. Apparatus according to claim 2, the distinguishing feature being that the collecting vessel is constructed as a cylindrical tube with a slot-like opening for the admission of the sun's rays, and the rays are collected by means of cylindrical lenges
- 4. Apparatus according to claims 2 and 3, the distinguishing feature being that the collecting lens is made hollow and furnished with inlets and outlets for the liquid, the latter of which are in communication with the hollow body-like vaporizer arranged in the collecting vessel, or, in case the hollow bodies contain heating liquid, with the then necessary steam boiler, so that the lens serves as preliminary heater and is simultaneously cooled.
- 5. Apparatus according to claims 2 to 4, the distinguishing feature being that through the tubular hollow bodies water under pressure is conveyed, which is then conducted as heating liquid to a special steam boiler.
- 6. Apparatus according to claims 2 to 5, the distinguishing feature being that the collecting vessel connected with its lens is fixed in the ground and a plane mirror, which conducts the sun's rays to the lens, and set up parallactically in the equator system is arranged on a special carrier so as to be adjustable movably and in declination.
- 7. A device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, of such a nature that the rays of the sun, concentrated by the use of optical means are passed direct into a collecting reservoir furnished with an inside lining of such a character that the rays are absorbed therein and, which in its turn, imparts the heat stored up to another medium, for instance, to a liquid surrounding the collecting reservoir.
- 8. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claim 7, adjustment of optical means in such a fashion that the burning focus of the concentrated rays of heat is about on a level with the aperture of the receiving chamber.
- 9. A device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 8, consisting of a spherical appliance for the concentration of the rays of heat, which is furnished with a small circular aperture, and a suitably isolated condensing lens, reflector or similar device adjusted at such a distance that the focus of the rays of heat thus concentrated falls just about in the aperture of the thermal chamber.
- 10. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claim 9, the thermal chamber constructed in such a manner that it enters direct into the steam generator or that it is surrounded by a second concentric envelope containing a liquid having a high boiling point, which in its turn, rests inside a boiler which serves the purpose of generating steam.
- 11. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 10, the use of a condensing lens, which by reason of its physical or chemical features permits principally the passage of only the rays of heat.
- 12. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 11, the insertion of a plate of rock salt having flat surfaces and even thickness to serve as a cover closing the aperture of the thermal chamber.
- 13. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 10, the provision of ribs or similar attachment to the outer surface of the thermal chamber which run in a meridional direction.
- 14. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 8, means of uniting several apparatus in one system, so designed that the tubes which contain the liquid to be heated, and which pass through the boiler common to the whole system are conducted through the hollow axis of the whole mechanism.
- 15. In a device for effective employment of the heat of the sun, as claimed in claims 7 and 14, the intermediary container occupying a position between the thermal chamber and the water in the boiler may contain an easily melted substance in place of oil or the like.

"Improvements in electric insulating materials."

Abstract.—In preparing an insulating material for submarine cables, soluble crystalloids are removed as far as possible before vulcanization.

As fillers ground hard rubber (ebonite) and fused quartz are suitable.

The claims are :---

- 1. An electric insulation material of high resistance and low electrostatic capacity, adaptable for prolonged use in sea water without substantial deterioration and approximately as good in these respects as gutta percha, characterized in this, that it is composed of rubber substantially free of water soluble matter and a water insoluble filler substantially free of water soluble impurities.
- 2. An insulating material according to claim 1, characterized in this, that the rubber when immersed in sea water for an indefinite period will not absorb water of a weight greater than one per cent. of the weight of the rubber.

- 3. An insulating material according to claims 1 or 2, characterized in this, that the rubber contains no more than approximately 0·1 per cent. in weight of soluble crystalloids.
- 4. An insulating material according to claims 1, 2, or 3, characterized in this, that the filler is in a finely divided state, the particles of which lie in real contact with or are held with good cementation to the rubber.
- 5. An insulating material according to any one of the feregoing claims, characterized in this, that the filler is rubber vulcanized sufficiently to make it impervious to water.
- 6. An electric cable comprising a conductor or conductors surrounded by insulating material in accordance with any one or more of the foregoing claims.
- 7. An electric cable comprising a conductor or conductors surrounded by insulating material, characterized in this, that said material is composed of rubber substantially free of all water soluble matter, the purity of the rubber in this respect being such, for example, that the rubber when immersed for an indefinite period in sea water will not absorb water of a weight greater than one per cent. of the weight of the rubber and a substantially insoluble filler for the rubber compound.

"An improved process for the production of urea."

Abstract.—The applicant proposes to incorporate a process for the manufacture of urea on to that for the production of synthetic ammonia. Compressed carbon dioxide is introduced into the mixture leaving the catalytic tube at a temperature of 250° and a pressure of 800 atmospheres: the temperature of the carbon dioxide is regulated so that the temperature in the reaction chamber is between 150° and 200°.

The claims are :---

- 1. A process for the continuous production of urea from ammonia and carbon dioxide, characterized by the fact that the gaseous mixture, obtained by catalytic synthesis of ammonia is caused to react with carbon dioxide gas while still under the influence of pressure and heat the urea being subsequently separated from the reaction product.
- 2. A process as claimed in claim 1, in which the uncombined nitrogen-hydrogen mixture or nitrogen-hydrogen ammonia mixture are recirculated with fresh nitrogen-hydrogen mixture in the system for further production of ammonia.
 - 3. A process for producing urea substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawing.

"An improved adjustable tool for marking rubber trees and the like."

Abstract.—A shank is fitted with a transverse metal shaft. Marking blades are fitted to holes in the shaft by means of screws and fly-nuts. A catch on the blades rests against the long edge of the shaft and prevents the blades from twisting.

- Claim 1: An improved instrument or tool for marking the bark of rubber trees and the like characterized by the transverse shaft wherein the holes are bored to receive a series of marking blades or prongs, substantially as described and illustrated in the accompanying drawings.
- Claim 2: In an improved instrument or tool for marking the bark of rubber trees, as claimed in claim 1, the adjustably arranged marking blades or prongs to vary the cuts from ½ inch to 5 inches approximately on the bark of the rubber tree, substantially as described.
- Claim 3: In an improved instrument or tool for marking the bark of rubber trees, as claimed in claims 1 and 2, a catch resting flat and closely to the transverse shaft to keep the blades or prongs in a definite position, substantially as described and as illustrated in the accompanying drawings.


