Know Ye that We, the Governor in Executive Council, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 109 (3), and subject to the provisions of section 109 (4) of the said Ordinance, do hereby confirm and proclaim the said by laws.

#### SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

By-laws relating to bakeries and eating-houses set forth in Chapter XI. of the by-laws of the Municipal Council of Colombo proclaimed in Government Gazette No. 6,080 of October 20, 1905, as amended by Proclamation published in Government Gazette No. 6,791 of April 28, 1916, are hereby revoked, and the following by-laws substituted therefor:—

#### GENERAL BY-LAWS RELATING TO LICENCES.

#### Interpretation of Terms.

- 1. In these by-laws the following expressions shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context:—
  - "The Council" means the Municipal Council of Colombo.

"Chairman "means the Chairman of the Municipal Council of Colombo.

- "Licensee" means the person holding a licence issued by the Chairman authorizing the use of any premises or place for any special purpose mentioned in the licence in pursuance of the Municipal Councils Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.
- or any by-law made thereunder.

  "Licensed premises" means the whole of the premises or place in respect of which a licence has been issued by the Chairman.
- "Licensed trade" means a trade for which a licence is necessary under the provisions of the Municipal Councils Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.
- 2. No person shall within the limits of the Council keep any bakery or eating-house without an annual licence from the Chairman, which licence the Chairman shall issue to all persons complying with the conditions provided for the issue of such licence. Every such licence shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such licence is issued, unless such licence shall have been previously cancelled as provided in by-law No. 10 or 11.

3. No licence shall be transferable.

4. All notices in connection with the licensed premises or the licensed trade shall be deemed to be served upon the licensee when left with any person employed in the licensed premises or when affixed to such premises.

5. The licensee shall comply with the lawful requirements of any notice served on him by the Chairman within the time stated in such notice, or if no such time is stated in the notice then within seven days from the service of such notice.

6. Every licence shall be subject to such fee as the Council shall, with the sanction of the Governor in Executive Council, impose.

7. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer of the Council generally or specially authorized in writing thereto by the Chairman at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any licensed premises and to inspect any furniture, equipment, vehicle, or utensil which is, or appears to be, used for the purpose of a licensed trade.

8. Every licensee shall during the period of licence keep his premises, furniture, and equipment in conformity

with the conditions on which the licence was issued.

9. Any person committing a breach of any regulation for any licensed premises shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 (Rupees Fifty), and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 (Rupees Twenty-five) for every day during which the offence was committed after conviction or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

10. On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee by Court for breach of any regulation relating to his

licensed premises, such licence shall be liable to cancellation by such Court.

11. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued the licensed premises cease to conform to the conditions laid down for its issue, the Chairman may notice the licensee to do all things necessary to make the premises conform to such conditions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of the notice the Chairman may suspend or cancel the licence.

#### BAKERIES.

A Bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread and making of cakes and biscuits for sale.

#### I .- Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a bakery unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the walls of every room in every part are not less than 7 feet in height, and are built of brick, stone, or

cabook, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed. (c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

That all the woodwork is oil painted or limewashed (e)

(f) That the floor is cemented throughout.

- (g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.
  (a) That the room in which kneading takes place has a superficial floor space of not less that 12 feet by 15 feet and that the lower 4 feet of the internal surface of the walls is covered with glazed tiles or is plastered with
- (b) That there is a free external air space not less than 7 feet wide on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors or windows.

(c) That the door of the oven does not open directly into the kneading room.

(d) That every kneading room is provided with a ceiling which is either plastered and limewashed or made of closely fitting boards which are either limewashed or oil painted.

3. (a) That the troughs, tables, and all the utensils used in the making of bread are capable of being moved

about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

- (b) That the tops of the tables used in the making of bread are made of well seasoned closely fitting planks or of some non-harmful impervious material.
  - (c) That the kneading room shall be rendered flyproof by means of wire gauze screens in windows and doors.
- (a) That the bakery is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
  - (b) That the bakery is at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap or open sewer.
  - (c) That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the bakery.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Bakeries.

1. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his promises a board

with his name and the words "Licensed Bakery" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

2. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees (including the vendors of bread) to be kept in the bakery so as to be available for inspection at all reasonable times by the Chairman or any person authorized by him.

3. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the bakery to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil painted, to be washed with hot water and, soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at any other time if so ordered by the Chairman

in writing.

Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the floor and the tiled or cemented portions of the walls and the tops of the tables to be washed every day at such hour as shall be specified in the licence. He shall cause every part of the bakery, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of bread to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises. He shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle, which shall be removed from the bakery and cleared once a day. The receptacle shall always be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

5. Every licensee of a bakery shall use for the manufacture of bread good and wholesome flour, water, and other

materials. He shall store the flour on a movable platform constructed in the manner herein specified:

The platform shall be of any convenient length and breadth, consisting of a single layer of stout planks supported The legs of the platform should not be permanently fixed in the floor. The edges on legs 3 feet high. of the planked top should stand out 9 inches away from the frame underneath, so as to prevent rats crawling up the legs and round the edge of the planked top. The platform shall be so constructed that there are no shelves or recesses under the planked top to provide harbour for rats.

The platform should be a movable one, so that it may be lifted away from the position and the floor underneath cleaned. It should be placed at least 9 inches away from the wall. He shall keep the space beneath

and around the platform free from all obstructions.

Every licensee of a bakery shall provide a sanitary dust bin and at least two spittoons to be kept on the licensed He shall keep the spittoons so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread, but shall premises. not keep them in the kneading room.

7. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep the bakery free from rats and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with

broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as found.

No person shall on any pretext whatsoever keep any animal or bird in a bakery.

No person shall spit within the bakery, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

(a) No person suffering from, or who has recently suffered from, any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter the licensed premises or take part in the manufacture or sale of any bread therein, or engage in the transport of any bread therefrom.

(b) No licensee of a bakery shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the provisions of the

above regulation 10 (a).

- 11. No licensee of a bakery shall store or keep or allow to be stored or kept in the room where bread is prepared or stored, or in which the materials for making bread are stored, any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or any articles, other than those used in the manufacture of bread.
- No licensee of a bakery shall use, or allow to be used, as a sleeping place any place on the same floor as the bakery or forming part of the same building, unless such place is effectually separated from the places where bread is prepared or stored or in which the materials thereof are stored by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than onefifteenth of the superficial floor space.

13. All persons employed in the preparation and making of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of making bread, and shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body and a clean white cap or turban.

14. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide clean water, clean towels, nail brush, and soap, and keep them so

as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread.

15. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

16. No licensee of a bakery shall expose, or cause to be exposed, for sale in the licensed premises any bread unless such bread is kept in clean properly constructed glass cases free from flies, dust, and vermin.

17. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all bread except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, to be stamped with figures denoting one or other of the following weights, viz.:-

 $\frac{1}{4}$  lb.,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb., 1 lb., 2 lb., or 4 lb.

He shall not sell or expose for sale any bread, except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, which shall not have one of the aforesaid weights stamped on it or which shall be found to weigh less than the weight stamped thereon.

18. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause to be fixed in a conspicuous place in the licensed premises a beam and scales with standard weights, and, if required by any purchaser, shall weigh any bread sold or exposed for sale in the said premises.

No licensee of a bakery shall allow any person to transport bread from his bakery for sale, unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the bakery.

The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a bakery, issue cards of registration for 20.

use by every person employed by such licensee in transporting bread for sale.

21. No licensee of a bakery shall allow any bread to be transported from his licensed premises for sale, except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. The licensee shall examine such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle, and shall satisfy himself that it is clean and wholesome before he allows such transport.

#### EATING-HOUSES.

"Eating-house" includes any premises (other than a house for which a licence has been obtained under the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912) where meals are prepared or supplied for consumption by the public in the premises or elsewhere for the profit or gain of any person owning or having an interest in or managing such business.

"Meals" includes tea or coffee when either is sold in the form of a beverage.

#### I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep an eating-house unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:-

That the premises are in good repair and are well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet and is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

2. That the walls of every room in every part are not less than 7 feet in height, and are built of brick, stone, or cabook, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.

That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

That the roof is made of some permanent material. That all the woodwork is oil painted or limewashed. That the floor is cemented throughout.

That the premises are provided with adequate drainage, with a sanitary dust bin, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

That the premises to be used as an eating-house have no internal communication with any part of a dwelling 8. house or with a bakery.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Eating-Houses.

1. Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Eating-house" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

2. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in such premises. He shall also cause a list of the names and

addresses of all employees to be kept at all times on the premises so as to be available for inspection.

3. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises to be limewashed twice every year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every part of such premises, the surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the preparation, sale, or consumption of food or drink to be kept in good repair, clean,

and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises

Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all utensils used in the preparation, sale, and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in 24 hours.

6. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed

immediately after such use and before being used by any other customer.

7. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed from the premises daily. He shall keep such receptacle covered at all times, except when refuse is being placed in it, and shall cause all waste tea, coffee, milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste to be collected in such receptacle and not to be thrown on the ground.

8. No licensee of an eating house shall use any counter or other place from which tea, coffee, or milk is served, unless the said counter or other place is covered with zinc or other impervious material.

9. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least two spittoons to be kept always at the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises as well as to the employees.

10. Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep the premises free from rats, and shall fill all rat holes with broken glass and plaster such holes with cement as soon as he discovers them.

Every licensee of an eating-house shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water. No licensee of an eating-house shall keep or store or expose for sale any food unless such food is kept in a receptacle so constructed as to prevent its contamination by flies, dust, and vermin. He shall keep such receptacles always clean.

13. No licensee of an eating-house shall sell or offer or expose for sale any milk to which water or any other foreign liquid or substance has been added so as to render such milk unwholesome.

14. No person shall spit within such premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

- No person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter such premises or take part in the preparation or sale of food or drink.
- 16. No licensee of an eating-house shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the above regulations numbered 14 and 15.
- 17. No licensee of an eating-house shall allow any person to transport for sale cooked food from the licensed premises unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of an eating-house and unless such food is carried in a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle.

  18. Every licensee of an eating-house shall see that every vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle used for carrying

food is clean at the time any food is placed in it.

19. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of an eating-house, issue cards of registration

for use by every person employed by such licensee in carrying food for sale.

20. The licensee of an eating-house shall not permit the licensed premises to be used for any other purposes whatsoever.

#### INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS.

The College year commences on October 1. The First term lasts from October 1 till December 23. The Second term from January 3 till March 31 and the Third term from May 1 till July 31. The College is closed for vacations during the months of April, August, and September.

There are two Departments in the College:-

I.—The Medical Department.

II.—The Apothecaries' Department.

Non-Medical Students are admitted to certain courses of the Medical Department.

#### I.—The Medical Department.

This Department provides a five-year course of instruction to prepare Students for the Licence of the College in Medicine and Surgery (L.M.S. Ceylon). This qualification entitles the holder to be registered as a Medical Practitioner in Ceylon, the United Kingdom, and most of the British Colonies.

The following are the rules enacted by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor and the Executive Council, with regard to the admission of Students to the Ceylon Medical College:—

- 1. No Student, unless he has been registered by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom prior to January 1, 1923, may join the Ceylon Medical College until he has fulfilled the following conditions in order:—
  - (a) He shall have passed a Preliminary Examination in General Education specified in rule 2.
  - (b) He shall have passed the Pre-medical Examination as specified in rule 3.
  - (c) He shall have produced evidence of having attained the age of 17 years.
  - (d) He shall have been registered as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.
- 2. The Preliminary Examination in General Education shall be the London University Matriculation Examination, or any examination which gives exemption therefrom.
- 3. The Pre-medical Examination shall include the subjects of Chemistry, Physics, and Biology, and shall be held twice a year, if necessary, in Colombo, in the months of March and September. This examination shall be conducted by a Board of Examiners consisting of the Professors in Chemistry, Physics, and Botany, and the Lecturer in Zoology at the University College, the Government Analyst and the Registrar of the Medical College. The standard of the examination shall be, as far as possible, that of the First Professional Examination of the Ceylon Medical College as held hitherto. A course of instruction in the subjects of the Pre-medical Examination must be taken either at the Ceylon University College or at any other College or school in which the teaching and equipment provided for instruction are of a standard approved by the Ceylon Medical College Council. Details of the scope and duration of the course of study necessary for this examination shall be furnished by the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College on application to him.
- 4. Registration as a Medical Student shall be effected as heretofore through the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.
- 5. No special Entrance Examination shall be held by the Ceylon Medical College after October, 1924. Entrance to the Medical College shall depend on the results of the Pre-medical Examination and the number of vacancies for students, priority being given in this connection to an applicant according to the order of merit obtained by him in the Pre-medical Examination.
- 6. The number of Students to be admitted to the Ceylon Medical College in any year shall not exceed fifty.
- 7. The course of medical study in the Ceylon Medical College shall extend to a period of not less than five years after registration.
- 8. From and after October, 1924, the Academic Year shall be divided into three terms, namely, October to December, January to March, and May to July.

- 9. Students admitted to the Ceylon Medical College in or after October, 1924, shall be charged a fee of five hundred rupees for each Academic Year, or a fee of one hundred and seventy rupees for each term, and this fee shall cover all the necessary lectures, practical classes, and hospital training, but shall not include the special fees in force at present, such as examination fees, registration fees, library, microscope, and dissecting fees. If a Student has to re-take a term's course of lectures or practical classes in any one subject, or to take a further term of hospital training, a fee of thirty rupees shall be levied for each such item in lieu of the composite fee of one hundred and seventy rupees referred to above.
- 10. For Students joining the Medical College in or after October, 1924, the following examinations shall be held:—
  - (i.) A First Professional Examination in the subjects of Anatomy and Physiology in the study of which two Academic Years must be passed before a Student may present himself for examination.
  - (ii.) A Second Professional Examination in the subjects of Pathology, Public Health, Materia Medica, and Medical Jurisprudence.
  - (iii.) A Third or Final Professional Examination in the subjects of Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery. A Student may present himself for this examination, with the exception of Midwifery, only after the completion of five Academic Years.

#### Late Registration Fees.

A late registration fee of Rs. 15 will be charged to all Students who apply for enrolment subsequent to the last date notified for registration of Students and payment of Session fees. Students must register personally unless prevented by illness, in which case all necessary documents, including receipts for fees, with a medical certificate from a qualified Medical Officer, should be sent to the Registrar to reach him before 12 noon on the last day for registration, otherwise, if the documents are late in arriving, the late fee of Rs. 15 will be payable. Under no circumstances whatever will a Student be registered or enrolled after the lapse of ten days from the date notified as the last date for registration and payment of fees.

#### II.—RULES FOR STUDENTS.

The following rules apply to all Students:-

- 1. All fees must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kachcheries, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, and that receipt must be handed personally to the Registrar.
- 2. Students desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College must do so through the medium of the Registrar.
- 3. The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 11 A.M. to 12 noon to give advice to Students, their parents or guardians.
- 4. On entering the College for the first time Medical Students must obtain from the Registrar proper forms to be filled up for registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council in London, and must eventually obtain from that Council a sealed certificate of registration.
- 5. Every Student will receive from the Registrar at the commencement of each Session an enrolment card signed by the Registrar. Students may only attend such courses as are entered on their enrolment cards and in the Students' Register.
- 6. The enrolment card is to be taken to the Lecturer on each specified subject, and is to be signed by him as evidence that the Student has been entered on his roll.

- 7. At the end of a course of lectures or other classes of instruction a Student, provided he has attended regularly and has satisfactorily performed the work of the class, will receive a Class Certificate. These certificates are to be produced when entering for professional examinations.
- 8. A Student who fails to attend regularly or to perform satisfactorily his work in the class will be refused a Class Certificate by the Lecturer, and will be called upon to take the course over again.
  - 9. Irregular attendance or neglect of work will be reported to the Registrar.
- 10. No allowance whatever will be made for irregular attendance or unsatisfactory work.
- $11. \;\;$  Students suffering from infectious or contagious diseases are not allowed to attend the College.
- 12. It is within the power of any Lecturer to suspend temporarily any Student or Students from his class pending a report to the Registrar.
- 13. It is within the power of the Registrar to suspend any Student for misbehaviour pending reference of his case to the Council, which may inflict such punishment, including dismissal from the College, as it may consider necessary.
- 14. Apparatus lost or broken by a Student must be replaced or paid for within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise he will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus the time of payment may be extended. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payment should be made to the Registrar who will give a receipt for it.
- 15. Medical Students failing to pass their Final Examination at the end of their tenth year or the First Professional Examination at the end of their fourth year or the Second Professional at the end of their sixth year shall cease to be members of the College.
- 16. Students entering for an examination or a term are particularly warned to see that receipts for fees and all certificates are brought to the Registrar personally at least twenty-four hours before the last day mentioned in the Calendar.
- 17. If a Student fails to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day and hour prescribed, he shall on no consideration be allowed to enter for the session or examination.
- 18. The onus of producing the certificates of attendance rests with the Student. If a certificate is lost another may be obtained on payment of Rs. 5.
- 19. In connection with Medical College Associations, Societies, or functions, Students are not permitted to collect subscriptions from the Medical Staff or others without previous sanction from the Registrar.
- 20. The Medical College compound and buildings will be closed daily at 4.30 p.m. (Saturdays 2 p.m.). Special sanction must be obtained from the Registrar if the use of College compound, buildings, or rooms is required after closing hours.

#### MICROSCOPE.

Students are strongly advised to purchase a microscope, dissecting instruments, &c., early in their course, but microscopes for class work are supplied on payment of Rs. 5 a Session.

#### III.—ADMITTANCE OF SCIENCE STUDENTS.

Any person of either sex may be admitted to the following class of the Ceylon Medical College upon payment of the fees prescribed and provided that sufficient accommodation is available:—

#### PHYSIOLOGY.

Any person other than a Medical Student desirous of studying Anatomy must make special application to the Registrar.

#### IV.—THE RULES OF THE STUDENTS' LIBRARY.

- 1. The Students' Library is open from 9 A.M. to 12 noon and from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. daily, except Saturdays, when it is open from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M.
  - 2. The Library remains open during the long and short vacations.
- 3. The removal, damage, or marking of any book belonging to the Library is strictly forbidden.
- 4. Students must give a receipt to the Librarian for every book issued for use.

Note,—The amendment of rule 15 relating to Final-Year Medical Students is only applicable to Students who join the College from October, 1922.

- 5. On returning the book to the Librarian, the Student must see that the Librarian enters the receipt of the book in the Library book, otherwise he will be responsible for the loss of the book.
  - 6. Silence must be strictly observed in the Library, and smoking is prohibited
  - 7. Two tables are specially reserved for Lady Students.

#### V.—Courses of Clinical Instructions held in the General Hospital.

#### Rules for Students.

- 1. Students of the third, fourth, and fifth years will attend courses of Instruction in Clinical Medicine and Surgery under the Physicians and Surgeons of the General Hospital.
- 2. At the beginning of each Session Students will be enrolled for courses of Clinical Medicine and Surgery, and subject to there being vacancies, a Student may elect to work under any particular Physician or Surgeon he may desire to.
- 3. Three months is the minimum period for which courses of Clinical Medicine or Surgery can be taken out.
- 4. A Student may take out two three-months' clinical courses in either Medicine or Surgery, or, if he prefers, he may take out one six-months' course in either Clinical Medicine and Surgery.
- 45. Clinical Clerking and Surgical Dressing are taken out at the same time as Clinical Medicine and Surgery and under the same Clinicians.
- 6. Ward Classes in Medicine and Surgery are taken out in the third year for Junior Students and the fourth and fifth year for Senior Students, these classes being conducted in the General Hospital.
- 7. A Student is required to produce the following certificates of Hospital Attendance before admission to the Final Examination:—
  - Six Months (1) Clinical Medicine Six Months (2) Clinical Surgery Six Months each (3) Clinical Clerking . . Six Months each (4) Surgical Dressing (5) Ward Class Medicine (Junior and Senior) Twenty-seven Months altogether (6) Ward Class Surgery ( do. Twenty-seven mothhs altogether (7) Clinical Midwifery by residence at the Lying-in One Month  $\mathbf{Home}$

(8) Clinical Gynæcology ... One Month

Nóte.—All Students who complete their Second Professional in March or July,

should take early steps to arrange for getting one month's training at the Lying-in Home during vacation, if possible.

8. The systematic courses on Clinical Medicine and Surgery will be con-

8. The systematic courses on Clinical Medicine and Surgery will be conducted during the three terms, and Class Certificates of attendance will only be issued during these periods.

A Student may, however, attend the Hospital during the vacation period as a Clinical Clerk or Surgical Dresser.

- 9. All parts of the Hospital, except the Paying Section, are available for affording clinical instruction to Students.
- 10. No Student engaged in dissections or post-mortems will be allowed to enter the Operating Theatre.
- 11. A Student doing duty as Post-mortem Clerk, or attending the post-mortem demonstrations, will not be allowed during such duty, to do dressing in Surgical Wards of the Hospital.
- 12. All irregularities in the work of the Clinical Clerks and Surgical Dressers must be reported to the Medical Superintendent by the Surgeons or Physicians, and he will bring them to the notice of the Registrar.
  - 13. The following are the duties of—

#### A.—A Clinical Clerk—

- (1) To attend daily the rounds (morning and evening) of the Physician, whose clerk he is.
- (2) To record the condition, temperature, &c., of every case assigned to him.
- (3) To attend post-mortems in those cases assigned to him which have died.
- (4) To examine the urine and discharges of the cases assigned to him and record the results on the bed-head ticket.
- N.B.—Every Clinical Clerk must provide himself with a stethoscope, clinical thermometer, and a measuring tape.

#### B.—A Surgical Dresser—

- (1) To attend daily the rounds (morning and evening) of the Surgeon whose dresser he is.
- (2) To record the condition, temperature, &c., of every case assigned to him, and dress the same.
- (3) To attend all possible operations.
- N.B.—Every dresser must provide himself with a small pocket case of instruments.
  - C.—A Clerk in the Out-patient, Department—
    - (1) To assist the Medical and Surgical Officers in every way.
    - (2) To examine and prescribe for patients under the direction of the Medical Officer.

#### D.—A Post-mortem Clerk—

- (1) To attend thirty post-mortem demonstrations during the term.
- (2) To enter in the Post-mortem Book the description of the post-mortem examination as given by the Pathologist.
- (3) He shall personally perform six post-mortems.
- (4) The post-mortems will be held from 11 A.M. to 12 noon.
- 14. Each Student must keep a notebook to write down clinical notes from his Medical and Surgical cases, and this notebook must be available for inspection when required by the Physician or Surgeon to whom he is assigned.
- 15. All Students attending the practice of the General Hospital must continue to do so daily throughout the three terms (except on Sundays).
- 16. The Physicians and Surgeons attached to the General Hospital and Out-patient Department must call a roll daily of the Students attending their classes. Students must attend regularly and perform the work of the class in order to obtain Class Certificates for their attendance.

#### VI.—Rules for Medical Students attending Practical Midwifery.

- 1. Medical Students when in their final year will arrange to take out the prescribed twenty cases of labour.
- 2. The Students must enter their names for practical midwifery at the commencement of a term, i.e., in January, May, or October.
- 3. Students are recommended to submit their names in pairs, so that two may work together in the taking out of their cases.
- 4. At the commencement of each term the Registrar of the Medical College shall send to the Medical Superintendent the names of the Students who intend to take up the practical course for that term. (The number must be equally distributed throughout the term and the holidays.)
- 5. The names of all Students shall be entered in a register kept specially for the purpose in the De Soysa Lying-in Home.
- 6. The arrangements for night duty shall be made by the Medical Superintendent.
- 7. While taking out their course, Students will be accommodated during the nights only at the De Soysa Lying-in Home. They will be on duty from 9 P.M. to 8 A.M.
- 8. All cases admitted during the night and those remaining undelivered by 9 P.M. shall be assigned to the Medical Students.
- 9. The Students shall keep a notebook and enter facts in it connected with each case. This book will be examined by the Medical Superintendent from time to time.
- 10. A Student undertaking a case of midwifery is responsible for the conduct of that case during his hours of duty.
- 11. An Attendance Book is to be kept at the entrance of the De Soysa Lying-in Home, in which the hour of arrival and departure, with initials, will be entered by every Student.
- 12. As long as a patient remains in the De Soysa Lying-in Home the Student who attended her in her confinement is to visit her daily between the hours of 7 A.M. and 8 A.M. and enter the necessary particulars in the bed-head ticket.
- 13. The Students shall on no account absent themselves without the leave of the Medical Superintendent being previously obtained.
- 14. Students are to be properly dressed when conducting a case of midwifery; any untidiness or slovenliness in the dress of Students is to be reported to the Medical Superintendent by the House Surgeon.

- 15. No Student is allowed to be in the De Soysa Lying-in Home, nor on the premises, unless he is there strictly on duty, and Students "on duty" are not allowed to be in the Home during their "off duty" hours.
- 16. Students attending the Lying-in Home are not excused their Hospital attendance during the period they are on duty at the former Institute.

Note.—There is accommodation for four Students at a time on night duty.

It is recommended that, as far as possible, Students should take out their maternity cases during the vacation period, thus obviating the necessity of having to attend lectures after night duty in the Lying-in Home.

# VII.—EXAMINATIONS FOR THE LICENCE OF THE CEYLON MEDICAL COLLEGE IN MEDICINE, SURGERY, AND MIDWIFERY.

The Medical Professional Examinations of the Ceylon Medical College are held twice yearly, viz., in March and July. The Final Examination is held in December also. The following examinations have to be passed in order to obtain the Licence in Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery:—

- (1) The First Professional.
- (2) The Second Professional.
- (3) The Third or Final Professional.

#### 1.—The First Professional Examination.

Before admission to the First Professional Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

- (1) Of having been registered as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.
- (2) Of having passed the Pre-medical Examination.
- (3) Of having studied during two years in the Ceylon Medical College.
- (4) Of having attended the following courses:—
  - (a) Anatomy:—

(1) Lectures, two courses during two academic years.

- (2) Practical, two academic years, during which period evidence must be produced that the complete human body has been dissected, and that in all six parts have been satisfactorily dissected
- (b) Physiology:—
  - (1) Lectures:—

General Physiology, during two First and two Second terms. Histology, one course during one Third term.

(2) Practical:—

One course of Practical Instruction in each of the following:-

Histology.

Chemical Physiology.

Experimental Physiology.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

- (a) Anatomy:—
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Oral Examination.

Each Candidate will have 10 minutes oral on Osteology and 10 minutes oral on Anatomical Preparations. At the option of the Examiners he may be called upon to perform dissections.

- (b) Physiology:—
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Practical.

#### Candidates will be expected—

- (a) To prepare and mount Microscopical Specimens.
- (b) To recognize Microscopical Specimens.
- (c) To analyze a Chemico-Physiological Solution or Solid.

- (d). To show a practical knowledge of the more important quantitative methods of analysis used in Chemical Physiology.
- (e) To show a practical acquaintance with Experimental Physiological Methods.
- (3) Oral Examination.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination must on first entry take both the above subjects, viz., Anatomy and Physiology, on passing which he may attend courses for the Second Professional Examination. In the event of only one subject being passed, he will be exempted from re-examination in it, but will not be permitted to attend courses for the Second Professional until such time as he has passed in Anatomy and Physiology. Candidates who entered on and after October 1, 1924, cannot pass in one subject only, unless they obtain at the same time at least half the mark required to pass in the paper of the other.

#### 2.—The Second Professional Examination.

Before admission to the Second Professional Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

- (1) Of having passed the First Professional Examination.
- (2) Of having attended the following courses:—
  - (a) Pathology:
    - (1) Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
    - (2) Practical Pathological Histology, one course during First and Second terms.
    - (3) Bacteriology, Lectures and Practical, one course during Third term.
    - (4) Post-mortem Demonstrations, including Clerking, six months.
    - (5) The conduction of six post-mortems.
  - (b) Medical Jurisprudence:—Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
  - (c) Hygiene: -Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
  - (d) Materia Medica:-
    - (1) Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
    - (2) Lectures, Pharmacology and Therapeutics, one course during Third term.
    - (3) Lectures, Pharmacy, one course during Third term.
    - (4) Practical Pharmacy, one course during Third term.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

- (a) Pathology (including Bacteriology):—
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Practical and Oral Examination.

The Candidates may be examined in-

Morbid: Anatomy and Bacteriology.—Practical Examination of Museum Fresh and Microscopical Specimens.

- (b) Medical Jurisprudence:-
  - (1) One Written Paper of two hours.
  - (2) Oral Examination.
- (c) Hygiene: -One Written Paper of two hours.
- (d) Materia Medica and Therapeutics:—
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Practical and Oral Examination.

#### Candidates will be expected-

- (I) To recognize the drugs and preparations of the British Pharmacopæia.
- (2) To dispense a prescription.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination on first entry at the end of his third year takes two of the above subjects, viz., Pathology and Materia Medica, on passing which he may attend courses for the Final Examination. At the end of the second term of his fourth year he takes Forensic Medicine and Public Health. In the event of only one or two subjects being passed, he will be exempted from re-examination in it or them, but will not be permitted to attend courses for the Final Examination until such time as he has passed in Pathology.

#### 3.—The Final Examination.

Before admission to the Final Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

(1) Of having passed the Second Professional Examination.

(2) Of having been a Registered Medical Student for five years.

(3) Of having attained the age of 21 years.

- (4) Of having attended the Medical and Surgical Practice of the General Hospital, Colombo, for a period of three years as follows:—
  - (a) Out-patient Department, Medical side Six Months (b) Out-patient Department, Surgical side Six Months (c) Clinical Medicine and Clinical Clerking Six Months (d) Clinical Surgery and Surgical Dressing Six Months (e) Junior Ward Class Medicine Nine Months (f) Junior Ward Class Surgery... Nine Months Eighteen Months (g) Senior Ward Class Medicine (h) Senior Ward Class Surgery... Eighteen Months (i) Clinical Gynæcology Three Months
  - (i) Gynæcological Clerking ... One Month
  - (k) Lying-in Home Midwifery Practice ... One Month
- (5) Of having attended a course of instruction in Vaccination under the Provincial Surgeon of the Western Province.
- (6) Of having personally conducted twenty cases of labour in the Lying-in Home.
- (7) Of having attended Clinical Instruction at-

(a) Infectious Diseases Hospital, for three months.

- (b) The Victoria Memorial Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Hospital, for three months in each subject.
- (c) The Lady Havelock Hospital for Children's Diseases.
- (8) Of having personally administered an Anæsthetic to at least 12 cases.
- (9) Of having attended the following courses of lectures in the Ceylon Medical College:—
  - (a) Medicine, one course.
  - (b) Surgery, one course.
  - (c) Operative Surgery, one course.
  - (d) Midwifery, one course.
  - (e) Gynæcology, one course.
  - (f) Tropical Medicine, one course.
  - (g) Mental Diseases, one course.
  - (h) X-Ray and Electrical Therapeutics (including Demonstrations), one
  - (i) Venereal and Skin Diseases, one course.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

- (a) Medicine (including Tropical Medicine):-
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Clinical Examination of cases in the wards of the General Hospital.
  - (3) Oral Examination.
- (b) Surgery:—
  - (1) One Written Paper (including questions on the diseases of Eye, Ear Nose, and Throat, and Surgical Anatomy) of three hours.
  - (2) 'Practical:—
    - (a) Examination of Surgical Cases in the wards of the General Hospital (may be asked questions on Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat).
    - (b) Examination on Bandaging, Instruments, Splints, &c.
    - (c) Examination in Operative Surgery.
    - (d) Oral Examination.
- (c) Midwifery and Gynæcology:—
  - (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
  - (2) Oral Examination.

Candidates will be expected to show a practical knowledge of Midwifery and Gynæcology.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination must on first entry take all three of the above subjects, viz., Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery. Passes are allowed in one of these subjects or more, in each of which at least 50 per cent. of the total marks must be obtained.

Students may, if they so desire, sit for the final in Midwifery as a separate single subject before the end of the fifth year, provided that they have taken the necessary courses. The courses required are—The entire course of Midwifery lectures, Gynæcology lectures, Medicine lectures, Surgery lectures. Junior Ward Classes, Medicine and Surgery, Clinical Gynæcology, Gynæcology Clerking, Lying-in Home Practical, and Practical Midwifery (20 cases) and three months' course in each of the following, viz. :—O. P. D. Medical, O. P. D. Surgical, Clinical Clerking, Surgical Dressing.

Candidates availing themselves of this privilege are not eligible for First or Second Class Honours at the Final, for which all subjects must be passed

together.

## VIII.—RULES AND REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO EXAMINATIONS.

#### A.—Examination Rules: Medical.

The following Examination Rules apply to all examinations held in the College:—

- 1. Students not sitting for the examinations are warned that they are not allowed access to the College and College grounds during the examinations.
- 2. Candidates for the Medical Professional Examinations must present themselves for all the subjects of an examination for which they are liable at their first entry, and subsequently in such subject or subjects in which they have failed to qualify in the previous examination.

Final students may, if they so desire, sit for Midwifery as a separate subject before the end of the fifth year, provided that the necessary courses

have been taken.

Students admitted to the College on and after October 1, 1924, and presenting themselves for the First Professional Examination must take both subjects, viz., Anatomy and Physiology together, until they have passed in one or both subjects; but candidates will not be allowed to pass in one subject only, unless they obtain at the same time at least half the number of marks required to pass in the paper of the other.

- 3. On no consideration whatever must the Candidate write his name on the answer books. A Candidate so doing is liable to be disqualified at the discretion of the Examiners.
- 4. Any Candidate more than fifteen minutes late shall not be allowed to enter the Examination Room.
- 5. No Candidate shall be allowed to leave the Examination Room before the expiration of half an hour.
- 6. A Candidate copying from the papers of other Candidates, or obtaining assistance from other Candidates or from persons outside the Examination Room, or introducing books, manuscripts, or papers of any kind into the Examination Room, will be at once dismissed from the examination. His case shall be brought before the next Meeting of the Council, and if his offence is considered grave, he shall not be admitted to any future examination of the College.
- 7. At the discretion of the Examiners in any subject, on consultation with the Registrar of the College, a Candidate may be informed that he has not obtained sufficient marks in the written examination to enable him to proceed with the Oral and Practical Examinations.
- 8. Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their notebooks containing the record of the work done by them in the Laboratory Classes which they have attended.
- 9. Examination fees will not be refunded for any cause whatever, and Candidates failing to present themselves at any examination will be required to pay the usual examination fee before again being admitted to an examination. In the case of a Candidate reporting ill before the examination begins, and supporting his statement with an approved medical certificate, the fee for the next ensuing examination will not be charged.

Note.—Rule 8 above applies only to Physiology, and Pathology.

#### IX.—GOVERNMENT BURSARIES.

#### 1.—Bursaries.

Bursaries for poor deserving Medical Students have been instituted by the Government to cover the cost of both the Pre-medical and Medical Courses. The number will be limited to ten per cent. of the accepted entries for the Pre-medical Course at University College in any one year with the addition of

one extra Bursary which will be offered each year and reserved for a lady student. Each shall be held subject to satisfactory academic progress being maintained from year to year.

2. The award of these Bursaries shall be made by the Medical College Council, subject to approval by the Government.

#### Rules.

- (1) Candidates may be of any race, but must either be born in Ceylon, or of at least one Ceylonese parent.
- (2) Candidates must not be over 21 years of age, must be physically fit for a medical career, of good character, and the necessary standard of general education required for entrance to the University College.
- (3) Certificates proving the particulars required by rule (2) must be furnished in submitting application for a Bursary.
- (4) Preference shall be given to such candidates as shall appear to the Council by their superior attainments and promise of usefulness to be more deserving of the advantage of these Bursaries.
- (5) No candidate shall be eligible unless his or her parents or guardians produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Council that they are unable to pay the Medical College fees for such candidates, and they may be required to do so subsequently from time to time.
- (6) The Registrar shall report to the Council at the end of each session on the progress and conduct of the holders of the Bursaries. In the event of such report being unsatisfactory, any Bursary may be withdrawn by the Council.
- (7) Should the holder of a Bursary win the entrance or First Professional Scholarship he (or she) shall vacate his (or her) Bursary during the period covered by the Scholarship.
- (8) Canvassing of members of the Ceylon Medical College Council by candidates or on their behalf shall disqualify any candidate.

#### 2.—Entrance Scholarship.

This Scholarship is awarded annually to the candidate who stands first in the March Pre-medical Examination, provided a sufficient standard has been attained.

#### Rules.

- (1) The winner of the Scholarship will be entitled to free education in the Ceylon Medical College for two years, and he will not be required to pay lecture, registration, library, microscope, anatomical, or examination fees during this period.
- (2) This Scholarship ceases at the end of the second year, and the Scholar is no longer exempt from payment of such College fees as may be subsequently due.

(3) In the event of the conduct or progress of the Scholar being unsatisfactory this Scholarship may be cancelled.

(4) In the event of the Scholar failing to pass the First Professional Examination at the end of his second year, he will be required to pay for such courses of instruction as he is ordered by the Examiners to re-take, and subsequently to pay the ordinary fees due on account of the third, fourth, and fifth year courses of study.

# 3.—The Ceylon Medical College Jubilee Scholarship (Founded 1921).

This Scholarship was founded by the Government of Ceylon in commemoration of the Half-Centenary of the foundation of the Ceylon Medical College.

#### Rules.

- 1. This Scholarship shall be called "The Ceylon Medical College Jubilee Scholarship." It is founded by the Government of Ceylon to commemorate the Half-Centenary of the foundation of the Ceylon Medical College.
- 2. Candidates for this Scholarship must be the sons or daughters of Licentiates or Qualified Apothecaries of the Ceylon Medical College.
- 3. Candidates who apply for this Scholarship must be over 17 and under 22 years of age. They must be physically fit, and must hold the requisite preliminary qualifications for registration as a Medical Student of the Ceylon Medical College.
- 4. The Scholarship shall be awarded on the recommendation of the Council of the Ceylon Medical College.

- 5. In making its recommendation, the Council shall take into consideration the moral character, attainments, and social status of candidates and further preference shall be given to the candidate who, in the opinion of the Council, is considered to be the most deserving of the help and advantages of the Scholarship. In the event of there being two or more candidates of like attainments and qualifications, the award shall be made by a competitive examination, the candidate obtaining the highest marks being entitled to the award.
- 6. The elected Scholar shall be exempted from the payment of all fees (except fees for conferring Licence and Registration Fee under Ordinance No. 2 of 1905) for a period of five years, provided always that his conduct and progress are satisfactory.
- 7. In the event of a Scholar's conduct and progress being at any time unsatisfactory, the Scholarship shall be cancelled. It shall, however, in the case of illness, duly certified, or other unavoidable cause, be competent for the Council to recommend that the period of holding the Scholarship be extended, provided that the whole period does not or will not exceed six years.

#### 4.—FIRST PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATION SCHOLARSHIP.

#### Rules.

- 1. This Scholarship is awarded to the Student who stands first in the First Class in the First Professional Examination, provided he obtains a sufficient number of marks.
- 2. The winner of this Scholarship will be entitled to free education during his third, fourth, and fifth years, provided his progress and conduct are satisfactory, and will not be called upon to pay lecture, microscope, or examination fees during this period.
  - 3. All holders of Scholarships must pay the fee for conferring the licence.

#### 5.—Post-Licentiate Scholarship.

This Scholarship is granted yearly to the best student of the year, provided he qualifies in the first class and within the statutory period, on the following terms:—

(a) Appointment to a House Officership in the General Hospital at the first opportunity, with subsequent appointment to special hospitals in Colombo and to, say, Kandy or Galle.

(b) Leave and free passage to proceed to England at the end of three years, instead of four, if he so desires, and if he is well reported on.

· An outfit allowance of £50.

d) On obtaining such higher British Qualifications as are amongst those laid down and approved by the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services, he be granted a scholarship for one year to enable him to engage in the study of some special subject, the choice of which rests with him. The value of the scholarship should be at the rate of £300 per annum for the period of his special study.

Note.—The three years' "apprenticeship" proposed in (b) is suggested so as to ascertain the student's capabilities. Those who are unfavourably reported on will not be sent to England, but in certain cases they may be allowed another year within which to secure a satisfactory report. After the initial period of three years' service an officer will be entitled to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  months' vacation leave (or any unexpired portion of such leave) and six months' half-pay leave. He may also be granted a further period of six months' half-pay leave under the Regulations.

#### X.—APOTHECARIES DEPARTMENT

#### Information for Students.

This Department provides a two years' course to qualify Students for the post of Government Apothecary or Estate Dispenser. There are no fees to be paid for tuition, but at the conclusion of the course. Students who pass the Final Examination may be appointed to the Civil Medical Department or as an Estate Dispenser.

Information as regards conditions of service and salaries as Apothecaries can be obtained on application to the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services.

The Government appointments are pensionable.

Intending Students must at the end of September present to the Registrar—

(a) A certificate of being over 16 and under 25 years of age.

(b) A certificate of good character.

(c) A certificate of having passed one of the recognized Preliminary Examinations specified below in Arithmetic, English, and one of the following languages: Latin, Sinhalese, Tamil.

The following are the approved Entrance Examinations:—

(1) The Apothecaries' Entrance Examination of the Ceylon Medical College. The Entrance Examination is only held if sufficient candidates do not present the qualifications stated under (2), (3), and (4). Students are only admitted to the number required to meet the needs of the Civil Medical Department.

(2) The Elementary School-leaving Certificate of the Ceylon Education Department.

(3) The Junior or Senior Oxford or Cambridge Local or Cambridge School Certificate Examination.

(4) Any Entrance or Matriculation Examination of the Indian Univer-

In every case a pass must be obtained in all the subjects required by the Regulations of the Ceylon Medical College Council, viz., Arithmetic, English, and one of the languages: Latin, Sinhalese, Tamil.

The Regulations of the Apothecaries' Entrance Examination are as

follows:

This examination is held if required once a year in July. Before admission to the Entrance Examination a Candidate must present to the Registrar, not later than June 22, the following certificates:-

(1) Certificate of being over 16 and under 25 years of age.

(2) Certificate of being of good character.

At the same time he must bring a receipt for Rs. 10,\* which must be paid into the General Treasury or a Kachcheri. The Candidate will then receive an admission form bearing his number, which will admit him to the examination.

#### Subjects of the Examination.

(1) English Language:

(a) English Grammar.

- (b) Writing from Dictation.
- (c) Writing of an Essay.

(2) Arithmetic:

Numbers, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, Division, Least Common Multiple, Greatest Common Measure, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, Weights and Measures, Money Tables, Practice, Simple Proportion, Percentages.

(3) One of the following Languages:—

Tamil, Sinhalese, or Elementary Latin.

#### Rules for Students.

The following rules apply to all Students of both sexes:

All fees must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kachcheries, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, and that receipt must be handed personally to the Registrar.

2. Students desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College must do so through the medium of the Registrar.

The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 11 A.M. to 12 noon. to give advice to Students, their parents, or guardians.

4. Each Student will receive from the Registrar, at the commencement of each Session, a card on which his signature is placed against the courses of instruction which he is to attend during that Session.

5. This card is to be taken to the Lecturer in each subject, and by him

signed as evidence that the Student has been entered in his roll.

6. At the end of his course of lectures or other classes of instruction a Student, provided he has attended regularly and has satisfactorily performed the work of the class, will receive a Class Certificate. These Certificates are to be produced when entering for Professional Examinations.

<sup>\*</sup> The fee must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kachcheri, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, which must be produced when entering for the examination. This fee is returned if and when a Student passes the First Apothecaries' Examination. No other examination fee is charged.

- 7. Irregular attendance or neglect of work will be reported to the Registrar.
- 8. A Student who fails to attend regularly or to satisfactorily perform the work of the class will be refused a Class Certificate by the Lecturer, and will be called upon to take the course over again.
- 9. No allowance whatever will be made for irregular attendance or unsatisfactory work.
- 10. Students suffering from infectious or contagious disease are not allowed to attend the College.
- 11. It is within the power of any Lecturer to temporarily suspend any Student or Students from his class pending a report to the Registrar.
- 12. It is within the power of the Registrar to suspend any Student for misbehaviour pending reference of his case to the Council, which may inflict such punishment, including dismissal from the College, as it may consider necessary.
- 13. Apparatus lost or broken by a Student must be replaced or paid for within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise he will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus, the time of payment may be extended. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payments should be made to the Lecturer, who will give a receipt for it.
- 14. Students who are considered by the Council to be unsuitable for further tuition in the College, or who fail to pass the Second Apothecaries' Examination at the end of three years, will be dismissed from the College.
- 15. If a Student fails to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day at 4 P.M. precisely, he shall not be allowed to enter for an examination or Session. If the absence is due to unavoidable circumstances, he may be allowed to enter for the session on payment of a late registration fee of Rs. 3, before the 10th day from the last date fixed for such registration
- 16. The *onus* of producing certificates of attendance at lectures rests with the Student. If a certificate is lost, another may be obtained on payment of Rs. 5.
- 17. Students must provide themselves with separate notebooks for the different courses of instruction they have to attend. These notebooks will be inspected by the Lecturer and Tutor from time to time.
- 18. In connection with Medical College Associations, Societies, or functions, Students are not permitted to collect subscriptions from the Medical Staff or others without previous sanction from the Registrar.
- 19. Final year Apothecary Students, who have been requested to discontinue attending the College for failure to pass the Second Apothecaries' Examination at the end of three years, shall be permitted to sit for the subsequent Apothecaries' Final Examination on payment of a fee of Rs. 15.

#### THE RULES OF THE STUDENTS' LIBRARY.

- 1. The Students' Library is open from 9 A.M. to 12 noon and from 1 P.M., to 4 P.M. daily, except Saturdays, when it is open from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M.
  - 2. The Library will be open during the long and short vacations.
- 3. Any noise, disturbance, breakage, or the removal of any book or piece of furniture from the Library is strictly forbidden.
- 4. Students must give a receipt to the Librarian for every book which they wish to read, and must on no consideration whatever remove any book from the Library.
- 5. On returning the book borrowed to the Librarian, the Student must see that the Librarian enters the receipt of the book in the Library book; otherwise he will be responsible for the loss of the borrowed book.
- 6. Silence must be strictly observed in the Library, and smoking is prohibited.
  - 7. Two tables are specially reserved for Lady Students.

#### **Professional Examinations.**

#### 1.—THE FIRST APOTHECARIES' EXAMINATION.

The First Apothecaries' Examination is held twice a year, in March and July. Before admission to the First Apothecaries' Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

- (1) Of having passed one of the recognized qualifying preliminary examinations in General Education.
- (2) Of having studied for one year in the Ceylon Medical College.

- (3) Of having attended subsequent to passing the above examination the following courses of instruction at the Ceylon Medical College:-
  - (a) Elementary Chemistry.—Lectures: One course during the three terms. Practical and Tutorial classes during the three terms.
  - (b) Pharmacy.—Lectures: One course during the three terms. Practical class during the three terms.
  - (c) Elementary Anatomy and Physiology.—Lectures: One course during the three terms.
  - (d) Dispensing.—Practical work in the Hospital Dispensaries during the three terms.
  - (e) Vaccination.—Practical work at the Naccine Station under the Provincial Surgeon, Western Province, during the three terms. Thirty attendances.

He shall then apply to the Registrar, from whom he will receive an admission form with a number if his certificates are in order.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

#### 1.—Chemistry.

- (1) Written Paper: Simple questions on the elementary principles of chemistry, the physical and chemical properties of air and water, and the following: oxygen and oxides, hydrogen, nitrogen, oxides and acid of nitrogen, ammonia, carbon, oxides of carbon, carbonates, chlorines hydrochloric acid, bleaching powder, potassium chlorate, sulphur, oxides and acids of sulphur, sulphuretted hydrogen, phosphorus and phosphoric acid, boric acid and borax, and silica. The oxides and most commonly occurring salts of sodium, potassium, calcium, magnesium, iron, copper, lead, and mercury.
- (2) Practical Examination: Simple exercises involving the preparation or identification of a substance in the above list, and easy quantitative exercises (such as the determination of the percentage of water of crystallization in a salt, or the quantitative neutralization of acids and alkalis).

#### -Pharmacy.

- (1) Written Paper, 2 hours.
- (2) Practical Simple Dispensing.

#### 3.—Elementary Anatomy and Physiology.

- (1) Written Paper, 2 hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

#### 2.—THE SECOND APOTHECARIES' EXAMINATION.

The Second Apothecaries' Examination will be held twice a year, in March and July. Before admission Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates :-

- (1) Of having attained 19 years of age.
- (2) Of having passed the First Apothecaries' Examination.
- (3) Of having studied for two years in the Ceylon Medical College subsequent to passing the examination in General Education.
- (4) Of having attended since passing the First Apothecaries' Examination the following courses conducted by the Ceylon Medical College:-
  - (a) Materia Medica.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
  - (b) Pharmacy.—Practical: One course of three terms.
  - (c) Elementary Medicine.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
  - (d) Elementary Surgery.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
    (e) Elementary Midwifery.—Lectures and Practical Instruction: One
  - course during the Monsoon Term.
  - (f) Hygiene and Public Health.—Lectures: One course during the Autumn and Winter Terms.
  - (g) Hospital Practice:
    - (1) Elementary Clinical Medicine: One course during the three terms.
    - (2) Elementary Clinical Surgery: One course during the three terms.
    - (3) Out-patient Department :-
      - (a) Surgical dressing

.(b) Medical side

Six Months

(c) Surgical side

- Three Months
- (h) Dispensing.—Two academic years.
- (i) Hospital Forms.—Lectures: One course during the Monsoon Term.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

#### 1.—Materia Medica.

(1) Written Paper, 2 hours.

(2) Oral Examination and Practical Pharmacy.

Candidates will be expected to show a practical acquaintance with the drugs and preparations of the British Pharmacopæia.

#### 2.—Elementary Medicine and Hygiene.

(1) Written Paper, 3 hours.

(2) Oral Examination.

#### 3.—Elementary Surgery and Midwifery.

(1) Written Paper, 3 hours.

(2) Oral Examination.

Candidates will be required to show a knowledge of (a) dressing and treatment of wounds and ulcers; (b) the preparation of patients, rooms, and instruments for operation; (c) the names of instruments; (d) the conduct of a case of normal labour.

#### 4.—Hospital Forms and Management.

Candidates will be expected to be acquainted with the Forms of the Ceylon Civil Medical Department.

After passing the Second Apothecaries' Examination Candidates are eligible for appointments as Government Apothecaries or Estate Dispensers if there are vacancies.

#### 9.—Rules and Regulations with regard to Examinations.

#### Examination Rules.

The following Examination Rules apply to all examinations held in the College:—

- 1. Students not sitting for the examinations are warned that they are not allowed access to the College and College grounds during the examinations.
- 2. Candidates for the Apothecary Entrance and First and Second Apothecary Examinations must present themselves for all the subjects of an examination at one and the same time. Any Candidate failing to satisfy the Examiners in any one subject of an examination shall be rejected in the whole examination. Provided that at the Second Apothecaries' Examination a candidate who obtains 40 per cent. in two of the three subjects—(1) Materia Medica, (2) Elementary Medicine and Hygiene, (3) Elementary Surgery and Midwifery—need not be examined again in these subjects, but may complete the examination in the remaining subjects on a subsequent occasion.
- 3. On no consideration whatever must the Candidate write his name on the answer books. A Candidate so doing is liable to be disqualified at the discretion of the Examiners.
- 4. Any Candidate more than fifteen minutes late shall not be allowed to enter the Examination Room.
- 5. No Candidate shall be allowed to leave the Examination Room, before the expiration of half an hour.
- 6. A Candidate copying from the papers of other Candidates, or obtaining assistance from other Candidates or from persons outside the Examination Room, or introducing books, manuscripts, or papers of any kind into the Examination Room, will be at once dismissed from the examination. His case shall be brought before the next meeting of the Council, and if his offence is considered grave, he shall not be admitted to any future examination of the College.
- 7. At the discretion of the Examiners in any subject on consultation with the Registrar of the College, a Candidate may be informed that he has not obtained sufficient marks in the written examination to enable him to proceed with the practical.
- 8. Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their notebooks containing the record of the work done by them in their Laboratory Classes which they have attended.

Rule No. 267 of the general rules for Prisons published in Gazette No. 7,542 of August 20, 1926, is hereby rescinded, and the following rule is substituted therefor:—

267. The body of an executed prisoner shall not be given up to his friends or relatives for burial without the permission of Government, provided that the Fiscal may, on behalf of the Government, grant permission for the body to be so given up, if he is satisfied that burial or cremation will take place locally without delay or demonstration. If such permission is not given, the body shall be buried in the usual cemetery.

#### STATISTICS. VITAL

#### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 20, 1928.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 178 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 97 Sinhalese, 21 Tamils, 33 Moors, 12 Malays, and 7 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1928, viz., 264,713) was 35·2, as against 34·4 in the preceding week, 32·3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 32·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 143 (2 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 86 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 17 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.2, as against 29.2 in the previous week, 25.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.6 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 143 total deaths, 21 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 29 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average for last year.

Stillbirihs.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-two deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 10 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Maradana North, and 2 each in Kotahena North, Maradana South, and Slave Island, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena South, and Wellawatta North, as against 13 in the previous week and 19 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana South, and 1 each in Kotahena

North and Kollupitiva, as against 12 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

(a) Ten deaths from Phthisis were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena North, and Wellawatta North, and 1 in New Bazaar, as against 11 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. (b) Two deaths from Phthisis, of residents of Colombo Town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama,

during the week. 3. One death from Bubonic Plague, of a resident of Colombo town, occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week. No death from Plague was registered within the city.

4. Nine deaths from Debility were registered, 6 from Enteritis, 5 each from Dysentery, Infantile Convulsions, and Worms, 2 each from Tetanus and Accidents, 1 from Diarrhoea and 67 from Other Causes.

5. Twenty-one cases of Measles, 13 of Chickenpox, and 6 of Enteric Fever were reported during the week, as against 15, 11, and 7, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.8°, against 80.4° in the preceding week and 80.2° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.875 in., against 29.891 in. in the preceding week and 29.972 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 10.54 in., against 3.73 in. in the preceding week and 4.57 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held in the Municipal Office on Saturday, September 15, 1928, at 9 a.m., pursuant to Notice dated September 10, 1928.

Present:—Mr. L. W. C. Schrader, Chairman; Mr. D. W. Subasinghe; the Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe; Mr. F. W. Sproule; Mr. S. H. Dahanayake; and Dr. T. de Kretser.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of August 25, 1928, and the Special Meeting of September 6, 1928, copies thereof having been furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed.

Arising from the Minutes, the Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos desired to express his thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Council for the vote of congratulation passed at the last meeting.

- Mr. S. H. Dahanayake presented a petition from conservancy cooly M. K. Siyadoris, which the Chairman said would be inquired into.
- 2. The following motion stood in the name of Mr. S. N. Dahanayake:—That this Council, while generally accepting the recommendations of the Donoughmore Commission regarding the reform of the Municipal Councils, do suggest to His Excellency the Governor (a) that the franchise for women should be extended to those over 21 years of age; (b) that the Galle Municipal area be extended up to and including the Boosa race course on the Colombo side, and to the 76th milepost on the Matara side, and also to include all houses and gardens abutting on any road marking the limits of the Municipal area; (c) that the Municipal area be divided into ten electoral divisions; (d) that the work of the Schools Committee of the Municipal area be included as part of the work of the Municipal Council; (e) that the Council be empowered to make reasonable grants to public libraries; (f) and that all paddy fields and vegetable gardens, educational institutions, places of worship, and premises occupied by priests who have taken the monastic vow of celibacy be exempted from taxes.

The Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos raised a point of order, as a Special Committee had been appointed to formulate a scheme for the reform of the constitution, and had not yet made a report.

The Chairman suggested that the motion should be deferred until the Council decide to await, or dispense with, the report of the Special Committee.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayake agreed to defer the motion.

- 3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. W. Subasinghe moved—(1) That the Superintendent of Works be requested to prepare a plan of the proposed road—about 20 feet in width—connecting Morris road and Hirimbura Cross road, and to submit same without delay—if possible, at the next meeting—with a report showing the blocks to be acquired and their extents and claimants. The Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded.
- Mr. F. W. Sproule suggested adding the words "with estimate of cost of acquisition, if any, and construction of a gravel road 20 feet in width" after the word "plan," and deleting the words "of the proposed road—about 20 feet in width."

The mover and seconder agreed to the suggestion.

The Chairman stated that when the question was considered by Council in 1925 it was agreed that the residents were to pay the costs of the survey, and the Superintendent was only to point out the trace and supervise the preparation of the plan. He did not think the Superintendent should be required to make the survey at this moment, as he would be engaged over the landing and transporting of pipes for the duplication of the water service.

The mover replied that the cost of the survey should be borne by the Council, and not by the residents. If the Superintendent had no time to do the work Council should employ a surveyor.

Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe suggested that the words "if possible at the next meeting" should be deleted.

The mover and the seconder agreed to the words being deleted.

The motion as amended was put to the meeting and carried.

- (2) That the Superintendent of Works be requested to submit a plan with an estimate for the construction of a small market with three stalls at the Sarenthukade Junction and the Gintota market place for the sale of fish. Mr. J. E.
- Mr. F. W. Sproule moved as an amendment that the question be referred to the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation. Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe seconded.

The amendment was put to the meeting and carried.

4. To consider a petition from the stall holders of the fruit market for extension of the duration of the lease of the stalls in the public markets:-

The Chairman moved—(1) That the market stalls be sold by auction for 1929, with the option of renewing the lease for another year at the same rent. The lessees of stalls in the fruit market and the shops to be given the option of renewing the lease for 1929 at the same rent. (2) That the lease of the trees at the Bataduwa depôt be given to the overseer, C. Wijewardene, for 1929 at Rs. 121. Mr. D. W. Subasinghe seconded.—Carried.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayake moved that the bathing wells at Talbot town be not sold for 1929. Mr. D. W. Subasinghe seconded.

- (ii.) That Assistant Wireman William Silva be given a bicycle allowance of Rs. 7 per mensem for night patrol.
- (2) Deposits for electricity dues.—Recommended that the Chairman be authorized to demand deposits against electricity dues, at his discretion.
- (3) Service mains.—Recommended that hereafter all service mains be provided by the Council; and that for this purpose a sum of Rs. 2,750 be voted for the purchase of the necessary materials.
- (4) Street lamps: with reference to item 1 (j) of the Minutes of the Special Committee of May 28, 1928, approving an estimate of Rs. 1,200 for the purchase of 1,000 by 40 Watt gas filled bulbs, recommended that the estimate be increased to Rs. 1,580 for the purchase of 1,500 bulbs of 40 Watt and 360 bulbs of 100 Watt.

- (5) Application from the Superintendent for the purchase of a turning lathe at a cost of Rs. 500, and providing a motor and shafting with pulleys at an additional cost of Rs. 425.—Recommended that consideration be deferred till next year.
- (6) Application from the Superintendent for an increase to his motor car allowance.—Recommended that the motor car allowance be increased to Rs. 100 per mensem.
- (7) Minimum monthly charge.—Recommended that a minimum charge of Rs. 5 and meter rent be made in the case of all installations, whether or not current is consumed during the month.
- (8) Considered plan showing proposed extensions.—Recommended the following amendments to the recommendations of May 28, 1928, item 1, of the Minutes:—(a) Kandewatta road, reduced from 5 lamps to 3; (b) Circular road, reduced from 8 lamps to 6; (c) Wackwella road, reduced from 3 lamps to 2; (d) Hall Cross road increased 2 lamps to 3; (e) Mahamodera road increased by 3 lamps.

#### Resolution.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Special Committee be adopted.

Resolved that in view of the recommendation of the Reform Commission this Committee desires to be informed whether the Council require them to proceed further with the formulation of a scheme of Constitutional Reform.

- Mr. F. W. Sproule moved that consideration of the matter be deferred till the next meeting.—Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe seconded.
- Mr. D. W. Subasinghe expressed the opinion that the views of the Council should be placed before the Legislative Council.
- Mr. S. H. Dahanayake moved that the Special Committee be informed that they are to proceed with the formulation of a scheme.

There being no seconder, the original motion was put to the meeting and carried by 6 to 2.

## NOTIFICATIONS UNDER "THE PATENTS ORDINANCE, 1906."

THE following Specifications have been accepted:—

No. 2,29 of January 30, 1928.

Jadav Prosad Chaliha.

Process of and apparatus for drying and withering of tea in course of manufacture.

Abstract.—A jacketed vacuum vessel is used for the preliminary and final removal of moisture: in this case the jacket is heated with water to between 160 and 200°F. In the fermentation stage the jacket is filled with cooling water, pans of water are placed in the chamber and a small degree of pressure reduction is used.

The claims are :-

- 1. In the manufacture of tea a process for drying or "firing" which consists in placing the leaf in a chamber at a temperature below 212° Fahr. and in reducing the pressure in said chamber, thereby causing the moisture in the leaf to evaporate more readily and quickly at a lower temperature than when subjected to drying or firing at ordinary atmospheric pressure, characterized by this that the temperature used in the chamber lies between the limits as far as possible of 260° on the upper side and approximately 160° on the lower side, the pressures or vacuum being adjusted to correspond thereto.
- 2. In the manufacture of tea a process of drying or of "firing" according to claim 1, which consists in placing the leaf in a chamber which is more or less completely hermetically sealed, heating said chamber within the limits specified and in reducing or lowering the air or vapour pressure within said chamber to cause the moisture in the leaf to evaporate or boil off at the temperature selected.
- 3. In the manufacture of tea a process of drying or firing according to claim 1 or 2, wherein the drying or firing chamber is water jacketed, wholly or in part, through which fluid is circulated at any desired temperature between the limits of 160° and 200° to keep the same as far as possible at a desired even temperature not exceeding the stated maximum.
- 4. In the manufacture of tea a process according to any of the preceding claims, wherein for the "firing" the temperature of the chamber is limited to one not exceeding 200° Fahr. and preferably is arranged to be about 160° Fahr.
- 5. In the manufacture of tea a process according to any of the preceding claims, wherein the drying chamber is jacketed more or less completely and water or any fluid is circulated therethrough, said water when such is used being taken from the steam engine and boiler units which may be available, or being the heated water used for cooling a gas or oil engine or the like, or said water or fluid in jacket being purposely heated.
- 6. A modification in the process according to any of the proceding claims, wherein when the freshly plucked leaf is in too moist a condition or the atmosphere is too cold and humid for the proper and sufficiently rapid withering of the leaf, the said leaf is partially dried to assist the withering by placing it in a chamber suitably heated within the limits stated and treating it as set forth.
- 7. A process for assisting the withering of the leaf in tea manufacture, which consists in partially drying the leaf by a process according to any of the preceding claims in order to remove excess moisture more rapidly than is possible in ordinary withering sheds and to facilitate and hasten the commencement, or picking up, of the chemical wither.
- 8. A modification of the process according to claim 1 for the purpose of assisting the fermentation of the leaf, wherein the leaf is placed in a chamber which is left open and which is suitably cooled if necessary, for example by circulating cooling fluid through it or through a jacket partially or wholly surrounding it, in which chamber water is placed in any suitable receptacle and through which chamber the air may be circulated or drawn to produce a cool atmosphere charged with moisture and hence one particularly advantageous to the carrying out of the fermentation.
- 9. Apparatus for assisting in the drying, firing, withering and in certain conditions for the fermentation of tea leaf in the course of manufacture, comprising a chamber with means for exhausting or reducing the pressure inside said chamber to below the pressure of saturated vapour which corresponds to the temperature inside the chamber.
- 10. Apparatus according to claim 9, having a jacket, or heating or cooling means, whereby the temperature inside the chamber may be raised or lowered to facilitate the desired operation.

- 11. Apparatus according to claim 9 or 10, comprising a chamber adapted to resist external pressure, means for introducing tea leaf into said chamber and hermetically closing the said chamber, and means such as a jacket surrounding the greater part of the chamber, wherein heating or cooling fluid may be circulated to control the temperature of the chamber.
- 12. Apparatus according to claim 9, 10, or 11, a jacket surrounding four of the six sides of the chamber, the opposite end walls being made removable or being in the form of tightly closing doors adapted to close and form hermetically sealed joints with the jacketed sides.
- 13. Apparatus according to any of the claims 9 to 12, the interior of the chamber being provided with ledges or supports for the reception of shelves or trays with the leaf to be treated thereon, arranged so as to enable the leaf to be conveniently introduced into and extracted from the chamber.
- 14. Apparatus according to any of the claims 10 to 13, the chamber having cross tubes or pipes having outer sufaces suitably arranged to radiate heat therein for the circulating fluid which controls the temperature inside the chamber.
- 15. Apparatus according to any of the claims 9 to 14, the chamber being connected by piping to an air pump or the like capable of reducing the pressure within the chamber.
- 16. Apparatus according to any of the claims 9 to 15, the chamber being provided with trays for the leaf to be treated, and spaces being provided around the edges of, or at the ends of, the trays for the circulation of the vapour or air, thus enabling the reduction of pressure to affect the contents of all the trays.
- 17. Apparatus according to any of the claims 9 to 16, the jacket being connected by piping to a water circulating system connected to the steam engine or boiler set available, or to the cooling water jacket of a gas or oil engine or the like.
- 18. An improved process for drying or firing tea leaf in the process of manufacture of tea, or of assisting in the withering of the leaf, or in the fermentation of the leaf in manufacture, arranged, adapted to be carried out or to function substantially as described.
- 19. Apparatus for assisting in the manufacture of tea by a process according to any of the claims 1 to 7, or according to any of the apparatus claims 8 to 17, constructed, arranged, or adapted to function substantially as described or substantially as described and illustrated.

Improvements in tea feeding and spreading machinery.

Abstract.—At the bottom of the hopper the tea passes into the vertical (adjustable) space between two moving belts or one belt and a vertical fixed face, the lower belt travels round an arc and then upwards at about 30° to the horizontal. The space between the two belts at the bottom is greater than at the start; suitable guides and rollers are provided.

The claims are :-

- 1. Apparatus for feeding tee leaf or the like, to a drying, withering, sifting, breaking, or other machine, or to an encless conveyor, or onto stationary changes or racks, comprising essentially a substantially rectangular hopper or feeding space open at the top and bottom and provided with two encless belts, or one encless belt and a stationary which comprise the back and front respectively of said feeding space for the purpose hereinbefore specified.

Fuel control means.

Abstract.—A device is fitted between the carburetor and the engine. When the engine is shut off the condensed fuel runs down and is trapped in a horizontal tube. This provides a rich mixture for priming the engine in restarting This tube is connected to a chamber having regulatable means for controlling the moist air which comes from the top of the radiator, the pipe which conveys it being supplied with a moisture trap. A valve in the mixing chamber lets in dry air when the suction becomes too great. Modifications describe means whereby the outflow of moist air can be controlled by the pressure in the exhaust or from the dashboard are described.

The claims are :--

- 1. Device for controlling the fuel mixture admitted to the intake manifold of an internal combustion engine, including a closed receptacle having an outlet passage adapted to be placed in communication with the intake of the engine intermediate of the carburetor and said intake, said receptacle being provided with an air admitting opening, through which air enters, when the piston perform its suction stroke.
- 2. Device, as set forth in claim 1, including regulable means for controlling the air admitting opening in said receptacle.

Device, as set forth in claim 1, in which the outlet passage of the receptacle is formed to receive the re-run of orndensed vapor or fuel from the intake manifold of the engine when the same is stopped, said re-run of condensed vapor or fuel being used as prime charge when the engine again is set in operation.
- 4. Modified embodiment of the device, as set forth in claims 1 and 2, in which the discharge end of the outlet passage is disposed above the bottom of the receptacle, and in which the air admitting openings is provided with air cleaning means.
- 5. Modified embodiment of the device, as set forth in claim 1, including adjustable means for controlling the outflow through said outlet passage.
- 6. Device, as set forth in claim 1, including a vapor admitting line for said receptacle arranged in communication with the overflow pipe of the radiator, so that moist air may enter said closed receptacle and be conveyed into the intake of the engine.
- 7. Device, as set forth in claims 1 and 6, wherein the vapor admitting line is provided with a trap having a gravity controlled gate for automatically discharging excess moisture from said trap.
- 8. Device, as set forth in claims 1 and 6, including means, operable when the suction in the receptacle increases beyond a predetermined degree, for admitting air into the receptacle sufficient to prevent such excess pressure becoming effective in the radiator of the engine.
- 9. Device, as set forth in claims 1 and 5, in which the adjustable means outlet controlling the outflow through said outlet passage is manually operated from a point remote of the engine.
- 10. Modified embodiment of the device, as set forth in claims 1 and 6, in which the adjustable means for controlling the outflow through said outlet passage is operable by the pressure in the exhaust manifold of the engine, whereby the outlet passage is automatically controlled.
- 11. Device, as set forth in claims 1 and 3, in which said receptacle is provided with a bored head adapted to be interposed between the carburetor and the intake manifold, and a screen arranged in the bore of the head, whereby the outlet passage of the receptacle terminates on the intake manifold side of said screen.
- 12. Device, as set forth in claims 1, 6, and 8, in which the closed receptacle is provided with a tube disposed therethrough, said tube having a partition intermediate of its end and ports are arranged on opposite sides of the partition and communicating with the receptacle interior, a discharge member forming said outlet passage leading from one end of said tube to the intake manifold and a pressure relief valve being disposed at the opposite end of said tube.
- 13. Device, as set forth in claims 5 and 9, in which said adjustable means is operated by a plunger slidably mounted in a hollow member having a threaded member for clamping said hollow member to a support, e.g., to the dash of a motor vehicle.
- 14. Device, as set forth in claims 6 and 7, in which said trap consists of a casing with openings in its top to receive the vapor admitting line and the overflow pipe of the radiator, said casing having a downwardly sleping bottom terminating at one side in an outlet opening, which is closed by said gate pivoted at its upper end to normally close the outlet.
- 15. Devices for controlling the fuel mixture admitted to the intake manifold of an internal combustion engine, substantially as shown and described and set forth.
