The Standing Orders of the Ceylon Medical Council dated August 7, 1929, and published in *Gazette* No. 7,727 of August 9, 1929, are amended as follows:—

1. *In Chapter 2—(a) Delete rule 1 and substitute therefor* “The Council shall meet for general business at least once every three months, but a meeting of the Council may be summoned at any time by direction of the President and shall be summoned on a written requisition signed by not less than five of the members and addressed to the President.”
- (b) *Delete rule 3 and substitute therefor* “Five members including the Chairman shall form a quorum.”
2. *In Chapter 3—Delete rule 10 and substitute therefor* “All such voting papers when completed shall be sent to the Office of the Returning Officer, Medical College, in the manner prescribed in Appendix A so as to be delivered to him not later than the date appointed for the election. All voting papers not so delivered shall be considered spoiled voting papers.”
3. *In Chapter 5—Add to rule 1* “A copy shall be sent to each member as early as possible after each meeting.”
4. *In Chapter 10—(a) Delete words* “The following shall be the conditions on which members may inspect the documents of the Council” *and substitute therefor* “The following shall be the conditions on which members may inspect and copy the documents of the Council.”
- (b) *Delete in rule 2 the words* “for inspection.”
5. *After Chapter 11—Insert the following Appendix A:—*

### APPENDIX A.

#### *Nomination and Voting Papers.*

1. There shall be no special form for the nomination paper.
2. The voting (when necessary) may be done by post. For this purpose voting cards will be supplied, with the names of the candidates printed or typed thereon, and opposite each name, a cage for the voting mark and two envelopes marked A and B. The card when filled up shall be placed in the envelope marked A, and closed; and on the envelope the voter shall, in the presence of a witness, write his name and address, and the witness shall attest the same. Envelope A shall then be placed in the envelope marked B and sealed, and the envelope B shall be posted to the Returning Officer.
6. *In Appendix B—(a) Delete in rule 1* “2 P.M.” *and substitute therefor* “2.30 P.M.”
- (b) *Delete rule 3 and substitute therefor* “In the absence of the President and Vice-President some other member to be chosen from the members present shall act as Chairman. Five members including the Chairman constitute a quorum.”

12. Members having resolutions and questions to be laid before an ordinary meeting should send them to the Secretary five days before the date of such meeting, but any resolutions of a sudden and important nature intended for a special meeting shall be sent in three days before the time when the decision of such resolutions or questions is expected. Questions or

resolutions so received shall be entered in the agenda if passed by the Chairman as deserving of recognition by the Committee; if rejected it shall be the duty of the Secretary to return them to the senders with reasons for doing so. But however if a returned resolution intended for a special meeting be resent signed by four members the Chairman shall convene a special meeting with regard to it.

Bringing forward of Motions.

13. Any resolutions in the agenda in its turn shall be read and concisely explained by the mover standing, or in his absence by the Secretary, according to the time at his disposal.

Amendments.

14. When a resolution has been made and seconded any member who wishes to bring an amendment on it shall do with the permission of the Chairman in the same manner as when he makes a resolution. Such amendment if passed shall be noted by the Secretary. But a second amendment cannot be made while the first one is still before the Committee.

Seconding and Supporting.

15. Any member seconding or supporting a resolution or an amendment shall do so standing, bowing to the Chair, or by word or concisely stating his views if any.

Opposition.

16. Any member wishing to oppose a resolution or an amendment shall do so only after it has been seconded and with the permission of the Chairman, in becoming Language and to the point without going into hints and personalities calculated to hurt the feelings of others. But no remarks touching an original resolution can be offered while an amendment on it is before the Committee.

Seconding Opposition Views.

17. Any opposition views so brought forward may be seconded, if so disposed, by any member to whom they may appear to be sound and reasonable in the same manner as in the case of a resolution.

Debates.

18. No member shall raise anything touching a resolution, amendment, or any opposition view that has not been seconded. In debate, only the mover of a resolution or amendment has the right of reply.

Votes.

19. On finding that the Committee have thoroughly grasped the question before them, the Chairman shall call for their votes first with regard to the amendment, secondly to the opposition view, and lastly to the original resolution.

Decision.

20. When together with the Chairman's ordinary vote the votes are equal, then only can the Chairman give his casting vote in order to arrive at a decision.

Difference of Opinion.

21. Any member of the side that loses by such decision shall have the right to request the Secretary within one week of such decision to have his opinion with reasons noted in the minutes of that meeting and the Secretary shall comply with such request.

Removal and withdrawal of Resolutions.

22. Resolutions, amendments, or opposition views when not seconded are automatically removed. But those that are seconded can only be withdrawn with the approval of the Committee.

Revival, of passed or dropped resolutions, &c.

23. No member shall bring forward anything either in support or against a passed or dropped resolution, amendment, or opposition view until a period of three months have elapsed from the date of such resolution, &c.

Replies to Questions.

24. Written replies of the Chairman to questions entered in the Agenda shall be read at the meeting. In case the questioner is not satisfied with such reply he may further explain the question concisely or in connection put a further question. On the Chairman's reply to the further explanation or question the matter must cease.

Petitions.

25. At meetings any member can with the Chairman's permission submit petitions, but before doing so he shall concisely state the purport of each and hold himself responsible for its language which shall be respectful. No petition shall be read without first obtaining the consent of the Committee.

Books, Papers, &c.

26. All books, papers, and lists of the Committee shall be correctly and tidily kept and the Secretary shall be responsible for this.

Order of Precedence.

27. The order of precedence shall be thus—the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and the members according to the order of their appointment or original list.

Signatures.

28. All communications signed by the Chairman or on his orders by the Secretary shall be treated as those of the Committee.

Infringing of rules.

29. It shall be the duty of every member to observe these rules so far as this matter is concerned and as well as the general etiquette observed at meetings. Any member infringing any of them shall be checked by the Chairman, Secretary, or any member. The finding of the Chairman shall be final on any question regarding a point of order. The Chairman shall have the power to stop any member who for the third time refuses to accept his finding, and if he persists in speaking he shall, by a resolution passed to that effect, be suspended for one month for the first offence, for two months for the second offence, and for three months for the third offence.

*For regulating Fisheries and Imposition of Fees, Sub-section (8).*

1. From and after January 1, 1930, a fee of 2 per cent. on the sale proceeds of fish shall be levied by the Village Committee from all fishers who bring their fish for sale to Gandara and Noonewella bays.

2. No fish shall be sold at Gandara and Noonewella bays except by auction at the auction shed erected by the Village Committee on the land Reguwewatta at Gandara.

3. The renter who sells such fish by such public auction may recover a fee of 2 per cent. of the proceeds of such sale.

4. Any one infringing any of these rules shall be liable to such fine as the Village Tribunal may impose.

*For Prevention and Abatement of Nuisance, Sub-section (15).*

1. No person shall befoul the seashore at Gandara or at Noonewella.

## By-laws.

## CHAPTER II.

## CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.

*By-laws, as amended by Council on June 12, 1929.*

1. Notice of an adjourned meeting shall be served on members at least twenty-four hours before the time fixed for such meeting. Adjournment of Meetings.
2. Strangers, including the Press, may be present at Council meetings in the places set apart for them, but must withdraw when called upon to do so by the Chairman, when, in the opinion of the majority of the Councillors present at the meeting, expressed by resolution, such exclusion is deemed advisable. Presence of Strangers.
3. For all purposes connected with the Council, the precedence and seniority of Councillors shall be regulated as follows :—  
After the Chairman shall rank the Councillors in order of the priority of their nomination or election, and in the case of former Councillors re-nominated or re-elected, of the priority of their continuous membership of Council (such continuous membership being deemed to be unimpaired during the absence of a nominated member for whom a temporary successor has been nominated). Order of Precedence.
4. The business of the Council shall be transacted in the following order *unless the Council otherwise resolves by a resolution under by-law 10 (i)* :—  
  - (1) Confirmation of the minutes of the last preceding *General* meeting.
  - (2) Memorials, petitions, complaints, and communications addressed to the Council.
  - (3) Questions.
  - (4) Motions.
  - (5) Any other matter set down in the notice.
  - (6) Monthly statements of receipts and disbursements, progress reports of works, and such other documents as are required by the Council shall be *laid on the table at the meeting*.Order of Business.
5. Copies of the minutes of each meeting shall be sent to Councillors after they have been signed by the Chairman and printed. At the next or some subsequent meeting the question shall be put that the minutes be taken as read and confirmed. Minutes.
6. (a) A Councillor presenting a memorial, petition, complaint, or other communication to the Council shall give three clear days' notice to the Secretary of such presentation. Memorials, Petitions, &c.  
 (b) He will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful and may state concisely its purport. He may move that it be referred to the Chairman or to any Committee for disposal or for report to the Council.  
 (c) It shall be competent for any Councillor to move that it be read. In making such motion he shall state concisely his reasons for wishing to have it read.  
 (d) No debate shall be permitted on such motion nor shall any other Councillor speak upon or in relation to such document except to second the motion formally.  
 (e) Such motion being seconded, the question shall be put whether the petition or memorial shall be read.
7. In any cases wherein individual rights or interests may be affected by any act, order, or proceeding of Council, all parties so affected may be heard upon petition before the Council when in Committee, either in person or by Counsel. Hearing Petitioners.
8. When it is intended to examine any witnesses, the petitioner or Councillor requiring such witnesses shall deliver to the Secretary, three days at least before the day appointed for their examination, a list containing the names, residences, and occupations of such witnesses and the Secretary shall notify such witnesses in writing to be present for such examination. List of Witnesses.
9. (a) Only questions relating to Municipal affairs may be put to the Chairman. Questions.  
 (b) At least four clear days' notice—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—shall be given to the Secretary of such questions.  
 (c) A written reply shall be read by the Chairman to each question.  
 (d) No Councillor shall address the Council upon any question nor shall the terms of any question contain any agreement or expression of opinion or statement of fact, except in so far as may be necessary to explain such question.  
 (e) Any Councillor may put a supplementary question for the purpose of further elucidating any matter of fact regarding which an answer has been given: Provided that the Chairman shall disallow any supplementary question, if, in his opinion, it infringes the rules as to questions, and in that case the question shall not appear on the record of the minutes of the Council.
10. (a) Every notice of motion shall be in writing, signed by the Councillor giving the notice. Unless such notice shall be in the hands of the Secretary three clear days—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—before the meeting of Council, the motion shall not be included in the agenda. Motions.  
 (b) All notices of motion shall be dated and numbered as received, and shall be entered by the Secretary upon the agenda paper in the order in which they are received.  
 (c) Before any notice of motion is placed on the agenda paper, it shall be submitted to the Chairman who, if he be of opinion that it is out of order, shall cause the giver of the notice to be so informed.

(d) Every notice of motion shall be relevant to some question affecting the Municipal administration of Colombo.

(e) No motion to rescind any resolution which has been passed within the preceding six months nor any motion to the same effect as any motion which has been negatived within the preceding six months shall be in order, unless notice thereof shall have been given and specified in the agenda, and the notice shall bear, in addition to the signature of Councillor who proposes the motion, the signatures of five other Councillors and when such motion has been disposed of, it shall not be competent for any Councillor to propose a similar motion within a further period of six months.

(f) No motion shall be deemed to have been submitted for debate until it shall have been proposed and seconded.

(g) Any Councillor may second a motion or amendment by rising in his place and bowing to the Chair, without prejudice to his right to speak at a later period of the debate.

(h) When a motion has been made and seconded, and the debate thereon concluded, the question thereupon shall be put to the vote by the Chairman.

(i) Immediately after the motions of which due notice has been given have been disposed of a Councillor may propose a motion asking the permission of Council to bring forward a motion of which due notice has not been given and in such case he will hand to the Secretary a copy of such motion.

Withdrawal of Motion or Amendment.

11. A Councillor who has made a motion or amendment may withdraw the same by leave of the Council, which shall be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any Councillor to speak upon it after the mover has asked for permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

Reintroduction of Motion.

12. A motion which has been withdrawn may be made again at any subsequent meeting; but no motion shall be proposed which is the same in substance as any motion which, within the period of six months referred to in rule 10 (e), shall have been resolved in the affirmative or negative.

Amendments.

13. (a) Every amendment shall be in writing and handed to the Secretary by the Councillor proposing it.

(b) Every amendment shall be relevant to the motion on which it is moved.

(c) Every amendment shall be read before being moved.

(d) No amendment shall be discussed or put to the Council until it shall have been seconded.

(e) A Councillor, who has seconded an amendment in a formal manner, shall be permitted afterwards to speak upon it.

(f) Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion, as amended, shall take the place of the original motion, and shall become the question upon which any further amendment may be moved.

Debate ceases when Question fully put.

14. No member may speak to any question after the same has been fully put by the Chairman. A question is fully put when the voting has been taken thereon.

Voting and Recording of Votes.

15. (a) The question shall be put by the Chairman and the votes may be taken by a show of hands, and the result shall be declared by the Chairman; but any Councillor may call for a division, when the votes shall be taken by the Secretary, asking each Councillor separately, according to the order of precedence, how he desires to vote, and recording the votes accordingly.

(b) On any question being put, either in Council or in Committee of the whole Council, every Councillor present shall, unless he declines to vote, record his vote either for the ayes or noes.

(c) In the event of a Councillor declining to vote, the Secretary, in case a division has been called for, shall enter his name upon the minutes as having declined to vote.

(d) The Chairman shall have an original vote in common with the other Councillors, as also a casting vote if upon any question the votes are equal.

Casting vote of Chairman.

(e) When the Council is in Committee of the whole Council, the Chairman shall have an original vote in common with the other Councillors and also a casting vote if upon any question the votes shall be equal.

Members Dissenting.

16. It shall be competent for any Councillor who is in a minority to have his dissent recorded by the Secretary and subsequently to submit in writing the reasons of his dissent from the opinion of the majority and such written dissent, if sent to the Secretary within one week of the Council Meeting in question, shall be entered by the Secretary at the end of his minutes of the proceedings.

Preservation of Order.

17. (a) It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order and his decision on all disputed points of order shall be final.

(b) Any Councillor deviating from the rules may be immediately called to order by the Chairman, or by any other Councillor rising to a point of order.

Decision of Questions of Order.

18. When the question of order has been stated, the Councillor who raises it shall resume his seat, and no other Councillor, except by leave of the Chairman, shall rise till the Chairman has decided the question, after which, the Councillor who was addressing the Council or Committee of the Council at the time the question was raised shall be entitled to proceed with his speech, if he conforms to the Chairman's ruling. If he does not so conform, the Chairman may refuse to allow him to proceed with his speech.

Councillor not Explaining or Retracting.

19. Any Councillor having used objectionable words and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering apologies for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the Council, may be censured or otherwise dealt with as the Council thinks fit.

Chairman Speaking.

20. When the Chairman is addressing the Council or Committee of the Council, any Councillor then standing shall immediately resume his seat.

Naming of Councillors.

21. (a) The Chairman may name any Councillor immediately after the commission of the offence of disregarding the authority of the Chair, or of abusing the rules of the Council by persistently and wilfully obstructing the business of the Council, and the Chairman may forthwith put the question, on a motion being made by any Councillor or from the Chair (no amendment, adjournment, or debate being allowed) "that such Councillor be suspended from the service of the Council."

(b) If any such motion be carried and any Councillor be suspended under this rule, his suspension, on the first occasion, shall continue for one month, on the second occasion for two months, and on the third or subsequent occasion for three months.

(c) Not more than one Councillor shall be named at the same time, unless several Councillors present together have jointly disregarded the authority of the Chair.

(d) If any *Councillor* or *Councillors* acting jointly, who have been suspended under this rule from the service of the Council, shall refuse, at any time during the period of suspension, to obey the direction of the Chairman to withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber, the Chairman may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce his decision.

22. The Chairman, after having called the attention of the Council or Council in Committee, to the conduct of a *Councillor* who persists in irrelevance or tedious repetition, either of his own arguments or of the arguments used by other *Councillors* in debate, may direct the *Councillor* to discontinue his speech.

Irrelevance or tedious Repetition.

23. (1) The Chairman may order *Councillors* whose conduct is grossly disorderly to withdraw immediately from the Council Chamber during the remainder of the meeting, and may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce his order.

Disorderly Conduct.

(2) If on any occasion the Chairman deems that his powers under this rule are inadequate, he may name such *Councillor* or *Councillors* in pursuance of rule 21.

24. *Councillors* who are suspended under rule 21 or are directed to withdraw under rule 23 shall forthwith withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber.

Duty to obey order of Suspension or withdrawal.

25. *Closure* or an adjournment of the discussion of any question may be moved by a *Councillor* at any time, and, if seconded, shall be forthwith put the vote.

Power to Adjourn.

26. In the case of grave disorder arising in the Council or Committee of the Council, the Chairman may, if he thinks it necessary to do so, adjourn the Council or Committee of the Council without question put, or suspend the meetings for a time to be named by him.

27. In speaking to any *matter* under consideration of the Council or a Committee of the whole Council, the following rules shall be strictly observed :—

Rules for Councillors Speaking.

- (1) The business shall be conducted in the English language.
- (2) Every *Councillor* shall address his observations to the Chairman, and shall speak standing.
- (3) He shall not be interrupted, unless out of order.
- (4) When he has finished his observations he shall resume his seat, and any other *Councillor* wishing to address the Council or Committee of the Council may rise.
- (5) A *Councillor* shall not read his speech, but he may read extracts from written or printed papers in support of his argument.
- (6) If two *Councillors* rise at the same time, the Chairman shall call on the *Councillor* who first catches his eye.
- (7) Every *Councillor* must confine his observations to the subject under consideration.
- (8) No *Councillor* shall impute improper motives to any other *Councillor*.
- (9) All personalities shall be avoided.
- (10) A *Councillor* may speak to the question before the Council or any amendment proposed thereto.
- (11) No *Councillor* shall speak more than once on any proposition before the Council, except in explanation or to order, or when the Council is in Committee, or as is provided by rule 27 (13).
- (12) By the indulgence of the Council a *Councillor* may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the Council, but such matters may not be debated, and he must confine himself strictly to the vindication of his own conduct.
- (13) The mover of any motion may reply after the all other *Councillors* present have had an opportunity of addressing the Council and before the question is put, but he shall strictly confine himself to answering previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment, which having been carried has become the substantive motion.

28. The Council may at any time resolve themselves into a Committee of the whole Council, and, on their resuming, the result of their deliberations shall be dealt with by the Council.

Committee of Council.

29. When the Council is in Committee, the rules 27 (11) and (13) shall be held to be suspended.

30. It shall be competent for any *Councillor* at any stage of any discussion in Committee to move that the Council should resume and on such motion being seconded the question shall be put to the vote by the Chairman, and if the motion is carried, the Council will immediately resume from Committee.

31. (1) In every Special Committee, the quorum thereof shall be three, unless otherwise specially fixed by resolution of Council.

Special Committees.

(2) In the absence of the Chairman at a meeting of any Special Committee, the *Councillors* present shall choose one of them to preside, who shall for that meeting have all the powers of the Chairman.

(3) When a Special Committee shall have agreed by a majority to a report, the same shall be signed by that majority and shall be submitted to the Council with the dissent or dissents of any *Councillors* in the minority.

(4) In the event of any division taking place in a Special Committee, a record thereof shall be entered in the minutes, together with the motion or resolution proposed, the name of the proposer, and the respective votes of the *Councillors* present.

32. The Press shall be excluded from all meetings of Special and Standing Committees.

33. The by-laws dated August 20, 1925, published in *Gazette* No. 7,481 of August 28, 1925, are revoked.

## "THE DEFENCE FORCE ORDINANCE, 1910."

THE following rules for the Ceylon Planters' Rifle Corps, made in terms of section 20 (1) of "The Defence Force Ordinance, 1910," as amended by Ordinance No. 18 of 1922, having been approved by His Excellency the Governor, are published for general information.

## RULES.

1. (Standing Order No. 5.)  
Enrolment.

(a) Enrolment forms and medical certificates, duly perfected, together with the recommendation of a serving member of the Corps, will be sent to the Adjutant, at Headquarters.

The name of the recruit will be shown in Block Capitals and the date of birth will be entered.

(b) Intending recruits will promise to make themselves efficient in the Corps for a period of three years.

(c) All enrolments are subject to the approval of the Commanding Officer.

2. (Standing Order No. 7.)  
Uniform.

(a) The wearing of uniform, except on parade or military duty, or when specially ordered, is prohibited.

(b) Officers, W. Os., and N. C. Os. must clearly understand that when in uniform they are always on duty and must not allow any irregularity to pass unchecked.

Regulation uniform must not be worn at Fancy Dress Balls, but there is no objection to Military Uniform of obsolete pattern being worn on such occasions.

(b) All letters to Headquarters dealing with arms, equipment, and clothing will be indicated by a letter "Q" being clearly marked on the envelope.

(c) Failure to reply to letters, circulars, and reminders is as much a breach of discipline as refusing to comply with an order.

3. (Standing Order No. 8.)  
Fancy Dress.

4. (Standing Order No. 9.)  
Correspondence.

5. (Standing Order No. 11.)  
Change of Address

All Officers, W. Os., N. C. Os., and Riflemen changing their address will immediately report the change; Officers to Headquarters direct, other ranks through their Detachment or Section Commander.

6. (Standing Order No. 12.)  
Leave.

(a) Applications for leave must be made direct to the Adjutant, who will arrange for an empty rifle case to be sent to the applicant for the return of the arms and equipment on charge. Until these are received correct and charges for deficiencies, &c., if any, are met, the certificate required by the Officer i/c Passports will not be issued. It is therefore most important that application for leave should be made early.

(b) All ranks are warned that their return to the Island from leave *must be reported to the Adjutant within seven days of disembarkation.*

7. (Standing Order No. 13.)  
Complaints.

All complaints or suggestions must be made through Detachment or Section Commanders to Company Commanders and through no other channel.

8. (Standing Order No. 16.)  
Meetings.

Meetings of W. Os., N. C. Os., and Riflemen will not be convened, for any purpose, without the authority of the Commanding Officer.

9. (Standing Order No. 17.)  
Commanding Officer.

The acts of the Commanding Officer must not be openly commented on, nor are particular courses of action to be recommended for his adoption either by memorials or meetings, unless such meetings are assembled by his order.

10. (Standing Order No. 20.)  
Non-efficiency.

All members who do not complete their efficiency obligations will pay into the Corps Funds a sum equivalent to the sum they failed to earn, but if in the opinion of the Commanding Officer a member failed to become efficient through no fault of his own, this payment may be dispensed with.

11. (Standing Order No. 21.)  
Duties:  
Officers.

(a) An Officer is at all times responsible that good order and discipline are maintained. It is his duty to notice, repress, and instantly report any negligence or improper conduct on the part of W. Os., N. C. Os., or men, whether on or off duty. This duty applies whether the offender does or does not belong to his own particular Unit. He will always afford the utmost aid and support to his Commanding Officer.

W. Os. and  
N. C. Os.

(b) W. Os. and N. C. Os. will support their superiors in every respect and will adopt towards subordinates such methods of command and treatment as will not only ensure respect for authority but will also foster the feelings of self respect and personal honour essential to military efficiency.

Intemperate language will be avoided.

Detachment and  
Section  
Commanders.

(c) Detachment and Section Commanders are responsible for ensuring that all ranks of their command become efficient.

They will keep the roll books and A. M. C. registers. These must be forwarded to Headquarters once per month. They will fix the date, time, and place for parades in their district and notify the Adjutant, in addition to all members of their command.

If the services of an Instructor are required, at least one week's notice must be given to the Adjutant.

The permanent departure from the district of any member of their command must be reported to Headquarters and the member's new address given.

Any loss of arms and equipment on the part of a member of the command will at once be reported by wire to the Adjutant and the local police.

The Adjutant must be notified by the 25th of the month of the estimated expenditure on mileage and batta for the succeeding month.

Mileage and Batta Rolls must be forwarded to the Adjutant immediately after the parade. The senior member present on parade will certify that the claims for mileage are correct.

12. (Standing Order No. 22.)  
Mobilization  
Ammunition.

This ammunition is not to be used for any purpose other than that for which it is issued. It must be produced on mobilization or when specially called for. It must be kept under lock and key except when taken out for its legitimate use or cleaning.

When the National Anthem is played in the hearing of members of the Corps, the procedure will be as follows:—

*With head dress and without arms*, Officers, W. Os., and N. C. Os. will salute with the right hand. Other ranks will stand to "attention."  
*With arms*, all ranks will stand to "attention."

#### ARMS AND EQUIPMENT.

All arms and equipment will be issued direct from Headquarters to individuals. All ranks will be held responsible for arms and equipment issued to them, from the time of issue till the time of receipt again at Headquarters.

(a) The belt will be adjusted so that the tabs are in the centre of the waist (back) and the fastening buckle central in front.

It will be fastened by passing the end through the broken part of the "D" from underneath, through the centre and then pulled back underneath to the left.

(b) The frog will be underneath the rearmost pouch of the LEFT cartridge carrier.

(c) The cartridge carriers will be pulled round the back as far as possible.

Note.—These are marked "L" and "R" on the inside.

(d) The braces will be fitted so that the rear ends are level with the tabs on the belt, crossed in the centre of the back with the one that passes over the left shoulder uppermost.

The top bar of the "D's" will be on the horizontal seam of the shirt, below the collar.

(e) The sling will be fastened on the lower sling swivel as close up as possible. Large brass portion inwards.

#### DRESS.

All ranks are requested to obtain articles of clothing through Headquarters instead of purchasing them through local firms. This will ensure uniformity and also enable members to get the benefit of contract rates.

(a) All ranks are entitled to the issue of one article of uniform free, after two years' efficient service, and subject to the scale of life of articles mentioned below.

All ranks attending the Annual Camp for a period of three days or more may claim one extra free issue as soon as they are efficient, after two years' service.

(b) The following scale governs all free issues. Replacement values are also shown:—

(a) Medals will be worn suspended from a brooch, ribbons to show one inch in length from the uppermost clasp or top of medal; with two or more medals the bottom of the medals will be level.

(With Mons Star, 1914-15 Star and Victory medals, the ribbon will be one inch from the top of the brooch to where the ribbon commences to taper.)

(b) On a jacket with a closed collar the medals will be worn midway between the first and second buttons and the edge one and a half inches from the seam of the front of the jacket.

(c) On a jacket with a roll collar the bar of the medals or ribbons will be worn half an inch above the left breast pocket with the first medal one and a half inches from the seam of the front of the jacket.

(d) Miniature medals will be worn suspended from a brooch, on the left lapel, one inch below the point of the shoulder and three quarters of an inch above the Regimental badge.

The medals will not extend beyond the lapel.

(e) Medal ribbons will be worn on a bar in the same position as medals. The ribbons will be half an inch in length.

(f) Not more than five ribbons will be worn in one row. Six ribbons will be worn in two rows; four and two; half an inch between rows.

(g) Clasps will be worn on the ribbons of the medals for which they are allowed and in the order in which they were earned.

Small size Regimental buttons will be worn down the front of the jacket, on the pockets and the shoulder straps.

*Overalls.*—As for Mess Dress.

*Wellingtons.*—As for Mess Dress.

*Helmet.*—Wolseley pattern white with black chin chain and spike and a large Regimental badge in the centre of the puggaree.

*Sword Sling.*—Black patent leather, worn under the jacket.

*Sword Knot.*—Black patent leather.

*Cross Belt.*—Black patent leather with pouch. Silver whistle. Silver badge on the pouch.

The purchase of this jacket is optional.

*Jacket.*—Green cloth with a 2-inch closed collar. Five buttons down the front. Two breast pockets with pointed flaps to button and two side pockets with pointed flaps not to button. Shoulder straps of the same material with pointed ends. Badges of rank and collar badges in black.

*Overalls.*—As for Mess Dress.

*Cross Belt.*—As for Leveé Dress.

*Bit.*—Portsmouth reversible.

*Head Collar.*—Regulation pattern.

*Head Rope.*—Rifle green.

*Saddle.*—Colonial pattern with wallets.

*Girth.*—Rifle green webbing.

*Numnah.*—Regulation pattern.

*Reins.*—Regulation pattern.

Brown band and rosettes of rifle green.

Shoe case and sword frog.

As for Drill Order with the following additions:—

Great coat rolled and carried behind the saddle.

Feed bag carried on the off side.

Picketing gear strapped to sword scabbard.

*Helmet.*—Wolseley pattern, khaki with black patent leather chin strap. Two flashes of Regimental ribbon. One on either side of the helmet midway between the side seams, with 1½ inches showing from the bottom of the puggaree. Yellow stripe perpendicular. Buckle of the chin strap to be on the left side.

*Breeches.*—(Mounted Officers only.) Spinners Wakefield cord, light shade, strapping of the same material, laced at the side.

*Shorts.*—Khaki drill Spinners shade No. 1 of Regimental pattern.

*Boots.*—Ankle brown with toecaps.

*Leggings.*—(Mounted Officers only.) New regulation Army pattern, crossed laced in front.

*Putties.*—Fox's spiral, khaki drill shade.

*Hosetops.*—Rifle green folded over the top of the puttie. To show 4 inches.

*Belt.*—Sam Browne, leather with brass fittings. One brace over right shoulder. Sword frog.

*Whistle.*—Carried in the left breast pocket on a rifle green lanyard over the shoulder.

*Spurs.*—(Mounted Officers only.) Steel hunting with brown leather straps and lace guards and silver chains.

*Sword.*—Regulation pattern as for Rifle Regiments with brown leather scabbard and sword knot.

#### TRAINING.

Presuming that a Platoon is standing easy :—

"Stand to your front." On this word of command the Platoon will stand properly at ease.

"Platoon." On this word of command the Platoon will stand to attention.

The same procedure applies to any formation. The name of the Unit of formation being used as the word of command to bring the Unit to the position of "Attention."

Swords are never fixed for inspection unless specially required by the Inspecting Officer.

(a) A *Company* or *Corps* parade will count as two drills.

(b) A *Section* or *Detachment* parade will count as one drill. Two such drills may be counted on one day provided that each of them is of not less than one hour's duration.

(c) Attendance at the *Annual* or *Company Camps* will count as three drills each day.

(d) Attendance on the range for the purpose of firing the *Annual Course of Musketry* will count as two drills.

(e) Attendance at the *King's Birthday* parade will count as two drills.

(f) Attendance at a *Despatch Riding* Scheme will count as two drills.

"Small Arms Training" will be strictly adhered to. Drill Order will be worn for firing.

On every range local orders defining the positions of lookout men and other necessary points will be kept and produced before firing commences.

#### DUTIES IN CAMP AND BARRACKS.

On the alarm being sounded all ranks will immediately proceed in Drill Order, with mobilization ammunition, to their parade ground. Helmets will be worn on all alarm parades. The Senior Officer, W. O., or N. C. O. present will assume command.

On the fire alarm being sounded all ranks will immediately proceed to their parade ground in whatever kit they may be wearing at the time. Helmets will be worn. The Senior Officer, W. O. or N. C. O. present will detail an armed party and take any other steps which he may consider to be necessary.

The Orderly Officer will be detailed in Orders. His duties will commence at Reveille and will continue till Reveille on the following day.

He will perform the following duties during his tour :—

- (1) Be present at all parades.
- (2) Visit the hospital.
- (3) Visit the men's mess at meal times in company with the Orderly Sergeant and investigate any complaints.
- (4) Inspect the cook houses.
- (5) Inspect the barrack rooms and the canteen.
- (6) Remain in camp or barracks except when on parade.
- (7) Render a report to the Adjutant before 9 A.M. on the day on which his duty is completed

His duties will commence at Reveille and continue till Reveille on the following day.

He will perform the following duties during his tour :—

- (1) See that all men are out of bed immediately after Reveille.
- (2) Report to and accompany the Orderly Officer to the men's mess at all meal times.
- (3) See that all lights are out in the dining hut and sleeping quarters 15 minutes after "Last Post" has been sounded.
- (4) See that the Sergeants Mess is closed at 11 P.M.
- (5) Remain in Camp or barracks except when on parade.

His duties will commence at Reveille and continue till Reveille on the following day.

He will perform the following duties during his tour :—

- (1) Report to the Orderly Sergeant within 15 minutes of "Reveille" being sounded.
- (2) Obtain "Sick Reports" from the Orderly Room and have the necessary entries made before parading the "Sick."
- (3) Parade the sick at the time and place ordered, march them to the medical inspection room and bring back the sick reports with the Medical Officer's signature.
- (4) Carry out any other duties ordered by competent authority.

The Canteen Sergeant will be detailed daily. He will report to the R. S. M., 15 minutes before the canteen opens, to obtain the order board.

He will—

- (1) Be present when the canteen is opened and for half an hour before it is closed.
- (2) Be responsible that the canteen is opened and closed at the proper times.
- (3) See that the canteen, when opened, is conducted strictly in accordance with orders.
- (4) See that the Canteen Corporal understands all orders so that he is competent to carry on in the absence of the Canteen Sergeant.

The Canteen Corporal will be detailed daily. He will report to the Canteen Sergeant, 5 minutes before the canteen opens, to receive his orders:

He will carry out all orders given to him by the Canteen Sergeant.

“THE DEFENCE FORCE ORDINANCE, 1910.”

THE following Rules for the Ceylon Mounted Rifles, made in terms of section 20 (1) of “The Defence Force Ordinance, 1910,” as amended by Ordinance No. 18 of 1922, having been approved by His Excellency the Governor, are published for general information.

RULES.

1. (Standing Order No. 13.)  
Non-efficients.

All members who do not qualify as efficients will pay into the Finance Fund the sum which they have failed to earn for the Regiment had they been efficient, but if, in the opinion of the Commanding Officer, a member fails to become efficient through no fault of his own, this payment may be dispensed with.

2. (Standing Order No. 14.)  
Care of Arms, Equipment, Mobilization, Ammunition &c.

It is the duty of all Ranks to keep their rifle, equipment, and uniform clean and in a serviceable condition. The 40 rounds of mobilization ammunition, issued to each member, and the bolt of the rifle must always be kept under lock and key. Mobilization ammunition must not be used for any other purpose and must be produced on mobilization or when specially called for. Loss of arms, ammunition, or equipment must be reported to Headquarters immediately as also to the local police and Troop Commander.

3. (Standing Order No. 20.)  
Change of address.

Change of address must be reported to Headquarters and also to Troop Commanders.

4. (Standing Order No. 21.)  
Irregularities.

Officers, W. Os., and N. C. Os. must clearly understand that, when in uniform, they are always on duty and must not allow any irregularity to pass unnoticed.

5. (Standing Order No. 22.)  
Commanding Officer.

The acts of the Commanding Officer must not be openly commented on, nor are particular courses of action to be recommended for his adoption either by memorials or meetings unless such meetings are assembled by his order.

6. (Standing Order No. 24.)  
Meetings.

Meetings of W. Os., N. C. Os., and Men are not to be convened for any purpose without the express authority of the Commanding Officer.

7. (Standing Order No. 26.)  
Correspondence.

(a) Failure to reply to letters, circulars, and reminders is just as much a breach of discipline as refusing to comply with an order.

(b) The correct channel for all correspondence regarding promotion, appointments, recruits, and resignations is through Troop and Squadron Commanders to the Adjutant. Correspondence on other subjects should be addressed direct to the Adjutant.

8. (Standing Order No. 28.)  
Fancy Dress Balls.

Regulation uniform must not be worn at Fancy Dress Balls, but there is no objection to Military uniform of obsolete pattern being worn on such occasions.

9. (Standing Order No. 29.)  
Leave.

Applications for leave must be made direct to the Adjutant, who will forward an empty rifle case for the return of Arms and Equipment on charge; until these are received correct and all charges for deficiencies and cleaning the rifle (if any) paid, it is not possible to issue the Passport Certificate, which is required by the Officer-in-Charge of Passports. It is therefore most important that applications for leave should be submitted early.

10. (Standing Order No. 30.)  
Review Order Uniform, Coat of.

The cost of this uniform will be borne in equal parts by the member concerned and the Regimental Sports and Entertainment Fund. On a member resigning or transferring to the Reserve he will return the breeches, boots, and spurs to Headquarters.

11. (Standing Order No. 33.)  
Duties of Officers.

An officer is at all times responsible for ensuring that good order and the rules and discipline of the service are maintained. It is his duty to notice, repress, and instantly report any neglect or impropriety of conduct on the part of Warrant Officers, N. C. Os., and private soldiers whether on or off duty and whether the offender does or does not belong to his particular unit.

He will always afford the utmost aid and support to his Commanding Officer.

12. (Standing Order No. 34.)  
Duties of W. Os. and N. C. Os.

Warrant Officers and N. C. Os. will support their superior in every respect and will adopt towards subordinates such methods, or command and treatment, as will not only ensure respect for authority, but will also foster the feelings of self-respect and personal honour essential to military efficiency. They will avoid intemperate language or an offensive manner.

(a) It is the duty of all subordinates to obey without hesitation all lawful commands of their superior officers to whom they must always show due respect, and at all times to conduct themselves in such a manner as to be a credit to the uniform which they are privileged to wear.

(b) The manner in which a soldier should proceed to obtain redress from any grievance, under which he considers he is suffering, is prescribed in sections 42 and 43 of the Army Act and the notes thereto in the Manual of Military Law.

The Regimental Badges consist of the Prince of Wales' Feathers. They are issued in four different sizes—

- (1) Large, for the front of the Review Order Helmet, and cross belt pouch.
- (2) Medium, for the Staff Cap, and collar of Jacket.
- (3) Small, for the Collar of Mess Jacket.
- (4) Arm Badge worn by W. Os. and N. C. Os.

(a) For wear Up-country or as ordered.

*Mess Jacket.*—Scarlet cloth lined with scarlet silk, rolled collar faced with blue cloth pointed cuffs and blue cloth shoulder straps with small size badges of rank only.

Collar, Cuffs, Shoulder Straps and lower edge of Jacket piped with white. Small size Regimental badges on lapels  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches from front edge of shoulder strap to bottom of badge. MINIATURE MEDALS are worn on the left lapel suspended from a brooch 1 inch below the point of the shoulder and the Regimental badge  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch below the medals; they must not extend beyond the lapel.

*Waist Coat.*—White drill with four silver Regimental buttons.

*Overalls.*—Blue cloth with double scarlet stripe  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch wide down the seam fastened under the boot with black foot straps.

*Boots.*—Wellington, black patent leather.

*Spurs.*—Box.

*Shirt.*—White stiff evening.

*Tie.*—Black, 1 inch to  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inch wide.

*Cap.*—Forage, with white cover.

(b) For wear in the Low-country or as ordered.

*Mess Jacket.*—White drill, roll collar, with small Regimental badges, blue shoulder straps with small badges of rank.

*Helmet.*—White, Wolseley pattern with white metal chin chain and spike, large Regimental badge in centre of pugaree in front.

*Jacket.*—White drill with stand up collar joining at throat. Two pleated breast pockets with flaps (no side pockets) medium Regimental badge on collar, centre of badge 2 inches from joint of collar, badge in middle of collar, shoulder chains on blue cloth with Regimental title and badges of rank, small buttons down front and on pockets.

*Breeches.*—Blue cloth, double scarlet stripe  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch wide down seam, with buck strappings.

*Boots.*—Jack.

*Spurs.*—Nickel hunting with chains black leather straps (and lace guards) Rowells will be filed down.

*Sword Belt.*—Silver and blue, worn under the Jacket.

*Cross Belt.*—Silver and blue with pouch.

*Sword Knot.*—Silver cord with acorn.

Officers when attending Levees will wear blue overalls and Wellington boots.

Shirt sleeves will be folded up neatly and not rolled, bottom of sleeves when folded to be level with elbow joint when hand is held straight down.

Whistles will be carried by all Officers, W. Os. and N. C. Os. when in shirt sleeves and khaki jackets.

Clothing, &c.,  
obtaining of.

All ranks are requested to obtain all articles of clothing and equipment through Headquarters instead of purchasing them through local firms. This will ensure uniformity throughout the Regiment and also enable members to get the benefit of the special rates.

*Position of Badges.*—Badges worn on forearm, bottom, of badge  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches from edge of sleeve. Badges worn on upper arm, lower edge of badge 9 inches from top of sleeve.

Badges worn on forearm of jackets will not be worn on the turn up of the sleeve when in shirt sleeves.

Badges W. Os. Regimental Sergeant-Major, Royal Arms (in white metal).

Regimental Qr. Mr. Sergeant, a Crown and laurels (in white metal).

Farrier Qr. Mr. Sergeant, a Crown and laurels (in white metal) (with Farrier's badge above Regimental arm badge).

Squadron Sergeant-Major, a Crown (in silver embroidery on scarlet cloth).

The above badges are worn on the forearm, the bottom of badge  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches from the edge of the sleeve.

The Regimental arm badge on a red cloth back ground will be worn on khaki and white jacket above the top of the badge of rank (except S. Q. M. S.).

*Badges N. C. Os.*—N. C. Os.' chevrons will be worn on upper arm with points downwards.

The Regimental Arm Badge will be worn by all N. C. Os. of and above the rank of Corporal. The bottom fastener of the badge will be fixed through the jacket  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch above the centre of the top stripe. Other badges such as shoes, flags, trumpets, &c., will be worn  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch above the arm badge.

Squadron Qr. Mr. Sergeants will wear Sergeants stripes with a Crown above.

The Regimental arm badge will be fixed through the centre of the chevrons.

N. C. Os.' chevrons will be of silver lace on scarlet cloth.

All badges of rank will be worn on right arm only with white and khaki jackets and on both arms in shirt sleeves.

The best shot in each Squadron, badge of crossed rifles and star on left forearm.

The best shot among W. Os. class II., Sergeants and Lance Sergeants, badge of crossed rifles and a Crown surrounded by a scroll of bay leaves on left forearm.

The best shot among Corporals, Farriers, and Troopers in Regiment, badge of crossed rifles and star surrounded by a scroll of bay leaves on left forearm.

*Marksman.*—A marksman badge of crossed rifles on left forearm.

*Signallers.*—Badges will be worn by N. C. Os. qualified as instructors on the right upper arm above the chevrons. Qualified signallers will wear the badge on left forearm.

*Efficiency.*—For five years' efficiency, a silver embroidery star on scarlet cloth on the right forearm.

(a) *Review Order.*—Helmet, white; Jacket, white; Breeches, blue; Jack boots; Spurs, black straps and guards Rowells will be filed down; Medals; Swords, with white sword knot; Officers wear cross belt and pouch in addition.

24. (Standing Order No. 46.)  
Efficiency Badges.

*On Horse.*—Saddle and bridle complete (less rifle bucket); Head rope; Blue saddle cloth; Sword and Knot (near side); Blue Throat Plume and Rosettes (Officers only).

(b) *Drill Order.*—Helmet, khaki with chin strap worn on the chin; Shirt, khaki; Breeches, khaki; Putties, khaki; Boots, brown, ankle; Spurs, brown straps and guards; Medal, Ribbons.

*Officers, W. Os. and Troop Sergeants.*—Field Glasses, slung on left side.

*On Horse.*—Saddle and bridle, complete; Head Rope, Hemp with ring; Picketing pegs, on the sword secured by straps; Shackle Rope, coiled in five coils and two half coils and strapped round the rear arch of the saddle on the near side; Built up rope, round the horses neck; Mess tin and water bucket, strapped on the rifle bucket, the buckle in the centre of the mess tin lid, holes down; Overcoat, rolled the length of a sword blade, on the front arch of the saddle. Nose bag on the back arch on the near side (Officers and O. Rs. not carrying rifles, on the off side).

*Note.*—Fitting of the head rope. This should be fitted by passing the end through the bottom ring of the connecting strap from the off side, then through the ring of the head rope and over the horses neck from the near side. It is then secured by four complete coils and two half coiled and adjusted so that the front of the coil is a hand's span from the bottom ring of the Headstall. Ends of all straps must point to the rear.

(a) The Adjutant must be informed of the time, date, and place of drills. If an Instructor is required one week's notice must be given.

(b) A Troop drill will count as one drill. Three Troop drills may be counted in one day provided that each of them is of not less than one and a half hour's duration. Attendance at the annual and local camps will count as three drills per diem. The firing of the Annual Musketry Course will count as two drills.

Estimates of the expenditure to be incurred for drills and Annual Musketry Course must be submitted to Headquarters by the 23rd of each month, *i.e.*, drills to be held in February must be estimated for by January 23.

Mileage claims will be certified correct by the Troop Commander or senior rank present at drills, &c., before they are forwarded to the Adjutant.

Finance Account.

(a) Regimental funds will be administered by a Finance Committee composed of the Commanding Officer (Chairman) and not less than three members of the Regiment. These members will be appointed by the Commanding Officer subject to the approval of the Commandant and their appointment will have effect from the date of such approval.

34. (Standing Order No. 64.)  
Troop Commander

The responsibility of making all ranks, under his command, efficient rests with the Troop Commander. He will draw up a programme of work for the year and forward it to the Adjutant for approval as soon as possible after the annual camp each year. He will keep his Troop roll books up to date from Regimental Orders and will forward them completed together with S. A. C. Registers to the Adjutant each month for checking.

He will collect all subscriptions due to the Regimental Sports and Entertainment Fund as also to the Polo Fund and enter the amounts in the column provided for this purpose in his roll book.

He will forward all subscriptions to the Hon. Treasurer who will make out and forward to the Troop Commander the necessary receipts for distribution.

He will inform the Adjutant of the date and place of any drill he may wish to hold if he should require an instructor. This information must reach Orderly Room a week before the drill is to take place. If any member of his Troop should leave the district he will ascertain that member's new address and forward it to the Adjutant.

He is responsible for all Government and Regimental property on his charge.

*Note.*—Attention is called to Chapter IV., Section 53, Estimates.

The Orderly Officer will be detailed in Regimental Orders.

His period of duty will be from Reveille to Reveille the next day.

He will perform the following duties :—

- (1) Visit all Regimental Guards, Sentries, and the stables once by day and once by night.
- (2) Be present at all parades.
- (3) Visit the Hospital.
- (4) Visit the men's mess at meal hours, in company with the Orderly Sergeant, and investigate any complaints.
- (5) Inspect the Cook Houses.
- (6) Inspect the Barrack rooms and Canteen.

35. (Standing Order No. 65.)  
Orderly Officer.



(7) He will not leave Camp or Barracks except for parades.

(8) He will render a report to the Adjutant on the completion of his tour of duty. This report will be in Orderly Room by 9 A.M.

His tour of duty will commence at Reveille and continue till the same hour the next day, during which time he will not leave Barracks except when on parade.

He will perform the following duties :—

- (1) Ascertain that all men are out of bed immediately after Reveille and report any absentees to the Orderly Officer.
- (2) Report to and accompany the Orderly Officer round the dining huts at all meal times and round the stables when required to do so.
- (3) See all lights out, except those in the Officers and Sergeants Messes, 15 minutes after last post has sounded.
- (4) Close the Canteen at the proper hour.
- (5) See the Sergeants Mess closed at 11 P.M.
- (6) Attend all parades.

36. (Standing Order No. 66.)  
Regimental Orderly Sergeant.

His tour of duty will commence at Reveille and continue till the same hour the next day during which time he will not leave Barracks except when on parade.

He will perform the following duties :—

- (1) Parade the sick and march them to the Hospital at the hour appointed.
- (2) Be present when the canteen opens and remain there all the time it is open.
- (3) See that no irregularity is permitted and that the liquor bar, when open, is conducted strictly in accordance with orders.
- (4) Report any trouble in the canteen to the Regimental Orderly Sergeant.
- (5) Bring to notice any complaints which may be made by the men.

37. (Standing Order No. 67.)  
Regimental Orderly Corporal.

The Stable Guard will—

- (1) Take charge of his post and all Government and Regimental property in view.
- (2) Challenge all persons approaching his post between Watch setting and Reveille.
- (3) Pay the proper compliments to all Officers approaching his post.
- (4) Ensure that the horse-keepers on duty are on the alert.
- (5) If a horse should break loose secure it, but if it should break out of its stall or box, not to follow it, but to call for the N. C. O. in charge of the Guard.
- (6) Permit no smoking in or near the stables.
- (7) In the case of fire or any other unusual occurrence alarm the N. C. O. in charge of the Guard.
- (8) Allow no unauthorized person to loiter on or near his post.
- (9) Permit no horse to be taken out of the lines except for duty.
- (10) Remain on his post until properly relieved by the N. C. O. in charge of the Guard.

**BY-LAWS.**

By-laws relating to bakeries and eating-houses set forth in Chapter XX. of the by-laws of the Municipal Council, Kandy, dated June 6, 1910 (published in *Gazette* No. 6,384 of June 10, 1910), are revoked and the following are substituted therefor :—

**GENERAL BY-LAWS RELATING TO LICENCES.**

*Interpretation of Terms.*

297. In these by-laws the following expressions shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context :—

- “The Council” means the Municipal Council of Kandy.
- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Municipal Council of Kandy.
- “Licensee” means the person holding a licence issued by the Chairman authorizing the use of any premises or place for any special purpose mentioned in the licence in pursuance of the Municipal Councils Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.
- “Licensed premises” means the whole of the premises or place in respect of which a licence has been issued by the Chairman.
- “Licensed trade” means a trade for which a licence is necessary under the provisions of the Municipal Councils Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.

(a) No person shall within the limits of the Council keep any bakery or eating-house without an annual licence from the Chairman, which licence the Chairman shall issue to all persons complying with the conditions provided for the issue of such licence. Every such licence shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such licence is issued, unless such licence shall have been previously cancelled as provided in by-law No. 10 or 11.

(b) No licence shall be transferable.

(c) All notices in connection with the licensed premises or the licensed trade shall be deemed to be served upon the licensee when left with any person employed in the licensed premises or when affixed to such premises.

(d) The licensee shall comply with the lawful requirements of any notice served on him by the Chairman within the time stated in such notice, or if no such time is stated in the notice then within seven days from the service of such notice.

(e) Every licence shall be subject to such fee as the Council shall, with the sanction of the Governor in Executive Council, impose.

(f) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer of the Council generally or specially authorized in writing thereto by the Chairman at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any licensed premises and to inspect any furniture, equipment, vehicle, or utensil which is, or appears to be, used for the purpose of a licensed trade.

(g) Every licensee shall during the period of licence keep his premises, furniture, and equipment in conformity with the conditions on which the licence was issued.

(h) Any person committing a breach of any regulation for any licensed premises shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 (Rupees Fifty), and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 (Rupees Twenty-five) for every day during which the offence was committed after conviction or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

(i) On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee by Court for breach of any regulation relating to his licensed premises, such licence shall be liable to cancellation by such Court.

(j) If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued the licensed premises cease to conform to the conditions laid down for its issue, the Chairman may notice the licensee to do all things necessary to make the premises conform to such conditions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of the notice the Chairman may suspend or cancel the licence.

#### BAKERIES.

298. A bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread and making of cakes and biscuits for sale.

#### I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a bakery unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

298. (1) (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the walls of every room in every part are not less than 7 feet in height, and are built of brick, stone, or cabook, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

(e) That all the woodwork is oil painted or limewashed.

(f) That the floor is cemented throughout.

(g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

298. (2) (a) That the room in which kneading takes place has a superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 15 feet and that the lower 4 feet of the internal surface of the walls is covered with glazed tiles or is plastered with cement.

(b) That there is a free external air space not less than 7 feet wide on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors or windows.

(c) That the door of the oven does not open directly into the kneading room.

(d) That every kneading room is provided with a ceiling which is either plastered and limewashed or made of closely fitting boards which are either limewashed or oil painted.

298. (3) (a) That the troughs, tables, and all the utensils used in the making of bread are capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

(b) That the tops of the tables used in the making of bread are made of well seasoned closely fitting planks or of some non-harmful impervious material.

(c) That the kneading room shall be rendered flyproof by means of wire gauze screens in windows and doors.

298. (4) (a) That the bakery is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(b) That the bakery is at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

(c) That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the bakery.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Bakeries.

299. (1) Every licensee of a bakery shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Bakery" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

(2) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees (including the vendors of bread) to be kept in the bakery so as to be available for inspection at all reasonable times by the Chairman or any person authorized by him.

(3) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the bakery to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodworks to be limewashed or, if oil painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at any other time if so ordered by the Chairman in writing.

(4) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the floor and the tile or cemented portions of the walls and the tops of the tables to be washed every day at such hour as shall be specified in the licence. He shall cause every part of the bakery, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of bread to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises. He shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle, which shall be removed from the bakery and cleared once a day. The receptacle shall always be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

(5) Every licensee of a bakery shall use for the manufacture of bread good and wholesome flour, water, and other materials. He shall store the flour on a movable platform constructed in the manner herein specified :—

The platform shall be of any convenient length and breadth, consisting of a single layer of stout planks supported on legs 3 feet high. The legs of the platforms should not be permanently fixed in the floor. The edges of the planked top should stand out 9 inches away from the frame underneath, so as to prevent rats crawling up the legs and round the edge of the planked top. The platform shall be so constructed that there are no shelves or recesses under the planked top to provide harbour for rats.

The platform should be a movable one, so that it may be lifted away from the position and the floor underneath cleaned. It should be placed at least 9 inches away from the wall. He shall keep the space beneath and round the platform free from all obstructions.

(6) Every licensee of a bakery shall provide a sanitary dust bin and at least two spittoons to be kept on the licensed premises. He shall keep the spittoons so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread, but shall not keep them in the kneading room.

(7) Every licensee of a bakery shall keep the bakery free from rats and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as found.

(8) No person shall on any pretext whatsoever keep any animal or bird in a bakery.

(9) No person shall spit within the bakery, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

(10) (a) No person suffering from, or who has recently suffered from, any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter the licensed premises or take part in the manufacture or sale of any bread therein, or engage in the transport of any bread therefrom.

(b) No licensee of a bakery shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the provisions of the above regulation 10 (a).

(11) No licensee of a bakery shall store or keep or allow to be stored or kept in the room where bread is prepared or stored, or in which the materials for making bread are stored, any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or any articles, other than those used in the manufacture of bread.

(12) No licensee of a bakery shall use, or allow to be used, as a sleeping place any place on the same floor as the bakery or forming part of the same building, unless such place is effectually separated from the places where bread is prepared or stored or in which the materials thereof are stored by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(13) All persons employed in the preparation and making of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of making bread, and shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body and a clean white cap or turban.

(14) Every licensee of a bakery shall provide clean water, clean towels, nail brush, and soap, and keep them so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread.

(15) Every licensee of a bakery shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

(16) No licensee of a bakery shall expose, or cause to be exposed, for sale in the licensed premises any bread unless such bread is kept in clean properly constructed glass cases free from flies, dust, and vermin.

(17) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all bread except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, to be stamped with figures denoting one or other of the following weights, viz. :—

$\frac{1}{2}$  lb.,  $\frac{3}{4}$  lb., 1 lb., 2 lb., or 4 lb.

He shall not sell or expose for sale any bread, except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, which shall not have one of the aforesaid weights stamped on it or which shall be found to weigh less than the weight stamped thereon.

(18) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause to be fixed in a conspicuous place in the licensed premises a beam and scales with standard weights, and, if required by any purchaser, shall weigh any bread sold or exposed for sale in the said premises.

(19) No licensee of a bakery shall allow any person to transport bread from his bakery for sale, unless such person is in position of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the bakery.

(20) The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a bakery, issue cards of registration for use by every person employed by such licensee in transporting bread for sale.

(21) No licensee of a bakery shall allow any bread to be transported from his licensed premises for sale, except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. The licensee shall examine such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle, and shall satisfy himself that it is clean and wholesome before he allows such transport.

#### EATING-HOUSES.

300. "Eating-house" includes any premises (other than a house for which a licence has been obtained under the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912) where meals are prepared or supplied for consumption by the public in the premises or elsewhere for the profit or gain of any person owning or having an interest in or managing such business.

"Meals" includes tea or coffee when either is sold in the form of a beverage.

#### I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep an eating-house unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

300. (1) That the premises are in good repair and are well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet and is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(2) That the walls of every room in every part are not less than 7 feet in height, and are built of brick, stone, or caobok, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.

(3) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(4) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

(5) That all the woodwork is oil painted or limewashed.

(6) That the floor is cemented throughout.

(7) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage, with a sanitary dust bin, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(8) That the premises to be used as an eating-house have no internal communication with any part of a dwelling house or with a bakery.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Eating-Houses.

301. (1) Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Eating-house" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

(2) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in such premises. He shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times on the premises so as to be available for inspection.

(3) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises to be limewashed twice every year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

(4) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every part of such premises, the surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the preparation, sale, or consumption of food or drink to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises.

(5) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all utensils used in the preparation, sale, and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in 24 hours.

(6) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by any other customer.

(7) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed from the premises daily. He shall keep such receptacle covered at all times, except when refuse is being placed in it, and shall cause all waste tea, coffee, milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste to be collected in such receptacle and not to be thrown on the ground.

(8) No licensee of an eating-house shall use any counter or other place from which tea, coffee, or milk is served, unless the said counter or other place is covered with zinc or other impervious material.

(9) Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least two spittoons to be kept always at the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises as well as to the employees.

(10) Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep the premises free from rats, and shall fill all rat holes with broken glass and plaster such holes with cement as soon as he discovers them.

(11) Every licensee of an eating-house shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

(12) No licensee of an eating-house shall keep or store or expose for sale any food unless such food is kept in a receptacle so constructed as to prevent its contamination by flies, dust, and vermin. He shall keep such receptacles always clean.

(13) No licensee of an eating-house shall sell or offer or expose for sale any milk to which water or any other foreign liquid or substance has been added so as to render such milk unwholesome.

(14) No person shall spit within such premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

(15) No person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter such premises or take part in the preparation or sale of food or drink.

(16) No licensee of an eating-house shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the above regulations numbered 14 and 15.

(17) No licensee of an eating-house shall allow any person to transport for sale cooked food from the licensed premises unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of an eating-house and unless such food is carried in a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle.

(18) Every licensee of an eating-house shall see that every vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle used for carrying food is clean at the time any food is placed in it.

(19) The Chairman, shall on application made to him by the licensee of an eating-house, issue cards of registration for use by every person employed by such licensee in carrying food for sale.

(20) The licensee of an eating-house shall not permit the licensed premises to be used for any other purposes whatsoever.

RULES REFERRED TO.

The rules dated September 30, 1926, published in *Gazette* No. 7,550 of October 15, 1926, are hereby amended as follows:—

(1) Rules 14 and 22 are repealed; and Rules 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 19, 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21 are renumbered 9 to 15 and 17 to 22 respectively.

(2) The following is inserted as rule 8:—

*Docking.*

It shall be the duty of the Master Attendant or Pilot to bring the vessel up to the Dock into such a position that she is on a suitable line to enter the Dock and at suitable speed. When she is in this position and the docking hawsers are fast on board and being manned by the men on shore, all further operations shall be carried out under the direction of the Dock Master whose responsibility should begin at this time. The Master Attendant or Pilot is to remain on the bridge until the ship is moored in the Dock to assist the Dock Master, if necessary.

(3) The following is inserted as rule 16:—

*Undocking.*

When a vessel is being undocked, the Dock Master shall be responsible for the method to be followed and shall remain in charge until the vessel is clear of the Dock entrance when she will be taken in charge by the Master Attendant or Pilot, but it will be the duty of the Dock Master to render all assistance to the Master Attendant or Pilot after this period as far as lies in his power to assist in getting the vessel clear of the Guide Pier.

The Dock Master is to notify the Commanding Officer of the method which he proposes to follow and is to obtain his concurrence to the arrangement. The ship's officers are to co-operate with the Dock Master as may be necessary.

## BY-LAWS.

1. The following by-laws made by the Sanitary Board of the Kalutara District under section 9 E (2) of Ordinance No. 18 of 1892 are repealed:—

- (a) The by-law dated March 4, 1920, and published in *Gazette* No. 7,091 of March 12, 1920, and  
(b) By-law No. 6 of Chapter XII. dated February 20, 1918, and published in *Gazette* No. 6,928 of March 8, 1918.

2. All householders shall deposit or cause to be deposited the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from their premises in cylindrical galvanized wrought iron bins which they shall provide and they shall place these bins daily on the edge of the road outside their premises between the hours of 6 A.M. and 6.30 A.M. and remove them or cause them to be removed within the space of half an hour after the same shall have been emptied by the scavengers.

3. The bins shall—

- (a) be constructed in such a manner and be of such weight that the whole receptacle with its contents can be easily lifted and emptied into the scavenging cart,  
(b) they shall be provided with covers and convenient handles,  
(c) they shall have the owner's name or tenement number painted outside, and  
(d) they shall be kept clean by the owners.

4. No person shall place or cause to be placed dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse in or on the edge of any road except in bins as aforesaid, at the times specified.

Provided that the Chairman may authorize a householder to use instead of a bin as aforesaid a wooden box provided with a loose lid approved by him, if he is satisfied that, owing to poverty, the immediate provision of such a bin would press harshly on the householder.

5. Any person committing a breach of the above regulation shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 10 and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction or written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

## BY-LAW REFERRED TO.

(a) Whenever any tree within the administrative limits of this Council or the branch, fruit, or leaf of such a tree is in the opinion of the Chairman either likely to fall upon any house or building or likely to be dangerous to its occupants, and whenever such tree, branch, fruit, or leaf overhangs any street, the Chairman may, by a notice in writing served on the owner or the occupier of the land upon which the tree stands, require him to cut down the tree, branch, fruit, or leaf, as the case may be; and if such owner or occupier fails within twenty-four hours of receiving the notice to comply with its requirements, any officers or workmen authorized in writing by the Chairman may enter upon such land and at the expense of the owner or occupier do what the owner or occupier was required to do by the notice.

(b) The owner or occupier who fails to comply with the requirements of a notice issued under paragraph (a) above shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 9, 1929.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 196 (2 Europeans, 14 Burghers, 120 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 23 Moors, 9 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1929, viz., 267,667) was 38.2, as against 34.3 in the preceding week, 47.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 36.1 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 187 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 109 Sinhalese, 40 Tamils, 19 Moors, 8 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 36.4, as against 29.4 in the previous week, 33.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.3 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 187 total deaths, 44 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 40 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 15.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Twenty-six deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 16 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Kotahena North, 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, and 1 each in Kotahena South, Maradana North, and Maradana South, as against 22 in the previous week and 23 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Eight deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 2 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, and New Bazaar, and 1 each in Kotahena South and Kollupitiya. The number registered during the preceding week as also the weekly average for last year was 8.

(c) Three deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in New Bazaar, Maradana North, and Maradana South. The number registered during the preceding week as also the weekly average for last year was 3.

2. (a) Sixteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 8 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), and 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, New Bazaar, and Maradana North, as against 13 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Five deaths from *Phthisis* of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Seven deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 5 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in St. Paul's and Slave Island, as against 5 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. Eighteen deaths from *Debility* were registered, 13 from *Enteritis*, 6 from *Puerperal Septicaemia*, 5 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 4 each from *Dysentery* and *Accidents*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Worms*, and *Homicide*, and 74 from *Other Causes*.

5. **Reported Cases.**—Twenty cases of *Chickenpox* and 2 of *Measles* were reported during the week, as against 23 and nil respectively, of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 79.3°, against 78.9° in the preceding week and 79.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.849 in., against 29.887 in. in the preceding week and 29.907 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.17 in., against 2.33 in. in the preceding week and 3.77 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

**A**N auction sale of all timber and firewood standing or fallen within the boundaries of the demarcated coupes described in the annexed schedules A and B will be held at the Divisional Forest Office, Kew road, Slave Island, Colombo, at 10 A.M. on Friday, December 20, 1929, subject to the following conditions:—

1. The coupes will be put up for sale one by one at a rate per coupe and no advance of less than Rs. 10 per coupe will be accepted.
2. The highest bid will be accepted, subject to the approval of the Conservator of Forests. The highest bidder will be required by the officer conducting the sale to sign the sale book kept for the purpose directly a coupe has been knocked down to him.
3. Payment of 5 per cent. of the successful bid should be made immediately after the sale and this amount will be retained as security referred to in paragraph 7 (b) below.
4. Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or person for whom they bid; such authority will be retained by the Divisional Forest Officer and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.
5. Bidders should satisfy themselves by inspection before bidding as to the contents of the demarcated coupes referred to in the annexed schedules, as the figures given therein are estimated only and their correctness is in no way guaranteed. The boundaries of coupes in Kananpella and Mitirigala will be pointed out by the Range Forest Officers, Waga and Mirigama, respectively, and the plans can be examined at the Divisional Forest Office, Colombo.
6. The successful bidder will be required to execute a purchase agreement in respect of each coupe.
7. Before execution of the agreement, the purchaser will be required (a) to pay either the full purchase amount or, if payment by instalments, 40 per cent. thereof, (b) to deposit as security for the efficient and punctual fulfilment of the agreement 5 per cent. of the full purchase amount offered by him or Rs. 100 whichever is greater. If payment is made by instalments the balance of 60 per cent. of the full purchase price shall be paid by the purchaser in two equal instalments in accordance with clauses 3 and 5 of the special conditions set out below in this notice.

10. The purchaser shall further make himself liable for punishment under the Forest Ordinance of 1907, for the commission of any forest offence by whomsoever committed within the limits of the whole block of forest in which such coupe is situated, and shall agree to take the steps necessary for the prevention of the commission of such forest offences.

*Special Conditions.*

(1) On payment of the full purchase amount the purchaser shall be entitled to fell and remove on or before January 1, 1931, in the manner specified below, all the timber and firewood contained in the purchased coupe. All timber

and firewood not removed by the date of expiry of the agreement, i.e., January 1, 1931, shall *ipso facto* revert to the Crown.

(2) The purchaser shall further agree that should any timber be left standing or lying felled within the coupe on the date of expiry, the expenses incurred by Government for their removal be defrayed from the amount deposited by him as security under clause (b) in paragraph 7 above.

(3) If the purchaser desires to pay by instalments payment of a first instalment of 40 per cent. of the full purchase price of the coupe shall entitle him to fell and remove all the trees in an area not exceeding one-third of the total area of such coupe. Payment of 70 per cent. of the full purchase price by means of a second instalment of 30 per cent. shall entitle the purchaser to fell and remove all the trees in an area not exceeding two-thirds of the total area of such coupe.

(4) The purchaser shall agree to commence felling along the full length of one boundary of each coupe previously pointed out to him by the Range Forest Officer concerned, and laid down on the plan of the coupe annexed to agreement. He shall further agree to progress the felling in a direction parallel to the boundary along which the felling has been commenced in the manner prescribed under clauses (a) and (b) below:—

(a) All trees, seedlings and saplings which are under 3 inches in diameter shall be cut out flush with the ground.

(b) All saplings and trees over 3 inches in diameter shall be felled within 6 inches of the ground.

(5) If paying by instalments, the purchaser shall pay the second instalment or in all 70 per cent. of the full purchase price, within four months, and the third and final instalment within seven months of the date of execution of the agreement.

Should the purchaser fail to pay either instalment when due it shall be within the discretion of the Divisional Forest Officer to cancel the agreement as from the date of such default, and to declare same to be null and void. Any unremoved or unfelled timber or firewood lying or standing in the coupe shall unconditionally revert to the Crown as from the date of such cancellation, and the purchaser shall have no further claim thereto.

(6) Should the purchaser fell or remove trees or firewood from any area of the coupe he has not paid for, or from any area of forest outside the demarcated boundaries of his coupe, nothing in the agreement shall exempt him from liability to punishment for illicit felling and removal under the provisions of the Forest Ordinance, No. 16 of 1907, and of the rules framed thereunder. For the purpose of special condition 6, it shall be presumed that the purchaser has previous to entering into the agreement satisfied himself as to the position of the lines and pillars demarcating his coupe, and that the purchaser has further agreed that he shall not in the event of any dispute put forward a plea of ignorance of the limits or extent of his coupe.

(7) The purchaser or his agent or any of his employees shall not damage any boundary pillars or block up the boundaries. Should the lines become blocked or the pillars thrown down due to unavoidable circumstances, such lines should be at once cleared or such pillar replaced.

(8) The purchaser shall not for the purpose of removing timber from his own coupe enter into any other area of forest not paid for by him except with the permission of the Range Forest Officer concerned, and along paths permitted by him.

(9) The purchaser shall further agree to compensate the Crown for any damage to produce caused by himself, his employees, his animals, his machinery, or his material

in transit over any area of forest not paid for by him at rates to be assessed by the Divisional Forest Officer, Colombo.

(10) If no objection exists in the opinion of the Divisional Forest Officer, the purchaser will further be permitted to erect wire shoots for the transport of materials always provided that he pays full royalty values for the forest produce outside his own coupe damage during such erection or in using such shoot. The permission in writing of the Divisional Forest Officer, Colombo, must be obtained before erection of any and every wire shoot.

(11) All produce from the coupe should in the first instance be removed to a depôt and stacked separately to facilitate inspection. Removal permits will then be issued by the Range Forest Officers concerned for the removal of such produce to a final destination.

(18) The purchaser shall further be remunerated at the rate not exceeding Fifteen Rupees (Rs. 15) per acre provided that in the opinion of the Divisional Forest Officer the reforestation is fully satisfactory, when the area is taken over at the expiry of the 3rd year, the exact amount of remuneration being proportionate to the degree of efficiency as judge by the Divisional Forest Officer of the work performed.

(19) The security deposited will then be released.

(20) If at any time during the term of agreement (*i.e.*, 3 years) the area reforested does not appear to have been properly planted, weeded, or fenced, it shall be within the discretion of the Divisional Forest Officer to enforce any or all of the following:—

(a) To cancel the agreement;

(b) To require the purchaser or his workmen to vacate the area;

(c) To confiscate the amount deposited as security; and

(d) To seize all food crops planted or lying in the area.

The purchaser shall have the right of appeal to the Conservator of Forests in the event of any of the enforcement of any of the above penalties specified in the above conditions and the purchaser shall agree to accept the Conservator of Forests' decision as final and binding.

#### Schedule A.

To purchase all timber and firewood trees standing or fallen within the demarcated boundaries of a coupe of 50 acres more or less demarcated in the Kananpella Reserve, situated at Kananpella, Hewagama korale, Colombo District.

The total value of timber and firewood has been departmentally assessed at Rs. 30 and Rs. 45, respectively, per acre making a total of Rs. 3,750 for the whole coupe.

#### Schedule B.

To purchase all timber and firewood trees standing or fallen within the demarcated boundaries of a coupe of 50 acres more or less in the Mitirigala Reserve, situated in the village of Mitirigala, Siyane korale east, Colombo District.

The total value of timber and firewood in the coupe has been estimated at Rs. 30 and Rs. 45, respectively, per acre thus making a total value of Rs. 3,750 for the whole coupe.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held at the Town Hall on Wednesday, October 2, 1929, at 3 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice, dated September 25, 1929.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of September 4, 1929, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene asked the following questions which the Chairman answered :—

Q.—(1) Will the Chairman be pleased to place before the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) for consideration and report the question of the desirability or otherwise of provision being made, in the amendment of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, now under consideration, for the reduction in the computation and assessment of annual value of the annual cost of insurance, repairs, maintenance, and upkeep, as is provided for in the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920? A.—(1) The suggestion made in the question is merely another means of reducing the amount payable in rates on the properties in the City by some four lakhs—the equivalent of the amount by which it would have been reduced if the recent motion to alter the rate from 20 per cent. to 18 per cent. had been passed by the Council. The Council rejected that motion at the meeting on September 4 and the Chairman does not feel justified in taking the initiative in calling a meeting of the Four Standing Committees to consider so similar a suggestion unless the Council indicates that it wishes him to do so.

Q.—(2) Will the Chairman be pleased to inquire when the new assessment of Government property, which the Colonial Secretary in his letter of January 7, 1928, hoped will be ready by June, 1928, is likely to be completed? A.—(2) The Chairman has again, on September 25 last, addressed the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, on the subject.

Q.—(3) Will the Chairman be pleased to call on the Medical Officer of Health to submit a report stating what steps should be taken to improve the sanitary condition of New Bazaar Ward, where the incidence of consumption has been the highest for several years and enteric and continued fever have also been very high? A.—(3) Yes.

3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. S. Muttiah asked the following questions which the Chairman answered :—

Q.—(1) Is the Chairman aware that the Newnham Ground is not recognized as a suitable ground for first class matches (e.g., Colombo Soccer League matches) in which the City Football League teams take part? A.—(1) No. The Chairman understands that a first class league match was played on it last Friday.

Q.—(2) As the Colombo Municipality undertook to maintain this ground, will the Chairman find out what defects are found on this ground and take suitable steps to remedy such defects to enable first class matches to be played on this ground next year? A.—(2) The Council never undertook to maintain this football ground, but voted a sum of money for mowing its grass twice a month and this is being done.

4. Pursuant to notice, Dr. S. Muttiah moved that "A Special Committee be appointed to consider the regulations insisting upon taximeters being fitted to all passenger carrying motor cars plying for hire in Colombo." Dr. E. A. Coorey seconded. Mr. S. W. R. Dias Bandaranaike spoke in support of the motion.

The Chairman gave the facts with regard to this matter. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

## ANNEXURE B.

*Draft Regulations in Pursuance of Powers vested in the Municipal Council by "The Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, 1899."*

1. The cemetery shall be open daily to the public from 6 A.M. till sunset.
2. All applications for sites for cremations and for graves in the general sections of the cemetery shall be made to the cemetery-keeper, or in his absence, to his assistant at the cemetery-keeper's office, at least 6 working hours before the time fixed for the burial. The office is open from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M.
3. All applications for graves in the sections of the cemetery sold to religious denominations, under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall be made to the caretaker or person in charge of such section.
4. No grave shall be less than four feet in depth.
5. The cemetery-keeper shall send weekly to the Registrar-General a copy or transcript of records of all burials and cremations that take place in the cemetery.
6. The caretaker or person in charge of any section of the cemetery sold to religious denominations, under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall mark the date of any burial or burials in such section on a plan similar to the plan kept by the cemetery-keeper and submit such plan daily to the cemetery-keeper or his assistant for verification, together with the death certificates relating to such burial or burials.
7. The caretaker, curator or trustee of any section of the cemetery sold to religious denominations, under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall furnish a complete return of all graves sold during the month giving all particulars as to date of sale, amount paid, cash receipt No., full name and address of purchaser, name of deceased and date of burial, size of grave, position of grave, grant No. and the date such grant was issued, together with a plan showing the grave sold, to the cemetery-keeper or his assistant before the 10th of every following month. All such grave sites so sold shall be pointed out to the cemetery-keeper or his assistant when required by either of them.
8. The caretaker, curator or trustee of any section of the cemetery sold to religious denominations, under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall whenever required produce all books, documents, and plans of such section for the inspection of the proper authority or of anyone thereto authorized by him and shall supply all the necessary information whenever called upon to do so.
9. No grave shall be re-opened within a year, nor vault within eighteen months, from the last interment therein, except for post-mortem examinations as provided for by law.
10. The caretaker of any section of the cemetery sold to religious denominations under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall inform the cemetery-keeper of any proposed exhumation of a dead body interred in his section and before such exhumation takes place shall hand over to him the order of the District Judge with regard thereto, which should be forwarded by the cemetery-keeper to the Medical Officer of Health.
11. For exclusive possession, sites of graves must be purchased within one year from date of burial. Sites not so purchased will be regarded as available for further burials at the discretion of the cemetery-keeper.
12. Cremations shall take place only on a site indicated by the cemetery-keeper and ashes of dead bodies cremated, unless removed within six days of cremation, shall be disposed of by the cemetery-keeper.
13. The minimum quantity of firewood and kerosine oil to be used for the cremation of a dead body of an adult person shall be,—Firewood, 20 cwt. ; kerosine oil, 4 gallons.
14. The following fees shall be paid to the cemetery-keeper in advance under the 23rd clause of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899 :—

15. Paupers dying in the Government Civil Hospital shall be buried free of charge by the hospital contractor or servants, under the direction of the cemetery-keeper.
16. On the production of a certificate from a Christian Minister, Municipal or Police Inspector, or Headman not lower than the rank of a Muhandiram that the friends and relatives of any deceased person are not able to pay the fees herein authorized for the digging of a grave, the cemetery-keeper shall cause a grave to be dug and the corpse to be buried therein free of charge.
17. No grave, site or vacant space in the cemetery shall be enclosed with any permanent coping or wall and no tombstone or monument or vault of any description shall be erected thereon until such grave site or vacant space has been purchased. The proof of such purchase shall be the production of a grant which must be available for the inspection of the cemetery-keeper. The caretaker of any section of the cemetery sold to religious denominations, under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall produce to the cemetery-keeper proof of the sale of any such site or vacant space in the section under his care before he allows it to be built upon.
18. No person shall plant any tree, palm, shrub, or hedge or fix any bower for growing creepers on any grave space in the cemetery (whether purchased or not) or place thereon any large tub or flower pot or vase, bowl or any receptacle (that can hold water in which mosquitoes are able to breed) without the consent of the cemetery-keeper.
19. The caretaker, curator, or trustee of any section of the cemetery, sold under section 12 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, shall keep such section well swept and clear of jungle, weeds, leaves, stones, and rubbish. He shall also keep all hedges trimmed and roadways and paths in the section under his care at all times in proper repair. He shall see that the grave diggers and other coolies in attendance at a funeral in his section are properly clad in uniform when they are engaged on such duty.
20. No person shall allow any cattle or other animals to stray into or to be tethered in the cemetery.
21. No person shall bring a dog into the cemetery.
22. No person shall drive a motor car or any other vehicle into the cemetery unless such car or vehicle is used as a hearse to convey a dead body. In the case of a sick or invalid person wishing to be conveyed into the cemetery by vehicle, the permission of the cemetery-keeper shall first be obtained before such vehicle enters the gates of the cemetery.

23. Should it be necessary for the purpose of preventing the disturbance of one funeral party by another, the cemetery-keeper or his assistant, may require that one burial service should be concluded before another is commenced.
24. The cemetery-keeper or his assistant shall at all times keep order in the cemetery and his authority in maintaining such order shall not be disputed.
25. Any breach of any of these regulations shall be an offence punishable under section 41 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899.

## ANNEXURE C.

*Amendments to By-laws relating to Bakeries and Eating Houses.**(Amendments are shown in Italics.)*

## GENERAL BY-LAWS RELATING TO LICENCES.

*Interpretation of Terms.*

1. In these by-laws the following expressions shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context :—

“The Council” means the Municipal Council of Colombo.

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Municipal Council of Colombo.

“Licensee” means the person holding a licence issued by the Chairman authorizing the use of any premises or place for any special purpose mentioned in the licence in pursuance of the Municipal Council's Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.

“Licensed premises” means the whole of the premises or place in respect of which a licence has been issued by the Chairman.

“Licensed trade” means a trade for which a licence is necessary under the provisions of the Municipal Council's Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.

2. No person shall within the limits of the Council keep any bakery or eating-house without an annual licence from the Chairman, which licence the Chairman shall issue to all persons complying with the conditions provided for the issue of such licence. Every such licence shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such licence is issued, unless such licence shall have been previously cancelled as provided in by-law No. 10 or 11.

3. No licence shall be transferable.

4. All notices in connection with the licensed premises or the licensed trade shall be deemed to be served upon the licensee when left with any person employed in the licensed premises or when affixed to such premises.

5. The licensee shall comply with the lawful requirements of any notice served on him by the Chairman within the time stated in such notice, or if no such time is stated in the notice then within seven days from the service of such notice.

6. Every licence shall be subject to such fee as the Council shall, with the sanction of the Governor in Executive Council, impose.

7. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer of the Council, generally or specially authorized in writing thereto by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any licensed premises and to inspect any furniture, equipment, vehicle, or utensil which is, or appears to be, used for the purpose of a licensed trade.

8. Every licensee shall during the period of licence keep his premises, furniture and equipment in conformity with the conditions on which the licence was issued.

9. Any person committing a breach of any regulation for any licensed premises shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 (Rupees Fifty), and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 (Rupees Twenty-five) for every day during which the offence was committed after conviction or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

10. On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee by court for breach of any regulation relating to his licensed premises, such licence shall be liable to cancellation by such court.

11. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued the licensed premises ceased to conform to the conditions laid down for its issue, the Chairman may notice the licensee to do all things necessary to make the premises conform to such conditions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of the notice the Chairman may suspend or cancel the licence.

## BAKERIES.

A bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread and making of cakes and biscuits for sale.

I.—*Conditions of Issue of Licence.*

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a bakery unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

1. (a) *That the site is approved by the Chairman.*

(b) *That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.*

(c) *That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height in no place is less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone or cabook with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.*

- (d) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground and are not more than 18 inches in length.  
 (e) That the roof is made of some permanent material.  
 (f) That all the woodwork is oil painted or limewashed.  
 (g) That the floor is cemented throughout.  
 (h) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

2. (a) That the room in which kneading takes place has a superficial floor space of not less than 180 square feet with a clear space of not less than 2 feet round the kneading tables and that the lower 5 feet of the internal surface of the walls is covered with glazed tiles or is plastered with cement and that the kitchen is not less than 80 square feet in area and is provided with an efficient smoke vent.

(b) That there is a free external air space not less than 7 feet wide on at least one of the sides of the kneading room which contains doors and windows, but if there is a free external air space only on one side that there is provided an extractor fan.

(c) That the door of the oven does not open directly into the kneading room.

(d) That every kneading room is provided with a ceiling which is either plastered and limewashed or made of closely fitting boards which are either limewashed or oil-painted.

3. (a) That the troughs, tables, and all the utensils used in the making of bread are capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

(b) That the tops of the tables used in the making of bread are made of well seasoned closely fitting planks or of some non-harmful impervious material.

(c) That the kneading room shall be rendered fly-proof by means of wire gauze screens in windows and doors and that the flour shall be stored in a special fly-proofed room provided with dovetailed ceiling.

4. (a) That the bakery is provided with a sanitary dust bin, and a separate room for the workmen when off duty with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(b) That the bakery is at least 30 feet distant from any pail closet, ash pit, or open sewer within the bakery premises.

(c) That there is no cesspit or manure heap within the bakery premises.

(d) That the building to be used as a bakery has no internal communication with the interior of any part of a dwelling house or eating-house.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Bakeries.

1. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Bakery" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

2. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees (including the vendors of bread) to be kept in the bakery so as to be available for inspection at all reasonable times by the Chairman or any person authorized by him.

3. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the bakery to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at any other time if so ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause the floor and the tiled or cemented portions of the walls and the tops of the tables to be washed every day at such hour as shall be specified in the licence. He shall cause every part of the bakery, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of bread to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises. He shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle, which shall be removed from the bakery and cleared once a day. The receptacle shall always be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

5. Every licensee of a bakery shall use for the manufacture of bread good and wholesome flour, water, and other materials. He shall store the flour on a movable platform constructed in the manner herein specified and in a special room, with adequate ventilation, set apart for the purpose and rendered fly-proof:—

The platform shall be of any convenient length and breadth, consisting of a single layer of stout planks supported on legs 3 feet high. The legs of the platform should not be permanently fixed in the floor. The edges of the planked top should stand out 9 inches away from the frame underneath, so as to prevent rats crawling up the legs and round the edge of the planked top. The platform shall be so constructed that there are no shelves or recesses under the planked top to provide harbour for rats.

The platform should be a movable one, so that it may be lifted away from the position and the floor underneath cleaned. It should be placed at least 9 inches away from the wall. We shall keep the space beneath and around the platform free from all obstructions.

6. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide a sanitary dust bin to be kept on the licensed premises.

7. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep the bakery free from rats and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as found.

8. No person shall on any pretext whatsoever keep any animal or bird in a bakery.

9. No person shall spit within the bakery.

10. (a) No person suffering from, or who has recently suffered from, any infectious, contagious or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter the licensed premises or take part in the manufacture or sale of any bread therein, or engage in the transport of any bread therefrom.

(b) No licensee of a bakery shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the provisions of the above regulation 10 (a).

11. No licensee of a bakery shall store or keep or allow to be stored or kept in the room where bread is prepared or stored, or in which the materials for making bread are stored, any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or any articles other than those used in the manufacture of bread.

12. No licensee of a bakery shall use, or allow to be used, as a sleeping place any place on the same floor as the bakery or forming part of the same building, unless such place is effectually separated from the places where bread is prepared or stored or in which the materials thereof are stored by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenths of the superficial floor space.

13. All persons employed in the preparation and making of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of making bread, and shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body and a clean white cap or turban. When any work is proceeding in the kneading room the extractor fan, if required under Part I., section 2 (b) of these by-laws, shall be working.

14. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide clean water, clean towels, nail brush, and soap, and keep them so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread.

15. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide the licensed premises with a pipe-borne supply of potable water from the city water mains.

16. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all bread except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, to be stamped with figures denoting one or other of the following weights, viz. :—

$\frac{1}{4}$  lb.,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb., 1 lb., 2 lb., or 4 lb.

He shall not sell or expose for sale any bread, except fancy bread, rolls, biscuits, or confectionery, which shall not have one of the aforesaid weights stamped on it or which shall be found to weigh less than the weights stamped thereon.

17. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause to be fixed in a conspicuous place in the licensed premises a beam and scales with standard weights, and, if required by any purchaser, shall weigh any bread sold or exposed for sale in the said premises.

18. No licensee of a bakery shall allow any person to transport bread from his bakery for sale, unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the bakery. *Such cards shall not be transferable.*

19. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a bakery, issue cards of registration for use by every person employed by such licensee in transporting bread for sale.

20. No licensee of a bakery shall allow any bread to be transported from his licensed premises for sale, except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. The licensee shall examine such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle, and shall satisfy himself that it is clean and wholesome before he allows such transport.

#### EATING-HOUSES.

"Eating-houses" includes any premises (other than a house for which a licence has been obtained under the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912) where meals are prepared or supplied for consumption by the public in the premises or elsewhere for the profit or gain of any person owning or having an interest in or managing such business.

"Meals" includes tea or coffee when either is sold in the form of a beverage.

#### Conditions of Issue of Licence.

1. That the site is approved by the Chairman.
2. That the premises are in good repair and are well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room used for the serving of meals has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet and is provided for the purpose of ventilation with doors or windows opening either directly or through an open verandah into an external open space and having an aggregate opening of not less than  $\frac{1}{7}$ th the superficial floor area of room.
3. That the premises include a kitchen having a minimum superficial area of not less than 80 square feet, an efficient smoke vent and at least one window capable of being opened. Such window when open shall have an area of not less than  $\frac{1}{15}$ th of the superficial floor space.
4. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cobwork, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed.
5. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground and not more than 18 inches in length.
6. That the roof is made of some permanent material.
7. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.
8. That the ground floor is cemented throughout.
9. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage, with a sanitary dust bin, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
10. That the premises to be used as an eating-house have no internal communication under the same roof with any part of a dwelling house or with a bakery.

#### II.—Regulations for Licensed Eating-houses.

1. Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Eating-house" or "Licensed Restaurant" legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.

2. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in such premises. He shall also cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times on the premises so as to be available for inspection.

3. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises to be limewashed twice every year in the months of June and December; the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every part of such premises, the surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the preparation, sale, or consumption of food or drink to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises.

5. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all utensils used in the preparation, sale, and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in 24 hours.

6. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by any other customer.

7. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed from the premises daily. He shall keep such receptacle covered at all times, except when refuse is being placed in it, and shall cause all waste tea, coffee, milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste to be collected in such receptacle and not to be thrown on the ground.

8. No licensee of an eating-house shall use any counter or other place from which tea, coffee, or milk is served, unless the said counter or other place is covered with zinc or other impervious material.

9. Every licensee of an eating-house shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least two spittoons to be kept always at the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises as well as to the employees.

10. Every licensee of an eating-house shall keep the premises free from rats, and shall fill all rat holes with broken glass and plaster such holes with cement as soon as he discovers them.

11. Every licensee of an eating-house shall provide the licensed premises with a pipe-borne supply of potable water from the City water mains.

12. No licensee of an eating-house shall keep or store or expose for sale any food *except vegetables* unless such food is kept in a receptacle so constructed as to prevent its contamination by flies, dust, and vermin. He shall keep such receptacles always clean.

13. No licensee of an eating-house shall sell or offer or expose for sale any milk to which water or any other foreign liquid or substance has been added so as to render such milk unwholesome.

14. No person shall spit within such premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

15. No person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter such premises or take part in the preparation or sale of food or drink.

16. No licensee of an eating-house shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the above regulations numbered 14 and 15.

17. No licensee of an eating-house shall allow any person to transport for sale cooked food from the licensed premises unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of an eating-house and unless such food is carried in a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. *Such cards shall not be transferable.*

18. Every licensee of an eating-house shall see that every vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle used for carrying food is clean at the time any food is placed in it.

19. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of an eating-house, issue cards of registration for use by every person employed by such licensee in carrying food for sale.

20. The licensee of an eating-house shall not permit the licensed premises to be used for any other purposes whatsoever.

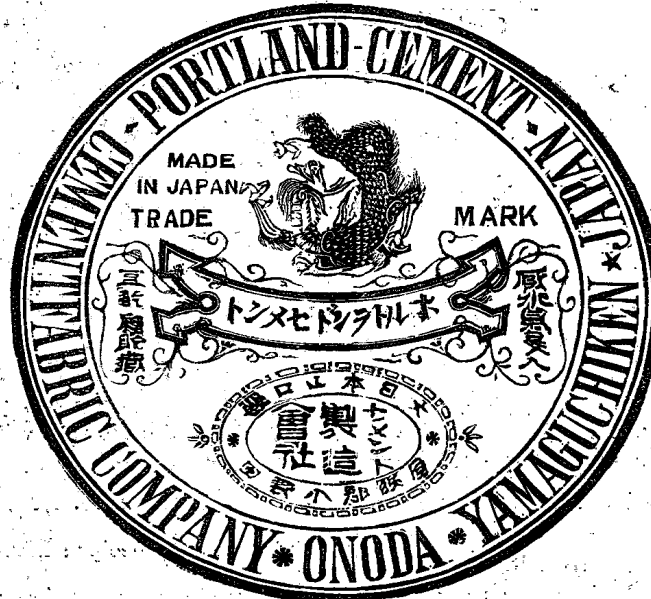
