A PROCLAMATION.

B. H. BOURDILLON.

HEREAS by a Proclamation dated February 8, 1912, published in Gazette No. 6,189 of February 16, 1912, the Chief Headmen's divisions of Valigamam North and Valigamam East were brought under "The Village Communities Ordinance of 1889," and the said Chief Headmen's divisions were subdivided into villages or convenient groups of villages in the manner specified in column I. of the schedule hereto:

And whereas the said Proclamation is in force by virtue of section 4 sub-section (3) and section sub-section (2) of "The Village Communities Ordinance, No. 9 of 1924":


And whereas it is now deemed expedient to amalgamate the said two Chief Headmen's divisions of Valigamam North and Valigamam East into one Chief Headman's division to be hereafter called and known as Valigamam North and East:

Now know Ye that I, the Officer Administering the Government, do hereby declare (a) that the Chief Headmen's divisions of Valigamam North and Valigamam East shall be amalgamated and be called and known hereafter as the Chief Headman's division of Valigamam North and East and (b) that the said new division shall continue to be subdivided in the manner in which the said two constituent portions have heretofore been divided, namely, into the villages or convenient groups of villages specified in column II. of the schedule hereto.

I do hereby in all other respects confirm the said Proclamation.

HEREAS section 38 of "The Estate Roads Ordinance, 1902," provides that where in any case in which a road or portion of a road has been constructed, or partially constructed, by the proprietors of any estates, it shall be lawful for the proprietors for the time being of such estates to apply to the Governor that such road may be treated as a road constructed under the aforesaid Ordinance, and on receipt of such application the Governor may, if he thinks fit, issue a Proclamation declaring that such road shall be treated as a road made under the said Ordinance:

And whereas such an application has been received from the proprietors of Bolagalla and Rilagalla estates in the Kandy District, Central Province:

Now know Ye that in exercise of the powers vested in the Governor by the aforementioned section of the aforementioned Ordinance, J, the Officer Administering the Government, do hereby declare that the road specified and defined in the schedule hereto shall be treated as a road made under the aforementioned Ordinance as from the date hereof.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 19, 1930.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 151 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 91 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 28 Moors, and 4 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1930, viz., 270,700) was 29.1, as against 31.6 in the preceding week, 35.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 32 5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 206 (1 European, 13 Burghers, 114 Sinhalese, 36 Tamils, 27 Moors, 10 Maleys, and 5 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 39.7, as against 43.7 in the previous week, 29.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.9 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 206 total deaths, 48 were of infants under one year of ago, as against 48 in the preceding week, 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 12.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-one deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena North and Maradana North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, New Bezeer, Meradena East, and Slave Island, as against 27 in the previous week, and 22 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Fifteen deaths from Influenza were registered, 8 in St. Paul's, 2 each in Kotshena South, Maradana North, and Maradana East, and 1 in Maradana South, as against 23 in the previous week, and 9 the weekly average for last

- (c) Five deaths from Bronchitis were registered, 2 in Meradene hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's and Wellawatta South, as against 3 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- 2. Nine deaths from Phthisis were registered, 5 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in Kotahena South and Meradana South, as against 14 in the previous week, and 11 the weekly average for last year.
- 3. (a) Nino deeths from Enteric Fever were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), and I each in Kotchene North and Kollupitiya, as against 5 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths from Enteric Fever of residents of Colombo town, occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda,

during the week.

(a) One death from Plague was registered in St. Paul's, as against 1 in the previous week.

(b) One death from Plague, of a resident of Colombo town, occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week.

- 5. Thirty-one deaths from Enteritis were registered, 10 from Debility, 9 from Diarrhoea, 7 from Dysentery, 6 from Puerperal Septicaemia, 5 from Worms, 3 each from Infantile Convulsions and Accidents, and 72 from Other Causes.
- 6. Reported Cases.—Seventeen cases of Chickenpox, 15 of Enteric Fever, 2 of Measles, and 2 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 19, 11, 3, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather .- The mean temperature of air was 81.5, against 82.2° in the proceeding week and 81.5° in the corresponding week of the provious year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.888 in., against 29.856 in. in the preceding week and 29 873 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.61 in. against 0.19 in. in the preceding week and 0.08 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

The lessee shall on receipt of a month's notice, of such requirement from the lessor, his agent or agents, surrender such portion or portions without compensation.

6. If any portion of the plantation and premises hereby demised to be adjudged during the continuance of the tenancy to be private property and not to belong to the Crown, such adjudication shall in no way determine the tenancy, but an abatement in the rent shall be made by the lessor on behalf of the Crown proportionate to the

acreage declared to be private property.

7. The lessee shall not during his tenancy cut or peel any cinnamon sticks which shall not have come to maturity, nor shall he at any time destroy or injure any cinnamon bushes or trees or timber on the said plantation growing, nor shall he at any time commit any waste thereon. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the lessee from harvesting such cinnamon as is fit to be harvested in the usual course of husbandry.

8. The lessee shall permit the lessor or his agent or agents at all reasonable time during the tenancy to enter upon the said leased premises and plantation to view the

state and condition thereof.

9. During the last year of the term it shall be lawful for the lessor to appoint one or more persons who shall superintend the cutting and peeling of cinnamon then growing upon the said plantation, and so soon as such superintendent or superintendents have been appointed, the lessee shall not cut or harvest any cinnamon, save with the approval and consent of one of such superintendents.

10. The lessee shall, from time to time during the said term, when and so often as need shall require, at his own cost well and substantially repair and maintain the boundary marks and hedges, mounds, banks, fences, drains, and ditches, which indicate the boundaries of the premises

hereby demised.

11. The lessee shall be at liberty to manure the premises hereby demised or any portion thereof subject to Municipal

regulations. Cattle are not allowed on the land.

12. The lessee shall at the expiration or sooner determination of the said term deliver up the said plantation and leased premises and all fixtures and additions thereto in such good and husbandlike conditions as aforesaid, and in all respects in such state and condition as shall be consistent with the due performance of the agreements and stipulations herein contained.

14. If any other quarterly instalments of rent hereby secured shall be in arrear for more than thirty days, or if the lessee commit a breach of any of the foregoing covenants, it shall be lawful for the lessor for and on behalf of the Crown to re-enter upon the said plantation and leased premises without making any compensation to the lessee, and thereupon it shall be optional to the lessor on behalf of the Crown either to sell the remainder of the term at the risk of the lessee or to forthwith determine the tenancy of the said plantations and leased premises.

15. The lessee will pay all rates and taxes due on account of this land and be subject to Municipal regulations.

16. The lessee shall provide permanent latrine accommodation in accordance with Municipal requirements and regulations.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.—INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS IN ARTS, SCIENCE: AND SCIENCE (AGRICULTURE), 1931.

- 1. Date and Place of Examination.—The Intermediate Examinations in Arts and Science commence on the first Monday in July and that in Agriculture during the week beginning on the first Monday in July. Examinations will be held in Colombo only.
- 2. Qualifications for Admission.—These Examinations are open to men and women. No candidate shall be admitted unless he has passed or has been registered as exempt from the London Matriculation Examination (see Appendix) not later than that of the preceding January. A candidate who has sat for a January Matriculation Examination may if he so desire enter provisionally for an Intermediate Examination pending the results of the Matriculation Examination.
- 3. Entry.—Every candidate for the Examinations (entire or referred) whether first entry or re-entry must apply to this office for an entry form not less than fourteen days before the last day of entry. Each form of entry whether first entry or re-entry must reach the Education Office not later than the following dates :-

The examination shall be conducted mainly by means of printed papers; but for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of a candidate to pass, the Examiners shall not be precluded from

putting viva voce questions to any candidate.

In all subjects there shall be two papers of three hours each, except in the case of History of Architecture. In Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and Zoology there will be in addition

In the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and Zoology Papers In the Physics, Chemistry, Botally, Geology, and Zoology Papers questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination. The questions in French and German which are set in papers in Science and Mathematical subjects shall be optional in the case of candidates sitting in the Colonies the Dominions and in the Colonies.

No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners' unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the four prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Arts. Referred candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects within the above stated limits will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again.

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:—

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of the common materials occurring in nature. The history of the discovery of the composition of air and water. The laws of chemical combination. The atomic and molecular theories. Equivalent atomic and molecular weights, and the methods of their determination, including atomic heats and isomorphism.

The elements of physical chemistry, including the following—The properties of gases and solutions. Thermal dissociation osmotic pressure, and determination of molecular weights in solution by the freezing point method. Diffusion. Colloidal solutions. Electrolysis and the theory of electrolytic dissociation. ciation. Electrical conductivity. Hydrolysis. Strengths of acids and bases. Chemical equilibrium and simple examples of the law of mass action. Catalysis. Thermo-chemistry. Combustion and flame.

The history, production and properties of the more important and typical elements, and their most familiar compounds (including those of carbon as follows: carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, carbon disulphide, methane, ethylene and acetylene).

The whole to be treated as far as possible experimentally, and

in an elementary manner.

One alternative question on elementary organic chemistry will be set in each paper according to the following syllabus—Hydro-carbons, halogen derivatives, alcohols, ethers, aldehydes, ketones, acids and esters, as illustrated by the study of methane, ethylene, acetylene, methyl and ethyl alcohols, diethyl ether formaldehyde and acetaldehyde, acetone, formic, acetic and oxalic acids, ethylacetate; glycerol, fats and soaps (from an experimental standpoint only); benzene, nitrobenzene, aniline and phenol. Candidates will be expected to show a practical acquaintance with all the particular substances specified.

II.—Practical Examination.

[Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis provided

that it does not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.]
Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes

involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallisation, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks, for inspection should the Examiners so desire. These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the Examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the Teacher, may also be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

No candidate will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the

deposition, and deformation.

Their physical characters, chemical composition, and modes of origin and occurrence.

(c) The simpler optical properties of the common rock-forming minerals and the physical principles on which

forming minerals and the physical principles on which these properties depend.

(d) The general characters and relationships of the chief types of sedimentary, igneous, and metamorphic rocks.

II.—Historical Geology.—The disposition of rocks and its representation on maps; evidence of relative ages of rocks; fossils, their preservation and distribution in rocks of different ages; the geological systems, their broad characters and distribution in Great Britain.

Practical Work.

Interpretation of simple geological maps in terms of rock-structure and its relation to topography; expression of this interpretation by means of sections; Graphic methods of finding thickness, dip and strike of beds, of completing outcrops, and of tracing the underground extension of strata.

Identification and description of common minerals and typical rocks, with and without the microscope, exercises in projection of crystals; identification and description of crystal forms of common minerals, both on models and on actual

crystals.

Reference of fossils to their broad biological groups and geological periods.

History of Architecture.

- (1) Greek and Roman Architecture (one paper):
- (2) History of Greek and Roman Art (one paper).

The characteristics of various periods and their course of development in Egypt, Assyria, Greece, and Rome.

(3) Drawings of Greek and Roman Orders done during the session to be submitted and marked.

Two Imperial size sheets* of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., "Greek and Roman Architecture."

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to be prescribed two years previously.

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History from about 1400 to the present One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text.

Ancient History (Two Papers).

Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.C.

Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.C. to 330 A.D.

A selected portion of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

Geography (Two Papers and Map Work).

1. General Geography.—General principles as exemplified in the world considered as a whole. (One paper).

The Earth's Crust:-Nature of the earth's crust. internal and external forces modifying the crust in so far as they determine:—(a) General structure and leading topographical features of the continental masses and ocean basins; (b) types and distribution of rocks, minerals and soils.

Climate: Broad seasonal distribution of insolation, temperature, pressure, winds and rainfall, leading to recognition of chief climate types and their associated weather conditions. (The physical conditions and movements of the oceans should be considered only in so far as they affect climate).

Vegetation:—General distribution of forest, woodland, scrub and grassland in relation to climate, soil and topography.

Major Geographical Regions:-The division of the world into major geographical regions.

Human Geography:-The influence of the foregoing physical factors upon the distribution of man and upon the production of food and raw materials, and the consequent development of the geographical regions.

- Regional Geography.—(One paper).
- (a) Europe with special reference to the British Isles, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and Scandinavia.

- (b) North America with special reference to the north-eastern industrial areas, and the United States east of the Mississippi (c) The Monsoon lands with special reference to the Indian
- Empire and Ceylon.

3. Map Work .- (One paper).

The map work would be carried on in connection with the general and regional geography and should include:—The study of topographic maps (including section drawing) as exemplified by one-inch and six-inch Ordnance Survey maps of the British Isles; the use and study of atlas maps, including the advantages and disadvantages of the principal projections employed, climate and weather maps; cartographical and disagrammatic representation of geographical data. diagrammatic representation of geographical data.

Economics (Two Papers).

I.-Industrial and Commercial History.-The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent

To include:—The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in industrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

II.—Principles of Economics.—Economics, analytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom.

To include:—The scope of economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

- (1) The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.
- (2) The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified, and an elementary knowledge of :-
 - (a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate, including an elementary knowledge of heredity, variation, and evolution.
 - (b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.
 - (c) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Fostal Membranes in the Bird and Mammal.
- (3) A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups :-

Foraminifera, Radiolaria, Protozoa :- Lobosa, Sporozoa Flagellata, Ciliata.

Cœlenterata:—Hydrozoa, Anthozoa. Platyhelmia:—Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda.

Annelida:—Oligochæta, Polychæta. Articulata:—Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida. Chordata:—Urochorda, Cephalochorda.

Craniata: Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia.

Practical Examination.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregoing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of Lepus will be substituted that of Mus), and to determine the zoological position of specimens in accordance with paragraph 3 above.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks, for inspection should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE. Scheme of Examination.

The examination will be a Pass Examination only.

Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General Principles of Biology, and (9) Geography.

(Note.—Candidates must select at least one of their four subjects

from among the first three of the foregoing list: candidates offering "General Principles of Biology," are not permitted to offer also Botany or Zoology.)

In all subjects there will be two papers of three hours each, and, except in Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, and in

Geography, there will also be a three hours practical test.

In each subject questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the

examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by

means of vivd voce questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects

taken

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Science.

Referred* candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects according to these conditions will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is

reasonably good.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date

of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science may enter for examination in one or more supplementary subjects.

EXEMPTIONS.

(Note.—No exemptions are given from this examination in whole or in part except on the results of examinations of this University.)

Candidates who have passed the Internal Intermediate Examination in Science in accordance with the conditions then in force for External Students are entitled to exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Science; and if the combination of subjects did not comply with the requirements for External Students such candidates may be exempted on passing in the necessary Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate or the Final

Examinations in Arts for External Students in or after 1920, or who have passed the corresponding examinations for Internal Students, under the conditions applicable to External Students in force since that date, with any of the following subjects:-Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry,

Botany, Geology, Geography, may claim exemption, when entering for the Intermediate Examination in Science, from examination in such of the foregoing subjects as they may have taken.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture prior to 1927 are entitled to exemption at the Intermediate Examination in Science from subjects which may be taken at the Intermediate Examination in Science be taken at the Intermediate Examination in Science.

Graduates in Engineering Science of this University, whether Internal or External, will be permitted to proceed without assing the Intermediate Examination in Science, to the B.Sc. General or Special Examination for External Students, after a lapse of two academic years from the passing of the B.Sc. Examination in Engineering.

The questions in French or in German, which by the Regulations are set for the home candidates will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

No Candidate will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of each subject.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects of the examination.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on Saturday, June 14, 1930, at 9 a.m., pursuant to Notice dated June 7, 1930.

Present:—Mr. M. M. Wedderburn, Chairman; Mr. D. W. Subasinghe; the Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos, M.L.C.; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe; Mr. F. W. Sproule; Mr. T. Amarasuriya; and Dr. S. P. Joseph

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of May 10, 1930, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Mr. D. W. Subasinghe handed in a letter relating to the condition of Elliot road, and requested that it may be inquired into.

Pursuant to notice Mr. D. W. Subasinghe moved-(i.) That a culvert be built opposite Brothers' Villa in Hirimbura Cross road.

Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe seconded, and suggested as an amendment that the Standing Committee on Municipal Works should consider and report whether the culvert should be built.

The mover agreed to the amendment, which was put to the meeting and carried.

(ii.) That the necessary steps be taken by this Council to open up the proposed road connecting Morris road and Hirimbura Cross road as early as possible. The Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded pro forma.

The Chairman suggested that the motion should be amended as follows:—That investigation be made with a view to open the proposed road connecting Morris road and Hirimbura Cross road as early as possible, and that the Chairman be asked to ascertain the probable cost of acquisition. The mover and seconder agreed to the amendment.

Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe suggested action under section 19 of the Housing Ordinance.

The motion as amended was put to the meeting and carried.

The Chairman's Administration Report for the year 1929 :- Mr. D. I. Durham moved that, in terms of section 102 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Chairman's Administration Report for the year 1929 be submitted to His Excellency the Governor. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.— Carried.

5. Report of Dr. W. G. Wickremasinghe, Medical Officer of Health, of the outbreak of plague in 1929:—Resolved that consideration be deferred until the circulation of the report is completed.

6. Report of the Special Committee on the salaries of the Municipal Staff (Annexure A to these Minutes):-

Mr. F. W. Sproule moved that Council do go into Committee to consider the report. Mr. D. W. Subasinghe seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee considered the recommendations of the Special Committee and resolved that they be approved with the following additions:-

(i.) That the maximum salary of the Second Clerk, Mr. S. G. de Alwis, be raised from Rs. 1,800 to Rs. 2,100;

(ii.) That Mr. E. H. Jansen, Superintendent of Electricity Department, be given an immediate rise to Rs. 4,200, and remain on the present scale of annual increments;

(iii.) That the Secretary's salary be raised to Rs. 6,900 so long as the post is held by Mr. Arndt.

The above recommendations to take effect from July 1, 1930.—Recommendations (i.) and (ii.) were unanimous, (iii.) was carried by 6 votes to 2.

Council resumed, and the Chairman moved that the recommendations of the Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. D. W. Subasinghe seconded.—Carried.

13: In accordance with the resolution of Council of May 8, 1930, the Chairman stated that there has been a distinct improvement in the Accountant's work. He proposed to report again after the end of the year.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works, Finance and Assessment, and Markets and Sanitation of May 24, 1930, were laid

before the Council:-

14. Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of May 24, 1930.

(2) To consider the following estimates:—(a) Rs. 350 for building two D. B. scavenging carts.—(i.) Recommended. (ii.) Resolved that the width of the carts be reduced by 6 in. to 9 in. (b) Rs. 800 for procuring two road rollers.—Recommended. If the Chairman can get the loan of a steam roller only one bullock roller should be procured. (c) Rs. 475 for building a room of galvanized iron sheets for storing night soil buckets.—Recommended that the room be built with brick walls and tiled roof at a cost not exceeding Rs. 750. (d) To approve the construction of a bus stand at the railway station end of the small esplanade, at an approximate cost of Rs. 750.—Approved and recommended. (4) To consider Mr. M. S. Gooneratna's complaint re

(4) To consider Mr. M. S. Gooneratna's complaint re damage caused to his boundary wall.—Recommended that, although no damage has been done to the wall and there is no likelihood of any damage being done, where the founda-

tion is exposed it should be protected.

(5) To consider 9 applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed, the services at No. 21, Havelock road and No. 177, China Carden Middle road, being charged Rs. 2 per quarter for trade purposes.

(6) Water service to St. Aloysius College.—Recommended that, as the services to all the other large educational boarding establishments are now metered, the service to

St. Aloysius College should also be metered.

(7) To consider the question of flushing the drains at the Bazaar:—The Chairman explained the difficulty of using a hose in flushing the drains.—Recommended that, as an experiment, two connections with stop cocks from the main to the drains on the land side be provided.

(8) To consider tenders for a new engine for the Power Station:—(i.) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Finance. (ii.) Recommended that Messrs. Crossley Bros. & Co.'s tender for Rs. 14,939 be accepted.

(9) To consider letter No. F. P. 29 of May 10, 1930, from

(9) To consider letter No. F. P. 29 of May 10, 1930, from the Director of Electrical Undertakings, requesting payment of a sum of Rs. 5,592 28, being departmental charges for services rendered in connection with the extension of the Power House.—Recommended that the charge be paid.

(10) To consider the question of the inclusion of bungalows under the agreement recently arrived at for the lighting of St. Aloysius College and connected institutions: The feeling of the Committee is that bungalows should not be included under the agreement.

(11) To consider an application from Apprentice I. K. E. Gunewardena, Switchboard Attendant, to be paid for his services.—Recommended that the apprentice be paid 50 cents per diem as from June 1, 1930.

(12) Insurance of the Power House.—Recommended that the insurance of the Power House for Rs. 150,000 be

renewed.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

Wards 2 and 3.—Recommended.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Finance and Sanitation (meeting together) of May 24, 1930.

The Committees agreed that a full time Medical Officer should be appointed, and that the choice lay between the local applicants and Dr. A. C. Das Gupta, who has the D.P.H. A ballot was taken, and the Committee were unanimously in favour of Dr. Arndt. (ii.) Recommended that Dr. Arndt be appointed.

The Chairman moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committees be adopted. Mr. D. W. Subasin he seconded.

Mr. T. Amarasuriya moved, as an amendment, that the recommendation of the Standing Committees be not

adopted, and that Dr. Das Gupta, who has the D.P.H. qualification be appointed. Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe

The amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost by 7 votes to 1. The Chairman did not vote. original motion was then put to the meeting and carried by votes to 1.

Mr. J. E. Perera moved that the appointment should be on one year's probation. The Hon. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded.—Carried.

ANNEXURE A.

Report of the Special Committee on Salaries of the Municipal Staff.

This Committee was appointed on March 8, 1930, to consider the applications of Municipal Officers for increase

of salary, and report to Council.

The present Salaries Scheme was passed by the Council in June, 1927, and is of too recent a date to appear to need revision. But the scheme was not popular, for it did not come up to expectation and the present expression of discontent is probably the result of the publication of the Government Salaries Recommendations, for practically every officer has memorialized the Council for increase of After careful consideration we are of opinion that in some grades of the service the existing rates of pay need revision, while the pay of individual officers is, in many cases, less than it should be; and we make the following recommendations with regard to (1) the rate of pay to be attached to the several posts (2) the immediate rise to individual officers.

(1) Accountant.—The salary was Rs. 1,800—90—2,400 up to June, 1928, when it was increased by Rs. 600 for additional work in connection with the accounts of the Electricity Department, the increase being payable by that

Department.

We recommend that (1) the maximum be raised to Rs. 3,600 by 20 annual increments of Rs. 90; (2) the present holder of the post, who has served the Council for 22 years and is now 44 years of age, be given an immediate

rise of Rs. 120 to bring his salary up to Rs. 2,880.
(2) Shroff.—The salary was increased in 1928 by Rs. 300 payable by the Electricity Department. His present maximum is therefore Rs. 2,100 which we consider ade-The future salary may be considered, when the

post falls vacant.

The Shroff has asked for an assistant, owing to the increase of work in his Department; and we recommend the appointment of an Assistant Shroff on Rs. 30 per month, for whom the Shroff must be responsible. The present for whom the Shroff must be responsible. The present allowance of Rs. 120, to enable the Shroff to provide a substitute when he is on leave, should be discontinued if the Assistant Shroff is appointed.

The payment to the Accountant, Shroff, and Secretary on Electricity Account, although treated as "allowance was voted as increase of salary and is pensionable. The salaries of these officers are therefore treated accordingly.

(3) Clerical Service.—We recommend that Grade II. should be discontinued on the retirement of the Second Clerk and all officers in the Clerical Service put on the The maximum may be increased from Rs. 1,200 to Rs. 1,500 by 12 annual increments of Rs. 60 and 4 of Rs. 75 with a halt of three years at Rs. 1,200.

The officers are recommended for immediate rises in the

statement annexed to this report.

(4) Inspectors.—No recommendation is made regarding an increase of pay; but we recommend that the Inspectors be allowed full pay leave not exceeding 6 months, to enable them to be trained, so as to entitle them to the emoluments of trained Inspectors. Leave to be granted on such conditions as the Council may determine.

(5) Manager, Health Department.—The maximum to be raised from Rs. 960 to Rs. 1,200 by 8 annual increments of Rs. 48 and 4 of Rs. 60, with a halt of three years at Rs. 960.

Bicycle allowance as at present.

(6) Inspector of Works.—We recommend a salary of Rs. 840 to Rs. 1,800 by 7 annual increments of Rs. 60 and 6 of Rs. 90, with a halt of three years at Rs. 1,260. Motor bicycle allowance as at present.

Peons, Conservancy Kanganies, Cart Shed Overseer, and Criers of the Fish Auction Shed.—The maximum to be increased from Rs. 420 to Rs. 450 by 16 annual increments

of Rs. 12 and 1 of Rs. 18.

(8) Park-keeper.—To receive annual increments of Rs. 30 instead of biennial increments of Rs. 60.

(9) Waterworks Town Overseer.—Maximum to be raised to Rs. 1,200 by 9 annual instalments of Rs. 24, 6 of Rs. 48, and 2 of Rs. 60.

(10) Turncocks and Patrols.—To receive 14 annual increments of Rs. 12 and 4 of Rs. 18 instead of 20 increments of Rs. 12.

(11) Market Master and Slaughterhouse-keeper.—The maximum to be increased from Rs. 648 to Rs. 720 by 6

annual increments of Rs. 24 and 6 of Rs. 36.

(12) Superintendent of Works.—We recommend that from January, 1932, Mr. Toussaint's annual increments be

Rs. 300 instead of Rs. 250.

(13) Superintendent of Electricity Department.-While recognizing Mr. Jansen's good services the Committee are not prepared to recommend an increase until he has served at least 5 years.

(14) The Officers of the Clerical Service have asked that in case of illness the cost of treatment in a paying ward of the hospital may be defrayed by the Council. The Committee are divided on the question of allowing this concession. If allowed, it should be to the officers themselves, not to members of their families.

We recommend that the officers mentioned in the annexed statement should be given an immediate rise. It will involve an increase under the head Personal Emoluments of Rs. 1,062 for the 6 months, July to December, 1930. The aggregate of the difference between the existing and the proposed rates of annual increments to the officers will be Rs. 222.

Daily-paid Employees of the Electricity Department.— The daily rates of pay of the following employees may be increased as shown

Assistant Engine Drivers Elaris and Ekanayaka from Rs. 2·15 to Rs. 2·30.

Assistant Engine Driver Albert from Re. 1 50 to Re. 1 65. Switchboard Attendant Jayawardena from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2 15.

Wireman G. S. de Silva from Rs. 2:35 to Rs. 2:50. Wireman W. de Silva from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2.15. Fitter James Appu from Re. 1.90 to Rs. 2. Store Cooly Francis from 75 cents to 85 cents. All other coolies an increase of 5 cents each.

The question was discussed of putting the higher paid employees on a monthly wage. We think that this may be considered at a later date as a reward for good work.

Scavenging Coolies.—Considering the unusual conditions under which both scavenging and conservancy coolies work, e.g., that a considerable number work both as scavenging and conservancy coolies and are also allowed to accept fees. for private work, we recommend that no rise should be given under the present system as they are sufficiently paid for the work they do.

We recommend that the proposed increases should take effect from July 1, 1930.
