SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1895.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: rain has helped the ploughing of fields, most of which have been sown for yala. The plants in low-lying fields sown early are thriving.

Dry grain : no cultivation, except a little kurakkan in Hewagam korale. Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce and dear generally.

Prices of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts, from Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per 1,000.

Rainfall: during the month there was sufficient rain.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: prospects of a good harvest are before us.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala harvest cultivation has commenced for this harvest. In Hapitigam korale some fields have already been sown.

Dry grain: some chenas are being prepared for cultivation in Hapitigam korale. No dry grain is cultivated in Alutkuru korale north,

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce.

Prices of staple products: rice, Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per 1,000; paddy, Re. 1.75 per bushel.

Rainfall good, but more wanted.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: fair.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: in the Pasdun korale the sowing for the yala harvest is nearly over. In the Kalutara Totamune the harvest is about one month old in some cases, and in some cases the fields are still being sown. In the Rayigam korale the fields are still being prepared for the yala harvest, this work having being delayed owing to want of rain.

Dry grain: kurakkan is being sown in the Pasdun korale. No dry grain is cultivated in the Totamunes. is very little cultivation in the Rayigam korale.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are abundant in the Rayigam korale and the Totamunes, but scarce in the Pasdun korale.

Prices of staple products: country-grown rice, Rs. 4 to Rs. 4:50 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4:50 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per 1,000

Rainfall moderate in the Totamunes and the Rayigam korale, and plentiful in the Pasdun korale.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: the prospects of the yala harvest are poor in the Rayigam korale and fair in the Totamunes and the Pasdun korale.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy: maha harvesting concluded. Crop or prospects of crop fair, except in Udunuwara, where prospects are poor owing to drought. Yala cultivation commenced in all divisions, except Uda Bulatgama, where there is no yala cultivation. Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Dry grain: yala kurakkan being sown. Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.]

Rainfall satisfactory.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1:50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1:25 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 5 per 100.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Mátalé south: the rainfall recorded for the month is 11:30 in. The yala operations have begun in most places,

but more rain is badly wanted for the progress of the yala fields.

Matalé north: the rainfall was fair in Kandapalla korale, but only sufficient to partly fill some tanks. The kanata sowing with fine grains other than kurakkan is being carried on, for which the present weather seems most favourable.

Mátalé east: kurakkan crops have been secured in all the villages with satisfactory returns. Maha fields produced a good crop in Gangala korales. The fields in Laggala Udasiyapattu have not been yet reaped, but the prospects are good.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Kotmale: maha paddy harvest being reaped, crop somewhat damaged by drought. Uda Hewaheta and Wala-

pane: paddy young, condition not satisfactory.

Dry grain: chenas are being cleared for kurakkan. Uda Hewaheta: no cultivation this month. Walapane: a fair crop gathered.

Rain: during the month there was sufficient rain.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.25 in Kotmale; in the other two divisions Re. 1.75. Kurakkan and Indian corn, Re. 1.25 and Re. 1 per bushel.

Fruits and vegetables deficient owing to dry weather.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there was rain throughout the district on the 17th, and some partial showers on the 7th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 16th, 19th, 20th, and 23rd. The rainfall registered at the Public Works Department Office, Jaffna, was 3.61 in. The wind was variable up to the 25th, and the south-west wind set in on the 26th, apparently the little

Paddy, kalapokam of 1895: threshing of paddy was continued in the Karachi, Punakari, and Pachilaippa divisions.

Dry grain crops: kurakkan, payaru, and ellu are in blossoms and in ear. Prospects middling owing to want of rain in the early part of the cultivation.

Tobacco plants were cut and cured during the month, and the crop is reported fair.

Price of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.62 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3.25 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel: varaku, Re. 1.25 per bushel; sami, Re. 1.50 per bushel: pinaddu, Rs. 3.50 per kudai.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

In some of the villages in Mantai division, where paddy crops (maha) were reaped and stacked, some of the proprietors are threshing their crops for food. In Muchali and Nanaddan pattus, as stated in the report for March, paddy crops totally failed, except in three or four villages.

Dry grain crops have helped the people a great deal during this season of distress. The paddy fields are now

being manured in some of the villages.

Paddy sells at Re. 1.50 per bushel, and kurakkan at Re. 1.25 per bushel, as in March. Rainfall during the month is 2.08 in.

Health of people improved much since the setting in of the south-west monsoon.

Health of cattle not satisfactory. In general they suffer for want of water and pasture. Murrain has broken out in Muchali north and Nanaddan west.

MULLAITTÍVU DISTRICT.

Threshing of paddy was carried on in some villages. Cutting and curing of tobacco begun. Some tobacco gardens were abandoned during the early part of the month in maritime pattus and Mulliavalai owing to scarcity of water in wells.

Prices of food articles: rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1 per bushel;

varaku, 75 cents per bushel.

There were refreshing showers of rain about the middle of the month, and the wind sometimes blew strongly from the south-west.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

Constant slight rain. Kalapokam paddy and kurakkan over. Idaipokam nearly ripening. Crop saved by rain during month.

Gingelly in a few last year's chenas in plants; prospects very good. Paddy cheaper than last month; kurakkan the same price.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy: the yala sowing is now over in all the pattus, and the young crops look promising, there having been a seasonable fall of rain of about 7 in.

Dry grain: sowing of amu and karakkan is also over. Mederi is being sown, but in limited extent.

Miscellaneous: breadfruit and jak are scarce; sweet potatoes and vegetables are plentiful; cocoanut, too, is plentiful, and price per thousand on an average is Rs. 30.

Prices of staple products: rice is from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3:50 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1:50 per bushel; mederi, Rs. 2; amu, Re. 1:25; kurakkan, Re. 1:50; breadfruit, Rs. 4 per hundred; jakfruit, Rs. 20 per hundred; sweet potatoes, Re. 1:25 per cwt.; plantain bunches, Rs. 25 per hundred; cucumber, Rs. 3 per hundred; pumpkins Rs. 15 per hundred. Public health on the whole satisfactory, and better than it was: dysentery still hangs about, and also some cases

of fever; a few cases of chickenpox and measles also occurred in the Four Gravets and Akmimana.

Cattle: healthy, no disease.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Magam pattu: maha paddy crop in the western walakada has already been harvested; yala cultivation commenced. The crop of second maha at Tissa is being reaped, and reported to be good. The crop of Magama is young, and is expected to be good.

West Gruwa pattu: the few showers which fell during the month revived the dying paddy crop. The crops of lands under the Udukiriwila tank are fairly good. The prospects of land dependent on other irrigation works and the rainfall have been reported to be meagre. The ripe crops were damaged owing to flood caused by the rain in the interior.

Dry grain: with the recent showers sowing commenced.

Prices of staple products: rice, is Rs. 3.60 to Rs. 4 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1.52 to Re. 1.75; mederi, Re. 1 per bushel; amu, Re. 1 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; Indian corn, 50 cents per 100 pods.; breadfruit, Rs. 5 to Rs. 9 per 100; cocoants, Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per 1,000; pumpkins, Rs. 25 per 100; plantain bunches, Rs. 37.50 per 100; sweet potatoes, Rs. 2 per cwt.; jakfruit, Rs. 18 per 100; murunga, 25 cents per 100. Rainfall: there have been a few showers during this month.

Health: The health of the inhabitants has greatly improved.

Paddy: the crops in Beminianwila under the Walawe works are still young; not expected to give a good yield. Those in Kanuketiya Lower have been reaped, also those in the Moderagam palata, but owing to the heavy rains that fell during the month they could not have been threshed. No paddy cultivation both in the Wewgam palata and Paranagam palata.

Cocoanuts are still scarce, and the price of a hundred is Rs. 5; value of paddy per bushel, Re. 1.50.

Preparations for pasu yala cultivation being commenced.

MÁTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: cultivation retarded in Wellahoda and Gangaboda pattus owing to lateness of rain. Copious rains, however, have fallen during the last ten days of April, and operations are being vigorously pushed on. In other parts of district prospects favourable.

Dry grain: very little sown, but crops are thriving.

Prices: same as last month.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: reaping of early munmari harvest is over, and of late munmari has been commenced. Sowing of pinmari is in progress. The protracted drought in the first quarter of this year led to the entire failure of crops on 900 acres on early munmari lands, and the crops on 6,000 acres more were only saved by the rain which fell in this month. Rest of the crop of both early and later munmari on 20,000 acres escaped damage.

Dry grain: harvest was over in January and February.

Price of paddy is Re. 1 a bushel.

Rainfall: after a long drought rain commenced to fall from the 8th instant only. It came rather late, and crops on 900 acres entirely failed; others on 26,000 acres, though sayed, will not yield so well as they did last year.

The fall of rain in April was 6.67, and this, added to the floods from up-country, inundated the pinmari lands now under cultivation and damaged the seed sown and the young plants on about 1,500 acres, which require to be sown again after the flood subsides. About 6,000 acres remain to be sown.

Hoof disease has appeared in Eraur and Rukampattu. Steps are taken to stop its spread.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

The welcome rain which fell in the latter half of the month produced considerable energy throughout divisions in the preparation of land for yala cultivation. The tanks in the Wanni and Hiriyala are reported to be filling; chena prospects very favourable. Should a fair quantity of rain attend the burst of the south-west monsoon, there will be no cause for uneasiness as to food supply, but there is a deficiency of seed paddy.

The health of people and cattle has been good.

Rainfall registered at Kurunegala during April was 13:01 in. Less rain appears to have fallen in Hirivala than in other divisions.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division: Maha paddy crop has been reaped, and is being threshed. In some villages paddy is being

so wn in "kekulam." Chenas are cleared in some and fine grain, such as maneri and mun, are being sown.

Central division: paddy and fine grain crops of maha have been harvested, and the yield is reported to be 29,969 bushels; crop good. Fine grain harvested was about 2,280 bushels. Yala cultivation continues. Dewareddiri and kottiarane sown, about 600 bushels; crops good though young. About 17 bushels of fine grain cultivated thriving If rain continues cultivators intend to sow bala-wi.

Southern division: maha sowing continues. About 218 bushels paddy have been sown during the current month. Crops thrive well, as there was sufficient rain.

Total rainfall during the month 3.84 in.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Crops of late maha cultivation in Demala hatpattu being gathered; prospects moderate. Clearing of chenas for yala cultivation commenced in Demala hatpattu and Puttalam pattu. No operations in Kalpitiya division.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

Anurádhapura District.

Rainfall during the month 11:40 in. at Anuradhapura; in Nuwarakalawiya and Tamankaduwa rainfall was moderate, but not continuous, and it has not been sufficient to fill any of the village tanks. Paddy crops under some tanks have been harvested, and under some are maturing and being reaped. Condition of crop good. No tavalus. Gingelly and menderi are being sown in some chenas, and in others the seeds have germinated. Cultivation limited owing to restriction of chenas. There are a few tanks which are full, whilst the rest have about quarter or no water. In Hurulu palata scarcity of food is reported in some villages.

Cattle murrain has been reported in one village of Nuwaragam palata, two in Hurulu, and two in Taman-

kaduwa, but the disease is not spreading.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: in Kuruwiti korale the second maha crop is being harvested; weather unfavourable. In Atakalan and Kolonna korales maha cultivation is progressing; weather favourable. Recent rain has facilitated preparation of fields for yala sowing in Nawadun, Kadawatu, and Meda korales. In Kuruwiti and Kukulu korales yala crop promises well.

Dry grain: in Kuruwiti korale owitas for yala cultivation are sown, and in Nawadun korale under preparation. Yala chenas in Nawadun and Kukulu korales and in the Pannil pattu of Atakalan korale are being sown. In the Meda pattu of Atakalan korale el-wi chenas are being cleared.

No murrain among cattle.

KEGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy: ploughing operations for yala have commenced throughout the district. Godahinati already sown in

Three Korales and Lower Bulatgama.

Dry grain: chenas are being cleared for sowing hill paddy and kurakkan. Kurakkan has already been sown in parts of Beligal korale and Galboda and Kinigoda korales. Mun, gingelly, and tana have also been sown in parts of Beligal korale.

Price of paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; hill paddy, Re. 1.12 per bushel; kurakkan, 75 cents per bushel.

Rainfall registered at Ambanpitiya 18:05 in.; Ruwanwella, 22:20 in.

The district is free from cattle disease, but fever is increasing everywhere.

The weather has been unusually dry.

Maha fields ripening and in ear; prospects good. Maha paddy earlier own and maha kurakkan harvested; crops good.

Yala paddy cultivation commenced. Maha paddy harvested; crops fair

Maha paddy harvested; crops bad.

The maha harvest was very poor owing to the long drought. Several fields in Kohonsiyapattu and Asgiri korales died entirely. The fields harvested in Matale Uda-iyapattu did not suffer from want of rain on account of the hill streams, and therefore crops were good. Gampahasiya pattu fields were harvested, with satisfactory results. The chenas were all reaped, and the crops were good. The garden produce, such as cocoanuts and vegetables, fetched high prices in the market.

The tanks in Kandapalla and Inawalawa were partly filled in January, which allowed of the cultivation of some fields abandoned after ploughing for want of water, and also saved the crops in several places. In Inamalawa and Wagapanaha Pallesiyapattu a plague of grasshoppers did much damage to the chenas. In Udugoda korales a plague of godawello damaged late sown fields in several places. The maha crop on the whole was fair, and best where the cultivation had begun early under the dry ploughing "kekulan" system. In Wagapanaha Pallesiyapattu the paddy crops were scanty, but the chenas have given the cultivators a good supply of corn.

The paidy fields and chenas gave their usual supply of grain unaffected

by the protracted drought.

Kurakkan harvested : paddy plants 2% months old.

Kurakkan crop is being reaped-\(\frac{3}{4}\) good \(\frac{1}{4}\) bad, owing to want of rain. Paddy cultivation of the maha commenced.

Maha harvest reaped $-\frac{7}{8}$ good, $\frac{1}{8}$ bad, owing to drought. Chenas are being cleared for kurakkan.

Want of rain during the quarter very much interfered with dry grain sowing in paddy lands. The sowing on garden lands was however carried on as usual, and the prospects are reported to be fair. Paddy was reaped and threshed throughout the district during the quarter. The crops of Punakari, Karachi Islands, Valiganiam east and west, and Tenmaradchi were reported good, while in the other divisions the crops on high lands were indifferent owing to want of rain, and those on low lands and lands watered from wells and ponds were said to be fair.

In January there was no rain except a few slight showers in some of the divisions, and a heavy rain at Jaffna on the 7th. In February there was no rain in any part of the district, and the weather was dry by day with heavy dews at nights. In March there was again a total absence of

rain, and the weather was exceedingly hot.

Railway Probationers' Examination.
