WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," as amended by section 2 of Ordinance No. 8 of 1924, it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Southern Circuit, twice at least at Galle and such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Galle on April 27 and September 15 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned at Tangalla, a place included within the said Southern Circuit:

Now, therefore, know Ye that We, the Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Tangalla in the said Southern Circuit on or about Monday, June 15, 1931.

Special Conditions.

1. Where natural boundaries do not exist the purchaser will be required to demarcate with 3 ft. lines the area leased to him according to the instructions of the Divisional Forest Officer.

2. The Range Forest Officer, will periodically measure up all timber which has been collected at the wayside depôt, and payment for such timber will be required within seven days. On receipt of payment removal permits will be issued by the Range Forest Officer to the lessee according to his requirements, or to persons

duly authorized by him, after it has been stamped with a special stamp by or in the presence of the Range Forest Officer. Timber may be removed in the log or as sawn timber.

3. The lessee shall, if called upon to do so by the Divisional Forest Officer deposit a sum or sums of money as fixed by the Divisional Forest Officer from which the amounts due from time to time may be credited to revenue in the event of default by the lessee to make payment when due for extracted material.

4. The Conservator of Forests may remit or reduce the purchase rate on timber, which in the opinion of the Divisional Forest Officer is felling waste, defective, or of inferior quality.

5. The lessee is at liberty to make arrangements to supply Government Departments with timber either in the log or sawn and the Forest Department is prepared to act as a medium between the Government Departments and the lessee.

6. On the occurrence of serious irregularities the lessee will be liable to have his security forfeited and his agreement cancelled while he will be liable to be fined for smaller irregularities.

7. The lessee will be required to cut and remove sound timber of all species enumerated in Clause 10, above under Class I. having a girth measurement of 3 ft. and over at 4 ft. height from ground, without confining himself to any particular species. On failure to observe this conditions the Divisional Forest Officer shall have the power to cancel and close down the agreement with forfeiture of security and with such other penalties as the Divisional Forest Officer may deem fit in the circumstances.

8. VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 11, 1931.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 159 (12 Burghers, 97 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 25 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1931, viz., 282,870) was 29.3, as against 26.2 in the preceding week, 34.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 125 (11 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 20 Moors, 2 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 23.0, as against 21.9 in the previous week, 28.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 125 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 18 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of still births registered during the week was 10.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena South and Maradana South and 1 each in Kotahena North and Slave Island, as against 13 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 2 each in New Bazaar and Slave Island and 1 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena South, as against 9 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Maradana North and 1 each in Maradana hospitals and Maradana East, as against 7 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Two deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Pettah and St. Paul's, as against nil in the previous week and 1 the weekly average for last year.

5. Nine deaths from *Debility* were registered, 4 each from *Enteritis* and *Tetanus*, 3 from *Worms*, 2 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Dysentery*, and *Infantile Convulsions*, 1 each from *Suicide*, *Homicide*, *Puerperal Septicaemia*, and *Accidents*, and 57 from *Other Causes*.

6. **Reported Cases.**—Twenty-nine cases of *Chickenpox*, 9 of *Enteric Fever*, and 2 of *Plague* were reported during

the week, as against 13, 6, and nil, respectively, of the preceding week.

3. The block is estimated to contain the following timber:—Hora, 2,300 c. ft., malaboda, 340 c. ft. and firewood 1,000 c. yds.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on January 17, 1931, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- (a) Statement of receipts and Disbursements from close of 1929 to December, 1930, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress Report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for January, 1931.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of January, 1931.
- (e) The reservoir readings for January, 1931.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during January, 1931.

4. Petitions :—Mr. W. A. B. Soysa presented petitions from (1) Mudaliyar A. W. Athukorala stating that the Council had not reduced the annual value of premises No. 959, Peradeniya road, although he had reduced the monthly rental thereof by Rs. 10 and notified the fact to the Municipality, and complaining that the notice of assessment had not been served on him, as the owner of the premises.

(2) Mr. Awata Perumal, the Trustee of the Pullayar Kovil, regarding the application made by Mr. Balasubramaniam Kurukul, the High Priest of the Kovil, offering to repair the drain in the vicinity of the Kovil for the estimate for Rs. 3,500 sanctioned by the Council, and undertaking to accept liability for the maintenance of the drain thereafter.

Mr. Geo. E. de Silva presented a petition from Mr. K. Kamaldeen applying for a mutton stall in the Public Market. The Chairman undertook to look into the matters referred to in the several petitions.

5. Correspondence :—(1) Letter No. U 383A/29 of January 22, 1931, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, stating that Government is of opinion that the Hunasgiriya Water Supply Scheme should be deferred until the financial situation improves, and that it has therefore been decided to defer the preparation of detailed plans and estimates for the present—Read.

(2) Letter No. U 9/30 of February 12, 1931, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary stating that His Excellency the Governor has ordered that the Draft Ordinance amending section 115 (1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910, so as to provide for the levy of a Conservancy rate, should be withdrawn, on reconsideration of the matter in Executive Council.—Read.

(3) Letter dated January 29, 1931, from the Secretary, Ceylon Fire Insurance Association, stating that his Committee has decided that the rates for insurances in Kandy should be placed on the same basis as the rates for Colombo.—Read.

(4) Petition from certain residents of Peradeniya road, between the Pullayar Kovil and Good Shepherd Convent premises begging that the stand-pipe near the Tamil Home, which has been closed, be re-opened as they are put into great inconvenience and difficulty in getting water.—Read.

Resolved that the stand-pipe referred to be re-opened.

(5) Letter dated December 20, 1930, from the Hony. General Secretary, Kandy Social Service League, forwarding a scheme for the licensing of beggars, for the consideration of Council.—Read.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. Ismail asked :—(1) Is it true that the proposed Town Survey will not be legally valid ? (2) If so, what does the Council propose to do in this connection.

The Chairman replied :—I have had some conversation with the Superintendent of Surveys on this subject, as a result of which I am addressing the Surveyor-General. I will lay the matter further before the Council on hearing from him.

7. Pursuant to notice Ratwatte Adigar moved :—That the Municipal Engineer be asked to draw up an estimate to build a pavilion at Bogambara for the use of the Public at a cost not exceeding Rs. 2,500." Mr. Geo. E. de Silva seconded.—Carried unanimously.

8. Papers *re* the proposal to lease premises No. 81, Trincomalee street for a period of five years for the Municipal Free Library.

Resolved that the lease be entered into, as proposed.

9. To obtain a vote for Rs. 260 to meet the cost of almirah for the Municipal Court.

Resolved that the vote be allowed.

10. To consider a revised scale of charges for the supply of electrical energy.—Considered.

Resolved that the papers be circulated to the Council and the matter brought up at the next Meeting.

11. To sanction the transfer of a sum of Rs. 1,481.42 from the saving of Rs. 5,263.45 on the vote for "Oil Waste" to meet the excess of expenditure over the estimate in the vote for "Fuel" applied for by the Municipal Electrical Engineer.

Resolved that the transfer of the sum, as proposed, be sanctioned.

12. Report of the Special Committee on the definition of Commercial and Residential Areas.—Tabled.

Ratwatte Adigar proposed that the report be adopted. Mr. Geo. E. de Silva seconded.—Carried.

13. To approve the proposal to have a rickshaw stand at the top of Torrington road.

Resolved that the proposal be approved.

14. To consider the question of the conversion of Stalls Nos. 23, 24, and 25 Public Market into beef and mutton stalls.

Resolved that the Medical Officer of Health be asked to report on the desirability of converting these stalls into mutton stalls only.

15. To confirm Mr. D. Seneviratne in his appointment as Municipal Veterinary Officer.

Resolved that Mr. Seneviratne be confirmed.

16. To sanction the leave in excess of six weeks granted to the following officers :—

17. To obtain a vote for an Address of Welcome to the Governor-elect on his arrival in Kandy.

Resolved that a vote of Rs. 50 be allowed for the purpose.

18. To obtain a further vote of Rs. 25 from savings under the Head "Car Park in Peradeniya road," for the survey, with spot levels, of the playground in Katugastota with a view to its conversion into a Car Park.

Resolved that the further vote asked for be allowed.

19. Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on January 27, 1931.

(1) Papers *re* halting of 'buses outside specified halting places.—Recommended that prosecutions be not entered in these cases.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on January 27, 1931.

(2) Papers *re* the auction of Stall No. 23 Public Market.—Recommended to accept the bid for Rs. 15, if the stall is not required for beef or mutton.

(3) To sanction the provision of a barbed wire fence at a cost of Rs. 2,400 for the land acquired for the purpose of a burial ground at Mavilmada.—Recommended, if posts are concrete, subject to approval of rates.

(4) Papers *re* the licensing of Kapok as a Dangerous and Offensive Trade.—Recommended that licensing be done according to the discretion of the Medical Officer of Health.

(5) Papers *re* the proposed transfer of Stalls Nos. 37 and 38 and Space No. 23 Public Market.—Recommended joint licence between the two applicants at Rs. 150 for all three Stalls.

(6) Letter dated January 9, 1931, from P. A. Albert asking that the premium demanded for the transfer of half share of Space No. 83 Small Market be waived.—Recommended the reduction of premia to Rs. 50 and Rs. 25 for the present for Public Market Stalls and Spaces respectively, and that P. A. Albert be asked to pay Rs. 25 for the transfer in question.

- (11) Petition dated December 15, 1930, from the holders of Public Market Stalls and Spaces begging that they be allowed an extension of time by one month to pay their monthly rents.—Recommended that as the rents have been reduced it is regretted that the application cannot be allowed.

- (12) Report dated January 7, 1931, from the Municipal Engineer regarding the appointments of Waterworks Inspector and Barrel Drain Overseer.—Recommended that if other local applicants are proposed to be appointed, the Council be consulted before such appointments are made in future.
- (13) Estimate for Rs. 160 from the Municipal Engineer for weather shades for the ten Municipal notice boards for posters and advertisements.—Recommended to pass the estimate, but that the Committee considers it is excessive, and suggests that some of the notice boards are not exposed to the weather and need not be provided with shades.
- (14) Estimate for Rs. 4,200 from the Municipal Engineer for constructing side drain along Peradeniya road.—Recommended that this work be postponed.
- (15) Application from Mr. A. R. Swaris for a private water service to premises Nos. 346 and 346A, Peradeniya road.—Recommended.
- (16) Estimate for Rs. 140 from the Municipal Engineer for re-building a portion of the boundary wall of the Muslim cemetery at Mahaiyawa.—Recommended.
- (17) Papers *re* the laying of water services to the different religious sections of the Mahaiyawa cemetery.—Recommended to supply a pipe and tap to the Buddhist section at a cost of Rs. 360.

- (22) Details of the work proposed to be carried out with the vote of Rs. 2,000 provided in the Budget for Service mains along Lady Havelock's Drive.—Recommended that this work be postponed, Mr. de Silva dissenting.
- (23) To authorize the acceptance of a sum of Rs. 193·72 from Mr. P. B. Nugawela, half of the Council's claim against him in respect of electricity dues.—Recommended.
- (24) To approve of the destruction and sale of certain articles in the electrical stores.—Recommended, subject to verification by the Chairman and the Municipal Electrical Engineer.
- (25) To accept the tenders recommended by the Municipal Electrical Engineer for the scrap materials in electrical stores, and to authorize the writing off of a sum of Rs. 3,662·98 representing the difference between the book values of the materials and the prices offered by tenderers.—Recommended, subject to verification by the Chairman and the Municipal Electrical Engineer.
- (26) Report dated December 22, 1930, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer on the subject of effecting economies in public lighting on bright moonlight nights.—Recommended to leave the matter to the discretion of the Municipal Electrical Engineer.
- (27) To sanction the expenditure of a sum of Rs. 193·50, half the estimated cost of Rs. 387 for laying a new service main to the "Octagon," Kandy.—Recommended.
- (28) To obtain a vote of Rs. 67·60 on account of the expenditure incurred in erecting a new lamp standard at the junction of Brownrigg and Hill streets.—Recommended.
- (29) Letter No. 1,773 of December 4, 1930, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer asking for permission to shift his staff to the room previously used for storage batteries and to clean office furniture, the cost to be met out of the unexpended balance of Rs. 539·77 in the Management Sundries Account Vote, and also applying for a special vote of Rs. 150 on Capital Account for making alterations to the desks used by the staff.—Recommended.

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted with the exception of (2), (3), (8), (10), and (13).

In regard to (2), it was decided to await the report of the Medical Officer of Health on the conversion of this stall and stalls Nos. 24 and 25 referred to in item 14 above, into mutton stalls only.

In regard to (3), it was resolved that the estimate be referred to the Works Committee.

In regard to (8), it was resolved to retain the existing assessments during this year, and to consider the matter with the 1932 Budget.

In regard to (10), it was resolved that the matter be deferred for consideration with the proposals for the lease of the produce.

Item (13) was passed, subject to the approval of rates by the Council.

20. Papers *re* application to effect alterations to the Queen's Hotel.—Resolved that the papers be circulated to the Council.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on March 21, 1931, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated March 17, 1931.

Present :—Mr. R. H. Whitehorn, Chairman ; Ratwatte Adigar ; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva ; Dr. G. P. Hay ; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail ; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake ; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa ; Dr. W. E. de Silva ; and Mr. H. P. G. Young.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on February 21, 1931, having been previously submitted, to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1930, to January, 1931, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- Health Officer's report for February, 1931.
- Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of February, 1931.
- The reservoir readings for February, 1931.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during February, 1931.

4. Petitions :—Ratwatte Adigar presented petitions from (1) N. M. P. Pandara Nadar asking for a permit to open a mutton stall at premises No. 19, King street, Kandy, to serve the Hindu residents of the town, and a memorial forwarded to him by the petitioner signed by certain residents of the town in support of his request.

(2) S. M. Segu Abdul Cader asking for permission to erect a dwarf wall to enclose the Municipal Rice Granary at Mahaiyawa, occupied by him.

Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake presented petitions from (1) Mr. M. F. Ibrahim, the late Collector of Market daily rents, asking that the collection of fees at the motor bus stands in Kandy be entrusted to him.

(2) The holders of temporary boutiques in the market grounds, at which tea kiosks are conducted, asking that they be allowed to continue the tea kiosk business during the present depression, as the closure thereof would result in loss and hardship to them.

(3) Mr. S. Abdul Raheman asking for a beef stall in the public market to sell meat at prices cheaper than those now obtaining.

Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake also presented a letter from Mr. E. F. de Silva, the Honorary Secretary of the Kandy Rate-payers' Association, supporting Abdul Raheman's request for a beef stall.

Mr. Geo. E. de Silva presented a petition from Mr. J. R. Juhari complaining that his household goods were thrown out from the model tenement occupied by him, without notice to him, in his absence, for failure to pay the rent due on this tenement.

The Chairman undertook to look into the matters referred to in the several petitions.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. de Silva moved:—(a) That the present rates levied by this Council under the following headings—Consolidated rates, Conservancy, Light, Police, be reduced by 2 per cent. during the next 9 months in this year; and that the Chairman be requested to effect retrenchment in the various departments in order to meet the present crisis.

The Chairman ruled out the motion as being not in order, in view of the fact that the Council had already passed a resolution in October, 1930, to continue the existing rates and taxes for 1931, and the six months' time required under by-law 19A for amending the resolution had not elapsed.

Pursuant to notice Mr. de Silva moved:—(b) That the Municipal Engineer be requested to prepare an estimate with a view to putting a number of signboards at the important spots in the town indicating the sides of the road pedestrians should keep to. Ratwatte Adigar seconded.

Mr. de Silva withdrew this motion on the Chairman undertaking to consult the Director of Public Works and the Superintendent of Police, Central Province, Kandy, as to the advisability of introducing measures to secure the end contemplated in the resolution, and to submit a report to the Council thereafter.

6. To sanction the revised scale of charges for the supply of electrical energy as detailed in the Chairman's memorandum dated February 26, 1931.

Resolved that the revised scale of charges detailed in the Chairman's memorandum dated February 26, 1931, be sanctioned.

7. Papers *re* prices of beef and mutton at the Kandy Public Market.

(1) Resolved that the licensees of beef and mutton stalls in the Public Market be notified that they would be expected to sell beef and mutton at prices not exceeding the maximum prices, as stated to the Chairman, at his inquiry on February 28, 1931, viz. 1st quality beef, 30 cents; ordinary beef without bones, 28 cents; ordinary beef with bones, 25 cents; mutton, 80-90 cents; and that the licensees shall be required to exhibit in their stalls, daily, the prices of beef and mutton.

(2) Resolved also, Mr. de Silva dissenting, that no further beef and mutton stalls be established for the present, and that the results of the steps decided upon in the 1st resolution be reported upon in two months.

8. To obtain a vote of Rs. 100 for the expenses towards the King's Birthday Celebrations.

Resolved that a vote of Rs. 100 be allowed accordingly.

9. To waive the sum of Rs. 1,336.73, appearing as due from Messrs. M. Ismail & Co., as cost of construction of back-lane in respect of premises 4/1, Ward street.

Resolved that the amount in question be waived.

10. To sanction leave in excess of six weeks granted to the following officers of the Electricity Department:—

J. H. Ratnaike, 9½ days; H. M. Siyatu, 20 days.

Resolved that the excess leave be sanctioned.

11. Recommendations of Standing Committees.

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on February 21, 1931.

(1) Letter dated February 9, 1931, from Messrs. Liesching & Lee stating that their clients, Messrs. M. Ismail & Co., Kandy, are prepared to pay Rs. 231.70, the cost of construction of back-lane in respect of premises 107, Colombo street, provided that these premises are served by the back-lane.—Recommended to press the Council's claim.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on February 21, 1931.

(2) Estimates from the Municipal Engineer for Rs. 2,755 and Rs. 385 for improvements to the Septic Tanks at Torrington and Ellagalla roads respectively.—Recommended, as no other course appears available.

(3) Letter dated January 7, 1931, from Mr. S. K. Pitche asking that Space No. 31, Small Market, of which he is the present licensee, be transferred in favour of his nephew, Mr. A. Cader Mohideen, and that a nominal premium of Rs. 10 be charged for the transfer.—Recommended on reduced premium of Rs. 25.

(4) Conditions for the issue of licences for Poultry Yards.—Recommended with the omission of condition (7).

(5) Petition dated December 23, 1930, from certain tea kiosk keepers in Peradeniya road, who trade in sundry goods in their kiosks, begging that the notice served on them to close their tea kiosks be withdrawn, and they be allowed to continue the dual trades, as closing their kiosks during the present depression would entail much hardship and loss.—Recommended that the rule should be observed.

(6) Papers regarding the insanitary condition of the Ambalams in Peradeniya road.—Recommended that the only possible course is to provide latrines and caretakers.

(7) Papers *re* the necessity for having a trained resident midwife to serve Watarentenne, Dodanwela, Leula, and Halloluwa villages.—Recommended, payment of Rs. 2.50 for each case being made on a certificate by the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee that the Midwife did attend the case and that the parties were too poor to pay.

(8) Letter dated January 28, 1931, from P. A. Ismail Lebbe, the licensee of the Vegetable Stall in the Katugastota Market, stating that he is prepared to vacate the stall as he is continuing to lose on the business, and asking that the licence fees he paid during the last five years in respect of this Stall be refunded to him in consideration of the losses he has sustained.—Recommended that no refund can be made, and that he can vacate the Stall if he wishes, on proper notice.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on February 21, 1931.

(9) To sanction the refund of Rs. 100, four months' rent paid by Mr. N. M. Abdul Rahiman for Beef Stall No. 2, Mahaiyawa, during the period it was used by the Council as a Store-room for building materials, &c., and to fix the rent of the mutton stall at Mahaiyawa, in the occupation of Mr. Rahiman, at Rs. 15 per mensem, subject to a 10 per cent. deduction during the depression.—Recommended.

(10) Supplemental Budget No. 2 of 1930.—Recommended.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on March 6, 1931.

(11) Papers *re* damage to Mr. A. V. Perera's land at Dodanwela.—Recommended that the claims for damages and for compensation for land cannot be entertained.

(12) Letter of January 29, 1931, from Messrs. Liesching & Lee complaining of offensive smells from the drain between their premises and those lately occupied by Messrs. Khaja Nainar & Co.—Recommended estimate for Rs. 64 for improvements.

(13) Papers *re* proposed water service to premises 641, Peradeniya road, belonging to Mr. N. E. Weerasooria.—Recommended a 1-inch pipe to remain the Council's property; the difference in cost between the ¾-inch pipe and the 1-inch pipe to be met by the Council.

(14) Application for water services to premises (1) 246, Peradeniya road; (2) 4A-12E, Colombo road.—Recommended to allow the service in respect of the first, and to disallow the second.

(15) Estimate for Rs. 57 for 4 "Trespass" Notice Boards for the Mavilmada and Nittawela Trenching grounds.—Recommended.

(16) Papers re drainage in the vicinity of the Pullayar Kovil.—Recommended that the money voted will be paid to Mr. K. Balasubramaniam Kurukal, the High Priest of the Kovil, on the work being completed to the Council's satisfaction and if he agrees to undertake maintenance thereafter.

The Council to be absolved from any future liability for maintenance or damages to the land above.

(17) Estimate for Rs. 170 for replacing the decks of the two barges on the lake.—Recommended.

(18) Application for water service to the Kandy Lawn Club.—Recommended on usual terms.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on March 6, 1931.

(19) Papers re charges for hire of high voltage and illumination lamps. Proposals laid down on Circular No. 179/EE11 of February 27, 1931.—Recommended.

(20) Estimate for Rs. 434.90 for providing lights for the cooly line latrines at Mahaiyawa.—Recommended.

(21) Papers re claim against O. Abdulla Saibo—D. C., Kandy, case No. 37,081.—Recommended to write off Rs. 148.50.

The recommendations were adopted with the exception of (2), (5), (6), and (16). In regard to (2), it was resolved that the papers be referred to the Works Committee. In regard to (5), it was resolved (the Chairman and Mr. Young dissenting) to allow the concession to carry on dual trades till the end of this year, except in cases where grain is sold. In regard to (6), it was resolved to instruct nuisance watchers to see to the sanitary condition of the ambalams, as part of their duties. In regard to (16), it was resolved to delete clause 2 of the recommendation, and to substitute therefor the following:—"The Council admits no present or future liability."

12. Application from the Honorary Secretary, Ceylon Kennel Club, for the use of Victoria Esplanade, opposite the Maligawa, for a show which the club proposes to hold in Kandy on April 25, 1931.

Resolved to inform the Club that the Council regret that the site proposed is not suitable for a Dog Show, and to inquire whether a portion of Bogambara grounds would not suit their purposes.

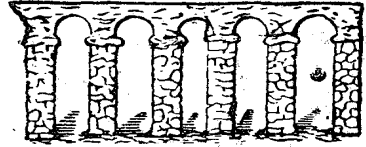
