THE CEYLON (STATE COUNCIL ELECTIONS)
ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1931.

"THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE, No. 13 OF 1896."

THE following rules and orders made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages," as amended by Ordinance No. 7 of 1897, for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage and festival where special precautions have been and are necessary, are published for general information, in lieu of the rules promulgated annually for several years.

RULES.

1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama Esala festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and it is hereby limited to fifteen days, namely, July 16 to July 30, 1931. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.

2. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads they have to travel.

3. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama—

- (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices;
- (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims;
- (c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims;
- (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims.
- (e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

4. For the purpose of these rules camp shall mean the area within half a mile of the Maha Dewale in every direction.

5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer, or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

6. Any person bringing any cattle or cart bulls within one-quarter of a mile of the camp without a permit from the Supervising Officer or any person authorized by him to issue such permits shall be deemed guilty of an offence. The issue of such permit shall be subject to compliance by the permit-holder with such conditions as may be imposed by the Supervising Officer for the purpose of enforcing sanitation and maintaining the health of the camp.

7. Any person exposing commodities of any description for sale in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp shall be deemed guilty of an offence, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence, by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

8. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or failing to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting or assisting in the concealment of such disease, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

10. All persons shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any person declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

11. No person shall construct any booth or extend any building so as to encroach on the main streets of the camp without the previous sanction of the Supervising Officer.

THE CEYLON (STATE COUNCIL) ORDER IN
COUNCIL, 1931.

IT is hereby notified that, in pursuance of Article 39 (2) of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, the Governor has been pleased to prescribe the rules of procedure given in the schedule hereto for the transaction of business concerning subjects or functions in the charge of Officers of State and to order that the said rules shall come into operation upon the first meeting of the State Council.

SCHEDULE.

1. To enable Officers of State to perform their duties in connection with subjects and functions of Government in their charge they will exercise general control over the Departments indicated in the Schedule at the end of this Statement and each Officer of State will be responsible for preparing the annual and supplementary estimates of the Departments under his general control.

2. Before a Head of a Department which is under the general control of an Officer of State carries out any executive act or makes any recommendation to the Officer of State which affects the functions of any other Department, he shall, unless otherwise directed by his Officer of State, consult the Head of the Department likely to be affected.

3. Whenever it appears that the subject matter of any question under consideration by any Officer of State cannot be dissociated from the administration of subjects or functions of Government allocated to another Officer of State or to any Executive Committee, the Officer of State should consult the Officer of State, or (through its Chairman) the Executive Committee concerned.

4. The normal channel of communication between an Officer of State and a Department under the general control of another Officer of State or of any Executive Committee is through the Officer of State or Minister concerned, and not direct to a Head of a Department or other executive officer. An Officer of State may, however, in respect of the subjects and functions of administration allocated to him correspond direct with, and utilize the services of, any Government Agent or of any Head of a Department by whom such subjects or functions are administered. Heads of Departments under the control of one Officer of State who also administer subjects or functions which are allocated to another Officer of State or to an Executive Committee may, in respect of such subjects or functions, correspond direct with the Officer of State or Executive Committee in charge of those subjects or functions. Government Agents may also correspond with an Officer of State through the Heads of Departments concerned, if any, in respect of subjects and functions allocated to that Officer of State.

5. Requests for drafts of legislative measures required by any Officer of State should be addressed to the Legal Secretary, or to the Attorney-General until the Governor shall appoint a person to be Legal Secretary. Such requests should not be made until it has been decided, in principle, that legislation is desirable and should be in all cases accompanied by a memorandum containing the fullest possible instructions for the guidance of the Legal Draftsman in the preparation of the draft required.

6. An Officer of State should communicate with Departments under his general control through the Heads thereof and should not communicate with any officer in such Department except through such Heads. Officers in these Departments, other than Heads of Departments, should not communicate with Officers of State.

7. Officers of State and Judges of the Supreme Court correspond direct with the Governor. District Judges, Commissioners of Requests and Police Magistrates correspond direct with the Legal Secretary (or with the Attorney-General until the Governor shall appoint a person to be the Legal Secretary) and with the Attorney-General in regard to his statutory duties.

8. Heads of Departments may correspond direct with each other in respect of the subjects or functions administered by their Departments. Proposals of a Head of a Department involving reference to the Heads of other Departments should be fully discussed with them before the proposals are placed before Officers of State. The fact that this has been done should be made clear in the correspondence.

9. It is the duty of each Head of Department who is under the general control of an Officer of State to give effect to the directions of such Officer of State. It is also his duty in respect of the subjects and functions of Government administered by his Department, to assist other Officers of State, Executive Committees and Departments.

10. Where, in the opinion of an Officer of State, it is necessary to initiate disciplinary action against any officer of his Departments, the Officer of State should report the circumstances to the Chief Secretary.

11. All official papers including communications to and from Officers of State should, as far as possible, be filed in the files of the Departments concerned, to avoid the clerical labour, expense, delay and mistakes which would be caused by duplication of portion of the records for the sole use of Officers of State. An Officer of State is entitled to see any official record relating to the subjects and functions of administration in his charge, which is kept in any of the Departments under his general control.

12. Before a Head of a Department which is under the general control of an Officer of State proceeds to vary any authorized policy, or to do any administrative act which involves a question of principle not previously decided, or which is likely to cause public controversy, or any act of major importance not duly sanctioned, he shall submit the matter for the orders of his Officer of State. This procedure shall not apply to cases of sudden emergency where immediate action not duly sanctioned is essential in the interests of the public welfare before the Officer of State concerned can be consulted. The Head of Department shall report to his Officer of State at the earliest possible opportunity all such cases of immediate action whether taken by himself or by his subordinate officers acting under his authority.

13. Officers of State should inform the Governor at the earliest possible opportunity of any important event connected with the administration of subjects and functions of Government allocated to them.

14. Heads of Departments of an Officer of State should report at once to the latter any incident of a grave or important nature, which occurs in connection with the subjects or functions of Government administered under the general control of such Officer of State. Government Agents should report all such incidents occurring within their Provinces to the Officer of State concerned and also to any Head of a Department affected.

15. Departmental practice established before the commencement of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, shall, subject to any changes made by the proper authorities, continue thereafter.

16. The subjects and functions of Government assigned to each of the Officers of State shall be those mentioned in the following schedule. Where subjects or functions are specified which are not expressly mentioned in the second schedule to the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, they are included, among those assigned to the Officers of State indicated in the following schedule, by virtue of the power vested in the Governor by Article 33 of the said Order in Council.

1. To enable Executive Committees to perform their duties in connection with subjects and functions of Government in their charge, they will exercise the general control referred to in Article 39 (1) of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, over the Departments indicated in the schedule at the end of this statement and each Executive Committee will be responsible for preparing the annual and supplementary estimates of the Departments under its general control.

2. For the purposes referred to in the last preceding paragraph, Government Agents will be considered to be Heads of Departments under the general control of the Executive Committee of Home Affairs and the estimates for sub-heads in their charge will be prepared by this Executive Committee.

3. Before a Head of a Department which is under the control of an Executive Committee carries out any executive act or makes any recommendation to the Committee which affects the functions of any other Department, he shall, unless otherwise directed by his Executive Committee, consult the Head of the Department likely to be affected.

4. Whenever it appears that the subject matter of the deliberations of any Executive Committee cannot be dissociated from the administration of subjects or functions of Government allocated to an Officer of State or to another Executive Committee, the Minister should confer with the Officer of State, or the Committees concerned should, subject to any general instructions issued in this regard by the Board of Ministers, arrange joint sittings, or discussions between their respective Chairmen, before any one of the Executive Committees concerned concludes its deliberations.

5. The normal channel of communication between an Executive Committee and a Department under the general control of another Executive Committee or of any Officer of State is through the Officer of State or Minister concerned, and not direct to a Head of a Department or other executive officer. An Executive Committee may, however, in respect of the subjects and functions of administration in its charge, correspond direct with, and utilize the services of, any Government Agent or of any Head of a Department by whom such subjects or functions are administered. Heads of Departments under the control of one Executive Committee who also administer subjects or functions which are allocated to another Executive Committee or to an Officer of State, may correspond direct with the Officer of State or Executive Committee in charge of those subjects or functions. Government Agents may also correspond with any Executive Committee through the Head of the Department concerned, if any, in respect of subjects or functions allocated to that Committee. Chairmen of Local Government bodies should correspond with the Executive Committee of Local Administration through the Commissioner of Local Government.

6. Requests for drafts of legislative measures required by any Minister, after consultation with his Executive Committee, should be addressed to the Legal Secretary or to the Attorney-General until the Governor shall appoint a person to be Legal Secretary. Such requests should not be made until it has been decided, in principle, that legislation is desirable and should be in all cases accompanied by a memorandum containing the fullest possible instructions for the guidance of the Legal Draftsman in the preparation of the draft required.

7. Government Agents should prepare their diaries monthly in duplicate and send one copy to the Chief Secretary for the information of the Governor, the other to the Minister for Home Affairs.

8. Ministers correspond direct with the Governor.

9. The reports of recommendations and decisions of an Executive Committee and all correspondence on behalf of such Committee should be signed by the Chairman or with his authority by the Clerk to the Committee.

10. Ministers should communicate with Departments under the general control of their Executive Committees through the Heads thereof and should not communicate with any other officers in such Departments. Heads of Departments should communicate with their Executive Committees through Ministers, or with the authority of the latter, through the Clerks to such Committees. Officers other than Heads of Departments should not communicate with Ministers.

11. All Heads of Departments may correspond direct with each other in respect of the subjects or functions administered by their Departments. Proposals of a Head of a Department involving reference to the Heads of other Departments should be fully discussed with them before the proposals are placed before Ministers. The fact that this has been done should be made clear in the correspondence.

17. The Departments named in Column II. hereto will be under the general control of the Officers of State named in Column I. and will be administered by the Heads of Departments named in Column III.

THE CEYLON (STATE COUNCIL) ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1931.

It is hereby notified that, in pursuance of Article 39 (1) of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, the Governor has been pleased to prescribe the rules of procedure given in the schedule hereto for the transaction of business relating to subjects or functions with which Executive Committees are concerned and to order that the said rules shall come into operation with respect to any Executive Committee upon the appointment of the Chairman of that Committee to be a Minister.

12. It is the duty of each Head of Department who is under the general control of an Executive Committee to give effect to the directions of such Committee. It is also his duty, in respect of the subjects and functions of Government administered by his Department, to assist Officers of State, other Executive Committees and Departments.

13. When, in the opinion of an Executive Committee, it is necessary to initiate disciplinary action against any officer of a Department subject to its general control, the Chairman should report the circumstances to the Chief Secretary.

14. A Head of Department submitting questions for the consideration of his Executive Committee or advising on any question referred to him by his Executive Committee shall embody the salient facts, the issues involved and alternative courses of action together with his recommendations, in a written report to his Minister.

15. All official papers including communications to and from Ministers should, as far as possible, be filed in the files of the Departments concerned, to avoid the clerical labour, expense, delay and mistakes which would be caused by duplication of portion of the records for the sole use of Ministers. A Minister is entitled to see any official record relating to the subjects and functions of administration in charge of his Executive Committee, which is kept in any of the Departments under its general control. Should a member of the Committee request that any such record be given to him for perusal, the Minister should direct that the papers or files required be supplied to him, but members of the Committee should not remove such papers from the offices of the Ministry.

16. Clerks to Executive Committees shall not write minutes on official papers passing between Ministers and Heads of Departments.

17. Before a Head of a Department which is under the general control of an Executive Committee proceeds to vary any authorized policy, or to do any administrative act which involves a question of principle not previously decided, or which is likely to cause public controversy, or any act of major importance not duly sanctioned, he shall submit the matter to his Minister for the orders of the Executive Committee concerned. This procedure shall not apply to cases of sudden emergency where immediate action not duly sanctioned is essential in the interests of the public welfare before the Minister concerned can be consulted. The Head of Department shall report to his Minister at the earliest possible opportunity all such cases of immediate action whether taken by himself or by his subordinate officers acting under his authority.

18. To ensure that two or more meetings which a member of the State Council is *ex officio* entitled to attend are not held at the same time, the Clerk to each Executive Committee shall consult the Clerk to the State Council before meetings of Executive Committees are fixed.

19. A request to the Governor to exercise powers vested in him (such as the power to make regulations) relating to subjects or functions of administration allocated to any Executive Committee should, unless otherwise provided by the Governor, be forwarded by the Minister direct to the Governor, after consultation with the Executive Committee.

20. Ministers should inform the Governor at the earliest possible opportunity of any important event connected with the administration of the subjects and functions of Government allocated to their Executive Committees.

21. Heads of Departments under the general control of an Executive Committee should report at once to their Minister any incident of a grave or important nature which occurs in connection with the subjects or functions of Government administered by their Departments. Government Agents should report all such incidents occurring within their Provinces to the Executive Committee concerned and also to any Head of a Department affected.

22. Departmental practice established before the commencement of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, shall, subject to any change made by the proper authorities, continue thereafter.

23. The subjects and functions of Government assigned to each Executive Committee shall be those mentioned in the following schedule. Where subjects or functions are specified which are not expressly mentioned in the first schedule to the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, they are included among those assigned to the Executive Committees indicated in the following schedule by virtue of the power vested in the Governor by Article 32 of the said Order in Council.

"THE MOTOR CAR ORDINANCE, No. 20 OF 1927."

REGULATIONS made by the Governor in Executive Council for the urban area of Madampe under sections 6, 53, 58, and 70 of the Motor Car Ordinance, 1927.

REGULATIONS.

1. In these regulations the expression "Public Stand" shall mean a defined space with a constructed floor prepared for the accommodation of hiring cars.
2. There shall be as many public stands and halting places as the Sanitary Board may from time to time establish and notify in the *Gazette* and in two or more of the newspapers.
3. No hiring cars shall be parked within the limits of the Sanitary Board of Madampe except at a public stand so established and notified.
4. When any portion of a public stand has been set apart for hiring cars plying upon any particular route, all hiring cars plying upon that route shall be parked in the portion of the stand so set apart. All hiring cars parked on a public stand shall be moved up as vacancies occur in front of them. The car arriving first in any particular space shall halt at any position marked therefor, and cars arriving thereafter shall draw up one behind the other in such space according to the time of their arrival.

5. The driver of any hiring car who fails to park his car as prescribed by these regulations shall be guilty of an offence.

6. Any hiring car brought into a public stand shall be parked in such a manner as to cause no obstruction to other hiring cars standing in or entering or leaving the said stand. The driver or some person in charge of every such hiring car shall always be in attendance on his hiring car and shall move his hiring car to permit the ingress or egress of other hiring cars, when reasonably called upon to do so by the drivers of such other hiring cars.

7. Admission of hiring cars to public stands so established and notified shall be by written permits to be issued by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board or by the Superintendent of Works, Madampe, upon payment of a fee according to the scale of charges set out in the schedule hereto. Cars licensed to ply on any route to or from Madampe and plying regularly on such routes shall be issued annual permits. Monthly or day permits may also be issued.

8. The owner or driver of every hiring car which shall be found within the space set apart for a public stand without such a permit shall be guilty of an offence.

9. Such permits shall always be carried in the hiring car in respect of which it is issued, and shall be produced by the driver for inspection on the demand of any Police Officer or duly authorized officer of the Sanitary Board.

10. The driver of a hiring car plying for hire within the limits of the Sanitary Board of Madampe on the roads below mentioned shall not park his hiring car except (a) at a public stand, or (b) at a halting place set apart for the purpose by the Chairman, and then only for so long as is reasonably necessary for the purpose of taking up or setting down passengers or goods.

Negombo-Chilaw road, Beazaar street also known as Chetty Street, Kurunegala road including portion called Jayawardane crescent, Galahitiyawa road including a portion called Collin place, and Goods Shed road.

Charges for—

- (1) Hiring car licensed to carry not more than seven passengers Rs. 25 per annum, Rs. 2.50 per mensem, or Re. 0.25 per diem.
- (2) Hiring car licensed to carry more than seven passengers Rs. 50 per annum, Rs. 5 per mensem, or Re. 0.50 per diem.

1. Condition No. 11 is rescinded and the following substituted therefor :—

11. (a) In addition to the rent the grantee shall pay in respect of every gallon of arrack (at 33 degrees, or not more than 35 degrees, under proof) removed from the Government Warehouse the cost price and duty at the rates shown in Schedule A.

(b) In respect of "Special Matured Pot Still Arrack" at 27 degrees underproof, sold in white sealed bottles, the grantee shall pay, in addition to the rent, duty at the rate prescribed for sealed bottles in Schedule A, and cost price at the rate of Rs. 5.90 per gallon.
