Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages, No. 13 of 1896.

 $Regulations \ for \ Munnessaram \ Festival.$

REGULATIONS made by the Governor under section 1 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages."

REGULATIONS.

In these regulations the expression "camp area" shall mean the space within the boundaries specified in the schedule hereto,

and "Assistant Government Agent" shall mean the Assistant Government Agent of the Puttalam · and Chilaw Districts.

2. No person shall camp in any place within the camparea where camping is prohibited by special or general order of the Assistant Government Agent.

3. No person shall ease himself within the camp area, except at the places provided for the t purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

4. No person shall deposit any liquid or solid refuse or

any rubbish within the camp area, except in the places or receptacles provided for that purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

(a) No cattle shall be kept in the camp area, and no cattle shall be kept in the vicinity of the camp area except at a place specially appointed as a cattle gala or at a place

approved for such use by the Assistant Government Agent.

(b) The person in charge of cattle shall cause their droppings within the camp area to be removed to a place provided therefor, and he shall at all times keep clean the place occupied by his cattle.

6. All prepared foods sold within the camp area shall be protected from flies and dust by being (a) wrapped in or covered with clean paper or cloth, or (b) kept in closed glass cases, or (c) kept in other covered containers approved by the Medical Officer, or by the Sanitary Officer in charge of the camp area. of the camp area.

7. No person who is likely to affect prejudically the cleanliness of the camp area, and no person who is suffering from an infectious disease shall be permitted to enter the

8. In the event of an epidemic breaking out in the camp area during the festival, the Assistant Government Agent may direct the pilgrims to leave the place of pilgrimage, and may prescribe the routes and methods for their conveyance

11. No person shall keep bakeries, aerated water manufactories, or galas within the camp area without previously obtaining a licence from the Assistant Government Agent, permitting him to do so. The licence shall be

issued free of charge.

12. No person shall, without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, construct any booth, or extend any building within the camp area so as to encroach on the main or other streets of the camp.

13. No person shall, without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, discharge fireworks

of one mile from the boundaries of such area.

No person shall slaughter animals within the camp area, except in the place provided for the purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent, and every person slaughtering animals in such a place shall be responsible for its cleanliness.

All felled trees together with every other fallen tree in the areas specified in the above service should be split and converted into pieces of 3 feet in length and of 2 inches minimum diameter. Billets over 9 inches diameter should be split. All wood over 12 inches in girth to be billetted in 3 feet lengths by hand saw or cross cut saw only.

3. Of the above quantity, 18,000 cubic yards (i.e., 9,000 cubic yards from Kandapola, and 9,000 cubic yards from Moon Plains) more or less should be delivered at the Nuwara Eliya Timber and Firewood Depot in monthly consignments of 1,500 cubic yards more or less as required by the Divisional Forest Officer, Central Division, Nuwara-Eliya, and the balance 9,000 cubic yards at the Wayside Depots at Kandapola and Moon Plains as required to be delivered to estates.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 18, 1931.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 152 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 91 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 23 Moors, 1 Malay, and 1 Other). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1931, viz., 284,440) was 27.9, as against 24.9 in the preceding week, 29.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 151 (6 Burghers, 90 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 18 Moors, 4 Malays, and 8 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 27.7, as against 26.8 in the previous week, 39.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 151 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 48 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twelve deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 3 each in Kotahena North and Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Maradana North, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 17, in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Eleven deaths from Influenza were registered, 5 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena South, and I each in Pettah, Maradana North, and Slave Island, as against 13 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Kotahena South and 1 each in Maradana East and Wellawatta South, as against 7 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were regstered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena South and Maradana North, and 1 each in Kotahena North and Wellawatta South, as against 13 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths from *Phthisis* of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 2 in Slave Island, as against 1 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Ten deaths from Debility were registered, 9 from Enteritis, 4 from Tetanus, 3 each from Dysentery, Worms, and Puerperal Septicaemia, 2 each from Diarrhoea and Other Causes.

5. Reported Cases.—Six cases of Enteric Fever and 2 of Chickenpox were reported during the week, as against 6 and 2, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.4°, against 81.0° in the preceding week and 81.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.872 in., against 29.870 in. in the preceding week and 29.888 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 3.43 in., against 2.17 in. in the preceding week and 0.61 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

The examination shall be conducted mainly by means of printed papers; but for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of a candidate to pass, the Examinate shall got be precluded from putting viva voce questions to any candidate.

In all subjects there shall be two papers of three hours each, except in the case of History of Architecture. In Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and Zoology there will be in addition a practical test.

In the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and Zoology Papers questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination. The questions in French and German which are set in papers in Science and Mathematical subjects shall be optional in the case of candidates sitting in the Dominions and in the Colonies.

No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be

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Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects. selected by them.

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the four prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Arts. Referred candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects within the above stated limits will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects agains. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining three subjects is reasonably good. A candidate who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Arts may enter for examination in one or more supplementary

No exemptions from this examination are given in (Nots .whole or in part except on the results of examinations of this University.)

Candidates who have passed the Internal Intermediate Examination, in accordance with the conditions then in force for External Students, are entitled to exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Arts; and if the combination of subjects did not comply with the requirements for External Students, such candidates may be exempted on passing in the necessary Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who prior to 1930 have passed the Intermediate Examination in Divinity with Latin and/or Classical Greek are exempted from the corresponding papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Graduates in Theology of this University who passed the Intermediate Examination in Divinity prior to 1930 shall be exempted from the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Graduates in Laws shall be exempted from examination in

Graduates in Laws shall be exempted from examination in Law at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Similarly, Bachelors of Science of this University shall be exempted from examination in subjects included in their Final Science Examination.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their Notebooks certified by their teachers as being the record of their work carried out by the candidates in the laboratory, so that the Examiners may inspect them if they so desire. Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (IL.) of the examination in Chemistry:

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of the common materials occurring in nature. The history of the discovery of the composition of air and water. The laws of chemical combination. The atomic and molecular theories. Equivalent atomic and molecular weights, and the methods of their determination, including atomic heats and isomorphism. Valency and structural formulæ. The classification of the elements according to the periodic system.

The elements of physical chemistry, including the following:—The properties of gases and solutions. Thermal dissociation. Osmotic pressure, and determination of molecular weights in solutions by the freezing point method. Diffusion. Colloidal solutions. Electrical conductivity. Hydrolysis. Strengths of acids and bases. Chemical equilibrium and simple examples of the law of mass action. Catalysis. Thermo-chemistry. Combustion and flame.

The history, production and properties of the more important and typical elements, and their most familiar compounds (including those of carbon as follows: carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, carbon disulphide, methane, ethylene and acetylene).

The whole to be treated as far as possible experimentally, and in an elementary manny.

One alternative question on elementary organic chemistry will be set in each paper according to the following syllabus—Hydro-carbons, halogen derivatives, alcohols, ethers, aldehydes, ketones, acids and esters, as illustrated by the study of methane, ethylene, acetylene, methyl and ethyl alcohols, diethyl ether, formaldehyde and acetaldehyde, acetone, formic, acetic and oxalic acids, ethylacetate; glycerol, fats and soaps (from an experimental standpoint only); benzene, nitrobenzene, aniline and phenol. Candidates will be expected to show a practical aquaintance with all the particular substances specified.

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallisation, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the Teacher, may also be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

No candidate will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination.

Two Imperial size sheets† of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale; the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., "Greek and Roman Architecture."

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to be prescribed two years previously.

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History from about 1400 to the present day. One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text.

Ancient History (Two Papers).

Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.c.

Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.c. to 330 A.D.

A selected portion of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

* The list of plants may be changed from time to time, but two years notice of any change will always be given.

† Each sheet should bear a statement by the candidate's teacher to the effect that it is the bona fide work of the candidate with lift.

Geography (Two Papers and Map Work).

1. General Geography.—General principles as exemplified in the world considered as a whole. (One paper.).

The Earth's Crust:—Nature of the earth's crust. The internal and external forces modifying the crust in so far as they determine:—(a) General structure and leading topographical features of the continental masses and ocean basins; (b) types and distribution of rocks, minerals and soils.

Climate:—Broad seasonal distribution of insolation, tem-Climate:—Broad seasonal distribution of insolation, temperature, pressure, winds and rainfall, leading to recognition of chief climate types and their associated weather conditions. (The physical conditions and movements of the oceans should be considered only in so far as they affect climate).

Vegetation: -General distribution of forest, woodland, scrub and grassland in relation to climate, soil and topography.

Major Geographical Regions:—The division of the world into major geographical regions.

Human Geography:—The influence of the foregoing physical factors upon the distribution of man and upon the production of food and raw materials, and the consequent development of the geographical regions.

Regional Geography.—(One paper).

(a) Europe with special reference to the British Isles, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, and Scandinavia.
(b) North America with special reference to the north-eastern industrial areas, and the United States east of the Mississippi.
(c) The Monsoon lands with special reference to the Indian Empire and Ceylon.

Empire and Ceylon.

3. Map Work.—(One paper).

The map work would be carried on in connection with the general and regional geography and should include:—The study of topographic maps (including section drawing) as exemplified by one-inch and six-inch Ordnance Survey maps of the British Isles; the use and study of atlas maps, including the advantages and disadvantages of the principal projections employed, climate and weather maps; cartographical and diagrammatic representation of geographical data.

Economics (Two Papers).

I.—Industrial and Commercial History.—The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent to 1760.

To include:—The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in industrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

II.—Principles of Economics.—Economics, analytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom.

To include:—The scope of economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

- (1) The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus.* Distomum, Astacus,* Amphioxus, Scyllium,* Rana,* Lepus.*
- (2) The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified, and an elementary knowledge of—

 (b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.

) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Feetal Membranes in the Bird and Mammel Bird and Mammal.
- (3) A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups:

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Intermediate Examination in Science.

Scheme of Examination.

The examination will be a Pass Examination only.
Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects selected
by themselves out of the following subjects of examination,
viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Physics,
(4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General
Principles of Biology, and (9) Geography.

(Note.—Candidates must select at least one of their four subjects

(Note.—Candidates must select at least one of their four subjects from among the first three of the foregoing list: candidates offering "General Principles of Biology," are not permitted to offer also Botany or Zoology.)

In all subjects except Geography there will be two papers of three hours each, and except in Pure Mathematics and Applied Mathematics, there will also be a three hours paratical test. In Geography there will be three papers of three hours each.

In each subject questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the

examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by means of vivd voce questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects taken.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science may enter for examination in one or more supplementary articles. mentary subjects.

EXEMPTIONS.

(Note.—No exemptions are given from this examination in whole or in part except on the results of examinations of this University.)

Candidates who have passed the Internal Intermediate Examination in Science in accordance with the conditions then in force for External Students are entitled to exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Science; and if the combination of subjects did not comply with the requirements for External Students such candidates may be exempted on passing in the necessary Supplementary Subjects.

Outlines of the Constitution and public administration of the Outlines of the Constitution and public administration of the United Kingdom at the present day, including the organization and working of Parliament, the Executive (Crown, Ministers, and Civil Service), and the Judiciary; the constitution and powers of the Local Authorities in England; the relations between the United Kingdom and its Colonies and Dependencies.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

(3) Q.—Owing to the increasing hardships experienced by landowners, will the Chairman be pleased to request the Government to regard the matter as urgent and thereby have the amendment of the Ordinance expedited? A.—The

Chairman has already so requested the Government.

(4) Q.—How many notifications have been received from landowners informing the Council of reduced rentals, since the assessment were revised? A.—4,965 objections have been received. The number of other notifications cannot since the assessment were revised: A.—1,500 objections have been received. The minute of the 25,500 files relating to the 25,500 separate properties in the City.

(5) Q.—How does the Chairman propose to deal with these notifications? A.—As objections, when they have been received before the close of the statutory period for objections.

(6) Q.—Owing to urgency of relief necessary, will the Chairman be pleased to obtain an early amendment of the Ordinance in order to revise the annual values of premises at any time of the year? A.—The Chairman will forward any request that the Council may decide to make in this matter to the proper quarter.

(7) Q.—In view of local financial stringency, will the Chairman bring before the Committees of the Council the desirability of a reduction of the warrant charge of 10 per cent. now levied? A.—The warrant costs of 10 per cent. are leviable under section 139 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, and cannot be reduced without an amendment of the law. The Chairman will place the question of such amendment before the Committees.

(8) Q.—Will the Chairman be pleased to state the difference in the total annual value of the properties in the San Sabatian Ward on the properties and present agreement and their converse. The

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, May 9, 1931, at 9 a.m., pursuant to notice dated May 4, 1931.

Present:—Mr. G. S. Wodeman, Chairman; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. C. L. Wickremesinghe; Mr. T. Amarasuriya; Dr. S. P. Joseph; Mr. P. R. Gunasekara; and Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of April 18, 1931, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member,

were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. E. Perera asked the following questions :-

(1) How many notices to erect dry earth latrines have been issued to residents of Ward No. 3 during the year 1930, and the 1st quarter of 1930:

(2) How many residents have complied with the requirement? How many have been prosecuted for default?

(3) Is the Chairman aware of the foul condition of the unbuilt side drains of Circular road between the Udugama junction and the Railway line? Will the Chairman take steps to drain off the water or disinfect the pools in the drains?

The Chairman replied as follows:—(1) and (2) A statement is tabled for the information of members.

(3) This portion of Circular road is maintained by the Public Works Department. The drains were recently cleared

by that Department.

As there is little or no flow, the drain is oiled weekly to kill mosquito larvae. The drain is quite clean at present and

As there is notice or no now, the drain is clied weekly to kill mosquito larvae. The drain is quite clean at present and no disinfectant is required. The presence of the black oil probably makes it look worse than it is.

An estimate is being prepared to build cement drains along the portion of the road up to its junction with the Galle.

Matara road, and Council will be asked to vote half the cost if Government agree to contribute a moiety.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. E. Perera moved—"That the steps taken to enforce the erction of dry earth latrines be deferred owing to the acute financial depression prevailing at the present time." Mr. T. Amarasuriya seconded.

The Chairman suggested that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation for consideration and report.

(4) To consider 15 applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(6) To consider estimate of Rs. 193 for the lighting of the bazaar urinal and the sea beach latrine.—Recommended.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

- (2) To determine the pay of the scavenging coolies :—The Chairman explained that the coolies are paid at the rate of Rs, 16.50 and Rs. 19.50 per mensem, according to their length of service; but that it is desirable they should be paid as daily wage in view of the Labour Ordinance.—Recommended that the coolies be paid at the rate of cents 55 and cents 65.

per diem, according to their length of service.

(3) List of demolished buildings in Ward 3.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(4) To consider the extension of the conservancy area:—(1) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation. (2) Recommended that conservancy should be extended to the Dangedera area.

9. To submit the Report of the Retrenchment Committee :- The Chairman moved that Council should go into Committee to consider the report.

Council in Committee.

The Chairman said that the recommendation that the salary of the Secretary on the occurrence of a vacancy should be Rs. 3,600 to Rs. 6,000 may be accepted, provided that the suggested age limit for applicants should not apply to office see already in the service of the Council.

Scavenging Staff.—It is not possible to reduce the number of coolies; but a saving might be expected when scavenging is done by lorries. A scheme for savenging by lorries is being prepared for consideration with the budget for next year.

Waterworks.—The Superintendent of Works has been told to dispense with the services of two turn cocks after

giving them due notice.

Hiyare Service Road.—It would not be possible to get a contribution from the Village Committee towards the maintenance of this road, and it was doubtful if Government would contribute anything for the use of the road by the Forest Department. A detailed estimate for improvements of the road would be submitted in due course.

Works Department.—The number of road overseers has been reduced by one. The rates for road maintenance are the same as the Public Works Department rates, except for tarring. The Public Works Department rates for tarring

are lower because it gets special rates for tar, and no Customs duty is payable by Government.

The amount of metal required for entirely reconditioning starved roads cannot be compared with the amount required for improving Public Works Department roads which have been regularly maintained in good condition.

It was not possible to lay down general rules for the quantity of metal to be used. This would depend on the state of the road and the width of the platform, &c. He said the recommendation of the Special Committee appearing on page 5 of the report could be generally accepted subject to slight amendments and put in the following form:—

(a) Consolidation to be done by stream roller whenever possible.

(b) Spremex to be used instead of coals when the weather permits.

(c) A boiler and spreyer to be purchased for tarring

(d) Rates for road maintenance not to exceed Public Works Department rates unless the cost of materials such as tar is greater.

Recommendation (e) he said was not clear and could not be accepted. No definite rule could be laid down for the amount of metal to be used; it would depend on the state of the road to be reconditioned and each case must be considered on its merits.

Collectors.—It would not be practical at present to do away with the collectors of Wards 1 and 2, but he suggested that a lower rate—say, 5 per cent.—be paid for collection after the 4th month, i.e., for collection of warrants.

agreed to the suggestion.

Mr. P. R. Gunasekara referred to the large expenditure on road prior to 1929 when no tarring was done. Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel was of opinion that the expenditure on Municipal roads was not excessive. The Chairman moved that Council do resume. He thanked the members of the Special Committee for their valuable report, and moved Council do adjourn until June 27.
