A PROCLAMATION.

GRAEME THOMSON.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 34 (1) of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to declare by Proclamation any road or path which the Railway may cross to be a "minor crossing" and whether such "minor crossing" shall be closed by gates or not ; and such Proclamation to alter, vary, or repeal :

And whereas by a Proclamation published in *Gazette* No. 6,047 of April 7, 1905, the roads and paths which the Ceylon Government Railway crosses between the stations of Wellawatta and Alutgama, in the Western Province, appearing in the schedule hereto, were among others declared to be "minor crossings" not closed by gates:

By-law 7 of Chapter XIV. relating to seizure of articles unfit for food of the by-laws of the Municipal Council of Colombo published by Proclamation dated October 12, 1905, in *Gazette* No. 6,080 of October 20, 1905, is hereby repealed and the following is substituted therefor :---

By-law 7. Printed and numbered cards, in such form as the Chairman shall, from time to time, direct and signed by the Secretary, shall be issued annually to every milk vendor employed by a registered dairyman on an application made by such a dairyman. Such cards shall bear a photograph of the vendor and a copy of such photograph shall be deposited with the Chairman. No person shall sell, hawk, or expose milk for sale, unless he has in his possession a card issued for the current year in his own name and unless the name of the dairyman under whom he is employed is still on the register at the time of the sale, hawking, or exposing of the milk for sale. Should such person fail to produce, on demand by any Municipal or Police Officer, such a card for inspection, he shall be guilty of an offence, and such officer may at once arrest him, and shall convey him forthwith after arrest to the nearest Police Station, and the Officer in Charge of such Police Station shall deal with him as if he had been arrested by a Police Officer without a warrant under the provisions of the Criminal Procedure Code. Such cards may be cancelled at any time by the Chairman if it appears to him to be necessary, in the interests of the public health.

Rule 18 is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :-

18. Tickets, conditions of issue.—(a) Tickets given to passengers on payment of their fares are not transferable; they are the property of the Government, and must be produced or delivered up whenever demanded by the railway servants. Special attention is directed to sections 8, 9, 10, and 11 of the Bailway Ordinance. (b) The single journey tickets are available only on the day of issue or by a through train starting on the day of

issue.

(c) Single journey tickets entitle the holders to travel once only in one direction, and excursion or concessionary return tickets once only in each direction between the points marked thereon.
 (d) Tickets will not be issued to passengers at an intermediate station for the train by which they have travelled or are travelling; but passengers desirous of travelling beyond the station to which they have booked must; before passing that station, hand their tickets to the Guard, at the same time informing him to which station they wish to

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travel. The Guard will then see to the collection of the excess fare at the proper point, but under no circumstances can the advantage of an excursion or concessionary return ticket be obtained by payment of excess fare. (e) Passengers having once booked are not allowed to change their tickets for those of a lower class

(f) Should a passenger with an excursion or concessionary return ticket apply to travel in a carriage of a higher class than that for which the ticket was issued, he will be required to pay the difference between the fares of the two classes respectively for the single journey. Should a passenger apply to travel in a higher class both journeys, he will have to pay such difference for each journey.

(g) A passenger leaving the train at a station short of that to which he has booked must deliver up his ticket, and cannot be allowed to resume his journey except by obtaining a fresh ticket.

(h) Passengers are not allowed to use tickets on any day for which such tickets are not available.

(i) Passengers are booked at intermediate stations only on condition that there is room in the train by which they intend to travel.

(j) Should there not be room in the class of carriage for which passengers are booked, and it is possible to find temporary accommodation for them in a higher class without inconvenience to other passengers, they will be required to change as soon as room is available in the class for which they hold tickets.

(k) Tickets issued at specially reduced rates can only be used between the stations specified thereon. If used to or from any other stations the whole ticket will be forfeited and full fares charged.

(1) Return tickets issued to naval and military officers, sailors and soldiers (and their wives and children), on certificates, are available on the return journey without any limitation of time.

Rule 22 is hereby amended as follows :-3.

(i.) By the insertion of the words "excursion or concessionary" immediately after the word "of" in the first

line of sub-rule (a). (ii.) By the deletion of the word "a" in the first and fourth lines respectively of sub-rule (b) and the sub-stitution therefor of the words "an excursion or concessionary".

Rule 23 is hereby amended as follows :

(i.) By the insertion of the words "or concessionary" immediately after the word "excursion" in the second line of sub-rule (b).

(ii.) By the deletion of the words "Refunds will not be allowed on unused halves of return tickets after the extensible period" from sub-rule (d).

Rule 24 is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :---5.

24. Extension of Time.-(a) A passenger who is left behind at a roadside station through sickness or other unavoidable cause, or who is unable to use his ticket by the train for which he has been booked, should at once com-municate with the Station Master with a view to having his ticket made available by another train, if the cause of delay be satisfactorily explained, otherwise the passenger will have to purchase a fresh ticket.

(b) A passenger found travelling with an expired ticket must pay the full single fare and no refund will be made.

6. Rule 26 is hereby amended by the deletion of the words "and Yatiyantota" in the eighth line of sub-rule (a) thereof and the substitution of the words "Yatiyantota, Negombo, Trincomalee, and Batticaloa" therefor. 7. Rule 31 is hereby amended by the deletion of the words "single and return" after the word "tickets" in the

first line of sub-rule (c).

8. Rule 32 is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :-

Concessions.—(a) The following concessions are in force on this Railway :---32.

Applications for concessions Nos. (1), (2), (3), (4), (9), and (11) should be made at least one week before the date on which the party intends to travel, to the General Manager, Colombo, who reserves the right of refusing to grant the concession or of declining to allow the tickets to be available by particular trains. If application is entertained an authority will be sent to the applicant to be presented at the station at

which the tickets are to be issued or other concession granted.

When applying for any such concessions the following information must be given :-

(i.) The dates fixed for the excursion.

(ii.) The trains required to be used on outward and homeward journeys. (iii.) Class and probable number of passengers.

(iv.) Approximate quantity of luggage or baggage. (v.) Number of animals, motor cars, &c.

(vi.) Stations between which the party wishes to travel.

(vii.) The nature or object of the excursion.

(1) Operatic, Theatrical and Circus Parties.—(a) Parties of not less than six in number will be conveyed first-second, or third class at one and a quarter fare for the double journey and at $\frac{3}{4}$ fare for a single journey when travelling between stations not less than twenty-five miles apart to give a performance. The whole of the party must travel by the same train.

(b) The concession will also apply to not more than two advance agents. Return tickets will be available for return within seventeen days including the date of issue and date of return. (c) Baggage, scenery, animals, motor cars, &c., will be conveyed at the following rates :

(i.) Baggage and scenery in small lots at ordinary parcels rates with usual free allowance on tickets held or at half parcels rates without the free allowance on tickets held, whichever is lower.

(ii.) Baggage and scenery in wagon loads will be conveyed at owner's risk by goods trains and charged for at 50 cents per wagon per mile. Minimum charge, Rs. 10.
(iii.) Horses and other animals will be conveyed at owner's risk at 50 cents per vehicle per mile, subject to a

minimum charge of Rs. 10 per vehicle.

The necessary tackle for securing scenery, furniture, fittings, &c., loaded on open trucks must be provided by the owners or consignors. Tarpaulins will, when possible, be provided by the railway, if required, free of charge, but the Government will not be responsible for any damage caused by wet. If the loading is done by the sender, the trucks must be loaded to the satisfaction of the officer in charge of the forwarding station, and the Government will not accept any responsibility for delay to the trucks if the contents are not properly loaded and secured, nor will

they bind themselves to forward the goods by any particular train, nor guarantee delivery within any specified time.
(2) Pleasure parties.—(a) Parties of not less than ten persons travelling by ordinary trains between stations not less than twenty-five miles apart will be conveyed, first, second, or third class, at one and a quarter fare for the double journey. The whole party must travel in the same train, both on the outward and return journeys. Return the double for the fore the fo

Leturn tickets will be available for return within seventeen days, including the date of issue and date of return. Members of Sports Clubs.—(b) The above concession is also allowed to members of sports clubs without restriction as to distance on production of a certificate from the Secretary of the club giving particulars of the engage-

restriction as to distance on production of a certificate from the Secretary of the club giving particulars of the engagement, match, or meeting which the party is attending.
(3) Hunting and Polo Parties and their Horses.—The concession in terms of item 2 (a) will be allowed to hunting and polo parties of not less than four in number. Their ponies or horses will be conveyed at single fare for the double journey subject to a minimum charge as for one horse box.
(4) Military, Volunteer, or Police Bands.—(a) Parties of not less than six in number when travelling by train for the purpose of playing at public or private entertainments will be conveyed at one and a quarter fare for the double journey. Betturn tickets will be available for return within seventeen days.

journey. Return tickets will be available for return within seventeen days. Private Bands.—(b) Tickets in terms of item 2 (a) will be issued to bona fide private bands of not less than

six in number for the purpose of giving performances at public or private entertainments on production of certificate of engagement.

(5) Police in Uniform and Volunteers attending Special Meetings, &c. --Police in uniform attending meetings for inspection, drill, target practice, rifle competition, &c., and Volunteers, including Inspecting Officers, attending special meetings for inspection, drill, &c. (other than those mentioned in item 7), will be allowed to travel at one and a quarter fare for the double journey on production of warrants signed by an officer of the Force. The tickets will be available from the day prior to the meeting to the day after its close, both inclusive, and when the meeting commences on a Monday or ends on a Saturday, Sunday will be considered a dies non.
(6) Sailors and Soldiers in Uniform attending Target Practice.--Sailors and soldiers in uniform attending meetings for target practice or rifle competition will be charged one and a quarter fare for the double journey.

All excess luggage charges must be paid to the Booking Clerk at the time of booking and receipts obtained for payment, otherwise they are liable to be charged for again. The free allowance referred to above is granted only on the luggage booked at the starting station mentioned on the ticket. 2. Tenders should be in duplicate on the recognized form which can be obtained from the Divisional Forest Officer, North-Western Division, Kurunegala, on application. No tender will be accepted if not made on the proper form.

3. Tenders should be posted under sealed and registered over or be deposited in the tender box at the Office of the Conservator of Forests, Colombo, and should reach him not later than midday on Friday, February 19, 1932, the envelope being marked on the left hand top corner "Tenders for the Purchase of Timber in the North-Western Division," and signed by the tenderer. Alterations should be initialled, otherwise the tender may be treated as informal and be rejected.

4. A deposit of Rs. 25 will be required to be made either at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued.

5. Tenderers should before tendering satisfy themselves by inspection as to the trees in the area referred to in the schedule. The Forest Ranger of the Puttalam Range will point out the area and furnish all available information regarding its contents. Map showing the position of the area may be studied at the Forest Office, Kurunegala.

6. The successful tenderer will be required to execute a purchase agreement, and all tenderers should read and initial a copy of the agreement at the Office of the Divisional Forest Officer, North-Western Division, Kurunegala, at the time of obtaining tender forms.

7. Before execution of the agreement the purchaser will be required to deposit a cash security of Rs. 100 within two weeks' notice of the acceptance of the tender.

8. Should the successful tenderer fail to carry out the requirements of clauses 6 and 7 of this notice within 14 days of receiving notice in writing from the Divisional Forest Officer that his tender has been accepted, the sum of Rs. 25 deposited by him will be forfeited to the Crown. Unsuccessful tenderers will be entitled to a refund of the amount deposited by them on application to the Divisional Forest Officer, Kurunegala.

9. After execution of the agreement the purchaser may commence the felling of trees, and the collection o logs, after they have been numbered at the way side depôt referred to in the schedule annexed, where payment must be made at tendered rates for all timber extracted. Final removal will only be permitted after removal permits on the prescribed form have been issued in respect of paid for material.

10. and in clause 9 above. Nothing in these special conditions shall render the purchaser in any way exempt from liability under the Forest Ordinance of 1907, should he be responsible for the commission of a forest offence.

Special Conditions.

1. Where natural boundaries do not exist the purchaser will be required to demarcate with 3 ft. lines the area leased to him accordingly to the instructions of the Divisional Forest Officer.

2. The Range Forest Officer, will periodically measure up all timber which has been collected at the wayside depôt, and payment for such timber will be required within seven days. On receipt of payment removal permits will be issued by the Range Forest Officer to the lessee according to his requirements, or to persons duly authorized by him, after it has been stamped with a special stamp by or in the presence of the Divisional Forest Officer. Timber may be removed in the log or as sawn timber.

3. The lessee shall if called upon to do so by the Divisional Forest Officer deposit a sum or sums of money as fixed by the Divisional Forest Officer from which the amounts due from time to time may be credited to revenue in the event of default by the lessee to make payment when due for extracted material.

4. The Conservator of Forests may remit or reduce the purchase rate on timber, which in the opinion of the Divisional Forest Officer is felling waste, defective, or of inferior quality.

5. The lessee is at liberty to make arrangements to supply Government Departments with timber either in the log or sown and the Forest Department is prepared to act as a medium between the Government Departments and the lessee.

6. On the occurrence of serious irregularities the lessee will be liable to have his security forfeited and his agreement cancelled while he will be liable to be fined for smaller irregularities.

7. The lessee will be required to cut and remove sound timber of all species enumerated in Clause 10, above under Class I. having a girth measurement of 3 ft. and over at 4 ft. height from ground, without confining himself to any particular species. On failure to observe this condition the Divisional Forest Officer shall have the power to cancel and close down the agreement with forfeiture of security and with such other penalties as the Divisional Forest Officer may deem fit in the circumstances.

8. by attorney duly authorized. "Directors" means the directors for the time being of the Company or (as the case may be) the directors assembled at a board.

"Board" means a meeting of the directors or (as the context may require) the directors assembled at a board meeting, acting through at least a quorum of their body in the exercise of authority duly given to them. "Dividend" includes bonus. "The Office" means the registered office for the time

being of the Company. "Seal" means the common seal for the time being of the

Company. "Month" means a calendar month.

"In Writing" and "Written" include printing, lithography, and other modes of representing or reproducing words in a visible form.

Words importing the singular number only include the plural, and vice versá

Words importing the masculine gender only include the feminine, and vice versa.

Words importing persons include partnerships, associ-ations, corporations, companies, unincorporated or incorporated by Ordinance and registration, as well as individuals.

Subject to the preceding article any words defined in the Ordinance shall if not inconsistent with the subject or context bear the same meaning in these presents.

BUSINESS.

6. Commencement of Business .- The Company may proceed to carry out the objects for which it is established or any one or more of them, and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the directors in their discretion shall think fit; and notwithstanding that the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted, they shall do so as soon as, in the judgment of the directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied for.

7. Acquisition of Mr. John Hagenbeck's Collection of Animals.—The basis on which this Company is established is that the Company shall purchase from Mr. John Hagenbeck of Colombo as on and from the 15th day of June, 1931, his collection of living animals at Kalubowila West, Dehi-wala, in the Island of Ceylon, and accordingly no objection shall be made by this Company or by any shareholder, ereditor. or liquidator thereof to the said purchase or

acquisition upon the ground that the vendor, promoters, or other persons interested or any of them stand in a fiduciary position towards this Company or that there is in the circumstances no independent board of this Company and any director of this Company who is interested therein shall be entitled to retain and dispose of for his own use all benefits (if any) accruing to him directly or indirectly under or by virtue of the said purchase and the said purchase shall not be liable to be set aside on any such grounds as aforesaid or upon any ground in any wise connected therewith and every shareholder of the Company present and future shall be deemed to join the Company on the basis aforesaid.

8. Business to be carried on by Directors.—The business of the Company shall be carried on by, or under the management or direction of, the directors, and subject only to the control of general meetings, in accordance with these presents.

CAPITAL.

9. Nominal Capital.—The nominal capital of the Company is Three Hundred Thousand Rupees (Rs. 300,000) divided into 30,000 shares of Ten Rupees (Rs. 10) each.

SHARES.

10. Issue and Allotment.—The whole of the unissued shares of the Company for the time being shall be under the control of the board, who may, subject to the rights of any person entitled to apply for or have allotted to him any shares of the Company, and to the rights of the holders of the shares of the Company for the time being issued upon special terms, allot or otherwise dispose of the same to such persons, on such terms and conditions, and with such rights and privileges, and either at par or at a premium, or otherwise, and at such times, as the board may determine, with full power to give to any person the call of or option over any shares either at par or at a premium, and for such time and for such consideration as the board think fit, subject always to the stipulations contained in any agreement with reference to the shares to be allotted in pursuance thereof.

11. Commission and Brokerage for placing Shares, &c.— The directors may at any time pay a commission to any person for subscribing or agreeing to subscribe (whether absolutely or conditionally) for any shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company, or procuring or agreeing to procure subscriptions (whether absolute or conditional) for any shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company. Such commission may, if thought fit, be paid in fully paid shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company. The directors may also pay such brokerage as may be lawful.

12. Payment of Amount of Shares by Instalments.—If by the conditions of allotment of any share the whole or part of the amount thereof shall be payable by instalments, every such instalment shall, when due, be paid to the Company by the holder of the share.

Company by the holder of the share. 13. Acceptance.—Every person taking any share in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by writing under his hand in such form as the directors from time to time direct.

14. Payment.—Payment for shares shall be made in such manner as the directors shall from time to time determine and direct.

15. Shares held by a Firm.—Shares may be registered in the name of a firm, and any partner of the firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to appoint proxies, but not more than one partner may vote at a time.

16. Shares held by Two or more Persons not in Partnership.—Shares may be registered in the names of two or more persons not in partnership.

more persons not in partnership. 17. One of Joint-holders other than a Firm may give Receipts; only one of Joint-holders resident in Ceylon entitled to vote.—Any one of the joint-holders of a share, other than a firm, may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but only one of such joint-holders shall be entitled to the right of voting and of appointing proxies and exercising the other rights and powers conferred on a sole shareholder, and if the jointholders cannot arrange amongst themselves as to who shall vote or appoint proxies and exercise such other rights and powers conferred on a sole shareholder, the shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares in respect of such joint-holding shall vote or appoint proxies and exercise those rights and powers; provided, however, that in the event of such first registered shareholder in respect of such joint-holding then resident in Ceylon shall vote or appoint proxies and exercise all such rights and powers as aforesaid.

18. Survivor of Joint-holders, other than a Firm, only recognized.—In case of the death of any one or more of the joint-holders, other than a firm, of any share, the survivor

19. Liability of Joint-holders.—The joint-holders of a share shall be severally as well as jointly liable for the payment of all instalments and calls due in respect of such share.

20. Trusts or any Interest in Share other than that of Registered Holder or of any Person under Article 40 not recognized.—The Company shall not be bound to recognize (even though having notice of) any contingent, future, partial, or equitable interest in the nature of a trust or otherwise in any share, or any other right in respect of any share, except an absolute right thereto in the person from time to time registered as the holder thereof, and except also the right of any person under article 40 to become a shareholder in respect of any share.

INCREASE OF CAPITAL.

21. Increase of Capital by Creation of New Shares.—The Company in general meeting may, by special resolution from time to time, increase the capital by creation of new shares of such amount per share and in the aggregate, and with such special, preferential, deferred, qualified, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto as such resolution shall direct.

22. Issue of New Shares.—The new shares shall be issued upon such terms and conditions and with such preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto, as the special resolution creating the same or in default the Board shall direct; and in particular such shares may be issued with a preferential or qualified right to dividends and in the distribution of assets of the Company and with a special or without any right of voting. The directors shall have power to add to such new shares such an amount of premium as they may consider proper.

How carried into Effect.—Subject to any direction to the contrary that may be given by the special resolution creating the increase of capital, all new shares shall be dealt with as if they from part of the shares in the original capital. 24. Same as Original Capital.—Except so far as other-

Same as Original Capital.—Except so far as otherwise provided by the conditions of issue or by these presents, any capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the provisions, herein contained with reference to the payments of calls and instalments, transfer, transmission, forfeiture, lien, surrender, and otherwise.

REDUCTION OF CAPITAL AND SUBDIVISION OR CONSOLIDATION OF SHARES.

25. Reduction of Capital and Subdivision or Consolidation of Shares.—The Company in general meeting may, by special resolution, reduce the capital in such manner as such special resolution shall direct, and may, by special resolution, subdivide or consolidate the shares of the Company or any of them.

SHARE CERTIFICATES.

26. Certificates how issued.—Every shareholder shall be entitled to one certificate for all the shares registered in his name, or to several certificates, each for one or more of such shares. Every certificate shall specify the distinctive number of the share in respect of which it is issued, and the amount paid thereon, provided that in the case of shares registered in the names of two or more persons other than a firm the Company shall not be bound to issue more than one certificate to all the joint-holders, and delivery of such certificate to any one of them shall be sufficient delivery to all.

27. Certificates to be under Seal of Company.—The certificates of shares shall be issued under the seal of the Company.

28. Renewal of Certificate.—If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then upon production thereof to the directors they may order the same to be cancelled and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the directors, and on such indemnity as the directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof shall be given to the person entitled to such lost or destroyed certificate. A sum of fifty cents together with the amount of any costs and expenses which the Company has incurred in connection with the matter shall be payable for such new certificate.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

29. Transfer of Shares.—Subject to the restriction of these articles, any shareholder may transfer all or any of his shares by instrument in writing.

30. No Transfer to Minor or Person of Unsound Mind.— No transfer of shares shall be made to a minor or person of unsound mind.

31. Register of Transfers.—The Company shall keep a book or books, to be called "The Register of Transfers," in which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

or transmission of any snare. 32. Instrument of Transfer.—The instrument of transfer of any share shall be signed both by the transferor and transferce, and the transferor shall be deemed to remain the holder of such share until the name of the transferce is entered in the register in respect thereof.

Directors may decline to register Transfers.—The directors may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company has a lien or otherwise, and in the case of shares not fully paid up may refuse to register a transfer to a transferee of whom they do not approve. 24. 34. Not bound to state Reason.—In no case shall a shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declinature shall be absolute.

35. Registration of Transfer.—Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office to be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of Rs. 2:50, or such other sum as the directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid; and thereupon the directors, subject to the powers vested in them by articles 33, 34, and 36 shall register the transfere as a shareholder and retain the instrument of transfer.

36. Directors may authorize Registration of Transferees.— The directors may, by such means as they shall deem expedient, authorize the registration of transferees as shareholders, without the necessity of any meeting of the directors for that purpose.

Transfer Books when to be closed.—The transfer books may be closed during the fourteen days immediately preceding each ordinary general meeting, including the first ordinary general meeting; also when a dividend is declared, for the three days next ensuing the meeting; also at such other times as the directors may decide, not exceeding in the whole twenty-one days in any one year.

TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

39. Title to Shares of deceased Holder.—Subject and without prejudice to the provisions of article, 18 hereof: the executors or administrators or the heirs of a deceased shareholder shall be the only persons recognized by the Company as having any, title to shares of such shareholder.

the executors of administrators of the neurs of a decased shareholder shall be the only persons recognized by the Company as having any title to shares of such shareholder. 40. Registration of Persons entitled to Shares otherwise than by Transfer.—Any curator of any minor Shareholder, any committee of a lunatic shareholder or any person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any shareholder, or the marriage of any female shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer, shall, upon producing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this article, or of his title, as may from time to time be required by the directors, and with the consent of the directors (which they shall not be under any obligation to give) be registered as a shareholder in respect of such shares on payment of a fee of Rs. 2.50; or may, subject to the same to some other person.

41. Failing such Registration, Shares may be sold by the Company.—If any-person who shall become entitled to be registered in respect of any share under article 40, shall not, from any cause whatever, within twelve calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue, be registered in respect of such share, or if, in the case of the death of any shareholder, no person shall, within twelve calendar months after such death, be registered as a shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased shareholder, the Company may sell the same either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money , and the purchaser shall be entitled to be registered in respect of such share, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same ; the nett proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all moneys

in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold shall be paid to the person entitled thereto. 42. Gurator of Minor, &c., when not entitled to vote.— The curator of a minor shareholder, the committee or other legal guardian of any lunatic shareholder, the husband of any female shareholder not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator or heir of any deceased shareholder, shall not be entitled to receive notice of or to attend or vote at meetings of the Company or save as aforesaid, and save as regards the receipt of such dividends as the board shall not elect to retain, to exercise any of the rights and privileges of a shareholder, unless and until he shall have been registered as the holder of the shares.

SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE OF SHARES.

43. The Directors may accept Surrender of Shares.—The directors may accept, in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon a surrender of the shares of shareholders who may be desirous of retiring from the Company.

If Call or Instalment not paid, Notice to be given to Shareholder.—If any shareholder fails to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the directors may at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such shareholder requiring him to pay the same, together with any interest that may have accrued, at the rate of 9 per cent. Per annum, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such non-payment.

45. Terms of Notice.—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the notice) on and a place or places at which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as aforesaid are to be paid; the notice shall also state that, in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed, the shares in respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.

46. In Default of Payment, Shares to be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with, every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, with interest, and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared forfeited by a resolution of the board to that effect.

Shareholder still liable to pay Money owing at Time of Forfeiture.—Any shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall, notwithstanding, be liable to pay and shall forthwith pay to the Company all calls, instalments, interest, and expenses owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of forfeiture, together with interest thereon at 9 per cent. per annum, from the time of forfeiture until payment and the directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.

48. Surrendered or Forfeited Shares to be the Property of the Company, and may be sold, &c.—Every share surrendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the board shall think fit.

49: Effect of Surrender or Forfeiture.—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in, and also of all claims and demands against the Company in respect of the share and the proceeds thereof, and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

50. 51. Eorfeiture may be-remitted.—The directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share or shares, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money for the deficit, as they shall think fit, not being less than 9 per cent. per annum on the amount of the sums wherein default in

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payment had been made, but no share bona fide sold or e-allotted, or otherwise disposed of under article 48 hereof, shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

52. Company's Lien on Shares.—The Company shall have a first and paramount lien upon all the shares registered in the name of each Shareholder (whether solely or jointly with others) and upon the proceeds of sale thereof for his debts, liabilities, and engagements, solely or jointly with any other person to or with the Company, whether the period for the payment, fulfilment, or discharge thereof shall have actually arrived or not, and no equitable interest in any share shall be created except upon the footing and condition that article 20 hereof is to have full effect, and such lien shall extend to all dividends from time to time declared in respect of such shares and to all moneys paid in advance of calls thereon. Unless otherwise agreed, the registration of a transfer of shares shall operate as a waiver of the Company's lien (if any) on such shares. 53. Lien how made available and Proceeds how applied.

For the purpose of enforcing such lien the board may sell the shares subject thereto in such manner as they think fit, but no sale shall be made until such time as the moneys are presently payable, and notice in writing stating the amount due, and giving notice of intention to sell in default, shall have been served on such shareholder or the person (if any) entitled by transmission to the shares and default shall have been made for seven clear days after such notice. The net proceeds of any such sale shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of the debts, liabilities, and engagements aforesaid, and the residue (if any) shall be paid to the Shareholder or the person (if any) entitled by transmission to the shares or who would be so entitled but for such sale. Should the shareholder over whose share the lien exists be in England or elsewhere abroad, sixty days, notice shall be allowed him.

54. Certificate of Sale.—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the directors and of the secretary that the power of sale given by article 53 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated.

55. Transfer on Sale how executed.—Upon any such sale two of the directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer, with the certificate last aforesaid, shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such share.

CALLS.

56. Directors may make Calls.—The directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon the registered holders of shares, in respect of moneys unpaid thereon, and not by the conditions of allotment made payable at fixed times; and each shareholder shall pay the amount of every call so made on him to the persons and at the times and places appointed by the directors, provided that two months' notice at least shall be given to the shareholders of the time and place appointed, for payment of each call.

57. Calls, Time when made.-A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution authorizing the call was passed at a meeting of the hoard or was signed in terms of article 120.

58. Extension of Time for Payment of Call.—The directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more shareholder or shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof on such terms as the directors may determine. But no shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension except as a matter of grace or favour.

59. Interest on Unpaid Call.-If the sum payable in respect of any call or instalment is not paid on or before the day appointed for the payment thereof, the holder for the time being of the share in respect of which the call shall have been made, or the instalment shall have been due, shall pay interest for the same at the rate of 9 per contum per annum from the day appointed for the payment thereof to the time of the actual payment, but the directors may, when they think fit, remit altogether or in part any sum becoming payable for interest under this article. Any sum whether payable on account of the amount of the share or by way of premium which by the terms of allotment of a share is made payable upon allotment or at any fixed date, and any instalment of a call or premium shall, for all purposes of these presents, be deemed to be a call duly made and payable on the date fixed for payment, and in case of non-payment the provisions of these presents as to payment of interest and expenses, forfeiture, and the like, and all other the relevant provisions, of these presents, shall amply as if such such a provision or instalment were a shall apply as if such sum, premium, or instalment were a call duly made and notified as hereby provided.

60. Payment in Anticipation of Calls.—The directors may at their discretion receive from any shareholder willing to advance the same, and upon such terms as they think fit,

all or any part of the amount due upon the shares held by him beyond the sum actually called up.

BORROWING POWERS.

Power to borrow .--- The directors shall have power 61. from time to time at their discretion to borrow or raise from the directors or other persons any sum or sums of money for the purposes of the Company, at such rate of interest and on such terms as the directors think fit, but so that the amount at any one time owing in respect of principal moneys so borrowed or raised shall not, without the sanction of a general meeting exceed the sum of Twentyfive Thousand Rupees (Rs. 25,000). The directors shall, with the sanction of a general meeting, be entitled to borrow or raise such further sum or sums, and at such rate of interest as such meeting shall determine. The directors may, for the purpose of securing the repayment of any such principal sum or sums of money so borrowed or raised as aforesaid, and interest, create and issue any mortgages, debentures, mortgage debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company, charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, property, and rights or assets of the Company (both present and and rights of assets of the company (both present and future), including uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or give, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills of exchange. Provided that before the directors execute any mortgage, issue any debentures, or create any debenture stock they shall obtain the sanction thereto of the Company in general meeting whether ordinary or extraordinary, notice of the intention to obtain such sanction at such meeting having been duly given. Any such securities may be issued either at par or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time be cancelled or discharged, varied, or exchanged as the directors may think fit, and may contain any special privileges as to redemption, surrender, drawings, allotments of shares, or otherwise. Every debenture or other in-strument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money may be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company for securing the payment the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued. A declaration under the seal contained in or endorsed upon any of the documents mentioned in this article and subscribed by two or more of the directors or by one director and, the secretary, to the effect that the directors have power to borrow the amount which such document, may represent, shall be conclusive evidence thereof in all questions between the Company and evidence thereof in an quession over the containing such declaration shall, as regards the creditor, be void on the ground of its being granted in excess of the aforesaid borrowing power, inless it shall be proved that such creditor was aware that it was so granted.

MEETINGS.

62. First General Meeting.-The first general meeting of the Company shall be held at such time, not being more than twelve months after the registration of the Company,

than twelve months after the registration of the Company, and at such place, as the directors may determine. 63. Subsequent General Meetings.—Subsequent general meetings shall be held once in every year at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in general meeting and, if no time or place is prescribed, at such time and place as may be determined by the directors. 64. Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings.—The general meetings mentioned in the two last preceding articles shall be called ordinary general meetings; all other meetings of the Company shall be called extraordinary general meetings. general meetings.

65. When E ctraordinary General Meeting to be called. directors may, whenever they think fit, call an extraordinary general meeting, and the directors shall upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one seventh of the number of shareholders holding not less than one-seventh of the issued capital and entitled to vote, forthwith proceed to convene an extraordinary general meeting of the Company and in case of such requisition the following provisions shall have effect :

(1) Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, shall be addressed to the directors, and deposited at the office and may consist of several documents in like form each signed by one or more of the requisitionists. Upon the receipt of such re-quisition the directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an extraordinary general meeting to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the deposit of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene an extraordinary general meeting, to be held at such place and at such time as the requisitionists convening the meeting may themselves fix, but any meeting so convened shall not be held after three months from the date of such deposit.

at any such meeting a resolution requiring con (2) If firmation at another meeting is passed, the board shall forthwith convene a further extraordinary general meeting for the purpose of considering the resolution, and, if thought fit, of confirming it as a special resolution; and if the board do not convene the meeting within seven days from the date of the passing of the first resolution, the requisitionists, or a majority of them in value, may themselves convene the meeting.

66. Postponement of Meetings.—Any general meeting (whether ordinary or extraordinary) convened by the directors unless the time thereof shall have been fixed by the Company in general meeting, or unless such general meeting be convened in pursuance of such requisition as is in article 65 hereof mentioned may be postponed by the directors by notice in writing, and the meeting shall subject to any further nostronement to any further postponement, or adjournment, be held at the postponed date for the purpose of transacting the business covered by the original notice.

67. Notice of Resolution.—Any shareholder may on giving not less than ten days' previous notice of anyo resolution submit the same to a meeting. Such notice shall be given by depositing a copy of the resolution at anyo the office.

68. Seven Days' Notice of Meeting to be given.—Seven days' notice at least of every general meeting, rdinary or extraordinary, and by whomsoever convened, specifying the place, date, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given either by advertise-ment in the *Ceulon Government Gazette* or by notice sent by ment in the Ceylon Government Gazette or by notice sent by post, or otherwise served as hereinafter provided, but an accidental omission to give such notice to any shareholder shall not invalidate the proceedings at any general meeting; provided however that holders of preference shares or shares of any particular class shall not be entitled to notice of any meeting at which by the conditions or provisions attached to such preference share or shares of such particular class they shall not be entitled to attend or vote

69. Two Meetings convened by One Notice. — Where it is proposed to pass a special resolution the two meetings may be convened by one and the same notice, and it is to be no objection to such notice that it only convenes the second meeting contingently on the resolution being passed by the requisite majority at the first meeting.

70. Business requiring and not requiring Notification.— Every ordinary general meeting shall be competent, without special notice having been given of the purposes for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted therese to receive and consider the profit and loss account thereat, to receive and consider the profit and loss account (if any), the balance sheet of the Company, the reports of the directors and auditors, to elect directors, auditors, and other officers in place of those retiring, to fix the remuneration of the directors and auditors, to sanction and declare dividends, and to transact any business which under these presents curft to be transacted at an which under these presents ought to be transact any business ordinary general meeting and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business whatever of which special mention shall have been made in the notice upon which the meeting was convened.

notice upon which the meeting was convened. 71. Notice of other Business to be given.—With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing articles as to the business which may be transacted at ordinary general meetings without notice, no general meeting, ordinary or extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specifically mentioned in the notice upon which it was convened. 72. Quorum to be present.—No business shall be trans-acted at a general meeting, unless there shall be present in person at the commencement of the business two or more persons, being shareholders entitled to vote, or persons being proxies or attorneys of shareholders entitled to vote. 73. If Quorum not present, Meeting to be dissolved or

73. If Quorum not present, Meeting to be dissolved or adjourned; adjourned Meeting to transact Business.—If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of persons shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of shareholders, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place; and no patiga of such adjournment paed he size notice of such adjournment need be given.

notice of such adjournment need be given. 74. Chairman of Directors or a Director to be Chairman of General Meeting; in Case of their Absence or Refusal, a Share-holder may act.—The chairman (if any) of the directors shall be entitled to take the chair at every general meeting, whether ordinary or extraordinary; but if there be no chairman, or if at any meeting he shall not be present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for holding such meeting, or if he shall refuse to take the chair, the shareholders shall choose another director as chairman;

and if no directors be present, or if all the directors present decline to take the chair, then the shareholders present shall choose one of their number to be chairman.

75. Business confined to Election of Chairman while Chair vacant.—No business shall be discussed at any general meeting except the election of a chairman whilst the chair is vacant

76. Chairman with Consent may adjourn Meeting.—The chairman, with the consent of the meeting, may adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place, unless

due notice shall be given. 77. Minutes of General Meeting.—Minutes of the proecedings of every general meeting, whether ordinary or extraordinary, shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall when so entered be signed as soon as practicable by the chairman of the same meeting, or by the chairman of the succeeding meeting, and the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the chairman.

OTING AT MEETINGS.

Votes.-At any meeting every resolution shall in the 78. Votes.—At any meeting every resolution shall in the first instance be decided by a show of hands. In case there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman at such meeting shall be entitled to give a casting vote in addition to the votes to which he may be entitled as a shareholder and unless a poll be immediately demanded by the chairman or in writing by some shareholder present at the meeting and entitled to vote, a declaration by the chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry 78. chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry to that effect in the minute book of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of the number of votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution.

Poll.-If a poll be duly demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner and at such time and place as the chairman shall direct, and the result of the poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded. The demand for a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded. The demand for a poll may be withdrawn. 80. Poll how taken. If at any meeting a poll be demanded

by the chairman or by a notice in writing signed by some shareholder present at the meeting and entitled to vote, which notice shall be delivered during the meeting to the chairman, the meeting shall, if necessary, be adjourned, and the poll shall be taken at such time and in such manner as the chairman shall direct, and in such case every shareholder shall have the number of votes to which he may be entitled as hereinafter provided, and in case at any such poll there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman of the meeting at which such poll shall have been taken shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any votes to which he may be entitled as a shareholder and proxy and attorney, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in such meeting.

81. No Poll on Election of Chairman or on Question of Adjournment.—No poll shall be demanded on the election of a chairman of the meeting or on any question of adjournment.

82. Voting in Person or by Proxy or Attorney.---Votes may be given either personally or by proxy or by attorney duly authorized.

83. Number of Votes to which Shareholder entitled.—On a show of hands every shareholder present in person or by attorney duly authorized shall have one vote only. In case of a poll every shareholder present in person or by proxy or attorney shall have one vote for every there hold by him share held by him.

84. Proxy or Attorney though not Shareholdermay Vote. A person appointed as proxy or attorney need not be a shareholder of the Company, and may represent and vote for his principal at any meeting of the Company, or of any class of shareholders of the Company.

No Shareholder in arrear to exercise Rights and no 85. No Shareholder in arrear to exercise Hights and we Shareholder in arrear or not registered at least Three Months previous to the Meeting to vote.—No person shall exercise any rights of shareholder until his name shall have been entered in the register of shareholders and he shall have paid all calls and other moneys for the time being payable on every share in the Company held by him and no share-bolder shall be antitled to yote or speak at any general 85. holder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any general meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares, or any of them, shall have been paid; and no shareholder other than the curator of a minor shareholder, the committee of a lunatic shareholder or the person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any shareholder or the marriage of any female shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any meeting held after the expiration of three months from the

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registration of the Company, in respect of or as the holder of any share which he has acquired by transfer, unless he has been at least three months previously to the time of holding the meeting at which he proposes to vote or speak, duly registered as the holder of the share in respect of which he claims to vote or speak.

86. Instrument of Proxy to be in Writing.—Every in-strument appointing a proxy shall be in writing under the hand of the appointor or of his attorney duly authorized in writing, or if such appointor is a corporation, under the common seal, or under the hand of some attorney of such corporation duly authorized in writing in that behalf. 87. When Instrument of Proxy to be deposited.

The instrument appointing a proxy, with the letter or power of attorney (if any) under which it is signed, shall be deposited at the office at least forty-eight hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting or adjourned meeting, as the case may be, at which the person named in such instrument proposes to vote; otherwise the person so named shall not be entitled to vote in respect thereof. No instrument appointing a proxy shall be valid after the expiration of twelve months from the date of its execution.

88 When Power of Attorney to be deposited .-- The power of attorney under which a person proposes to vote shall be deposited at the office for registration in the books of the Company at least forty-eight hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting or adjourned meeting, as the case may be, at which the person named in such power of attorney proposes to vote, otherwise the person so named shall not be entitled to vote in respect thereof.

89. Form of Instrument of Proxy.-Every instrument of proxy, whether for a specified meeting or otherwise, shall, as nearly as circumstances will admit, be in the form or to the effect following :---

90. Objection to Validity of Vote to be made at the Meeting or Poll.—No objection shall be made to the validity of any vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) except at the meeting or poll at which such vote shall be tendered, and every vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) to which no objection shall be made at such meeting or poll shall be deemed valid for all purposes of such meeting or poll whatsoever.

91. No Shareholder to be prevented from voting by being personally interested in result.—No shareholder shall be prevented from voting by reason of his being personally interested in the result of the voting.

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DIRECTORS.

92. Number of Directors .-- The number of directors shall 92. Number of Directors.—The number of directors shan never beless than two nor more than five. In the event of the number of directors in Ceylon ever being reduced to one such remaining director shall immediately cause to be convened an extraordinary general meeting of the share-holders for the purpose of filling up one or more of the vacancies; but, in the event of a quorum of shareholders not attending such meeting (which shall not he adjourned not attending such meeting (which shall not be adjourned for the purpose of enabling a quorum to be present) the remaining director shall himself appoint a director to fall one of the vacancies. Any director so appointed shall hold office until the next ordinary general meeting of the Company. Company. Until such appointment the remaining director shall not act except for the purpose of appointing another and, if necessary, enabling him to be placed on the register

register of shareholders. 93. Qualification of Directors.—The qualification of a director shall be the holding in his own right alone, and not jointly with any other person, of shares of the Company of any class whether fully paid up or partly paid up of the total nominal value of at least two hundred and fifty rupees (Rs. 250) and upon which, in the case of partly paid up shares all calls for the time being shall have been paid, and this qualification shall apply as well to the first directors as to all future directors. A director may act before acquiring his qualification, but shall in any case acquire the same within two months from his appointment or election.

94. Remuneration of Directors.—As remuneration for their services the directors shall be entitled to appropriate a sum not exceeding one thousand two hundred and fifty rupess (Rs. 1,250) annually to be divided between them in

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such manner as they may determine, but the Company in general meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future, and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration for special or extra services hereinafter referred to nor any extra remuneration to the managing directors of the The directors shall also be entitled to be repaid Company.' all travelling and hotel expenses properly incurred by them

in or with a view to the performance of their duties. 95. Appointment of First Directors and Duration of their Office.—The first directors shall be Colonel Thomas Yates Wright, Harry Peter Cosmas, Esquire, Dr. Milanius de Almeida, and John Hangenbeck, Esquire, all of Colombo, who shall hold office till the first ordinary general meeting of the Company, when they shall all retire, but shall be eligible for re-election.

96. Directors may appoint Managing Director, &c., his Remuneration .-- One or more of the directors may be appointed by the directors to act as managing director or secretary, of the Company, for such time and on such terms as the directors may determine or fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office; and they may from time to time revoke such appointment and appoint another or other managing director or secretary, and the directors may impose and confer on the managing director all or any duties and powers that might be imposed or conferred on any manager of the Company. If any director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the directors may arrange with such director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, commission, or the payment of a lump sum of money, as they shall think fit.

97. Appointment of Successors to Directors.-The general meeting at which directors retire or ought to retire by rotation shall appoint successors to them, and in default thereof such successors may be appointed by the board or at a subsequent ordinary general meeting. No person, at a subsequent ordinary general meeting. To berson, not being a retiring director, shall, unless recommended by the directors for election, be eligible for election to the office of director at any general meeting, unless he or some other shareholder intending to propose him has, at least seven clear days before the meeting, deposited at the office, a notice in writing under his hand signifying his candidature for the appointment or the intention of such shareholder to propose him.

98. Board may fill up Vacancies.—The board shall have power at any time and from time to time before the first ordinary general meeting to supply any vacancies in their number arising from death, resignation, or otherwise.

99. Duration of Office of Director appointed to Vacancy.-Any casual vacancy occurring in the number of directors subsequent to the first ordinary general meeting may be filled up by the directors, but any person so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating director would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

100. To retire annually.-At the second ordinary general meeting and at the ordinary general meeting in every subsequent year, one of the directors for the time being shall retire from office as provided in article 101.

101. Retiring Directors how determined.—The directors to retire from office at the second, third, and fourth ordinary general meetings shall, unless the directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by hallot; in every subsequent year the directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in office.

102. Retiring Directors eligible for Re-election.-Retiring directors shall be eligible for re-election. 103. Decision of Question as to Retirement.—In case any

question shall arise as to which of the directors who have been the same time in office shall retire, the same shall be decided by the directors by ballot.

104. Number of Directors how increased or reduced. The Company in general meeting may from time to time increase or reduce the number of directors, and may also determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number shall go out of office.

105. If Election not made, Retiring Directors to continue until next Meeting.—If at any meeting at which an election of a director ought to take place, the place of the retiring director is not filled up, the retiring director may continue in office until the next ordinary general meeting, and so on, from meeting to meeting until his place is filled up, unless it shall be determined at mathematical is the target of the returner. it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of directors.

106. Resignation of Directors .-- A director may at any delivering such notice to the secretary, or by depositing the same at the office, or by tendering his written resignation at a meeting of the directors.

107. Directors may contract with the Company—A director or intending director shall not be disqualified by his office from entering into a contract or arrangement with the Company, either as vendor, purchaser, manager,

agent, broker, or otherwise, and no such contract or arrangement nor any contract or arrangement entered into by or on behalf of the Company with any person, firm, or company of or in which any director shall be in any way interested shall be avoided, nor shall any director so contracting or being so interested be liable to account to the Company for any profit realized by any such contract or arrangement by reason of such director holding the office of director, or of the fiduciary relation thereby established. Any director so contracting or being so interested as aforesaid shall disclose at the board meeting at which the contract; or arrangement is determined upon the nature of his interest, if his interest then exists, or in any other case at the first board meeting after the acquisition of his interest, and a director shall not as a director vote in respect of any contract or arrangement in which he is so interested as aforesaid, and if he do so vote his vote shall not be counted, but this prohibition shall not apply to any contract by or on behalf of the Company to give to the directors or any of them any security by way of indemnity or of security for advances or to a settlement or set-off of cross-claims, and it may at any time or times be suspended or relaxed, either prospectively or retrospectively, by a general meeting. A general notice that a director is a member of any specified firm or company, and is to be regarded as interested in any transaction with such firm or company, shall be sufficient disclosure under this article, and after such general notice it shall not be necessary to give any special notice relating to any particular transaction with such firm or company as aforesaid.

108. When Office of Director to be vacated.—The office of director shall ipso facto be vacated.—

- (a) If he resign his office.
- (b) If he become bankrupt or insolvent or suspend payment or file a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, or compound with his creditors.
- (c) If by reason of mental or bodily infirmity he become incapable of acting.
- (d) If he cease to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office, or do not acquire the same within two months of his appointment or election
- (e) If he cease to ordinarily reside in Ceylon or be absent from Ceylon for a period of six consecutive months.

Provided that until an entry of his office having been so vacated be made in the minutes of the board his acts as a director shall be as effectual as if his office were not vacated.

A director may hold any other office or position under the Company in conjunction with his directorship (other than that of auditor) and on such terms with respect to remuneration and otherwise as the directors shall determine, and a director may by himself or his firm act in any professional capacity (other than that of auditor) for the Company, and shall be entitled to remuneration accordingly as if he were not a director.

109. How Directors removed and Successors appointed.— The Company may, by an extraordinary resolution, remove any director before the expiration of his period of office and may, by an ordinary resolution, appoint another person in his stead. The director so appointed shall hold office only during such time as the director in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed.

INDEMNITY.

110. Indemnity to Directors, &c.—The directors, managing director, managers, agents, auditors, secretaries, and other officers or servants for the time being of the Company and the trustees (if any) for the time being acting in relation to any of the affairs of the Company, and every of them, and every of their heirs, executors, and administrators shall be indemnified and secured harmless out of the assets and profits of the Company from and against all actions, costs, charges, losses, damages, and expenses which they or any of them, their or any of their heirs, executors, or administrators, shall or may incur or sustain by or by reason of any contract entered into or any act done, concurred in, or omitted in or about the execution of their duty or supposed duty in their respective offices or trusts, except such (if any) as they shall incur or sustain by or through their own wilful act, neglect, or default respectively, and none of them shall be answerable for the acts, receipts, neglects, or defaults of the other or others of them, or for joining in any receipt for the sake of conformity or for any bankers or other persons with whom any moneys or effects belonging to the Company, shall or may be lodged or deposited for safe custody, or for any bankers, brokers, or other persons into whose hands any property or money of the Company may come, or for any defect of title

of the Company to any property purchased, or for the insufficiency or deficiency of or defect of title of the Company to any security upon which any moneys of or belonging to the Company shall be placed out or invested, or for any loss, misfortune, or damage resulting from any such cause as aforesaid, or which may happen in the execution of their respective offices or trusts, or in relation thereto, except the same shall happen by or through their own wilful neglect or default respectively.

111. No Contribution to be required from Directors beyond Amount, if any, unpaid on their Shares.—No contribution shall be required from any present or past director or manager exceeding the amount, if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past shareholder.

POWERS OF DIRECTORS.

112. General Powers of Company vested in Directors.— The management of the business of the Company shall be vested in the directors, and the directors may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Company is, by its memorandum of association or otherwise, authorized to exercise and do, and are not hereby or by statute directed or required to be exercised or done by the Company in general meeting, but subject nevertheless to the provisions of the Ordinance and of these presents, and to any regulations not being inconsistent with these presents from time to time made by the Company in general meeting; provided that no such regulation shall invalidate any prior act of the directors which would have been valid if such regulation had not been made.

PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS,

113. Meetings of Directors.—The directors may meet for the dispatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings as they may think fit, and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business; until otherwise determined, two directors shall be a quorum.

114. A Director may summon Meetings of Directors.— A director may at any time and the secretary shall at the request of a director, summon a meeting of directors.

115. Who is to preside at Meetings of Bodrd.—The board may elect a chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the director, shall be presided over by the chairman, if one has been elected and if present, but if there be a vacancy in the office of chairman, or if at any meeting of directors the chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then and in that case the directors present shall choose one of their number to be chairman of such meeting

116. Questions at Meetings how decided.—Any question which shall arise at any meeting of the directors shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the chairman thereat shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a director.

117. Board may appoint Committees.—The board may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes, but every committee so formed shall, in exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the board. All acts done by any such Committee, in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effect as if done by the board.

118. Acts of Board or Committee valid notwithstanding Informal Appointment.—The acts of the board or of any committee appointed by the board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the board or committee, or defect in the appointment of any director or of any member of the committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect had existed, and as if every person had been duly appointed, provided the same be done before the discovery of the defect.

119: Regulations of Proceedings of Committees.—The meetings and proceedings of such committees shall be governed by the provisions herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such committee respectively, or any regulation imposed by the board.

120. Resolution in Writing by all the Directors as valid as if passed at a Meeting of Directors. A resolution in writing signed in approval thereof by all the directors for the time being resident in Ceylon shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the directors duly called and constituted, provided that not fewer than two directors shall sign it.

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121. Minutes of Proceedings of the Company and the Directors to be recorded.—The directors shall cause minutes to be made in books to be provided for the purpose of the following matters, videlicet :—

- (a) Of all appointments of officers and committees made by the directors.
- (b) Of the names of the directors present at each meeting of the directors and of the members of any committee appointed by the board present ta each meeting of the committee.
- (c) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all general meetings.
- (d) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of the directors and of the committees appointed by the board.
- (e) Of all orders made by the directors.
- (f) Of the use of the Company's seal.

122. Signature of Minutes of Proceedings and effect thereof.—All such minutes shall be signed by the person or one of the persons who shall have presided as chairman at the general meeting, the board meeting, or committee Meeting at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person or one of the persons who shall preside as chairman at the next ensuing general meeting, board meeting, or committee meeting, respectively; and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any chairman of any general meeting, board meeting, or committee meeting, respectively, shall for all purposes whatsoever, be primá facie evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and the regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as chairman, and of the date on which such meeting was held.

COMPANY'S SEAL.

123. The Use of the Seal.—The seal of the Company shall not be used or affixed to any deed certificate of shares or other instrument except on the presence of two or more of the directors, or of one director and the secretary of the Company, who shall attest the sealing thereof; such attestation on the part of the secretary, in the event of a firm being the secretary, being signified by a partner or duly authorized manager, attorney, or agent of the said firm signing the firm name or the firm name per procurationem or signing for and on behalf of the said firm as such secretary, and in the event of a company whether domiciled or incorporated in the Island of Ceylon or elsewhere being the secretary, being signified by a director or the secretary or the duly authorized attorney of such company signing for and on behalf of such company as secretary. The sealing shall not be attested by one person in the dual capacity of director and representative of the secretary. Any instrument sealed with the seal of the Company and signed by two or more directors or by one director and the secretary of the Company shall be presumed to be duly executed.

ACCOUNTS.

124. What Accounts to be kept.—The directors, shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid-up capital for the time being of the Company, and of all sums of money received and expended by the Company, and of the matters in respect of which such receipt and expenditure take place, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company, and generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for showing the true financial state and condition of the Company; and the accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the office as the directors think fit.

125. Accounts how and when open to Inspection.—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether, and to what extent and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations the accounts and books of the Company or any of them shall be open to the inspection of the shareholders; and no shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or book or document of the Company, except as conferred by the Ordinance or authorized by the directors or by a resolution of the Company in general meeting.

126. Profit and Loss Account and Balance Sheet to be furnished to General Meeting.—At the ordinary general meeting in every year the directors shall lay before the Company a profit and loss account and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company for the period since the preceding account and balance sheet, or, in the case of the first account and balance sheet since the incorporation of the Company, made up to a date not more than six months before such meeting. 127. Report to accompany Statement.—Every such account and balance sheet shall be accompanied by a report of the directors as to the state and condition of the Company and as to the amount which they recommend to be paid out of the profits by way of dividend to the shareholders and the account, balance sheet, and report, shall be signed by the directors.

128. Copy of Balance Sheet to be sent to Shareholders.—A printed copy of such balance sheet shall, at least two months previous to such meeting, be delivered at, or posted to, the registered address of every shareholder.

DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

129. Where any asset is bought by the Company as from a past date (whether such date be before or after the incorporation of the Company) upon the terms that the Company shall as from that date take the profits and bear the losses thereof, such profits or losses, as the case may be, shall, at the discretion of the directors, be credited or debited wholly or in part to revenue account, and in that case the amount so credited or debited shall for the purpose of ascertaining the fund available for dividend be treated as a profit or loss arising from the business of the Company.

Division of Profits.—Subject to the rights of holders of shares issued upon special conditions and to any arrangement that may be made by the Company to the contrary and subject as to shares not fully paid up to any special arrangement made as regards money paid in advance of calls and subject to the provisions of these presents as to reserve fund the profits of the Company shall be divisible among the shares held by them respectively.

131. Declaration of Dividends.—The Company in general meeting may declare a dividend to be paid to the shareholders according to their rights and interests in the profits and may fix the time for payment. Provided always that if shares shall have been issued during the course of a financial year the holder thereof shall subject to any arrangement made by the directors to the contrary only be entitled to have paid to him in respect of dividends on such shares a proportionate part of the dividends for such financial year calculated on the proportionate part of the year from the dividends as earned rateably over the whole year. No dividend shall be payable out of the capital of the Company and the declaration of the board as to the amount available for dividend shall be conclusive. 132. Payment of Dividend in Specie, &c.—Any general meeting may direct payment of any dividend declared at such meeting or of any interim dividend, which may subsequently be declared by the directors, wholly or in part in sterling by means of drafts or cheques on London, or by the distribution of specific assets and in particular of paid-up shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company, or of any other company, or in any other form of specie, or in any one or more of such ways, and the directors shall give effect to such direction ; and where any difficulty arises in regard to the distribution, they may settle the same as they think expedient and in particular may issue fractional certificates, and may fix the value for distribution of such specific assets, or any part thereof, and may determine that cash payments shall be made to any shareholder upon the footing of the value so fixed, in order to adjust the rights of all parties, and may vest any such specific assets in trustees upon such trusts for the persons entitled to the dividend as may seem expedient to the board.

133. Interim Dividend.—The directors may, also if they think fit from time to time and at any time, without the sanction of a general meeting, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year.

134. Reserve Fund.—Previously to the directors paying or recommending any dividend on preference or ordinary shares, they may set aside, out of the profits of the Company, such sum as they think proper as a reserve fund, and may invest the same in such securities as they shall think fit (subject to the provisions of article 3 hereof) or place the same on fixed deposit in any bank or banks, and may from time to time deal with, vary, or realize such securities and dispose of all or any part thereof for the benefit of the Company. The directors may divide the reserve fund into such special funds as they think fit, with full power to employ the assets constituting the reserve fund in the business of the Company, and that without being bound to keep the same separate from the other assets and the directors may also carry forward any profits which they may deem it not prudent to divide.

135. Application thereof.—The directors may from time to time apply such portions as they think fit of the reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for the payment of accumulated dividends due on preference shares or for accumulated dividends due on preference shares or for equalizing dividends, or for special dividends, or for work-ing the business of the Company, or for repairing or main-taining or extending the buildings and premises, or for the repair or renewal or extension of the property or plant connected with the business of the Company or any part thereof, or for any other purpose of the Company which they may from time to time deem expedient.

136. Capitalization of Reserve.-The Company in general meeting may at any time and from time to time pass a resolution that any sum not required for the payment or provision of any fixed preferential dividend and (a) for the time being standing to the credit of any reserve fund or reserve account of the Company including premiums received on the issue of any shares or debentures of the Company or any sum arising from any operation creating an excess of assets on capital account or (b) being undivided net profits in the hands of the Company, be capitalized, and that such sum be set free for distribution and be appropriated as capital to and amongst the shareholders or amongst the members of any class of shareholders in accordance with their rights and in the shares and proportions in which they would have been entitled thereto if the same had been distributed by way of dividend on the shares and in such manner as the resolution may direct and such resolution shall be effective provided that such powers shall not be exercised unless recommended by the board, and the directors shall, in accordance with such resolution, apply such sum in paying up in full (or, with the consent of the shareholders, aforesaid in part) any unissued shares or debentures or other obligations of the Company on behalf of the Shareholders aforesaid, and appropriate such shares or debentures or other obligations and distribute the same credited as fully paid up (or, as the case may be, partly paid up) amongst the shareholders aforesaid in the proportions aforesaid in satisfaction of their shares and interests in the said capitalized sum, or shall apply such sum or any part thereof on behalf of the shareholders aforesaid in paying up the whole or part of any uncalled balance which shall for the time being be unpaid in respect of any issued shares held by such shareholders aforesaid or otherwise deal with such sum as directed by such resolution. Where any difficulty arises in respect of any such distribution the directors may settle the same as they think expedient, and in parti-cular they may issue fractional certificates, fix the value for distribution of any shares or depentures, depenture stock, or other obligations, make cash payments to any shareholders on the footing of the value so fixed in order to adjust rights, and vest any such shares or debentures or other obligations in trustees upon such trusts for the persons entitled to share in the appropriation and distribution as may seem just and expedient to the directors.

137. Unpaid Interest or Dividend not to bear Interest. No unpaid interest or dividend shall ever bear interest against the Company.

138. No Shareholder to receive Dividends while due to Company.—No shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend or bonus in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares, or otherwise howsoever.

139. Directors may deduct Debt from the Dividends.— The directors may deduct from the dividend payable to any shareholder all sums of money due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding such sums shall not be payable until

142. Shares held by a Firm.—Every dividend payable in respect of any share held by a firm may be paid to, and

143. Joint-holders other than a Firm.—Every dividend payable in respect of any share held by several persons jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons.

AUDIT.

Accounts to be audited .- The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correctness of the profit and loss account and balance sheet ascertained by one or more auditor or auditors

145. Qualification of Auditors.—No person shall be eligible as an auditor who is interested otherwise than as a shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but an auditor shall not be debarred from acting as a professional which the directors may deem necessary. It shall not be a necessary qualification for an auditor that he be a shareholder of the Company, and no director or officer of the Company shall, during his continuance in office, be eligible as an auditor.

146. 1: Date and Place of Examination.—There shall be two Matriculation Examinations held in Ceylon (at Colombo, Galle, Jaffna, and Kandy in each year, one commencing on the second Tuesday in January and the other on the first Tuesday in June.

2. Qualifications for Admission .- The Matriculation Examination is open to men and women. No candidate shall be admitted to the Examination unless he shall have completed his sixteenth year on or before the following dates :-

3. Students who have already Matriculated are not permitted to take the examination as a whole. Any Matricu-lated Student may enter for the Matriculation Examination with a view to passing in one or more supplementary subjects set out in the Regulations. For information whether a Supplementary Examination in any Special Language can be held, application should be made to this office.

No candidate will be permitted to take an Alternative Lower Paper in an examination for a Supplementary Certificate

Greek.

The paper shall contain (1) passages to be translated into English from Greek books not previously prescribed; (2) simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Greek; (3) questions on Grammar.

New Testament Greek.

The paper shall contain (1) passages to be translated into English from the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles; (2) simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into New Testament Greek; (3) questions on Grammar.

French

Ordinary Paper.

(a) Translation into English of two short passages of French

(c) Free composition based on a skeleton outline (150-200 words).

African and Oriental Languages (including Hebrew).

The paper in any African or Oriental Language, including Hebrew, approved for the Matriculation Examination, shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus :---

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question; (2) an easy piece for translation into the language in question, or as an alternative an essay of a simple character to be written in the language in question; (3) questions on Grammar, limited to accidence and elementary syntax.

The questions will be framed to test general knowledge of history and historical development rather than memory of detail.

One of the following branches (one paper of three hours will be set in each branch) :

V.-GEOGRAPHY.

A broad study of the outlines of World Geography, including the division of the World into Geographical Regions. The following regions in decreasing detail :--

(b) Europe, with its bordering seas.
(c) The rest of the world.

Attention should be directed to the British Empire from the point of view of its world setting. The study should be based upon the principles of Physical

Geography, of which the candidate will be expected to have an elementary knowledge. Attention should be directed to the interaction between the

environmental factors on the one hand and the life, settlements, occupations, and movements of mankind upon the other; importance should be attached to the development of industries and commerce.

In addition to questions requiring descriptive answers, practical exercises may be set on such subjects as maps and map-reading (including local large-scale maps), meteorological and other geographical statistics.

VI.-LOGIC.

The Examinations in Science shall aim at ascertaining whether candidates possess a knowledge of fundamental scientific methods acquired by observation of nature or by a simple course of experi-ments in physical measurement, or by the investigation of simple problems and commonly occurring phenomena illustrating natural laws.

GENERAL BIOLOGY.[†]

GENEBAL BIOLOGY.[†] It is intended that except in the types marked* the work should be carried only so far as is possible with the naked eye, or by use of a simple hand lens. The types studied should be dealt with so as to bring out the broad principles of classification. 1. The structure, functions and reproduction of a typical plant and animal cell, e.g., Spirogyra,* Amoeba.* 2. The fundamental facts of nutrition, elimination of waste, storage of reserve material, respiration, growth and irritability in plants and animals, including saprophytes and parasites, e.g., a mould, a mildew, and an animal parasite (Ascaris). A study of the factors governing the distribution of plants and animals, including an elementary study of soils. Seasonal changes. An annual, a biennial, a perennial herb; trees. Conditions under which life can exist. Differences between animals and plants. Elementary factors of the circulation of carbon and nitrogen. The questions set will have regard to the conditions under which these subjects may best be experimentally taught in schools. Experimental physiology should be illustrated mainly by plants and should comprisesimple experiments on absorption, conduction, transpiration, photosynthesis (carbon dioxide assimilation), respiration, growth, and tropic movements. (An elementary knowledge will be assumed of the chemical and physical properties of the atmosphere and of water.)

2. The main phenomena of the life-history of common flowering plants (excluding the microscopic processes of maturation and union of the sexual elements and of the development of the seed). The mechanisms of pollination; fruit and seed dispersal. Germination, particularly as illustrated by seedlings easily grown in the garden or in pots or boxes. The structure of garden soil. Different types of soil and their water and air contents. Rough methods of mechanical analysis of soils.

3. The nature and structure (excluding miscroscopic details) of the vegetable materials met with in every-day life, such as wood, cork, &c. (excluding manufactured substances); also of the common edible fruits and vegetables.

4. The description of a flowering plant (not necessarily be-longing to one of the Natural Orders enumerated below) and a knowledge of the following Natural Orders, as illustrated by wild or commonly cultivated plants :---Dilleniaceae, Malvaceae, Myrtaceae, Leguminesae, Compositae, Convolvulaceae, Soro-phulariaceae, Palmaceae or Commelinaceae, Orchidaceae.

5. An elementary knowledge of the nutrition, growth, irrita-bility of plants, particularly of such facts as can be demonstrated by simple qualitative and quantitative experiments. Candidates will be expected to show evidence that they have performed such experiments themselves.

The questions set will have regard to the conditions under which these subjects may best be experimentally taught in schools.

(An elementary knowledge will be assumed of the chemical and physical properties of the atmosphere and of water, together with some acquaintance with the use of the barometer and thermometer.)

6. The main features of the more easily accessible types of vegetation, and of the different habitats in which they are found. Common weeds of cultivated soil, and the causes of their prevalence.

An elementary knowledge of the adaptations shown by nativo plants to their environment.

7. The outlines of the cellular structure of the living plant as shown for example in simple fresh-water alage and in the mesophyll of a foliage leaf.

Zoology.

(1) The general principles of animal life treated in an elementary fashion and illustrated by the types specified in paragraph (4) Growth and Metamorphosis as illustrated by the frog and butterfly. Conditions under which life can exist. Differences between animals and plants.

(2) The gross structure of the skin ; the skeleton ; the alimen-tary tract and its glands ; the respiratory mechanism ; the vascular system ; the central nervous system ; and the functions of these organs in a typical mammal.

(3) The structure and mode of life of Amoeba and Hydra treated in an elementary manner.

(4) The chief external characters and mode of life of a jelly fish (Aurelia), an anemone, and a coral, an earth worm, a cray-fish or lobster, a blow-fly, a bee, a butterfly, a spider (the structure of the mouth parts of the foregoing arthropods not to be studied in detail), a starfish, a fresh-water mussel, and a snail, a fish, a frog, a lizard, a tortoise, and a snake, and a typical bird and manual mammal.

Candidates must possess a practical acquaintance with the external characters of the types specified in section (4).

(5) The distinguishing features of the following groups :---Protozoa, Coelenterata, Echinodermata, Annelida, Arthropoda (Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida), Mollusca, Vertebrata (Fishes Amphibians, Reptiles, Birds, and Mammals).

† Candidates should bring a hand lens, a sharp knife, drawing pencil, and Indiarubber. In this examination special stress is laid on competence in drawing. 1. . . .

 General succession of the Fossiliferous Strata. Candidates are expected to have practical acquaintance with the commonest minerals, rocks, and fossils.

Music.

Candidates must be prepared to undergo the following tests : (1) To answer questions on the rudiments of musical know-ledge including the transposition of a musical passage and the naming of the keys through which it passes, in both the original and the transposed versions.

Not more than three questions will be set in the foregoing subject.

(2) (a) To complete a melody of not less than 8 bars in all the opening of which will be given. The melody to modulate at least once and return finally to the original key.

(2) (b) To write a melody to a given stanza of poetry.

(3) To show a competent knowledge of Triads and their versions, the Dominant 7th and its inversions, suspensions. inver passing notes (accented and unaccented), cadences, and simple modulation.

N.B.-The tests under heading 3 will include

(i.) The writing of specified tharmonies in their suitable context :

(ii.) The addition of a melodious under-part to a given melody, making good two-part harmony ;

(iii.) Either the harmonizing of a melody in a way suitable for a string Trio; or, alternatively, the writing of a simple planoforte accompaniment to a given melody.

(iv.) The writing of a Modulation from a given key to a related key.

(4) The candidate will also be required to give a concise analysis of a movement in Sonata formic written for the Pianoforte.

N.B.—The term 'sonata form' shall signify first movement form only, and no knowledge of Rondo or Rondo Sonata form shall be implied.

(5) To show some knowledge of musical works and their composers.

The questions to be set will include-

(i.) The identification of short extracts from British National

songs or from well-known instrumental works; (ii.) An acquaintance with the outlines of musical history, within a specified period *, which will be set for each year's examination.

N.B.-Detailed biographical information will not be required.

Economics

Meaning of the principal economic terms. The material wants of mankind : how they are satisfied by production ; the organization of production under the influence of the various social institutions ; the functions and determination of price ; money and the general level of prices ; wages and other forms of income, their different sources and comparative magnitude.

ORDER OF EXAMINATION.

ORDER OF EXAMINATION. The Examination will extend over a period of four days; two papers of three hours each will be set on each day the times being 9 to 12 in the morning, and 1.30 to 4.30 in the afternoon. On the first day of the Examination (Tuesday) there will be two papers of three hours each in Elementary Mathematics, or Alternative Lower Elementary Mathematics; the morning paper on the second day will be English; and the order of the other papers which it is necessary for a candidate to take will be announced in the Time Table which will be sent 'o each candidate.

As regards the Compulsory Subjects, one paper is set in English, and two papers are set in Elementary Mathematics, and a further two in Alternative Lower Elementary Mathematics. In meny of the Alternative Lower Elementary Mathematics. In many of the optional subjects, in order to compress the Examination into as short a period as possible, two papers will be set, of which the candidate will be allowed to take one only.

A pass certificate, signed by the principal officer and setting forth the subjects of examination taken by the candidate, shall be delivered to each successful candidate after the report of the Examiners shall have been approved by the Senate. †

APPENDIX.

REGISTRATION AS MATRICULATED.

Candidates are registered as Matriculates of London University if they pass one of the three examinations conducted by the University, viz. :--

(i.) The Matriculation Examination ; (ii.) The General School Examination ; (iii.) The Special University Entrance Examination ;

or one of the Examinations conducted by other Bodies which are accepted by the University in lieu of the Matriculation Examination.

For the Examinations on which total exemption is granted relevant regulations[‡] must be consulted. Students registered as exempt from the Matriculation Examination must pay a registration fee of three guineas to the enpropulate Bacistrar.

Examination must pay a registration fee of three guineas to the appropriate Registrar. Application for registration should be made to the University of London together with official certification of the necessary qualifications and the proper fee of three guineas. Bank Drafts or Money Orders must be made payable to the University of London and crossed "Westminster Bank, Ltd., Brompton Square Branch." The fee and evidence must be forwarded together by registered post and addressed to the Accountant, University of London, South Kensington, London S.W. 7. Should the certificate be found insufficient for registration purposes the fee will be returned. Unless the certificate shows the names in full and that the applicant is at least sixteen years of age evidence of age must be produced.

Conditions under which the Cambridge Senior School Certificate will give Exemption from the Matricula-tion Examination of the University of London.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on December 19, 1931, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated December 15, 1931.

-Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. W. A. S. Soysa; Dr. W. E. de Silva; Mr. H. P. G. Young ; Mr. Walter Beven.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meetings held on November 21, 1931, and December 12, 1931, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and copies thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :---

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1930 to November 30, 1931, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to October 31, 1931.
 (c) Health Officer's report for November, 1931.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of November, 1931.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended December 19, 1931.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910 be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the Government Gazette.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :---Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during November, 1931.

3A. Ratwatte Adigar wished that the Chairman should take up the question of demolishing all the temporary boutiques in the Market Grounds, beginning with the 4 which were already vacant.

Mr. H. P. G. Young drew the attention of the Chairman to the unsightly tea kiosk near the 'bus stand opposite 3в. the Queen's Hotel, and to other wayside tea kiosks round the lake and in other parts of the town, at which various nuisanees were being committed, and suggested that the Police be asked to carry out a more efficient system of night patrol to check the nuisances

The Chairman made a general statement on the question of wayside tea kiosks, indicating that in five cases he had instituted prosecutions against the keepers for encroachments on the road.

As a general prohibition was *ultra vires*, he hoped to submit definite proposals for prohibiting specific areas, and for dealing with the question more minutely, after December 31, 1931, when the permits issued to some of the wayside tea kiosk keepers would expire, and will not be renewed. Mr. W. A. B. Soysa drew the attention of the Chairman to gambling which was carried on near the tea kiosk on the road leading to "Westcliffe".

The Chairman undertook to look into the nuisances complained of and to take necessary action.

4. Petitions :---Mr. W. A. B. Soysa presented a petition from Mr. S. M. Abdul Cader asking for a beef stall in the Public Market. The Chairman undertook to look into the petition.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. Geo. E. de Silva was to move-" That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed to draft the Reformed Municipal Constitution for the Kandy Municipal Council and to take necessary action in connection with same." Owing to the absence of Mr. de Silva the motion was deferred for the next meeting.

6. Chairman's memo. dated November 27, 1931, with regard to the proposed extensions to the Municipal limit with petition dated October 26, 1931, from the residents of Huduhumpola, Bogodawatta, &c.

(1) Ratwatte Adigar moved that the question of extensions be considered towards the end of next year and to bring up the question in September, 1932. Mr. Soysa seconded.—Carried.
 (2) It was decided to have a General Meeting of Council on January 9, 1932, at 8.30 A.M., to examine the rough sheets of the Town Survey Plan.

7. Papers relative to the proposal to re-open the closed alternate standpipes in the streets of the town. Resolved that the closed standposts be not re-opened in view of the approaching drought.


