GRAEME THOMSON.

WHEREAS it seems advisable to the Governor to establish in Ambanpola village, Asgiri Pallesiya pattuwa, Matale South, in the District of Matale in the Central Province, a general cemetery for the burial or cremation of the dead within the limits hereinafter specified and defined:

And whereas the Governor may under section 6 (3) of "The Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, 1899," as amended by the Cemeteries and Burials Amendment Ordinance, 1931, exempt any cemetery either wholly or in part from the operation of sections 11, 16, 17, and 24:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, by virtue of the powers vested in Us by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, do hereby, under section 6 (1) of "The Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, 1899," as amended by the Cemeteries and Burials Amendment Ordinance, 1931, establish, as from the date hereof, a general cemetery on the land described in Schedule A hereto for the burial or cremation of the dead within the limits specified and defined in Schedule B hereto.

And We do hereby exempt the said cemetery wholly from the operation of sections 11, 16, 17, and 24 of the said Ordinance.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. The by-laws published by Notification dated July 3, 1918, in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* No. 6,956 of July 12, 1918, are hereby repealed.

2. No pension, gratuity, or long service allowance shall be granted to any officer of the Matara Urban District Council without the authority of the Governor.

3. Subject to the provisions of by-law 2 and the following by-laws, every officer of the Matara Urban District Council on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 360 per annum and upwards who shall have had service of ten years or more including any service which may be reckoned under the proviso to by-law 8 may be awarded a pension as follows:—

For the first one hundred and twenty months of such service a pension equal to 120/720ths of his annual salary and for each additional completed month of service an additional 1/720th of such salary, but no officer shall be entitled to draw more than 480/720ths of his final salary as pension.

4. The above-mentioned rates shall only be granted in cases of faithful and meritorious service, but when the testimony as to fidelity, diligence, and merit is in any respect defective, a deduction from such rates may be made. Where there has been obvious negligence, irregularity, or misconduct, the grant of a pension may be altogether withheld.

5. In the case of officers on the fixed establishment of the Council drawing a salary of Rs. 360 per annum and upwards retiring on account of illness or age before

completing one hundred and twenty months' gross service a gratuity may be granted calculated at the rate of one-twelfth of a month's pay of the permanent office or offices held at the time of retirement, for each completed month of service.

6. Officers of the Matara Urban District Council shall have no absolute right to any pension, gratuity, or long service allowance under these by-laws, and the Matara Urban District Council retains power and authority to dismiss any such officer without any compensation.

7. No pension, gratuity, or long service allowance shall be granted to any officer of the Matara Urban District Council who shall be under fifty-five years of age, except upon a certificate from the Chairman and two medical practitioners that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body of discharging the duties of his office, nor unless he shall have discharged such duties theretofore with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Council.

8. The claim of an officer of the Matara Urban District Council to pension, gratuity, or long service allowance shall be considered to have commenced from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Council or its predecessor, the Matara Local Board. Provided that an officer transferred from the provisional and temporary establishment to the fixed establishment may be allowed to count his provisional and temporary service when it has been continuous with his subsequent permanent service.

Service under sixteen years of age however will not count for pension.

9. The service in respect of which pensions, gratuities, or long service allowances are granted under these by-laws must in all cases be continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation of the officer.

10. The pension or gratuity shall be computed upon the salary of the permanent office held by the officer of the Council at the time of his retirement provided he shall have held such appointment for at least three years; otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.

11. In case of abolition of office, if the officer has completed 120 months' gross service, he may be granted a pension of 1/720th of his salary for each month of his service counting for pension with an addition to such service of one month for each completed period of two months' service, the addition in no case exceeding 60 months. If the officer has not completed 120 months' gross service he may be granted a gratuity of 1/12th of a month's salary for each month of service counting for pension, plus an addition of 50 per cent. thereon. In no case shall the number of months to be added to the actual service exceed that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would make that age up to sixty.

12. If any person being in receipt of any pension or long service allowance from the Matara Urban District Council shall be convicted of any offence in any Court of Justice in the Island for which he shall be sentenced to death or to any terms of imprisonment with hard labour exceeding six months such pension or long service allowance shall forthwith determine and cease to be payable, unless such person shall, within three months after his conviction, receive free pardon or unless the Council shall otherwise order.

13. Officers on the fixed establishment of the Matara Urban District Council may be required to retire on or after attaining the age of fifty-five, upon the receipt of twelve months' notice to that effect, but they may continue in office till sixty years of age with the consent of the Council.

14. (1) Every officer who is transferred to or from the service of the Council from or to any other public service and whose aggregate service would have entitled him, had it been wholly under the Council, to a pension under these rules, shall on his ultimate retirement from service, if he has served for a period of at least 12 months under the Council, be entitled to a pension which shall bear the same proportion to that to which he would have been entitled had the whole of his service been under the Council as the aggregate* amount of the salary which he has drawn from the Council bears to the total sum made up of such aggregate amount and the aggregate of the amounts received by him in the course of his public service elsewhere than under the Council.

* The term "aggregate" salary is to be interpreted as the amount of the aggregate salary of the substantive post held by an officer in the course of his career, disregarding extra emoluments such as duty allowances, and regarding leave on half pay or without pay as leave on full salary.

Provided, however, that in the case of an officer who is transferred to the service of the Council after other public service in which the rules regulating pensions do not offer the same privileges to an officer transferred from the Council to such public service as are accorded under these rules to an officer transferred from such public service to the Council and whose aggregate public service under the Council and elsewhere would have entitled him, had it been wholly under the Council, to a pension under these rules, such officer may with the sanction of the Council on his ultimate retirement from public service (provided such retirement takes place from the Council and that he has served for a period of at least five years under the Council) be entitled to receive from the Council, in lieu of a pension calculated in the manner prescribed in the preceding paragraph, a pension representing the difference between the pension or pensions earned by such officer in respect of his public service elsewhere and a pension calculated as if his public service had been wholly under the Council.

(2) For the purposes of this section the expression "public service" includes employment under the Crown or any Local Government public body or bodies.

15. Should an officer who retires on pension find after such retirement an employment under Government or under another semi-official body on a salary equal to or higher than that which he drew from the Council at the time of his retirement, his pension shall be suspended so long as such employment continues. If he draws a less salary he shall be entitled to only so much of his pension as when added to the salary of the new appointment will make his total emoluments equal to the salary last drawn by him previous to his retirement.

16. Employees on the fixed establishment of the Matara Urban District Council drawing salaries of less than Rs. 360 per annum and retiring on account of age or infirmity after serving continuously for a period of fifteen years and upwards may, if the Council be satisfied that they are unfit owing to age or infirmity of body or mind, further to discharge efficiently the duties of their offices, be granted such long service allowances not exceeding Rs. 7.50 per mensem in each case as the Council may award. Persons in receipt of daily pay, who have completed a period of fifteen years of continuous service, retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of one-eighteenth of a month's pay drawn at the time of retirement for each completed month's service.

REGULATION.

REPORT REFERRED TO.

At the conclusion of the trial of the election petition presented by Dr. Hans Martinus Peries to have the election of Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu on June 13, 1931, as member of the State Council for the Colombo North

Electorate declared void, and having on March 8, 1932 certified to His Excellency the Governor that the said election was void on the ground of corrupt practice on the part of the said candidate Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu and certain of his agents, viz., Victor Casiechetty, Dr. Solomon David Fernando, and J. Sitharam, I gave the following persons who had been proved at the trial to have been guilty of corrupt practices at the said election, viz., Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu, Hewagama Jayalathge Saiya Fernando, Victor Casiechetty, Dr. Solomon David Fernando, and J. Sitharam opportunity to show cause why they should not be reported to His Excellency the Governor under the provisions of Article 79 (1) of the Ceylon (State Council Elections) Order in Council, 1931.

The said persons did not show sufficient cause why they should not be reported, and I accordingly report as follows:—

(1) That Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu of Colombo was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice in that he did on or about June 9, 1931, commit the offence of bribery by giving Hewagama Jayalathge Saiya Fernando a sum of money to induce the said Hewagama Jayalathge Saiya Fernando to procure or endeavour to procure his return as a member of the State Council or to procure or endeavour to procure the votes of the voters of the Colombo North Electorate for him.

(2) That the said Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice, namely, undue influence in that on or about June 12, 1931, Victor Casiechetty as agent of the said Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu on his behalf and with his knowledge and consent caused to be printed and circulated a fraudulent device or contrivance which impeded or prevented the free exercise of the franchise by the voters of the Colombo North Electorate, to wit, a notice printed at the press of M. D. Gunasena and Company to the effect that any voter who received a white ticket, meaning thereby a ballot paper, should put it into the white box, meaning thereby the box provided for the votes for the said Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

(3) That Hewagama Jayalathge Saiya Fernando of Grandpass, Colombo, formerly the Manager of the Sastrawiwardene Sastraya Samitiya free school at Grandpass, was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice, namely, bribery, in that on or about June 9, 1931, in consequence of a payment of money to him by Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu he promised to endeavour to procure the return of the said Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu as a member of the State Council or to procure or endeavour to procure the votes of the voters of the Colombo North Electorate for the said Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

(4) That Victor Casiechetty of Elie House road, Colombo, an assistant in the firm of A. P. Casiechetty and Company of Fourth Cross street, Pettah, Colombo, was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice, namely, the offence of undue influence, in that on or about June 12, 1931, he caused to be printed and circulated a fraudulent device or contrivance which impeded or prevented the free exercise of the franchise by the voters of the Colombo North Electorate, to wit, a notice printed at the press of M. D. Gunasena and Company to the effect that any voter who received a white ticket, meaning thereby a ballot paper, should put it into the white box, meaning thereby the box provided for the votes for Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

(5) That Dr. Solomon David Fernando of Kotahena, Colombo, doctor in charge of the Modera Municipal Dispensary, was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice, namely, the offence of undue influence, in that he did on or about June 11, 1931, make use of threats to Palliya Muhandiramge Francina Perera and in the month of May to Ediripulle Aron Fernando to compel the said Palliya Muhandiramge Francina Perera and the said Ediripulle Aron Fernando to vote for Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

(6) That J. Sitharam of Colombo, Advocate, was proved at the trial to have been guilty of a corrupt practice, namely, the offence of undue influence, in that he did on June 13, 1931, use force to Eddirimuni Garlino de Zoysa Wijegune Waidyaratne in order to compel the said Eddirimuni Garlino de Zoysa Wijegune Waidyaratne to vote for Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

(7) That the aforesaid corrupt practices on the part of Dr. Solomon David Fernando and J. Sitharam were committed by them in the course of the election as agents of Dr. Ratnajoti Saravanamuttu.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 26, 1932.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 142 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 75 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 22 Moors, 7 Malays, and 5 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1932, viz., 291,260) was 25.5, as against 27.8 in the preceding week, 31.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 130 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 75 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 15 Moors, 2 Malays, and 6 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 23.3, as against 23.2 in the previous week, 24.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 130 total deaths, 31 were of infants under one year of age, as against 42 in the preceding week, 24 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fourteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 10 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 in New Bazaar and 1 each in Kotahena South and Maradana North, as against 19 in the previous week, and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Seven deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 2 each in Maradana North and Slave Island and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, and Kollupitiya, as against 9 in the previous week, and 10 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Phthisis*, of residents of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. (a) Two deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident). The number registered during the preceding week was also 2 and the weekly average for last year was 3.

(b) One death from *Enteric Fever*, of a resident of Colombo Town, occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week.

4. Ten deaths from *Debility* were registered, 6 from *Enteritis*, 3 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Worms*, 1 each from *Dysentery*, *Infantile Convulsions*, *Puerperal Septicaemia* and *Accidents* and 60 from *Other Causes*.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on February 20, 1932, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated February 16, 1932.

Present :—Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman ; Ratwatte Adigar ; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva ; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail ; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake ; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa ; Dr. W. E. de Silva ; Mr. H. P. G. Young ; Mr. Walter Beven.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on January 16, 1932, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1930 to December 31, 1931, on account of Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for January, 1932.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of January, 1932.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended February 20, 1932.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during January, 1932.

3A. Mr. Geo. E. de Silva drew the attention of the Chairman to the fact that the prices of beef and mutton in Kandy had undergone no reduction, although other places like Matale, Kurunegala, and Colombo, had reduced their prices. He also suggested that the proposals which the Council had adopted to relieve unemployment in Kandy by giving the unemployed work on the Deyannawela Housing Scheme be carried into effect with expedition.

The Chairman wished to have further details in regard to the reductions affected in other places in the prices of beef and mutton so that he might make out a case for reduction here. In regard to relief work for the unemployed, the Chairman said that tenders had been accepted in respect of the first four blocks, and the contracts would be signed by tenderers within the next few days. Meanwhile, the unemployed were given work in preparing the road and the bridge to the site for the transport of building materials. When those four blocks were completed the people whose houses had to be demolished, to find room for the rest of the scheme, would be moved into these blocks and the rest of the scheme proceeded with.

Mr. de Silva mentioned that if the whole scheme was carried through now, when the prices of building material and labour had gone down considerably, the Council would be able to affect a saving of about Rs. 50,000 on the original estimate for this scheme.

Mr. Beven desired to know what progress had been made in connection with the removal of wayside tea kiosks from the Lake Bund and from other places at which they were objectionable.

The Chairman said that he had inspected these with the Medical Officer of Health and had had photographs taken of about 12-15. He proceeded against two of the worst cases and hoped to deal with the others in due course under the Housing Ordinance.

Mr. Young drew attention to the enormous waste of water in Kandy and urged that every possible step be taken, to conserve the water supply and keep the consumption within 600,000 gallons per day.

The Chairman indicated the steps he had so far taken to prevent waste, including the cure of leaks in the distribution system, which had resulted in a considerable saving of water. The Municipal Engineer's inspections of the whole water distribution area to discover leaks were not complete, but when they were complete, he hoped that it would result in a further saving of water. The average daily consumption had decreased by about 100,000 gallons. He invited Mr. Young to submit any suggestions of a specific nature for preventing waste, which he and the Council would be very glad to take up.

4. Petitions :—(1) Mr. Usoof Ismail presented a petition signed by Mr. H. D. A. Appuhamy and several others complaining that adulterated milk is sold extensively in Kandy and asking that the by-laws be strictly enforced.

(2) Mr. Wijayatilake presented a petition from the tea kiosk stall-holders of the Public Market asking for a reduction in their rents.

The Chairman undertook to consider the petitions and deal with them.

5. To approve of the nomination of Ratwatte Adigar to serve on the Excise Advisory Committee for the three years from October 1, 1931.

Resolved that the nomination of Ratwatte Adigar be approved.

6. To obtain sanction to accept the surrender of the lease from the Y. W. C. A. and to grant a new lease to the K. S. S. L. for the period applied for, other terms being the same as in the present lease to the Y. W. C. A.

(8) To consider the desirability of discontinuing the practice of circulating with the Minutes, to the Committees concerned, the papers considered at their respective meetings in terms of Mr. Young's remarks on Circular No. 1022 of December 8, 1931.—Recommended that papers be circulated to Members of Council, less the Members of the Committee concerned in each case.

(9) Papers *re* Mr. H. B. Wijeratne's application for permission to tap the water service at his premises in Brownrigg street for the purpose of extending the service to the two other adjoining premises owned by him, which are all under one roof, in consideration of their combined annual value being over Rs. 1,200 and his readiness to connect the three premises with each other by internal doors.—Recommended that the application be refused.

(10) To obtain a vote for Rs. 220 for the purchase of a clay contour map of Kandy.—Recommended, the Surveyor-General to be asked to include all new roads, &c., as per recent survey.

(11) Papers *re* proposal to fix minimum and maximum rates of wages for kangannies, with statement showing the scales of pay on which overseers, sub-overseers, and kangannies are now employed, with the service of each such officer.—Recommended minimum at 75 cents and maximum at Rs. 1.25.

(12) Applications for increase of salary from—(i.) Mr. R. Van Twest, Overseer, Works Department. (ii.) Mr. C. A. Pillai, Overseer, Mahaiyawa Model Tenements. (i.) Recommended to place Mr. Van Twest on Rs. 75 per mensem plus rent allowance. (ii.) Recommended to allow Mr. Pillai free quarters at the Mahaiyawa Model Tenements, which he should under no circumstances sublet.

(13) Application from Mr. A. W. Cotton for a water service to his Motor Garage in Peradeniya road.—Recommended a metered supply.

(14) Estimate for Rs. 217 from the Municipal Engineer for providing an iron railing in the unprotected portion of Hantane road, at which a motor accident occurred recently.—Recommended to put up guard stones.

(15) Estimate for Rs. 390 from the Municipal Engineer for rebuilding a portion of the boundary wall in the Muslim section of the Mahaiyawa General Cemetery.—Recommended.

(16) Chairman's memorandum and Municipal Electrical Engineer's report on Pumping Schemes for augmenting the Kandy Water Supply.—Recommended to refer the report and memo to the Director of Electrical Undertakings and Mr. Thyne for their comments.

(17) Memo dated February 1, 1932, from the Municipal Engineer, recommending the adoption, from March 1, of a revised scale of charges for water service, fittings, labour, &c.—Recommended.

(18) Tenders received for the construction of Model Tenements at Deyannawela.—Recommended to accept the tenders of C. H. Arnolis Bass and D. C. de Alwis each to be allowed two blocks.

(19) Municipal Engineer's application for authority to buy one Winget Machine at a cost of Rs. 815, the expenditure to be met from savings on the vote for construction of Model Tenements.—Recommended to authorize the purchase.

(20) To consider measures suggested by the Chairman for preventing waste of water in Kandy, *viz.* : (1) Replacement of present Standpost Watchers by Standpost Watchers with pedal cycles. (2) Posting copies of by-law No. 139 in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil on standposts. (3) Temporary cessation of supply to standposts in case of misuse of water.—Recommended that the Chairman's suggestion be approved, and that the Standpost Watchers be allowed a cycle allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem each on their providing themselves with cycles.

(21) Papers relative to the introduction of ball-valves with a schedule of masonry cisterns now existing in dwelling houses, and to consider whether the size of the cisterns should be reduced as a means of preventing waste.—Recommended to enact as a by-law, regulation 7 of the Schedule annexed to the Colombo Waterworks Ordinance, No. 18 of 1907, with any necessary amendment, and to ask the Council's Lawyer to report in consultation with the Municipal Engineer what further Colombo Municipal Council Waterworks By-laws should be adopted for Kandy.

(22) To consider whether restriction of water supply should be enforced in view of the reservoir having ceased to spill.—Recommended to shut off water between 11 P.M., and 5 A.M., after Ramazan.

Extract from the Minutes of The Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on February 6, 1932.

(23) To consider the desirability of discontinuing the practice of circulating with the minutes, to the Committees concerned, the papers considered at their respective meetings in terms of Mr. Young's remarks on Circular No. 1022 of December 8, 1931.—Recommended that papers be circulated to Members of Council less the Members of the Committee considered in each case.

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted with the exception of items (16) and (22).

In connection with item (16) the letter of the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, stating that Mr. Thyne's fee for his report would be Rs. 750 was tabled and it was resolved that Mr. Thyne be not consulted as the fee was too high.

As regards item (22) the Chairman was authorized to enforce restriction at his discretion.

9. To elect a member to serve on the Standing Committee on Municipal Works in place of Mr. Geo. E. de Silva, who has resigned.

Mr. W. A. B. Soysa was unanimously elected.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Galle Municipal Council, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, January 16, 1932, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated January 11, 1932.

Present :—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman ; Mr. C. E. de Vos ; Mr. J. E. Perera ; Mr. D. I. Durham ; Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe ; Dr. S. P. Joseph ; Mr. P. R. Gunasekara ; and Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel.

1. The Minutes of the Special Meeting of January 9, 1932, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Resignation of the Hon. Mr. H. M. Macan Markar, a nominated member of the Council :—The Chairman read a letter dated December 14, 1931, from the Hon. Mr. H. M. Macan Markar tendering his resignation owing to his inability to spare the time to attend to the affairs of the Municipality. He said it was fitting that the Council should have a note of appreciation of his services placed on the minutes. Mr. C. E. de Vos formally seconded, and on behalf of the members expressed his regret at losing the very great assistance, particularly with regard to matters regarding his own community, which Mr. Macan Markar had given to the Council. The motion was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

3. To elect, by ballot, the four standing Committees for the current year :—A ballot was taken, and the Chairman declared that the following had been elected :—(1) Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment : Mr. C. E. de Vos, Mr. J. E. Perera, Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe. (2) Standing Committee on Municipal Works : Mr. C. E. de Vos, Mr. T. Amarasuriya, and Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel. (3) Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects : Mr. J. E. Perera, Mr. D. I. Durham, and Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe. (4) Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation : Mr. D. I. Durham, Dr. S. P. Joseph, and Mr. P. R. Gunasekara.

4. To appoint the Special Committee on Drainage :—The Chairman thought it unnecessary to appoint this Special Committee, but Mr. J. E. Perera moved that the Special Committee be re-appointed. Mr. D. I. Durham seconded.—Carried.

5. The Chairman moved that the excess leave of 24 days over 36 days granted to Inspector Haniffa in 1931, on account of illness, be sanctioned. Mr. D. I. Durham seconded.—Carried.

6. Resolved that the meeting of the Standing Committees be held on January 30, at 10 A.M.

7. Wiring of the public markets for electric lighting :—Resolved that a sum of Rs. 1,300 be voted for the improved lighting of the markets, to be carried out departmentally.

8. Considered the draft address to His Excellency the Governor :—Resolved that the address be approved as amended.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council :—

9. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of December 19, 1931.*

(2) To consider the following estimates :—(a) Rs. 400 for repairing the semi-permanent buildings in the Infectious Diseases Hospital.—Recommended. (b) Rs. 850 for a wooden bridge at Kanampitiya.—Recommended on the understanding that the bridge will be 7 ft. in width instead of 6 ft.

(3) To approve in terms of section 15 of the by-laws relating to the Registration of Dogs, the shape of the metal badge for dogs for the year 1932.—Resolved that the diamond-shaped badge be adopted.

(4) To frame rules relating to the payment of electricity dues :—(i.) considered together with the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment ; (ii.) recommended that the following rules be adopted—(a) that accounts be rendered on or before the 10th day of the following month ; (b) that if the account be not paid, a reminder be sent 2 days before the end of the month, requesting payment within 10 days ; (c) that if the account be still not paid the supply be cut off without further notice ; (iii.) that a leaflet embodying these rules be distributed to all consumers.

(5) To replace the corroded brackets of the lamps of the Town Clock with copper brackets, at a cost of Rs. 37.50.—Recommended.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted.

10. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of December 19, 1931.*

(2) To frame rules relating to the payment of electricity dues :—(i.) considered together with the Standing Committee on Municipal Works ; (ii.) recommended that the following rules be adopted—(a) that accounts be rendered on or before the 10th day of the following month ; (b) that if the account be not paid a reminder be sent requesting payment within 10 days ; (c) that if the account be still not paid the supply be cut off without further notice ; (iii.) that a leaflet embodying these rules be distributed to all consumers.

(3) To consider an application from the collector of Ward 4W and 5 for payment of a bonus for listing and numbering premises within the lately extended Police limits.—Recommended that the collector be paid a bonus of Rs. 125 for carrying out the work.

(4) To recommend, under rule 24 of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, the grant to the widow of A. W. Dionisamy, Engine driver and fitter of the Electricity Department, a gratuity not exceeding three months' pay of the office, and to the minor child a gratuity not exceeding one month's pay of the office.—Recommended (i.) the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 300 to the widow and Rs. 100 to the minor child ; (ii.) that the child's gratuity be deposited in a bank for one year.

(5) To write off as irrecoverable the following rates for the years 1929 and 1930, viz.—assessment Re. 1.20, consolidated Re. 1.64.—Recommended that the sums be written off as irrecoverable.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

11. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of December 19, 1931.*

(2) To consider papers *re* the purchase on behalf of the Council, of premises No. 11, Dangedera, when sold for non-payment of rates.—Resolved that the property be conveyed to the Council, under Section 146 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, and that an effort be made to sell it, in terms of the "Entail and Settlement Ordinance, 1876." Further action to be deferred until Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe has prepared a memorandum as to the nature of the action to be taken, and the probable cost.

(3) To consider claim from Mr. E. A. Paulas of Kandewatta for damage caused to his land by the removal of silt from the Keppu-ela :—Resolved that the Law Committee do take up the matter in lieu of a Special Committee as a matter of urgency and that Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe be asked to revise the answer drafted by the Council's Lawyer.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

12. Final consideration of applications for the post of Secretary.

The Chairman moved Council into Committee.

Council in Committee interviewed the following applicants :—Messrs. Serasinghe, Rodrigo, Mack, Juriansz, Gurusinghe, and Abeyratna.

Council in Committee balloted for four out of the above six candidates. Result : Messrs. Serasinghe, Rodrigo, Mack, and Juriansz.

The Committee balloted again for two out of the above four candidates, and Messrs. Serasinghe and Mack headed the ballot.

At the final ballot Mr. Mack received 5 votes and Mr. Serasinghe 3 votes.

Resolved that Council in Committee recommended that Mr. T. L. F. Mack be appointed.

The Chairman moved that Council do resume, and that the recommendation of the Council in Committee be confirmed. Mr. D. I. Durham seconded. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

13. Drainage scheme for Talapitiya.—Resolved that the Chairman be authorized to put the work in hand at once, and that it be carried out departmentally.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Galle Municipal Council, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, February 13, 1932, at 10 a.m., pursuant to notice dated February 6, 1932.

Present:—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe; Mr. T. Amarasuriya; Dr. S. P. Joseph; Mr. P. R. Gunasekara; Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel; and Mr. A. M. Saheed.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of January 16, 1932, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. E. Perera asked:—"In view of the wrong impression created in the minds of the general public by the contents of the petition presented to His Excellency the Governor at Galle by the Secretary of the Galle National League, and published in the newspapers, regarding the increased taxes in certain parts of Wards No. 4 and 5 and the number of properties gazetted for sale for arrears of assessment rates, will the Chairman make a statement explaining the circumstances under which the taxes had to be increased, and giving the facts regarding the number of houses actually sold for non-payment of taxes during the past year?"

The Chairman replied as follows:—"Since the Police limits of Galle were defined in 1911, the area lying between Richmond Hill road, Kumbalwella road, Elliott road, Hume road, and Cripps road has become much more developed, and now forms one of the best residential parts of the town. Many large houses have been erected in recent years. Water and electric light are already provided along Richmond Hill road and Wakwella road, and extension of these services to Elliott road is being taken in hand. In January 1931, Council resolved that this area should be included in the Police limits and the rates increased accordingly; and that water and electric light be provided along Elliott road. The proposal to redefine the Police limits was approved by the Governor, and the extended limits were proclaimed in May, 1931. On September 12, 1931, Council resolved to levy a rate of 17½ per cent. on the annual value of all property within the Police limits for the year 1932. A large number of properties are advertised for sale every quarter for arrears of rates, but very few are actually sold as the rates are recovered within the month which elapses between the date of advertisement and date of sale. For the four quarters—3rd quarter 1930 to 2nd quarter 1931—the mesne profits of 38 properties were sold for periods between one and ten years, and 13 properties were bought on behalf of the Council, and further time allowed to the owners for the payment of arrears.

3. The next item on the agenda was a motion by Mr. P. R. Gunasekara. With the consent of Mr. Gunasekara the item was postponed until the end of the meeting.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. E. Perera moved:—"Whereas the postponement of the consideration of constitutional reforms in the Galle Municipality pending experience of the effect of the reforms that are to be introduced in the Colombo Municipality seriously impedes the constitutional progress and the good government of the town of Galle, this Council resolves (1) that an application be made to His Excellency the Governor to alter the number of the divisions of this Municipal town from five to seven, by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 5 of the Municipal Council Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, by subdividing each of the divisions of Kaluwella and Galupiadde into two; (2) that it be recommended to His Excellency the Governor to declare in terms of section 11 (4) of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, that as regards the town of Galle the sums of Fifteen Rupees and One hundred and Eighty Rupees mentioned in 2 (g), 2 (h), and 3 (a) of the said section 11 be reduced to Five and Sixty Rupees respectively." Mr. P. R. Gunasekara seconded, and Mr. C. E. de Vos supported the motion.

Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe and Mr. T. Amarasuriya agreed to the second part of the motion, but thought there should be a re-division of the whole town, not alone of Wards 2 and 3.

The Chairman moved as an amendment:—"That a Committee of the house be appointed to make an early report as to the best method of dividing the Municipality into seven wards, and that the recommendation of the Committee, after consideration and revision by Council, be forwarded to His Excellency the Governor, with a view to action being taken under section 5 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910."

The mover and seconder accepted the amendment, which was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

The following were appointed a Committee:—The Chairman, the five elected members, and Mr. A. M. Saheed with Mr. P. R. Gunasekara, as convener.

The second part of the motion was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

5. To consider the adjustment of the accounts for 1931 by the transfer of expenditure votes:—Resolved that the excess expenditure for 1931 under heads 9, 14, 17, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27, 32, 50, 56, and 59 be met from the saving under heads 7, 18, 21, 22, 23, 31, 46, 57, and 60 as per details in the statement submitted.

6. To consider the Supplemental Budget for 1931:—Resolved that the Supplemental Budget for 1931 be passed.

7. To approve in terms of section 24 of the Council's Leave Regulations that 14 days' leave granted to the Secretary in 1931 owing to ill-health, be not deducted from the 52 days' leave for which he would be eligible on retirement.—Resolved that 14 days' sick leave in 1931 be not deducted from the Secretary's retirement leave.

8. To consider an application for one months leave from the Medical Officer of Health:—The Chairman moved that the leave be allowed and that the Council do pay the substitute a salary of Rs. 250 for the month, and the Medical Officer's car allowance. Mr. D. I. Durham seconded.—Carried.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

9. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of January 30, 1932.*

(2) To consider the following estimates:—(a) Rs. 22,000 for maintenance of roads; (b) Rs. 12,000 for converting 219 miles of metalled road into metalled and tarred road.—Resolved that the Superintendent of Works should split up the cost of maintenance (Rs. 700 a mile) into labour, metal, tar, and sand, and the papers be referred back to the Provincial Engineer who, in view of the above remark will re-scrutinize details of arrears to be converted into fully tarred roads. (c) Rs. 3,500 for maintenance of the Hiyare Service road; (d) Rs. 2,000 for maintenance of Victoria Park, the Esplanade, and public seats; (e) Rs. 540 for weeding the catchment area of Bikke Reservoir; (f) Rs. 600 for weeding the margin of Hiyare Reservoir; (g) Rs. 500 for examining and clearing the Fort sewers; (h) Rs. 3,000 for clearing the elms; (i) Rs. 500 for the improvement of Hume road; (j) Rs. 490 for draining the Fort public latrine.—Recommended

that the above estimates (c) to (j) be passed. (k) Rs. 2,600 for building a public latrine for males and females at Mahamodera.—Recommended that the estimate be reduced to Rs. 2,325 and passed. (l) Rs. 700 for building and outlet drain from culvert No. 74/7 (Magalle) to the sea; (m) Rs. 180 for building a culvert along Wakwella road; (o) Rs. 135 for a water cart for the Hiyare Service road.—Recommended that the above estimates (l), (m), and (o) be passed.

(3) To consider 8 applications for water service.—Recommended.

(4) To consider an application from A. L. A. Abdul Careem Hadjar to erect a building at No. 33, Galle-Matara road, a portion of which will come within the street lines:—(a) considered together with the Standing Committee on Law and General subjects; (2) the Committees decide that this is a matter which is purely within the jurisdiction of the Chairman.

Resolution.

With regard to item (2) (k) resolved that tenders be invited.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

10. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of January 13, 1932.*

(2) To waive the assessment rates of the 3rd and 4th quarters of 1931 on houses which were evacuated in the plague area in Wards 2 and 3, as per statement.—Recommended that the rates be waived.

(3) To consider a resolution of the Poddala Mahajana Sabha recommending the reduction of the annual tax on bicycles to Re. 1.—Recommended that the request of the Sabha be refused with regret.

(4) Application from the widow of R. L. P. Siyadoris, Overseer, Works Department, for a gratuity:—Recommended (i.) that under section 24 of the Council's Pension Rules, the widow be granted a gratuity of Rs. 157·50, and each of the four minor children a gratuity of Rs. 52·50; (ii.) that the gratuity of the minor children be deposited in the Savings Bank for one year.

(5) List of demolished buildings in Ward 2.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(6) Wages of canal labourers:—Recommended that the wages of K. G. William be calculated at Rs. 19·50 per mensem, and the wages of S. Pedris and K. G. Siyaneris at Rs. 16·50 each per mensem.

Resolution.

With regard to item (2) resolved to substitute "written off" for "waived".

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

11. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation of January 30, 1932.*

(2) To consider a report on the conservancy of public latrines.—Recommended that two whole time labourers who should undertake no other duties, Municipal or private, during the hours specified below, should be employed at (a) the Customs latrine, and (b) the Sea beach latrine; one labourer to be on duty between 7 A.M. and 4 P.M. and the other between 4 and 10 P.M.; the former to be paid Re. 1·25, and the latter 75 cents per diem respectively. The additional monthly cost will be Rs. 75.

(3) To consider an application for a licence to open a pork stall at Havelock road.—Recommended that a special licence be granted subject to the proviso that the licensee shall display a notice that the Council does not guarantee the freedom of the meat from infection.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

12. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of January 30, 1932.*

(2) To consider an application from A. L. A. Abdul Careem Hadjar to erect a building at No. 33, Galle-Matara road, a portion of which will come within the street lines:—(i.) considered together with the Standing Committee on Municipal Works; (ii.) the Committee decided that this is a matter which is purely within the jurisdiction of the Chairman.

(4) To consider the draft by-laws relating to bakeries, eating-houses, tea and coffee boutiques, dairies, and aerated water factories.—Recommended that the draft by-laws be adopted, and that they be circulated in the meanwhile.

Resolution.

With regard to item (4) resolved that consideration be deferred until the next meeting, and the papers be re-circulated in the meanwhile. Suggestions to be sent by the members one week before the meeting. The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

13. Relief to rate payers:—The Chairman moved the Council into Committee to consider what action is called for to grant relief to owner of properties who, by reason of their poverty, are unable to pay rates.

After an informal discussion in Committee, the Chairman moved that Council do resume.

Council resumed, and the Chairman moved:—"That the Chairman be asked to consider the financial status of the owner of all properties paying rates up to 49 cents per quarter, and that he do prepare lists of properties belonging to owners who, by reason of their poverty, as the result of the present depression, are unable to pay rates. This lists to be submitted to the Council with a view to Council taking such action to afford relief to the poor as may appear desirable." Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried unanimously.

14. Pursuant to notice, Mr. P. R. Gunasekara moved:—"That the old rate of 7 per cent. be continued to be charged in the new area brought within the Police limits by proclamation of the Governor dated May 16, 1931, until such time as water and electric lighting are provided along Elliott road. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.

The mover asked the leave of Council to defer his motion until the next meeting, on the understanding that the Chairman obtaining the opinion of Mr. E. J. Samarawickrema on the subject.

The leave of Council having been given, the motion was deferred until the next meeting.

15. The Chairman moved the Council into Committee to consider the behaviour of Inspector Haniffa and de Silva. The Inspectors appeared before the Council in Committee and the Chairman explained the charges against each.

The Council resumed, and resolved that the Inspectors should be given a severe and final warning, and that the Chairman do take steps to determine their term of office if any further cause of complaint arises.

16. Time of meetings.—Resolved that in future the meetings of the Council and Standing Committees be held at 9.30 A.M.

17. Retirement of the Secretary.—Mr. C. E. de Vos moved that the Council do place on record their appreciation of Mr. Arndt's able services as Secretary. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded, and the Chairman associated himself with what the speakers has said. The motion was carried unanimously.

Graham Parsons Earwaker, Tea Planter, of Boisahabi Tea estate, Seleng Hat P. O. Assam, British India, seeks leave to amend the Specification of Application numbered and dated as above for "Improvements in tea sorting and breaking machines" alleging as the reasons:—"I desire to make by specification agree exactly to that of the corresponding specification now accepted in the United Kingdom of Great Britain for the same of uniformity as my British Specification more clearly describes and defines the nature of my invention."

The proposed amendments are as follows:—

On Page 1.

Striking out the Title of the invention and substituting "Improved method of sorting tea and apparatus therefor".

On Page 2.

Striking out lines 1 to 10 and substituting "This invention relates to an improved method of sorting tea and to apparatus therefor and consists in feeding the material (tea and stalk) to be sorted into a space of such dimensions that tea and stalk greater than predetermined lengths are prevented from assuming positions sufficiently perpendicular with respect to the surface of a sieve that would permit them to pass through the sieve. The particles of tea of and less than the predetermined lengths are permitted to assume perpendicular or substantially perpendicular positions and therefore pass through the sieve and the particles and stalk greater than the predetermined lengths pass along the sieve and over the end or the edge thereof."

"A tea sorting machine according to the invention includes a surface or platform forming in conjunction with a sieve there adjacent, a space into which the tea to be sorted is fed. The sieve has a mesh such that all or most of the unsorted tea could pass through the sieve and the platform is so spaced from the sieve that the stalk and longer particles of tea are restrained from assuming perpendicular positions relative to the sieve when said machine is agitated, oscillated, or rotated in any known manner whereby the stalk and longer particles of tea are retained on the sieve till passed over its end while the smaller particles of tea pass freely through the sieve."

Striking out lines 26 to 28.

On Page 3.

Striking out lines 1 to 7 up to the word "case" and substituting "I am aware that it has been proposed to husk or peel coffee berries and the like by introducing them into an adjustable space formed between two inclined sieves or inclined perforated plates either or both of which sieves or plates were reciprocated by mutilated pinion gearing or cranks and pitmen; and I am aware that it is known to clean grain and separate it from water, grass seed, and other undesired elements by passing uncleaned grain into a space between an imperforate conical frustum and a semi-circular screen, the cone when rotated removing beards and husks from the grain, forcing seed through the screen and in virtue of having spiral flights or ribs around its periphery carrying the grain from one end of the screen to the other."

"The present invention differs from these proposals in that it relates to a method of sorting tea and to a machine adapted for carrying out the said method as above set forth, i.e., the material (tea and stalk), to be sorted is fed into a space having dimensions such that the stalk and longer pieces of tea cannot become sufficiently perpendicular with respect to a sieve to enable them to pass through the sieve; and the mesh of the sieve is such that all or most of the said material could pass through the sieve were some of its particles not prevented by an adjustable platform or plate from assuming the requisite position, the tea that is allowed to pass through the sieve being of or less than predetermined lengths."

Deleting Claims 1 and 2 and substituting:

"1. Improved method of sorting tea consisting in feeding the unsorted tea or the tea to be sorted into a space of such dimensions that tea and stalk greater than predetermined lengths are prevented from assuming positions sufficiently perpendicular with respect to the surface of a sieve that would permit them to pass through the said sieve, the particles of tea of and less than the predetermined length passing through the sieve and the other particles and stalk passing over the edge or the end of the sieve substantially as herein described."

"2. An improved tea sorting machine wherein is provided a surface or platform positioned adjustably adjacent to and above a sieve forming a space into which the tea to be sorted is fed, the sieve having a mesh such that all or most of the unsorted tea could pass through the sieve, and the platform being so spaced from the sieve that the stalk and longer particles of tea are restrained from assuming perpendicular positions relative to the sieve when said machine is agitated, oscillated, or rotated in any known manner whereby the stalk and longer particles of tea are retained on the sieve till passed over its end while the smaller particles of tea pass freely through the sieve substantially as herein described."
