GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

THE following regulations for entry and training of Naval Cadets at the Royal Naval College at Dartmouth, and training afloat are published for general information. It is hereby notified that the Government of Ceylon is included among the Governments of certain Dominions and Colonies which are allowed to recommend a certain number of candidates annually for entry as Naval Cadets into the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, *vide* regulation 9.

NAVAL CADETS.

Regulations for Entry and Training at the Royal Naval College at Dartmouth, and Training afloat.

1. No nomination is required by a candidate for a Naval Cadetship. All that is necessary is to send an application to the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. *Applications should not be made until the Candidate has reached 12½ years of age.*

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY AND SERVICE.

2. Candidates must be British subjects of pure European descent, and the sons either of natural-born or naturalized British subjects. In doubtful cases the burden of clear proof will rest upon the parents or guardians of candidates.

3. All Naval Cadets entered under these regulations are trained together, but, after passing for the rank of Lieutenant or at an earlier stage, they may be required to serve as general service officers, or in one of the specialist branches (e.g., Gunnery, Torpedo, Navigation, &c.) or as Engineer Officers, or be employed on other special duty.

As far as possible officers selected for special service will be allowed to choose the branch in which they will qualify, subject to the proviso that all branches are satisfactorily filled.

Parents or guardians of candidates for appointment as Naval Cadets must undertake for them that they are prepared to serve in any branch if required.

4. Parents or guardians are required to declare in writing their intention that the candidate, if he obtains a Cadetship, shall adopt the Navy as his profession in life; and it is subject to this undertaking that candidates are selected for Cadetships. Every Cadet who enters the Royal Naval College must therefore be prepared to continue his training so long as the Admiralty are satisfied with his progress, and parents are not at liberty to withdraw their sons at will.

On the entry of a Cadet, parents or guardians will be required to undertake that, in the event of his withdrawing or being withdrawn from the College, or from the Navy before being confirmed as a Sub-Lieutenant, or before reaching the age of 21 whichever is the earlier, they will pay to the Admiralty, if demanded, the sum of 40*l.* per term in respect of each term passed by him at the R.N. College, Dartmouth, from the date of his entry to the date of his withdrawal, as a contribution towards the balance of the cost of his training and maintenance not covered by the annual payment of the fees mentioned in paragraph 15.

This undertaking does not apply to Cadets withdrawn at the request of the Admiralty.

5. Entries take place three times a year, in January, May, and September.

Candidates for entry in January must be more than 13 years and 4 months, but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the preceding 1st December.

Candidates for entry in May must be more than 13 years and 4 months, but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the preceding 1st April.

Candidates for entry in September must be more than 13 years and 4 months, but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the preceding 1st August.

The Qualifying Examinations are held in December, March, and July, and the appointments of successful candidates date from approximately the 15th January, 15th May, and 15th September following, respectively.

6. All candidates (except those being educated in the Dominions or Colonies who have received special recommendations from the Dominion or Colonial authorities under paragraph 9) will be required to present themselves before a Committee, which will interview each applicant separately about one month before the date of the qualifying examination.

The applications must be received at the Admiralty:—

For the January entry *before* 16th October.

For the May entry *before* 16th January.

For the September entry *before* 16th May.

Appointments to Naval Cadetships are made by the First Lord from among candidates recommended by the Committee, and all such appointments are subject to the candidate passing a Medical Examination (see paragraph 7) and a Qualifying Examination in educational subjects (see paragraph 8).

The fact, however, of a candidate being invited to appear before this Committee is not to be understood as in any degree implying that he will necessarily be chosen to attend the Qualifying Examination.

Travelling and other expenses incurred in connection with interview and medical examination cannot be recovered from the Admiralty.

* Candidates are eligible only for one Interview and Qualifying Examination.

PHYSICAL STANDARD.

7. Every candidate must be in good health, and free from any physical defect of body, impediment of speech, defect of sight or hearing, and also from any predisposition to constitutional or hereditary disease or weakness of any kind, and be in all respects well developed and active in proportion to his age. Before undergoing the Qualifying Examination he is required to pass the Medical Examination according to the prescribed regulations, and must be found physically fit for the Navy.

The Medical Examination includes dental examination. If remediable dental defects are discovered, the parents or guardians of successful candidates are required to arrange for necessary treatment to be undertaken, at their own risk and expense, before the Cadet is due to join the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, where a further examination of the teeth will be made. Cadets are not entitled to receive dental treatment at the public expense. Arrangements should therefore be made by parents or guardians for Cadets to receive necessary dental treatment during the vacations.

It should be particularly noted that *full normal vision*—as determined by Snellen's tests—is required. Details of the physical requirements of candidates are shown on page 674.

* Should any case occur where a selected candidate is prevented by illness from attending the Qualifying Examination the Admiralty will consider whether special arrangements can be made for him to be examined by the Head Master of the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, either at the end of the current term or at the beginning of the ensuing term.

In the event of the rejection on medical grounds of a candidate who would otherwise have been selected for the Qualifying Examination, the parent or guardian will at once be informed that, subject to the payment of a fee of four guineas, the candidate may present himself for re-examination by an Appeal Board. This Appeal Board will consist of the Director-General of the Medical Department of the Navy, together with a physician or a surgeon or a specialist nominated by the Medical Consultative Board, according to the nature of the alleged disqualification or disqualifications.

SYLLABUS OF QUALIFYING EXAMINATION.

8. * The Qualifying Examination is in the following subjects :—

- (1) English (including writing from dictation and reproduction of the gist of a short passage twice read aloud to the candidates).
- (2) History and Geography, with special reference to the British Empire.
- (3) Arithmetic and Algebra (two-thirds of the questions in this paper will be on Arithmetic. The use of algebraic symbols and processes will be allowed).
 Arithmetic. The simple and compound rules, avoirdupois weight, linear and square and cubic measures, the elementary mensuration of rectangular surfaces and volumes, measure of capacity (pints, quarts, gallons), the metric system (the metre, gramme and litre, with their multiples and sub-multiples), money (including the relationship of the cent to the dollar, and the centime to the franc), reduction, factors, the addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, and simplification of vulgar fractions, non-recurring decimal fractions, simple proportion, ratio and percentage, simple interest.
 Algebra. The meaning of algebraic symbols, substitution of values, easy identities, equations of the first degree including simultaneous equations, verification of the solution of equations, problems leading to simple equations, multiplication and division by binomial operator, easy factors (excluding sum and difference of cubes), fractions with numerical denominators.
- (4) Geometry. The paper will consist of questions both on Practical and on Theoretical Geometry. All candidates must be provided with a ruler graduated in inches and tenths, and also in centimetres and millimetres, a small set square, a protractor, pencil compasses, and a hard pencil. Any proof of a proposition will be accepted which appears to the Examiner to form part of a systematic treatment of the subject. Simple deductions from specified theorems will be set. Proofs of the validity of constructions will not as a rule be expected, but they may be asked for.
 Practical Geometry. The constructions shown in the appended Schedule A, 1-7. See page 674.
 Theoretical Geometry. See appended Schedule B, page 674. The facts stated in the following theorems, together with riders on them, but without formal proofs of the theorems :—B, 1-11. Formal proofs of the following theorems, together with riders on them :—B, 14-19, 21, 22.
- (5) French, with an oral examination to which importance will be attached.
- (6) Latin (easy passages for translation from Latin into English and from English into Latin, and simple grammatical questions).

The list of successful candidates will be published in alphabetical order.

APPLICATIONS FROM CERTAIN DOMINIONS AND COLONIES.

9. The Governments of certain Dominions and Colonies are allowed to recommend specially (through the Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs and the Colonies) a certain number of candidates annually from among boys belonging to families resident in the Dominions and Colonies.

Unless such candidates, however, actually reside and receive their education in their own Dominion or Colony, they must be also recommended by the Interview Committee, and they must in any case pass the Qualifying Examination and the Medical Examination.

KING'S CADETSHIPS.

10. Successful candidates who are the sons of officers of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army, or Royal Air Force who have been killed in action, or have died of wounds received in action, whether afloat or ashore, or have died through the destruction of their ship, or have been drowned or have suffered other violent death due directly and wholly to war service, or have died of disease attributable to active service, may be appointed as King's Cadets.

King's Cadets will be entitled to the following privileges in cases where the Admiralty are of opinion that substantial help is needed towards the expenses of their naval training :—

- (1) The grant of an Outfit Allowance of 40*l.* on first entry.
- (2) The remission of fees at Dartmouth.
- (3) The remission of private allowance after leaving Dartmouth.

In cases where the above conditions are fulfilled by Cadets, already in the Service, the Admiralty may, at their discretion, authorize the remission of all future payments in respect of training fees and private allowance.

King's Cadets will be eligible for Children's Allowances as prescribed by the regulations, but will not receive Educational Allowances.

Applications for King's Cadetships must be received a month before a Cadet is due to join Dartmouth.

DURATION OF COURSE, TERMS, &C.

11. Naval Cadets will undergo a course of instruction at the R.N. College, Dartmouth, extending over eleven terms, or 3½ years. On passing out of Dartmouth, they will be sent to sea for a further period of training as a Naval Cadet before being rated Midshipmen.

12. The following are the approximate dates for the beginning and end of the three terms at the College, and the lengths of the vacations :—

16th January to 8th April	.. Four weeks at Easter (vacation)
6th May to 4th August	.. Seven weeks at Midsummer (vacation)
22nd September to 21st December	.. Four weeks at Christmas (vacation)

13. The friends of the Cadets must be prepared to receive them during all the vacations.

14. All Naval Cadets, while at the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, and while serving with the Fleet, shall be subject to the regulations respecting Cadets in force for the time being.

FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS.

15. For Cadets entering under these regulations, payment will be at the rate of 150*l.* per annum for the period under training at the College, to be paid in sums of 50*l.* every term in advance on receipt of a claim from the Accountant-General of the Navy, to whom cheques, crossed "Bank of England," should be made payable. But the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty reserve the power of selecting from among the Cadets entered on each occasion, a number not exceeding 30 per cent. of the entries, with respect to whom reduced fees will be allowed, viz. : at the rates of 40*l.*, 70*l.* and 100*l.* per annum (to be paid in sums of 13*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*, 23*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* and 33*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* respectively every term in advance). A proportion of those admitted at the reduced scales will be sons of officers of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army or Royal Air Force or of civil officers under the Board of Admiralty, the reduced scales being reserved for such boys up to 8

maximum of 10 per cent. of the total entries on each occasion. The reduced scales will be allowed only in cases where the pecuniary circumstances of the parents are, in the opinion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, such as to justify it. Forms of application for admission at the reduced scales will be issued in respect of all candidates who are selected* after the interview to attend the Qualifying Examination, and when duly filled in should be returned as soon as possible by such parents as desire to make application for the reduced scale. If the parents or guardians of a Cadet are resident abroad, arrangements should be made with an agent in Great Britain to pay claims for fees, &c.

If a Cadet is absent at home on sick leave for a period in excess of 21 days in any one term, an abatement of half the normal fee for the period of his absence is made from the claim for the following term, when the full duration of his absence is known. No such abatement is granted when a Cadet is sick in a Naval Hospital.

16. In addition to the above payments, any expenses incurred by a Cadet for clothing, sports, books, instruments, washing, &c., as well as the allowance of 1s. a week paid as pocket money, are included in the personal account sent to the parent from the College as soon as possible after the end of each term.

17. No pay is allowed by Government to the Cadets in the College, except in the case of Cadet Captains, who receive a small weekly allowance.

The pay of Cadets in a non-seagoing training ship is 1s. a day; or 4s. a day if sent to undergo their training in an ordinary seagoing ship and not to a special Cadets' training ship; and that of Midshipmen is 5s. a day. These rates are subject to revision.

18. The fees specified in paragraph 15 will cease on the Cadet leaving Dartmouth, when he will normally be sent to a seagoing ship, for a period of approximately 8 months, to complete his training before being appointed Midshipman. During this period, parents or guardians will be required to pay, in advance, an allowance at the rate of 1s. a day, which will be used to supplement the Cadet's naval pay of 4s. a day. In the event, however, of a Cadet being sent to a non-seagoing training ship after leaving Dartmouth, he will receive naval pay of 1s. a day only, and an allowance of 50% a year, payable in advance, will be required to cover his expenses during the period of training. The allowances will be claimed periodically by the Accountant-General of the Navy.

19. The parent or guardian of every Cadet is required to provide outfit under the regulations in force.

20. All travelling expenses for Cadets are advanced by the Paymaster of the College, who will charge the sum to the Cadet's personal account.

GENERAL REGULATIONS AT DARTMOUTH.

21. Inasmuch as the Cadets have a weekly allowance paid to them as pocket money, and a charge is made to pay the expenses attending their amusements, it is unnecessary that their friends should give them any money, except on joining or on their return from the vacations, and the amount should then be reasonable. Such money as may be required by a Cadet for any special circumstance will be advanced by the Paymaster under the authority of the Captain.

22. Any valuable gold watches or chains brought by the Cadets to the College will be taken from them and placed in security until the Cadets return home. Silver watches may be used.

23. Instructions to Cadets joining the College for the first time will be sent by the Commanding Officer. Cadets rejoining the College will be expected to make their own arrangements for doing so.

24. Cadets are to bring their linen clean, and clothes and boots in good order, when they join the College, and also when they return from leave, and the outfit, as specified on the list attached, must be complete. A list of the clothes left behind will be sent with Cadets when they go on leave.

25. Cadets are not permitted to open accounts with tradesmen. Parents or guardians are requested not to allow their sons' outfitters to supply clothes or other articles without their authorization.

26. Each Cadet on joining and on returning after the vacations is required to produce a health certificate—signed by his parent or guardian not earlier than the day before the Cadet's return—to the effect that, so far as is known, he has not, for at least three weeks immediately preceding his return, been exposed to any infectious disease, or entered any house where such disease had existed. A certificate, drawn up in the necessary form, is sent to each parent, and failure on the part of the Cadet to produce this certificate, duly filled up and signed, on his return will entail his not being received.

In the event of a Cadet being placed on the sick list, information is always sent to his parents or guardians, who are also kept informed of the progress of the patient should the illness be in the slightest degree serious.

27. Letters relative to the Cadets should be addressed to "The Commanding Officer, Royal Naval College, Dartmouth," if the Cadet is at Dartmouth, or "The Commanding Officer, H.M.S. . . . , c/o G. P. O., London," if the Cadet is serving afloat, and not to the Captain by name.

Parents or guardians of Cadets must inform the Admiralty and the Commanding Officer of the College or the ship in which the Cadet is serving of any permanent change of residence, without delay.

28. The course of study includes the following subjects:—

- Mathematics, pure and applied.
- Science, with laboratory work: Mechanics, Electricity.
- Chemistry, Heat, Optics, Sound.
- Engineering, with workshop practice, and Mechanical Drawing.
- Seamanship, with Gunnery and Torpedo while under training at sea.
- Navigation.
- French.
- English Grammar and Composition.
- English Literature.
- History, including Naval History.
- Geography.
- Selected subjects from list of "General Subjects."
- Bible Study.
- Drill and Physical Training.

29. In all subjects of instruction the principle will be followed of giving merit marks for current work. At the end of each term the Cadet's proficiency and progress will be tested, partly by examination, and partly by the marks gained for current work.

PASSING OUT.

30. The passing-out examination is representative of all subjects studied at the College, with the exception of Religious Knowledge and the "General Subjects," which do not form part of the official examination. Marks for work done during previous terms are combined with the marks directly awarded in the examination.

First, Second and Third Classes will be awarded, and the class obtained in passing out from the College counts afterwards towards promotion to the rank of Sub-Lieutenant, promotion being accelerated according to the following scale:—

For a First Class	4 months
For a Second Class	2 months

The amount of time awarded is subject to revision.

ADMIRALTY PRIZES.

31. The following is a list of the Admiralty prizes for Cadets at Dartmouth:—

Robert Roxburgh Prize.—Books, accoutrements, &c., to the value of about 20l., awarded to the Cadet who obtains the highest place each term in the Grand Aggregate of marks in the Passing-out Examination.

Graham Naval History Prize.—Books, instruments, accoutrements, &c., to the value of £6 : 6 : 0, awarded to the Cadet of the 8th, 9th or 10th Term who obtains the highest place in a voluntary examination (usually held in the Easter Term) on a special book or period of Naval History.

* Note.—Parents abroad will, however, be furnished with forms of application, prior to this selection if they so desire.

- Harold Tennyson Prize.*—Books to the value of about 5l., awarded each term to the Cadet of the 8th Term who comes out first in an examination in English Literature, comprising the end-of-term examination in English and a voluntary examination on a special book.
- Passing-out Examination.*—Two prizes each for Mathematics, French, and Science; one each for Scripture, Engineering, Navigation, Seamanship, History and English.
- Eighth Term Examination.*—One prize each for Mathematics, Engineering, Science, History, French, Scripture, and Seamanship.
- Fifth Term Examination.*—One prize for Grand Aggregate. Two each for Mathematics, Science and French; one each for History, English and Geography.
- Special prizes may be awarded at the discretion of the Headmaster for work of outstanding merit during the course.

WITHDRAWAL.

32. Cadets may be required to withdraw at any time, if, in the opinion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty—

- (1) They fail to reach a satisfactory standard, or
- (2) Their conduct is unsatisfactory, or
- (3) They are unsuitable for the naval service.

33. It is to be distinctly understood that the period of training, including the time spent as a Cadet in a seagoing ship, is a time of probation, and that the parent or guardian of a Cadet is required to withdraw him immediately, on the receipt of an official request for his withdrawal.

34. When a Cadet is found to be making insufficient progress, a letter is sent to his parent or guardian warning him of the possibility of having to withdraw the Cadet unless a marked improvement takes place. This warning is generally issued a term in advance, to enable the parent provisionally to make other arrangements for continuing the boy's education in case his withdrawal should become necessary.

Physical Requirements for Candidates for Commissions in the Royal Navy.

With a view to preventing candidates who may be physically unfit for His Majesty's Service from incurring the inconvenience and expense of preparing for commissions in the Royal Navy, it is suggested that they undergo examination by the medical adviser of the family, or any other qualified medical practitioner, to whom the following list of defects which cause rejection may be submitted for guidance.

It is to be understood that this private examination is merely suggested as a guide for intending candidates and to lessen the chances of disappointment, and that it is by no means intended to take the place of, or to influence in any way, the regular official physical examination.

1. A weak constitution, imperfect development, physical weakness, either hereditary or from chronic disease, wounds, or injuries.
2. Skin disease, unless temporary or trivial.
3. Malformation of the head, deformity from fracture or depression of the bones of the skull, impaired intellect, epilepsy, paralysis, or impediment of speech.
4. Blindness or defective vision, squint, *imperfect perception of colours*, fistula lachrymalis, or any chronic disease of the eyes or eyelids.

Candidates for Naval Cadetships at the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, must possess *full normal vision*, viz.: 6/6, and be able to read D = 0, 6, as determined by Snellen's Test types, each eye being separately examined. A high degree of hypermetropia will disqualify.

5. Impaired hearing, or discharge from one or both ears, or any disease of the external, middle, or internal ear.
 6. Disease of the bones of the nose, or of its cartilages, nasal polypus, or disease of the naso-pharynx.
 7. Disease of the throat, tongue, palate, or tonsils; many unsound or functionless teeth, *†deformity of the jaws resulting in inefficient occlusion of the teeth, unhealthy gums, disease of the glands of the throat or neck, external cicatrices, if at all extensive, and especially if adherent.
 8. Functional or organic disease of the heart or blood vessels, deformity or contraction of the chest, or any symptom of lung disease or tendency thereto.
 9. Undue swelling or distension of the abdomen, obesity, disease or enlargement of the abdominal organs. Rupture, weakness or distension of the abdominal rings; any disease of the bladder or incontinence of urine.
 10. The existence of any serious defect of the genital organs, or of varicocele, when it clearly forms or is likely to form a serious impediment to the efficient performance of duty, e.g., when it is associated with varicose veins or piles.
 11. Paralysis, weakness, impaired motion, or deformity of the upper or lower extremities, from whatever cause; a varicose state of the veins, especially of the leg. Bunions, distortion or malformation of the hands, feet, fingers, or toes.
 12. Distortion of the spine, of the bones of the chest, or pelvis, from injury or constitutional defect.
- No person will be admitted into His Majesty's Service unless he has been vaccinated. Re-vaccination will also be required if considered necessary.

Schedules of Geometry in the Qualifying Examination.

A.—PRACTICAL GEOMETRY.

1. Bisection of angles and of straight lines.
2. Construction of perpendiculars to straight lines.
3. Construction of an angle equal to a given angle.
4. Construction of parallels to a given straight line.
5. Simple cases of the construction from sufficient data of triangles and quadrilaterals.
6. Division of straight lines into a given number of equal parts or into parts in any given proportion.
7. Construction of a triangle equal in area to a given polygon.

B.—THEORETICAL GEOMETRY.

Angles at a Point.

1. If a straight line stands on another straight line, the sum of the two angles so formed is equal to two right angles; and the converse.
2. If two straight lines intersect, the vertically opposite angles are equal.

* *I.e.*—Seven teeth missing or irreparable in persons under 17 years of age on the date of entry, 10 missing or irreparable in persons above the age of 17: a tooth is considered irreparable if it cannot obviously be made permanently serviceable by dental repair. Credit may be given for teeth which have not erupted, provided failure to erupt is not due to abnormality. Candidates must, however, possess a sufficient number of sound opposing molars and incisors to ensure an efficient masticating area. The numbers given above are intended as a general guide only.

† Dental defects in accepted candidates must be remedied, prior to joining, at the parents' or guardians' expense. Any dental treatment found necessary during the period of Cadetship will also be at parents' or guardians' expense.

Parallel Straight Lines.

3. When a straight line cuts two other straight lines, if—
 (i.) a pair of alternate angles are equal,
 or (ii.) a pair of corresponding angles are equal,
 or (iii.) a pair of interior angles on the same side of the cutting line are together equal to two right angles, then the two straight lines are parallel; and the converse.
4. Straight lines which are parallel to the same straight line are parallel to one another.

Triangles and Rectilinear Figures.

5. The sum of the angles of a triangle is equal to two right angles.
6. If the sides of a convex polygon are produced in order, the sum of the angles so formed is equal to four right angles.
7. If two triangles have two sides of the one equal to two sides of the other, each to each, and also the angles contained by those sides equal, the triangles are congruent.
8. If two triangles have two angles of the one equal to two angles of the other, each to each, and also one side of the one equal to the corresponding side of the other, the triangles are congruent.
9. If two sides of a triangle are equal, the angles opposite to these sides are equal; and the converse.
10. If two triangles have the three sides of the one equal to the three sides of the other, each to each, the triangles are congruent.
11. If two right-angled triangles have their hypotenuses equal, and one side of the one equal to one side of the other, the triangles are congruent.
12. The opposite sides and angles of a parallelogram are equal, each diagonal bisects the parallelogram, and the diagonals bisect one another.
13. If there are three or more parallel straight lines, and the intercepts made by them on any straight line that cuts them are equal, then the corresponding intercepts on any other straight line that cuts them are also equal.

Areas.

14. Parallelograms on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.
15. Triangles on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.
16. Equal triangles on the same or equal bases are of the same altitude.
17. Illustrations and explanations of the geometrical theorems corresponding to the following algebraical identities:—

$$k(a + b + c + \dots) = ka + kb + kc + \dots,$$

$$(a + b)^2 = a^2 + 2ab + b^2,$$

$$(a - b)^2 = a^2 - 2ab + b^2,$$

$$a^2 - b^2 = (a + b)(a - b).$$

Loci.

18. The locus of a point which is equidistant from two fixed points is the perpendicular bisector of the straight line joining the two fixed points.
19. The locus of a point which is equidistant from two intersecting straight lines consists of a pair of straight lines which bisect the angles between the two given lines.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. All or any part of any house, dwelling, church, place of business shall be provided with sufficient light and ventilation, and shall whenever so ordered by the Chairman or any officer acting under his authority be forthwith externally or internally limewashed, disinfected, or otherwise cleansed.

2. It shall be the duty of the owner of every house or other building to keep the same in a state of good repair, and free from holes in walls and floors where rats may breed, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Chairman that the tenant or occupier has agreed to undertake this duty, in which case the said duty shall fall on such tenant or occupier, as the case may be.

3. All floors of buildings used for trade purposes shall be cemented, and in the case of other buildings discretion shall be left to the Chairman.

4. No horse, mule, ass, cattle, sheep, goat, or pig shall be housed in a dwelling house or in the verandah of a dwelling house or in any shed or maduwa which is part of or attached to a dwelling house, and no such animal shall be kept within 50 yards of a dwelling house.

5. Storing of goods and merchandise in buildings used for trade purposes shall be arranged in such a manner as not to interfere with the free lighting and ventilation and easy cleansing of such buildings. One-fourth of the floor area shall be left unoccupied, and no goods shall be stacked within 4 feet of the roof or the ceiling.

3. Payment will be made on the basis that the starting point of the vehicle will be in all cases from the General Post Office; mileage of vehicles running empty between that office and the different places mentioned in the time table will be paid for. No garage for the motor vehicles or a site for it will be provided by the Postmaster-General and no payment will be made for any trips between the General Post Office and the contractor's garage.

4. The motor conveyances shall fulfil all the requirements of the Motor Car Ordinance, 1927, amended by Ordinance No. 22 of 1929.

5. The hours of arrival and departure from the General Post Office to be fixed from time to time by the Postmaster-General.

6. The contractor will be required to provide such number of motor conveyances as will, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General, be necessary for the service, and every such motor before being employed in the service will be subject to the approval of the Postmaster-General. Every conveyance should be capable of carrying two employees of the Post and Telegraph Department travelling on duty and should have sufficient space therein for conveying a large size cash box and about six to eight bags of stamps. 7. THE CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Ordinance, 1895.

WITH reference to the Rules of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and relative appendices published on pages 135 et seq of Part I. of the Ceylon Government Gazette No. 7,624, dated January 13, 1928, it is hereby notified that at a General Meeting of the Chamber duly convened and held at their Rooms on Friday, March 18, 1932 :—

1. *Survey Reports and Arbitration Awards.*—(a) The preamble to Appendix G was amended by the deletion of the words "should be sealed and certified by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce" in the fourth and fifth line thereof and by the substitution of the following words in their place :—

"be made by Surveyors and Arbitrators or by Umpires who shall be selected from among gentlemen nominated by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce in accordance with the regulations in this Appendix hereinafter set forth and contained and that the same be certified by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce".

(b) The second paragraph of the said Appendix G reading as follows :—

"The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce hereby nominates the following gentlemen as an Official Committee from whom the Surveyors, Arbitrators, and their Umpires must be selected, the Chamber reserving to itself the right to be exercised by the Standing Committee to add to, or cancel, the present and all future appointments"

and the list of Arbitrators and Surveyors appearing in the said Appendix G.

were deleted.

(c) The words "on this official Committee" appearing in the third line of Regulation No. 1 of the Regulations relating to the Appointment of Arbitrators and Surveyors in the said Appendix G were deleted and the words "as Arbitrators and Surveyors substituted therefor.

2. *Payment of Rubber Export Duty, Packing of Rubber, and Cent. Bids.*—Condition of Sale No. 3 of the Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale of Rubber in Appendix H was amended and re-arranged to read as follows :—

(a) All spot sales of Rubber shall be by the lot at so much per lb. ex Warehouse or Store, Colombo.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

General Meeting.

Wednesday, March 2, 1932, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice, dated February 24, 1932.

Present:—Mr. W. T. Stace, B.A., Litt. D., C.C.S., J.P., Chairman; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Dr. E. V. Rajnam; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. N. R. Blande; Mr. A. H. G. Dawson; Mr. M. L. M. Royel; Dr. S. Muttiah; Mr. T. C. Dyball; Mr. F. Dadabhoy, J.P.; Mr. F. J. Soertsz; Lt.-Col. N. W. Napier-Clavering, D.S.O., R.E.; Mr. A. E. Goonesinghe, M.S.C.; Mr. Aelian W. Pereira; and Mr. A. R. A. Razik.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of February 3, 1932, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of February 3, 1932, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. E. Goonesinghe, M.S.C., presented a petition from some of the residents of Maligawatta requesting that the present gas lamps be shifted so as to permit of better lighting and asked that it be referred to the appropriate Committee for consideration.

3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. S. Muttiah presented a petition from certain residents of Slave Island, praying that the widening of the lane connecting General's Lake road and Wekande, be extended to the whole length of this lane and asked that it be placed before the appropriate Committee.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. M. L. M. Royel presented a petition from Mr. W. Daniel Fernando of 121, Main street, regarding the surplus which accrued to the Council after sale of the premises No. 420/353, Colombo-Galle road, Wellawatta, for non-payment of rates and requested that it be placed before the Law Committee.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader presented a petition from Mr. Nazir Mohamed Sahib of Bangalore, presently of No. 64, Sea street, in Colombo, praying that he may be allowed to continue to lease the stalls he held from the Council in Edinburgh, Deans road, and Gintupitiya markets, and requested that it be placed before the appropriate Committees.

5. (a) With the permission of Council, Dr. E. A. Coorey presented a petition from the residents of 37th lane, and School Avenue, Wellawatta, regarding the provision of a storm water drain and requested that it be placed before the appropriate Committee.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Aelian W. Pereira asked the following questions which the Chairman answered:—

(1) Q. How many gas meters are there at present in use within the limits of Colombo (a) in public buildings,

(b) in the premises of private subscribers?

A. (a) and (b) there are no records of this.

(2) Q. How many gas meters in each of the above categories have been stamped by the Municipal Council, in terms of section 6 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1871?

A. There are no records of meters stamped by the Council from as early as 1871. Records are now kept, however, 545 meters were tested and stamped by Council's Gas Inspector during 1929 to 1931.

(3) Q. Are there any gas meters in each of the above categories enumerated in question 1 stamped by the Gas Company with its own seal?

A. There probably are meters stamped by the Company in Public Buildings. There are certainly meters stamped by the Company in private premises.

(4) Q. If so, under what authority has this been done or allowed to be done?

A. The authority for this practice cannot be traced.

(5) Q. Over what period of time has this practice been going on?

A. The exact period is not known. From available records it is deduced as prior to 1895.

(6) Q. Has the Gas Company paid to the Municipal Council such fees, as are enumerated in section 12 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1871 in respect of those meters stamped with the seal of the Municipal Council since January 1, 1929? If so, what sum has been paid each year?

A. No.

(7) Q. Has the Gas Company paid to the Municipal Council such fees, as are enumerated in section 12 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1871 in respect of those meters stamped with the seal of the Gas Company since January 1, 1929? If so, what sum has been paid each year?

A. No.

(8) Q. Are dry meters being used for testing meters?

A. Not for testing meters. But it is understood that the Gas Company uses dry meters for certain other purposes.

(9) Q. Has every meter tested by the Municipal Council during the past year, been tested in accordance with the terms of Section 8 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1871?

A. Yes.

(10) Q. Since January 1, 1927, has notice in writing been served on the Gas Company in terms of the second proviso of clause 17 of the Gas Contract of April 24, 1929, in respect of such defective lighting as is enumerated in clause 17? If so, how many such notices have been given?

A. The Gas Inspector reports defects daily and recoveries are made from the Company at the end of each month.

(11) Q. If notices have been given as aforementioned in question 10, has the Gas Company paid or allowed in account with the Municipal Council for each year, since December 31, 1926, such sums by way of liquidated damages as are specified in clause 17 of the gas contract?

A. No. Sums of 50 cents have been recovered on defective lamps but liquidated damages for failure to maintain the correct pressure has not been recovered because there has been no such failure.

(12) Q. Does the Gas Company use any particular kind of coal for the purpose of making gas?

A. We have no information as to the kind of coal used.

(13) Q. If so, has the Chairman obtained information from time to time from January 1, 1929, up to the present date, about the price per ton of such coal?

A. Yes.

(14) Q. Will the Chairman be pleased to table all such information he may have received about the price per ton of coal used by the Gas Company for the manufacture of Gas, since January 1, 1929, to date?

A. A statement of prices of coal and gas during the period asked for is tabled.

(15) Q. How many times during the last 10 years have the Council obtained reports from the City Analyst or Gas Examiners as to the quality and purity of gas?

A. On one occasion by the City Analyst in 1931. But the Gas Inspector tests weekly.

(16) Q. Will the Chairman be pleased to table the annual reports of the Gas Company from 1920 to 1930, inclusive?

A. The Gas Company's Local Manager informs me that he holds no instructions to disclose the annual reports of the Company except to those entitled to call for such information.

(17) Q. Has the Gas Company ever paid to the Council from 1920 to 1931, inclusive, any such sums as are specified in clause 16 of the Gas contract by way of liquidated damages for supplying gas of less illuminating power or of less heat equivalent pressure or purity than according to the contract the company ought to supply?

A. No. The quality of gas has not been found to be below specification.

(18) Q. Is there any substance in the assertion made by Mr. Gerald Pereira, in his letter to the Chairman of February 2, 1932, to the effect that the Gas Company have fixed 5 and 10 ft meters as sub meters for cookers and geysers?

A. Yes.

(19) Q. If there are such meters fixed, will such installations affect the registration of gas consumption and be disadvantageous to the consumer?

A. No.

(20) Q. How many meters other than for purposes of lighting were there in use at the end of 1931?

A. The Company have been asked to provide this information.

7. The following questions stood in the name of Mr. A. R. A. Razik:—(a) Does the Gas Company pay any fee as licence for the extensive operation they carry on in the City, if so, how much? (b) Does the Municipality control and regulate the price of gas for purposes other than lighting? If not, why?

A. The Chairman stated that the replies to these questions were not ready and will be placed before the Council at its next meeting.

7. (a) With the permission of Council, the Chairman moved that this Council do place on record its appreciation of the services of Dr. L. A. Prins, I.S.O., who had been first nominated a member of this Council on March 17, 1931, and has served on the Sanitation and Library Committees. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.—Carried unanimously.

(b) With the permission of Council, Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader moved:—“That the Council do record its cordial appreciation of the great services rendered to the Council by Mr. W. T. Stace, during the three periods he acted as Chairman of this Council.” Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.—Carried unanimously.

The Chairman thanked the Council for its kind vote of appreciation.

8. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved:—That the Council should resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the Agenda. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee—

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of February 16, 1932, were considered.

MUNICIPAL TREASURER'S DEPARTMENT.

(2) To consider:—(a) The question of confining arecanut curing stores to the offensive and dangerous trades areas, and also the question of putting a stop to the use of poisonous powders. (b) A report thereon of the Municipal Treasurer. Reg. No. 77.—Recommended (1) that by a by-law “arecanut curing” be declared an offensive trade under section 212 of Ordinance 6 of 1910. (2) That by a notification the annual fee of Rs. 10 be charged for issuing of licences under section 233 of Ordinance 6 of 1910. (3) That by-law 4 of the by-laws made under section 27 of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance No. 19 of 1915, and published by notification, dated September 22, 1927, in *Gazette* No. 7,607 of September 23, 1927, be amended by the addition of “arecanut curing” under the heading “Offensive trade.”

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Mr. M. L. M. Reyal supported the recommendation of the Standing Committee and urged that the Medical Officer of Health do take early steps to stop the use of the poisonous ingredients.

Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, Mr. A. E. Goonesinghe, and Dr. S. Muttiah spoke to the recommendation.

The Chairman replied to their questions and explained the present situation.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted.

VETERINARY DEPARTMENT.

(3) To select from the applicants and submit to Council the names of three candidates for the post of Head Clerk Veterinary Department, indicating, if the Committee think fit, the candidate whom they recommend Council to appoint. Reg. No. 95.

Resolved that the following names be submitted to Council:—(1) Mr. D. H. P. Goonetilleke, (2) Mr. T. Chellappah, (3) Mr. D. E. de Silva, with the recommendation that Mr. D. H. P. Goonetilleke be appointed.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

(4) To consider:—(a) Further sites selected for the provision of lavatories in New Bazaar Ward. (b) A report thereon of the Municipal Treasurer suggesting that the Council be asked to sanction the Silversmith street lavatory only, which is estimated to cost Rs. 16,500 and that supplemental provision of Rs. 4,800 be sought as follows:—Under I-86 Construction, Rs. 1,500; under L 19 Acquisition, Rs. 3,300; Total, Rs. 4,800. (c) A report of the Medical Officer of Health. Reg. VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 9, 1932.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 147 (1 European, 14 Burghers, 87 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 13 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1932, viz., 291,260) was 26.4, as against 26.9 in the preceding week, 29.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 122 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 79 Sinhalese, 22 Tamils, 9 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 21.9, as against 27.1 in the previous week, 23.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 122 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 9.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Ten deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents) and 1 each in Kotahena South, Maradana South, and Slave Island, as against 24 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, and Slave Island, as against 5 in the previous week and 10 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Seven deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Wellawatta South, and 1 each in Kotahena North, Maradana North, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 6 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Sixteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Maradana North and Maradana South, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya, as against 12 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) One death from *Phthisis*, of a resident of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (of non-residents), and 1 each in Kotahena North and Maradana East, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. Seven deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 5 each from *Worms* and *Debility*, 3 from *Dysentery*, 2 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Tetanus*, *Suicide* and *Accidents*, and 52 from *Other Causes*.

5. **Reported Cases.**—Thirty-three cases of *Chickenpox*, 10 of *Measles*, 7 of *Enteric Fever*, and 5 of *Whooping Cough* were reported during the week, as against 29, 4, 10, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.6°, against 81.3° in the preceding week and 82.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.857 in., against 29.886 in. in the preceding week, and 29.919 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.57 in., against 1.28 in. in the preceding week and 3.45 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
