"THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ORDINANCE, No. 11 of 1920.'

WHEREAS by Notification dated February 29, VV 1932, and published in the Government Gazette of March 4, 1932, His Excellency the Governor did constitute the Kolonnawa Urban District Council, the administrative limits whereof were specified in the schedule thereto:

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 30, 1932.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 159 (2 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 94 Sinhalese, 22 Tamils, 21 Moors, 6 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1932, viz., 291,260) was 28.5, as against 27.1 in the preceding week, 24.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths .--The total deaths registered were 116 (2 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 13 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 20 8, as against 23 9 in the previous week, 21.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the

weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 116 total deaths, 25 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 20 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Eleven deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents) and 1 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, Maradana North, and Kollupitiya, as against 18 in the previous week, and 17 the weekly

average for last year.

(b) Seven deaths from Influenza were registered, 3 in Slave Island, 2 in St. Paul's and 1 each in San Sebastian and New Bazaar, as against 4 in the previous week, and 10

the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered, 1 each in Kotahena South, Maradana East, and Slave Island, as against 5 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Ten deaths from Phthisis were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), 2 in New Bazaar and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, Kotahena South, and Kollupitiya, as against 12 in the

previous week, and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) One death from *Phthisis* of a resident of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama,

during the week.

3. Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), as against 4 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. One death from *Plague* of a resident of Colombo town occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week. No deaths were registered within the

Seven deaths from Enteritis were registered, 6 each from Worms, Debility, and Accidents, 3 from Dysentery, 2 each from Infantile Convulsions and Puerperal Septicaemia, 1 each from Diarrhoea and Tetanus, and 46 from Other Causes.

6. Reported Cases.—Seventeen cases of Chickenpox, 6 of Whooping Cough, 5 of Measles, 2 of Enteric Fever, and 1 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 35, 5, 6,

Plague were reported during the week, as against 35, 5, 6, 5, and nil, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.8°, against 81.9° in the preceding week, and 81.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.884 in., against 29.910 in. in the preceding week, and 29.835 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. REGULATIONS FOR THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR COMMERCIAL EDUCATION CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS OF THE LONDON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, 1933.

Date and Place of Examination.—These examinations will be held in Colombo, commencing on April 24, 1933.

Eligibility.—These examinations are limited to British Subjects and nations of Mandated Territories, Protectorates and Egypt. For the Junior examination candidates must be either (a) be members of an approved Commercial Class and have been in attendance in such a class for at least ayear or (b) be over 17 years of age. For the Senior examination candidates must either (a) be over 17 years of age or (b) have passed the Junior examination. Application for the approval of Commercial Classes must be made to the Director of Education at least 3 months before applications for entry are submitted.

3. Entries.—Entry forms duly filled in must be forwarded so as to reach the Director of Education not later than November 30, accompanied by a Bank receipt for the fees credited* to the No. 2 Account of the Director of Education in the Chartered Bank of India, &c., Colombo, at the rate of Rs. 15 for a Junior examination or Rs. 3 for a single Junior subject, and Rs. 20 for a Senior examination or Rs. 5 for a single Senior subject. A candidate taking a Modern Foreign Language or French Shorthand must pay an additional fee of Re. 1.

4. Withdrawals.—Fees cannot be returned. If notice of withdrawal is received in the Education Office more than sixteen days before the commencement of the examination, a voucher will be sent entitling the candidate, or (on application from an approved school) another pupil of the school to count towards a subsequent examination the Chamber's fee already paid. The Chamber do not undertake to grant a voucher if the full sixteen days' notice has not been given. Applications made later will, however, be considered if accompanied by a medical certificate stating that the candidate is physically unfit to take the examination, provided that such applications reach this Office by Wednesday of the examination was considered in a constant and the school of the examination was considered in a constant and the school of the examination. on more than one occasion, nor can a second voucher be issued in respect of the same fee.

Candidates who hold vouchers and who wish to enter for the subsequent examination must send to the Director of Education on or before November 30 fresh forms of entry together with the vouchers and the Bank receipts for the local fee payable by them. The local fees payable in such cases are-

Junior Senior Marks.—Percentages of marks required are-

Scheme of Examination.—There will be two Junior Certificate Examinations and two Senior Certificate ions. In order to obtain a certificate awarded on the results of these examinations candidates must pass in all the subjects of the particular examination at one and the same time, except as provided in paragraph 8. Candidates will not be permitted to enter for single subjects except as provided in paragraphs 7, 8, and 9.

(a) Junior General Commercial Certificate-

English, Arithmetic, Elements of Commerce, Commercial Geography, Bookkeeping.

(b) Junior Certificate for Shorthand Typists-

English, Arithmetic, Elements of Commerce, Shorthand, Typewriting.

(c) Senior General Commercial Certificate-

English, Commerce and Finance, Commercial Arithmetic, Bookkeeping and Accountancy.

(d) Senior Certificate for Shorthand Typists-

English, Commerce and Finance, Shorthand, Typewriting.

Single Subjects.—Candidates who hold the certificates named above may enter at subsequent examinations to enter for single supplementary subjects of the same grade.

8. Exemptions.—(a) Candidates who hold certificates in single subjects are allowed exemption from those subjects at the examination for Full Certificates.

(b) Candidates who hold Full Certificates in one section will be awarded Full Certificates in the other section of the same Grade on passing in the subjects not already included in the Certificates which they hold.

9. Reference.—If a candidate for a full certificate fails in not more than one subject he may be referred in that subject. In that case he may be permitted to take that subject within the next two years and on passing will be awarded a full certificate.

11. Detailed Syllabuses of Junior Subjects-

Arithmetic.—The practical application of Arithmetic to Percentages, Rates and Taxes, Profit and Loss, Simple Interest, Bankruptcies, and simple graphs of statistics, prices, &c. The Metric System.

Accuracy will be tested by examples in the simple rules, the use of contracted, prime factors, averages and statistics mensuration of areas and simple volumes. (Graph paper is supplied with the work book.)

Bookkeeping.—General principles of Bookkeeping by Double Entry and knowledge of commercial terms. The use and order of the Subsidiary books and Ledgers in the system of Commercial Bookkeeping to enable a correct Trial Balance to be extracted.

Arithmetical accuracy and neatness, and the use of sectional ledgers, will ensure extra marks. Erasure and untidiness will generally cause failure.

-A student may pass if his work is sufficiently good, by using a general ledger only, but the use of sectional ledgers will earn additional marks.

Commercial Geography.—The Commercial and Industrial Geography of the World with special reference to the British Empire. A thorough knowledge of maps showing, (i.) the location of the chief cities, scaports, and producing centres; (ii.) the chief sea routes and railway lines; (iii.) the distribution of the most important raw materials, food stuffs, and manufactured articles.

A precise acquaintance with the commerce and industry of the British Isles including the main articles of trade between the British Isles and the various parts of the Empire. The general conditions of climate and vegetation of the world as a basis for acquiring knowledge of its chief productions.

N.B.—Candidates will be expected to draw sketch maps freely.

Note.—From 1932, the type of question paper will be modified as follows:-

(a) Old Sections A and B will be combined as Section A, with three questions, viz., one on the British Isles, one on the British Empire excluding the British Isles, and one on the World excluding the British Empire. Candidates must answer two of these three questions.

(b) An additional question involving a broad knowledge of Geographical principles will be set in Section B

(old Section C).

Elementary Mathematics: Algebra.—Easy simplifications of algebraical expressions. Interpretation of the Simple equations. Simultaneous equations of the first degree. Quadratic equations. Problems involving quations. Easy factors. Graphs of statistics and of simple algebraical equations. Use of four figure logarithm such equations. tables in simple problems.

GEOMETRY.—The substance of Euclid, Books I. to III. Logical geometrical proofs of the theorems and problems will be accepted, whether Euclid's or not. Deductions. Simple loci. Applications of arithmetic and algebra to geometrical theorems and problems.

Note.—The use of logarithm tables is allowed.

Elements of Commerce.—The divisions of trade—manufacturer or producer, wholesale dealer, and retailer; development of the merchant business. Agents of production—labour and capital. Business organization and management—the functions of the various departments in a business house—the correlation of each department in the scheme of organization. The organization of the commercial side of the business of a manufacturer or producer, sole trader, business. or organization. The organization of the commercial side of the business of a manufacturer or producer, sole trader, business on consignment, commission, agency business, joint accounts. The wholesale trade, organization of wholesale warehouses transactions in wholesale trade. The retail trade—retail transactions—multiple shop system—departmental stores, co-operative trading. Gross profits, net profits, buying and selling, costing, working expenses, advertising. Banking system—relation of banker to customer. The Bankers' Clearing House, the services of banks. Current and deposit accounts, transfer of money, supply of credit to customers, &c. The remittance of money—General Post Office services, cheques, bills of exchange, &c. The credit system. Forms of transport—carriers, canals, rivers, railways, motor, aerial, ships. Collection and delivery of goods. Warehousing of goods, functions, operations, bonded warehouses, transfer of ownership of warehoused goods. Organization of foreign trade—export and import trade, markets and exchanges, importation of raw produce and the marketing, transactions in the import and export trade. Financing of foreign trade.

English.—Dictation, Essay, Analysis, and simple Précis. Questions are set dealing with Direct and Indirect Speech, and testing the candidate's Vocabulary. Students are expected to be able to paraphrase a piece of English prose or verse and write efficiently a simple business letter. Questions will be set on general English Literature, but not more than 25 per cent. of the questions will be devoted to this section. There are no set books or periods, but a sufficiently wide choice of questions will be given to cover an elementary survey of English Literature generally. Handwriting is taken into account in the marking of papers.

Note.—In this subject candidates must satisfy the Examiner in English Reading and Conversation.

Handwriting.—Copying a letter, a tabular statement or printed matter, &c. Copying and ruling up, where necessary, arithmetical examples, items of an invoice, a statement, a receipt, a telegram or other commercial form of document in general use, and the displaying of headings, or other matter by different sizes of writing. Addressing envelopes of various sizes, as a test of writing without lines. Simple lettering with the pen, and without the use of the pencil.

The Committee does not encourage Script writing.

Note.—Special attention is called to this subject, and no pains should be spared in seeking to meet the requirements of commercial houses with regard to handwriting. The old-fashioned copy book style of penmanship, thick in the downstrokes, almost invisible in the upstrokes, and abounding in flourishes should be avoided. The characteristics desired are simplicity, and uniformity of size, style, slope, and spacing. Each letter should, therefore, be clearly and accurately formed, so that its identity may be distinguished apart from its position in the word—the u's distinguished from the n's, &c.—and the turnings should be round and not angular. The slope should be slightly forward.

Modern Foreign Languages.—(French, German, Italian, Portuguese, Spanish.)
(1) Translations from and into the foreign language with grammatical questions.

(2) A short essay or simple letter in the foreign language

(4) The candidates' ability to express themselves verbally will be tested by conversation in the foreign language.

Candidates must pass in conversation as well as in the written portion of a language in order to obtain a certificate. Foreign candidates taking the examination in their own language must satisfy the examiner in English.

Shorthand.—Writing in Shorthand (any system), from passages dictated at the rate of 60, 70, or 80 words per minute for a period of five minutes. Transcription of any one of the above passages for which the candidate is allowed time at the rate of 7 words per minute.

Spelling, punctuation, and neatness of writing in transcription will be taken into account in judging the candidate's

N.B.—Any one of the three speeds may be chosen by the candidate. A speed of at least 60 words per minute is required for the certificate. Papers will be set in Shorthand in any Modern Foreign Language if a sufficient number of entries is received.

Typewriting.—Copying commercial letters, other matter, and tabular statements from typed and manuscript copy. Candidates are expected to be able to type correspondence invoices, easy balance sheets and statement of accounts, tabulated lists, elementary shipping documents, &c.

Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, syllabification, punctuation, and general intelligence. Candidates will be allowed to use any make of machine they choose. They should bring their own machines if possible; otherwise they will be expected to typewrite on the machine provided, irrespective of make or model.

Toddy Rent Sale Conditions, 1932-33.

THE Governor has under section 18 of "The Excise Ordinance No. 8 of 1912"; directed that the following shall be the conditions for the grant of the exclusive privilege of selling fermented toddy by retail:—

The rent period shall be-

(i.) In the Northern and Eastern Provinces from July 1. 1932, till June 30, 1933, except in the case of the Alampil Toddy Tavern in the Mullaittivu District: provided that the rent of any tavern supplying palmyra toddy only may be sold for such less period as the Government Agent may in his discretion determine.

(ii.) In all other provinces, from October 1, 1932, to September 30, 1933.

(iii.) For the Alampil Toddy Tavern in the Mullaittivu District for ten months from July 1, 1932, to September 30, 1932, and from March 1, 1933, to September 30, 1933.

2. The Government Agent shall call for tenders; but shall have discretion to put up the taverns to auction if the

tenders are unsatisfactory, and at such auction to reject any bids. Subject to this proviso the highest tenderer, or in the event of an auction being held, the highest bidder, shall be declared to be the purchaser of this privilege, and shall conform to and perform all the conditions under which this privilege is sold.

3. (i.) (a) Where toddy rents are sold by tender the Government Agent may, if he considers it necessary, require that a deposit of Rs. 50 be made by every tenderer

in respect of his tender.

The deposit so made by the successful tenderer shall be liable to forfeiture should he fail to sign these conditions

immediately he is declared the purchaser.
(c) The deposits of unsuccessful tenderers will be refunded

after the sale is concluded.

(ii.) No person is permitted to send in more than one tender for any one tavern.

4. (i.) The successful bidder or tenderer (hereinafter referred to as the grantee), shall immediately on being declared the purchaser of the rent, sign these conditions of sole and new to the Community A. as and pay to the Government Agent as a security deposit a sum equivalent to two months' rent of the privilege.

(ii.) The grantee shall within fourteen days of the sale of this privilege enter into a bond with the Government. Agent in form Excise T. 23 for the full amount for which he has purchased it, and he shall specially hypothecate by such bond the said security deposit.

(iii.) The security money will be deposited in the banks only on the application of the renters and at their risk and only on the condition that when such deposits are made no withdrawals can be allowed till the date of maturity.

(iv.) The security money shall be liable to forfeiture, in whole or in part at the discretion of the Government Agent, for breach of any of these conditions; and such forfeiture shall be in addition to any other penalty prescribed by these conditions for such breach.

Any person whose bid or tender is accepted and who fails to sign these conditions of sale or who, having signed these conditions of sale, makes default in respect of any condition, will be liable to be put on the list of defaulting renters, and no bid or tender will thereafter be accepted from such person in respect of the rent of any tavern.

6. The grantee shall at the time of the acceptance of the

The grantee shall at the time of the execution of the bond as aforesaid execute, if so required by the Government Agent, a power of attorney in the form sanctioned by law, to confess judgment in any action which may be instituted against him for the recovery of any moneys due in respect of this privilege, and shall also furnish to the Government Agent within fifteen days of the date of the execution of such power of attorney a duly certified copy thereof for filing in the District Court under section 32 of the Civil Procedure Code.

Procedure Code.

7. The grantee shall, on signing the conditions of sale, elect, and under his hand signify, a post office to which all notices and processes whatever in connection with this privilege may be addressed under registered cover; and all such notices or processes as aforesaid addressed to the post office so elected, and posted in due course, shall be considered as good and as effectual for all purposes as if the same had been served upon the grantee in person.

8. (i.) The grantee shall pay to the Government Agent the purchase money or rent due in respect of this privilege and any further duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due

and any further duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due by him to the Crown.

(ii.) The payment of the purchase money or rent shall be made in equal monthly instalments.

(iii.) The first instalment of the purchase money or rent shall become due and payable on 193, and the subsequent instalments shall become due on the last day of each succeeding month.

(iv.) Interest at the rate of 9 per cent. per annum shall

be payable in respect of all arrears.

9. (i.) No payment of any sum due by the grantee to the Crown shall be deemed to have been duly made unless the grantee shall have paid such sum at the Treasury or at a Kachcheri and shall have obtained an official receipt therefor.

- (ii.) No money which, for his own convenience, the grantee may think fit to leave in the hands of any shroff or any other officer of any Kachcheri shall be deemed to be money paid under this contract.
- 10. (i.) If any instalment or any part of any instalment of the purchase money or rent, or any duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due to the Crown from the grantee remains unpaid after the same shall have become due and payable the Government Agent shall have power, after fifteen days' notice to the grantee of his intention to do so, without further process of law, to cancel the licence or licences issued to the grantee, and to resell this privilege at the risk and loss of the grantee.
 - (ii.) Such notice may be served personally upon the grantee or addressed to the post office elected under condition 7, as the Government Agent thinks fit.
 - 11. (i.) The grantee shall at least twenty-one days before the date on which the privilege commences to run furnish to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Excise an application on the prescribed form showing the numbers and situations of the trees which he proposes to tap for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at each tavern, and the situation and numbers of the collecting stations for toddy which he proposes to establish; and no trees shall be tapped or toddy drawn in pursuance of this privilege otherwise than under cover of a licence setting forth the numbers and situations of such trees, the name of the drawer, the name of the owner or possessor of such trees, and the tavern for which the fermented toddy is intended.
 - (ii.) Any application to tap additional trees for any tavern shall be made to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Excise three weeks before the grantee intends to commence to tap such trees.
 - (iii.) The Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Excise shall have power, subject to appeal to the Excise Commissioner, to refuse any application to tap trees for any tavern if such application is, in his opinion, open to serious objection.
 - (iv.) Tapping of trees in dry areas other than the distillery area will not be permitted.
 - 12. (i.) If toddy is to be transported in pursuance of this privilege by lorry, cart, or railway, the grantee shall establish collecting stations on the main road in places approved by the Circle Officer.
 - (ii.) The grantee shall keep at each collecting station a book, in which he shall cause the following particulars to be entered daily:—
 - (a) The quantity of toddy received from each tapper;
 - (b) The quantity of toddy in each consignment dispatched to the tavern, with the time of dispatch; and
 - (c) The number of the transport pass covering each such consignment, the method of transport, and the registered number of the cart or motor vehicle employed.

The grantee shall further cause the registered number of the cart or motor vehicle employed to be noted on each such transport pass.

- (iii.) The grantee shall cause the morning yield of all trees to be lowered before 8.30 A.M. daily and the afternoon yield of all trees to be lowered before 4.30 P.M. daily. He shall cause every such yield to be removed at once to the proper collecting station. He shall not allow any toddy to be kept at any place other than a collecting station after 10 A.M. in respect of the morning yield or after 5.30 P.M. in respect of the afternoon yield.
- (iv.) The grantee shall cause all toddy from the morning yield to be delivered at the tavern before 11 A.M. daily and all toddy from the afternoon yield to be delivered at the tavern before 6 r.M. daily;

Provided that in any case in which toddy is transported to any tavern from any place more than 20 miles distant therefrom, the Excise Commissioner may, if he thinks fit, extend the time, whether in respect of the morning yield or of the afternoon yield, within which such toddy may be delivered at the tavern.

- (v.) The grantee shall cause the correct capacity of every storage vessel used for storing toddy at any collecting station to be marked upon such vessel, and shall provide an accurate dip rod for use therewith.
 - 13. (i.) The grantee shall not—
 - (a) Permit any tree to be tapped or toddy to be drawn from any tree for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at any tavern, unless such tree has first been marked for this purpose in the manner prescribed by the Excise Commissioner;

- (b) Permit any toddy to be transported to any tavern otherwise than under cover of a pass issued by the Superintendent of Excise or an Assistant Superintendent of Excise to the grantee and setting forth the name of the person who is to transport the toddy.
- (ii.) The grantee shall obtain separate passes for the transport of toddy by pingo carrier from the tree tope to the collecting station and for its transport by cart, lorry, or other vehicle from the collecting station to the taverm and shall deliver the appropriate pass to such pingo carrier or to the person in charge of such cart, lorry, or other vehicle.
- 14. (i.) If the grantee wishes to make vinegar from toddy, he shall obtain a vinegar licence from the Government Agent.
- (ii.) The Government Agent hereby reserves to himself the right to issue a licence to any person for making vinegar within the area to which this privilege relates on such terms and subject to such conditions as the Governor shall approve.

 (iii.) If a licence to make vinegar from toddy has been issued to the grantee, he shall store such vinegar in premises approved by the Government Agent, and shall keep a true account in the form prescribed by the Excise Commissioner of all toddy converted into vinegar and of all sales of vinegar.

(iv.) The grantee shall cause such vinegar store to be opened for inspection at the request of any Excise Officer not below the rank of Inspector, and shall produce the accounts therein maintained whenever called upon to do so.

15. The grantee shall have no concern or interest, direct or indirect, in the sale of arrack, or in the purchase of any privilege for the sale of arrack, within the area of his rent.

16. (i.) The Government Agent shall not be bound to find a site for any tavern in the event of the grantee not being able to procure a site.

(ii.) The grantee shall not open a tavern on any site otherwise than with the approval of the Government Agent, such approval being obtained from the Government Agent at least 14 days before the privilege commences to

17. The grantee shall not less than five days before the date on which this privilege commences to run, obtain from the Government Agent a licence or licences for the sale by retail of fermented toddy at the taverns within the area covered by this privilege.

18. (i.) The Government Agent hereby reserves to himself the right to order the grantee to close any tavern for such period during the passage of troops or during the holding of any poll as the Government Agent thinks fit.

- (ii.) The grantee shall not have or make any claim to any reduction, or to the remission, of any sum due and owing by him to the Crown by reason of any loss alleged to have been sustained by him, whether on account of such closing of any tavern during the passage of troops or during the holding of any poll, or through any other cause whatsoever.
- 19. (i.) No bid will be accepted from any person who is a habitual criminal as defined by Ordinance No. 32 of 1914.
- (ii.) The grantee shall, whenever called upon to do so by the Government Agent, satisfy the Government Agent that he is not a habitual criminal within the meaning of the said Ordinance.
