KNOW Ye that by virtue of the powers in Us vested by section 3 (1) of the Dried Meat Ordinance, 1908, as amended by the Dried Meat Ordinance, No. 1 of 1927, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, We, the Governor of Ceylon, do by this Proclamation declare that from and after the date hereof it shall be unlawful to remove dried meat from the Chief Headmen's divisions specified in Schedule I. hereto, except in accordance with the conditions set out in Schedule II. hereto.

## SCHEDULE II.

*Conditions.*

1. In these conditions unless the context otherwise requires—

"Dried meat" means the dried or salted flesh of any animal in quantities exceeding fifteen pounds but does not include dried or salted fish or any dried or salted meat which has been imported from beyond the seas.

"Assistant Government Agent" means the Assistant Government Agent, Trincomalee.

"Transit" means conveyance by land or water beyond the limits of any one of the Chief Headmen's divisions specified in Schedule I.

2. The transit of the dried meat of pig is permitted on a licence issued by the Assistant Government Agent on payment of such fee not exceeding Rs. 20 a year as the Assistant Government Agent may fix, having due regard to the conditions of the trade provided that no dried meat shall be removed from the Kantalai Forest Reserve nor from the portion of the Ceylon Resident Sportmen's Reserve situated within the Trincomalee District.

3. The transit of dried meat is prohibited unless it is properly packed and dried meat shall be packed for transit only at such places (hereinafter referred to as "packing depôts") as the Assistant Government Agent shall approve in writing.

4. To every portion of dried meat that is packed for transit there shall be left adhering a sufficient portion of the hide of the animal of which it is the flesh so as to enable the variety of the animal to be distinguished.

5. The transit of dried meat from a packing depôt is prohibited until the receptacle containing it has been numbered and marked in the manner prescribed by the Assistant Government Agent.

6. Every receptacle containing dried meat shall when in transit be accompanied by a pass (signed by the Assistant Government Agent or a person thereto authorized by him in writing) specifying its contents and the numbers and the marks thereon.

7. The Assistant Government Agent may prescribe the route for the transit of dried meat.

8. The Assistant Government Agent or any person thereto authorized by him in writing may seize in transit any dried meat which is being removed in contravention of these conditions and the receptacle containing it and he may further destroy or otherwise dispose of such dried meat and receptacle if the owner thereof fails to prove that these conditions have been complied with.

9. Every packing depôt and every receptacle therein used or capable of being used for the storing of meat may be inspected at any time by the Assistant Government Agent or by any person thereto authorized by him in writing, and in the course of such inspection the Assistant Government Agent or such person may open or order to be opened any receptacle suspected of containing dried meat and may remove any sample of dried meat from the depôt.

10. The Assistant Government Agent may (a) on the outbreak of any disease among cattle or other animals or (b) for any other reasonable cause affecting the public health suspend or cancel any licence issued under these conditions.

### BY-LAWS.

1. In the event of the death or resignation of the Chairman of this Council, it shall be the duty of the Vice-Chairman within three days from the date of such death or resignation to summon a meeting of the Council for a



date within seven days of the death or resignation of such Chairman for the purpose of electing a successor. Should he fail or neglect to do so or should there be no Vice-Chairman in office, the Secretary for the time being in office shall summon such meeting within forty-eight hours of the expiry of the said three days for a date within the aforesaid period of seven days.

2. After the expiry of the term of office of the members of this Council, the Secretary for the time being in office shall summon the first meeting of the new Council to be held on a day within ten days from the beginning of the year.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

*Meetings: Notice, Agenda, Quorum, &c.*

1. (a) There shall be twelve General Meetings of the Council in every year for the transaction of business.

(b) The general meetings of the Council shall be held at the Council Office at least once every month on such day and at such hour as the Council may from time to time resolve, or as soon after that hour as may seem expedient to the Chairman.

(c) A special meeting may be held at the place aforesaid on such date and at such hour as the Chairman shall for each such meeting specially appoint.

(d) Notice of every such meeting and of the business to be transacted at it shall be served on each Councillor at least three days—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—before the meeting.

(e) No business shall be brought before or transacted at any meeting, general or special, other than the business specified in the notice of the meeting, without the permission of the Council.

(f) No business shall be transacted at any meeting unless a quorum of at least five Councillors is present.

(g) If at any meeting there is not a sufficient number of Councillors present to form a quorum, the Chairman shall adjourn the meeting to such date not more than fifteen days after the date of the meeting so adjourned as he thinks fit, and the business which would have been brought before the meeting so adjourned, if there had been a quorum present, shall be brought before, and disposed of, at such adjourned meeting.

*Adjournment of Meetings.*

2. (a) The Chairman of any meeting, general or special, at which a quorum of the Council is present may, with the consent of the meeting, adjourn the meeting from time to time; but no business shall be transacted without the permission of the Council at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which such adjournment took place.

(b) Notice of an adjourned meeting shall be served on members at least twenty-four hours before the time fixed for such meeting unless the original meeting decides to hold the adjourned sitting within twenty-four hours.

*Presence of Strangers.*

3. Strangers, including the Press, may be present at meetings in the places set apart for them, but must withdraw when called upon to do so by the Chairman, when in the opinion of the majority of the members of the Council present at the meeting, expressed by resolution, such exclusion is deemed advisable in the public interest.

*Order of Business.*

4. The business of the Council shall be transacted in the following order:—

(a) Confirmation of the minutes of the last preceding meeting.

(b) Memorials, petitions, complaints, and communications addressed to the Council shall be laid before the Council.

(c) Questions of which due notice has been given.

(d) Motions of which due notice has been given.

(e) Any other matter set down in the notice of the meeting in the order in which such matters are set out or in such order as the Council may for special reasons adopt.

(f) Monthly statements of receipts and disbursements, progress reports of works, and such other documents as are required by the Council, shall be submitted to the Council.

*Order of Precedence.*

5. For all purposes connected with the Council, the precedence and seniority of Councillors shall be regulated as follows:—

After the Chairman shall rank the Vice-Chairman and then the Councillors in order of the priority of their nomination or election and in the case of former Councillors re-elected or re-nominated, of the priority of their continuous membership of Council (such continuous membership being deemed to be unimpaired during the absence of a nominated member for whom a temporary successor has been nominated).

*Minutes.*

6. The minutes of each meeting shall be circulated. At the next or some subsequent meeting the question shall be put that the minutes be taken as read and confirmed. In the absence of objection or correction, the minutes as recorded shall be confirmed.

*Memorials, Petitions, &c.*

7. (a) A member presenting a petition or memorial to the Council may state concisely the purpose of the petition or memorial.

(b) No member shall present any petition or memorial or other communication which is not respectful in tone throughout.

(c) It shall be competent for any member to move that such petition or memorial be read. In making such motion he shall state concisely his reasons for wishing to have it read.

(d) No debate shall be permitted on such motion, nor shall any other member speak upon or in relation to such petition or memorial, except to second the motion formally.

(e) Such motion being seconded, the question shall be put whether the petition or memorial shall be read.

*Questions.*

8. (a) Questions relating to the affairs of the Council may be put to the Chairman.

(b) At least seven clear days' notice—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—shall be given of such questions.

(c) A written reply shall be read by the Chairman to each question.

(d) No member shall address the Council upon any question, nor shall the terms of any question contain any argument or expression of opinion or statement of fact, except in so far as may be necessary to explain such question.

(e) Any member may put a supplementary question for the purpose of further elucidating any matter of fact regarding which an answer has been given.

Provided that the Chairman may disallow any supplementary question if, in his opinion, it infringes the rules as to the subject matter of questions, and in that case the question shall not appear on the record of the minutes of the Council.

*Motions.*

9. (a) Every notice of motion shall be in writing signed by the member of the Council giving the notice. Unless such notice has been in the hands of the Secretary seven clear days—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—before the meeting of Council, the motion may not be included in the agenda.

(b) All notices of motions shall be dated and numbered as received, and shall be entered by the Secretary upon the agenda in the order in which they are received.

(c) Before any notice of motion is placed on the agenda paper, it shall be submitted to the Chairman, who, if he be of opinion that it is out of order, shall order that such motion shall not be included in the agenda and shall cause the giver of the notice to be so informed.



(d) Every motion of which notice is given shall be relevant to some question affecting the administration of the Council's affairs.

(e) No motion to rescind any resolution which has been passed within the preceding six months, nor any motion to the same effect as any motion which has been negatived within the preceding six months, shall be deemed to be in order, unless notice thereof shall have been given and specified in the agenda, and the notice shall bear, in addition to the member who proposes the motion, the signatures of seven other members; and when such motion has been disposed of, it shall not be competent for any member to propose any similar motion within the period of six months next following.

(f) No motion shall be deemed to have been submitted for debate until it shall have been proposed and seconded.

(g) Any member may second a motion or amendment by rising in his place and bowing to the Chair, without prejudice to his right to speak at a later period of the debate.

(h) Before any motion of which previous notice has not been given, is moved in Council, it shall be reduced to writing signed by the mover and handed to the Secretary.

(i) When a motion has been moved and seconded and the debate thereon concluded, the question thereupon shall be put to the vote by the Chairman.

#### *Withdrawal of Motion or Amendment.*

10. A member who has moved a motion or amendment may withdraw the same by leave of the Council, which shall be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked for permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

#### *Reintroduction of Motion.*

11. A motion which has been withdrawn may be moved again at any subsequent meeting; but no motion shall be proposed which is the same in substance as any motion which within the period of six months referred to in rule 9 (e) shall have been resolved in the affirmative or negative.

#### *Amendments.*

12. (a) Every amendment shall be in writing and handed to the Secretary by the member proposing it.

(b) Every amendment shall be relevant to the motion during the discussion of which it is moved.

(c) Every amendment shall be read before being moved.

(d) No amendment shall be discussed or put to the Council until it shall have been seconded.

(e) A member who has seconded an amendment in a formal manner shall be permitted afterwards to speak upon it.

(f) Whenever an amendment to any motion under discussion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall take the place of the original motion, and shall become the question upon which any further amendment may be moved.

#### *Debate ceases when Question fully put.*

13. No member may speak to any question after the same has been fully put by the Chairman. A question is fully put when the voting has been taken thereon.

#### *Voting and Recording of Votes.*

14. (a) The question shall be put by the Chairman, and the votes may be taken by a show of hands or by a secret ballot as the Council decides, and the result shall be declared by the Chairman; but in any case where the votes are taken otherwise than by secret ballot, any member may call for a division, and in that event the votes shall be taken by the Secretary asking each member separately, according to the order of precedence, how he desires to vote, and recording the votes accordingly.

(b) On any question being put, whether in Council or in Committee of the whole Council, every member present shall record his vote, either for the ayes or the noes.

#### *Casting Vote of Chairman.*

(c) The Chairman shall have an original vote in common with other members whether in Council or Committee of the whole Council, and also a casting vote if upon any question the votes are equal.

#### *Members Dissenting.*

15. It shall be competent for any Councillor, who is in a minority, to record the reasons for his dissent from the opinion of the majority, and such written dissent, if sent

to the Secretary within one week of the meeting in question, shall be entered by the Secretary at the end of his minutes of the proceedings.

#### *Order of the Day.*

16. The "Order of the Day" shall include all business, arranged according to rule No. 4. Unless otherwise resolved the business shall be taken in the order printed.

#### *Preservation of Order.*

17. (a) It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order, and his decision on all disputed points of order shall be final.

(b) Any member of the Council deviating from the rules may be immediately called to order by the Chairman of his own motion or on any other member of the Council rising to a point of order.

#### *Decision of Questions of Order.*

18. When the question of order has been stated, the member who raises it shall resume his seat, and no other member, except by leave of the Chairman, shall rise till the Chairman has decided the question, after which the member who was addressing the Council or Committee of the Council at the time the question was raised shall be entitled to proceed with his speech, if he conforms to the Chairman's ruling. If he does not conform, the Chairman may refuse to allow him to proceed with his speech.

#### *Member not explaining or retracting.*

19. Any member who fails to explain or to retract any objectionable words used by him, or to offer apologies for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the Council, may be censured or otherwise dealt with as the Council thinks fit.

#### *Chairman Speaking.*

20. When the Chairman is addressing the Council or Committee of the Council, any member then standing shall immediately resume his seat.

#### *Naming of Members.*

21. (a) The Chairman may name any member immediately after the commission of the offence of disregarding the authority of the Chair, or of abusing the rules of the Council by persistently and wilfully obstructing the business of the Council, and the Chairman may forthwith put the question on a motion being made by any member or from the Chair (no amendment, adjournment, or debate being allowed) "that such member be suspended from the service of the Council."

(b) If any such motion be carried and any member be suspended under this rule, his suspension on the first occasion shall continue for one month, on the second occasion for two months, and on the third or subsequent occasion for three months.

(c) Not more than one member shall be named at the same time, unless several members present together have jointly disregarded the authority of the Chair.

(d) If any member or members acting jointly, who have been suspended under this rule from the service of the Council, shall refuse at any time during the period of suspension to obey the directions of the Chairman to withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber, the Chairman may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce his decision.

#### *Irrelevance or Tedious Repetition.*

22. The Chairman after having called the attention of the Council or Council in Committee to the conduct of a member who persists in irrelevance or tedious repetition, either of his own arguments or of the arguments used by other members in debate, may direct the member to discontinue his speech.

#### *Disorderly Conduct.*

23. (a) The Chairman may order members whose conduct is grossly disorderly to withdraw immediately from the Council Chamber during the remainder of the meeting, and may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce his order.

(b) If on any occasion the Chairman deems that his powers under this rule are inadequate he may name such member or members in pursuance of rule 21.

#### *Duty to obey Order of Suspension or Withdrawal.*

24. Members who are suspended under rule 21, or are directed to withdraw under rule 23, shall forthwith withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber.

*Power to adjourn.*

25. An adjournment of the discussion of any question may be moved by a Councillor at any time, and, if seconded, shall be forthwith put to the vote.

26. In the event of grave disorder arising at any meeting of the Council or Committee of the Council, the Chairman may, if he thinks it necessary to do so, adjourn the meeting without putting the question of adjournment to the house, or suspend the meeting for a time to be named by him.

*Rules for Members speaking.*

27. In speaking to any proposition under consideration of the Council or a Committee of the whole Council, the following rules shall be strictly observed:—

- (a) Every member shall address his observations to the Chairman, and shall speak standing except in Committee.
- (b) He shall not be interrupted unless he is out of order.
- (c) When he has finished his observations he shall resume his seat, and any other member wishing to address the Council may rise.
- (d) A member shall not read his speech, but he may read extracts from written or printed papers in support of his argument.
- (e) If two members rise at the same time, the Chairman shall call on the member who first catches his eye.
- (f) Every member shall confine his observations to the subject under consideration.
- (g) No member shall impute improper motives to any other member.
- (h) All remarks of a personal nature shall be avoided.
- (i) A member may speak to the question before the Council or any amendment proposed thereto.
- (j) No member shall speak more than once on any proposition before the Council, except in explanation or to order, or when the Council is in Committee, or as is provided by rule 12 (e).
- (k) By the indulgence of the Council, a member may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the Council, but such matters may not be debated, and he must confine himself strictly to the vindication of his own conduct.
- (l) The mover of any resolution or motion may reply after all the members present have had an opportunity of addressing the Council and before the question is put, but he shall strictly confine himself to answering previous speakers, and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment.

*Committee of Council.*

28. The Council may at any time resolve themselves into a committee of the whole Council, and, on their resuming, the result of their deliberations shall be dealt with by the Council.

29. It shall be competent for any member at any stage of any discussion in a committee of the whole Council to move that the Council do resume. The question shall be put to the vote by the Chairman, and if the motion is carried, the Council will immediately resume from Committee.

*Special Committees.*

30. (a) The Council may from time to time appoint from among their own number such special or standing committees, consisting of such number of Councillors as they think fit for the purpose of inquiring into and reporting upon any matters connected with the purposes of the Local Government Ordinance.

(b) No such committee shall take any proceedings after the close of the year during which it shall have been so appointed as aforesaid.

(c) The quorum for the meetings of every such committee shall be three, unless otherwise specially fixed.

(d) In the absence of the Chairman at a meeting of any Committee, the members present shall choose one of their own members to preside, and such member shall for that meeting have all the powers of the Chairman.

(e) When a committee shall have agreed to a report the same shall be signed by each of the members thereof and shall, together with the minutes of proceedings, be submitted to the Council.

(f) In the event of any division taking place in a committee, a record thereof shall be entered in the minutes together with the motion or resolution proposed, the name of the proposer, and the respective votes of the members present, and such minutes shall be submitted with the report of such committee.

31. The Press shall be excluded from all meetings of special and standing committees.

## REPEAL.

The by-law published by Notification dated March 14, 1933, in *Government Gazette* No. 7,972 of March 17, 1933, is hereby repealed.

## BY-LAWS.

(Conditions for the Issue of Licences for Dangerous and Offensive Trades as defined under the General By-laws relating to Licensed Trades, published in *Government Gazette* of November 7, 1930.

1. All materials required for the purpose of carrying on any dangerous or offensive trade as defined in by-law 1 of the general by-laws relating to licences shall be so stored as to prevent the diffusion of effluvia or other similar nuisance and all such materials which have to be brought along any public thoroughfare, and which are likely to give off effluvia or be otherwise offensive shall be transported in non-absorbent covered receptacles or in such other manner as the Chairman may direct, so as to obviate the creation of any nuisance.

2. All offensive vapours or gases emitted during any process or manufacture, shall either be discharged into the external air in such manner and at such a height as to ensure their absorption into the upper air without injurious or offensive effects upon the neighbourhood, or be passed directly through a fire into a condensing apparatus.

3. (1) All premises shall be adequately drained and the drains kept in efficient order and washed daily.

(2) Floors shall be maintained in a proper state of repair and cleansed daily, and when so ordered by the Chairman shall be reconstructed of any impermeable material he may specify.

(3) Walls shall be kept in good order so as to prevent the absorption of filth, and whitewashed twice at least annually and at such other times as the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health may by written notice specify.

4. (1) All apparatus including implements and vessels shall be kept clean, and where possible they shall be cleansed daily.

(2) All refuse, sweepings, and scrapings, together with waste and bye-products, shall be removed daily from the premises in covered receptacles, unless intended to be forthwith subjected to further trade purposes on the premises.

5. All tanks, used for washing or soaking skins or any other similar materials, shall be emptied and cleansed as often as may be necessary to prevent the creation or diffusion of effluvia.

6. No person carrying on any dangerous or offensive trade, and no owner or occupier of any land or premises upon which such dangerous or offensive trade is carried on, shall pollute any river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water, by discharging thereinto or suffering to flow thereinto, any foul, ill-smelling, or offensive water or other fluid, or by throwing thereinto, or suffering to be washed thereinto, any offensive substance, nor shall he in any other way pollute or contaminate such river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water.

7. The owner or occupier of any land from which clay, earth, stone, gravel, cabook, or any other material is cut for the manufacture of bricks or tiles, or for building, or for any other purpose, shall take all necessary steps to ensure that proper drainage is provided, and that the pits or trenches cut are afterwards so filled as to prevent the collection of stagnant water therein.

8. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of the above by-laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 25 for any such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 5 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction, or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

9. By-laws Nos. 4 to 12 of Chapter H (Dangerous and Offensive Trades) of the by-laws made by the Local Board, Kurunegala, and published by Notification dated May 11, 1925, in *Government Gazette* No. 7,462 of May 15, 1925, and heretofore in force within this area by virtue of the provisions of section 247 of "The Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920," are hereby repealed.

## BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. It shall be lawful for every mortgagee of any immovable property situate within the administrative limits of the Council, or for any of the heirs or the legal representative of any deceased mortgagee, to cause any such mortgage to be registered at the office of the Council.

2. Every person desiring to have a mortgage so registered shall forward or cause to be forwarded to the Chairman a statement setting out—

- (1) the name and address of the mortgagee or of any heir or legal representative of the mortgagee, if he is deceased;
- (2) the name and address of the mortgagor;
- (3) and a description of the property or such particulars as may be necessary for identifying it.

3. On receipt of such statement and on payment by the applicant of a registration fee, which is hereby fixed at Re. 1, the Chairman shall cause the names and addresses and necessary particulars to be entered in the register kept for that purpose in the office of the Council.

4. Such register shall be open for inspection at all times during the office hours of the Council; and a fee of Re. 1 shall be paid by any person who desires to have such inspection.

5. In the event of any seizure, in execution for the recovery of rates, taxes, or charges due to the Council, of any property concerning which any mortgage and names and addresses may have been registered as aforesaid, the Chairman shall, at least 14 days before advertising such property for sale, serve or cause to be served on the person or persons whose names and addresses may have been so registered, a notice in writing of the seizure, the date fixed for the sale, and the amount for the recovery of which the seizure was effected.

6. If at any time before the sale, the amount specified in the notice is paid to the Council, the property shall be released from seizure.

## BY-LAWS.

1. All householders shall deposit or cause to be deposited the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from their premises in cylindrical galvanized wrought iron bins which they shall provide, and they shall place these bins daily on the edge of the road outside their premises between the hours of 6 A.M. and 6.30 A.M., and remove them or

cause them to be removed within the space of half an hour after the same shall have been emptied by the scavengers.

2. The bins shall—

- (a) be constructed in such a manner and be of such weight that the whole receptacle with its contents can be easily lifted and emptied into the scavenging cart;
- (b) they shall be provided with covers and convenient handles;
- (c) they shall have the owner's name or tenement number painted outside; and
- (d) they shall be kept clean by the owners.

3. No person shall place or cause to be placed dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse on any part of a road, except in bins as aforesaid, at the times specified, provided that the Chairman may authorize a householder to use instead of a bin as aforesaid such other covered receptacle as may be approved by him, if he is satisfied that, owing to poverty, the immediate provision of such a bin would press harshly on the householder.

4. Any person committing a breach of the above by-laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 10, and in the case of continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 5 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction or written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

NOTICES UNDER "THE EXCISE ORDINANCE, No. 8 OF 1912."

ARRACK RENT SALE CONDITIONS, 1933-34.

THE Governor has, under section 18 of "The Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912", directed that in addition to the general conditions published by Excise Notification No. 186 of April 12, 1929, the following shall be the special conditions for the grant of the exclusive privilege of selling arrack by retail within any local area:—

1. (1) The privilege will be granted for the period from October 1, 1933, to September 30, 1934, or for any shorter period within these 12 months on application by way of tender or by auction in the form and manner prescribed in these conditions.
- (2) The privilege may be granted for the local area of an individual tavern, or for the area of a group of taverns as the Government Agent may decide.
2. No tender will be accepted from any person—
  - (a) whose name appears on the list of defaulting contractors, or on the list of defaulters in respect of toll, arrack, or toddy rents, or on the list of persons precluded for other reasons from having any concern in any Government rent; or
  - (b) whose name is on the Excise Register of Offenders; or
  - (c) who is a registered criminal within the meaning of the Prevention of Crime Ordinance, No. 2 of 1926, or who has been convicted of any crime or of any Excise offence; or
  - (d) who at any time held a licence which has been cancelled under section 26 of the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912.
3. Every tender shall be made on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Treasury or any Kachcheri.
4. Every tender or bid must be made by the tenderer or bidder in his own name. No tender or bid will be accepted if made through an agent.
5. (1) The Government Agent may, if he considers it necessary, require the deposit of a sum not exceeding Rupees One thousand (Rs. 1,000) by the tenderer in respect of each tender.
- (2) Every tender shall be accompanied by a Treasury or Kachcheri receipt acknowledging the deposit of the sum required by the Government Agent, under the foregoing condition 5 (1), and the number and date of the receipt shall be entered on the face of the tender form.
6. Every tender shall be placed in a sealed envelope clearly marked in the top left hand corner with the name of the tavern in respect of which the tender is made and its number on the list of sanctioned taverns. The envelope shall be (a) deposited in the Kachcheri Tender Box, or (b) handed to the Government Agent or to the Assistant Government Agent or to his Office Assistant, or (c) sent by registered post so as to reach the Kachcheri before the time fixed for closing the tenders.
7. (1) The Government Agent may in his discretion reject any or all of the tenders received; and in the event of his so rejecting all tenders, he may put up the privilege for sale by auction.
- (2) At such auction only those persons shall be allowed to bid from whom tenders have been received or who produce a Treasury or Kachcheri receipt acknowledging the deposit required by the Government Agent in respect of each exclusive privilege for which they desire to bid.
- (3) Subject to the proviso that the Government Agent shall have a discretion to reject any or all of the bids, the privilege shall be granted to the highest bidder at such auction.
- (4) In the event of the rejection of all bids as aforesaid, the privilege may be granted to any person who is approved by the Government Agent and who agrees to pay by way of rent such amount as the Government Agent may fix.
8. (1) (a) The grantee shall, immediately on being granted the privilege, sign these conditions and pay to the Government Agent as a security deposit a sum equivalent to two months' rent of the privilege.
- (b) The grantee shall also within fourteen days of the sale of the privilege enter into a bond with the Government Agent for the full amount for which he has purchased it and he shall specially hypothecate by such bond the said security deposit.
- (c) The said security deposit shall be liable to be confiscated by the Government Agent for breach of any of these conditions or for non-payment of instalments and such confiscation shall be in addition to any other penalty prescribed by these conditions for such breach.
- (2) Security money so paid will be deposited in the banks only on the grantee's application and only at his risk, and when such deposit is made no withdrawal will be allowed till the date of maturity.
- (3) If the highest bid or tender under condition 3 exceeds the sum of Rs. 2,000, the grantee shall at the time of the execution of the bond as aforesaid execute, if so required by the Government Agent, a power of attorney in the form sanctioned by law, to confess judgment in any action which may be instituted against him for the recovery of any moneys due in respect of the privilege, and shall also furnish to the Government Agent within fifteen days of the date of the execution of such power of attorney a duly certified copy thereof for filing in the District Court under section 32 of the Civil Procedure Code.
- (4) The grantee shall, on signing these conditions, elect and signify under his hand a Post Office or postal address to which all notices and processes whatever in connection with the privilege may be addressed under registered cover; and all such notices or processes, so addressed to such post office or to such postal address, and posted in the due course, shall be deemed to have been duly served and as effectual for all purposes as if they had been served upon the grantee in person upon the day on which any such notice or process was so posted.
9. If any tenderer or bidder, on being declared to be the purchaser of the privilege, declines to sign these conditions of sale or fails to furnish the required security when called upon to do so, the deposit made under the foregoing condition 5 (1) or 7 (2) will be declared forfeited and the defaulter will render himself liable to have his name entered in the list of defaulters in respect of all arrack or toddy rents. Subject to this exception the deposits of all tenderers or bidders will be returned after the conditions of sale have been signed by the successful tenderer or bidder.
10. (1) The successful tenderer or bidder or approved person (hereinafter referred to as "the grantee") shall pay the rent to the Government Agent in twelve equal monthly instalments.

- (2) The first instalment of the rent shall be deemed to be due and payable on September 30, 1933, and succeeding instalments shall be deemed to be severally due and payable on the last day of each succeeding month.
- (3) Interest at the rate of 9 per centum per annum shall be payable in respect of all arrears.
11. (1) In addition to the rent the grantee shall pay to the Government Agent in respect of every gallon of arrack (at 30 degrees, or not more than 32 degrees, underproof) removed from a Government warehouse the cost price and duty at the rates shown in schedule A.
- (2) In respect of "Special Matured Pot Still Arrack" at 27 degrees underproof, sold in sealed bottles, the grantee shall pay to the Government Agent in addition to the rent, such duty, cost price, and additional cost price as are prescribed for sealed bottles in schedule A, and extra additional cost price at the rate of Re. 1 per gallon.
12. (1) If any instalment or part of any instalment of the purchase money, or rent or any duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due to the Crown from the grantee remains unpaid after the same shall have become due and payable, the Government Agent shall have power, after fourteen days' notice to the grantee of his intention to do so, without further process of law, to cancel the licence or licences issued to the grantee and to resell the privilege at the risk and loss of the grantee. Such notice may be served personally on the grantee or addressed to the post office elected under the foregoing Condition 8 (4) as the Government Agent thinks fit.
- (2) In the event of the cancellation of a licence, the Government Agent shall have power to grant the privilege to any person approved by him for any period intervening between such cancellation and the resale of the privilege, and for this purpose may issue to such approved person a temporary licence upon such terms as he may think fit.
- (3) No remission of the rent payable in respect of the privilege will be granted on any plea of the grantee's having over-estimated the value of any tavern or on any other ground.
- (4) The grantee shall not have or make any claim to any reduction, or to the remission, of any sum due and owing by him to the Crown by reason of any loss alleged to have been sustained by him, whether on account of any closing of the tavern during the passage of troops or during the encampment of troops in the vicinity of the tavern or during the holding of any poll, or through any other cause whatsoever.
- (5) The Government Agent shall have power, at his discretion, to refuse to issue any order on the warehouse for the supply of arrack to the grantee till all arrears of rent in respect of the privilege have been settled with interest.
13. No payment of any sum due by the grantee to the Crown shall be deemed to have been duly made, unless the grantee shall produce a Kachcheri receipt in respect thereof.
14. (1) (a) The grantee shall open the tavern or taverns on the day on which the privilege commences to run.
- (b) The Government Agent shall not be bound to find a site for any tavern in the event of the grantee not being able to procure a site.
- (c) The grantee shall not open a tavern on any site otherwise than with the approval of the Government Agent, such approval being obtained from the Government Agent at least 14 days before the privilege commences to run.
- (2) The grantee shall not less than five days before the date on which the privilege commences to run, obtain from the Government Agent a licence or licences for the sale by retail of arrack at the taverns within the area covered by this privilege.
15. The grantee shall take over from the outgoing grantee and pay to him an amount, which may be agreed on, in respect of the cost of—
- (a) The balance of arrack remaining in a tavern, after the closing hour of the date of expiry of the privilege of the outgoing grantee, and
- (b) Any bottled arrack, and
- (c) Transport, wastage, and other miscellaneous charges.
16. (1) Where the incoming and outgoing grantees cannot agree with regard to the sum to be paid as aforesaid the outgoing grantee shall forthwith remove the balance of arrack of a strength not below 32 degrees underproof on a permit, to the nearest Excise Warehouse, and deliver it to the Excise Warehouse Officer in charge thereof and obtain a receipt.
- (2) The outgoing grantee shall present such receipt to the Excise Commissioner who shall pay to such grantee the value of the arrack as delivered at the rates of duty, cost price, and extra cost of bottled arrack, if any, at which such grantee purchased such arrack.
- (3) If the sum payable as duty and cost price by the incoming grantee at the time the arrack is so taken over by him, is higher than the sum actually paid for the said arrack by the outgoing grantee, the incoming grantee shall, within fourteen days of the commencement of his privilege, pay such difference to the nearest Kachcheri.
17. If the grantee, or any agent, or person employed by the grantee is, during the continuance of the privilege, convicted of an offence under Chapter XIII. of the Ceylon Penal Code, the Government Agent may, take any of the steps prescribed by section 30 of the Ordinance.
18. The grantee shall be responsible for all acts of his agents and employees in relation to the privilege.
19. The grantee of the taverns specified in schedule B hereto shall not sell any arrack for removal from such tavern.
20. The grantee shall have no concern or interest direct or indirect (a) in the sale of fermented toddy, or (b) in the purchase of any privilege of selling toddy, or (c) in the sale of foreign liquor within the area to which the privilege of selling arrack relates.
21. (1) The grantee shall purchase arrack only from the Government Warehouse, specified in schedule C hereto, in respect of the district within which the tavern is situated, and in quantities not less than those prescribed in the said schedule.
- (2) No arrack will be issued from a warehouse on Sundays or Public Holidays without the prior approval of the Assistant Commissioner of Excise.
- (3) Where arrack is transported by road from a warehouse to a tavern, the Warehouse Officer will not issue a transport pass available for use at a later hour than 6.30 P.M. on the date of issue.
22. The grantee shall accept such arrack as is available at the Government Warehouse, whether in bulk or in bottles.
23. The grantee shall draw such proportion of each consignment drawn by him as the Excise Commissioner or his Deputy or Assistant may require in sealed bottles of each description.
24. The grantee shall have no claim against the Crown for compensation (beyond a proportionate refund of the amount paid) in respect of any failure by the Crown for any reason whatsoever to deliver the full quantity for which the grantee has made payment at the Kachcheri as aforesaid.
25. The privilege shall not be transferable otherwise than with the sanction of the Governor first had and obtained.
26. The grantee shall account for all arrack purchased by him from time to time. The allowance made on account of wastage will under no circumstances exceed two per centum of the total quantity purchased.
27. The rent shall be determined by (a) the expiry of the term for which the privilege shall have been granted; (b) the death of the grantee; (c) or breach of any of the conditions governing it.

- (b) Shall not sell arrack in sealed bottles at any other rates than the following:—  
8-dram white bottles at the rate of Rs. 2.50 each for arrack at 30 degrees underproof and at the rate of Rs. 2.75 each for "Special Matured Pot Still Arrack" at 27 degrees underproof;  
6-dram black bottles at the rate of Re. 1.95 each for arrack at 30 degrees underproof.  
Pint bottles at the rate of Re. 1.30 each for arrack at 30 degrees underproof and at the rate of Re. 1.45 each for "Special Matured Pot Still Arrack" at 27 degrees underproof.
- (c) Shall not sell arrack by the dram or glass at a lower than Rs. 15.12 a gallon or 31½ cents a dram.

Provided that the Government Agent may for special reasons and on the application of the licensee permit the sale of arrack at such other rates as he may in his discretion determine.

2. (a) All arrack sold by the bottle on a retail "Off" licence shall be sold in sealed bottles bearing intact the seal of the Excise Department.

The licensee shall not keep in a tavern any sealed bottles other than those bearing the seal of the Excise Department. He shall put aside any bottle bearing a damaged or obliterated seal and shall show it to the Inspecting Officer on his next visit, and any such bottle shall, if so ordered by the Assistant Commissioner of Excise for the division, be exchanged for a fresh bottle.

(b) The licensee shall at all times keep at least one dozen sealed bottled of each kind of bottled arrack on a shelf or rack hung on a wall of the tavern prominently in view of customers at the bar.

**VITAL STATISTICS.****Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 20, 1933.**

*Births.*—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 167 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 94 Sinhales, 27 Tamils, 25 Moors, 8 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1933, viz., 292,200) was 29.8, as against 26.6 in the preceding week, 23.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.3 the weekly average for last year.

*Deaths.*—The total deaths registered were 138 (2 Europeans, 2 Burghers, 88 Sinhalese, 15 Tamils, 25 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 24.6, as against 22.1 in the previous week, 25.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.5 the weekly average for last year.

*Infantile Deaths.*—Of the 138 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 26 in the preceding week, 23 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

*Stillbirths.*—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

*Principal Causes of Death.*—1. (a) Twelve deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents) and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta South, as against 10 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Seven deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in New Bazaar and 1 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, Slave Island, and Wellawatta South, as against 8 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Kotahena South and Maradana North. The number registered during the preceding week was also 2 and the weekly average for last year was 3.

2. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 11 in Maradana hospitals (including 8 deaths of non-residents) and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, Kotahena South, and New Bazaar, as against 7 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths from *Phthisis*, of residents of Colombo Town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. One death from *Enteric Fever* was registered in Maradana hospitals, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. Twelve deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 6 from *Worms*, 5 from *Debility*, 3 each of *Tetanus* and *Puerperal Septicæmia*, 2 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Dysentery*, and *Accidents*, 1 each from *Infantile Convulsions* and *Suicide*, and 64 from *Other Causes*.

5. *Reported Cases.*—Thirteen cases of *Chickenpox*, 12 of *Measles*, 8 of *Enteric Fever*, and 1 of *Whooping Cough* were reported during the week, as against 13, 11, 1, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

*State of the Weather.*—The mean temperature of air was 80.9°, against 80.2° in the preceding week and 80.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.833 in., against 29.847 in. in the preceding week and 29.803 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 4.59 in., against 7.55 in. in the preceding week and 5.13 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

**THE KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.**

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on April 22, 1933, at 8.30 a.m. in accordance with notice dated April 18, 1933.

Present: Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman ; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail ; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake ; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa ; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle ; Dr. L. C. Wijesinha ; Mr. O. T. Nettelton ; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva.

1. The Minutes of proceedings of the meeting held on March 25, 1933, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1932 to March 31, 1933, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to February 28, 1933.
- (c) Health Officer's report for March, 1933.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of March, 1933.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended April 22, 1933.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the minutes of proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—

Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during March, 1933.

3A. On Dr. Attygalle's inquiry whether the leakage from a water main in Gregory road was reported, the Chairman said that it was so and explained that a heavy retaining wall appeared to have been built over the main and that in repairing the leak the main had to be diverted.

Mr. de Silva having suggested that the leak existed for three weeks before repairs were effected the Chairman agreed to inquire into the facts and circulate papers.

4. Petitions :—

Mr. Wijayatilake presented a petition from Mr. U. B. Godamune asking that his objection to the assessment of premises Nos. 703/704, Peradeniya road, which has been rejected, may be entertained. The Chairman undertook to inquire into the matter.

5. Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on March 25, 1933.*

(1) Papers *re* the proposal to recover the sum of Rs. 97 representing half share of the cost of constructing culvert in Malwatte Vihare premises, due by the High Priest of the Vihare, by an action at law.—Recommended to institute an action.

(2) Proposed amendment of by-law 144 to permit of metered water services being allowed for domestic purposes to premises assessed below the minimum annual value of Rs. 1,200 fixed by the Council, as the qualification entitling premises to private water services.—Recommended.

(3) Draft by-laws proposed for the Kandy Fire Brigade to permit of the Brigade's services being made available for local bodies outside Municipal limits in connection with outbreaks of fire, and the recovery of a scale of fees in respect of such services.—Recommended.

(4) Correspondence with Government on the subject of the application made by the Council for the free supply of a set of standard weights and measures for use in the Municipality, to replace the old set now in use.—Recommended to get the old set reconditioned by Messrs. Avery & Co., Birmingham, at a cost of Rs. 200.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on March 25, 1933.*

(5) Letter dated January 27, 1933, from Mr. P. A. K. Abdul Cader, Licensee of Stall No. 80, Public Market and Retail Rice Granary No. 4, Jail road, stating that he is leaving for India and asking that the stall and rice depôt be transferred in favour of Mr. K. A. Peer Mohammed to whom he is giving over the business.—Recommended to refuse the request.

(6) To authorize the Chairman to let out Public Market Stalls and Spaces which fall vacant during 1933, without the levy of privilege rents, and without competition in view of the prevailing trade depression.—Recommended.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on March 25, 1933.*

(7) To consider the desirability of leasing, in half acre blocks to the unemployed for the cultivation of vegetable, the Municipal lands at Nittawela and Mawilmada which have been used for trenching, when trenching operations are removed to the Gohagoda Trenching Ground in April, 1933.—Recommended.

(8) To obtain sanction for the half-pay leave allowed to Mr. A. J. K. Marikar from January 23 to February 28, 1933, and for the payment of a sum of Rs. 78 as salary to the substitute employed during a part of the period of Mr. Marikar's absence on full and half pay leave from January 12 to February 28, 1933.—Recommended.

(9) To obtain a supplementary vote for Rs. 1,000 to meet the expenses connected with the anti-smallpox measures carried out in Kandy.—Recommended.

(10) To consider suggestion to grant relief to ratepayers by a rebate or discount for prompt payment of rates.—Not recommended. No legal provision in the Municipal Councils Ordinance.

(11) To reconsider the Council's resolution of July 16, 1932, in regard to the payment of a decreased percentage of commission to rate collectors on their general collections for failure to recover less than 75 per cent. of the items of rates due from village areas, in view of the representations made by the collectors that they find it difficult to collect the required 75 per cent.—Recommended to substitute 65 per cent. as the minimum for 75 per cent. now required to be collected.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on April 8, 1933.*

(12) Application from Mr. D. J. Ponweera for a private water service for premises No. 400, Peradeniya road.—Recommended.

(13) Tenders received for the construction of three night soil storing sheds.—Recommended that the work be given to Contractors G. H. Arnolis Baas, A. R. Suwaris, and D. J. Ponweera, the contractors being entrusted with the construction of one night soil storing shed each at the rates quoted by the first (G. H. Arnolis Baas) *i.e.*, Rs. 1,394.50, in terms of the Municipal Engineer's recommendation.

(14) To sanction the transfer of sums of Rs. 81 from each of the two estimates No. 6 "Maintenance of Municipal Buildings" and No. 13 "Sundry Works" to Head 22, Item I., "Lighting of Town Hall and Offices" to meet cost of Rs. 162 for rewiring the ground floor of the Town Hall occupied by the Municipal Engineer's Department, and for providing a table fan for the Assistant Engineer's room.—Recommended.

(15) To sanction the transfer of a sum of Rs. 650 to a maintenance vote under Head 8, from the balances available under the two Capital Expenditure Estimates Nos. 73/31 and 74/31 to meet cost of replastering the entire inner side of the Ellagalla Road Septic Tank and coating it with a mixture of cement and ironite.—Recommended.

*Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on April 8, 1933.*

(16) Estimate for Rs. 2,810.59 from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for extending the electric main to a distance of one mile outside Municipal limits along Ampitiya road.—Recommended.

Resolved that the recommendations (1) to (16) be adopted.

At this stage Mr. de Silva left the meeting.

6. To restore Ratwatta Adigar, who has been absent from 3 consecutive meetings, to the office of Councillor, in terms of sections 29 and 30 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance.

Resolved that Ratwatta Adigar be restored to his office as Councillor.

7. Application from the Managing Director of Isako's Grand Russian Circus for the use of the Bogambara Ground for a circus show for 14 days from April 26, 1933.

The Chairman moved:—"That the application be allowed on a rent of Rs. 25 per diem and other usual charges, without reference to the question of prizes."—Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle seconded.

Mr. Soysa moved as an amendment:—"That the application be allowed on a rent of Rs. 15 per diem and other usual charges without the right to grant prizes."—Mr. Ismail seconded.

The amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost, the division being as follows:—*Ayes*—Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake, Mr. Hadji M. S. Usoof Ismail. *Noes*—Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle, Dr. L. C. Wijesinha, Mr. O. T. Nettelton, Chairman.

The original motion was then put to the meeting and carried by a majority of one vote. *Ayes*—Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle, Dr. L. C. Wijesinha, Mr. O. T. Nettelton, Chairman. *Noes*—Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail, Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake.

## GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, March 11, 1933, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated March 7, 1933.

*Present* :—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel; Mr. A. M. Saheed; Dr. H. E. Elkanayaka; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. A. Paulas; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna; and Mr. R. L. Ephraums.

1. The Minutes of the Meeting held on Saturday, February 18, 1933, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

Referring to item 10 (4) the Chairman said that the resolution passed by Council was to the effect that a scheme for allowing a rebate to rate-payers who paid their rates direct at the Municipal Office be tried experimentally in Ward No. 1 and that it do take effect from 2nd quarter, 1933. He was, however, unable to implement that resolution because the Municipal Councils Ordinance made no provision for such a step. He had written to the Chairman of the Kandy Municipal Council and made inquiries as to the possibility of getting the Ordinance amended but was unable to do more than that.

2. Two petitions and two letters were presented by Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka, and one petition by Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya.

These were tabled and the Chairman said that they would receive consideration.

3. Pursuant to notice Mr. F. Magdon Ismail asked the following questions :—(1) How many houses within the Municipal area do not receive conservancy? (2) Of these how many fall within the Police area? (3) How much is the total annual value assessed on such houses within the Municipal area for the purpose of assessment rates? (4) How much is the total annual value assessed on such houses within the Police area for the purpose of assessment rates? (5) Will the Chairman be so good as to take steps to see that covered carts are used for the removal of the refuse?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) 5,088. (2) 2,329. (3) Rs. 410,620.70. (4) Rs. 290,450. (5) It would not be feasible to provide the carts now in use with covers but inquiries will be made as to the cost and suitability of various kinds of covered carts when new ones are wanted.

4. Pursuant to notice Mr. E. M. Karunaratna asked the following questions :—(1) (a) Is the Chairman aware that a patient suffering from smallpox was brought to Galle in a car on Monday the 6th instant, at about 7 P.M. from Ambalangoda and admitted to the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Dadella? (b) If he was so aware, was the sanction of the Chairman obtained by the person responsible for the conveyance of the patient, prior to his getting him admitted to the said hospital? (c) Is it not a fact that the said Infectious Diseases Hospital is intended to serve the Municipal Town of Galle, and not intended for patients who develop diseases elsewhere? (d) Does the Chairman realize that the residents of Galle in general, and of Ward No. 7 in particular, have run a grave risk of infection by this surprising introduction of such a patient to the Town of Galle which had so far a clean bill, as regards the epidemic of smallpox that is still prevailing in Colombo and elsewhere? (e) Are adequate steps and precautions being taken to prevent any possible spread of infection from the patient referred to?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) (a) Yes. I heard of this when on circuit in the Matara District, whence I returned at 6.40 P.M. last evening. (b) No. (c) I am unable to answer this question as I have not had time to give it any consideration, and must admit that I am not aware whether or not the answer should be in the affirmative.

The Medical Officer of Health of the Municipality informs me that patients have been sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital from the Civil Hospital irrespective of whether they were residents of Galle or not.

The Secretary also informs me that in a letter to the Colonial Secretary dated April 24, 1909, reference is made to the fact that patients from outside Municipal limits will continue to be treated there.

The Provincial Surgeon will kindly make some statement when all your questions have been answered.

(d) My personal opinion is that the gravity of the risk mentioned would depend on the soundness of the precautions taken. (e) Yes, as far as can be ascertained. The Provincial Surgeon will doubtless comment on these two last questions when he makes his statement.

The Provincial Surgeon thereupon made a statement in the course of which he said that the patient in question, who had been ill for about a fortnight and was now convalescing, was brought in from a populous village in Ambalangoda where adequate isolation was not possible. In the circumstances it was considered advisable by the senior officers of the Medical Department to remove the patient to the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Galle.

He also stated that, as far as can be ascertained, the Medical Department has full control over the admission of patients to the Infectious Diseases Hospital irrespective of the question of their place of residence.

He assured the Council that everything possible was being done to ensure that the spread of infection should not occur.

Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya inquired whether there was a segregation Camp in Kosgoda as reported in the Press. The Provincial Surgeon replied that there was no Camp but that people were segregated there in their own houses.

Mr. J. E. Perera said he was personally not aware of the exclusive admittance authority of the Medical Department with regard to the Infectious Diseases Hospital.

The Chairman undertook to communicate with the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services on the subject and ascertain from him what the correct position was. The reply received would be made known to members.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. E. A. Paulas moved :—(1) That the rates in the schedule of rates of works be reduced by 25 per cent. (2) That the reduced rates be applied to all the works that are to be carried out in 1933. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka seconded.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Municipal Works for consideration. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.

The Chairman suggested that the mover should supplement his motion by preparing a memorandum, which could be submitted to the Committee, giving details of the suggested reductions as regards each item. The mover agreed to the suggestion.

The amendment was then put to the meeting and carried.

The following motion stood in the name of Mr. E. A. Paulas :—That the assessment of properties other than those that are rented out to be reduced by 25 per cent. from the 2nd quarter, 1933.

With the leave of Council the motion was withdrawn.

(2) That the rate of an unit of electricity be reduced to 40 cents. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded, and Messrs. S. H. Dahanayaka and F. Magdon Ismail supported the motion.

Mr. J. E. Perera said that it was a very laudable desire to want to reduce the burden on the tax-payers, but at the same time they should see that the Council's finances were maintained. Some time ago the rate for electricity was reduced from 50 cents to 45 cents per unit, and before the Council decided on any further reduction it was very necessary that the whole question should be gone into fully. He moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Standing Committees on Works and Finance for consideration.

The Chairman said that if the motion was carried it would mean a loss to Council of about Rs. 7,500 per annum. Revenue under all other heads was steadily decreasing and the Electricity Department was the only means of improving the Council's financial position. He urged the Council not to pass the motion. He thought it should be defeated then and there, but, however, he was willing to agree to the amendment proposed by Mr. Perera. The mover and seconder also agreed to the amendment which was then put to the meeting and carried.

(3) That the Council should not supply grass for the cattle that are exposed in the shed before slaughter as from April 1, 1933.

The Chairman made a statement explaining the position and the mover thereupon with the permission of Council withdrew the motion.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved : (1) That a Committee of this Council consisting of all the elected members be appointed to report on the necessity of opening out more playgrounds in the town and also on the improvement necessary to the Esplanade.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail in seconding inquired whether the mover would be willing to insert the words "and the Ramparts" after the word "esplanade." The mover had no objection, and with the permission of Council the motion was accordingly amended. Messrs. E. M. Karunaratna and J. E. Perera supported the motion.

The Chairman said there was no reason why the Council should not accept the motion, but he was not in favour of the inclusion of the words "improvements necessary to the Esplanade" as this work was being carried on at present under his personal direction and control. In this connection he also wished to deprecate publicly the unnecessary interference by individual members in the execution of works for which he, as Executive Officer of the Council, was entirely responsible. He would welcome interest taken, but he certainly resented interference. He suggested that the word "further" be inserted before the word "improvements." This was agreed to.

The motion, as amended, was then put to the meeting and carried. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka being appointed convener of the Committee.

7. To confirm the purchase on behalf of the Council, of the following properties sold by public auction for non-payment of rates: 124, Dangedera; 878A, Galupiadde; and 15, Circular road, all in Ward No. 3.—Resolved that the purchase be confirmed.

8. To write off the rates due for 4th quarter, 1931, on property No. 100A, Ettiligoda.—Resolved that the rates be written off.

9. To consider the question of "writing off" rates for 1933 on the ground of poverty of the owners:—The Chairman moved that the action taken last year be adopted and that the rates due on the properties mentioned in the annexed lists be "written off" for 1933, on the ground of poverty of the owners.—Carried.

10. To confirm the appointment of Mr. T. L. F. Mack as Secretary:—The Chairman moved that Mr. Mack be confirmed as Secretary of the Council. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the confirmation be deferred until such time as the contemplated Municipal reforms were introduced, but there being no seconder the motion fell through. The Chairman's motion was then put to the meeting and carried by 10 votes to one.

11. To consider the recommendations of the Four Standing Committees of February 4, 1933, with regard to (a) Commission to Collector. (b) Allowances to Collectors.

After some discussion it was resolved to refer these matters back to the Four Standing Committees to be considered at a meeting to be held on Saturday the 18th instant at 10.30 A.M. Mr. E. A. Paulas was invited to attend this meeting. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

12. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of February 25, 1933.*

(2) Payment of salary to Dr. F. Abeysuriya, Acting Medical Officer of Health, during the absence on leave of the permanent Medical Officer of Health from December 13 to 23, 1932.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 75 be paid to Dr. F. Abeysuriya for acting for the Medical Officer of Health from December 13 to 23, 1932.

(3) To consider the question of converting the telephone extension to the Office of the Medical Officer of Health into a direct line from the Exchange at an extra cost of Rs. 50.—Recommended that the telephone extension to the Office of the Medical Officer of Health be converted into a direct line from the Exchange at an extra cost of Rs. 50.

(4) To consider an application from the widow of late K. K. Methieshamy, cattle pound labourer, for a gratuity under section 24 of the Municipal Pension Rules.—Recommended that the widow be granted a gratuity of Rs. 58.50 being three months' pay of the office.

(5) To consider an application from the widow of the late M. D. James, conservancy labourer, for a gratuity under the Municipal Pension Rules.—Recommended, in terms of Rule 24 of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 112.50 to the widow and in addition Rs. 75 for the two minor children.

(6) List of demolished buildings in Ward No. 3.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(7) Application from the Galle Ayurvedic Association for assistance from the Council for the upkeep of the Free Ayurvedic Medical Hall within Municipal limits.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 300 be voted for 1933.

(8) Charges for service connections carried out by the Electricity Department.—Recommended that only the bare cost of labour and materials be charged for.

(9) To authorize writing off a sum of Rs. 660.75 due for supply of electricity, meter rent, and replacement of fuse from January to December, 1931.—Recommended that the sum of Rs. 660.75 be written off as irrecoverable.

(10) To consider what action should be taken with regard to the recovery of a sum of Re. 1.64 being balance rates due for 1st and 2nd quarters, 1932, on property No. 72A, Kandewatta, belonging to H. L. M. P. Mohamed.—Recommended that the sum of Re. 1.64 be waived.

(11) To consider papers relating to the taxation of properties appertaining to Buddhist Temples.—Recommended (1) that the requirements of section 115 (1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be strictly adhered to and that the taxation of all properties not exclusively appropriated to religious worship be put into force with effect from 3rd quarter, 1933. (2) that this be made applicable, *mutatis mutandi*, to all religious bodies.

(12) To consider Mr. F. Magdon Ismail's motion of February 18, 1933, viz., that the annual tax levied on each eating-house or tea kiosk be reduced to Rs. 4.—Recommended that consideration be deferred till the next meeting of this Committee.

(13) To sanction the waiver of a sum of Rs. 167.96 being the balance ground rent recoverable from the United Circus Shows.—Sanctioned.

(14) To consider an application from the Superintendent of the Electricity Department for a telephone to be installed in his bungalow.—Recommended that the telephone be installed as requested.

With regard to item (11) Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that all Buddhist Temples be exempted from the payment of rates. The Chairman said that he was in sympathy with the amendment, but the recommendation made must be accepted as there was no provision in the Ordinance to exempt such properties.

#### Resolution.

Resolved that the matter be deferred for further consideration and that in the meantime the papers on the subject be forwarded to Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka for his perusal and return.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

13. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation of February 25, 1933.*

(2) To consider the question of having fixed rates for the sale of meat and mutton.—Recommended that the matter be brought up again for consideration after 3 months.

(3) To consider what action should be taken with regard to the expenditure of the balance sum of Rs. 4,990 provided in the Budget for Anti-plague measures.—Recommended (1) that a Clayton's Gassing Machine, Type F, be purchased from Messrs. Hunter & Co., Colombo, at a cost of Rs. 245. (2) that the following staff be appointed:—

- (a) Two working kanganyics, each on a salary of Rs. 360 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 18 to Rs. 540 in 10 years; (b) 1 mason at Re. 1 per diem; (c) mason's assistant at 50 cents per diem; (d) 2 Clayton labourers at 70 cents each per diem; (e) 5 disinfecting and cleansing labourers at 50 cents each per diem.

(3) That applications be invited for the post of Supervisor, Rat Campaign, on a salary of Rs. 720 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 120 to Rs. 1,920.

With regard to item (3) it was resolved that the recommendations be adopted subject to the following amendments as regards recommendation (2):—(a) that one working kangany be appointed at Re. 1.25 per day; (e) that the work of disinfecting and cleansing be done by the unemployed and that the five labourers engaged be paid from vote No. 86 (Relief of the Unemployed).

As regards recommendation (3) it was resolved to include in the advertisement calling for applications a house and bicycle allowance of Rs. 360 per annum.

The recommendation of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining item was adopted.

14. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of February 25, 1933.*

- (2) To consider 6 applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.
- (3) To consider the following estimates:—(a) Rs. 500 for examining and clearing Fort sewers of silt; (b) Rs. 600 for weeding the catchment area of Hiyare Reservoir; (c) Rs. 540 for weeding the catchment area of Bikke Reservoir; (d) Rs. 2,000 for maintenance of Victoria Park, Esplanade, and public seats; (e) Rs. 2,500 for maintenance of Hiyare Service road.—Recommended that the above estimates be passed.
- (4) To sanction a Supplemental vote of Rs. 143 for providing an electric standard at the entrance to the cattle pound.—Recommended that consideration be deferred till after an inspection of the site by the Chairman.
- (5) To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 3,000 for current consumed by the Pumps at Pettigalawatta canal.—Recommended that a reduced vote of Rs. 2,500 representing the actual cost of current be sanctioned.
- (6) To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 400 being the wages to the two pump house attendants.—Sanctioned.

*Resolution.*

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

15. *Extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of March 4, 1933.*

- (2) To consider the question of amending items 8 and 9 of the schedule of fees published in *Government Gazette* No. 694 of May 10, 1908, relating to the manufacture of gunpowder and fireworks.—Recommended (1) that the storing of gunpowder and the storing of fireworks be declared by means of a by-law to be dangerous and offensive trades under section 212 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910. (2) that the licence fees for a gunpowder manufactory and for the manufactory of fireworks be reduced from Rs. 500 and Rs. 250 to Rs. 100 and Rs. 50, respectively, and that the licence fee for the storing of gunpowder and the storing of fireworks be fixed at Rs. 25 in each case. (3) To consider Mr. F. Magdon Ismail's motion of February 18, 1933, viz.:—(1) That this Council do take early steps to make suitable alterations in the rate of assessment of property tax with a view to abolishing the conservancy tax. (2) (a) that the practice of depriving householders of the service of conservancy for default of payment of the tax leviable thereon be discontinued as such practice causes great hardship and is injurious to the health of the Town. **Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Galle Municipal Council, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, April 1, 1933, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated March 27, 1933.**

*Present*:—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel; Mr. A. M. Saheed; Dr. H. E. Eknayaka; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. A. Paulas; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna; Mr. R. L. Ephraums; and Mr. A. C. Mohamed.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on March 11, 1933, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. The Chairman moved that, in terms of section 30 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, Mr. D. I. Durham who, having failed to attend three consecutive meetings of the Council, had *ipso facto* ceased to be a member, be restored to office. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka objected to the motion being passed. He quoted section 30 of the Ordinance and argued, that as Mr. Durham had failed to attend three consecutive meetings of the Council he had already ceased to be a Councillor and it was therefore not in order now for the Council to restore him to office. The matter should have been brought up at the last General Meeting.

The Chairman over-ruled the objection holding that there was no provision in the Ordinance to support Mr. Dahanayaka's contention.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried, Mr. Dahanayaka alone voting against.

3. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka presented a petition from W. T. Hinniappu, retired peon, asking that he be granted his pension. The Chairman said that it would be considered when item 8 on the Agenda was taken up.

4. The Chairman next read out the reply received from the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services on the question of the admission of patients to the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Dadalla. He said the position was that the Council had no control over the matter. In this connection he also mentioned that as Government Agent he had received a letter from the Provincial Surgeon stating that the present site of the Infectious Diseases Hospital was not satisfactory and asking that the question of another site be considered. He informed the meeting that he would be taking up this matter in his capacity as Government Agent.

5. The Chairman stated that there were a number of questions standing in the name of Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka but with the consent of the latter these had been put off for the next meeting as the Medical Officer of Health, who had to supply the information, was away on leave.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved:—(1) That Government be requested to grant to this Council the Old Kachcheri premises at Magalle for a playground.

The mover in the course of his speech stated that he understood these premises were to be leased to an Engineering firm. He further said that as there were some high officials in Government service who had taken shares in this particular firm the application for the lease had received unduly favourable consideration. He was, however, not prepared to divulge any names. He made the statement with a full sense of responsibility.

Mr. J. E. Perera seconded the motion which was supported by Messrs. A. C. Mohamed, E. M. Karunaratna, A. M. Saheed, and Thomas Amarasuriya. Messrs. Saheed and Karunaratna, however, dissociated themselves entirely from the remarks made by the mover.

The mover replied.

The motion was then put to the meeting and carried.

(2) That the Government premises now occupied by the Galle Club be taken over by this Council on a lease to serve as the Headquarters of the Municipality.

The Chairman said that the motion could not be accepted in its present form. He suggested that it be withdrawn on the understanding that it could be brought up again in another form at the next meeting. The mover agreed to the suggestion and thereupon, with the leave of Council, withdrew the motion.

7. The following motions stood in the name of Mr. F. Magdon Ismail:— (1) That this Council do not levy any rate for the supply of water to all places of religious worship; or in the alternative. (2) That no meter charges be levied in respect of such premises.

On the Chairman stating that this matter would be considered when the extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committees on Finance and Assessment were laid before the Council, Mr. Ismail, with the permission of Council, withdrew the motions.

8. To sanction the payment with effect from March 27, 1933, of Rs. 7.50 per diem to Dr. R. F. Alles for acting for the Medical Officer of Health during the absence on leave of the latter owing to ill health.—Sanctioned.

9. To sanction the expenditure of a sum of Rs. 3,500 being the cost of two Pulsometer Centrifugal Pumps purchased by Council in 1932 in connection with the Pettigalawatta drainage scheme.—Sanctioned.

10. To consider an application from the Chairman, Municipal Education District Committee for water service to the New Tamil School at Kandewatta.—Resolved that the application be allowed.

11. To sanction (a) the grant of a pension of Rs. 300 per annum to W. W. J. Wijesinghe, retired Peon Arachchi; and (b) the grant of a Long Service allowance of Rs. 7.50 per month to W. T. Hinni Appu, Peon, Secretariat, with effect from January 1, 1933.—(a) Sanctioned.

With regard to (b) Mr. J. E. Perera moved that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects with a view to recommending the payment of a pension instead of a retiring allowance. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka seconded.—Carried.

With the permission of Council the following five items which did not appear on the agenda were next taken up for consideration:—

12. Application from the Hony. Secretary, Galle Cricket Club, requesting permission to erect a cadjan fence enclosing the cricket ground of the Esplanade for a cricket match on April 7 and 8.—Resolved that permission be granted on payment of the usual ground rent fee of Rs. 10 per diem.

13. To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 150 for the purchase of a spare lifting chain for the travelling crane at the Power Station.—Sanctioned.

14. To consider the following recommendations of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of February 25, 1933, with regard to the taxation of properties appertaining to Buddhist temples.—Recommended (1) that the requirements of section 115 (1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be strictly adhered to and that the taxation of all properties not exclusively appropriated to religious worship be put into force with effect from 3rd quarter, 1933; (2) that this be made applicable, *mutatis mutandi* to all religious bodies.—Resolved that consideration be deferred till the next meeting of Council.

15. To consider the following recommendations of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of March 4, 1933, on the question of amending items 8 and 9 of the schedule of fees published in *Government Gazette* No. 694 of May 10, 1908, relating to the manufacture of gunpowder and fireworks.—Recommended (1) that the storing of fireworks be declared by means of a by-law to be dangerous and offensive trades under section 212 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910; (2) that the licence fees for a gunpowder manufactory and for the manufactory of fireworks be reduced from Rs. 500 and Rs. 250 to Rs. 100 and Rs. 50, respectively, and that the licence fee for the storing of gunpowder and the storing of fireworks be fixed at Rs. 25 in each case.—Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

16. Application from the Office Staff for two temporary electric fans owing to the excessive heat. The Chairman moved that a sum of Rs. 175 be voted for two oscillating bracket fans. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded.—Carried.

17. To consider the following recommendation of the Four Standing Committees of March 18, 1933, on the question of commission and allowances to Collectors.—Recommended that, on further consideration of the matter, no change be made in the present rate of commission paid to collectors for collection of assessment rates, but that the allowances be discontinued with effect from January 1, 1933, except in the case of the Collector of Ward 5A (Old Ward 4E).

The Chairman said it would assist in the discussion if the Council first considered the second part of the recommendation dealing with the question of allowances. This was agreed to.

Mr. A. M. Saheed moved to substitute the word "bonuses" for the word "allowances." Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried.

The second part of the recommendation was then put to the meeting and adopted.

With regard to the first part of the recommendation Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the rate of commission paid to collectors be reduced to 4 per cent. within Police limits and 6 per cent. outside Police limits, but there being no seconder the motion fell through.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka thereupon moved as a further amendment that the original recommendation of the Four Standing Committees of February 4, 1933, viz., that the commission for collection of assessment rates be reduced from 6 per cent. to 5 per cent. be adopted, but there being no seconder, this motion also fell through.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as an amendment that, with effect from January 1, 1933, a deduction of 5 per cent. be made on the total commission payable to each Collector. Mr. A. M. Saheed seconded and Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel supported the amendment. Messrs. J. E. Perera and A. C. Mohamed opposed the amendment and supported the recommendation of the Four Standing Committees.

The Chairman said he had an open mind on the matter. Personally he thought it would be fair not to make any change this year beyond the discontinuance of the "bonuses." The assessments were being considerably reduced as a result of the large number of objections received and the commission paid to Collectors was bound to be less than last year.

The amendment was then put to the meeting and declared lost, 4 voting for and 7 against, the Chairman declining to vote.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka called for a division which resulted as follows:—*For*: Messrs. Ismail, Saheed, Dahanayaka and Scharenguivel. *Against*: Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. M. Karunaratna, Thomas Amarasuriya, A. C. Mohamed, E. A. Paulas, R. L. Ephraums, and Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka.

#### Resolution.

Resolved that the first part of the above recommendation of the Four Standing Committees be adopted.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

18. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of March 18, 1933.*

(2) List of demolished buildings in old Wards 5 and 4w.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(3) To waive the rates of 4th quarter, 1932, on the evacuated buildings in the plague area amounting to Rs. 127.95 in Ward 2 and Rs. 15.97 in Ward 3.—Recommended that the rates be waived.

(4) Water supply to Mosques.—Recommended (1) that all the Mosques presently supplied with water be treated alike and that they be allowed a free supply of 7,500 gallons each per mensem, (2) that a charge of Re. 1 be made for every 1,000 gallons in excess of 7,500 gallons, and (3) that the meters be retained in order to ensure against unnecessary waste of water.

(5) To consider Mr. F. Magdon Ismail's motion of February 18, 1933, viz., that the annual tax levied on each eating-house or tea kiosk be reduced to Rs. 4.—Recommended that no reduction be made.

(6) To consider papers relating to the payment of a salary to W. Wijesinghe, retired Peon Arachchi, for performing the duties of Market-keeper from January 14, 1933, to February 28, 1933.—Recommended the payment of a salary of Rs. 37.50 for the period.

(7) Application from Mr. J. E. Perera to purchase one of Council's water carts for Rs. 50.—Recommended that the offer be accepted.

With regard to item (4) Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as an amendment that this Council do not levy any rate for the supply of water to all places of religious worship.

The Chairman said the motion was not in order and could not be accepted as the procedure to be followed in such cases was laid down in the Council's by-laws.

Mr. Magdon Ismail then moved as an alternative amendment that no meter charges be levied for any month in the case of mosques which did not consume more than 7,500 gallons during that month. Mr. A. C. Mohamed seconded.

The Chairman said he was not sure whether the by-laws would permit of this being done. He would, however, look into the legal aspect of the matter, and suggested that consideration be deferred. The mover and seconder agreed to the suggestion.

With regard to item (5) Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as an amendment that the annual tax levied on each eating-house or tea kiosk be reduced to Rs. 4 with effect from the beginning of next year. Mr. A. M. Saheed seconded and Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka supported the amendment, which was then put to the meeting and declared lost by the Chairman's casting vote.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail called for a division which resulted as follows:—*For*: Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, A. M. Saheed, S. H. Dahanayaka, Thomas Amarasuriya, E. M. Karunaratna, and E. A. Paulas. *Against*: Chairman, Messrs. J. E. Perera, A. J. R. Scharenguivel, Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka, R. L. Ephraums, and Mr. A. C. Mohamed.

Resolved that recommendations 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7 of the Standing Committee be adopted.

#### 19. Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of March 18, 1933.

(2) To consider two applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(3) To consider an estimate of Rs. 1,200 for extending the outlet pipe which discharges the foul water from the sump at Talapitiya to the sea.—Resolved that the matter be brought up at the next meeting of Council and that in the meantime inquiries be made as regards the cost of concrete piles.

(4) To consider the question of extending the drain which runs along the Wakwella road Pirivena to distance of 150 feet.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 325 be voted for the purpose.

(5) Letter from the Chief Engineer and Manager, Electrical Undertakings, regarding the purchase by Council of a Synchronous Motor.—Recommended that the lowest tender received, viz., Rs. 2,177 from Messrs. Brown & Co., be accepted.

With regard to item (3) the Chairman moved that, in view of the high cost of concrete piles, the original scheme be adopted involving an expenditure of Rs. 1,200. Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel seconded.—Carried.

With regard to item (4) it was resolved to vote a sum of Rs. 375 according to the estimate submitted by the Superintendent of Works.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

20. At the conclusion of the meeting the Chairman moved Council into Committee to consider the case of Inspector Abeywardena.

Council in Committee recommended that the Clerical Staff in the Secretariat be strengthened and that Mr. Abeywardena be appointed on a salary of Rs. 600 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 60 to Rs. 1,500, the transfer to take effect from April 1, 1933.

Council resumed and the Chairman moved that the above recommendation of Council in Committee be adopted.—Carried.

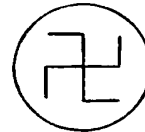

The addition of hexamethylenetetramine and such substance is claimed as accelerating the hardening of the binding substance. A repeatedly ignitable match is also described and claimed.
