BY-LAW.

By-law 156c.—On being satisfied that for the prevention wastage, misuse, or undue consumption of water from the Municipal Waterworks, supplied to any private premises and stored in any cistern within such premises, it is necessary to effect a reduction in the size, or any other alteration, of any cistern, or, the alteration of the arrangement, size, position, nature, or condition of any pipe, tap, valve, meter, or other fitting, situated within such private premises, the Chairman may serve a Notice upon the Owner or Occupier of such premises, in the form hereunder given, specifying the alterations required, and such alterations shall be made by the Owner or Occupier, to the satisfaction of the Chairman, within such time as may be specified in the said Notice.

In the event of the name or residence of the Owner or the name of the Occupier being unknown, such Notice may upon the written order of the Chairman be affixed in a conspicuous place upon the premises to which it refers, and it shall thereupon be deemed to have been duly served for the

purposes of this by-law.

Take notice that the water service to the above-mentioned premises having, on inspection, been found to require alteration, you are required to take steps to carry out the alteration or repairs set forth in the accompanying Memo-randum, which I certify to be necessary. Should you fail to carry out such alterations and repairs

within days after receipt of this Notice, the service to your premises will be discontinued and will not be reconnected until the requirements of this Notice are complied with to my satisfaction.

THE LABOUR ORDINANCE, No. 1 of 1923.

Notification No. 60.

DEGULATIONS under sections 14 and 23 of the Labour Ordinance, No. 1 of 1923, made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Article 93 of Council, 1931.

REGULATIONS

The regulations dated July 12, 1923, and published in Gazette No. 7,339 of July 13, 1923, as amended by the regulations dated October 24, 1923, and published in Gazette No. 7,358 of October 26, 1923, by the regulations dated October 31, 1923, and published in Gazette No. 7,359 of November 2, 1923, and by the regulations dated June 24, 1931, and published in Gazette No. 7,863 of June 26, 1931, are hereby further amended as follows:—

1. By the addition to Regulation 1A of the following

proviso:

"Provided that the Governor may by Notification in the Gazette exempt employers of Indian Immigrant Labourers from the operation of this regulation, for a period to be specified in such Notification without affecting however in any manner whatsoever any liabilities incurrep prior to the date of such Notification, in respect of estates or portions of estates planted exclusively in any one of the products named in Schedule A to these regulations.

2. By the deletion of paragraph (ii.) of regulation 18 and the substitution of the following paragraph therefor:

(ii.) (a) Where the average number of Indian Immigrant labourers employed on any estate during the quarter immediately preceding has been more than five. and where such average number works out at less than one labourer to each unit of cultivation as hereinafter defined, the Controller shall assess the amount payable in respect of such estate on the basis that each labourer of the aforesaid average number represents a unit of cultivation for the purposes of the calculation of fees.

(b) The unit of cultivation shall in this context be

deemed to be-

(1) for estates planted in tea alone: two acres; and (2) for estates planted in any one of the other products or in any combination of the products or in any combination of the products enumerated in Schedule A: an acreage bearing the same ratio to one acre as twice the rate payable in respect of tea bears to the rate payable in respect of any one of the other products or of any combination of products.

(c) No estate or portion of an estate in respect of which an employer has already been exempted from the operation of the foregoing Regulation 1A by the provise thereto, shall be brought into account for the purpose of

ascertaining whether such employer is entitled to pay reduced fees under this paragraph of this regulation.

\*\*Thustrations.\*\*—(i.) If the fee per acre payable in respect of tea is Re. 1.50 and the fee per acre payable in respect of rubber is 30 cents, for the purposes of this paragraph of this regulation the unit of cultivation for rubber is 150.  $\times$  2 = 10. 30

In all subjects there shall be two papers of three hours each, except in the case of History of Architecture and Geography. In Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and Zoology there will be in addition a practical test.

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the examination in Chemistry:—

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of the common materials occurring in nature. The history of the discovery of the composition of air and water. The laws of chemical combination. The atomic and molecular theories. Equivalent atomic and molecular weights, and the methods of their determination, including atomic heats and isomorphism. Valency and structural formulæ. The classification of the elements according to the periodic system.

The elements of physical chemistry, including the following:—The properties of gases and solutions. Thermal dissociation. Osmotic pressure, and determination of molecular weights in solution by the freezing point method. Diffusion. Colloidal solutions. Electrical conductivity. Hydrolysis. Strengths of acids and bases. Chemical equilibrium and simple examples of the law of mass action. Catalysis. Thermo-chemistry. Combustion and flame.

The history, production and properties of the more important

The history, production and properties of the more important and typical elements, and their most familiar compounds (including those of carbon as follows: carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, carbon disulphide, methane, ethylene and acetylene).

The whole to be treated as far as possible experimentally, and

The whole to be treated as far as possible experimentally, and in an elementary manner.

One alternative question on elementary organic chemistry will be set in each paper according to the following syllabus—Hydro-carbons, halogen derivatives, alcohols, ethers, aldehydes, ketones, acids, and esters, as illustrated by the study of methane, ethylene, acetylene, methyl and ethyl alcohols, diethyl ether, formaldehyde and acetaldehyde, acetone, formic, acetic and oxalic acids, ethylacetate; glycerols, fats and soaps (from an experimental standpoint only); benzene, nitrobenzene, aniline and phenol. Candidates will be expected to show a practical acquaintance with all the particular substances specified.

#### II.—Practical Examination.

[Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis provided that it does not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.] Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallisation, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the Teacher, may also be submitted to the Examiners.

#### Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

No candidate will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the

II.—Historical Geology.—The disposition of rocks and its representation on maps; evidences of relative ages of rocks; fossils, their preservation and distribution in rocks of different ages; the geological systems, their broad characters and distribution in Great Britain.

#### Practical Work.

Interpretation of simple geological maps in terms of rock-structure and its relation to topography; expression of this interpretation by means of sections; Graphic methods of finding thickness, dip and strike of beds, of completing outcrops,

Two Imperial size sheets † of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns toman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., "Greek and Roman Architecture."

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

#### History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to

be prescribed two years previously.

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

## Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History from about 1400 to the present day. One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text.

## Ancient History (Two Papers).

- (i.) Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.C.
  - Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.c. to 330 A.D.
- (ii.) A selected portion of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

Geography (Two Papers and Map Work).

1. General Geography.—General principles as exemplified in the world considered as a whole. (One papers)

The Earth's Crust:—Nature of the earth's crust. The internal and external forces modifying the crust in so far as they determine:—(a) General structure and leading topographical features of the continental masses and ocean basins; (b) types and distribution of rocks, minerals and soils.

Climate:—Broad seasonal distribution of insolation, temperature, pressure, winds and rainfall, leading to recognition of chief chimate types and their associated weather conditions. (The physical conditions and movements of the oceans should be considered only in so far as they affect climate).

Vegetation: -General distribution of forest, woodland, scrub and grassland in relation to climate, soil and topography.

Major Geographical Regions:-The division of the world into major geographical regions.

Human Geography:—The influence of the foregoing physical factors upon the distribution of man and upon the production of food and raw materials, and the consequent development of the geographical regions.

2. Regional Geography.—(One paper).

(a) Europe with special reference to the British Isles, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, and Scandinavia.

(b) North America with special reference to the north-eastern industrial areas, and the United States east of the Mississippi.

(c) The Monsoon lands—Indian Empire, Ceylon, Indo China, Siam, Japanese Empire, Malaya, East Indies, Philipines, China—with special reference to the Indian Empire and Ceylon.

3. Map Work.—(One paper).

The map work would be carried on in connection with the general and regional geography and should include:—The study of topographic maps (including section drawing) as exemplified by one-inch and six-inch Ordnance Survey maps of the British Isles; the use and study of atlas maps, including the advantages and disadvantages of the principal projections employed, climate and weather maps; cartographical and diagrammatic representation of geographical data.

#### Economics (Two Papers).

I.—Industrial and Commercial History.—The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent to 1760.

To include:—The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in industrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

II.—Principles of Economics.—Economics, analytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom.

To include:—The scope of economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

#### Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical\* Examination).

- (1) The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium. Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.
- (2) The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified, and an elementary knowledge of—
  - (a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate, including an elementary knowledge of heredity, variation, and evolution.
  - (b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.
  - of the body.

    (c) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Fætal Membranes in the Ried and Mammal Bird and Mammal.

(3) A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups :-

Protozoa:—Lobosa, Foraminifera, Radiolari Flagellata, Ciliata. Cœlenterata:—Hydrozoa, Anthozoa. Platyhelmia:—Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda. Radiolaria, Sporozoa

Annelida:—Oligochæta, Polychæta. Articulata:—Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida. Chordata:—Urochorda, Cephalochorda.

Craniata:—Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia.

#### \*Practical Examination.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals' comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregoing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of lepus will be substituted that of canis) and to determine the zoological position of specimens

that of canis) and to determine the zoological position of specimens in accordance with paragraph 3 above.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

(ii.) English Constitutional Law and its History, including—

(vi.) A general outline of the Law of Property with particular reference to the duties of Trustees towards their beneficiaries.

Intermediata Examination in Science.

#### . Intermediate Examination in Science. Scheme of Examination.

The examination will be a Pass Examination only.

Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General Principles of Biology, and (9) Geography.

(Note:—Candidates must select at least one of their four subjects from among the first three of the foregoing list: candidates offering "General Principles of Biology," are not permitted to offer also Botany or Zoology.)

In all subjects except Geography there will be two papers of three hours each, and except in Pure Mathematics and Applied Mathematics, there will also be a three hours paratical test. In Geography there will be three papers of three hours each.

In certain subjects questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by The examination will be a Pass Examination only.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by

means of viva voce questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects

taken.

Reference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who rails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Science.

Referred; candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects according to these conditions will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science may enter for examination in one or more supple-

mentary subjects. EXEMPTIONS.

(Note.—No exemptions are given from this examination in whole or in part except on the results of examinations of this University.)

Candidates who have passed the Internal Intermediate Exami-

nation in Science in accordance with the conditions then in force for External Students are entitled to exemption from the External

for External Students are entitled to exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Science; and if the combination of subjects did not comply with the requirements for External Students such candidates may be exempted on passing in the necessary Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate or the Final Examinations in Arts for External Students in or after 1920, or who have passed the corresponding examinations for Internal Students, under the conditions applicable to External Students in force since that date, with any of the following subjects:—Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry,

#### Scheme of Examination.

1. The examination shall be a Pass Examination only and shall be divided into two parts. Either part may be taken first at the option of the candidate, or the two parts may be taken together. A candidate who has passed one part as an Internal Student may enter for the remaining part as an External Student only with the special permission of the Senate. The two parts are as follows:

(1) Elements of Economics l paper

(2) Geography
(3) Pure Mathematics or Logic and Scientific Method 2 papers or French or German

#### PART II.

(4) English Economic History(5) British Constitution 1 paper 2 papers

2. Candidates who enter for both parts of the examination on the same occasion, and who pass in one part, will be credited with that part, and at a subsequent examination will be required to offer only that part in which they have falled.

3. The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of a candidate to pass, the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting viva voce questions to any candidate.

4. Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them, and a capacity to read with intelligence French or German or Italian.

5. The questions set in French or German or Italian in the papers on Elements of Economics are compulsory for all candidates.

candidates.

#### Reference.

1. A candidate at the Intermediate Examination, who takes all the five prescribed subjects in both Part I, and Part II. on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only, may be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone, and on one occasion only, at the next Intermediate Examination in Economics. Economics.

2. A referred candidate who does not pass in his referred subject in accordance with the above regulation will be required when re-entering to offer the whole of that part in which his referred subject is contained.

The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred

only if his failure in one subject is not serious and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

4. A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion.

#### Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Economics may enter for examination in one or more supplementary subjects.

#### EXEMPTIONS.

Note.—No exemptions are given from this examination in whole or in part except on the results of examinations of this University.

4. Candidates who have obtained either the Academic or the External Diploma in Geography shall be exempted from examination in Geography.

General Geography.—The broad distribution and inter-relation of the relief of the land, climates, natural vegetation, commercial products, and trade routes and centres. An outline study of the world as divided into its major geographical regions, with the main features of the physical and human (including economic) conditions of these regions.

Regional Geography.—Certain regions of the world (see below) considered under the following heads:—Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils, rocks, and minerals of economic importance. The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates. The river systems as related to configuration and climate. The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture. The sources of mechanical power. The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land. The localization of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors. Transport. Trade centres and trade routes. The geographical circumstances which influence the economic and strategical position of States.

#### British Constitution (Two Papers).

Outlines of the Constitution and public administration of the Outlines of the Constitution and public administration of the United Kingdom at the present day, including the organization and working of Parliament, the Executive (Crown, Ministers, and Civil Service), and the Judiciary; the constitution and powers of the Local Authorities in England; the relations between the United Kingdom and its Colonies and Dependencies.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

The Council met this day at 3 r.m., pursuant to notice, dated April 27, 1932.

Present: Mr. W. L. Murphy, B.A., C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. M. L. M. Reyal; Dr. S. Muttiah; Mr. F. Dadabhoy, J.P.; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, M.S.C.; Mr. Aelian W. Pereira; Mr. A. R. A. Razik; Mr. T. A. Owles; Dr. H. U. Leembruggen; and Mr. H. L. Groccock.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of April 6, 1932, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

- Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of April 6, 1932, be confirmed.

  2. Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, on behalf of Mr. Aelian W. Pereira (who was present later), asked the following questions which the Chairman answered:
- (1) Q.—How many sales of properties for non-payment of taxes were there during 1930 and 1931? A.—During
- 1930 there were 48 sales. During 1931 there were 78 sales.—Total 126.

  (2) Q.—Were certificates under section 143 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, signed by the Chairman in all cases to which this section applies during the aforesaid period? A.—No. There were only 4 cases which came under section 143, i.e., 2 during 1930 in which certificates were signed; 2 during 1931 in which sales were cancelled on payment of rates and dues.
- (3) Q.—Were certificates under section 146 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, signed by the Chairman in all cases to which this section applies during the aforesaid period? A.—No. 122 cases fell under section 146; 46 cases in 1930 and 76 cases in 1931. Four certificates were signed in 1931 in respect of properties sold during 1930. In 41 sales of 1930 and 70 sales of 1931 (total 111) sales were cancelled on payment of rates and dues.

(4) Q.—If not, how many vesting certificates are yet to be signed by the Chairman up to date, i.e., April 27, 1932?
Seven certificates have yet to be signed—1 sale of 1930 and 6 of 1931.

A.—Seven certificates have yet to be signed—1 sale of 1950 and 0 of 1951.

(5) Q.—If there are any such certificates yet to be signed, why the delay?

A.—The delay is due to efforts being made to induce quondam owners to pay the dues with a view to cancel the sales.

(6) Q.—Are aided drainage agreements registered? If not, why are they not registered? A.—No. There is

no reason why they should not be registered.

3. The following motion stood in the name of Dr. E. A. Coorey:—"This Council do resolve that, owing to the prevailing depression, a Commission or Committee be appointed to make recommendations as to what steps might be taken to reduce the establishment charges and all other expenditure of this Council and for this purpose the Four Standing Committees be requested to report as to the personnel, &c., of the Commission or Committee they would recommend to be appointed."

Dr. E. A. Coorey stated that the Special Committee regarding relief to ratepayers discussed the above motion and, after considering the proposals embodied therein, has made a recommendation to the Council which was coming up for consideration that day. He, therefore, withdrew the motion with the permission of the Council.

The Chairman stated that as Mr. Aelian W. Pereira was not able to attend the meeting the motion standing

in his name be deferred for the next meeting.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. E. Goonesinha moved :-- "That in view of the complaints made against the assessment and valuation of properties by the Municipal Assessor a Committee of this Council be appointed to investigate and report on the working of the Assessor's Department."—Mr. M. L. M. Reyal seconded. Dr. E. A. Coorey spoke to the motion.

The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on March (average by the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

  2. The following documents were submitted:
  - - (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1931 to March 31, 1932, on account of Municipal

(b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
(c) Health Officer's report for March, 1932.

(d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of March, 1932. (e) The Reservoir Readings for the week ended April 16, 1932.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this meeting as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910," be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the Government Gazette. A second of the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the Government Gazette. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during March, 1932.

3A. Regarding the complaint made by Mr. de Silva at the previous meeting of Council that traders in Kandy had increased the prices of all food-stuffs on the plea of having to pay higher import duties the Chairman stated that on inquiry he found the prices were normal although the increased duties had caused a momentary fluctuation. The price of rice had not been raised. At the present moment it is the lowest recorded for some years.

4. Petitions:—Mr. del Silva presented a petition from the residents of Mavilmada begging that the Gansabhawa road in Mavilmada be converted into a cart road as there is now no proper road access to their properties.

The Chairman undertook to inquire into the matter.

5. Correspondence:—(1) Letter No. M. 16/32 of April 5,1932, from the Superintendent of Police, Central Province, stating that on further consideration he is not able to undertake to train men for a Brass Band in Kandy and that the matter may be dropped at any rate until such time as the trade depression lifts.—Read.

1. (2) Letter No. D. 92/320 of March 18, 1932, from the Postmaster-General stating that it is not possible at present

to say when the question of revising telephone rates will be taken up.—Read.

6. Mr. de Silva obtained the leave of the Council to move the following motion, which stood in his name, at the next meeting of the Council:—"That the pumping scheme which has been under consideration be undertaken without any further delay."

7. To consider the question of allowing vegetable dealers to bring their vegetables to the market on Fair Days (Sundays and Thursdays) at 3 P.M. instead of 6 P.M. as at present.—Resolved that the time be advanced to 3 P.M.

as proposed.

- 8. Papers re the proposal for the Chairman to take action under section 203 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance" to prohibit the sale of any articles in or upon certain specified streets.—It was resolved to approve the proposal in regard to the roads indicated in the schedule, the Chairman undertaking to use his discretion in dealing with itinerating hawkers, gram and betel sellers, who might be affected by the prohibition.

  9. Recommendations of Standing Committees deferred for consideration from the March meeting:—

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on February 20, 1932.

(1) Draft of by-law proposed to be enacted in place of repealed by-law 157 authorizing the Chairman to have meters fixed at premises at which water is shown to be unduly consumed or wasted, and to recover charges in respect of such excess consumption or waste.—Recommended. Resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on March 5, 1932.

(2) Letter dated February 9, 1932, from Mr. F. Mapalagama offering his services free to the Council.—Recommended that Mr. Mapalagama's offer be not accepted.

Mr. de Silva moved—That Mr. Mapalagama's offer be accepted. Mr. Wijayatilake seconded.

The motion was put to the meeting and lost, only the mover and seconder voting for it.
