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## MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on February 16, 1895, at 3 p.m.

*Present* :—E. Elliott, Esq., Chairman; Dr. J. Attygalle; H. E. H. Hayes, Esq.; R. L. Symes, Esq.; W. Abeyesundera, Esq.; C. P. Hayley, Esq.; Hon. P. D. Anthonisz; D. G. Goonawardene, Esq.; N. Dias Abeyesinghe Esq.; and C. L. M. Abdul Carim, Esq.

1. Read and confirmed Minutes of last Meeting.
2. Pursuant to notice Mr. C. P. Hayley asked for information regarding the progress of the work in connection with the Pettigalla-ela.

The Chairman desired the Secretary to read a report from the Superintendent of Works dated February 15, 1895, explaining the reasons why the work of the timber groin at the outlet of the Pettigalla-ela was stopped. He (the Chairman) advised that the work should be suspended until the proposed improvements of the Morogoda-ela were completed.

3. Pursuant to notice the Hon. Dr. Anthonisz asked “(1) Why the contractor who built the latrine at the railway station has not completed the work according to the plan approved by the Council; and (2) if the contractor has been paid for the work, or has had an advance, and if the Council is going to take over the building as it stands at present or compel him to complete it according to the plan.”

The Chairman replied that he had carefully inspected the work, and found it was carried out in strict accordance with the contract, with the only exception of the screens to the doors being built outside instead of inside the building, owing to the want of room to place them inside.

4. Pursuant to notice Mr. R. L. Symes asked “which of the works which were the subject of my question in Council of November 17 last have been completed, and if any of them are still unfinished, to ask what progress has been made, and when we may anticipate that they may be completed.”

The Chairman read a report from the Superintendent of Works dated February 14, 1895, explaining in detail the works completed and those uncompleted, and in case of the latter the reasons why they were not finished last year.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. Abeyesundera asked "Why no commencement whatever has been made with regard to the erection of a side wall to the Kepu-ela opposite the railway station, though it was decided by the Council on July 21 last to build it in sections."

The Chairman replied that he finds that tenders were invited in October last for the work, but that the three lowest tenderers refused to take up the work, and that he had thought it advisable to await the release of labour by the completion of the work of the Mátara railway near Galle, which would reduce rates, he believed, before taking further action.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. R. L. Symes asked "Whether the resolution passed on August 25 last, that the completion reports of works be certified by the Member of the Ward in which the work has been completed as well as by the Chairman, is now complied with, and if not, why not?"

The Chairman stated the resolution had been brought to his notice, but that he must decline to be bound by it as it trenchanted in his opinion on the executive authority vested in the Chairman.

7. Pursuant to notice Mr. R. L. Symes asked, "As it is now some considerable time since the letter from the Colonial Secretary with reference to the report of the Special Committee of the Ceylon National Association on proposed amendments of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance was received, to inquire when it will be referred to the Standing Committee to frame a reply in accordance with resolution passed on December 17, 1894."

The Chairman replied that the written opinion of the Members only came before him on December 27, and that as the Standing Committee was out of office at the end of the year, it had not been possible as yet to carry out the wish of the Council. But as the Chairman was aware that the Sub-Committee of the Legislative Council was sitting, he had sent forward copies of all the written opinions for its consideration. The papers would now be laid before the Standing Committee to be elected this day.

8. The Council, in terms of section 88 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, elected by ballot the following as Members of the Standing Committee:—H. E. H. Hayes, Esq.; Hon. P. D. Anthonisz; Dr. J. Attygalle; C. P. Hayley, Esq.; R. L. Symes, Esq.

9. On a motion by Mr. H. E. H. Hayes, seconded by Mr. R. L. Symes, it was unanimously resolved that His Excellency the Governor be requested to appoint Mr. H. F. Jansz as Auditor for the current year.

10. In terms of section 139 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance it was resolved that the assessment of properties contained in the books for 1894, with the alterations and additions already sanctioned by the Standing Committee, be adopted for 1895.

11. Submitted papers regarding the water supply. The Chairman laid before the Council the returns of the rainfall and the consequent rate of filling of the Bikke reservoir, which show the following results:—

(a) It took 97.21 inches of rainfall (equivalent to about 37½ million gallons) between March 1 and December 30 to fill the reservoir 30 feet in depth, and holding 13 million gallons (Mr. Burnett's figures).

(b) It took 60 inches of rainfall over the same area (equivalent to 23 million gallons) to fill 15 feet holding about 10 million gallons.

(c) It took 36 inches of rainfall (equivalent to nearly 14 million gallons) to fill the top 10 feet holding 7½ millions.

The top 10 feet will supply a population of 2,600 with 8 gallons a head for a period of 365 days, and as the rainfall for any year has during the past twenty-five years never been under 71 inches, and averages over ninety inches, it may be taken as certain this upper 10 feet will be at least twice filled in a year, viz., once during each monsoon. The Chairman considered these figures set at rest the question of the sufficiency of the supply for the object in view, and as regards the quality of the water now stored, he laid on the table reports by Mr. Cochran City Analyst of Colombo.

Read report of December 17 on a sample of water drawn from the reservoir itself, stating *inter alia* that nitrites are certainly not present in appreciable quantity as would have been expected from the high amount of albumenoid matter present. However, a water which contains so much albumenoid matter, and which absorbs so much oxygen, cannot be considered as a safe drinking water."

Read also a further report of a sample of water drawn from the pipes as delivered in the town, reporting that "the passage of the water through the pipes leading from the reservoir to the town appears to have eliminated a considerable portion both of the free and of the albumenoid ammonia, and has also reduced the oxidisable matter. For a water of this class the free and saline ammonia and the oxidisable matter were within reasonable limits. The albumenoid matter, as represented by the ammonia it yields, is undoubtedly still high, but in the absence of nitrites and nitrates, and in the presence of only an inconsiderable amount of chlorine, it is no doubt largely of vegetable origin. In Parke's *Hygiene* the general limit of this ingredient in 'usable water' is .0070 grain per gallon, with a note added: 'This may be larger in upland surface water, peat waters, &c., when the source is chiefly vegetable.' There is evidently great difference on the part of hygienic authorities in defining a superior limit for water of this class; but most authorities would recommend where, as in the present case, the albumenoid ammonia yielded is so much above the general limit, that steps should be taken to reduce it by filtration. Some of the water was filtered through a small chatty filter with sand in the upper chatty and farriers' charcoal in the lower. In the first experiment the filtering medium communicated a considerable amount of free or saline ammonia to the water, while it slightly reduced the albumenoid and oxidisable matter ..... I have no doubt a greater depth of well-washed charcoal in a finer state of division would have given better results ..... I have no doubt, although I have not made the experiment, that filtration through animal charcoal would reduce the albumenoid matter within safe limits."

Read also reports on samples of water now vended in the town and commonly used, the conclusion being as follows:—

*Labuduwa Water.*—This is a water which I would have some misgivings in reporting as of usable quality. The amount of free ammonia is far too high for water from a well of no great depth, while the amount of albumenoid ammonia just exceeds the recognized limits for water of this class. On the other hand, a decidedly impure water might be expected to show a larger proportion of chlorides and to absorb a larger proportion of oxygen. It is a water which I would regard with some suspicion, and its effects should be watched.

*Talbot Town Water.*—I should certainly regard this as a usable water. The amount of chlorides is certainly very high if not derived from the sea; but the low amount of free and of albumenoid ammonia, the absence of nitrites, with the presence of nitrates, and the low amount of oxygen absorbed, all go to show that any organic impurities originally dissolved by the water have been very thoroughly oxidised during the passage of the water through the soil.

Moved by Mr. N. Dias Abeyesinghe, and seconded by Mr. W. Abeyesundera, "that water be supplied to the Fort from the Bikke reservoir, and that the water-rate be levied from March 1 next."

An amendment to this motion was moved by the Hon. Dr. Anthonisz, and seconded by Dr. Attygalle, "that the water be not issued until it is fit for human consumption."

The amendment was put to the vote, when there were—

The Chairman declared the amendment carried.

Moved by Mr. H. E. H. Hayes, and seconded by Mr. Symes, “that the tank be emptied immediately and cleaned.”

Carried by 6 against 4.

12. Submitted correspondence relating to the purchase of a steam roller for the Municipal roads.

Moved by the Hon. Dr. Anthonisz, seconded by Dr. Attygalle, “that an eight-ton steam roller be procured from the firm of Aveling & Porter, and that the cost of it be paid out of the votes for “Permanent Repair” and “General Upkeep of Roads.”

Mr. C. P. Hayley moved as an amendment, “that application be made to the Director of Public Works for the loan of a steam roller to be used in the Municipal roads on trial.

Seconded by Mr. R. L. Symes.

Hereupon Dr. Anthonisz withdrew his motion, and the amendment was carried.

13. Submitted a letter from the Honorary Secretary of the Volunteer and Public Band dated January 25, 1895, in answer to the inquiry made by resolution of Council of December 17, 1894.

Moved by Mr. C. P. Hayley, “that the payment to the band for December be made.”

Seconded by Mr. R. L. Symes.—Carried.

14. Submitted an application from Bandmaster F. Veniga, dated January 5, 1895, for the allowance hitherto granted to the Volunteer and Public Band.

Moved by Mr. Abeyesundera, “that a sum of Rs. 80 monthly be paid to Mr. Veniga as long as he fulfils the conditions stated in his letter; and that his band be composed of not less than twelve men, excluding himself.”

Seconded by Dr. Anthonisz.—Carried by 6 against 4.

15. Submitted a petition from the widow of a late latrine cooly for an allowance.

Resolved.—That the application be referred to the Standing Committee.

The Meeting now adjourned to Tuesday next, at 3.30 P.M.

### Tuesday, February 19, 1895.

16. The accounts for the months of December, 1894, and January, 1895, were laid on the table.

17. Submitted the following reports :—

- (1) Report from the Sanitary Officer for the Quarters ended June 30 and September 30, 1894.
- (2) Auditor's Report for 1894.
- (3) Report on Works for December, 1894, and January, 1895.

18. The Chairman handed in his reasons for dissent from the resolution of Council of the 16th instant in regard to the supply of water to the Fort :—

The Chairman desires to record his dissent from the resolution passed on the 16th instant, not to utilize the water in the Bikke reservoir, on the following grounds:

(1) The water is reported by the Analyst to be of satisfactory nature in all respects except one, and the utter absence of nitrites, &c., indicates it is free of any contamination from animal matter, and the one impurity is admitted to be due to vegetable matter which has produced an excess of albumenoid ammonia. The two analyses recently made show that the proportion of this has already fallen from .037 grain per gallon to .026 as delivered in the town. There is every reason to believe that during the dry weather now coming on (during which the water in the tank will be undisturbed and quiescent) much of the objectionable vegetable matter now in suspension in the water will fall below the intake of the delivery pipe, which is 10 feet below the spill level.

There is sufficient water now in the tank above this point to meet the wants of the Fort to the extent of 12 gallons a head for the coming two dry months, supposing no further rain falls (as against a consumption of 7½ gallons a head in Colombo). Further, in view of the clearing of the surface of the basin of drainage of vegetation, which it has been decided to undertake at once, it is hoped that the water will be still more diluted and the proportion of the objectionable matter in a given bulk reduced.

(2) No satisfactory reason has been advanced for rejecting the water, solely because it has an excess of albumenoid ammonia.

From the authorities on the subject, I gather the test is quite a modern one, and the accuracy of its result has been impugned.

A recognized authority, Dr. C. Fox (formerly Medical Officer of Health of Essex), in his work on Sanitary Examination of Water, &c., (2nd edition), writes :—

“I totally disagree with Mr. Wanblyer (one of the inventors of the process) in relying solely on the indications of the Neseler test to the exclusion of an estimate of the process of oxidation and other valuable data in which an opinion should be based.”

Again he writes :—

“A very serious mistake has been often made by those who produce the ammonia process of water analysis, which has thrown great discredit on the chemistry of the subject. This *mistake* has been to deliver an opinion on the quality of the water which has been solely a determination of the amount of albumenoid ammonia contained in it” (p. 193 2nd edition).

This is the mistake, I think, we are making; placing too much importance on this one defect, where in every other respect the analysis is most favourable, and there can be no possible objection to the locality from which gathered.

(3) It is admitted that “upland and peaty” waters everywhere exhibit an excess of albumenoid ammonia; and Mr. Cochran says “there is great diffidence on the part of hygienic authorities in defining a superior limit for waters of this class.” Mr. Burnett, the Analyst who examined a specimen of the water in this reservoir in 1893, wrote as follows :—“The water is entirely free from nitrites or nitrates. If the water is an upland surface water and the

source chiefly vegetable, this will account for the large amount of ammonia and oxidisable organic matter. If the presence of the above can be thus accounted for, I consider the water fit for drinking purposes." This water contained '037 grain per gallon of albumenoid ammonia, as against '036 in present water.

Mr. Ewart informed me that this question of the presence of an excess of albumenoid ammonia in tank water was raised in connection with Labugama in its earlier days, when Mr. Burnett went fully into the question and showed the test was not one acquiesced in by leading authorities on water analysis. Writing as to the water in this reservoir, Mr. Ewart reported in March, 1893, as follows:—

"With regard to the analysis .... I am of opinion that the quantity of albumenoid ammonia is not sufficient in itself to condemn the water as unfit for human consumption. The standards referred to by the Analyst are stated by the best authorities to be applicable only to cases in which there may be some suspicion that the organic matter in solution is of animal origin, and possibly due to sewage contamination. The very small quantities of free or saline ammonia, nitrites, and chlorides found in the sample of water from the Bikke reservoir show that the organic matter in solution is of vegetable and not animal origin, and I am satisfied after carefully examining the watershed that there can be no sewage pollution."

(4) But admitting the water as discharged from the pipes and without filtration does not come up to a typical and high standard of purity in one respect only, it is admitted to be fit for culinary purposes, bathing, &c., and one of the medical members is inclined to the opinion it might be drunk with safety if previously boiled and filtered. Nor must it be forgotten that water has been used to a large extent by the poorer inhabitants during the past week during which the pipes have been kept running to clean them out in anticipation of a early regular delivery.

No ill-effect from this use has been yet observed.

(5) The next ground is that the water, though not up to the standard, is infinitely superior to that used by the largest proportion of the inhabitants of the Fort. In the report of the Sub-Committee of this Council dated December 31, 1888, occurs the following passage:—

"Public interest and attention to the matter—the improvement of the water supply of Galle—has been recently revived, and the presence of latent danger accentuated by the illness, and somewhat sudden death, of a Member of your Council, and several of his children, within a few days of one another. Inquiries showed that these unfortunate results might possibly be attributed to the drinking water used in the house having been drawn from a polluted source; and hence the appointment of this Committee to inquire if it would be possible to provide a water scheme for the relief of the Fort at a moderate outlay."

The person referred to was Mr. Abdul Cader, a rich Moor trader, and though he, like others, purchased water for drinking purposes, it was believed at the time he had been unawares drinking water taken from a well in his compound by his servants. It was at the time stated this was by no means uncommon, while many of the poorer classes regularly used Fort water. Further inquiries showed that the water brought in for external use was about a gallon a head (including the bathing water used by the better classes), while of the superior Labuduwa water the consumption was quarter of a gallon. Even this latter water the Analyst has denounced as containing an excess of albumenoid ammonia, and this was attributed by Dr. Anthonisz to dirt washed into the well, the excrement of cattle, and the return into the well of water used in bathing. Yet the use of water contaminated in this manner by organic matter is encouraged in preference to rain water free of contamination of this nature falling short of an empirical standard with reference to western surroundings.

(6) With due deference, therefore, to the Medical authorities who have opposed the issue of this water for use, I am of opinion that the condition of the water is much superior in purity to that which is wilfully used by many of the less opulent and well-informed of the inhabitants of the Fort, and this should influence the decision rather than European ideas of comparative excellence, specially when the defect can be satisfactorily explained and the same objectionable ingredients form a characteristic of the best water procurable for money to an extent which perhaps would condemn its use in European towns.

(7) I may add that when the Director of Public Works recently inspected the reservoir and had the lower scouring sluice opened, he stated the water discharged was much less foul than that which came out of Labugama from the corresponding sluice.

(8) Under the circumstances, while I feared the Medical authorities would feel bound on professional grounds, and in accordance with usage, to condemn the water, just as some doctors fell bound to warn their friends against smoking, drinking Ceylon tea, using bought milk, &c., I feel at liberty to take a wider view of this matter, on the ground that the water is infinitely better than what is already largely used by nearly all the Fort residents for culinary and domestic purposes, and by many of the poorer and less intelligent for drinking; while the best drinking water available is condemned by the Analyst for containing an excess of the very same combination.

In view of the decision there is now no course but to let the 12 millions of gallons of water in the tank run to waste and postpone the supply of water to the town for another fourteen months, possibly longer, as it will require 97 inches of rain to refill the tank, and this is above the average annual fall.

To do otherwise would not only be illogical, but would endanger the purity of the future supply; for though the proportion of the albumenoid ammonia might be largely diluted, it would probably still be in excess of the limit of safety laid down by the Medical authorities.

## Sanitary Officer's Report for the Quarter ended December 31, 1894.

The *General Health* was better than during the previous quarter. The outbreak of fever in Ward No. 3, which played sad havoc during the latter part of the previous quarter, continued with remissions; and dysentery, too, did not altogether disappear. Chickenpox and measles were reported in the different wards.

The improvement of the drains in Chando and Parawa streets has greatly added to the appearance and health of the locality. The next step to be taken for the improvement of the sanitary condition of those narrow, ill-ventilated, and overcrowded streets is to introduce a satisfactory mode of refuse removal. The present cesspit arrangement, which obviously endangers the public health in many ways, should be discontinued, and the water carriage system or the dry-earth system substituted. The experiment of trying the dry-earth system in six houses without back doors was tried in July, 1894, with satisfactory results; but when we wanted to extend to ten houses, the inmates were not willing to allow it, simply because they did not like the idea of having the tubs removed through houses. Those who had back doors were willing to allow it, and it will lessen the nuisance so much if the dry-earth system could be introduced to those houses with back doors even. In houses without back doors the old cesspits should be filled in and the pail system substituted. The pails should be of sufficient capacity to hold the excretal refuse for a week, when it would be necessary to change them. To keep the contents dry the kitchen ashes may be used, and the tubs may be changed once a week without any inconvenience or unpleasantness to the inmates by providing well-fitting lids.

*Municipal Latrines* were kept clean. The improvements in the China Garden latrine have given satisfaction, and this latrine can be kept very clean. The other latrines should be improved the same way to secure better cleanliness.

*Street Sweeping and Scavenging* were satisfactory. The scavenging cart goes as far as the Kachchiwatta bridge only along Matara road. It should go as far as the next junction, as it is a crowded locality, and heaps of house rubbish are always to be seen by the roadside. The bulls for the cart were sent rather late on many occasions, and the sweepings of the markets had to be left unremoved to the annoyance of the public.

*Slaughtering of Cattle*.—The quality of cattle was good.
