## REGULATIONS.

The regulations appearing in *Gazette* No. 7,692 of February 8, 1929, as amended by Notifications in the *Gazettes* of April 26, 1929, November 8, 1929, and September 19, 1930, respectively, are hereby repealed and the following regulations substituted therefor.

## INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS.

The College year commences on October 1. The First Term lasts from October 1 till December 23. The Second Term from January 3 till March 31 and the Third Term from May 1 till July 31. The College is closed for vacations during the months of April, August, and September.

There are two Departments in the College :—

I.—The Medical Department.

II.—The Apothecaries' Department.

Non-Medical Students are admitted to certain courses of the Medical Department.

## 1.—The Medical Department.

This Department provides a five-year course of instruction to prepare Students for the Licence of the College in Medicine and Surgery (L.M.S. Ceylon). This qualification entitles the holder to be registered as a Medical Practitioner in Ceylon, the United Kingdom, and most of the British Colonies.

The following are the rules enacted by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor and the Executive Council, with regard to the admission of Students to the Ceylon Medical College :—

1. No Student, unless he has been registered by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom prior to January 1, 1923, may join the Ceylon Medical College until he has fulfilled the following conditions in order :—

- He shall have passed a Preliminary Examination in General Education specified in rule 2.
- He shall have passed the Pre-Medical Examination as specified in rule 3.
- He shall have produced evidence of having attained the age of 17 years.
- He shall have been registered as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.

2. The Preliminary Examination in General Education shall be the London University Matriculation Examination, or any examination which gives exemption therefrom.

3. The Pre-Medical Examination shall include the subjects of Chemistry, Physics, and Biology, and shall be held twice a year, if necessary, in Colombo, in the months of June and September. This examination shall be conducted by a Board of Examiners consisting of the Professors in Chemistry, Physics, and Botany, and the Lecturer in Zoology at the University College, the Principal, University College, and the Registrar of the Medical College. The standard of the examination shall be, as far as possible, that of the First Professional Examination of the Ceylon Medical College as held hitherto and after July, 1933, no candidate who has failed in the examination on three successive occasions will be allowed to present himself for it again. A course of instruction in the subjects of the Pre-Medical Examination must be taken either at the Ceylon University College or at any other College or school in which the teaching and equipment provided for instruction are of a standard approved by the Ceylon Medical College Council. Details of the scope and duration of the course of study necessary for this examination shall be furnished by the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College on application to him.

4. Registration as a Medical Student shall be effected as heretofore through the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.

5. No special Entrance Examination shall be held by the Ceylon Medical College after October, 1924. Entrance to the Medical College shall depend on the results of the Pre-Medical Examination and the number of vacancies for

students, priority being given in this connection to an applicant according to the order of merit obtained by him in the Pre-Medical Examination.

6. The number of Students to be admitted to the Ceylon Medical College in any year shall not exceed fifty.

7. The course of medical study in the Ceylon Medical College shall extend to a period of not less than five years after registration.

8. From and after October, 1924, the Academic Year shall be divided into three terms, namely, October to December, January to March, and May to July.

9. Students admitted to the Ceylon Medical College in or after October, 1924, shall be charged a fee of five hundred rupees for each Academic Year, or a fee of one hundred and seventy rupees for each term, and this fee shall cover all the necessary lectures, practical classes, and hospital training, but shall not include the special fees in force at present, such as examination fees, registration fees, library, microscope, and dissecting fees. If a Student has to retake a term's course of lectures or practical classes in any one subject, or to take a further term of hospital training, a fee of thirty rupees shall be levied for each such item in lieu of the composite fee of one hundred and seventy rupees referred to above.

10. For Students joining the Medical College in or after October, 1924, the following examinations shall be held :—

- A First Professional Examination in the subjects of Anatomy and Physiology in the study of which two Academic Years must be passed before a Student may present himself for examination.
- A Second Professional Examination in the subjects of Pathology, Public Health, Materia Medica, and Medical Jurisprudence.
- A Third or Final Professional Examination in the subjects of Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery. A Student may present himself for this examination, with the exception of Midwifery, only after the completion of five Academic Years.

## Late Registration Fees.

A late registration fee of Rs. 15 will be charged to all Students who apply for enrolment subsequent to the last date notified for registration of Students and payment of Session fees. Students must register personally unless prevented by illness, in which case all necessary documents, including receipts for fees, with a medical certificate from a qualified Medical Officer, should be sent to the Registrar to reach him before 12 noon on the last day for registration, otherwise, if the documents are late in arriving, the late fee of Rs. 15 will be payable. Under no circumstances whatever will a Student be registered or enrolled after the lapse of ten days from the date notified as the last date for registration and payment of fees.

## II.—RULES FOR STUDENTS.

The following rules apply to all Students :—

1. All fees must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kacheries, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, and that receipt must be handed personally to the Registrar.

2. Students desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College must do so through the medium of the Registrar.

3. The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 11 A.M. to 12 noon to give advice to Students, their parents or guardians.

4. On entering the College for the first time Medical Students must obtain from the Registrar proper forms to be filled up for registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council in London, and must eventually obtain from that Council a sealed certificate of registration.

5. Every Student will receive from the Registrar at the commencement of each Session an enrolment card signed by the Registrar. Students may only attend such courses as are entered on their enrolment cards and in the Students' Register.

6. The enrolment card is to be taken to the Lecturer on each specified subject, and is to be signed by him as evidence that the Student has been entered on his roll.

7. At the end of a course of lectures or other classes of instruction a Student, provided he has attended regularly and has satisfactorily performed the work of the class will receive a Class Certificate. These certificates are to be produced when entering for professional examinations.

8. A Student who fails to attend regularly or to perform satisfactorily his work in the class will be refused a Class Certificate by the Lecturer and will be called upon to take the course over again.

9. Irregular attendance or neglect of work will be reported to the Registrar.

10. No allowance whatever will be made for irregular attendance or unsatisfactory work.

11. Students suffering from infectious or contagious diseases are not allowed to attend the College.

12. It is within the power of any Lecturer to suspend temporarily any Student or Students from his class pending a report to the Registrar.

13. It is within the power of the Registrar to suspend any Student for misbehaviour pending reference of his case to the Council, which may inflict such punishment, including dismissal from the College, as it may consider necessary.

14. Apparatus lost or broken by a Student must be replaced or paid for within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise he will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus the time of payment may be extended. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payment should be made to the Registrar who will give a receipt for it.

15. Medical Students failing to pass their Final Examination at the end of their tenth year or the First Professional Examination at the end of their fourth year or the Second Professional at the end of their sixth year shall cease to be members of the College.

16. Students entering for an examination or a term are particularly warned to see that receipts for fees and all certificates are brought to the Registrar personally at least twenty-four hours before the last day mentioned in the Calendar.

17. If a Student fails to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day and hour prescribed, he shall on no consideration be allowed to enter for the session or examination.

18. The *onus* of producing the certificates of attendance rests with the Student. If a certificate is lost, another may be obtained on payment of Rs. 5.

19. In connection with Medical College Associations, Societies, or functions, Students are not permitted to collect subscriptions from the Medical Staff or others without previous sanction from the Registrar.

20. The Medical College compound and buildings will be closed daily at 4.30 P.M. (Saturdays 2 P.M.). Special sanction must be obtained from the Registrar if the use of College compound, buildings, or rooms is required after closing hours.

#### MICROSCOPE.

Students are strongly advised to purchase a microscope, dissecting instruments, &c., early in their course, but microscopes for class work are supplied on payment of Rs. 5 a Session.

#### III.—ADMITTANCE OF SCIENCE STUDENTS.

Any person of either sex may be admitted to the following class of the Ceylon Medical College upon payment of the fees prescribed and provided that sufficient accommodation is available:—

#### PHYSIOLOGY.

Any person other than a Medical Student desirous of studying Anatomy must make special application to the Registrar.

#### IV.—THE RULES OF THE STUDENTS' LIBRARY.

1. The Students' Library is open from 9 A.M. to 12 noon and from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. daily, except Saturdays, when it is open from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M.

2. The Library remains open during the long and short vacations.

*Note.*—The amendment of rule 15 relating to Final-Year Medical Students is only applicable to Students who join the College from October, 1922.

3. The removal, damage, or making of any book belonging to the Library is strictly forbidden.

4. Students must give a receipt to the Librarian for every book issued for use.

5. On returning the book to the Librarian, the Student must see that the Librarian enters the receipt of the book in the Library book, otherwise he will be responsible for the loss of the book.

6. Silence must be strictly observed in the Library, and smoking is prohibited.

7. Two tables are specially reserved for Lady Students.

#### V.—COURSE OF CLINICAL INSTRUCTIONS HELD IN THE GENERAL HOSPITAL.

##### *Rules for Students.*

1. Students of the third, fourth, and fifth years will attend courses of instruction in Clinical Medicine and Surgery under the Physicians and Surgeons of the General Hospital.

2. Students in the second and third term of their third year and in their fourth year must put in six months Medical Clerking and six months Surgical Dressing in the wards of the General Hospital. During their fourth year they must put in three months Medical Clerking, and three months Surgical Dressing in the Out-patient Department.

In addition they must put in three months Gynaecological Dressing and one month as Midwifery Clerk in the fifth year.

No Student will be allowed to take any two of the courses mentioned in this paragraph concurrently.

3. A Post-mortem Clerkship must be held for one term, during the period served as Medical Clerk in the wards. No student will be allowed to attend post-mortems during his period as Surgical Dresser, Gynaecological Dresser, or Midwifery Clerk.

4. A Student may take out two three-months' clinical courses in either Medicine or Surgery, or, if he prefers, he may take out one six-months' course in either Clinical Medicine and Surgery.

5. Clinical Clerking and Surgical Dressing are taken out at the same time as Clinical Medicine and Surgery and under the same Clinicians.

6. Ward classes in Medicine and Surgery are taken out in the third year for Junior Students and the fourth and fifth year for Senior Students, these classes being conducted in the General Hospital.

7. Clerks and Dressers will be allotted to the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons by the Medical and Surgical Registrars as far as possible at their own choice for periods of three months.

Each Clerk or Dresser will be allotted six beds, and he will be personally responsible for entering all notes of his cases on the bed head ticket, dressing these cases and carrying out such clinical laboratory tests as are ordered by the Visiting Staff.

8. The systematic courses on Clinical Medicine and Surgery will be conducted during the three terms, and Class Certificates of attendance will only be issued during these periods.

A Student may, however, attend the Hospital during the vacation period as a Clinical Clerk or Surgical Dresser.

9. All parts of the Hospital, except the paying section, are available for affording clinical instruction to Students.

10. No Student engaged in dissections or post-mortems will be allowed to enter the Operating Theatre.

11. A Student doing duty as Post-mortem Clerk, or attending the post-mortem demonstrations, will not be allowed during such duty, to do dressing in Surgical wards of the Hospital.

12. All Clerks and Dressers must, when beginning their work, present their attendance cards to the Surgical and Medical Registrars and bring with them the following instruments:—

13. All Clerks and Dressers must be in the wards by 7.45 A.M. and must remain in the wards till 10 A.M. During this time they accompany the Physician or Surgeon to whom they are attached on his morning rounds. On operation mornings they assist in the theatre till 10 A.M. after having finished dressing their cases.



14. Clerks and Dressers must be in the wards in the afternoons, at the hour set apart for ward work in the Time Table, when all cases requiring two dressings a day must be redressed, and new cases examined.

A record of the morning and evening attendances will be kept by the Medical and Surgical Registrars.

No Student may absent himself without asking in writing for permission to do so from the Medical and Surgical Registrars, stating the reasons for his absence.

15. Clerks and Dressers work must not be interrupted by vacations, Government and Bank Holidays including Sundays except where special permission is granted by the Visiting Staff Member.

No Clerk or Dresser will be signed up for three months work, unless the attendance be put in in three consecutive months.

A 90 per cent. attendance is necessary for a three-months' course, but in cases of illness or special leave, the Registrar of the Medical College may permit a 75 per cent. attendance, if he be satisfied of a reasonable cause for absence from work.

16. At the expiration of the Clerkship or the Dressership, the Student must produce his attendance card to be filled in signed by the Medical and Surgical Registrars and countersigned by the Physician or Surgeon for whom he worked, and this card must be given to the office of the College Registrar before a card for a fresh Clinical Post be granted.

17. All irregularities in the work of Clerks or Dressers must be reported by the Medical and Surgical Registrars to the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College.

18. Post-mortem Clerks must attend all teaching post-mortems during one term and must personally perform 6 post-mortems.

The must enter in the Post-mortem Book an account of the post-mortem, as described by the Pathologist.

19. The regulations in force at the Lying-in Home must be followed by all students taking up their cases and doing clerking.

20. Loitering in the corridors and verandahs of the Hospital and smoking in the Hospital, except in the Post-mortem Room, are strictly forbidden.

21. Students obtaining sick leave or special leave must notify the Registrar, and Medical and Surgical Registrars of the General Hospital or the Medical Superintendent of the Lying-in Home as the case may be.

#### Out-patient Department.

22. Clinical instruction in Medicine and Surgery is given in the Out-patient Department of the General Hospital. Students of the fourth and fifth years are enrolled at the beginning of each term for three-months' courses of instruction on either the Medical or Surgical side.

23. Three months is the minimum period for which Students are enrolled for clinical instruction in the Out-patient Department.

24. Attendance at the Out-patient Department during vacation time is permitted.

25. The following Attendance Certificates which shall include Medical and Surgical Clerking are required from Students before they are permitted to enter for the Final examination :—

26. The main duty of the Out-patient Department Dressers is to dress cases in this Department from 7.45 A.M. to 10 A.M. Out-patient Department Clerks attend the Out-patient Department Physicians from 7.45 A.M. to 10 A.M., examining cases and carry out such clinical pathological tests as are required of them.

27. All attendance cards must be returned to the College office immediately on expiration of the course prescribed, after being duly signed by the proper authorities.

28. During the fifth year Students must put in three-months Medical Clerking and three-months Surgical Dressing in the Out-patient Department.

#### VI.—RULES FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS ATTENDING PRACTICAL MIDWIFERY.

1. Medical Students when in their final year will arrange to take out the prescribed twenty cases of labour.

2. The Students must enter their names for practical midwifery at the commencement of a term, *i.e.*, in January, May, or October.

3. Students are recommended to submit their names in pairs so that two may work together in the taking out of their cases.

A 2

4. At the commencement of each term the Registrar of the Medical College shall send to the Medical Superintendent the names of the Students who intend to take up the practical course for that term. (The number must be equally distributed throughout the term and the holidays.)

5. The names of all Students shall be entered in a register kept specially for the purpose in the De Soysa Lying-in Home.

6. The arrangements for night duty shall be made by the Medical Superintendent.

7. While taking out their course, Students will be accommodated during the nights only at the De Soysa Lying-in Home. They will be on duty from 9 P.M. to 8 A.M.

8. All cases admitted during the night and those remaining undelivered by 9 P.M. shall be assigned to the Medical Students.

9. The Students shall keep a note book and enter facts in it connected with each case. This book will be examined by the Medical Superintendent from time to time.

10. A Student undertaking a case of midwifery is responsible for the conduct of that case during his hours of duty.

11. An Attendance Book is to be kept at the entrance of the De Soysa Lying-in Home, in which the hour of arrival and departure, with initials, will be entered by every Student.

12. As long as a patient remains in the De Soysa Lying-in Home the Student who attended her in her confinement is to visit her daily between the hours of 7 A.M. and 8 A.M. and enter the necessary particulars in the bed-head ticket.

13. The Students shall on no account absent themselves without the leave of the Medical Superintendent being previously obtained.

14. Students are to be properly dressed when conducting a case of midwifery; any untidiness or slovenliness in the dress of Students is to be reported to the Medical Superintendent by the House Surgeon.

15. No Student is allowed to be in the De Soysa Lying-in Home, nor on the premises, unless he is there strictly on duty, and Students "on duty" are not allowed to be in the Home during their "off duty" hours.

16. Students attending the Lying-in Home are not excused their Hospital attendance during the period they are on duty at the former Institute.

*Note.*—There is accommodation for four Students at a time on night duty.

It is recommended that, as far as possible, Students should take out their maternity cases during the vacation period, thus obviating the necessity of having to attend lectures after night duty in the Lying-in Home.

#### VII.—EXAMINATIONS FOR THE LICENCE OF THE CEYLON MEDICAL COLLEGE IN MEDICINE, SURGERY, AND MIDWIFERY.

The Medical Professional Examinations of the Ceylon Medical College are held twice yearly, *viz.*, in March and July. The Final Examination is held in December also. The following examinations have to be passed in order to obtain the Licence in Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery :—

- (1) The First Professional.
- (2) The Second Professional.
- (3) The Third or Final Professional.

##### 1.—The First Professional Examination.

Before admission to the First Professional Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates :—

- (1) Of having been registered as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom.
- (2) Of having passed the Pre-Medical Examination.
- (3) Of having studied during two years in the Ceylon Medical College.
- (4) Of having attended the following courses :—

(a) Anatomy :—

- (1) Lectures, two courses during two academic years.
- (2) Practical, two academic years, during which period evidence must be produced that the complete human body has been dissected, and that in all six parts have been satisfactorily dissected.

(b) Physiology :—

(1) Lectures :—

General Physiology, during two First and two Second terms.  
Histology, one course during one Third term.

## (2) Practical :—

One course of Practical Instruction in each of the following :—

- Histology.
- Chemical Physiology.
- Experimental Physiology.

## SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

## (a) Anatomy :—

- (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

Each Candidate will have 10 minutes oral on Osteology and 10 minutes oral on Anatomical Preparations. At the option of the Examiners he may be called upon to perform dissections.

## (b) Physiology :—

- (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
- (2) Practical.

Candidates will be expected—

- (a) To prepare and mount Microscopical Specimens.
- (b) To recognize Microscopical Specimens.
- (c) To analyze a Chemico-Physiological Solution or Solid.
- (d) To show a practical knowledge of the more important quantitative methods of analysis used in Chemical Physiology.
- (e) To show a practical acquaintance with Experimental Physiological Methods.

## (3) Oral Examination.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination must on first entry take both the above subjects, viz., Anatomy and Physiology, on passing which he may attend courses for the Second Professional Examination. In the event of only one subject being passed, he will be exempted from re-examination in it, but will not be permitted to attend courses for the Second Professional until such time as he has passed in Anatomy and Physiology.

## 2.—The Second Professional Examination.

Before admission to the Second Professional Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates :—

- (1) Of having passed the First Professional Examination.
- (2) Of having attended the following courses :—

## (a) Pathology :—

- (1) Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
- (2) Practical Pathological Histology, one course during First and Second terms.
- (3) Bacteriology, Lectures and Practical, one course during Third term.
- (4) Post-mortem Demonstrations, including Clerking, six months.
- (5) The conduction of six post-mortems.

## (b) Medical Jurisprudence :—Lectures and Demonstrations, one course during the Fourth year.

## (c) Public Health :—Lectures and Demonstrations, one course during the Fourth year.

## (d) Materia Medica :—

- (1) Lectures, one course during First and Second terms.
- (2) Lectures, Pharmacology, and Therapeutics, one course during the First and Second terms.
- (3) Lectures, Pharmacy, one course during the First term.
- (4) Practical Pharmacy, one course during the First term.

## SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

## (a) Pathology (including Bacteriology) :—

- (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
- (2) Practical and Oral Examination.

The Candidates may be examined in—

Morbid Anatomy and Bacteriology.—Practical Examination of Museum Fresh and Microscopical Specimens.

## (b) Medical Jurisprudence :—

- (1) One Written Paper of two hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

## (c) Public Health :—One Written Paper of two hours.

## (d) Materia Medica and Therapeutics :—

- (1) One Written Paper of three hours.
- (2) Practical and Oral Examination.

Candidates will be expected—

- (1) To recognize the most important drugs and preparations of the British Pharmacopœia.
- (2) To dispense a prescription.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination on first entry at the end of the Second term of his third year takes one of the above subjects, viz., Materia Medica and Pharmacy. At the end of his third year he takes Pathology and Bacteriology. At the end of the second term of his fourth year he takes Forensic Medicine and Public Health. In the event of his passing in any one subject, he will be exempted from re-examination in it.

## 3.—The Final Examination.

Before admission to the Final Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates :—

- (1) Of having passed the Second Professional Examination.
- (2) Of having been a Registered Medical Student for five years.
- (3) Of having attained the age of 21 years.
- (4) Of having attended the Medical and Surgical Practice of the General Hospital, Colombo, for a period of three years as follows :—

- (a) Out-patient Department, Medical side . . . Three Months
- (b) Out-patient Department, Surgical side . . . Three Months
- (c) Clinical Medicine and Clinical Clerking . . . Six Months
- (d) Clinical Surgery and Surgical Dressing . . . Six Months
- (e) Junior Ward Class Medicine . . . Nine Months
- (f) Junior Ward Class Surgery . . . Nine Months
- (g) Senior Ward Class Medicine . . . Eighteen Months
- (h) Senior Ward Class Surgery . . . Eighteen Months
- (i) Clinical Gynæcology . . . Three Months
- (j) Gynæcological Clerking . . . One Month
- (k) Lying-in Home Midwifery Practice . . . One Month

(5) Of having attended a course of instruction in Vaccination under the Provincial Surgeon of the Western Province.

(6) Of having personally conducted twenty cases of labour in the Lying-in Home.

(7) Of having attended Clinical Instruction at—

- (a) Infectious Diseases Hospital, for three months.
- (b) The Victoria Memorial Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Hospital, for three months in each subject.
- (c) The Lady Havelock Hospital for Children's Diseases.

(8) Of having personally administered an Anæsthetic to at least 12 cases.

(9) Of having attended the following courses of lectures in the Ceylon Medical College :—

- (a) Medicine, one course.
- (b) Surgery, one course.
- (c) Operative Surgery, one course.
- (d) Midwifery, one course.
- (e) Gynæcology, one course.
- (f) Parasitology, one course.
- (g) Mental Diseases, one course.
- (h) X-Ray and Electrical Therapeutics (including Demonstrations), one course.
- (i) Venereal and Skin Diseases, one course.

## SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

(a) Medicine (including Tropical Medicine) : 200 marks including—

- (1) One Written Paper of three hours—60 marks.
- (2) Clinical Examination of cases in the wards of the General Hospital—80 marks.
- (3) Oral Examination—40 marks.
- (4) Clinical notes of 5 cases taken by the candidate during his Clerking in the Medical Wards, countersigned by the Physician under whom he was working—20 marks.

(b) Surgery : 200 marks, including—

(1) One Written Paper (including questions on the diseases of Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat, and Surgical Anatomy) of three hours—60 marks.

(2) Practical :—

- (a) Examination of Surgical Cases in the wards of the General Hospital (may be asked questions on Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat)—60 marks.

- (b) Examination on Bandaging, Instruments, Splints, &c.—20 marks.
- (c) Examination in Operative Surgery—10 marks.
- (d) Oral Examination—40 marks.
- (e) Ophthalmology—10 marks.
- (c) Midwifery and Gynæcology : 200 marks, including—
- (1) One Written Paper of three hours—80 marks.
  - (2) Oral Examination : Midwifery—20 marks, Gynæcology—20 marks.
  - (3) Clinical Examination : Midwifery—40 marks, Gynæcology—40 marks.

N.B.—A Candidate for this examination must on first entry take all three of the above subjects, viz., Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery. Passes are allowed in one of these subjects or more, in each of which at least 50 per cent. of the total marks must be obtained.

Students may, if they so desire, sit for the final in Midwifery as a separate single subject before the end of the fifth year, provided that they have taken the necessary courses. The courses required are—The entire course of Midwifery lectures, Gynæcology lectures, Medicine lectures, Surgery lectures, Junior Ward Classes, Medicine and Surgery, Clinical Gynæcology, Gynæcology Clerking, Lying-in Home Practical, and Practical Midwifery (20 cases) and three months' course in each of the following, viz. :—O. P. D. Medical, O. P. D. Surgical, Clinical Clerking, Surgical Dressing.

Candidates availing themselves of this privilege are not eligible for First or Second Class Honours at the Final, for which all subjects must be passed together.

### VIII.—RULES AND REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO EXAMINATIONS.

#### A.—Examination Rules : Medical.

The following Examination Rules apply to all examinations held in the College :—

1. Students not sitting for the examinations are warned that they are not allowed access to the College and College grounds during the examinations.

2. Candidates for the Medical Professional Examinations must present themselves for all the subjects of an examination for which they are liable at their first entry, and subsequently in such subject or subjects in which they have failed to qualify in the previous examination.

Final students may, if they so desire, sit for Midwifery as a separate subject before the end of the fifth year, provided that the necessary courses have been taken.

Students admitted to the College on and after October 1, 1924, and presenting themselves for the First Professional Examination must take both subjects, viz., Anatomy and Physiology together, until they have passed in one or both subjects; but Candidates will not be allowed to pass in one subject only, unless they obtain at the same time at least half the number of marks required to pass in the paper of the other.

3. On no consideration whatever must the Candidate write his name on the answer books. A Candidate so doing is liable to be disqualified at the discretion of the Examiners.

4. Any Candidate more than fifteen minutes late shall not be allowed to enter the Examination Room.

5. No Candidate shall be allowed to leave the Examination Room before the expiration of half an hour.

6. A Candidate copying from the papers of other Candidates, or obtaining assistance from other Candidates or from persons outside the Examination Room, or introducing books, manuscripts, or papers of any kind into the Examination Room, will be at once dismissed from the examination. His case shall be brought before the next Meeting of the Council, and if his offence is considered grave, he shall not be admitted to any future examination of the College.

7. At the discretion of the Examiners in any subject, on consultation with the Registrar of the College, a Candidate may be informed that he has not obtained sufficient marks in the written examination to enable him to proceed with the Oral and Practical Examinations.

8. Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their note books containing the record of the work done by them in the Laboratory Classes which they have attended.

9. Examination fees will not be refunded for any cause whatever, and Candidates failing to present themselves at any examination will be required to pay the usual examination fee before again being admitted to an examination. In the case of a Candidate reporting ill before the examination begins, and supporting his statement with an approved medical certificate, the fee for the next ensuing examination will not be charged.

Note.—Rule 8 above applies only to Physiology and Pathology.

### IX.—GOVERNMENT BURSARIES.

1. A limited number of Bursaries for poor and deserving Students of either sex have been instituted by Government to cover the cost of the Pre-Medical and Medical Courses. One Bursary is reserved specially for a woman Student.

The award of these Bursaries will be made by the Medical College Council, subject to approval by Government, at the close of the Pre-Medical course, and no Candidate will be eligible unless he (or she) has passed the Pre-Medical examination. In the case of men Students this examination must have been passed at the end of the first year; in the case of women Students, by the end of the second year. Successful Candidates for these Bursaries will have the fees for the Pre-Medical course refunded for one year.

#### Rules.

(1) Candidates may be of any race, but must either have been born in Ceylon, or of at least one Ceylonese parent.

(2) Candidates must be not less than 17 and not more than 21 years of age at the time of entering University College, must be physically fit for a medical career, of good character, and of the necessary standard of general education required for entrance to University College, i.e., London Matriculation or examination giving exemption therefrom.

(3) Certificates proving the particulars required by rule 2 must be furnished in submitting an application for a Bursary.

(4) Preference will be given to such Candidates as appear to the Council by their superior attainments and promise of usefulness to be more deserving of the advantage of these Bursaries.

(5) No Candidate will be eligible unless his or her parents or guardians produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Council that they are unable to pay Medical College fees for such Candidates, and they may be required to do so subsequently from time to time.

(6) In the event of failure to pass examinations at the correct term, any Bursary may be withdrawn by the Council.

(7) The holder of a Bursary cannot at the same time hold the Entrance or First Professional Scholarship, but the Bursary will lapse during the period covered by the Scholarship.

(8) Canvassing of Members of the Ceylon Medical College Council by Candidates or on their behalf will disqualify any Candidate.

#### 2.—ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship is awarded annually to the candidate who stands first in the March Pre-Medical Examination, provided a sufficient standard has been attained.

#### Rules.

1. The winner of the Scholarship will be entitled to free education in the Ceylon Medical College for two years, and he will not be required to pay lecture, registration, library, microscope, anatomical, or examination fees during this period.

2. This Scholarship ceases at the end of the second year, and the Scholar is no longer exempt from payment of such College fees as may be subsequently due.

3. In the event of the conduct or progress of the Scholar being unsatisfactory, this Scholarship may be cancelled.

4. In the event of the Scholar failing to pass the First Professional Examination at the end of his second year, he will be required to pay for such courses of instruction as he is ordered by the Examiners to retake, and subsequently to pay the ordinary fees due on account of the third, fourth, and fifth year courses of study.

#### 3.—THE CEYLON MEDICAL COLLEGE JUBILEE SCHOLARSHIP (FOUNDED 1921).

This Scholarship was founded by the Government of Ceylon in commemoration of the Half-Centenary of the foundation of the Ceylon Medical College.

#### Rules.

1. This Scholarship shall be called "The Ceylon Medical College Jubilee Scholarship." It is founded by the Government of Ceylon to commemorate the Half-Centenary of the foundation of the Ceylon Medical College.

2. Candidates for this Scholarship must be the sons or daughters of Licentiates or Qualified Apothecaries of the Ceylon Medical College.

3. Candidates who apply for this Scholarship must be over 17 and under 22 years of age. They must be physically fit, and must hold the requisite preliminary qualifications for registration as a Medical Student of the Ceylon Medical College.

4. The Scholarship shall be awarded on the recommendation of the Council of the Ceylon Medical College.

5. In making its recommendation, the Council shall take into consideration the moral character, attainments, and social status of Candidates and further preference shall be given to the Candidate who, in the opinion of the Council, is considered to be the most deserving of the help and advantages of the Scholarship. In the event of there being two or more Candidates of like attainments and qualifications, the award shall be made by a competitive examination, the Candidate obtaining the highest marks being entitled to the award.

6. The elected Scholar shall be exempted from the payment of all fees (except fees for conferring Licence and Registration Fee under Ordinance No. 2 of 1905) for a period of five years, provided always that his conduct and progress are satisfactory.

7. In the event of a Scholar's conduct and progress being at any time unsatisfactory, the Scholarship shall be cancelled. It shall, however, in the case of illness, duly certified, or other unavoidable cause, be competent for the Council to recommend that the period of holding the Scholarship be extended, provided that the whole period does not or will not exceed six years.

#### 4.—FIRST PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATION SCHOLARSHIP.

##### Rules.

1. This Scholarship is awarded to the Student who stands first in the First Class in the First Professional Examination, provided he obtains a sufficient number of marks.

2. The winner of this Scholarship will be entitled to free education during his third, fourth, and fifth years, provided his progress and conduct are satisfactory, and will not be called upon to pay lecture, microscope, or examination fees during this period.

3. All holders of Scholarships must pay the fee for conferring the licence.

#### 5.—POST-LICENTIATE SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship is granted yearly to the best student of the year provided he qualifies in the first class and within the statutory period, on the following terms:—

(a) Appointment to a House Officership in the General Hospital at the first opportunity, with subsequent appointment to special hospitals in Colombo and to, say, Kandy or Galle.

(b) Leave and free passage to proceed to England at the end of three years, instead of four, if he so desires, and if he obtains a good report.

(c) An outfit allowance of £50.

(d) On obtaining such higher British qualifications as are amongst those laid down and approved by the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services, he be granted a Scholarship for one year to enable him to engage in the study of some special subject, the choice of which rests with him. The value of the Scholarship should be at the rate of £300 per annum for the period of his special study.

*Note.*—The three years' "apprenticeship" proposed in (b) is suggested so as to ascertain the Student's capabilities. Those who are unfavourably reported on will not be sent to England; but in certain cases they may be allowed another year within which to secure a satisfactory report. After the initial period of three years' service an officer will be entitled to 4½ months' vacation leave (or any unexpired portion of such leave) and six months' half-pay leave. He may also be granted a further period of six months' half-pay leave under the regulations.

### X.—APOTHECARIES DEPARTMENT.

#### Information for Students.

This Department provides a two years' course to qualify Students for the post of Government Apothecary or Estate Dispenser. There are no fees to be paid for tuition, but at the conclusion of the course, Students who pass the Final Examination may be appointed to the Department of Medical and Sanitary Services, or as Estate Dispensers.

Information as regards conditions of service and salaries as Apothecaries can be obtained on application to the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services.

The Government appointments are pensionable.

Intending Students must at the end of September present to the Registrar—

(a) A certificate of being over 16 and under 25 years of age.

(b) A certificate of good character.

(c) A certificate of having passed one of the recognized Preliminary Examinations specified below in Arithmetic, English, and one of the following languages:—Latin, Sinhalese, Tamil.

The following are the approved Entrance Examinations:—

(1) The Apothecaries' Entrance Examination of the Ceylon Medical College. The Entrance Examination is only held if sufficient Candidates do not present the qualifications stated under (2), (3), and (4). Students are only admitted to the number required to meet the needs of the Department of Medical and Sanitary Services.

(2) The Elementary School-Leaving Certificate of the Ceylon Education Department.

(3) The Junior or Senior Oxford or Cambridge Local or Cambridge School Certificate Examination.

(4) Any Entrance or Matriculation Examination of the Indian Universities.

In every case a pass must be obtained in all the subjects required by the Regulations of the Ceylon Medical College Council, viz., Arithmetic, English, and one of the languages:—Latin, Sinhalese, Tamil.

The Regulations of the Apothecaries' Entrance Examinations are as follows:—

This examination is held if required once a year in July. Before admission to the Entrance Examination a Candidate must present to the Registrar, not later than June 22, the following certificates:—

- (1) Certificate of being over 16 and under 25 years of age.
- (2) Certificate of being of good character.

At the same time he must bring a receipt for Rs. 10,\* which must be paid into the General Treasury or a Kachcheri. The Candidate will then receive an admission form bearing his number, which will admit him to the examination.

#### Subjects of the Examination.

(1) English Language:—

- (a) English Grammar.
- (b) Writing from Dictation.
- (c) Writing of an Essay.

(2) Arithmetic:—

Numbers, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, Division, Least Common Multiple, Greatest Common Measure, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, Weights and Measures, Money Tables, Practice, Simple Proportion, Percentages.

(3) One of the following languages:—

Tamil, Sinhalese, or Elementary Latin.

#### Rules for Students.

The following rules apply to all Students of both sexes:—

1. All fees must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kachcheries, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, and that receipt must be handed personally to the Registrar.

2. Students desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College must do so through the medium of the Registrar.

3. The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 11 A.M. to 12 noon to give advice to Students, their parents or guardians.

4. Each Student will receive from the Registrar, at the commencement of each Session, a card on which his signature is placed against the courses of instruction which he is to attend during that Session.

5. This card is to be taken to the Lecturer in each subject, and by him signed as evidence that the Student has been entered in his roll.

6. At the end of his course of lectures or other classes of instruction a Student, provided he has attended regularly and has satisfactorily performed the work of the class, will receive a Class Certificate. These Certificates are to be produced when entering for Professional Examinations.

7. Irregular attendance or neglect of work will be reported to the Registrar.

8. A Student who fails to attend regularly or to satisfactorily perform the work of the class will be refused a Class Certificate by the Lecturer, and will be called upon to take the course over again.

9. No allowance whatever will be made for irregular attendance or unsatisfactory work.

10. Students suffering from infectious or contagious disease are not allowed to attend the College.

11. It is within the power of any Lecturer to temporarily suspend any Student or Students from his class pending a report to the Registrar.

\* The fee must be paid into the General Treasury, Colombo, or at outstations into the Kachcheri, on account of the Ceylon Government, and a receipt obtained, which must be produced when entering for the examination. This fee is returned if and when a Student passes the first Apothecaries' Examination. No other examination fee is charged.

12. It is within the power of the Registrar to suspend any Student for misbehaviour pending reference of his case to the Council, which may inflict such punishment, including dismissal from the College, as it may consider necessary.

13. Apparatus lost or broken by a Student must be replaced or paid for within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise he will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus, the time of payment may be extended. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payments should be made to the Lecturer, who will give a receipt for it.

14. Students who are considered by the Council to be unsuitable for further tuition in the College, or who fail to pass the Second Apothecaries' Examination at the end of three years, will be dismissed from the College.

15. If a Student fails to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day at 4 P.M. precisely, he shall not be allowed to enter for an examination or Session. If the absence is due to unavoidable circumstances, he may be allowed to enter for the Session on payment of a late registration fee of Rs. 3 before the 10th day from the last date fixed for such registration.

16. The onus of producing certificates of attendance at lectures rests with the Student. If a certificate is lost, another may be obtained on payment of Rs. 3.

17. Students must provide themselves with separate note books for the different courses of instruction they have to attend. These note books will be inspected by the Lecturer and Tutor from time to time.

18. In connection with Medical College Associations, Societies, or functions, Students are not permitted to collect subscriptions from the Medical Staff or others without previous sanction from the Registrar.

19. Final year Apothecary Students, who have been requested to discontinue attending the College for failure to pass the Second Apothecaries' Examination at the end of three years, shall be permitted to sit for the subsequent Apothecaries' Final Examination on payment of a fee of Rs. 15.

#### THE RULES OF THE STUDENTS' LIBRARY.

1. The Students' Library is open from 9 A.M. to 12 noon and from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. daily, except Saturdays, when it is open from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M.

2. The Library will be open during the long and short vacations.

3. Any noise, disturbance, breakage, or the removal of any book or piece of furniture from the Library is strictly forbidden.

4. Students must give a receipt to the Librarian for every book which they wish to read, and must on no consideration whatever remove any book from the Library.

5. On returning the book borrowed to the Librarian, the Student must see that the Librarian enters the receipt of the book in the Library book; otherwise he will be responsible for the loss of the borrowed book.

6. Silence must be strictly observed in the Library, and smoking is prohibited.

7. Two tables are specially reserved for Lady Students.

#### Professional Examinations.

##### I.—THE FIRST APOTHECARIES' EXAMINATION.

The First Apothecaries' Examination is held twice a year, in March and July. Before admission to the First Apothecaries' Examination Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

- (1) Of having passed one of the recognized qualifying preliminary examinations in General Education.
- (2) Of having studied for one year in the Ceylon Medical College.
- (3) Of having attended subsequent to passing the above examination the following courses of instruction at the Ceylon Medical College:—

- (a) *Elementary Chemistry*.—Lectures: One course during the three terms. Practical and Tutorial classes during the three terms.
- (b) *Pharmacy*.—Lectures: One course during the three terms. Practical class during the three terms.
- (c) *Elementary Anatomy and Physiology*.—Lectures: One course during the three terms.
- (d) *Dispensing*.—Practical work in the Hospital Dispensaries during the three terms.
- (e) *Vaccination*.—Practical work at the Vaccine Station under the Provincial Surgeon, Western Province, during the three terms. Thirty attendances.

He shall then apply to the Registrar, from whom he will receive an admission form with a number if his certificates are in order.

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

##### 1.—Chemistry.

- (1) Written Paper: Simple questions on the elementary principles of chemistry, the physical and chemical properties of air and water, and the following: oxygen and oxides, hydrogen, nitrogen, oxides and acid of nitrogen, ammonia, carbon, oxides of carbon, carbonates, chlorines hydrochloric acid, bleaching powder, potassium chlorate, sulphur, oxides and acids of sulphur, sulphuretted hydrogen, phosphorus and phosphoric acid, boric acid and borax, and silica. The oxides and most commonly occurring salts of sodium, potassium, calcium, magnesium, iron, copper, lead, and mercury.
- (2) Practical Examination: Simple exercises involving the preparation or identification of a substance in the above list, and easy quantitative exercises (such as the determination of the percentage of water of crystallization in a salt, or the quantitative neutralization of acids and alkalis).

##### 2.—Pharmacy.

- (1) Written Paper, 2 hours.
- (2) Practical Simple Dispensing.

##### 3.—Elementary Anatomy and Physiology.

- (1) Written Paper, 2 hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

#### 2.—THE SECOND APOTHECARIES' EXAMINATION.

The Second Apothecaries' Examination will be held twice a year, in March and July. Before admission Candidates must present to the Registrar the following certificates:—

- (1) Of having attained 19 years of age.
- (2) Of having passed the First Apothecaries' Examination.
- (3) Of having studied for two years in the Ceylon Medical College subsequent to passing the examination in General Education.
- (4) Of having attended since passing the First Apothecaries' Examination the following courses conducted by the Ceylon Medical College:—

- (a) *Materia Medica*.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
- (b) *Pharmacy*.—Practical: One course of three terms.
- (c) *Elementary Medicine*.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
- (d) *Elementary Surgery*.—Lectures: One course of three terms.
- (e) *Elementary Midwifery*.—Lectures and Practical Instruction: One course during the Monsoon Term.
- (f) *Hygiene and Public Health*.—Lectures: One course during the Autumn and Winter Terms.
- (g) *Hospital Practice*:—

- (1) Elementary Clinical Medicine: One course during the three terms.
- (2) Elementary Clinical Surgery: One course during the three terms.
- (3) Out-patient Department:—

#### SUBJECTS OF THE EXAMINATION.

##### 1.—Materia Medica.

- (1) Written Paper, 2 hours.
- (2) Oral Examination and Practical Pharmacy.

Candidates will be expected to show a practical acquaintance with the drugs and preparations of the British Pharmacopœia.

##### 2.—Elementary Medicine and Hygiene.

- (1) Written Paper, 3 hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

##### 3.—Elementary Surgery and Midwifery.

- (1) Written Paper, 3 hours.
- (2) Oral Examination.

Candidates will be required to show a knowledge of (a) dressing and treatment of wounds and ulcers; (b) the preparation of patients, rooms, and instruments for operation; (c) the names of instruments; (d) the conduct of a case of normal labour.

## 4.—Hospital Forms and Management.

Candidates will be expected to be acquainted with the Forms of the Department of Medical and Sanitary Services.

After passing the Second 'Apothecaries' Examination Candidates are eligible for appointments as Government Apothecaries or Estate Dispensers if there are vacancies.

## 9.—Rules and Regulations with regard to Examinations.

## Examination Rules.

The following Examination Rules apply to all examinations held in the College :—

1. Students not sitting for the examinations are warned that they are not allowed access to the College and College grounds during the examinations.

2. Candidates for the Apothecary Entrance and First and Second Apothecary Examinations must present themselves for all the subjects of an examination at one and the same time. Any Candidate who obtains 50 per cent. in any subject need not be examined again in such subject, but may complete the examination in the remaining subjects on a subsequent occasion.

3. On no consideration whatever must the Candidate write his name on the answer books. A Candidate so doing is liable to be disqualified at the discretion of the Examiners.

4. Any Candidate more than fifteen minutes late shall not be allowed to enter the Examination Room.

5. No Candidate shall be allowed to leave the Examination Room before the expiration of half an hour.

6. A Candidate copying from the papers of other Candidates, or obtaining assistance from other Candidates or from persons outside the Examination Room, or introducing books, manuscripts, or papers of any kind into the Examination Room, will be at once dismissed from the examination. His case shall be brought before the next meeting of the Council, and if his offence is considered grave, he shall not be admitted to any future examination of the College.

7. At the discretion of the Examiners in any subject on consultation with the Registrar of the College, a Candidate may be informed that he has not obtained sufficient marks in the written examination to enable him to proceed with the practical.

8. Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their note books containing the record of the work done by them in their Laboratory Classes which they have attended.

## RULES.

The rules under section 5 published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,514 of February 26, 1926, as amended by Notification in *Gazette* No. 7,903 of January 29, 1932, are hereby further amended as follows :—

(1) by the addition of the following new rule immediately after rule 27, under the heading "Passengers" :—

27A. *Sleeping Cars: Charges.*—In the Colombo-Kankasanturai Up and Down night mail trains sleeping accommodation will be provided for 12 second class passengers on payment of a charge of Rs. 2.50 per berth in addition to the second class fare to the station to which the passenger is booked.

*Ladies' Compartment.*—One compartment of 4 berths is reserved for ladies, and only ladies shall travel in it, except when the whole of that compartment has been reserved for a family on payment of reservation charges.

*Reserved Compartments.*—The charges for reserving a compartment are 4 second class fares and 4 sleeping berth fares.

Servants are not allowed to travel in these sleeping compartments except when a whole compartment has been reserved as stated above.

Applications for berths, conveyance of luggage in compartment, &c., are subject to the general conditions contained in Coaching Rule 27.

(2) by the deletion of the words "Soldiers' and Sailors' Home" in item 13 of rule 32, clause (12) and the substitution of the words "British Soldiers' and Sailors' Institute" therefor;

(3) by the deletion of rule 14 under the heading "Conveyance of Goods Traffic," and the substitution of the following therefor :—

14. *Hours of Business.*—Goods offices are open for the receipt and delivery of goods at all goods stations from 7 A.M. to 5.30 P.M. daily, after which latter hour goods can neither be received nor delivered. On Sundays, Christmas Day, and Good Friday goods sheds and offices are entirely closed, but arrangements are made for the delivery of perishable goods and livestock.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

#### Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 17, 1932.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 172 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 106 Sinhalese, 38 Tamils, 10 Moors, 5 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1932, viz., 289,961) was 31.0, as against 32.8 in the preceding week, 32.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 114 (4 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 15 Moors, 7 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 20.6, as against 24.2 in the previous week, 28.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 114 total deaths, 20 were of infants under one year of age, as against 23 in the preceding week, 35 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 11.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in San Sebastian and Maradana South, as against 17 in the previous week, and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Twelve deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 each in St. Paul's and Slave Island, 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Maradana South, as against 8 in the previous week, and 10 the weekly average for the last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Kotahena North and Maradana hospitals, as against 4 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 8 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena North and New Bazaar, and 1 each in Kotahena South, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 11 in the previous week, and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths from *Phthisis*, of residents of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Three deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), as against 1 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. Five deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 3 from *Worms*, 2 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Dysentery*, and *Tetanus*, 1 each from *Infantile Convulsions*, *Debility*, *Homicide*, and *Suicide*, and 53 from *Other Causes*.

5. **Reported Cases.**—Thirty-one cases of *Chickenpox*, 7 of *measles*, 4 each of *Enteric Fever* and *Mumps*, 2 each of *Whooping Cough* and *Plague*, and 1 of *Diphtheria* were reported during the week, as against 11, 10, 4, nil, 1, 1, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 81.3°, against 81.8° in the preceding week and 80.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.895 in., against 29.898 in. in the preceding week and 29.861 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.99 in., against 0.16 in. in the preceding week and 0.42 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

**KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.****The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on August 27, 1932, at 8 a.m., in accordance with the Notice dated August 22, 1932.**

*Present* : Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman ; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva ; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail ; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake ; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa ; Mr. Walter Beven ; Mr. H. P. G. Young ; Dr. L. C. Wijesinghe.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on July 16, 1932, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

1A. Before the proceedings commenced, the Chairman moved :—“ That the Council do place on record their sense of deep regret at the death of Mr. H. L. Grocock, Deputy Director of Public Works, who rendered very valuable advice to the Council in connection with the improvement of its water supply during the short period of his association with the Council as a member from May to October, 1926, and instruct the Secretary to convey this vote of condolence to the members of Mr. Grocock's family.”

The vote of condolence was passed in the usual manner, all members standing.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1931 to July 31, 1932, on account of Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for June, 1932.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of July, 1932.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended August 27, 1932.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of “ The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910,” be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during July, 1932.

4. Petitions :—Mr. Geo. E. de Silva presented a petition from Mr. Segu Abdul Cader Mohideen, the occupier of the Rice Depôt at Mahaiyawa, praying for a reduction in the rent of the Depôt.

Mr. S. W. Wijayatilleke presented a petition from Mr. Abraham Perera, the occupier of Temporary Boutique No. 10, Market Grounds, asking that he be allowed to continue the occupation of the boutique, or in the alternative, that he be given twelve months' time in which to vacate it, so as to enable him to collect all outstanding debts to him.

The Chairman undertook to look into the matters referred to in the petitions.

5. Correspondence :—Letter No. PN 6868 of August 17, 1932, from the Controller of Establishments to the Government Agent, Western Province, re pension payable to Mr. S. C. Kanakasundera, Shroff Mudaliyar, Colombo Kachcheri, for the information of the Chairman, Municipal Council, Kandy.—Read.

Resolved to authorize the payment of a sum of Rs. 36·63 per annum to Government as the Council's contribution towards Mr. Kanakasundera's pension.

5A. Pursuance to notice Mr. de Silva moved :—“ That the Council do define the actual rights of the Kandy Sports Club to the use of the Bogambara Green and the use of the surrounding grounds by the general public.” A discussion followed in which Messrs. Beven, Ismail, Wijayatilake, and the Chairman took part.

Mr. de Silva withdrew the motion on the Chairman undertaking to look into the matter on receiving particulars from Mr. de Silva.

6. Report of the Auditor-General on the accounts of the Kandy Municipal Council for the year 1931 with the Accountant's observations thereon.—Tabled.

7. Reports submitted by the Municipal Engineer in accordance with resolutions passed at the meeting of Council held on June 25, 1932, on—

(a) 2-zone system.

(b) Lake Augmentation Scheme.

(c) Rough estimate of scheme to supply 500,000 gallons per diem from the river.

In tabling the reports the Chairman made a short statement explaining the benefits which the Council would derive by adopting the two-zone system and the Lake Augmentation Scheme.

The Council went into Committee to consider the reports and a discussion ensued.

It was resolved unanimously to adopt the 2-zone system and to vote the sum of Rs. 13,350 required for putting it into execution.

The Chairman moved :—“ That the Municipal Engineer's report on the Lake Augmentation Scheme be submitted to the Director of Public Works for his comments, in the first instance.” Mr. H. P. G. Young seconded.

Mr. de Silva opposed the motion.

Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake moved as an amendment :—“ That both reports on the Lake Augmentation Scheme, and the Pumping Scheme from the river be submitted to the Director of Public Works for his comments.” Mr. W. A. B. Soysa seconded.

The Chairman withdrew his motion with the consent of the seconder, in favour of the amendment.

The amendment was carried, only Mr. de Silva voting against it.

8. To approve the proposed rent of Rs. 6 per annum and a period of 25 years with option of renewal for a further 25 years for the lease of site in Torrington road to the Queen's Hotel for the purpose of constructing a septic tank.

Resolved that the proposed rent and the period of lease be approved.

9. Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on July 16, 1932.*

(1) Papers re the unauthorized conversion into tea kiosks of Market Stalls, Nos. 13, 14, and 32, originally licensed for the sale of sundry goods by their licensees, and their non-compliance with the notice served on them to revert to their original trades.

Recommended to prosecute and to examine the question of raising rent.

(2) Letter dated June 20, 1932, from Sina Muna Mohammado, the licensee of Space No. 21, Public Market, stating that he has transferred his stock in trade to W. A. Meerasa, and asking that the licence for this Space be issued in favour of the latter.—Recommended.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on July 16, 1932.*

(3) Papers re the proposal made by the Medical Officer of Health to employ Mr. J. L. Rodrigo, Slaughter-house Clerk, to assist in the clerical work in his office in the afternoons, and to place him in grade III. of the Council's Clerical Service in consideration thereof.—Recommended to employ Mr. Rodrigo from 12 noon to 4 p.m. daily and to pay him Rs. 4 extra remuneration per month. If the arrangement works satisfactorily, the proposal to place the Officer in grade III. to be considered later.

(4) Papers re the proposal to appoint Mr. E. B. Peiris as Secretary and Accountant on the retirement of the present Secretary.—Recommended that Mr. Peiris be appointed Secretary and Accountant on a salary of Rs. 7,500 rising to Rs. 9,000 by annual increments of Rs. 300. Also that an additional clerk in grade III. be appointed to assist on the Accounting side. Mr. Peiris to cease to hold the appointment of Secretary, Education District Committee.

(5) Application from Miss. L. A. Chapman for electric lights to the new block of the Evelyn Nurseries, and her request that the cost of material connected with the installation be charged for at cost price.—Recommended that the application be allowed on a reduced charge of Rs. 200 for the installation.

(6) To obtain a supplementary vote for Rs. 110 under Head 23—Capital Expenditure—to meet the cost of converting record-room in Town Improvement Office into a dark room for blue print work.—Recommended.

(7) Application from Mr. R. D. Buultjens, Clerk, Works Department, asking that his service as clerk under the Board of Improvement Commissioners, which is continuous with his service in the Council, be counted for pension purposes.—Not recommended.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on August 13, 1932.*

(8) Papers re suggestion to discontinue the inspections of the Kandy Fire Brigade by the Superintendent of the Colombo Fire Brigade, owing to the excessive fee charged for this service by the Colombo Municipal Council.—Recommended that the half-yearly inspections be temporarily carried out by the Chairman, the Superintendent of Police, Central Province, and the Provincial Engineer, Central Province (North).

(9) To consider the question of leasing to Mr. E. H. Wijenaike a strip of the Municipal land opposite premises No. 9, Holluwa road.—Recommended to lease the strip at a rent of Rs. 5 per annum.

(10) Estimate for Rs. 249·39 from the Municipal Engineer for erecting a railing at a dangerous point of the road near the turn off to the Nittawela Trenching Ground.—Not recommended.

(11) Estimate from the Municipal Engineer for Rs. 198 for erecting a latrine in reservoir road.—Recommended.

(12) Estimate for Rs. 217·55 from the Municipal Engineer for effecting certain alterations to the Katugastota Market.—Recommended.

(13) Application from Mr. P. M. Mohammado for a metered service to supply water to the five dwellings he has erected at premises No. 116, Colombo street.—Recommended.

(14) Estimate for Rs. 408 from the Municipal Engineer for effecting necessary repairs to the corner of Hantane Hospital road.—Recommended.

(15) To sanction the appropriation of a sum of Rs. 71·25 from the unexpended balance of Rs. 378·38 in the vote allowed for building roadside drains in Katugastota road, to meet the cost of five barrels of cement supplied to Contractor Brumpy for repairing the defective bottoming of roadside drains in this road.—Recommended.



*Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on August 13, 1932.*

(16) Proposed new form for the Municipal Electrical Engineer's monthly reports.—Recommended that the new form be adopted.

(17) To authorize the writing off of a sum of Rs. 690 representing the book values of certain unserviceable articles in the electrical stores, destruction of which is recommended by the Municipal Electrical Engineer.—Recommended.

(18) Papers *re* proposals suggested by the Municipal Electrical Engineer for improving the public lighting along Market street and Ward street.—Recommended that the proposals be adopted.

(19) Letter of July 12, 1932, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer asking for permission to allow Business Firms and hotels to advertise on Pillar Boxes on the same terms as those allowed to the Empire Theatre, in view of the failure of the Empire Theatre to avail itself of the offer.—Recommended that individual applications to advertise on Pillar Boxes be considered on their merits by the Electricity Committee.

(20) Estimate for Rs. 110 from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for erecting a new lamp standard at the Railway Crossing opposite the Kandy General Post Office.—Recommended.

(21) To sanction the expenditure of a sum of Rs. 113 for erecting two Karri timber poles to support the overhead electrical cable in Gregory road.—Recommended.

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted with the exception of the 2nd clause in item (4) relating to the appointment of a Clerk in grade III. to assist Mr. Peiris on the Accounting side. It was agreed to defer consideration of this proposal for the Budget meeting.

The Chairman suggested that the present quarters of the Secretary were required for conversion into Municipal Offices and that Mr. Peiris continue to draw the usual house allowance of 10 per cent. on his salary in lieu of free quarters. This was agreed to.

Mr. Geo. E. de Silva moved :—“That this Council do place on record its sense of appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Council by Mr. J. R. Jayatileke, the retiring Secretary, during a period of 27 years.” Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake seconded.

The Chairman associated himself very warmly with the vote of appreciation and it was carried unanimously.

## GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

## Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, August 20, 1932, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated August 15, 1932.

*Present* :—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman ; Mr. J. E. Perera ; Mr. D. I. Durham ; Mr. C. L. Wickremasinghe ; Mr. T. Amarasuriya ; Dr. S. P. Joseph ; Mr. A. J. R. Scharenguivel ; and Mr. A. M. Saheed.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting held on Saturday, July 9, 1932, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read, and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. Amarasuriya asked the following questions :—

(1) With reference to the case of plague which occurred recently within the Municipality—(a) How many hours after death of the patient was the post-mortem held ? (b) How many hours after the post-mortem was the specimen from the dead body sent to the Bacteriological Institute for examination and report ? (c) In what condition was the specimen reported to have been received and was a definite opinion given by the Bacteriologist ? (d) Did the Medical Officer of Health, Municipality, make a Bacteriological Examination in this case ?

(2) Has the attention of the Chairman been drawn to a letter which appeared in the "Ceylon Independent" of July 20, regarding the resignation of a newly appointed Municipal Inspector—and to inquire if a qualified Sanitary Inspector will be appointed to fill the vacant post ?

The Chairman replied as follows :—

(1) (a) About 21 hours ; (b) the specimen was taken from Galle by the 8 A.M. train on the morning after the post-mortem was held at 4 P.M. the previous day ; (c) slightly decomposed. The Bacteriologists report was that it appeared to be positive ; (d) no.

(2) Yes. The answer to the second part of the question is that the matter will be discussed by the Council in Committee.

3. To consider the position of Council with regard to the Gintota-Welipitimodera road and the Koppe-ela from Hunugoda bridge to its mouth.—Resolved that in view of the description of the northern boundary of the Municipality as proclaimed in *Government Gazette* No. 5,243 dated September 22, 1893, this Council do maintain the Gintota-Welipitimodera road from January 1, 1933, but that no change be made as regards the Koppe-ela and the Hunugoda bridge.

4. To consider the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation regarding the establishment of two small dispensaries for the benefit of the poorer residents of the Municipality.—Resolved that the matter be deferred for consideration with the budget for 1933.

5. To confirm the purchase on behalf of the Council of the properties Nos. 309, 724A, 769, 770A, Galupiadda, in Ward 3 and No. 100A, Ettiligoda, also in Ward 3 ; and No. 575, Dadalla, in Ward 5 sold by public auction for non-payment of rates.—Resolved that the sale be confirmed.

6. To consider an application from the manager of the United States Amusement Co. asking that he be charged a flat rate for electric lighting.—Resolved that the application be refused and that the usual rate for current be charged, viz., 45 cents per unit.

The following extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works, Finance and Assessment, Markets and Sanitation, Law and General Subjects were laid before the Council :—

7. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of July 30, 1932.*

(2) To consider 6 applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(3) To consider an application from the residents of Jail road asking for lights and water service from the Railway running shed up to the Kaluwella Buddhist Temple.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 1,000 be voted for water service and Rs. 750 for electric lighting.

(4) To consider in detail the schedule of rates drawn up by the Superintendent of Works.—Recommended that the schedule of rates be approved.

## Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

8. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of July 30, 1932.*

(2) List of demolished buildings in Wards 3, 4w, 5, and 5A.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(3) To consider an application from Messrs. Clark Spence & Co. asking for a reduction of the annual licence fee in respect of their coaling business which is now being carried on only on a small scale.—Recommended that a new scale of fees be drawn up in respect of the following trades :—

(a) *Coal*.—Retail business, Rs. 25 ; whole-sale business, e.g., supplying coal to ships, Rs. 250.

(b) *Plumbago*.—The keeping of a plumbago curing store and yard, Rs. 25 to Rs. 50 ; storing of plumbago otherwise than in barrels, Rs. 25 to Rs. 75.

(4) To consider whether the deposit which the Council reserves the right to demand against electricity supply accounts be waived in the case of those applicants who are the owners of premises to which the supply is required.—Recommended that no exception be made and that the present practice of demanding deposits against electricity dues be continued in all cases.

(5) To consider whether the concession granted to St. Aloysius College in respect of electric lighting by letter No. 936 of March 13, 1930, be extended and made to apply in cases where the total consumption is over 300 units.—Recommended that consideration be deferred.

(6) To consider further the application from the Chairman of the Galle Municipal Education District Committee for a grant for the purpose of buying books for children attending non-English schools within the Municipality.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 100 be voted for the purpose of buying books for children attending non-English schools within the Municipality.

(7) To consider the question of purchasing a Gestetner Duplicating Machine for use in the office.—Recommended that the Chairman be authorized to purchase a Gestetner Duplicating Machine at a cost of Rs. 750.

(8) To authorize writing off a sum of Rs. 782.50 due for supply of electricity and meter rent from January to December, 1930.—Recommended that the sum of Rs. 782.50 be written off as irrecoverable.

(9) Lease of market stalls for 1933 :—(1) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation ; (2) recommended that the lease of the stalls for 1933 be offered to the present stall holders at the same rental as in 1932.

## Resolution.

With regard to item (4) the Chairman explained that there had been some misunderstanding and the recommendation of the Standing Committee was not quite in order. According to a previous resolution of Council the Chairman is authorized to demand deposits against electricity dues at his discretion.

He moved as an amendment that no change be made in the printed rules appearing on page 3 of the application form for supply of electricity.—Carried.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

9. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation of July 30, 1932.*

(2) Lease of market stalls for 1933 :—(1) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment ; (2) recommended that the lease of the stalls for 1933 be offered to the present stall holders at the same rental as in 1932.

*Resolution.*

Resolved that the above recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted.

10. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of July 30, 1932.*

(2) To consider the draft by-laws relating to bakeries, tea boutiques, eating-houses, dairies, and aerated water factories.—Recommended that the general by-laws relating to licences and the by-laws on bakeries be approved as amended by the Committee.

*Resolution.*

Resolved that consideration be deferred till the next meeting of Council and that in the meantime copies of the existing by-laws on bakeries and the proposed new by-laws be circulated to the following Members:—Messrs. J. E. Perera, P. R. Gunasekara, T. Amarasuriya, A. J. R. Schærenguivel, and C. E. de Vos.

At the conclusion of the Meeting Council went into Committee to consider the question of writing off rates on the ground of poverty.

Council in Committee recommended that the rates be written off in the case of those premises mentioned in Mr. Abeyratna's list and in addition that the rates on Nos. 1, 2, 4, and 5 in list A be also written off.

The expenses of appraising the property and of registering the security bond with the stamp fees as required under Ordinance No. 10 of 1919, should also be paid by the successful tenderer.

7. All title deeds tendered as security should be accompanied by a certificate obtained from the Registrar of Lands that the lands to which they relate are unencumbered. This certificate must be obtained at the cost of the party offering the security.

8. The purchaser must abide by the provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 1896 and other conditions under which the ferry rent is sold. Copies of the conditions are available at the Batticaloa Kachcheri, and will be supplied on application.

9. The purchaser should provide his own canoe and maintain it in good order.

10. Further information can be obtained on application at the Batticaloa Kachcheri.

11. No contract shall be entered into with any person whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors, either individually or jointly with any other person, nor shall the contractor employ any person whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors, or any other person to whom the Government Agent, Eastern Province, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, objects after giving due notice of his objection in writing.
