PENSION RULES.

1. (a) No officer shall be deemed to have an absolute right to any pension, gratuity, or allowance under these rules, and the Board reserves to itself the power to dismiss an officer without compensation.

(b) No pension, gratuity, or retiring allowance shall be granted on retirement to any officer without the authority of the Governor, in order to obtain which a certificate of good conduct from the Chairman setting out the length of service, age, and ground of retirement must be forwarded together with the application for pension, gratuity, or retiring allowance, and the computation thereof, through the Commissioner of Local Government to the Controller of Establishments.

2. (1) Subject to the provisions and exceptions herein-after contained every officer holding a permanent office in the service of the Board and drawing a salary of not less than Rs. 400 per annum may be granted a pension calculated at the rate of 1/720th of the salary of the office or offices held by him at retirement for each month of service counting for pension, provided that he has completed not less than 120 months' gross service.

(2) If such an officer retires on account of illness or age before completing 120 months' gross service, he may receive a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/12th of a month's salary of the office or offices held by him at retirement for each month of service.

3. Any officer may be required to retire from the service of the Board on or after attaining the age of fifty-five years; but retirement shall be compulsory on his attaining the age of sixty years, unless the Governor decide that his services shall be retained.

4. No pension shall be granted to an officer retiring before he attains the age of fifty-five years, unless a Medical Board, consisting of two Medical Practitioners nominated by the Chairman, certifies that the officer is unfit to discharge the duties of his office owing to infirmity either of mind or body, and unless he shall have theretofore discharged such duties to the satisfaction of the Chairman.

5. The Chairman may call upon an officer, who is below the limit of age entitling him to retire on pension, to retire from the service on the ground of his inability to discharge efficiently the duties of his office. In such a case the Board may by special resolution, subject to the approval of the Governor, grant such retiring allowance or gratuity as is considered just and proper, but in no case exceeding the amount for which the length of service of the officer would qualify him.

6. In the case of the abolition of any pensionable office, the pension or gratuity grantable to the officer holding such office will be that which would have been payable to him, had he retired on grounds of ill-health.

7. No pension or gratuity granted under these rules shall be assignable or transferable.

8. (1) The service to be reckoned for pension shall be calculated from the date on which the officer commences to draw salary in respect of his first permanent appointment, whether pensionable or not. Acting service in an office carrying claims to pension shall, when continuous with permanent employment, count as service for pension, provided no other officer was earning pension for the same period in respect of the same office. The service of an officer under 16 years of age shall not in any case count for pension.

(2) An officer is entitled to reckon as service for pension the whole period of absence on vacation leave, and half the period of absence on leave with half salary. Absence without salary will not count as service for pension.

9. (1) The pension or gratuity awarded to an officer shall be computed upon the salary drawn by him, at the time of his retirement, in respect of the permanent office or offices then held by him, provided that he shall have held such office or offices, to which the same fixed salary or incremental scale of salary is attached, for at least three years, otherwise the pension or gratuity shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such officer during the three years next preceding the date of his retirement.

(2) For the purposes of these rules, salary will include, in addition to the salary of the permanent office or offices held by him, any allowance voted to him by resolution of the Board as a pensionable allowance, but no other emolument whatsoever.

10. The rates of pension, retiring allowance, and gratuity above set forth shall be granted only in cases of faithful and meritorious service. Where the testimony as to good conduct is in any way defective, a deduction may be made from the pension or gratuity, and where the misconduct of an officer has been of a serious nature, the pension or gratuity may be entirely withheld.

11. The service in respect of which pensions or gratuities are granted ought in all cases to have been continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or by temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation. Service prior to a break of service may, however, be allowed to count for pension together with service subsequent to such break, if the whole of the intervening period has been spent in some employment under Government or under another statutory local authority.

12. If any person in receipt of a pension or retiring allowance is convicted of any offence in any Court in the Island and sentenced to death or to any term of rigorous imprisonment exceeding six months, the payment of such pension or allowance shall be forthwith discontinued, unless such person shall within three months of such conviction receive an unconditional pardon, or unless the Board with the approval of the Governor in any case for special reasons otherwise decides.

13. If any person to whom a pension, annuity, or allowance has been granted under these rules becomes a bankrupt, such pension, annuity, or allowance shall forthwith cease; but it shall be lawful for the Board, with the approval of the Governor, from time to time during the remainder of such person's life or during such shorter period or periods, whether continuous or otherwise, as may be necessary, to pay all or any part of such pension, annuity, or allowance to, or to apply the same for the maintenance and personal support or benefit of, such person and his wife and children jointly or any one or more of them exclusively, as may in the circumstances of each case be necessary or expedient.

14. (1) Every officer who is transferred to a post under Government or under another statutory local authority with the approval of the Board, shall be entitled on ultimate retirement to pension for the service rendered to the Board, provided that he retires from the latter service in circumstances which would entitle him to pension under these rules. In all such cases the amount contributed by the Board by way of pension shall be based only on the service under the Board, and the final salary drawn from the Board.

(2) An officer who has been transferred to the service of the Board from some other employment under Government or under another statutory local authority may, if he retires from the service of the Board after completing 10 years' public service in all, but before completing 10 years' service under the Board, be awarded, in lieu of a gratuity, an annuity based on service and salary under the Board, calculated in the manner prescribed by rule 2 (1).

15. No person may at any time draw from the funds of the Board an amount of pension which, when added to the amount of any pension or pensions drawn in respect of other public service, exceeds two-thirds of the highest

pensionable emoluments drawn by such person at any time in the course of his service under the Board or in such other public service.

16. If any person in receipt of a pension or retiring allowance from the Board returns to the service of the Board, he may be allowed to retain his pension or retiring allowance during the period of his re-employment, in which case he shall receive on his ultimate retirement no award whatever under these rules; or he may be required to forego the pension or retiring allowance then drawn by him, in which case he shall receive on his ultimate retirement a pension or retiring allowance based on his aggregate service and the highest salary drawn by him at any time during that service. The Chairman shall decide the terms on which a former servant of the Board may be re-employed in any particular case.

17. Any employee of the Board drawing a salary of less than Rs. 400 per annum, retiring on account of illness after serving continuously for a period of 15 years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied from the report of a Medical Board that he is unfit to discharge efficiently the duties of his office owing to infirmity of body or mind, be awarded such long service allowance not exceeding Rs. 7.50 per mensem as the Board may think just and proper. In the case of employees who retire after attaining the age of 55 years or over, no Medical Board need be appointed. Any employee in receipt of daily pay, who has completed not less than 20 years' service, retiring in similar circumstances, may be awarded a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/36th of a month's pay for each month's service.

18. In the event of any officer or servant, whether in a pensionable or non-pensionable office or on daily pay, dying while in the service of the Board, it shall be competent to the Board, subject to the approval of the Governor, to grant to the widow or next-of-kin of such officer or servant a gratuity not exceeding three months' pay, and in addition one month's pay for each minor child.

19. If any case not covered by these rules shall arise which in the opinion of the Board merits the award of a pension, retiring allowance, or gratuity, a report setting out the circumstances of such case, together with the recommendation of the Board, shall be forwarded through the Commissioner of Local Government and the Controller of Establishments, General Treasury, to the Governor for his decision as to the nature and the amount of the compensation, if any, that may be awarded.

2. (1) Subject to the provisions and exceptions herein-after contained every officer holding a permanent office in the service of the Board and drawing a salary of not less than Rs. 400 per annum may be granted a pension calculated at the rate of 1/720th of the salary of the office or offices held by him at retirement for each month of service counting for pension, provided that he has completed not less than 120 months' gross service.

The service of an officer under 16 years of age shall not in any case count for pension.

(2) An officer is entitled to reckon as service for pension the whole period of absence on vacation leave, and half the period of absence on leave with half salary. Absence without salary will not count as service for pension.

9. (1) The pension or gratuity awarded to an officer shall be computed upon the salary drawn by him, at the time of his retirement, in respect of the permanent office or offices then held by him, provided that he shall have held such office or offices, to which the same fixed salary or incremental scale of salary is attached, for at least three years, otherwise the pension or gratuity shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such officer during the three years next preceding the date of his retirement.

(2) For the purposes of these rules, salary will include, in addition to the salary of the permanent office or offices held by him, any allowance voted to him by resolution of the Board as a pensionable allowance, but no other emolument whatsoever.

10. The rates of pension, retiring allowance, and gratuity above set forth shall be granted only in cases of faithful and meritorious service. Where the testimony as to good conduct is in any way defective, a deduction may be made from the pension or gratuity, and where the misconduct of an officer has been of a serious nature, the pension or gratuity may be entirely withheld.

11. The service in respect of which pensions or gratuities are granted ought in all cases to have been continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or by temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation. Service prior to a break of service may, however, be allowed to count for pension together with service subsequent to such break, if the whole of the intervening period has been spent in some employment under Government or under another statutory local authority.

12. If any person in receipt of a pension or retiring allowance is convicted of any offence in any Court in the Island and sentenced to death or to any term of rigorous imprisonment exceeding six months, the payment of such pension or allowance shall be forthwith discontinued, unless such person shall within three months of such conviction receive an unconditional pardon, or unless the Board with the approval of the Governor in any case for special reasons otherwise decides.

13. If any person to whom a pension, annuity, or allowance has been granted under these rules becomes a bankrupt, such pension, annuity, or allowance shall forthwith cease; but it shall be lawful for the Board, with the approval of the Governor, from time to time during the remainder of such person's life or during such shorter period or periods, whether continuous or otherwise, as may be necessary, to pay all or any part of such pension, annuity, or allowance to, or to apply the same for the maintenance and personal support or benefit of, such person and his wife and children jointly or any one or more of them exclusively, as may in the circumstances of each case be necessary or expedient.

14. (1) Every officer who is transferred to a post under Government or under another statutory local authority with the approval of the Board, shall be entitled on ultimate retirement to pension for the service rendered to the Board, provided that he retires from the latter service in circumstances which would entitle him to pension under these rules. In all such cases the amount contributed by the Board by way of pension shall be based only on the service under the Board, and the final salary drawn from the Board.

(2) An officer who has been transferred to the service of the Board from some other employment under Government or under another statutory local authority may if he retires from the service of the Board after completing 10 years' public service in all, but before completing 10 years' service under the Board, be awarded, in lieu of a gratuity, an annuity based on service and salary under the Board, calculated in the manner prescribed by rule 2 (1).

15. No person may at any time draw from the funds of the Board an amount of pension which, when added to the amount of any pension or pensions drawn in respect of other public service, exceeds two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such person at any time in the course of his service under the Board or in such other public service.

16. If any person in receipt of a pension or retiring allowance from the Board returns to the service of the Board, he may be allowed to retain his pension or retiring allowance during the period of his re-employment, in which case he shall receive on his ultimate retirement no award whatever under these rules; or he may be required to forego the pension or retiring allowance then drawn by him, in which case he shall receive on his ultimate retirement a pension or retiring allowance based on his aggregate service and the highest salary drawn by him at any time during that service. The Chairman shall decide the terms on which a former servant of the Board may be re-employed in any particular case.

17. Any employee of the Board drawing a salary of less than Rs. 400 per annum, retiring on account of illness after serving continuously for a period of 15 years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied from the report of a Medical Board that he is unfit to discharge efficiently the duties of his office owing to infirmity of body or mind, be awarded such long service allowance not exceeding Rs. 7.50 per mensem as the Board may think just and proper. In the case of employees who retire after attaining the age of 55 years or over, no Medical Board need be appointed. Any employee in receipt of daily pay, who has completed not less than 20 years' service, retiring in similar circumstances, may be awarded a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/36th of a month's pay for each month's service.

18. In the event of any officer or servant, whether in a pensionable or non-pensionable office or on daily pay, dying while in the service of the Board, it shall be competent to the Board, subject to the approval of the Governor, to grant to the widow or next-of-kin of such officer or servant, a gratuity not exceeding three months' pay, and in addition one month's pay for each minor child.

19. If any case not covered by these rules shall arise which in the opinion of the Board merits the award of a pension, retiring allowance, or gratuity, a report setting out the circumstances of such case, together with the recommendation of the Board, shall be forwarded through the Commissioner of Local Government and the Controller of Establishments, General Treasury, to the Governor for his decision as to the nature and the amount of the compensation, if any, that may be awarded.

Add after Rule 30.—

30 A. The Registrar shall on receipt of this report cause to be destroyed the finger-print documents of a person who has not been previously convicted of a crime and whose conviction and sentence have been set aside in appeal. In the case of a person whose sentence has been varied in appeal the Registrar shall cause the necessary alterations to be made in the finger-print documents of such person.

30 B. In the case of a person previously convicted of a crime but whose conviction or sentence is set aside or varied in appeal, the Registrar shall delete from the records, kept by him and other officers, reference to the conviction or sentence so set aside or make the necessary alterations in such records.

30 C. If a person who has not previously been convicted of a crime but whose photograph has been taken under Rule 27 or 28 is acquitted by the Supreme Court or his conviction is otherwise set aside, the Registrar shall thereupon forthwith cause the photographs (both negatives and copies) of such person to be destroyed or handed over to such person.

SELECTION OF A CEYLONESE CANDIDATE FOR APPOINTMENT AS POLICE PROBATIONER.

This Notification applies to Selection of Police Candidates for 1933 and there is no guarantee that the same Conditions will apply in Future Years.

THERE will be a vacancy in 1933 in the Ceylon Police Force in the rank of Probationary Assistant Superintendent to be filled by the appointment of a Ceylonese Probationer.

2. As recommended in the report of the Select Committee of the Legislative Council on the Police Force (Sessional Paper XI.—1926), Ceylonese candidates for appointment as Police Probationers will undergo the same qualifying literary examination as candidates resident in England and will be selected, subject to confirmation by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, by His Excellency the Governor.

3. Instructions have been received from the Secretary of State that the qualifying literary examination to be held by the Civil Service Commissioners will commence on June 27, 1933. Arrangements are being made for examination papers to be sent by the Civil Service Commissioners to Ceylon so that Ceylonese candidates may take up the examination in Ceylon.

4. **Method of Application.**—(a) Candidates must first obtain the permission of His Excellency the Governor to sit at the examination. Applications on forms to be obtained from the Chief Secretary or from the Inspector-General of Police must be sent to reach the Chief Secretary not later than January 31, 1933. No applications received after that date will be considered.

(b) Forms must be filled in as follows:—The applicant is required to state full particulars regarding his career and qualifications; he must name on the form two referees who will answer from personal knowledge for his character and capacity. Originals and copies of testimonials (not more than six) will be attached to the form. He must also enclose his birth certificate (or a certified copy), the originals and copies of certificates of any examinations passed by him, and a certificate from a qualified medical practitioner giving his height, chest measurement, with any special remarks as to physical development, &c. The originals of the testimonials and the birth and examination certificates will be inspected and returned to the candidate while the copies will be retained for record in the Secretariat.

(c) Applications from candidates already in Government Service should be forwarded through the Heads of the Departments in which the applicants are serving.

5. **Conditions of Eligibility.**—Every candidate shall fulfil each of the following conditions:—

- (i.) He must be a natural-born British subject.
- (ii.) His permanent home must be in Ceylon.
- (iii.) He must have been educated either in Ceylon or in the United Kingdom or Great Britain and Northern Ireland.
- (iv.) On August 1, 1933, at least 19 years and not more than 26 years must have elapsed since the date of his birth; provided that in the case of an Inspector or Sub-Inspector in the Ceylon Police who joined the Force as a Sub-Inspector during the period 1919–1926, on August 1, 1933, at least 19 years and not more than 30 years must have elapsed since the date of his birth.

- (v.) He must have passed the London Matriculation Examination or the Cambridge Senior Examination with exemption from the London Matriculation Examination.
- (vi.) He must be of good moral character.
- (vii.) He must be unmarried, except in the case of an Inspector or Sub-Inspector who joined the Force as a Sub-Inspector during the period 1919–1926.
- (viii.) He must be of sound constitution, and physically fit for service in any part of the Island. He must also be able to distinguish the principal colours.

Note.—No person will be deemed eligible as a candidate who has not furnished satisfactory proof that he fulfils each of the conditions set forth above.

6. **Permission to sit at the Examination.**—Candidates who have complied with the above instructions will be informed in due course whether they have been granted permission to sit at the examination. The grant of such permission will be at the absolute discretion of the Governor and he will not be prepared to give reasons for his decision on any application.

7. **Selection after the Examination.**—The Governor will, subject to confirmation by the Secretary of State, select a candidate to fill the vacancy from amongst those who are pronounced by the Civil Service Commissioners to have qualified in the literary examination.

The candidate will be selected who appears to the Governor to be most suitable on grounds of character, personal fitness, general education and subsequent training and experience (if any).

Candidates must be prepared to attend at the Secretariat, if required, at their own expense, to reply to any inquiries which may be considered necessary. Qualification in the literary examination will not in itself imply ultimate selection for an appointment.

The selection of the candidate will be at the absolute discretion of the Governor, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, and he will not be prepared to give reasons for his decision on any application. Attempts to influence his selection through persons who are not personally well acquainted with the candidate are useless, and will be regarded as indicating that the candidate himself does not consider his qualifications sufficiently good to justify his appointment on his own merits. *They can in no case operate to the advantage of a candidate, and may lead to his disqualification.*

8. **Reserve List.**—When the selection of a candidate to fill the existing vacancy has been completed, it will be at the discretion of the Governor, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to place certain of the unsuccessful candidates (but only candidates who have qualified in the literary examination) on a reserve list. From this list candidates may be selected to fill any further vacancies that might occur during the course of the year 1933. No indication can be given, however, as to the possible occurrence of such vacancies.

9. **Medical Examination.**—The selected candidate will be required to undergo a medical examination as to his physical fitness for service as a Police Officer in any part of the Island. Final selection will depend upon successfully passing this medical examination.

A candidate may not offer more than two subjects in Part II.

Except as provided below in the case of languages no candidate may offer similar subjects in Parts I. and II. That is to say, a candidate taking Physics-plus-Chemistry or Biology may not offer Everyday Science; a candidate taking Lower or Higher Mathematics may not offer Elementary Mathematics; and a candidate taking Modern History may not offer General History. A candidate may not offer the same language in Part I. and Part II. nor may he offer more than two foreign languages in all.

Modern Languages in Part I.—Any one of the following modern languages may be offered: French, German, Italian, Spanish, Russian.

In addition to the above-named subjects a candidate may take up either freehand drawing or geometrical drawing, each of which carries 50 marks.

A candidate must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the whole examination as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

The syllabus of individual subjects will be the same as that for the Navy, Army, and Air Force Entrance Examination which is reproduced below, except that candidates in Physics-plus-Chemistry and Biology in Part II. will not be required to produce evidence of laboratory training. For candidates examined in Ceylon the laboratory tests in Lower and Higher Mathematics will be omitted, the maximum marks for the subjects being allotted to the written papers.

Fee.—Each candidate undergoing the examination should pay a fee of £5, which amount is due to the Civil Service Commissioners, and an additional local fee of Rs. 20 to meet the cost of supervision and other incidental expenses in connection with the examination. Instructions as to the manner in which the fee is to be paid will be sent with the Order for Examination which, together with a Time Table of the Examination, will be forwarded in time to reach candidates who have been nominated about a fortnight before the examination.

II.—SYLLABUS OF THE NAVY, ARMY, AND AIR FORCE ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

1. **ENGLISH:** The tests in English will be designed to value understanding and command of the language. No essay will be asked for.

Précis.—A passage will usually be set for summary or précis. Limits may be prescribed for the number of words that the summary or précis should contain. Failure to keep within the prescribed limits will entail loss of marks. It is useful for the candidate to have some idea of the number of words he is accustomed to write on a foolscap page.

Handwriting.—In English, and in every other subject, deductions for handwriting which is at all difficult to read will be made up to 20 per cent. of the maximum mark. An officer in the field may have to write under great difficulties, and his report may have to be read in a poor light by another officer tired out by a long day's work. If communications are to take place accurately in those circumstances, it is essential that under mere examination conditions the handwriting should be absolutely legible. Accordingly, perfection of legibility is the criterion; no preference will be accorded on other grounds to any particular style of handwriting.

Spelling.—In English, and in every other subject, deductions for bad English spelling will be made up to 10 per cent. of the maximum mark. A spelling recognized by any standard dictionary is accepted as correct.

Command of the English language is taken into account in all subjects.

2. **GENERAL KNOWLEDGE:** The questions in General Knowledge will be designed to test the knowledge and interest of candidates (1) in the more important topics of the day, (2) in literary, geographical and other questions.

4A. **MODERN LANGUAGE:** The test will include translation from the foreign language; set composition (in which an English passage is given to be put into the foreign language); and free composition (in which the candidates write in their own words on a prescribed subject). The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English.

For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

4B. **GENERAL HISTORY:** The questions will be designed to test such knowledge and understanding of British history as a boy of the United Kingdom may be expected to have acquired at school by the age of 18. There will be no limit of time; attention will be confined to the great men and the great events, the great changes and the great movements, and the broad features of the general life. So much knowledge of foreign history is desirable as is necessary in order to understand the action of this country abroad and the action of other countries upon this country, and the knowledge of geography necessary for the comprehension of history will be tested. Answers must be strictly directed to the questions asked; irrelevance will be severely penalized. The questions will not be questions upon details, and exact dates will only be expected for the great landmarks; but accurate knowledge of the outlines will be expected, and illustrative detail strictly relevant and correctly presented will receive credit. A very liberal choice of questions will be allowed.

4C. **ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS:** 1. Arithmetic, including problems about money, imperial and metric weights and measures, mensuration, percentages, and averages.

Knowledge of recurring decimals, scales of notation, stocks and shares, foreign exchange, and true discount is not required. Contracted methods are not required; when an approximate result is required candidates may work with all the figures supplied or make legitimate discards at any stage. The arithmetical rules for square and cube root are not required.

An arithmetical result may be asked for to a certain approximation, or the data may themselves be only approximate. In such a case, to give the result to a greater degree of accuracy than is asked for or is justified by the data will entail loss of marks. Candidates are expected to understand such phrases as "three significant figures," "four-figure accuracy."

2. A sound appreciation of the following geometry will be expected, but proofs will not be asked for:—

Properties of angles at a point, e.g., that vertically opposite angles are equal. Congruence properties of triangles, i.e., the nature and number of the conditions that determine a triangle. The conditions of similarity of two triangles, i.e., the conditions which determine the shape of a triangle. The following plane loci: the locus of a point equidistant from two fixed points, and the locus of a point within a given angle at equal perpendicular distances from the arms of the angle. The condition of the parallelism of two straight lines in its various forms. Proportion properties of parallels, the treatment of incommensurables not being required. Perimeter and area of a circle. Surface-areas and volumes of prisms, cylinders, pyramids, cones, with such simple problems on these figures as can be solved by the geometrical properties mentioned in this and the next paragraph. Surface-area and volume of a sphere. The representation of the simplest three-dimensional figures by means of plan and elevation.

3. Of the following geometry a sound appreciation will be expected, and proofs may be asked for. Candidates may base their proofs on the properties mentioned in the preceding paragraph or on other grounds:—

The angle-sum property of a triangle. Properties of the parallelogram. Solution of right-angled triangles

by drawing and by the use of tables of trigonometrical functions. Pythagoras' theorem and the converse. Areas of triangles, quadrilaterals, &c. Simple properties associated with symmetry. Simple properties of circles, viz., angle properties, rectangle properties, properties of chords and tangents. Similar figures. Measurements suitable for determining the position of a point in a plane, or in space. Measurement of the angle between two planes, and between a line and a plane.

4. Algebraic calculation in connection with the above geometry and with other problems, including: the expression of an arithmetical generalization in a formula, the interpretation of a formula, evaluation of a formula for numerical values of its variables; linear and quadratic equations with numerical coefficients; simple instances of varying magnitudes, statistical and mathematical, treated by means of graphs and otherwise; inversion of a formula (or change of the subject of a formula); use of logarithms; gradient of a graph.

A knowledge of algebraic square root and the theory and use of negative and fractional indices will not be expected. Questions will not be set upon lowest common multiple or highest common factor. Little skill is expected in algebraic manipulation, as, for instance, in long multiplication and division, factorization, transformation of expressions, identities, inequalities, and the simplification of fractions; only such manipulation will be expected as arises naturally out of simple problems.

5. *Mode of Treatment.*—Grasp of elementary principles and readiness in practical application will be looked for. Numerical results should be worked out to a few significant figures. Candidates may be required to apply rough checks of the accuracy of particular results; they may also save themselves from blunders by applying checks even when not demanded. No great skill in the use of drawing instruments will be expected, but slovenly work will entail loss of marks.

Credit will be given for the clearness and aptness of the language of the answers; deductions will be made for obscurity or slovenliness, and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words or phrases. The use of mathematical symbols and of well-established abbreviations like lb. and cm. is permissible; a calculation can often be exhibited quite clearly without the use of words, and a tabular form is often appropriate; but incomplete sentences such as are appropriate in telegrams will involve loss of marks.

There will be no laboratory test.

4D. **EVERYDAY SCIENCE:** The questions will be on matters mainly physical, chemical, biological, hygienic. Such knowledge will be expected as a boy is likely to possess who has studied the subject intelligently at school up to the age of 16 and has kept his eyes open. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

There will be no laboratory test.

5. **LATIN:** Translation and prose composition. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English.

6. **GREEK:** As for Latin.

7. **FRENCH:** Translation from French; set composition; free composition; conversation. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English. The oral test will carry 75 marks.

8. **GERMAN:** As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

9. **MODERN HISTORY:** British history, including British colonial history, from 1660 to the present day, together with European history during the same period. European history will be treated mainly as affecting British history, and with special reference to the following subjects:—Decline of the power of Holland. The ambitions of Louis XIV. The rivalry of England and France for colonial empire in India and America. Frederick the Great and the rise of Prussia. The French Revolution and the First Empire. The unification of Italy. Bismarck and the Union of Germany. The

action of Russia in the Near East, Middle East, and Far East. The causes and results of the Great War (1914-1918).

Although a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached. Such knowledge of geography as is necessary to make the history comprehensible will be required.

All questions, whether relating to European or to British history, will deal with the broad outlines of the subject and no more knowledge of detail will be expected than is necessary for the comprehension of the outlines.

Mathematics. Subjects 10, 11.—Credit will be given for the clearness and aptness of the language of the answers; deductions will be made for obscurity or slovenliness, and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words or phrases. The use of mathematical symbols and of well-established abbreviations like lb. and cm. is permissible; a calculation can often be exhibited quite clearly without the use of words, and a tabular form is often appropriate; but incomplete sentences such as are customary in telegrams will involve loss of marks.

10. **LOWER MATHEMATICS: Arithmetic.**—Arithmetic, including simple methods of dealing with statistical data.

The mensuration of plane areas and simple solid bodies. The use of callipers, vernier and other simple measuring instruments. The determination of area, volume, and density by displacement, by weighing, &c.

Geometry.—The substance of Euclid's six books. Elementary ideas in solid geometry treated informally: straight lines, planes, rectangular blocks, wedges, pyramids, cylinders, cones, and spheres. The construction of plans and elevations.

Algebra.—Formulas, their evaluation and transformation; the notion of a function; rate of change. The gradient and area of a graph. Arithmetical and finite geometrical sequences.

Trigonometry.—Solution of plane triangles; graphs of trigonometrical functions; use of four-figure tables; addition theorems.

The composition and resolution of velocities and acceleration in one plane; rectilinear motion under uniform acceleration; the conservation of linear momentum; work, energy and power; graphical treatment of varying velocities, accelerations and forces.

Proofs of the parallelogram and triangle of forces, and of the principle of moments will not be asked for. Questions will not be set on curvilinear motion.

11. **HIGHER MATHEMATICS:** Includes Lower Mathematics, together with:—

4D. EVERYDAY SCIENCE: The questions will be on matters mainly physical, chemical, biological, hygienic. Such knowledge will be expected as a boy is likely to possess who has studied the subject intelligently at school up to the age of 16 and has kept his eyes open. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

There will be no laboratory test.

5. LATIN: Translation and prose composition. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English.

6. GREEK: As for Latin.

7. FRENCH: Translation from French; set composition; free composition; conversation. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English. The oral test will carry 75 marks.

8. GERMAN: As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

9. MODERN HISTORY: British history, including British colonial history, from 1660 to the present day, together with European history during the same period. European history will be treated mainly as affecting British history, and with special reference to the following subjects:—Decline of the power of Holland. The ambitions of Louis XIV. The rivalry of England and France for colonial empire in India and America. Frederick the Great and the rise of Prussia. The French Revolution and the First Empire. The unification of Italy. Bismarck and the Union of Germany. The

action of Russia in the Near East, Middle East, and Far East. The causes and results of the Great War (1914-1918).

Although a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached. Such knowledge of geography as is necessary to make the history comprehensible will be required.

All questions, whether relating to European or to British history, will deal with the broad outlines of the subject and no more knowledge of detail will be expected than is necessary for the comprehension of the outlines.

Mathematics. Subjects 10, 11.—Credit will be given for the clearness and aptness of the language of the answers; deductions will be made for obscurity or slovenliness, and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words or phrases. The use of mathematical symbols and of well-established abbreviations like lb. and cm. is permissible; a calculation can often be exhibited quite clearly without the use of words, and a tabular form is often appropriate; but incomplete sentences such as are customary in telegrams will involve loss of marks.

10. LOWER MATHEMATICS: *Arithmetic.*—Arithmetic, including simple methods of dealing with statistical data.

The mensuration of plane areas and simple solid bodies. The use of callipers, vernier and other simple measuring instruments. The determination of area, volume, and density by displacement, by weighing, &c.

Geometry.—The substance of Euclid's six books. Elementary ideas in solid geometry treated informally; straight lines, planes, rectangular blocks, wedges, pyramids, cylinders, cones, and spheres. The construction of plans and elevations.

Algebra.—Formulas, their evaluation and transformation; the notion of a function; rate of change. The gradient and area of a graph. The solution of equations, linear and quadratic, simple and simultaneous. The use of logarithms; the meaning and simplest properties of negative and fractional indices. Arithmetical and finite geometrical sequences.

Trigonometry.—Solution of plane triangles; graphs of trigonometrical functions; use of four-figure tables; addition theorems.

Mechanics.—The lever, the inclined plane, the pulley, the balance and other simple machines; the composition and resolution of forces in one plane; moments; simple graphical methods; simple cases of equilibrium; properties of the centre of gravity; work; velocity ratio, mechanical advantage, and efficiency of a machine.

The composition and resolution of velocities and acceleration in one plane; rectilinear motion under uniform acceleration; the conservation of linear momentum; work, energy and power; graphical treatment of varying velocities, acceleration.

Proofs of the parallelogram of vector addition, and of the principle of moments. Questions will not be set on the resolution of forces, and on the resolution of velocities, and on the resolution of accelerations, asked for.

General.—In the absence of special instructions that a question is to be answered by a particular method, candidates are at liberty to choose their method from any branch of mathematics.

11. HIGHER MATHEMATICS: Includes Lower Mathematics, together with:—

Geometry.—Elements of solid geometrical drawing.

Equations to the straight line, circle, ellipse, parabola, hyperbola, and other simple curves, in rectangular co-ordinates. Acquaintance is expected only with the simplest theorems about the curves. Candidates are free to use the methods of the infinitesimal calculus. Polar co-ordinates; deduction of the equation of a curve from simple data; drawing a curve from its equation.

Co-ordinate geometry of three dimensions up to the equations of the plane and the straight line.

Algebra.—Elementary knowledge of the use of indeterminate coefficients, especially with partial fractions. Easy computation, including the numerical solution of equations.

Calculus.—Differentiation and integration of simple standard forms and other forms depending on them; application to easy geometrical, mechanical, and physical problems, to turning values, and to the expansion of simple algebraic and trigonometrical functions. A working knowledge (without rigorous fundamental demonstrations) of the elementary infinite series for $(1+x)^m$, e^x , $\log_e(1+x)$, and their use in approximative calculations.

Mechanics.—The equilibrium of bodies in two dimensions; link polygons; virtual work. Harmonic motion. Simple and conical pendulums. Projectiles. Simple cases of linked mechanisms. Moments of inertia. Simple cases of the motion of rigid bodies in two dimensions; such as flywheels, compound pendulums, rolling wheels. The action of such mechanical devices as crank mechanisms, engine governors, cranes, brakes.

General.—In Higher Mathematics more analytical skill will be expected than in the earlier stage. In the absence of special instructions that a question is to be answered by a particular method, candidates are at liberty to choose their method from any branch of mathematics.

Science. Subjects 12, 13.—There will be no laboratory test in Physics-plus-Chemistry or Biology as a part of the examination.

In the valuation of candidates' work in these subjects credit will be given for lucidity, orderly development, and aptness of language; deductions will be made for incoherence, irrelevance, obscurity, slovenliness of expression and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words and phrases. Chemical symbols must be restricted to their proper function and not used as shorthand symbols for the names of the substances.

12. PHYSICS-PLUS-CHEMISTRY.—The following three subdivisions will carry equal weight:—

Electricity.—The fundamental ideas concerning electric currents, difference of potential, resistance; construction and mode of action of the commoner primary batteries. The fundamental laws of electrolysis, and their application in secondary cells and electro-plating. Heating effect of a current; its application in incandescent and arc lamps, electric welding, cooking, &c. The phenomena of permanent and induced magnetism in iron; fields of magnetic force; the magnetic field associated with an electric current. The construction and action of an electro-magnet; application in electric bells and telephones. The simpler phenomena of electro-magnetic induction; broad principles and applications of the induction coil, magneto, dynamo, and motor. The fundamental ideas concerning wireless telegraphy. The simpler methods of measuring electric current, difference of potential, and resistance; practical definitions of ampere, volt, and ohm. Ohm's law. Construction and mode of action of simple measuring instruments; electric transmission of power by direct current; joule, watt, Board

Physics of Gases.—General: Principles of measurement.

Hydrostatics: Pressure; floating bodies. Determination of specific gravity. Gaseous pressure. Boyle's law. Atmospheric pressure; barometers. Air and water pumps and other simple instruments.

Heat: Temperature; thermometers. Specific heat, latent heat, calorimeters. Expansion; measurement and simple illustrations. Transmission of heat; convection, conduction, and radiation; application to heating and ventilating. Vaporization; distillation; humidity, fog and cloud. Heat considered as energy; mechanical equivalent. Generation of heat; calorific values.

Optics: Transmission, reflexion, refraction of light. Prisms and lenses; the formation of images. Construction of simple telescopes and microscopes. The eye; spectacles. Intensity; principles of illumination; photometry. Dispersion; spectroscopes; colour.

Chemistry.—General Chemistry: Elements, compounds and mixtures. Laws of chemical combination. Equivalents, molecular and atomic weights. Structural formulae and valency. Outlines of the properties of solutions. Heat of reaction.

Inorganic Chemistry: The chemical properties of oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, chlorine, carbon, sulphur, phosphorus, and their common compounds.

The general characteristics and behaviour of the metals potassium, calcium, aluminium, copper, zinc, mercury, tin, lead and iron.

The preparation (without technical details) and uses of chemicals of industrial importance, such as oxygen, soda, sulphuric acid, coal gas, and of the more important metals.

Organic Chemistry: Outlines of the chemistry of the simple compounds of carbon, containing not more than two carbon atoms directly connected. An elementary knowledge of the properties of benzene and its simpler derivatives. The part played by carbon compounds in the life of animals and plants; fats, soap, starch and sugars, treated descriptively. Carbon compounds as sources of energy.

In Chemistry a choice of questions will be given so that full marks may be scored without a knowledge of organic chemistry.

13. BIOLOGY: 1. The contrast, with respect to energy, between living creatures and lifeless matter; the broad differences between plants and animals; respiration; anabolism and katabolism.

The main types of nutrition and their place in the economy of living nature; nitrifying and nitrogen-fixing organisms, plants, grazing animals; the essential constituents of human food.

Asexual and sexual reproduction as illustrated by yeast, common mould, a fern, and the flowering plant (*e.g.*, buttercup). The broad features of the development of the flowering plant (*e.g.*, bean) from the seed.

The interaction between plant and animal life as illustrated in simple cases.

2. A fuller treatment of the growth of plants; experiments upon germination, observations of the structure of seeds and bulbs, the characters of buds.

Comparison of the eggs of an animal (*e.g.*, the fowl, the frog) with seeds. The more obvious features of the development of the frog from the ovum to the end of larval life.

3. A fuller treatment of the physiology of the flowering plant. The chief ingredients of soil and their properties; main types of soil. The work of earthworms, soil bacteria and protozoa. Relations between plants and soil; arrangements subserving the absorption of water by roots and loss by leaves.

Experiments upon the influence of light upon growth; respiration and assimilation; the structure and functions of the green leaf. Food reserves.

The main points in human physiology brought out by comparison and contrast with the physiology of the flowering plant.

4. A fuller treatment of the reproduction of the flowering plant. The chief features in the structure of flowers; pollination and cross-pollination and the means by which these are effected; fruiting, and the main types of fruits; seed-dispersal.

5. The broad features of the economy of the more important food-plants; the rotation of crops; the relation of crops to the needs of horses and of animals used for food.

6. The evidence for the doctrine of biogenesis, and for the connection of micro-organisms with putrefaction disease, &c.

7. The candidate should study some or all of the following types in illustration of the subject:—

Saccharomyces and bacteria; mucor and penicillium or eurotium; a unicellular green plant, *e.g.*, chlamydomonas or haematococcus or protococcus (a comparison of its nutrition with that of plants without chlorophyll); spirogyra, volvox, a moss, *e.g.*, funaria, a fern (a knowledge of the microscopical anatomy of the vegetative organs of the moss and fern is not required); flowering plants, both herbaceous and woody.

Amoeba; paramecium or vorticella; monocyctis; hydra; obelia; taenia (externals and life-history); lumbricus; periplaneta; honey bee (externals and life-history); aphid (externals and life-history); scyllium

(skeleton); scyllium or a teleost (externals, vascular and respiratory systems); a mammal (rabbit or rat; skeleton, rabbit or dog).

FREEHAND DRAWING: There will be no deductions; candidates will be credited with all the marks gained.

There will be two tests in drawing. In the first a photograph or other representation of a landscape will be set before the candidate, who will be required to make an outline sketch of it in the style of a military panorama. The drawing should show with few lines all the important features of the landscape, so that officers using the sketch in action should be able to grasp the nature of the position and rapidly identify its landmarks. Correct proportions are essential. A conventional form of shading with oblique parallel lines may be used; but this must be strictly confined to parts of the sketch where such definition is helpful to the clearness of the whole. Roofs of buildings should be tinted with red chalk, water with blue, and roads with brown. *Manual of Map Reading, Photo Reading, and Field Sketching*, 1929, articles 70, 73, 74, 76, should be consulted.

In the second test candidates will be asked to draw from memory some common object, such as a chair or a saddle.

GEOMETRICAL DRAWING: The neat and accurate use of pencil, ruling pen, compass, scales, protractor, set squares. The application of geometrical drawing to simple problems in plane geometry. The construction of ordinary and diagonal scales. The setting out of words or sentences in good lettering.

Note.—Every Ceylonese Probationer will be subject to any regulations as to Probationers (not inconsistent with this paper) which may from time to time be made by the Ceylon Government, including regulations as to examinations in vernacular languages, riding, &c.

Any Probationer who may fail to pass the prescribed examinations within four years, or be found unfit for Police duties, will be liable to removal from the service.

Before an officer's salary reaches £460 per annum, and again before it reaches £580 per annum, £720 per annum, and £880 per annum, there is a strict efficiency bar; and the officer will not be permitted to draw further increments unless his service is thoroughly satisfactory in every respect, and until he has shown sufficient ability, initiative, and promise to justify the expectation that he will be fully capable of carrying out efficiently, and will accept the further responsibility of his new rank.

Pension.

Subject to the exceptions and provisions contained in the Government Pension Minute, pension may be paid as follows to officers who retire from Service owing to ill-health on being condemned by a Medical Board or on attaining the age of 55 years:—

(a) After 10 years' service, one quarter of the officer's salary.

- (b) 1/720th of the officer's salary is added for each additional month's service.
- (c) The maximum amount payable is 3/4th of the salary which can be drawn after 35 years' service.
- (d) An officer to whom a pension is granted may, at his option, be paid, in lieu of such pension, a pension at the rate of 3/4ths of such pension together with a gratuity equal to ten times the annual value of the reduction so made in the pension.

Note.—(i.) If an officer retires before the completion of 10 years' service on being condemned by a Medical Board, he may be granted a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/12th of a month's salary for each month of service

(ii.) If an officer confirmed in a pensionable post dies while in service after the completion of 5 years' service (which may include service in any territory under His Majesty's protection) his dependant or dependants may be paid, with the approval of His Excellency the Governor, a gratuity not exceeding one year's pensionable emoluments.

Widows' and Orphans' Pension Fund.

An officer's widow and orphans are eligible for a pension from the Widows' and Orphans' Pension Fund to which every officer monthly contributes 4 per cent. of his salary.

Note.—The cadre, salary, allowances, and other conditions of service as set forth in this paragraph are liable to revision when the report of the Salaries and Cadres Commission has been considered by Government. Salaries are at present subject to a temporary levy, which amounts to 10 per cent. on salaries of Rs. 4,800 (£320) and over.

- (j) To hire, lease, or purchase land either with any other person or company or otherwise, and to erect a factory and other buildings thereon or on any land already leased or owned by the Company at the cost of the Company and such other person or company or otherwise, and to lease any factory or other buildings from any company or person.
- (k) To enter into any agreement with any company or person for the working of any factory erected or leased as provided in (i), or for the manufacture, and preparation for market of tea, rubber, or any other produce in such or any other factory.
- (l) To prepare, cure, manufacture, treat, and prepare for market tea, rubber, coconuts, cacao, plumbago, minerals, and (or) other crops or produce, and to sell, ship, dispose of such tea, rubber, cacao, coconuts, plumbago, minerals, crops, and produce either raw or manufactured, at such time and places, and in such manner as shall be deemed expedient.
- (m) To buy, sell, warehouse, transport, trade, and deal in tea, rubber, coconuts, cacao, coffee, and other plants and seed, and rice and other food required for coolies, labourers, and others employed on estates and other products, wares, merchandise, articles, and things of any kind whatever.
- (n) To work mines or quarries and to find, win, get, work, crush, smelt, manufacture, or otherwise deal with ores, metals, minerals, oils, precious and other stones, deposits, and products, and generally to carry on the business of miners, manufacturers, growers, planters, and exporters of tea, rubber, cacao, chocolate, coconuts, and other products, or any such business on behalf of the Company or as agents for others and on commission or otherwise.
- (o) To act as agents, attorneys, brokers, or trustees for any person, firm, or company, and to undertake and perform sub-contracts, and also to act in any of the business of the Company through or by means of agents, attorneys, brokers, sub-contractors, or others.
- (p) To establish and carry on a dairy farm, and to buy and sell live stock, and to sell and deal in milk and dairy produce, wholesale or retail.
- (q) To establish and maintain in Ceylon or elsewhere, stores, shops, and places for the sale of tea, coconuts, rubber, cacao, chocolate, coffee, and articles of food, drink, or refreshment, wholesale or retail; and to establish in any part or parts of the world branch establishments and (or) agencies for carrying on or developing the business of the Company or any branch thereof; and generally to carry on the business of merchants, exporters, importers, traders, engineers, or any other trade, business or undertaking whatsoever.
- (r) To cultivate, manage, and superintend estates and properties in Ceylon or elsewhere, to act as agents for the investment, loan, payment, transmission, and collection of money and for the purchase, sale, improvement, development, and management of property, including concerns and undertakings, and to transact any other agency business of any kind.
- (s) To let, lease, sell, exchange, or mortgage the Company's estates, lands, buildings, or other property, or any part or parts thereof, whether in consideration of rents, money, or securities for money, shares, debentures, or securities in any other company, or for any other consideration, and otherwise to trade in, dispose of, or deal with the same or any part thereof.
- (t) To borrow or receive on loan money for the purpose of the Company upon the security of cash credit bonds, or of hypothecation or mortgages of the Company's property or any part or parts thereof, or otherwise, as shall be thought most expedient and in particular by the issue of debentures, debenture stock, or bonds to bearer or otherwise, either charged upon all or any part of the Company's present or future property (including uncalled capital), or not so charge, as shall be thought best.
- (u) To cause or permit any debenture stock, bonds, debentures, mortgages, charges, incumbrances, liens, or securities of or belonging to or made or issued by the Company or affecting its property or rights, or any of the terms thereof to be renewed, extended, varied, redeemed, exchanged,

- transferred, or satisfied, as shall be thought fit, also to pay off and re-borrow the moneys secured thereby, or any part or parts thereof.
- (v) To draw, make, accept; and endorse; bills of lading, warrants, bills of exchange, promissory notes, and other transferable or negotiable instruments for the purposes of the Company.
- (w) To unite, co-operate, amalgamate, or enter into partnership or any arrangement for sharing profits of union of interests or any other arrangement with any person or company already engaged in or hereafter to be established for the purpose of carrying on business having objects wholly or in part similar or analogous or subsidiary to those of the Company or to any of them, or capable of being conducted so as to benefit this Company, either directly or indirectly, and to subscribe for or otherwise acquire for the benefit and in the name of the Company or otherwise, and pay for in any manner that may be agreed upon, either in money or in shares or bonds or otherwise, and to hold any shares, stock, or other interest in any such company, and to promote the formation of any such company.
- (x) To establish and support or aid in the establishment and support of associations, institutions, funds, trusts, and conveniences calculated to benefit employees or ex-employees of this Company, or of any business or company in which this Company is interested, or the dependents or connections of such persons and to grant pensions and allowances and to make payments towards insurance and to subscribe or guarantee money for charitable or benevolent objects or for any exhibition or for any public, general, or useful object.
- (y) To acquire by purchase in money, shares, bonds, or otherwise, and undertake all or any of the business, property, assets, and liabilities of any person or company carrying on any business in Ceylon or elsewhere which this Company is authorized to carry on, or possessed of property suitable for the purposes of this Company.
- (z) To sell the property, business, or undertaking of the Company, or any part or parts thereof, for such consideration as the Company shall think fit, and in particular for shares, stocks, debentures, or securities of any other company.
- (z1) To procure the Company to be registered or incorporated in Ceylon, and, if and when necessary, or thought advisable, elsewhere.
- (z2) To lend money on any terms and in any manner and on any security, and in particular on the security of plantations, factories, growing crops, produce, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds, bills of lading, warrants, stocks, shares, debentures, and book debts, or without any security at all.
- (z3) To invest and deal with the moneys of the Company not immediately required upon such securities and in such manner as may from time to time be determined.
- (z4) To promote and establish any other company whatsoever and to subscribe to and hold the shares or stock of any other company or any part thereof.
- (z5) To pay for any lands and real or personal, immovable, movable, estate, or property, or assets of any kind acquired or to be acquired by the Company, or for any services rendered or to be rendered to the Company, and generally to pay or discharge any consideration to be paid or given by the Company, in money or in shares or debentures or debenture stock or obligations of the Company or partly in one way and partly in another, or otherwise howsoever with power to issue any shares either fully or partly paid up for such purpose.
- (z6) To accept as consideration for the sale or disposal of any lands and real or personal immovable and movable, estate, property, and assets of the Company of any kind sold or otherwise disposed of by the Company, or in discharge of any other consideration to be received by the Company, in money or in shares, the shares (whether wholly or partially paid up) of any company or the mortgages, debentures, or obligations of any company or person, or partly one and partly the other.
- (z7) To distribute among the Shareholders in specie any property of the Company whether by way of dividend or upon a return of capital, but so that no distribution amounting to a reduction of capital be made, except with the sanction for the time being required by law:

- (z8) To carry on any other business which the Company may, from time to time, decide to carry on.
- (z9) To do all such things as are incidental or conducive to the above objects or any of them.

And it is hereby declared that the word "Company" in this clause (where it does not refer to The Ceylon Prudential Investments, Limited), shall be deemed to include any partnership or other body of persons, whether incorporated or not incorporated and whether domiciled in Ceylon or elsewhere, and the intention is that the objects specified in each paragraph, except where otherwise expressed in such paragraph, shall in no wise be limited or restricted by reference to or inference from the terms of any other paragraph.

4. The liability of the Shareholders is limited.

5. The capital of the Company is Rs. 500,000 divided into 500,000 shares of Re. 1 each, with power to increase or reduce the capital.

The shares forming the capital (original, increased, or reduced) of the Company may be subdivided into such classes with any preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto, and be held upon such terms as may be prescribed by the Articles of Association and regulation of the Company for the time being or otherwise.

We, the several persons whose names and addresses are subscribed, are desirous of being formed into a Company in pursuance of this Memorandum of Association, and we respectfully agree to take the number of shares in the capital of the Company set opposite our respective names.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE CEYLON PRUDENTIAL INVESTMENTS, LIMITED.

Table C, not to apply.—The regulations contained in the Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies' Ordinance, 1861," shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution.

Power to alter Articles.—The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of, or in addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained and comprised in these Articles or not.

INTERPRETATION CLAUSE.

1. *Interpretation.*—In the interpretation of these presents the following words and expressions shall have the following meanings, unless such meanings be inconsistent with, or repugnant to, the subject or context, viz. :—

The word "Company" means the above-named Company.

The "Ordinance" means and includes "Joint Stock Companies' Ordinance, 1861," and any statutory modification thereof.

"These presents" means and includes the Memorandum of Association and the Articles of Association of the Company from time to time in force.

"Capital" means the capital for the time being raised or authorized to be raised for the purposes of the Company.

"Shares" means the shares from time to time into which the capital of the Company may be divided.

"Presence or present" at a meeting means presence or present personally or by proxy or by attorney.

"Directors" means the Directors for the time being of the Company or (as the case may be) the Directors assembled at a Board.

"Board" means a meeting of the Directors or (as the context may require) the Directors assembled at a Board meeting, acting through at least a quorum of their body in the exercise of authority duly given to them.

"Persons" means partnerships, associations, corporations, companies, unincorporated or incorporated by Ordinance and registration, as well as individuals.

"Office" means the registered office for the time being of the Company.

"Seal" means the common seal for the time being of the Company.

"Month" means a calendar month.

"Writing" means printed matter or print as well as writing.

Words importing the singular number only include the plural, and *vice versa*.

Words importing the masculine gender include the feminine, and *vice versa*.

"Member" or Holder means a Shareholder.

"Secretary" includes any person appointed to perform the duties of Secretary temporarily.

"Extraordinary resolution" means a resolution passed by three-fourths in number and value of such Shareholders of the Company for the time being entitled to vote as may be present in person or by proxy (in cases where by these Articles proxies are allowed) at any meeting of which notice specifying the intention to propose such resolution has been duly given.

BUSINESS.

2. *Company may proceed to Business as soon as Subscription sufficient.*—The Company may proceed to carry out the objects for which it is established, and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit; and if the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted, as soon as in the judgment of the Directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied for.

3. *Directors to carry on Business of Company.*—The business of the Company shall be carried on by, or under the management or direction of, the Directors, and subject only to the control of General Meetings, in accordance with these presents.

4. *Members visiting Works.*—No member shall be entitled without the permission of a Director to visit or inspect any portion of the works and premises of the Company at any time. The Directors shall have absolute power to refuse such application without assigning any reason therefor.

5. *Office.*—The Chief Office of the Company shall be in Batticaloa or such other place as the Directors may from time to time determine, and the business of the Company shall be carried on at such place or places as the Directors may from time to time determine.

CAPITAL.

6. *Capital.*—The nominal capital of the Company is Five hundred thousand Rupees (Rs. 500,000) divided into 500,000 shares of (Re. 1 each).

7. *Power to increase.*—The Directors may, with the sanction of a special resolution of the Company in General Meeting, increase the capital of the Company by the creation of new shares of such amounts per share and in the aggregate and with such special, preferential, deferred, qualified, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto as such resolution shall direct.

8. Except so far as otherwise provided by the conditions of issue or by these presents, any capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the same provisions in all respects with reference to the payments of allotment money, calls and instalments, transfer, transmission, forfeiture, lien, surrender, and otherwise, as if it had formed part of the original capital.

9. *Power to reduce.*—The Directors may also with the sanction of a special resolution of the Company subdivide or consolidate the shares of the Company, or reduce the capital by paying off capital or cancelling capital which has been lost or is unrepresented by available assets or reducing the liability on the shares or otherwise as may seem expedient, and capital may be paid off upon the footing that it may be called up again or otherwise.

SHARES.

10. *Directors may issue unissued Shares.*—The Company may issue the balance capital whenever the Directors shall think fit and may make arrangements on the issue of shares for a difference between the holders of such shares in the amount of calls to be paid, and the time of payment of such calls.

11. *Instalments to be paid when due.*—If by the conditions of allotment of any share the whole or part of the amount thereof shall be payable by instalments, every such instalment shall, when due, be paid to the Company by the holder of the share.

12. *Shares to be offered to existing Shareholders.*—Subject to any directions to the contrary that may be given by the meeting which sanctions the increase of capital or any subsequent meeting prior to the offer hereinafter mentioned, all new shares shall be offered to the members in proportion to the existing shares held by them of the particular class to be issued so that the new shares of the particular class shall be offered to holders of that class only on such terms as the Board shall determine, and such offer shall be made by notice limiting the time within which, if not accepted, it will be deemed to be declined, and after the expiration of such time or on receipt of an earlier intimation from the member to whom such notice is given, that he declines to accept the shares offered, the Directors may from time to time dispose of the same to such person or persons, companies, trusts, or corporations, whether members or not, in such manner as they in their absolute discretion may think fit.

13. *Increased Capital to be issued as directed by General Meeting.*—In case of the increase of the capital of the Company by the creation of new shares, such new shares shall be issued upon such terms and conditions, and with such preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights and privileges annexed thereto, as the General Meeting resolving on the creation thereof, or any other General Meeting of the Company shall direct, and, if no direction be given, as the Directors shall determine, and in particular such shares may be issued with a preferential or qualified right to the dividends, and in the distribution of the assets of the Company, and with a special or without any right of voting.

To be offered to existing Shareholders unless otherwise directed.—Subject to any direction to the contrary that may be given by the meeting that sanctions the increase of capital, all new shares shall be offered to the Shareholders in proportion as nearly as possible to the existing shares held by them, and such offer shall be made by notice specifying the number of shares to which the Shareholder is entitled and limiting a time within which the offer, if not accepted, will be deemed to be declined, and after the expiration of such time, or on the receipt of an intimation from the Shareholder to whom such notice is given that he declines to accept the shares offered, the same shall be disposed of in such manner as the Directors may determine. Provided that the Directors may, at their discretion, allot such new shares or any portion of them to the vendor or vendors of any property or lands being acquired by the Company in payment of the whole or any part of the purchase price of any such property or lands, and that without offering the shares so allotted to the Shareholders.

14. *Underwriting Commission.*—The Company may pay to any person a commission at a rate not exceeding 10 per cent. or of an amount not exceeding such rate in consideration of his subscribing or agreeing to subscribe whether absolutely or conditionally for any shares in the Company or procuring or agreeing to procure subscriptions whether absolute or conditional for any shares in the Company.

15. *Payment of Brokerage and Rights to further Shares.*—The Company may pay a reasonable sum of brokerage and may make any allotment on the terms that the person to whom such allotment is made shall have the right to call for further shares at such time or times and at such price or prices (not being less than par) as may be thought fit.

16. *Shareholders to accept Shares in Writing.*—Every person taking any share in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by under writing his hand in such form as the Company may from time to time direct.

17. *Shares in Firm Name.*—Shares may be registered in the name of a firm or partnership and any partner of the firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to give proxies in respect of shares registered in the name of the firm.

18. *Joint-Shareholders.*—Shares may be registered in the names of two or more persons jointly.

19. *Powers and Rights of Joint-holders.*—Any one of the joint-holders of a share, other than a firm, may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but only one of such joint-Shareholders shall be entitled to the right of voting and of giving proxies and exercising the other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, and if the joint-holders cannot arrange amongst themselves as to who shall vote or give proxies and exercise such other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares, shall vote or give proxies and exercise those rights and powers; provided, however, that in the event of such first registered Shareholder being

absent from the Island, the first registered Shareholder then resident in Ceylon shall vote or give proxies and exercise all such rights and powers as aforesaid.

20. *Survivorship of Joint-holders.*—In case of the death of any one or more of the joint-holders of any shares, the survivor or survivors shall be the only person or persons recognized by the Company as having any title to, or interest in, such shares.

21. *Company will not recognize Equities.*—The Company shall not be bound to recognize (even though having notice of) any contingent, future, partial, or equitable interest in the nature of a trust or otherwise in any share, or any other right in respect of any share, except any absolute right thereto in the person from time to time registered as the holder thereof, and except also the right of any person under clause 41 to become a Shareholder in respect of any share.

22. *Joint-holders severally liable for Calls.*—The joint-holders of a share shall be severally as well as jointly liable for the payment of all instalments and calls due in respect of such share.

CERTIFICATES.

23. *When entitled and nature of Certificate.*—Every Shareholder shall be entitled to a certificate or certificates under the common seal of the Company, specifying the share or shares, held by him and the amount paid thereon, and such certificates may be in such form as the Board may from time to time prescribe provided that in the case of shares registered in the names of two or more persons the Company shall not be bound to issue more than one certificate to all the joint-holders, and delivery of such certificate to any one of them shall be sufficient delivery to all. A Shareholder shall be entitled to one certificate for the whole of his shares or to several certificates each for a part of such share.

24. *As to Issue of New Certificate in place of One defaced, lost, or destroyed.*—If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then upon production thereof to the Directors, they may order the same to be cancelled, and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then, upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Directors, and on such indemnity as the Directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof may be given to the person entitled to such lost or destroyed certificate. A sum of fifty cents shall be payable for such new certificate.

25. When a share is forfeited and the certificate thereof is not delivered up to the Company the Board may issue a new certificate of the share distinguishing it as they think fit from the certificate not delivered up.

CALLS.

26. *Calls.*—The Board may from time to time (subject to any term upon which any share or shares have been or may be issued) make such calls as they think fit upon the members in respect of all moneys unpaid on their shares. Each member shall be liable to pay the calls so made, and any money payable on any share under the terms of allotment thereof to the persons or Banking Company and at the times and places appointed by the Board, provided that no call shall exceed one-fourth of the nominal amount of the share, and all calls shall be made payable at intervals of not less than two months.

27. *Interest on overdue Calls.*—If any Shareholder fails to pay the amount of any call due by him on or before the day appointed for payment thereof, he shall be liable to pay interest on the same at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the day appointed for the payment thereof to the time of actual payment.

28. *Time of Calls.*—A call be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution of the Directors authorizing such call was passed.

29. *Directors may give Time to pay Call.*—The Directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more Shareholder or Shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof on such terms as the Directors may determine. But no Shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension except as a matter of grace or favour.

30. *Payment of Calls in Advance.*—The Directors may at their discretion receive from any of the Shareholders willing to advance the same, and upon such terms as they think fit, all or any part of the moneys uncalled upon their respective shares beyond the sums actually called up; and upon the moneys so paid in advance, or upon so much thereof as from time to time and at any time thereafter exceeds the amount of the calls then made upon, and due in respect of the shares in respect of which such advances have been made, the Board may pay or allow interest at such rate as the Shareholders paying such sums in advance and the Directors may agree upon, not exceeding, however, eight per centum per annum.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

31. *Shareholders may transfer subject to Articles.*—Subject to the restrictions contained in these Articles, any Shareholder may transfer all or any of his shares by instrument in writing.

32. *No Transfer to Infant.*—No transfer of shares shall be made to an infant or person of unsound mind.

33. *Register of Transfers.*—The Company shall keep a book or books, to be called "The Register of Transfers" in which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

34. *In what Cases Board may decline to register Transfer.*—The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company have a lien, or otherwise; or in case of shares not fully paid up, to any person not approved of by them; and in no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declination shall be absolute.

35. *Transfer to be left at Office and Evidence of Title given. Fee on Transfer.*—Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office of the Company to be registered, accompanied by the certificate for the shares to be transferred and by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of two rupees and fifty cents or such other sum as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid to the Company for the registration of every such transfer; upon payment thereof the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Article 34, shall register the transferee as a Shareholder and retain the instrument of transfer.

36. *Form of Transfer.*—The instrument of transfer of any share shall be signed both by transferor and transferee, and the transferor shall be deemed to remain the holder of such share until the name of the transferee is entered in the register in respect thereof. Such instrument of transfer shall be made in the usual common form or as near thereto as the case will admit.

37. *Directors to arrange for Registration without Meeting.*—The Directors may by such means as they shall deem expedient, authorize the registration of transferees as Shareholders, without the necessity of any meeting of the Directors for that purpose.

38. *Directors not bound to inquire into Validity of Transfer.*—In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming a transfer of any share in accordance with these Articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring, or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously declared in respect thereof, but only if at all, upon the transferee.

39. *When Transfer Books may be closed.*—The Register of Transfers may be closed at such times and for such periods as the Directors may from time to time determine, provided always that it shall not be closed for more than thirty days in any year.

TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

40. *Transmission of Shares.*—The executors, or administrators, or the heirs of a deceased Shareholder (not being one of several joint-holders) shall be the only person recognized by the Company, as having any title to the shares of such Shareholder.

41. *Representative of Shareholder to be registered or nominate Transfer.*—Any guardian of any infant Shareholder, or any committee of a lunatic Shareholder, or any persons becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any Shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer, shall, upon producing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this clause, or of his title as the Directors think sufficient, be forthwith entitled, subject to the provisions herein contained, to be registered as a Shareholder in respect of such shares; or may, subject to the regulations as to transfers hereinbefore contained, transfer the same to some other person.

42. *In default of Registration Company may sell Shares after Twelve Months.*—If any person who shall become entitled to be registered in respect of any share under clause 41, shall not, from any cause whatever, within twelve calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue be registered in respect of such share or if, in the case of the death of any Shareholder, no person shall, within twelve calendar months after such death, be registered as a Shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased Shareholder, the Company may sell such shares, either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money; and the purchaser

shall be entitled to be registered in respect of such shares, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same, and the nett proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all moneys in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold shall be paid to the person entitled thereto.

SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE OF SHARES.

43. *Directors may accept Surrender of Shares.*—The Directors may accept, in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed a surrender of the shares of Shareholders who may be desirous of retiring from the Company provided such acceptance is properly legalized.

44. *If Call or Instalment not paid Notice may be given.*—If any Shareholder fails to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the Directors may at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such Shareholder requiring him to pay the same together with any interest that may have accrued, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such non-payment.

45. *Form of Notice.*—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the notice) on, and a place or places at, which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as aforesaid are to be paid. The notice shall also state that, in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed, the shares in respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.

46. *If Notice not complied with Shares may be forfeited.*—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with, every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, with interest and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared or forfeited by a resolution of the Board to that effect. Such forfeiture shall include all dividends declared in respect of the forfeited shares and not actually paid before the forfeiture.

47. *Shareholder still liable for Calls.*—Any Shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall, notwithstanding be liable to pay and shall forthwith pay to the Company all calls, instalments, premia, interest, and expenses owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of the forfeiture, together with interest thereon from the time of forfeiture until payment at nine per centum per annum, and the Directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.

48. *Forfeited Shares the Property of the Company.*—Every share surrendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, reallocated, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the Board shall think fit.

49. *Claims against the Company extinguished.*—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in, and also of all claims and demands against, the Company in respect of the share and the proceeds thereof, and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

50. *Validity of Sale.*—A certificate in writing under the hands of one of the Directors and of the Secretary or Secretaries that a share has been duly surrendered, or forfeited, stating the time when it was surrendered or forfeited, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated as against all persons who would have been entitled to the share but for such surrender or forfeiture, and such certificate and the receipt of the Company for the price of such share shall constitute a good title to such share, and a certificate of proprietorship shall be delivered to any person who may purchase the same from the Company, and thereupon such purchaser shall be deemed the holder of such share, discharged from all calls due prior to such purchase; and he shall not be bound to see to the application of the purchase money, nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.

51. *Power to annul Forfeiture.*—The Directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share or shares, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money for the deficit, as they shall think fit, not being less than nine per centum per annum on the amount of the sums wherein default in payment had been made, but no share *bona fide* sold or re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of under Article 48 hereof, shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

52. *Company's Lien on Shares.*—The Company shall have a first charge or paramount lien upon all the shares of any holder or joint-holders for all moneys for the time being due to the Company by such holder or by all or any of such joint-holders respectively, either in respect of such shares or of other shares held by such holder or joint-holders or in respect of any other debt, liability, or engagement whatsoever and whether due from any such holder individually or jointly with others, including all calls which the Directors shall have resolved to make, although the times appointed for the payment thereof shall not have arrived; and where any share is held by more persons than one, the Company shall be entitled to the said charge or lien in respect of any money due to the Company from any of such persons. And the Directors may decline to register any transfer of shares subject to such charge or lien.

53. *As to enforcing Lien by Sale.*—Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors, and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executor, or administrators, or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company, and default shall have been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder over whose share the lien exists be in India or elsewhere abroad, sixty days' notice shall be allowed him.

54. *Application of Proceeds of Sale.*—The nett proceeds of any such sale shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of such debts, liabilities, or engagements, and the residue (if any) paid to such Shareholder or his representatives.

55. *Directors' Certificate Conclusive Evidence.*—A certificate in writing under the hands of one of the Directors and of the Secretary or Secretaries that the power of sale given by clause 53 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts, therein stated.

56. *Two Directors may execute a Transfer.*—Upon any such sale two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer with the certificate last aforesaid shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such shares.

PREFERENCE SHARES.

57. *Power to create Preference Shares.*—Any shares from time to time to be issued or created may from time to time be issued with any such right or preference, whether in respect of dividend or of repayment of capital, or both, or any such other special privilege or advantage over any shares previously issued or then about to be issued (other than shares issued with a preference), or at such a premium or with such deferred rights as compared with any shares previously issued or then about to be issued, or subject to any such conditions or provisions, and with any such right or without any right of voting, and generally on such terms as the Company may from time to time by special resolution determine.

58. *Class Meetings.*—Whenever the capital by reason of the issue of preference shares or otherwise, is divided into different classes of shares, all or any of the rights and privileges attached to each class may be modified by agreement between the Company and any person purporting to contract on behalf of that class, provided such agreement is confirmed by an extraordinary resolution passed at a separate General Meeting of the holders of shares in that class and all the provisions hereinafter contained as to General Meetings shall *mutatis mutandis* apply to every such meeting, but so that the quorum thereof shall be three members personally present holding shares of that class.

59. *Proceedings at Class Meetings.*—Any meeting for the purpose of the last preceding clause shall be convened and conducted in all respects as nearly as possible in the same way as an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company, provided that no member not being a Director, shall be entitled to notice thereof or to attend thereat, unless he be a holder of shares of the class intended to be affected by the resolution, and that no vote shall be given except in respect of a share of that class, and that at any such meeting a poll may be demanded in writing by any members personally present and entitled to vote at the meeting.

BORROWING POWERS.

60. *Directors' Power to borrow.*—The Directors may from time to time raise or borrow for the purposes of the Company or secure payment of any sum or sums of money. The Directors may raise or secure the repayment of such moneys in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as they think fit, and in particular by mortgages or bonds or by the issue of debentures or debenture stock of the Company, perpetual or terminable, and with or without

trust, deeds creating a charge or charges upon all or any part of the property of the Company (both present and future) including its uncalled capital for the time being.

61. *Loans by Members.*—The Directors may also if they think fit receive from any of the members willing to advance the same all or any of the moneys not at the time payable on their respective shares and on the moneys so paid in advance or so much thereof as from time to time exceeds the amount payable on shares in respect of which such advance has been made, may pay interest at such rate as the Directors may think fit.

62. *Power to create Securities.*—For the purpose of securing the repayment of any such money so borrowed or raised, or for any other purposes, the Directors may grant, create, execute, and issue any mortgages, cash credits, debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company, charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, lands, property, rights, and assets of the Company, both present and future, including uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or may make, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills of exchange.

63. *Power to vary Securities.*—Any such securities may be issued either at par or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time be cancelled, or discharged, varied, or exchanged as the Directors may think fit, and may contain special privileges as to redemption, surrender, drawings, allotment of shares, or otherwise.

64. *Securities may be assigned free of Equities.*—Every debenture or other instrument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money may be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued.

65. The Board may with the sanction of the Company previously given in General Meeting convert any paid up shares into stock.

66. *Transfer of Stock.*—When any shares have been converted into stock the several holders of such stock may thenceforth transfer their respective interests therein, or any part of such interests, in the same manner and subject to the same regulations as and subject to which any shares in the capital of the Company may be transferred, or as near thereto as circumstances admit; but the Board may from time to time if they think fit, fix the minimum amount of stock transferable, and direct that fractions of a rupee shall not be transferable with power nevertheless at their discretion to waive the observance of such rules in any particular case.

67. *Rights to Stockholders.*—The stock shall confer on the holders thereof respectively the same rights as would have been conferred by shares of equal amounts of the class converted in the capital of the Company but so that none of such rights except the participation of the profits of the Company shall be conferred by any such amount of stock as would not if existing in shares of the class converted have conferred such rights.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

68. *First General Meeting.*—The First General Meeting shall be held at such time not being more than twelve months after the incorporation of the Company and at such place as the Directors may determine.

69. *General Meetings to be held once a Year.*—Subsequent General Meetings shall be held once in every year, at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting, and if no time or place is so prescribed, then at such place and at such time as soon after the first day in each year as may be determined by the Directors.

70. *Other General Meetings, Extraordinary Meetings.*—The General Meetings mentioned in the last preceding clause shall be called Ordinary General Meetings; all other meetings of the Company shall be called Extraordinary General Meetings.

71. *When Extraordinary Meetings to be called.*—The Directors may whenever they think fit, call an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company, and the Directors shall do so upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one-tenth of the number of Shareholders of the Company for the time being, or by any Shareholder or Shareholders holding in the aggregate one-tenth part of the shares of the Company for the time being subscribed for, upon which all calls or other sums then due have been paid.

72. *Requisition must state Object of Meeting.*—Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, shall be addressed to the Directors, and shall be sent to the registered office of the Company.

Time within which Meeting must be convened.—Upon the receipt of such requisition, the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the delivery of the requisition, the requisitionists may

themselves convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such place and such time as the Shareholders convening the meeting may themselves fix but not later than three months after the date of deposit of the first requisition. If at any such meeting a resolution requiring confirmation at another meeting is passed, the Directors shall convene a further Extraordinary General Meeting for the purpose of considering the resolution, and if thought fit, of confirming it as a special resolution, and if the Directors do not convene the meeting within seven days from the date of the passing of the first resolution the requisitionists, or a majority of them in value, may themselves convene a meeting.

73. *At least Five Days' Notice of Resolution to be given.*—Any Shareholder may, on giving not less than five days' previous notice of any resolution, submit the same to a meeting.

74. *How Notice to be given.*—Such notice shall be given by leaving a copy of the resolution at the registered office of the Company.

75. *Eight Weeks' Notice of every General Meeting.*—Eight weeks' notice at least of every General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, and by whomsoever convened, specifying the place, date, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given by notice to the Shareholders as hereinafter provided or in such other manner (if any) as may be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting. Where it is proposed to pass a special resolution the two meetings may be convened by one and the same notice and it is to be no objection to such notice that it only convenes the 2nd meeting contingently upon the resolution being passed by the requisite majority at the 1st meeting. The accidental omission to give notice of any meeting to or the non-receipt of such notice by any of the Shareholders shall not invalidate any resolution passed at any such meeting.

76. *What Business may be transacted at Ordinary General Meeting.*—Every Ordinary General Meeting shall be competent, without special notice having been given of the purpose for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted thereat, to receive and discuss any report and any accounts presented thereto by the Directors, and to pass resolutions in approval or disapproval thereof, and to declare dividends, and to elect Directors and Auditors in place of those retiring by rotation, and to fix the remuneration of the Auditors; and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business whatsoever of which special mention shall have been given in the notice or notices upon which the meeting was convened.

77. *No other Business without Notice.*—With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing Article as to the business which may be transacted at ordinary General Meetings without notice, no General Meeting, ordinary or extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specially mentioned in the notice or notices upon which it was convened except resolutions submitted under Article 73.

78. *Quorum to be present.*—No business shall be transacted at a General Meeting, unless there shall be present in person at the commencement of the business two or more persons, being Shareholders entitled to vote, or persons being proxies or attorneys of Shareholders entitled to vote.

79. *Procedure if Quorum not present.*—If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of persons shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place; and no notice of such adjournment need be given.

80. *Chairman.*—The Chairman (if any) of the Directors shall be entitled to take the Chair at every General Meeting, whether ordinary or extraordinary; or if there be no Chairman, or if at any meeting, he shall not be present at the time appointed for holding such meeting, or if he shall refuse to take the Chair, the Shareholders shall choose another Director as Chairman; and if no Directors be present or if all the Directors present decline to take the Chair, then the Shareholders present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman.

81. *No Discussion when Chair vacant.*—No business shall be discussed at any General Meeting, except the election of a Chairman, whilst the chair is vacant.

82. *Adjournment.*—The Chairman may, with the consent of the meeting, adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place unless due notice thereof shall be given.

83. *Minutes of General Meeting.*—Minutes of the proceedings of every General Meeting whether ordinary or extraordinary shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall when so entered be signed as soon as practicable by the Chairman of the same meeting.

or by the Chairman of the succeeding meeting, and the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the Chairman.

VOTING AT MEETINGS.

84. *Votes.*—At any meeting every resolution shall be decided by a show of hands and in case their shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman at such meeting shall be entitled to give a casting vote in addition to the votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder; and unless a poll be immediately demanded by some Shareholder or in the case of a special resolution by five Shareholders, present and entitled to vote, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry to that effect in the Minute Book of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of the number or proportion of votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution. The power of demanding a poll conferred by this clause may be exercised by the proxy or attorney of any Shareholder duly appointed in that behalf.

85. *Demand for a Poll.*—If at any meeting a poll be demanded by some Shareholder or by his proxy or attorney, or in the case of a special resolution by five Shareholders, or by their proxies or attorneys present at the meeting and entitled to vote, the meeting shall, if necessary, be adjourned and the poll shall be taken at such time and place and in such manner as the Chairman shall direct, and in such case every Shareholder shall have the number of votes to which he may be entitled as hereinafter provided; and in case at any such poll there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman of the meeting at which such poll shall have been demanded shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder or proxy or attorney, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in such meeting.

86. *Demand for a Poll not to prevent Continuance of Meeting.*—The demand of a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded.

87. *No Poll on Election of Chairman.*—No poll shall be demanded on the election of a Chairman of the meeting or on any question of adjournment.

88. *Voting Rights.*—On a show of hands every Shareholder present in person shall have one vote. Where a Shareholder is present by an attorney who is not a Shareholder such attorney shall be entitled to vote for such Shareholder on a show of hands. In case of a poll every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share up to ten; he shall have an additional vote for every five shares beyond the first ten shares up to one hundred, and an additional vote for every ten shares held by him beyond the first hundred shares.

89. *Votes in respect of Shares of Deceased or Bankrupt Members.*—The parent or guardian or curator of an infant Shareholder, the Committee or other legal guardian or curator of any lunatic Shareholder, the husband of any female Shareholder not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator of any deceased Shareholder, or any one of such persons as aforesaid, if more than one, shall not be entitled to vote in the place of such infant, lunatic, female, or deceased Shareholder, unless such person shall have been registered as Shareholder.

90. *Proxies and Attorneys permitted.*—Votes may be given either personally or by proxy or by attorney where there are joint registered holders of any share any one of such persons may vote at any meeting either personally or by proxy in respect of such share as if he were solely entitled thereto, and if more than one of such joint-holders be present at any meeting or at any poll personally or by proxy, that one of the said persons so present whose name stands first in the register in respect of such shares shall alone be entitled to vote in respect thereof.

91. *No Shareholder entitled to vote unless he has been a Registered Shareholder at least One Month.*—No Shareholder shall be entitled to be present or to vote either personally or by proxy or attorney at any meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares have been paid, and no Shareholder, other than the trustee or assignee of a bankrupt or representative of a deceased Shareholder, shall be entitled to be present or to vote at any meeting held after the expiration of three months from the registration of the Company, in respect of any share which he has acquired by transfer, unless he has been registered as the holder of the share in respect of which he claims to vote at least one month previous to the time of holding the meeting at which he proposes to vote.

92. *Proxy must be a Shareholder.*—No person shall be entitled to hold a proxy who is not a Shareholder in the Company, but this rule shall not apply to an attorney.

93. *Appointment of Proxy must be in Writing.*—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be printed or written and shall be signed by the appointor (whether a Shareholder or his attorney) or if such appointor be a company or corporation, it shall be under the common seal of such company or corporation. A proxy may be either general or special.

94. *Proxies.*—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be deposited at the registered office of the Company not less than forty-eight hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting at which such person named in such instrument proposes to vote.

Form of Proxy.—The instrument appointing a proxy may be in the following form:—

95. *Objection to vote must be made at Meeting or Poll.*—No objection shall be made to the validity of any vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) except at the meeting or poll at which such vote shall be tendered, and every vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) to which no objection shall be made at such meeting or poll shall be deemed valid for all purposes of such meeting or poll whatsoever.

96. *Shareholder may vote although interested in Result.*—No Shareholder shall be prevented from voting by reason of his being personally interested in the result of the voting.

DIRECTORS.

97. *Number of Directors.*—The number of Directors shall never be less than two or more than twelve; but this clause shall be construed as being directory only, and the continuing Directors or Director may act notwithstanding any number of vacancies.

Qualification of Directors.—The qualification of a Director shall be his holding in his own right at least to the value of Five hundred rupees (Rs. 500) and upon which all calls for the time being shall have been paid, and this qualification shall apply to the first Directors as well as to all future Directors. A Director may act before acquiring his qualification, but shall in any case acquire the same within six months from his appointment or election.

98. *Remuneration of Directors.*—As remuneration for their services the Directors shall be entitled to appropriate a sum not exceeding One thousand Rupees (Rs. 1,000) annually to be divided between them in such manner as they may determine, but the Company in General Meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future, and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration granted for special or extra services hereinafter referred to, nor any extra remuneration to the Managing Directors of the Company. The Directors shall also be entitled to be paid their reasonable travelling and hotel and other expenses incurred in consequence of their attendance at Board meetings and otherwise in execution of their duties as Directors.

99. *Kasinather Vaitialingam Marcandan Somasundaram* (who is herein referred to as the Life Director) shall (subject to the provisions of Regulation 101) be entitled to hold office so long as he lives. The ordinary Directors (which term shall mean the Directors for the time being of the Company other than the Life Director and any alternate Director appointed by a Life Director) shall hold office until the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company when they shall retire but shall be eligible for re-election.

A Life Director shall, subject to the provisions of the Article 101 have power to appoint any member of the Company or any other person to be an Alternate Director during his absence from Ceylon and such appointment shall have effect and such appointee while he holds office shall be entitled to notice of meetings of Directors and to attend and vote thereat accordingly and generally to exercise all the rights and functions of such absent Director, subject to any limitations or restrictions in the instrument appointing him but he shall not require any qualification and he shall *ipso facto* vacate office and when his appointor returns to Ceylon or vacates office as a Life Director. An appointment under this regulation shall be effected by an instrument in writing under the hand of the appointor

and any appointments so effected can be cancelled by the appointor by an instrument in writing under his hand and such Alternate Director shall vacate office as soon as notice in writing of the execution of such instrument of cancellation shall be received at the office of the Company, such Alternate Director may be one of the Ordinary Directors of the Company in which case he shall be entitled to vote in both capacities but one person holding the office of Ordinary Director and Alternate Director shall not be quorum under Article 114. An Alternate Director shall in the absence of a direction to the contrary in the instrument appointing him be entitled to receive notice of and to vote at General Meetings of the Company on behalf of his appointor and generally to represent his appointor in the same manner as he had been appointed by a general proxy under the provisions of these Articles.

100. *Directors may be appointed Managing Director, &c.*—One or more of the Directors may be appointed by the Directors to act as Secretary, Manager, Managing Director, and (or) Agent, for such time and on such terms as the Directors may determine or may fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office, and they may from time to time revoke such appointment and appoint another or other Secretary, Manager, Managing Director and (or) Agent.

The Directors may confer on the Managing Director or Managing Directors all or any duties and powers that might be conferred on any Manager of the Company.

Directors may be remunerated for Extra Services.—If any Director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the Directors may arrange with such Director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, commission, or the payment of a lump sum of money, as they shall think fit.

101. *Disqualification of Directors.*—The office of the Directors shall be vacated:—

- (a) If he without the sanction of a General Meeting accept or hold any other office under the Company except that of Chairman, Managing Director, Secretary, Manager, or Trustee.
- (b) If he become bankrupt, or suspend payment, or compound with his creditors.
- (c) If (not being a Life Director) he absents himself from the Meeting of the Company for a period exceeding three months at any one time without the consent of the other Directors.
- (d) If he be found lunatic or become of unsound mind.
- (e) If (not being a Life Director) he be called upon by all the other Directors to resign his office.
- (f) If by notice in writing to the Company he resign his office.

102. *Not disqualified by acting in certain Capacities.*—No Director shall be disqualified by his office from contracting with the Company either as vendor, purchaser, or otherwise, nor shall any such contract or any contract or arrangement entered into by or on behalf of the Company in which any Director shall be in any way interested be avoided nor shall any Director so contracting or being so interested be liable to account to the Company for any profit realized by any such contract or arrangement by reason of such Director holding that office or the fiduciary relations thereby established, but it is declared that the fact of his having an interest must, unless all the Directors are interested, be disclosed by him at the meeting of the Directors at which the contract or arrangement is determined on if his interests then exist, or in any other case at the first meeting of the Directors after the acquisition of his interests, and that no Director shall as a Director vote in respect of any contract or arrangement in which he is so interested as aforesaid, and if he do vote his vote shall not be counted, but his prohibition shall not apply to any contracts or arrangements on behalf of the Company to give to the Directors or any of them security by way of indemnity or of security for advances or to a settlement or set off of cross claims, and it may at any time or times be suspended or relaxed by a special resolution at a General Meeting. A general notice that a Director is a member of any specified firm or company, and is to be regarded as interested in any transaction with such firm or company, shall be sufficient disclosure under this Article, and after such, general notice it shall not be necessary to give any special notice relating to any particular transaction with such firm or company as aforesaid.

103. Every retiring Director shall continue to hold office until his successor is duly appointed and on requiring shall if qualified, be eligible for re-election.

104. *Directors may resign.*—A Director may retire from his office upon giving one month's notice in writing to the Company of his intentions so to do, and such resignation shall take effect upon the expiration of such notice or its earlier acceptance by the Board.

105. Any casual vacancy occurring amongst the Directors may at any time be filled up by the Board, but any person so chosen to fill a casual vacancy shall retain his office until the next following ordinary General Meeting of the Company, and shall then be eligible for re-election. The continuing Directors may act notwithstanding any vacancy in their body.

106. *First Directors.*—The First Ordinary Directors shall be elected and appointed by the subscribers to the Memorandum of Association and shall hold office till the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company, where they shall retire but shall be eligible for re-election.

107. *To retire Annually.*—At the Second Ordinary General Meeting and at the Ordinary General Meeting in every subsequent year, one of the Directors for the time being shall retire from office as provided in Article 108.

108. *Retiring Directors how Determined.*—The Ordinary Directors to retire from office at the second, third, and fourth ordinary general meetings shall, unless the ordinary Directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by ballot; in every subsequent year the ordinary Directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in the office. Retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.

109. *Alternate Director.*—A Director may at any time appoint any other Director or any other person approved by a majority of the Board to act as alternate Director for him and may at any time cancel such appointment. A Director or such other person appointed alternate for a Director shall be entitled to perform all the functions of his appointor (including the functions of a Chairman of the Board). A Director appointed as alternate Director shall have an extra vote at all meetings for each Director whom he represents in addition to his own vote as a Director and in the event of his appointor being Chairman of the Board shall be entitled to a casting vote.

Any alternate Director shall *ipso facto* cease to be an alternate Director if his appointor ceases for any reason to be a Director.

All appointments and removals of alternate Directors shall be effected by writing under the hand of the Director making or revoking such appointment left at the office.

110. *General Meeting may increase or reduce Number of Directors.*—A General Meeting may from time to time increase or reduce the number of Directors and may also determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is to go out of office.

111. Each Director, Manager, Secretary, and other officer or servant of the Company shall be indemnified by the Company against, and it shall be the duty of the Directors out of the funds of the Company to pay, all costs, losses, and expenses which any such officer or servant may incur or become liable to by reason of any contract entered into, or act or deed done by him as such officer or servant, or in any way in discharge of his duties, including travelling expenses.

No Director or other officer of the Company shall be liable for the acts, receipts, neglects, or defaults of any other Director or officer or for joining in any receipts or other act for conformity or for any loss or expenses happening to the Company through the insufficiency or deficiency of title to any property acquired by order of the Directors for or on behalf of the Company, or for the insufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the moneys of the Company shall be invested, or for any loss or damage arising from the bankruptcy, insolvency, or tortious act of any person with whom any moneys, securities, or effects shall be deposited, or for any loss or damage occasioned by an error of judgment or oversight on his part or for any other loss, damage, or misfortune whatever which shall happen in the execution of the duties of his office or in relation thereto unless the same happen through his own dishonesty.

112. *No Director liable to contribute in excess of Unpaid Calls.*—No contribution shall be required from any present or past Director or Manager, exceeding the amount, if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past Shareholder.

POWERS OF DIRECTORS.

113. *General Powers of Company vested in Directors.*—The management of the business of the Company shall be vested in the Directors, and the Directors may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as the Company is, by its Memorandum of Association or otherwise, authorized to exercise and do, and are not hereby or by statute directed or required to be exercised or done by the Company in General Meeting, but subject nevertheless to the provisions of the Ordinance and of these presents, and to any regulations not being inconsistent with these presents from time to time made by the Company in

General Meeting; provided that no such regulation shall invalidate any prior act of the Directors which would have been valid if such regulation had not been made.

PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS.

114. *Meetings of Directors, Quorums, &c.*—The Directors may meet for the dispatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings at such places and times and in such manner as they may think fit, and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business. Until otherwise determined two Directors shall be a quorum.

115. *Directors may summon Meeting.*—A Director may at any time summon a meeting of Directors.

116. *Chairman of Board to be elected.*—The Board may elect a Chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the Directors shall be presided over by the Chairman, if one has been elected and if present, but if there be a vacancy in the office of Chairman, or if at any meeting of Directors the Chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then and in that case the Directors present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

117. *Questions to be decided by Majority of Votes.*—Any question which shall arise at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the Chairman thereof shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a Director.

118. *Directors may delegate Powers.*—The Board may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part and either as to persons or purposes, but every committee so formed shall, in exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board. All acts done by any such committee, in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effect as if done by the Board.

119. *Proceedings at Meetings.*—The meetings and proceedings of such committees shall be governed by the provisions herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of Directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such committee respectively, or any regulation imposed by the Board.

120. *Acts Valid notwithstanding Vacancy.*—The acts of the Board or of any committees appointed by the Board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Board or Committee, or defect in the appointment or qualifications of any Director or of any member of the committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect had existed, and as if such person had been duly appointed or qualified, provided the same be done before the discovery of the vacancy or defect.

121. *Resolution in Writing to be valid if signed by all Directors.*—A resolution in writing signed by all the Directors for the time being in Ceylon shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted.

MINUTES.

122. *Minutes.*—The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in a book or books to be provided for the purpose:—

- (1) Of all appointments (a) of officers and (b) Committees made by the Directors.
- (2) Of the names of the Directors present at each meeting of the Directors.
- (3) Of the names of the members of the committee appointed by the Board present at each meeting of the Committee.
- (4) Of all orders made by the Directors.
- (5) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of the Directors.
- (6) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all General Meetings of the Company.
- (7) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of Committee appointed by the Board.
- (8) Of the use of the Company's seal.

123. *Signature of Minutes.*—All such minutes shall be signed by the person who shall have presided as Chairman at the General Meeting, the Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing General Meeting or Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting as the case may be; and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively, shall, for all purposes whatsoever, be *prima facie* evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and transaction or occurrence

of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the Chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman, and of the date on which such meeting was held. Nevertheless the minute book may be amended according to the fact where it shall be shown to be erroneous and such corrections may be made by order of the Board or of a General Meeting as the case may be.

124. *Seal.*—The seal of the Company shall not be affixed to any instrument except in the presence of two or more of the Directors, or of one Director and the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall attest the sealing thereof; such attestation on the part of the Secretaries, in the event of a firm or registered company being the secretaries, being signified by a partner or duly authorized manager, director, secretary, attorney, or agent of the said firm or company signing for and on behalf of the said firm or company as such secretaries.

ACCOUNTS.

125. *Directors to keep Accounts.*—The Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid-up capital for the time being of the Company, and all sums of money received and expended by the Company, and of the matters in respect of which such sums were received and expended, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company, and generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for showing the true financial state and condition of the Company. The accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the registered office of the Company, as the Directors think fit.

126. *Shareholders have no Right to inspect Accounts except with Authority of Directors in General Meeting.*—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether, and to what extent, and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations, the accounts and books of the Company or of any of them shall be open to the inspection of the Shareholders, and no Shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or book or document of the Company except as conferred by Ordinance or authorized by the Directors or by a resolution of the Company in General Meeting.

127. *Accounts to be presented to Ordinary General Meeting.*—At the Ordinary General Meeting in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the income and expenditure of the Company for the previous financial year, and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up to end of the same period.

128. *What Accounts must show.*—The statement so made shall show, arranged under the most convenient heads, the amount of gross income, distinguishing the several sources from which it has been derived and the amount of gross expenditure, distinguishing the expense of the establishment, salaries, and other heads of expenditure. Every item of expenditure fairly chargeable against the year's income shall be brought into account, so that a just balance of profit and loss may be laid before the meeting, and in cases where any item of expenditure which may in fairness be distributed over several years has been incurred in any one year the whole amount of such item shall be stated with the addition of the reasons why only a portion of such expenditure is charged against the income of the year.

129. *Balance Sheet to contain Summary of Property.*—The balance sheet shall contain a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company arranged under the heads appearing in the form annexed to the table referred to in Schedule C to "Joint Stock Companies' Ordinance, 1861," or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

130. *Director's Report to accompany Balance Sheet.*—Every such statement shall be accompanied by a report as to the state and condition of the Company and as to the amount which the Directors recommend should be paid out of the profits by way of dividend or bonus to the Shareholders.

131. *A Copy to be sent to Shareholders Seven Days before the Meeting.*—A printed copy of such balance sheet shall, at least seven days previous to such meeting, be delivered at, or posted to, the registered address of every Shareholder.

132. *Accounts to be audited.*—The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correctness of the balance sheet ascertained, by one or more Auditor or Auditors.

AUDIT.

133. *Who is eligible for Appointment as Auditor.*—No person shall be eligible as an Auditor who is interested otherwise than as a Shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but it shall not be a necessary qualification for an Auditor that he be a Shareholder of the Company and no Director or officer of the Company shall, during the continuance in office, be eligible as an Auditor.

134. *Directors to appoint First Auditor.*—The Directors shall appoint the first Auditor or Auditors of the Company and fix his or their remuneration. He or they shall hold office till the first General Meeting of the Company. All subsequent appointments shall, except as is hereinafter mentioned, be made at the ordinary General Meeting of the Company in each year by the Shareholders present thereat, and the Auditor or Auditors appointed at such meeting shall hold office only until the first ordinary General Meeting after his or their appointment or until otherwise ordered by a General Meeting.

135. *Remuneration to be fixed by General Meeting.*—The remuneration of the Auditors other than the first shall be fixed by the Company in General Meeting, and this remuneration may from time to time be varied by a General Meeting.

136. *Eligible for Re-election.*—Retiring Auditors shall be eligible for re-election.

137. *Directors may fill Vacancy.*—If any vacancy that may occur in the office of Auditor, is not supplied at the ordinary General Meeting, or if any casual vacancy shall occur in the office of Auditor, the Directors shall fill up the vacancy by the appointment of a person or persons who shall hold office until the next ordinary General Meeting after his or their appointment.

138. *Auditors to examine Accounts.*—Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet intended to be laid before the next ordinary General Meeting, after his appointment, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with the accounts and vouchers relating thereto and to report thereon to the meeting, generally, or specially, as he may think fit.

139. *To be given List of Books and Access thereto.*—The Auditor or Auditors for the time being shall have a list delivered to him or them of all books kept by the Company, and he or they shall at all reasonable hours in the daytime have access to all accounts, books, and documents whatsoever of the Company for the purpose of audit.

DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

140. *Directors may declare Dividend with Sanction of General Meeting.*—The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, from time to time, declare a dividend to be paid and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders in proportion to the amount paid on their shares, but no dividend or bonus shall be payable except out of nett profits. Where capital is paid up on any shares in advance of calls upon the footing that the same shall carry interest such capital shall not whilst carrying interest confer a right to participate in profits.

141. *Interim Dividend.*—The Directors may, if they think fit, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, or pay a bonus to the Shareholders on account, and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year provided the Directors are satisfied that the nett profits of the Company will be sufficient to justify such interim dividend or bonus. No more than four interim dividends shall be paid in any calendar year.

142. *Reserve.*—The Directors may, before recommending any dividend or bonus, set aside out of the profits of the Company such a sum as they think proper as a reserve fund and may invest the same in such securities as they may select, or place the same on fixed deposit in any bank or banks, and may from time to time deal with and vary such investment and apply such reserve fund or such portion thereof as they think fit, to meet contingencies or for special dividends, or for equalizing dividends, or for working the business of the Company, or for repairing, maintaining, or extending the buildings and premises of the Company, or for the repair or renewal or extension of the property or plant of the Company or any part thereof, or for any other purposes connected with the interest of the Company that they may from time to time deem expedient without being bound to keep the same separate from the other assets.

143. *Capitalization of Reserve.*—Any General Meeting declaring a dividend may resolve that such dividend be paid wholly or in part by means of drafts or cheques on London or any other places or by the distribution of specific assets, and in particular of paid-up shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company, or paid-up shares, debentures, or debenture stock of any other company, or in any one or more of such ways; any General Meeting may resolve that any moneys, investments, or other assets forming part of the undivided profits of the Company standing to the credit of the reserve fund or in the hands of the Company and available for dividend be capitalized and distributed amongst the Shareholders in accordance with their rights on the footing that they become entitled thereto as capital and that all or any part of such capitalized fund be applied on behalf of the Shareholders in paying up in full any unissued shares of the Company, and that

such unissued shares so fully paid be distributed accordingly amongst the Shareholders in the proportion in which they are entitled to receive dividends and shall be accepted by them in full satisfaction of their interest in the said capitalized sum. For the purposes of giving effect to any resolution under this or the last preceding Article the Directors may settle any difficulty which may arise in regard to the distribution as they think expedient, and in particular may issue fractional certificates, and may fix the value for distribution of any specific assets, and may determine that cash payments shall be made to any members upon the footing of the value so fixed or that fractions of less value than Re. one, may be disregarded in order to adjust the rights of all parties, and may vest any such cash or specific assets in trustees upon such trusts for the person entitled to the dividend or capitalized fund as may seem expedient to the Directors.

144. *No Interest on Unpaid Dividend.*—No unpaid dividend or bonus shall ever bear interest against the Company.

145. *Shareholder indebted to Company not entitled to Dividend.*—No Shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend or bonus in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares, or otherwise howsoever.

146. *Directors may deduct Dividend from Shareholders Indebtedness.*—The Directors may deduct from the dividend or bonus payable to any Shareholder all such sums of money as may be due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding the fact that such sums or any of them are not payable until after the date when such dividend or bonus is payable.

147. *Notice of Dividend.*—Notice of any dividend that has been declared, or of any bonus to be paid, shall be given to each Shareholder entitled thereto and any dividend or bonus unclaimed by any Shareholder for three years after notice thereof is given may be forfeited by the Directors for the benefit of the Company, and, if the Directors think fit, may be applied in augmentation of the Reserve Fund.

148. *Receipt of One Partner of Firm sufficient.*—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by a firm may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any partner of such firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm.

149. *Receipt of One Joint-holder sufficient.*—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by several persons jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons

NOTICES.

150. *Notices to be signed by Secretaries.*—Notices from the Company may be authenticated by the signature (printed or written) of the Secretary, Secretaries, or persons appointed by the Board to authenticate the same.

151. *Registered Address in Ceylon.*—Every Shareholder shall give an address in Ceylon which shall be deemed to be his place of abode, and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company.

152. *Se vice of Notices.*—A notice may be served by the Company upon any Shareholder, either personally or by being sent through the post in a prepaid letter addressed to such Shareholder at his registered address or place of abode, and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served notwithstanding that the Shareholder to whom such notice is addressed be dead, unless his executors, or administrators shall have given to the Directors, or to the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries of the Company, their own or some other address in Ceylon to which notice may be sent.

153. *Notices to Joint-holders.*—All notices directed to be given to Shareholders shall, with respect to any share to which persons are jointly entitled, other than a firm, be given to whichever of such persons is named first in the register of Shareholders, and notice so given shall be sufficient notice to all the holders of such shares.

154. *Notice posted deemed to be received in Ordinary Course of Post.*—Any notice, if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day on which the letter containing the same would in ordinary course of post have been delivered at its address, and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed, and put into a post office or post box, and the entry in the Company's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

155. *Shareholders who have not Registered Address not entitled to Notice.*—Any Shareholder who fails to give and register an address in Ceylon as provided in Article No. 151 shall not be entitled to be given any notices.

156. No member of general or other meeting of members shall be entitled to require discovery of or any information respecting any details of the Company's trading or any matter which may be in the nature of a trade secret or mystery of trade, or which may relate to the conduct of the business of the Company, and which, in the opinion of the Directors, it will be inexpedient in the interests of the members of the Company to communicate to the public.

EVIDENCE.

157. *Presumptions in Case against Shareholders.*—On the trial or hearing of any action or suit brought or instituted by the Company against any Shareholder or his representatives to recover any debt or money claimed to be due to the Company in respect of his shares, it shall be sufficient to prove that the name of the defendant is or was, when the claim arose, on the register of Shareholders of the Company as a holder of the number of shares in respect of which such claim is made, and that the amount claimed is not entered as paid in the books of the Company; and it shall not be necessary to prove the registration of the Company, nor the appointment of the Directors who made any call, nor that a quorum of Directors was present at the Board at which any call was made, nor that the meeting at which any call was made duly convened or constituted, nor any other matter whatsoever, but the proof aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the debt.

PROVISIONS RELATIVE TO WINDING UP OR DISSOLUTION OF THE COMPANY.

158. *Power to purchase Company's Property in a Winding-up.*—Any Shareholder, whether a Director or not, and whether alone or jointly with any other Shareholder or Director, and any person not a Shareholder, may become the purchaser of the property of the Company or any part thereof in the event of a winding up or a dissolution, or at any other time when a sale of the Company's property or effects or any part thereof shall be made by the Directors under the powers hereby or under the Ordinance conferred upon them.

159. *Distribution of a Specie in a Winding-up.*—If the Company shall be wound up whether voluntarily or otherwise the liquidator or liquidators may with the sanction of a special resolution of the Company divide among the contributories in specie any part of the assets of the Company, and may with the like sanction vest any part of the assets of the Company in trustees upon such trusts for the benefit of the contributories as the liquidator or liquidators with the like sanction shall think fit, and if thought expedient any such division may be otherwise than in accordance with the legal rights of the members of the Company, and in particular any class may be given preferential or special rights or may be excluded altogether or in part, and the liquidator or liquidators shall be entitled to sell all or any of the assets of the Company in consideration of or in exchange for shares, ordinary, fully paid, part paid, or preference, in the purchasing company, but in case any division otherwise than in accordance with the legal rights of the contributories shall be determined on or any sale made of any or all of the assets of the Company in exchange for shares in the purchasing company either ordinary, fully paid, or part paid, or preference, any contributory who would be prejudiced thereby, shall have a right to dissent as if such determination were a special resolution passed pursuant to the section 192 of the Companies (Consolidation) Act of 1908 in England but for the purposes of an arbitration as in sub-section (6) of the said section provided the provisions of the Ceylon Arbitration Ordinance, 1866, and of the Ceylon Ordinance No. 2 of 1889, shall apply in place of the English and Scottish Acts referred to in the said sub-section (6) of section 192 of the aforewritten Companies (Consolidation) Act, and the said section 192 save as herein excepted, shall be deemed to be part and parcel of these present Articles.

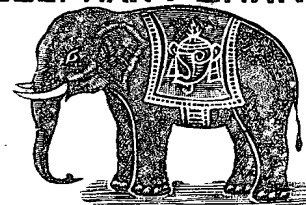

THE COLOMBO MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

General Meeting.

Wednesday, November 2, 1932, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice, dated October 26, 1932.

Present :—Mr. W. L. Murphy, B.A., C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. G. W. Dodds; Mr. N. R. Blande; Mr. M. L. M. Reyal; Dr. S. Muttiah; Mr. F. Dadabhoy, J.P.; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. F. J. Soertsz; Lieut.-Colonel N. W. Napier-Clavering, D.S.O., R.E.; Mr. Aelian W. Pereira; Mr. A. R. A. Razik; Mr. H. J. Hutchings; Dr. S. T. Gunasekera; Mr. G. K. Thornhill; and Mr. H. K. de Kretser.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of October 5, 1932, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of October 5, 1932, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. R. A. Razik asked the following questions which the Chairman answered :—

(1) *Q.*—What are the duties performed by the Assistant Municipal Treasurer, Mr. Viyian Pereira? *A.*—A list of the duties of the Assistant Municipal Treasurer is tabled.

(2) *Q.*—Why is he paid a travelling allowance of Rs. 900 per annum? *A.*—To enable him to attend to certain outdoor duties such as inspecting Municipal Markets, Laundries, Municipal Stores and bus stands and also to see that Revenue Inspectors are on duty.

(3) *Q.*—Does he do outdoor work with the Revenue Inspectors? *A.*—No.

(4) *Q.*—If so, please give a list showing different premises he has visited this year ending September 30? *A.*—In view of the answer to No. 3 this question does not arise.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. M. L. M. Reyal moved :—“ This Council is of opinion that owners of properties in the Second and Third Cross streets, Pettah, should not be compelled to reserve space for public arcades.” Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando seconded.

Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader raised two points, *i.e.*, (1) whether it was legal for the Council to introduce a motion such as that which, if accepted, would affect the discretionary powers vested in the Chairman by the Housing Ordinance, (2) whether, in the event of the Council having accepted the motion, the person on whose behalf the motion was introduced would stand to be benefitted.

The Chairman gave his ruling and stated that as regards (1) the Council was perfectly in order in introducing that motion in order to express its opinion. (2) No resolution arrived at would affect the discretionary powers vested in the Chairman by the Ordinance.

The motion was put to the meeting and lost.

4. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved :—That the Council should resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the agenda. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee—

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee regarding Relief to Ratepayers of October 14, 1932, were considered.

(2) To consider the question of the retirement of Mr. A. M. Fernando, Superintendent of Cattle Mart.—Recommended that Mr. A. M. Fernando, Superintendent, Cattle Mart, be given one year's notice and that, on his retirement, the post be abolished.

(6) To consider :—(a) The possibility of exempting from payment of rates in cases where tenants go into occupation of a house within the three days of the close of a month without paying rent therefor. (b) A report thereon of the Municipal Treasurer. (c) The recommendation of the Law Committee that the rates be made payable as from the date of occupation. Registered No. 1,157.—Recommended that rates be made payable as from the date of occupation.

The following Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of October 15, 1932, was considered.

(6) To consider a memorandum of the Municipal Treasurer, dated October 13, 1932, regarding water rate on school boardings, hostels, &c. Registered No. 1,792.—Recommended that section 34 of the Regulations under Ordinance No. 18 of 1907 be amended to read as follows :—

Section 34.—In the case of a private boarding house (other than a school boarding house or an educational or religious hostel) or a house taking in paying guests and paying consolidated rates or a fixed sum in lieu of such rates the Municipal Council may supply water at the rate of 50 cents per head per month on the average number of boarders or paying guests lodging at each house during the month.

The following Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of July 19, 1932, was considered.

MUNICIPAL ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT.

(10) To consider :—(a) The question of appointing a Playground Instructor for the new playground at Skinner's road, which will be ready for opening by the middle of August. (b) Reports thereon of the Municipal Engineer and the Municipal Treasurer. Registered No. 1,052.—Recommended that the staff of Playground Instructors be increased by the appointment of a part-time Instructor and that arrangements be made to transfer one of the present whole-time Instructors to this new playground and that the new half-time Instructor should take his place.

(b) Reports thereon of the Medical Officer of Health, the Municipal Engineer, and the Municipal Treasurer. Registered No. 1,679.—Recommended.

(8) To consider :—(a) An application from Messrs. Alex Pereira & Co., for a licence to sell frozen meat, &c., at No. 28, Upper Chatham street, Fort, through an Electric Refrigerator. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando urged that the whole policy regarding this matter be considered and that the question of the renewal of the licences in respect of the two frozen meat stalls allowed in Wellawatta be also considered in due course.

Mr. A. R. A. Razik opposed the recommendation of the Standing Committees.

The Chairman explained the position.

Dr. S. Muttiah stated that the present application (*re* item No. 8) was for purposes of storing and not for the sale of frozen meat.

Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader moved that the whole question be referred to the Four Standing Committees. Mr. A. R. A. Razik seconded.—Carried.

ANNEXURE A.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO MUNICIPAL PENSION MINUTE.

Compulsory Retirement.

15. Every Municipal Officer or Servant may be required to retire from the Municipal Service on or after attaining the age of fifty-five years, upon being given twelve months' notice to that effect, subject to the approval of the Governor. Retirement shall be compulsory for every Municipal Officer or Servant on attaining the age of sixty years,* provided that in the case of subordinate officers and members of the Clerical Service and outdoor staff the Council may extend such Officers' or Servants' employment for a further period, in no case exceeding 10 years, and in special cases among other classes of Municipal Officers or Servants the Council may extend such Officers' or Servants' employment for a further period (in no case exceeding five years) on being satisfied that his retirement at sixty would be detrimental to the interests of the Municipal Service.

* *In the case of female officers or servants retirement shall be compulsory on attaining the age of fifty years, unless the Council desires the officer's services shall be retained.*

Retiring allowances to Non-pensionable Officers.

21A. Municipal Officers or Servants drawing a salary at a yearly or monthly rate whose service has been entirely in a non-pensionable office may be awarded a retiring allowance not exceeding three-fourths of the amount payable under Rule 2 provided that to become eligible for an allowance under this rule an officer or servant of 60 years of age or under (*in the case of female officers of 50 years of age or under*) shall have been reported upon by a Medical Board nominated by the Chairman and approved by the Finance Committee to be permanently unfit for further active service or shall be retired on abolition of office after serving continuously for a period of not less than 15 years, provided further that this privilege shall not in any way interfere with the power of the Council to dispense with the services of any such officer or servant or to reduce his or her salary in case of reorganization or abolition of office, and no claim to any additional grant on account of such reduction or abolition shall in any case be recognized. Any such officer or servant shall continue to be liable to suspension, dismissal, or removal from office in the same manner as if this rule did not exist.

Abstract.—The applicants state that a stable suspension can be made, without the addition of a stabiliser, if the coal and the oil satisfy certain conditions which are described. Briefly these are that the coal is ground till it practically all passes through a sieve with 70 to 80 strands per centimetre and that the oil is a cracked fuel oil containing about 6 per cent. or more of fixed carbon.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 10, 1932.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 191 (2 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 110 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 29 Moors, 2 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1932, viz., 289,961) was 34.4, as against 32.3 in the preceding week, 32.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 159 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 85 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 21 Moors, 5 Malays, and 12 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.7, as against 26.9 in the previous week, 20.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 159 total deaths, 35 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 21 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 19.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 10 in Maradana hospitals (including 7 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, and Wellawatta South, as against 12 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Twelve deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 1 in the previous week and 10 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Maradana North and Maradana South. The number registered during the preceding week was also 4 and the weekly average for last year was 5.

2. (a) Ten deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Maradana North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, and Slave Island, as against 8 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths from *Phthisis*, of residents of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Two deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident). The number registered during the preceding week was also 2 and the weekly average for last year was 3.

4. One death from *Plague* was registered in Kotahena South. The number registered during the preceding week was also the weekly average for last year was 1.

5. Fourteen deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 12 from *Debility*, 6 from *Worms*, 4 from *Tetanus*, 3 from *Dysentery*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Homicide* and *Accidents*, and 73 from *Other Causes*.

6. **Reported Cases.**—Twenty-five cases of *Measles*, 8 of *Chickenpox*, 5 each of *Smallpox* and *Enteric Fever*, 4 of *Mumps*, and 1 each of *Whooping Cough* and *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 37, 24, 1, 6, nil, nil, and 3 respectively of the preceding week.

Improvements in or relating to pipe joints.

Abstract.—The end of the pipe has the external diameter reduced for a distance extending back from the end by about one inch. The reduced portion has a slight taper so that the diameter decreases towards the end. The back of the cut away portion terminates in a blunt frustoconical surface. To make a joint a rubber ring is placed over the end of the pipe and a slightly larger collar is placed over this; on sliding the pipe into the collar the rubber ring turns and is finally jammed tight against the frustoconical end. Increase of internal pressure tightens the joint. The collar may be tapped if desired.

The socket interior at the end of the next section of pipe has a complementary form. The shoulder on the socket serves the purpose of engaging with the joint ring and forcing this into a plane normal with the pipe axis.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 10, 1932.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 191 (2 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 110 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 29 Moors, 2 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1932, viz., 289,961) was 34.4, as against 32.3 in the preceding week, 32.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 159 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 85 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 21 Moors, 5 Malays, and 12 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.7, as against 26.9 in the previous week, 20.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 159 total deaths, 35 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 21 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 19.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fifteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 10 in Maradana hospitals (including 7 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, and Wellawatta South, as against 12 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Twelve deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 1 in the previous week and 10 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Maradana North and Maradana South. The number registered during the preceding week was also 4 and the weekly average for last year was 5.

2. (a) Ten deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Maradana North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, and Slave Island, as against 8 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths from *Phthisis*, of residents of Colombo town, occurred at the Anti-Tuberculosis Hospital, Ragama, during the week.

3. Two deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident). The number registered during the preceding week was also 2 and the weekly average for last year was 3.

4. One death from *Plague* was registered in Kotahena South. The number registered during the preceding week as also the weekly average for last year was 1.

5. Fourteen deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 12 from *Debility*, 6 from *Worms*, 4 from *Tetanus*, 3 from *Dysentery*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Homicide* and *Accidents*, and 73 from *Other Causes*.

6. *Reported Cases.*—Twenty-five cases of *Measles*, 8 of *Chickenpox*, 5 each of *Smallpox* and *Enteric Fever*, 4 of *Mumps*, and 1 each of *Whooping Cough* and *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 37, 24, 1, 6, nil, nil, and 3 respectively of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.2°, against 79.0° in the preceding week and 79.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.899 in., against 29.897 in. in the preceding week and 29.836 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.90 in., against 1.03 in. in the preceding week and 2.52 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
