APPLICATIONS from persons who are Chartered Accountants, or who possess equivalent qualifications, and from members of the General Clerical Service (Special Class, Class I., and Class II. above the second efficiency bar) are invited for filling the following posts in Class IV. of the Scheme for Accountants and Audit Officers:—

2. Applicants must be natural-born British Subjects of Ceylonese descent.

3. All applications must reach the Controller of Establishments, General Treasury, before noon on Friday, November 30, 1934. An application from a person already in the Government Service will be considered only if forwarded through the Head of his department.

4. A competitive examination will not be held for the purposes of selection, but any applicant may be required to undergo such literary or *viva voce* test as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of testing his intelligence, general knowledge, and suitability.

5. The salary scale attached to the posts is Rs. 3,200—250—4,200: Efficiency Bar: 4,500—300—6,000. If the candidate selected is a Chartered Accountant or possesses equivalent qualifications he will be appointed on the initial salary of the upper segment of the scale (*i.e.*, Rs. 4,500). If the candidate is an officer already in the service of the Ceylon Government he will be transferred to the salary scale of the post in accordance with Financial Regulation 847.

6. Rent allowance will not be payable unless the officer appointed held an appointment under the Ceylon Government before June 1, 1934.

7. The grant of leave and other conditions of service will, in the case of a new entrant to the Public Service, be governed by the recommendations in Sessional Paper VIII. of 1934.

8. A new entrant to the Public Service will before appointment be required to pass a medical examination.

GENERAL BY-LAWS RELATING TO LICENCES.

Interpretation of Terms.

1. In these by-laws the following expressions shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context.

“The Council” means the Urban District Council of Badulla.

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Urban District Council of Badulla.

“Licensee” means the person holding a licence issued by the Chairman authorizing the use of any premises or place for any special purpose mentioned in the licence in pursuance of the Local Government Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.

“Licensed premises” means the whole of the premises or place in respect of which a licence has been issued by the Chairman.

“Licensed trade” means a trade for which a licence is necessary under the provisions of the Local Government Ordinance or any by-law made thereunder.

“Lodging-house” means a house in which sleeping accommodation is provided for lodgers but no meals are served.

“Eating-house” means a house in which meals are served to customers but where no accommodation is provided for lodgers.

“Offensive or dangerous trade” means any one of the following trades:—

Manufacturing of manure, tanning, curing areca-nuts, boiling blood or offal, making or extracting fat, making soap, dyeing fibre, manufacturing or storing fibre, keeping a kraal for soaking coconut husks, storing Maldive fish, in quantity over 5 cwt., storing lime, hides, bones, artificial manure, materials for the manufacture of artificial manure in quantity over 1 gunny bag, manufacturing or storing copra, manufacturing coconut oil by mills or chekkus, manufacturing desiccated coconuts, manufacturing of bricks or tiles, burning lime, keeping a saw pit, curing or storing plumbago.

2. (1) No person shall within the limits of the Council keep any bakery, eating-house, tea and coffee boutique, restaurant, hotel, butcher's stall, fish stall, gala, dairy, laundry, common lodging-house, aerated water factory, ice factory, or public bathing place, or carry on in any place any dangerous or offensive trade without an annual licence from the Chairman, which licence the Chairman shall issue to all persons complying with the conditions provided for the issue of such licence. Every such licence shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such licence is issued, unless such licence shall have been previously cancelled as provided in by-law No. 10.

(2) Where an eating-house and a common lodging-house are established in the same building, a separate licence shall be obtained in respect of each of them.

3. No licence shall be transferable.

4. All notices in connection with licensed premises or the licensed trade shall be deemed to be served upon the licensee when left with any person employed in the licensed premises or when affixed to such premises.

5. The licensee shall comply with the lawful requirements of any notice served on him by the Chairman within the time stated in such notice or, if no such time is stated in the notice, within seven days from the service of such notice.

6. Every licence shall be subject to such fees as the Council shall, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board and the Governor, impose.

7. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any officer of the Council generally or specially authorized in writing thereto by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any licensed premises and to inspect any furniture, equipment, vehicle or utensil which is, or appears to be, used for the purpose of a licensed trade.

8. Every licensee shall during the period of licence keep his premises, furniture, and equipment in conformity with the conditions on which the licence was issued.

9. Any person committing a breach of any by-law for any licensed premises or carrying on, without a licence, any of the trades referred to in by-law No. 2 above, shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 (Rupees fifty), and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 (Rupees Twenty-five) for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

10. On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee by court for breach of any by-law relating to his licensed premises such licence shall be liable to cancellation by such court.

11. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued the licensed premises cease to conform to the conditions laid down for its issue, the Chairman may notice the licensee to do all things necessary to make the premises conform to such conditions, and any licensee failing to comply with the requirements of the notice within the time specified therein shall be guilty of an offence.

BAKERIES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a bakery unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened and when open having an area not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the average height of every room is not less than 10 ft. and the height is in no place less than 7 ft. and the walls are built of brick, stone or cabook, and both surfaces of the walls (except so much thereof as may be cement-plastered or glazed) are limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 ft. from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

(e) That all the wood work is oil-painted or limewashed.

(f) That the ground floor is of cement concrete not less than 4 inches thick and the internal surface of the lower ends of all the walls is cement-plastered or covered with glazed tiles to a height of 4 ft.

(g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

2. (a) That the room in which kneading takes place has a superficial floor space of not less than 12 ft. by 15 ft.

(b) That there is free external air space not less than 7 ft. wide on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors or windows.

(c) That the door of the oven does not open directly into the kneading room.

(d) That every kneading room is provided with a ceiling which is either plastered and limewashed or made of closely fitting boards which are either limewashed or oil-painted.

3. (a) That the troughs, tables, and all the utensils used in the making of bread are capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

(b) That the tops of the tables used in the making of bread are made of well seasoned closely fitting planks or of some non-harmful impervious material.

4. (a) That the bakery is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(b) That the bakery is at least 50 ft. distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

(c) That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the bakery.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Bakeries.

1. Every licensee of a bakery shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words “Licensed Bakery” legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the

licensed premises and shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises, for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council, a Register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the date of their engagement and discharge.

3. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause (a) the walls of every room forming part of the bakery to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December; (b) the ceiling to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December; (c) the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at any other time if so ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause (a) the floor and the tiled or cemented portions of the walls of the kneading room and the tops of the tables to be washed every day at such hour as shall be specified in the licence; (b) every part of the bakery, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of bread to be kept in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises; (c) all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle which shall be removed from the bakery and cleared once a day; and (d) every such receptacle to be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

5. Every licensee of a bakery—(1) shall use for the manufacture of bread good and wholesome flour, water and other materials; (2) shall store the flour on a movable platform constructed in the following manner:—

The platform shall be of any convenient length and breadth, consisting of a single layer of stout planks supported on legs 3 ft. high. The legs of the platform shall in no case be permanently fixed on or into the floor. The edges of the top shall stand out 9 inches away from the frame underneath, so as to prevent rats crawling up the legs and round the edge of the top. The platform shall be so constructed as to leave no shelves or recesses under the top capable of providing harbour for rats. The platform shall be a movable one, capable of being lifted away from position to enable the floor underneath to be cleaned and shall be placed at least 18 inches away from the wall and the space beneath and around the platform shall at all times be kept free from all obstruction.

6. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide a Sanitary dust bin and at least two spittoons to be kept on the licensed premises. He shall keep the spittoons so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread, but shall not keep them in the kneading room.

7. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all rat holes in the bakery to be filled up with broken glass and plastered with cement.

8. No person shall for any purpose whatsoever keep any animal or bird in a bakery.

9. No person shall spit within the bakery, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

10. (a) No person suffering from, or who has recently suffered from, any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall enter the licensed premises or take part in the manufacture or sale of any bread therein, or engage in the transport of any bread therefrom.

(b) No licensee of a bakery shall permit any person to contravene the provisions of the foregoing paragraph of this by-law.

11. No licensee of a bakery shall store or keep or allow to be stored or kept in the room where bread is prepared or stored, or in which the materials for making bread are stored any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or any articles, other than those used in the manufacture of bread.

12. No licensee of a bakery shall use or allow to be used as a sleeping place any place on the same floor as the bakery or forming part of the same building, unless such place is effectually separated from the places where bread is prepared or stored, or in which the materials thereof are stored, by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space of such sleeping place.

13. All persons employed in the preparation and making of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of making bread, and shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body and a clean white cap or turban.

14. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide clean water, clean towels, nail brush, and soap and keep them so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread.

15. Every licensee of a bakery shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

16. No licensee of a bakery shall expose or cause to be exposed for sale in the licensed premises any bread unless such bread is kept in clean, properly constructed glass cases free from flies, dust and vermin.

17. (1) Every licensee of a bakery shall cause all bread baked on the premises to be stamped with figures denoting one or other of the following weights:—

$\frac{1}{4}$ lb., $\frac{1}{2}$ lb., 1 lb., 2 lb., or 4 lb.

(2) He shall not sell or expose for sale any bread which does not have one of the aforesaid weights stamped on it or which is found to weigh less than the weight stamped thereon.

(3) The divisions of the foregoing paragraphs of this by-law shall not apply to fancy bread, rolls, biscuits or confectionery.

18. Every licensee of a bakery shall cause to be fixed in a conspicuous place in the licensed premises a beam and scales with standard weights and shall at the request of any *bona fide* purchaser weigh any bread sold or exposed for sale in the said premises.

19. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a bakery, issue to him in respect of each employee of the licensee approved by the Chairman, a card of registration authorizing the transport by such employee of bread for sale; and every such employee while transporting bread for sale shall carry such card on his person and produce the same for inspection when called upon to do so by any officer of the Council or any Police Officer in uniform.

20. No licensee of a bakery shall allow any employee to transport bread unless he has previously obtained a card of registration as aforesaid from the Chairman in respect of such employee and unless such bread is carried in a closed fly-proof and dust-proof vehicle, basket, tin or other suitable receptacle kept always in a clean and wholesome condition.

21. The licensee upon the termination of the service of any employee as a transporter of bread under him shall forthwith report the fact to the Chairman and surrender the card of registration issued in respect of such employee for cancellation by the Chairman.

22. It shall be an offence for any employee upon his dismissal or discharge to refuse or omit to return the card of registration entrusted to him.

EATING-HOUSES AND TEA OR COFFEE BOUTIQUES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique, unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are in good repair and are well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet and is provided with windows capable of being opened and of an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

2. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone or caobok and both surfaces of the walls are limeplastered and limewashed.

3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

4. That the roof is made of some permanent material.

5. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

6. That the floor is cemented throughout.

7. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage, with a sanitary dust bin, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Eating-houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques.

1. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Eating-house" or "Licensed Tea or Coffee Boutique" as the case may be legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in such premises. He shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed, and the dates of their engagement and discharge.

3. Every licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises and the ceiling and all the woodwork including that of any unceiled roof to be lime-washed at least twice a year in the months of June and December, provided however, that all woodwork that is oil-painted may instead be washed with hot water and soap at least 4 times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be specified by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause every part of such premises, the surroundings and drains to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises, and shall cause the furniture and all utensils and equipment on such premises to be kept clean and in good repair.

5. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause all utensils used in the preparation, sale, and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in 24 hours.

6. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by any other customer.

7. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed from the premises daily. He shall keep such receptacle covered at all times except when refuse is being placed in it, and shall cause all waste tea, coffee, milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste to be collected in such receptacle.

8. No licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall use any counter or other place from which tea, coffee, or milk is served, unless the said counter or other place is covered with zinc or other impervious material.

9. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least two spittoons to be kept always at the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises as well as to the employees.

10. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall fill all rat holes in the house with broken glass and plaster such holes with cement as soon as he discovers them.

11. Every licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

12. No licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall keep or store sugar and jaggery except in glass-stoppered wide-mouthed bottles, or expose any food for sale otherwise than in a receptacle so constructed as to prevent the contamination of the food by flies, dust, and vermin, and kept clean at all times.

13. No licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall sell, or expose, or offer for sale or keep any adulterated milk on the licensed premises. For the purpose of this by-law "adulterated milk" shall mean milk to which water or any foreign liquid or substance other than tea, coffee, or cocoa prepared for immediate consumption has been added.

14. No person shall within the premises of a licensed eating-house or tea or coffee boutique (a) spit except into a spittoon provided for the purpose or (b) throw or place any remnants of food or other refuse of any kind except in the receptacle provided for the purpose.

15. No person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall enter such premises or take part in the preparation of sale of food or drink, until the periods of infection and of incubation have elapsed.

16. No licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the foregoing by-laws 14 and 15.

17. The Chairman shall on application made to him by the licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique issue to him in respect of each employee of such eating-house or tea or coffee boutique approved by the Chairman, a card of registration authorizing such employee to carry for sale food cooked or made on the licensed premises, and every such employee while transporting any such food for sale shall carry such card on his person and produce it for inspection when called upon to do so by any officer of the Council or any Police Officer in uniform.

18. No licensee of an eating-house or of a tea or coffee boutique shall allow any employee to transport for sale cooked food to or from the licensed premises unless he shall have previously obtained a card of registration as aforesaid from the Chairman in respect of such employee and unless

such food is carried in a closed basket, tin or other similar receptacle so constructed as to be fly-proof and dust-proof and always kept in a clean and wholesome condition.

19. The licensee upon the termination of the service of any employee as a transporter of food under him, shall forthwith report the fact to the Chairman and surrender the card of registration issued in respect of such employee for cancellation by the Chairman.

20. It shall be an offence for any employee upon his dismissal or discharge to refuse or omit to return the card of registration entrusted to him.

BUTCHERS' STALLS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a butcher's stall unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

1. That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, and having an area when open of not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.

2. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook, and both surfaces of the walls are limeplastered and limewashed except the lower ends of their internal surface which shall be cement-plastered or covered with glazed tiles to a height of 4 feet from the floor.

3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

4. That the roof is made of some permanent material.

5. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

6. That the floor is cemented throughout.

7. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

8. That the tables and all the furniture are capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

9. That every table on which meat is kept is covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

10. That the premises are provided with a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

11. That the premises are at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

12. That there is no cesspit, latrine or ashpit within, or directly communicating with, the premises.

By-laws for Licensed Butchers' Stalls.

1. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Butcher's Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the dates of their engagement and discharge.

3. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be lime-washed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be specified by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging meat to be kept polished and free from rust.

5. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep every part of the butcher's stall, its surroundings and drains in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance, and shall keep furniture, utensils, and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of meat, at all times clean and in good repair.

6. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least one spittoon, to be kept on the licensed premises, so that those employed on the premises may have easy access to them.

7. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in a covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to

be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always covered, except at the times when refuse is being actually placed in it.

8. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause all rat holes in such stall to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as they are found.

9. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

10. No person shall spit within a butcher's stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

11. No person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such a disease, shall enter a butcher's stall or take part in the storing, preparation, or sale of meat therein, or in the transport of any meat thereto or therefrom.

12. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the foregoing by-laws 10 and 11.

13. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or other articles except those used for the purpose of the storing, preparation, or sale of meat.

14. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall allow any place on the same floor as the butcher's stall, and forming part of the same building, to be used as a sleeping place, unless it is effectually separated from the butcher's stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space of such sleeping place.

15. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep on the licensed premises an ample supply of potable water.

16. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall sell, or expose for sale or keep on the licensed premises, any meat except the meat of animals slaughtered either in a public slaughter-house within the limits of the Council area duly declared and proclaimed under section 22 of the Butcher's Ordinance, 1893, or in a place appointed for the purpose by the Chairman under section 11 of the said Ordinance, or under a special licence issued under section 14 of the said Ordinance.

17. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of meat during the hours 8 A.M. to 7 P.M.

18. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall sell or expose for sale, or cause to be sold or exposed for sale, any meat from his stall at any place other than the licensed premises.

19. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall transport meat from a slaughter-house to the licensed premises except in carts which have the internal surface of the sides and bottom lined with zinc or other impermeable material and washed daily and kept clean and free from dirt or grit.

20. It shall be an offence for the licensee or (any) person employed by him for the sale of meat on the licensed premises to refuse to sell any meat which is available on the licensed premises at the time a demand is made for it by any person tendering the price of such meat to the licensee or other person aforesaid.

21. No licensee shall construct any loft above a stall or use the space between the upper end of the walls of such stall and the roof for the purpose of storing any materials whatsoever.

FISH STALLS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a fish stall unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, and having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

2. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook and both surfaces of the walls are limeplastered and limewashed, except the lower ends of their internal surface which shall be cement-plastered or covered with glazed tiles to a height of 4 feet from the floor.

3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

4. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

5. That the floor is of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered and emptying into a bucket.

6. That every table on which fish is kept is covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

7. That the premises are provided with a sanitary dust bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

8. That the premises are at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

9. That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the premises.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Fish Stalls.

1. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Fish Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fish stalls in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises, for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council, a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the dates of their engagement and discharge.

3. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the fish stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be specified by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging fish to be kept polished and free from rust.

5. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep every part of the fish stall, its surroundings and drains, in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance, and shall keep the furniture, utensils, and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of fish, at all times clean and in good repair.

6. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises, so that those employed on the premises may have easy access to them.

7. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

8. Every licensee of a fish stall shall fill up all rat holes in such stall with broken glass and plaster them with cement as soon as he discovers them.

9. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

10. No person shall spit within a fish stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

11. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such a disease, shall enter a fish stall or take part in the storing, preparation, or sale of fish therein, or in the transport of any fish thereto or therefrom.

12. No licensee of a fish stall shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of the foregoing by-laws 9, 10, and 11.

13. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or other articles, except those used for the purposes of the storing, the preparation, and the sale of fish.

14. No licensee of a fish stall shall allow any place on the same floor as the fish stall and forming part of the same building to be used as a sleeping place unless it is effectually separated from the fish stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space of such sleeping place.

15. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep on the licensed premises an ample supply of potable water.

16. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of fish between 8 A.M. and 7 P.M.

17. It shall be an offence for any licensee or (any) person employed by him for the sale of fish on the licensed premises to refuse to sell any fish which is available on the licensed premises at the time a demand is made for it by any person tendering the price of such fish to such licensee or other person aforesaid.

LODGING HOUSES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a lodging-house unless he shall deposit with the Chairman a certificate of good character signed by three or more respectable householders resident within the area of the Council, or

by a Police Magistrate, or Justice of the Peace and unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are substantially built and in good repair and that every room is well ventilated and well lighted and provided with windows capable of being opened and having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet.
2. That the walls of every room have an average height of 10 feet and not less than 7 feet in any part and are built of brick, stone, or cabook and have the inner surface limeplastered and limewashed.
3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.
4. That the roof is made of some permanent material.
5. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.
6. That the floor is cemented throughout.
7. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.
8. That the premises are provided with—(a) sanitary dust bins of sufficient number and size to contain the refuse from the house, (b) sufficient bathing accommodation, and (c) latrine accommodation consisting of at least one separate latrine for every 10 of the number of persons for whose accommodation the premises are to be licensed.
9. That the premises are provided with a good water supply and that the supply of drinking water and the bathing accommodation are so arranged as to preclude the pollution of the drinking water by persons bathing.
10. That the premises have a separate room set apart as a kitchen and that the kitchen has an efficient outlet for smoke.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Lodging Houses.

1. Every licensee of a lodging house shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Lodging House" legibly painted thereon, in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.
2. Every licensee of lodging house shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung up in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the dates of their engagement and discharge.
3. No licensee of a lodging house shall permit more persons than the number specified in the licence to sleep at any one time in such lodging house.
4. No licensee of a lodging house shall permit males and females of over 10 years of age to occupy the same sleeping room, except in the case of husband and wife and parents and children.
5. No licensee of a lodging house shall allow his premises to be occupied for immoral purposes. He shall maintain and enforce good order and decorum therein.
6. Every licensee of a lodging house shall keep a register of the name, occupation, and native place, and last temporary or permanent residence of each person occupying his premises.
7. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause the windows of each of the sleeping rooms to be kept open to their full width for at least four hours each day, unless prevented by inclement weather.
8. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises and the ceiling and all the woodwork including that of the unceiled roof to be limewashed at least twice a year in the months of June and December provided however that all woodwork that is oil-painted may instead be washed with hot water and soap at least 4 times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at other times when ordered so to do by the Chairman in writing.
9. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause every part of the lodging house, its surroundings, and drains, to be kept in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises, and cause also the furniture, utensils, and equipment to be kept at all times clean and in good repair.
10. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause every room, passage, stair case, verandah, drain, and the land belonging to the premises to be thoroughly swept at least once a day before noon.
11. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause all cooked food to be kept in such manner as to be inaccessible to flies or other insects.
12. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause all filth, house refuse, or other offensive matter to be immediately placed in a covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized

iron, and to be removed from the premises daily. The receptacle shall always be kept covered except when refuse is being actually placed in it.

13. No licensee of a lodging house shall admit to his premises whether as lodger or as employee any person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease.

14. (a) If any person in a lodging house becomes ill from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, the licensee of such lodging house shall forthwith give notice of the fact to the Sanitary Inspector in whose division the lodging house is situated or to the Chairman; and the licensee shall cause the house to be vacated if so required by the Chairman, and shall allow the bedding, clothing, and other articles used by the infected person to be disinfected or if necessary to be destroyed, and the house to be fumigated, disinfected, and limewashed at the public expense in such manner as the Chairman may direct.

(b) The licensee of any such lodging house shall not admit any new lodger until the premises have been inspected and certified by the Chairman as free from infection.

15. No licensee of a lodging house shall allow cattle, goats, or fowl to be kept within the building.

16. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause all mats, bed clothes, and bedding, and every bedstead used in such house to be thoroughly cleaned from time to time and take such other steps as may be necessary to keep them at all times in a clean and wholesome condition.

17. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause the seat, floor, and walls of every water closet, earth closet, or privy belonging to such house to be thoroughly cleaned from time to time and take such other steps as may be necessary for the purpose of keeping them at all times in a clean and wholesome condition.

18. Every licensee of a lodging house shall cause all rat holes in the house to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement, as soon as they are discovered.

RESTAURANTS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a restaurant unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet and is provided with windows capable of being opened, and having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

2. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook and both surfaces of the walls are limeplastered and limewashed.

3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

4. That the roof is made of some permanent material.

5. That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

6. That the ground floor is cemented throughout.

7. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage, with a sanitary dust bin, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Restaurants.

1. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises for the inspection of the Chairman, or any officer of the Council a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the dates of their engagement and discharge.

2. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises and the ceiling and all the woodwork, including that of an unceiled roof, to be limewashed at least twice a year in the months of June and December: Provided, however, that all woodwork that is oil-painted may instead be washed with hot water and soap at least 4 times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at other times when ordered by the Chairman in writing.

3. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause every part of the premises, the surroundings and drains, to be kept in good repair, clean and wholesome, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises, and cause also the furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the preparation, sale, or consumption of food or drink to be kept at all times clean and in good repair.

4. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause the counter or other place from which tea, coffee, or milk is served to be covered with zinc or other impervious material.

5. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause all utensils used in the preparation, sale, or consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water not less than once in twenty-four hours and take such other measures as may be necessary to keep them in a clean and sanitary condition.

6. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed before being used by any other customer.

7. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause a sanitary dust bin and at least two spittoons always to be kept at such premises. He shall keep the spittoons so as to be readily accessible to those employed in or consuming food or drink on the premises.

8. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and removed from the premises daily. He shall not permit any waste tea, coffee, or milk, or remnants of food, or cooking waste to be deposited or thrown on the ground, but shall cause the same to be collected in a proper receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to be removed daily. He shall keep such receptacle always covered except when refuse is being actually placed in it.

9. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause all rat holes in the restaurant to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement as soon as they are found.

10. (1) No licensee of a restaurant shall allow any person to spit within such premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose. (2) He shall not allow any person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to enter such premises or to take part in the preparation or sale of food or drink.

11. Every licensee of a restaurant shall provide an ample supply of potable water.

12. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause all food stored or exposed for sale to be kept in receptacles capable of preventing contamination by flies, dust, and vermin. He shall at all times keep such receptacles in a clean and wholesome condition.

13. Every licensee of a restaurant shall cause the sugar used in such premises to be kept in glass-stoppered, wide mouthed bottles.

14. No licensee of a restaurant shall sell or offer for sale or expose for sale or keep on the licensed premises any adulterated milk. For the purpose of this rule "adulterated milk" shall mean milk to which water or any foreign liquid or substance other than tea, coffee, or cocoa prepared for immediate consumption has been added.

15. The Chairman shall on the application made to him by the licensee of a restaurant issue to him in respect of each employee of the licensee approved by the Chairman, a card of registration authorizing the transport by such employee of cooked food for sale; and every such employee while transporting cooked food for sale shall carry such card on his person and produce the same for inspection when called upon to do so by any officer of the Council or any Police Officer in uniform.

16. The licensee of a restaurant shall not allow any employee to transport cooked food unless he has previously obtained a card of registration as aforesaid from the Chairman in respect of such employee and unless such cooked food is carried in a closed vehicle, basket, tin, or other suitable fly-proof and dust-proof receptacle always kept in a clean and wholesome condition.

17. The licensee upon the termination of the service of any employee as a transporter of cooked food under him shall forthwith report the fact to the Chairman and surrender the card of registration issued in respect of such employee for cancellation by the Chairman.

18. It shall be an offence for any employee upon his dismissal or discharge to refuse or omit to return the card of registration entrusted to him.

HOTELS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a hotel unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are substantially built and in good repair and that every room is well ventilated and well lighted and provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open is not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space, and that every room has a minimum superficial area of 120 square feet.

2. That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook; the surfaces of the walls being limeplastered and limewashed or colour-washed.

3. That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

4. That the roof is made of some permanent material.

5. That all woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

6. That the ground floor is cemented throughout.

7. That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

8. That the premises are provided with—(a) sanitary dust bins of sufficient number and size to contain the refuse from the house, (b) such bathing accommodation as is sufficient to meet all sanitary requirements, and (c) latrine accommodation consisting of at least one separate latrine for every 10 of the number of persons for whose accommodation the premises are to be licensed.

9. That the premises are provided with a suitable form of water supply, and that the supply of drinking water and the bathing accommodation are so arranged as to preclude the pollution of the drinking water by persons bathing.

10. That the premises have a separate room set apart as a kitchen and that the kitchen has an efficient outlet for smoke.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Hotels.

1. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the hotel. He shall also cause to be kept in the licensed premises a register, the pages of which shall be bound and consecutively numbered in which shall be entered the names and addresses of all servants employed by him on the licensed premises together with the dates of their engagements and discharge, and produce the register for inspection at all times on the demand of the Chairman or any officer of the Council.

2. The Chairman shall cause a plan of the licensed premises to be attached to every licence for a hotel and shall show on such plan the sleeping rooms and the number of persons to be permitted to sleep in each room, such number being calculated at the rate of one person to every 40 square feet of the floor area of such room, two children under 10 years being considered to be equivalent to one person.

3. No licensee of a hotel shall permit any person to sleep in the hotel except in one of the rooms specifically set apart as sleeping rooms in the plan of the hotel attached to the licence.

4. No licensee of a hotel shall permit more persons to sleep in any room than the number specified in the plan.

5. Every licensee of a hotel shall keep a register of the name, occupation, native place, and last temporary or permanent residence of each person occupying his premises.

6. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause the windows of each of the sleeping rooms to be kept open to their full width for at least four hours each day, unless prevented by inclement weather.

7. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the licensed premises and the ceiling and all the woodwork including that of the unceiled roof to be limewashed at least twice a year in the months of June and December: Provided, however, that all woodwork that is oil-painted may instead be washed with hot water and soap at least 4 times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

8. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause every part of the hotel, its surroundings, and drains, to be kept in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance on the licensed premises and cause also the furniture, utensils, and equipment to be kept at all times clean and in good repair.

9. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause every room, passage, staircase, verandah, drain, and the land forming the premises of the hotel to be thoroughly swept at least once a day before noon.

10. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause all filth, house refuse, or other offensive matter to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to be removed from the premises daily. He shall keep such receptacle always covered except when such filth, house refuse, or other offensive matter is being actually placed in such receptacle.

11. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause all cooked food to be kept in such manner as to be inaccessible to flies and other insects.

12. No licensee of a hotel shall admit to his premises any person suffering from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease.

13. If any person in a hotel becomes ill from any infectious or contagious disease, the licensee of such hotel shall forthwith give notice of the fact to the Sanitary Inspector in whose division the hotel is situated or to the Chairman, and the licensee shall cause the house to be vacated, if so required by the Chairman, and allow the bedding, clothing, and other articles used by the infected

person to be disinfected, or if necessary to be destroyed, and the house to be fumigated, disinfected, and lime-washed at the public expense in such manner as the Chairman may direct.

14. No licensee of a hotel where a case of infectious or contagious disease has occurred shall admit any new lodger or customer until the premises have been inspected and certified by the Chairman as free from infection.

15. No licensee of a hotel shall allow cattle, goats, or fowl to be kept within the building.

16. Every licensee of a hotel shall cause all rat holes in the hotel to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement as soon as they are discovered.

CATTLE SHEDS, GALAS, AND HALTING PLACES FOR CATTLE.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licences.

No person shall be entitled to a licence for a gala unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the premises are properly levelled and drained and the ground is either paved or properly consolidated with broken metal, so as to keep a hard and level surface.

2. That every building or shed intended for the accommodation of cattle in a gala is built of brick, stone, or cabook, and the walls and pillars are limewashed and plastered with cement to a height of 4 feet from the ground; that the roof is of some permanent material, that the floor is paved with brick, or stone rendered in cement, cement concrete, or asphalt; that drains similarly constructed are provided so as to convey the urine, washings, and rain water into one or more covered receptacles.

3. That the premises are provided with an ample supply of water, both for drinking purposes and for the washing of the premises.

4. That the premises have sufficient latrine accommodation.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Galas.

1. Every licensee of a gala shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his gala a board with the words "Licensed Gala" and the name of the licensee legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a gala shall keep a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises.

3. The licensee of every gala shall cause the walls and pillars of the gala to be limewashed down to a line 4 feet from the floor on or before December 31 in each year.

4. Every licensee of a gala shall cause the gala and all the buildings therein to be kept in good repair, and in a clean and sanitary condition and to be thoroughly washed and swept daily.

5. The licensee of every gala shall cause all dung, refuse, urine, and washings to be removed from the gala at least once a day and deposited at a suitable distance from the gala so as to prevent any nuisance being caused thereby.

DAIRIES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a dairy unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted.

(b) That the walls and roof of the buildings of the dairy are made of some permanent material.

(c) That the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

(d) That the floor is cemented or paved with some hard and impermeable material.

(e) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

(f) That there is a sufficient supply of pure water protected from pollution at a convenient distance for the use of the dairy.

2. That every building or shed intended for the accommodation of cattle is built of corrugated iron with metal posts or, if built of brick, stone, or cabook, that the walls and pillars are plastered with cement to a height of 4 feet from the ground and have the upper parts limewashed; that the roof is of some permanent material, and the floor paved with brick, or stone rendered in cement, cement concrete, or asphalt; that similarly constructed drains are provided so as to convey the urine, washings, and rain water into one or more covered receptacles.

3. (i.) That the milk room is in a suitable position and at a distance of not less than 25 feet from the cow sheds and other buildings.

(ii.) That the floor of the milk room is cemented and its junctions with the walls rounded off; that the walls of the milk room are not less than 7 feet in height and are built of corrugated iron with metal posts or if built of stone, brick, or cabook that they are limeplastered and lime-washed.

(iii.) That at least two opposite walls of the milk room abut on the open air.

(iv.) That the roofs are ceiled with grooved boards to prevent the ingress of dust, and that the boards are oil-painted; that all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(v.) That there is at least one window and door, and that the area of the window space is not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space of the milk room; and that the window space is covered with fly-proof netting, that the door is opposite the window, is close fitting and fitted with fly-proof netting.

(vi.) That the milk room is provided with a table covered with marble, slate, zinc, or other approved impermeable material.

(vii.) That it is provided with a sanitary dust bin.

(viii.) That it is at least 100 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

(ix.) That there is no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the milk room.

4. That the number of cows for which each dairy is to be licensed is stated in the application for licence, and that such number is proportionate to the size of the cattle shed, allowing for each cow a floor space of 8 feet by 5 feet and a minimum air space of 400 cubic feet.

II.—By-laws for Licensed Dairies.

1. Every licensee of a dairy shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Dairy" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises and shall also cause to be kept on the licensed premises for the inspection of the Chairman or any officer of the Council a register with consecutively numbered pages giving the names and addresses of all servants employed by him in the trade or business for which the premises have been licensed and the dates of their engagement and discharge.

3. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the dairy to be limewashed twice a year in the months of June and December. He shall cause the woodwork to be washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at such other times as may be specified by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause the floors and the top of the milk room table to be washed at least once every day.

5. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause all utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a dairy to be kept clean.

6. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause every part of the dairy, its surroundings, and drains to be kept in good repair and clean.

7. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause all vessels sent out containing milk to be thoroughly cleansed and to be properly covered with clean material, and shall take all proper precautions to prevent the milk from being contaminated during transit.

8. Every licensee of a dairy shall provide for the storing of milk in vessels made only of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware, enamelled iron, galvanized iron, or tin, and shall take all proper precautions to prevent such vessels being stored in the cattle shed.

9. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause all dung, refuse, urine, and washings to be removed from the dairy at least once a day and disposed of at a suitable distance from the dairy so as to prevent any nuisance being caused thereby.

10. No licensee of a dairy shall keep any animal or bird in a milk room for any purpose whatsoever.

11. No licensee of a dairy shall allow the milk vessels, butter vessels, churns, separators or other articles employed in the dairy to be used for any other purpose, and he shall cause them to be thoroughly cleaned at least once daily by washing them with boiling water.

12. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or skin disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall enter a dairy or take part in the

preparation, sale, or transport of milk, or be permitted to do so by the licensee or person in charge or control of the dairy.

13. Every licensee of a dairy shall use for the purpose of such dairy—

- (a) where a public water supply exists, water from such supply only, causing for this purpose pipes to be laid from the nearest main, and the water to be obtained therefrom by means of taps within the building.
- (b) where no public water supply exists, water from a suitable source capable of supplying a sufficient quantity of pure water.

14. Every licensee of a dairy obtaining water from any source other than a public water supply shall discontinue the use of such source and obtain water from the public water supply as soon as such a supply is established.

15. No licensee of a dairy shall cause any cow to be milked for the purpose of obtaining milk for sale, unless at the time of milking the udder and teats of such cow are thoroughly clean, and unless the hands of the person milking are also thoroughly clean and free from all infection and contamination.

16. Every licensee of a dairy shall give immediate notice to the Chairman of any case or suspected case of infectious or contagious disease which may occur among the persons working or who have been recently working in the dairy.

17. (a) Every licensee of a dairy shall whenever any animal in his dairy is affected with any contagious or infectious disease forthwith give notice of the fact to the Chairman. He shall in order to prevent infection or contamination forthwith remove or cause to be removed from the proximity of other animals any animal in his dairy which is found or is suspected to be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease.

(b) On the outbreak of any infectious or contagious disease every licensee of a dairy shall carry out such instructions for the control of the outbreak as the Chairman or other proper authority may from time to time give.

(c) No licensee of a dairy shall sell or permit to be sold the milk of any animal suffering from tuberculosis, whether of the udder or otherwise, acute mastitis, foot-and-mouth disease, anthrax, actinomycosis of the udder, or add such milk or permit it to be added to any other milk which is intended for sale or for human consumption.

18. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause all cattle food, except grass and straw, to be stored in a suitable rat-proof receptacle.

19. (a) No licensee of a dairy shall allow milk intended for sale to be kept in any place other than the milk room.

(b) No licensee of a dairy shall use the milk room or permit it to be used for any purpose other than that of storing and preparing milk.

20. (a) No licensee of a dairy shall adulterate milk by the addition of water or any other foreign liquid or substance thereto, nor shall he sell, offer, expose, hawk for sale, or deliver milk so adulterated.

(b) No licensee of a dairy shall sell, offer, expose, hawk for sale, or deliver any milk from which the cream has been removed, unless such milk is contained in a vessel which is clearly, distinctly, and conspicuously labelled "Skimmed milk" in English, and the equivalent term in Sinhalese and Tamil, and is sold as such.

21. No licensee of a dairy shall sell or supply milk obtained from cows other than those kept in his own licensed dairy.

22. (1) The Chairman shall issue annually to the owner of every licensed dairy in respect of each vendor of milk cards of registration bearing the name and thumb impression of such vendor, and the name of the licensee and the registered number of the dairy. (2) No such card of registration shall be issued until a Medical Officer deputed by the Chairman has examined and found such vendor free from any infectious, contagious, or skin disease. (3) Such card of registration shall not be transferable, and shall be carried by the vendor on his person when engaged in the sale or transport of milk and produced for inspection whenever demanded by the Chairman or any officer of the Council authorized by him.

23. It shall be an offence for any employee upon his dismissal or discharge to refuse or omit to return the card or registration entrusted to him.

24. The Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, Sanitary Inspector, or any other officer generally or specially authorized by the Chairman, shall be at all times entitled on payment of the value thereof to take a sample of milk for analysis from any licensed dairy, or from any person selling, exposing, hawking, or delivering milk, and every licensee of a dairy or registered vendor or other person who refuses to sell such samples for analysis shall be guilty of an offence.

III.—By-laws relating to the Sale of Milk Generally.

1. No person who is not a licensee of a dairy as aforesaid, shall himself, or by any agent or servant, sell or deliver, or expose, keep, carry, hawk, or offer for sale, any milk within the administrative limits of the Council, save in accordance with the conditions hereinafter prescribed.

2. (i.) Every such person, whether resident within or without the limits of the Council, who desires to sell or supply for money milk in any quantity to any person or persons within the limits of the Council, shall cause himself to be registered in the books of the Council as a purveyor or supplier of milk.

(ii.) Such registration shall be free of all fees or charges.

3. Every such person shall, by proper application made for that purpose, further cause registration-cards to be issued annually by the Chairman to each servant, vendor, or agent, whether paid or unpaid, employed by him in the work of selling or delivering milk.

4. Any contravention of, or non-compliance with, the foregoing provisions shall be an offence.

5. (1) The Chairman may in his discretion refuse to register as a purveyor or supplier of milk under the foregoing by-law 2, any person who has not been recommended for registration, after such inspection, as may be necessary, of his premises, his animals, and his utensils and equipment generally—

(a) if he is a resident within the administrative limits of the Council, by the Medical Officer of Health of the Council; or

(b) if he is a resident in any area outside the limits of the Council, by the Chairman of any duly constituted local authority there may be in such area, or if there is none, by the Medical Officer of Health for the district in which such area lies.

(2) The Chairman may likewise refuse to issue any registration-cards, under the foregoing by-law 3, until a Medical Officer deputed by him has examined and found each such servant, vendor, or agent to be free from any infectious or contagious disease and from diseases of the skin.

6. The registration-cards so issued by the Chairman shall include the following particulars:—

(a) employer's name and number on register;

(b) name of vendor or servant or agent, and his thumb impression.

7. It shall be an offence for any person to deliver milk or to carry or hawk milk for sale within the limits of the Council, unless he has in his possession a registration-card for the current year duly issued as aforesaid.

8. (i.) It shall be an offence for any person delivering milk or carrying or hawking milk for sale within the limits of the Council, to refuse, or to fail for any reason, to produce for inspection a duly issued registration-card for the current year, when called upon to do so by a Sanitary Inspector or by any person specially or generally authorized by the Chairman in that behalf.

(ii.) In the event of any person so refusing or failing to produce such card, it shall be lawful for such Sanitary Inspector or other authorized person to exercise the powers given to peace officers by section 33 (1) of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1898.

9. It shall be an offence for any person to sell or deliver or to expose, keep, carry, hawk, or offer for sale, within the limits of the Council—

(i.) any milk from which the cream has been removed, unless such milk is contained in a vessel which is distinctly and conspicuously labelled "Skimmed milk" in English, and the equivalent term in Sinhalese and Tamil, and is sold as such.

(ii.) any milk adulterated with water or any other foreign substance or liquid; provided that milk to which tea, coffee, or cocoa has been added for consumption on the premises of any tea or coffee boutique or eating-house, shall not be deemed to be adulterated for the purpose of this by-law.

(iii.) any milk contained in bottles of which the mouth is not covered with paper or other impermeable material.

10. If any person found guilty of an offence under the foregoing by-law 9 is proved to be the agent or servant, whether paid or unpaid, of any other person, such other person shall also be liable to be punished for the same offence, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the court that he had given all necessary instructions and used due diligence to ensure compliance, and that the offence was due to an act or default of his agent, or servant without his own knowledge, consent, or connivance.

LAUNDRIES.

I.—*Conditions of Issue of Licence.*

No person shall be entitled to a licence for a laundry unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened and having an area when open of not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook work, and have their surfaces limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

2. That a separate room with a floor cemented throughout is provided for the storage of soiled linen.

3. That the premises have a sufficient supply of water for all the purposes of the laundry.

4. That where a pipe-borne water supply is available and is used by the laundryman adequate drainage of the waste water is provided.

5. That the laundry is provided with latrine accommodation consisting of not less than one latrine for every ten of the number of persons employed therein.

II.—*By-laws for Licensed Laundries.*

1. Every licensee of a laundry shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Laundry" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a laundry shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in such laundry. He shall cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be at all times kept in the laundry so as to be available for inspection.

3. Every licensee of a laundry shall cause the inside of the soiled linen room to be limewashed four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December.

4. Every licensee of a laundry shall cause every part of the laundry, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used for the purposes of the laundry to be kept clean and in good repair.

5. No licensee of a laundry shall allow any person suffering, or who to his knowledge has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease to enter the laundry or take part in any work therein or in the transport of any articles thereto or therefrom.

6. No licensee of a laundry shall take or receive or permit to be taken or received soiled clothes from a house where there is or has recently been a case of infectious, or contagious disease, unless the clothes have been disinfected in the manner directed by the Chairman by notification or, failing such directions, in a suitable manner.

7. On the occurrence of any infectious or contagious disease in his premises the licensee of the laundry shall (1) forthwith stop all work in the laundry, (2) notify the Chairman of the occurrence of the disease, (3) retain all clothes in the laundry until the written permission of the Chairman is obtained for the return of the clothes, and (4) not resume work until the premises have been declared by the Chairman to be free of infection.

8. No licensee of a laundry shall keep washed linen in any room used as a sleeping room.

9. Every licensee of a laundry shall cause all rat holes found therein to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement.

AERATED WATER FACTORIES.

I.—*Conditions of Issue of Licences.*

No person shall be entitled to a licence for an aerated water factory unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened, and having an area when open of not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook work, and have their surfaces limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

(e) That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

(f) That the floor is cemented throughout.

(g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

2. That there is at least one room reserved for the manufacture of aerated water.

3. That there is a separate fly-proof room for the storage of syrup essences, and chemicals used in the manufacture of aerated water.

4. That a separate place is provided for the washing of bottles.

5. That the water used in the factory is obtained from a source adequately protected from contamination, that it is so transported to the factory as to preclude all possibility of pollution in transit, that it is stored at the factory in properly constructed tanks or reservoirs, that before it is used in the manufacture of aerated water (and in any process connected therewith) and for washing bottles, accessories, and utensils it is passed through a suitable filter approved by the Chairman and connected with the plant, and that, unless it is derived from an approved source of supply, it has been found on chemical and bacteriological examination to be pure and wholesome.

6. (a) That the aerated water factory is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons, and with latrine accommodation consisting of not less than one latrine for every ten of the number of persons employed therein.

(b) That the aerated water factory is at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, cattle shed, manure heap, or open sewer.

(c) That there is no cesspit, latrine, cattle shed, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the aerated water factory.

II.—*By-laws for Licensed Aerated Water Factories.*

1. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Aerated Water Factory" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in every aerated water factory. He shall cause a register of names and addresses of all employees (including the vendors of aerated water) to be at all times kept in the factory and to be available for inspection by the Chairman or any other officer of the Council.

3. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the factory to be limewashed twice a year in June and December. He shall cause the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least once every June and December, and at any other time when ordered by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause the floor of the factory to be washed at least once every day.

5. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause all bottles used in the factory to be thoroughly cleaned in the following manner :—

There shall be two separate tanks for the cleansing of bottles, one being used for the removal of labels and for the preliminary cleansing, and the other for the final cleansing. Where a pipe-borne water supply is available, the final cleansing shall be in running water.

6. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause every part of the factory, its surroundings, drains, furniture, and utensils, and the equipment used in the making of aerated water to be kept clean and in good repair.

7. No licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause or permit materials or articles other than those used in the manufacture of aerated water to be introduced into the factory.

8. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall take proper measures to ensure that all materials used in the factory are clean, wholesome, and of good quality, and shall cause them to be stored in vermin-proof cupboards or shelves.

9. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause every bottle containing aerated water to bear a label setting out the description of the water and the place of manufacture, the name of the person or firm owning the factory, and the number assigned to the factory by the Chairman.

10. No licensee of an aerated water factory shall employ any person under 12 years of age to work in such factory.

11. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or skin disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter an aerated water factory, or take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of aerated water.

12. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause all persons engaged in bottling aerated water to wear, whilst so engaged, a wire gauze mask over the face and leather gloves on the hands.

13. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall use for storing syrup, essences, chemicals, &c., only vessels made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware, or enamelled iron. He shall not use such vessels for any other purpose, and shall keep them in a place set apart therefor.

14. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause all dung, refuse, urine, and washings from the cattle sheds, latrines or any part of the factory to be removed at least once a day, and to be disposed of in such manner as to prevent any nuisance being caused thereby.

15. No licensee of an aerated water factory shall keep any animal or bird within the licensed premises for any purpose whatsoever.

16. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any Inspector of the Council or any person thereto authorized by the Chairman in writing, to enter any place used for the manufacture or sale of aerated waters at any time when such place is open, and on payment of the price thereof to take a sample bottle of any kind of aerated water which is there manufactured or kept for sale, and any proprietor or person in charge of such place who refuses to permit such sample to be taken shall be guilty of an offence.

17. Every licensee of an aerated water factory shall cause all rat holes found therein to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement.

ICE FACTORIES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence for an ice factory unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. (a) That the premises are in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and that every room is provided with windows capable of being opened and having an area when open of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(b) That the average height of every room is not less than 10 feet and the height is in no place less than 7 feet and the walls are built of brick, stone, or cabook work, and have their surfaces limeplastered and limewashed.

(c) That all the eaves are at least 6 feet from the ground.

(d) That the roof is made of some permanent material.

(e) That all the woodwork is oil-painted or limewashed.

(f) That the floor is cemented throughout.

(g) That the premises are provided with adequate drainage.

(h) That one room in such factory is exclusively reserved for the manufacture of ice.

(i) That the premises are supplied with an adequate supply of water obtained from a source protected from contamination, and with adequate means of transport so as to ensure complete freedom from contamination or pollution in transit, and with properly constructed tanks or reservoirs.

(j) That the factory is provided with a sanitary dust bin, at least two spittoons, and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(k) That the factory is at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, cattle shed, manure heap, or open sewer.

(l) That there is no cesspit, latrine, cattle shed, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the factory.

2. That a special room or place for storage of fuel is provided and so situated that fuel can be carried to it, or from it to the furnace, without passing through any of the rooms of the factory in which ice is made, stored, or placed for delivery.

3. That all the water used in the manufacture of ice, unless it is derived from an approved source of supply, is passed through a suitable filter approved by the Chairman and connected with the plant.

II.—Regulations for Licensed Ice Factories.

1. Every licensee of an ice factory shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Ice Factory" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the factory; and he shall cause a register of the names and addresses of all employees to be at all times kept in the factory so as to be available for inspection by the Chairman or any other officer of the Council.

3. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the factory to be limewashed twice a year in June and December. He shall cause the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted to be washed with hot water and soap at least once every June and December, and at other times when ordered so to do by the Chairman, in writing.

4. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause the floor of the factory to be washed at least once every day.

5. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause every part of the factory, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in the making of ice to be kept clean and in good repair.

6. No licensee of an ice factory shall introduce or permit to be introduced into the factory materials or articles other than those used in the manufacture of ice.

7. No licensee of an ice factory shall employ any person under twelve years of age in the factory.

8. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or skin disease or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter the factory or take part in the preparation, handling, sale, or transport of ice.

9. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause all dung, refuse, urine, and washing from the cattle sheds, latrine, or any part of the factory to be removed at least once a day and disposed of in such manner as to prevent any nuisance being caused thereby.

10. No licensee of an ice factory shall keep any animal or bird within the factory for any purpose whatsoever.

11. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any Sanitary Inspector or any person thereto authorized by the Chairman in writing to enter any ice factory at any time when such factory is open, and to take samples of water used for the manufacture of ice or samples of water derived from ice there manufactured, and any proprietor or person in charge of such factory who refuses to permit such samples to be taken shall be guilty of an offence. If such sample is found to be unfit for human consumption the proprietor or manager of the factory from which such sample was taken shall be guilty of an offence.

12. Every licensee of an ice factory shall cause all rat holes found therein to be filled with broken glass and plastered with cement.

PUBLIC BATHING PLACES.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a public bathing place unless he satisfies the Chairman that the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the public bathing place is located in a sufficiently secluded spot or is screened from public view.

2. That a portion of the premises is suitably screened off for the exclusive use of women and children.

3. That the water used is obtained from the public water supply where such exists.

4. Where the public bathing place is served by a well or spring—

(a) That the well or spring is provided with a protecting wall at least 2 feet high all round, or, if there is no wall that the bathing place is constructed in such a way that none of the waste water flowing therefrom can find its way back into the well or spring.

(b) That the ground immediately surrounding such well or spring is sloped and paved and covered with concrete, so as to allow the water to run into a leadaway drain of a sufficient length to prevent any percolation of dirty water into the well or spring.

II.—By-laws for Public Bathing Places.

1. Every licensee of a public bathing place shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position outside his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Public Bathing Place" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. Every licensee of a public bathing place shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence, to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and he shall cause a register of the names and addresses of all employees to be at all times kept in the licensed premises so as to be available for inspection by the Chairman or any other officer of the Council.

3. (a) If tubs are used in a public bathing place the licensee of such bathing place shall cause them to be cleaned daily and painted twice annually in June and December.

(b) If cemented cisterns are used he shall cause them to be kept in good repair and cleaned daily.

(c) If a large tank or bath is used, he shall provide it with an inlet pipe for a constant supply of fresh water and an outlet pipe capable of drawing away the used water from below as the fresh water flows in from above.

4. Every licensee of a public bathing place shall cause every part of the public bathing place, its surroundings, drains, and equipment to be kept clean and in good repair.

5. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious, or loathsome disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe, wash in, or in any way use the

water of, any such public bathing place, unless the water is drawn for such person by some healthy person and carried for use to a distance of at least 20 yards from such public bathing place.

6. Whenever a public bathing place is served by a well or a spring, no person shall use such well or spring for washing any animal or any article whatever other than the cloth or costume worn at the time of bathing, and any process of cleaning such cloth or costume upon a stone or otherwise shall be carried out at such distance from the well or spring as to preclude the possibility of the splash caused thereby falling into the well or spring.

7. No person shall commit a nuisance by obeying a call of nature at or near any public bathing place, except in a latrine provided for the purpose.

General Meeting.

The Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice, dated July 25, 1934.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 4, 1934, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read and confirmed.

1A. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando stated that he wished to move, under section 90 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, that the House do stand adjourned till 3 p.m. on Wednesday, August 8, 1934.

The Chairman pointed out that that section did not provide for a motion of that kind.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando stated that section 90 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, should be read in conjunction with by-law 25 of Chapter II. of the Council's by-laws.

After a discussion, the Chairman permitted Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando to state his reasons for asking for an adjournment.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando stated that it was as a protest against the enforcement of the Quota Scheme on Ceylon by a Special Order-in-Council and having submitted his reasons moved that the House do stand adjourned till 3 p.m. on Wednesday, August 8, 1934.

The Chairman ruled the motion out of order and stated that he would take the sense of the House as to whether it should adjourn or not.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha wished to know whether he might second the motion.

The Chairman stated that there was no motion before the House.

With the permission of the Chairman, Mr. A. E. Goonesinha supported Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando's remarks.

The Chairman invited the members to record the sense of the House as to whether it should adjourn or not.

Seven members voted in favour of adjournment and 10 members voted against it.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando called for a division and the Council divided as follows :—

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. E. Goonesinha presented a petition signed by certain residents of Mutwal, &c., praying that they be granted a permit to have Bana preaching on Sunday evenings at Elie House park, and requested that it be referred to the Four Standing Committees for consideration and report.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. R. A. Razik asked the following questions which the Chairman answered :—

(1) Q.—Will the Chairman please let me know what sum is expended annually in the maintenance of the riding track in Victoria Park? A.—The actual amounts expended are as follows :—1931, Rs. 692.43; 1932, Rs. 485.69; 1933, Rs. 534.31; 1934, Rs. 313.28 (half year).

(2) Q.—Is there any check on, and supervision over, the expenditure, and if so, what? A.—All work on the track is ordered and supervised by the Engineer, Sanitation, under directions of the Municipal Engineer. The Superintendent of Parks further checks labour and materials.

(3) Q.—Will the Chairman consider the feasibility of having leather shavings put down on the track? A.—Yes.

(4) Q.—Are monies used by way of capital expense for new gas mains, &c., taken out of the annual vote of Rs. 124,000 voted for lighting; if so, how much has been so expended? A.—The answer to the first part of the question is in the negative so far as mains are concerned, and as it is not clear what items the member intends to include as “&c.” it is not possible to reply to the second portion.

(5) Q.—If the monies voted for street lighting are utilized for laying of mains, &c., will the Chairman kindly present these items separately in future Budgets? A.—These items are already shown separately.

(6) Q.—Under what authority were large sums of rate-payers money spent on improving the illuminating power of gas lamps when the Gas Company is responsible for the candle power of lamps as is shown in the “Gas Files” of this Council? A.—On the authority of the sanctioned estimates.

(7) Q.—Will the Chairman in the future consult the Housing and Town Improvement Committee and not act on a suggestion of the Engineer, Mechanical? A.—The Chairman acts normally on the advice of the Municipal Engineer. If the Council so wishes he has no objection to consulting the appropriate Committees in each case.

(8) Q.—How many gas lamps were reported by the Council's Gas Inspector as being defective and poorly illuminating during the first half of this year? A.—956.

(9) Q.—How much in fines have been recovered from the Gas Company during the first half of this year for use of lamps below the contracted candle power? A.—Nil.

(10) Q.—Is the Engineer, Mechanical, permitted to buy the electrical goods necessary for the workshop from whomever he likes and as he likes? A.—Yes, under rules which limit his discretion to the purchase of goods costing less than Rs. 20 and proprietary articles obtained direct from the local agents.

(11) Q.—Will the Chairman in future call for tenders for the supply of electrical goods to the Council? A.—The Chairman sees no reason for altering the present procedure.

4. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved :—That the Council do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the agenda. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

The gratuity is based on his service of 190 months and his average monthly pay of Rs. 26·60. *Note.*—This labourer's service had been interrupted by breaks. They can be condoned under second proviso to Rule 21 of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, which runs as follows :—“It shall, however, be competent for the Council, with the consent of His Excellency the Governor, to award such gratuities in cases in which the service has not been continuous.” Registered No. 832.—Recommended.

(42) To recommend, under Rule 21 of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, the grant of a gratuity of Rs. 335·23 to Muttusamy, B. T. 16 of the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon's Department, who is condemned by a medical board as unfit for further service. The gratuity is based on his service of 155 months and his average monthly pay of Rs. 38·93. Registered No. 803.—Recommended.

(43) To recommend, under Rules 2, 12, and 2A (i.) of the Municipal Council Pension Rules, the grant of a reduced pension, with effect from April 27, 1934, of Rs. 1,650·12 per annum, and a gratuity of Rs. 5,500·40 to Mr. M. H. C. Coorey, Head Clerk, Municipal Assessor's Department. Registered No. 892.—Recommended.

** Write off of Arrears of Rates.*

(44) To consider a report of the Municipal Treasurer, dated July 13, 1934, recommending that arrears of rates amounting to Rs. 267·99 be written off. (34 cases all on ground of poverty). Registered No. 904.—Recommended.

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) of July 25, 1934, were considered.

MUNICIPAL TREASURER'S DEPARTMENT.

(2) To consider :—(a) Letter No. Q, dated June 1, 1934, from the Auditor-General regarding the payment of acting salary under the new Municipal Leave By-law No. 25. (b) The comments of the Municipal Treasurer, dated June 29, 1934. (c) A memorandum thereon of the Chairman. Registered No. 696.—Recommended that the present procedure do continue and all acting appointments be made by the Chairman. The question of acting pay was deferred for consideration at the next meeting.

MUNICIPAL ASSESSOR'S DEPARTMENT.

(3) To consider :—(a) The following motion of Dr. E. A. Coorey, M.M.C., in Council on May 16, 1934 :—“ In view of the fact that great hardship is caused to all religious bodies in the City particularly to the Buddhists and the Hindus by assessment of properties in terms of section 115 (i.) of the Municipal Council Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, which only provides that all school buildings, and buildings *exclusively* appropriated to religious worship, &c., shall be exempted from the payment of such rate or rates, this Council is of opinion that this section of the Ordinance should be so amended as to bring the assessment of such properties into line with the provision made in section 172 of Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, which provides that there shall be exempt from any such rate or acreage tax all lands or buildings *wholly or mainly* used for religious, educational, or charitable purposes, &c., and urges on the Central Government the desirability of amending the said section of the Municipal Council Ordinance accordingly”. (b) The report of the Municipal Assessor thereon. Registered No. 610.—Recommended, by a majority of six to two, that exemptions be granted to lands and buildings owned and occupied by religious, educational, or charitable bodies.

The voting was as follows :—

Ayes.—Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando, Dr. E. A. Coorey, Mr. M. L. M. Reyal, Dr. S. Muttiah, Mr. F. Dadabhoy, and Mr. A. E. Goonesinha.

Noes.—The Chairman and Mr. W. J. Price.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

The Chairman moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committees be not adopted.

Dr. E. A. Coorey moved, as an amendment, that the recommendation of the Standing Committees be adopted, subject to the addition of the words “ where they are owned and occupied by such Institutions ” after the words “ Charitable purposes, &c.,” occurring in 10th and 11th lines of the motion. Mr. A. E. Goonesinha seconded.

The amendment was put to the meeting and the Chairman announced that 8 Members had voted for it and 8 against, and that he gave his casting vote against the amendment which he declared *lost*.

Dr. E. A. Coorey called for a division and the Council divided as follows :—

Noes.—(1) The Chairman; (2) Mr. T. C. Dyball; (3) Lt.-Colonel N. W. Napier-Clavering, D.S.O., R.E.; (4) Dr. S. T. Gunasekera; (5) Mr. G. K. Thornhill; (6) Mr. W. J. Price; (7) Mr. T. A. Owles; (8) Mr. F. A. Bond; (9) Mr. C. F. Whitaker. The amendment was declared *lost*.

The motion of the Chairman was put to the meeting and carried.

The following Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of July 25, 1934, was considered.

VETERINARY DEPARTMENT.

(22) To consider the memoranda of the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon, dated July 4, and the Municipal Treasurer, dated July 5, 1934, regarding the removal of non-contagious diseased carcasses of animals within the City and of their incineration at the Refuse Destructor and suggesting that the Council should consider the question of charging a fee for this service. Registered No. 875.—Recommended that the recommendation of the Finance Committee (item No. 22) of July 18, 1934, be approved.

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee regarding Housing and Town Improvement of July 27, 1934, were considered.

MUNICIPAL ASSESSOR'S DEPARTMENT.

Soertsz; K.C., who has been absent from the two previous General Meetings and thereby ceased to be a member in consequence of having failed to attend three consecutive General Meetings, be restored to office, under the provisions of section 30 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on August 18, 1934, at 8.45 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated August 13, 1934.

Present:—Mr. E. T. Dyson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. W. Beven; Dr. L. C. Wijesinha; Mr. O. T. Nettelton.

1A. Before proceedings of the meeting commenced the Chairman moved—"That this Council place on record its deep sense of loss caused by the death of Mr. Chas. Vanderwall, Proctor, S. C., who rendered valuable services to the Council both as a member of Council from January, 1897, to November, 1905, and as its lawyer for many years, and that an expression of its sympathy be conveyed to the widow and children in their said bereavement." Ratwatte Adigar seconded the vote of condolence, mentioning that Mr. Vanderwall was a highly respected citizen of the town, had lived here for over half a century, and as the Council's lawyer had had the fullest confidence of the Council. The vote of condolence was passed in the usual manner, all members standing.

1B. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on July 21, 1934, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted:—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1933 to July, 1934, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for July, 1934.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of July, 1934.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended August 18, 1934.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the minutes of proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table:—

- (a) Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during July, 1934.
- (b) Report of the Municipal Engineer on the condition of the various drives in Kandy.

3C. The Chairman mentioned that the state of the reservoir was causing some concern and as a result of measures of restriction already introduced the daily consumption had been reduced to about 650,000 gallons from about 750,000 gallons a day. He indicated that he would circulate papers to Council if between now and the next meeting the reservoir fell to such a level as to necessitate the supply of lake water and the enforcement of further measures of restriction, he did not personally think that such drastic measures would be necessary.

4. Petitions:—(1) Mr. Geo. E. de Silva presented a petition from certain residents of Huduhumpola praying that adequate bridge access be provided from Huduhumpola via the Railway line, on to the public road.

(2) Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake presented petitions from (a) Messrs. M. K. M. K. A. K. & Co., asking for a private water service to the Mosque in Getambe. (b) Mrs. M. S. Fernando in regard to the cancellation by Council of a lease of land held by her at the head of the lake.

(3) Mr. W. A. B. Soysa presented petitions from (a) residents in Castle Hill street praying that the back-lane behind Silva's studio in Castle Hill street be lighted so as to prevent the abuses prevailing therein at night. (b) Mr. A. P. R. K. N. Waduganathan Chettiar, the owner of premises Nos. 374, 374A, 375, 375A, 376A-J, Trincomalee street claiming exemption from meter rent and excess water charges for these premises served by one tap and occupied for residential purposes and asking for the removal of the meter installed.

The Chairman undertook to look into the several matters referred to in the petitions.

5. Pursuant to notice Ratwatte Adigar asked—Will the Chairman be pleased to table a statement showing—

- (a) Works given out on tender during the last 3 years of Rs. 1,000 and over.
- (b) The amount of estimate for each work.
- (c) The amount of tender.
- (d) The amount actually paid as cost of such work.
- (e) The amount saved on estimates.
- (f) The number of building applications during the last three years.
- (g) The number of building applications allowed.
- (h) The number of buildings for which certificates of conformity have been issued.
- (i) The number of buildings constructed and occupied without certificates and which have been assessed as distinct from those not assessed.

The Chairman tabled a statement giving the necessary particulars.

6. Pursuant to notice, Dr. Attygalle asked :—Are new buildings marked on the town survey plan and is the plan kept up to date ?

The Chairman replied :—No.

Arising therefrom it was resolved that as a matter of future procedure every new building erected in the town be indicated in the town plan kept at the Municipal Engineer's Office before a certificate of conformity is issued in respect of such premises.

7. Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake obtained the leave of the Council to defer consideration of the following motion which stood in his name for the special meeting of the Council to be convened for the purpose of considering the report of the Salaries Committee :—“That in view of the low state of the finances of the Council at present, the Government be requested to allow the present arrangement of having the Government Agent, Central Province, to act as Chairman of the Council to continue till such time as the Council is reformed.”

8. To consider the report of the Salaries Committee and connected memoranda. It was resolved that a special meeting of the Council be held on August 26, at 9 A.M., for the purpose of considering this report, and that Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake's motion under 7 above be referred to the same meeting.

9. Recommendations of the Standing Committees :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on July 21, 1934.

(1) Papers *re* application made by Carpenter Bandia for sick pay in respect of 14 days' leave taken by him in May last, under by-law 19 (1) of the Council's Leave By-laws.—Recommended to advise that Bandia is not entitled to sick leave pay.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on July 21, 1934.

(2) Application from Mr. K. D. M. Perera for a stall in the Public Market for the sale of pork.—Recommended to refuse the application.

(3) Letter dated June 18, 1934, from Messrs. M. G. Aponso & Co., stating that they have closed the business which they carried on in fish stall No. 60/61, Public Market and given over their share of the stall to Messrs. P. S. Fernando & Bros., and asking that the name of the latter be entered in the licence as licensee. (D 60).—Recommended.

(4) Papers *re* applications received for permission to open a beef stall in Ampitiya (C 181).—Recommended to inform the applicants that the Council is prepared to consider the question of allowing a beef stall to serve the area if the applicants can provide a suitable stall at a suitable site.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on July 21, 1934.

(5) To obtain sanction for the recovery of the sum of Rs. 124.42 representing the cost of construction of back lane in respect of premises No. 74, Brownrigg street from the owner of these premises in 12 monthly instalments of Rs. 10 each and one of Rs. 4.42 with 6 per cent. interest per annum thereon.—Recommended.

(6) To consider the desirability of limiting the concession now allowed to owners of properties to redeem properties sold for default in payment of rates and purchased by the Council on their paying the arrears in instalments to purchases made before January 1 this year. (A 66).—Recommended that this limitation be adopted.

(7) To sanction the creation of the post of caretaker of the Ratwatte Sports Pavilion at Bogambara from July 11, 1934, on a monthly salary of Rs. 25 (O 512).—Recommended.

(8) To obtain sanction for the creation of the following posts in the Municipal Council's Motor Workshop, on the salary scales mentioned :—(a) One mechanic—pay Rs. 3 per diem rising to Rs. 4 per diem by increments of 10 cents per diem allowed annually. (b) Two labourers and day or night watchers—pay 75 cents per diem rising to Re. 1.25 per diem by 10 increments of 3 cents and five increments of 4 cents per diem allowed annually.—Recommended creation of posts, subject to the amendment of the salary scale of mechanic to Rs. 2.50 per diem rising to Rs. 3 per diem by increments of 10 cents per diem allowed annually.

(9) To obtain sanction for the payment of a sum of Rs. 60.26 to Overseer Jansz representing overtime work done by him to permit of the completion of the Pavilion in time for the opening. (O 512).—Recommended.

(10) Letter dated May 25, 1934, from the Hony. Secretary, Katugastota Muslim Association, claiming exemption from rates for premises No. 76, Madawela road, on the ground that they are used for an Arabic School.—Recommended to exempt the premises from rates.

(11) Papers *re* the proposal to charge a monthly rent from the Electricity Department for the use of the Katugastota Garage as engine room and of the Lorry Drivers' quarters as quarters for the Head Wireman in charge. (F 109).—Recommended to charge a rent of Rs. 35 per mensem.

(12) Papers *re* inquiries made as to additional staff and expenditure necessary for carrying out a more intensive anti-mosquito campaign.—Recommended additional vote of Rs. 750 for the remainder of the year.

(13) To obtain sanction for the payment to Mr. M. C. Abdul Jawad, Assessment Clerk, retired from the Council service as from July 1, 1934, a commuted pension of Rs. 3,906.25 and a reduced annual pension of Rs. 1,171.88.—Recommended.

(14) To obtain sanction for the payment to Dingiriya, Public Lamp labourer, Electricity Department, retired from the Council's service as from June 23, 1934, a commuted pension of Rs. 358.12 and a reduced annual pension of Rs. 107.44.—Recommended.

(15) Application from the Hony. Secretary, Baudharakshaka Samitiya, for a contribution towards the building of a garage to house their hearse.—Not recommended.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on July 21, 1934.

(16) Estimate from the Municipal Engineer for Rs. 30 for providing a rickshaw stand in King street for 3 rickshaws and estimates for Rs. 50 and Rs. 75 from him for providing, alternately, stands to accommodate 3 and 6 rickshaws at Brownrigg street. (B 33).—Recommended estimate for Rs. 30 for providing stand for 3 rickshaws in King street, and estimate for Rs. 75 for providing stand for 6 rickshaws in Brownrigg street.

(17) To sanction the unauthorized extension of water service made to premises Nos. 1 & B, Temple street by their owner being allowed to remain on his agreeing to have the services metered. (W/PW 152).—Recommended to allow extension to remain if the owner agrees to pay meter rent from the date the unauthorized extension was carried out : otherwise to disallow the services.

(18) Letter dated May 15, 1934, from the Hony. Secretary of the Sri Puspadana Society stating that his Committee has directed him to request the Council to instal a standpost near the Maligawa for the use of the pilgrims worshipping at the Maligawa on full moon and new moon poya days.—Not recommended for the present.

(19) Papers *re* enquiries made as to the possible erection and maintenance costs of a live fence along the front walls inside the Mahaiyawa General Cemetery.—Recommended to consider the proposal with the 1935 Budget.

(20) Estimate for Rs. 311 from the Municipal Engineer for effecting improvements to the pig slaughter-house and repairing the latrine attached to the Dharma lines.—Recommended.

(21) To obtain a vote for Rs. 165 for providing an additional counter for the Shroff's Room. (W/PW 43/243).—Recommended.

(22) To obtain a supplementary vote for Rs. 2,000 for the purchase of 40 additional water meters. (W/S 11/32).—Not recommended in view of the proposed Change of policy in regard to the allowance of metered water services.

(23) Eight tenders received for repairing side drains in Katukelle Lake road. (W/M 91).—Recommended that Mr. D. J. Ponweera's tender for Rs. 1,589.62 for the work be accepted.

(24) To obtain sanction for utilizing the balance of Rs. 610·56 left unexpended in estimate 45/31—Night Soil Depôts—for metalling the approach road to Mahaiyawa Night Soil Depôt. (W/G 73).—Recommended.

(25) Application from the Municipal Engineer for a supplementary vote for Rs. 5,820·82 representing the cost of certain extra items not originally estimated for but found to be necessary for the completion of the Sports Pavilion and of making the roadway to the Pavilion.—Recommended a supplementary vote for the amount and also votes of Rs. 500 for the equipment of the Pavilion and of Rs. 60·26 to meet the overtime wages of Overseer Jansz in connection with the work done by him to permit of the completion of the Pavilion in time for the opening.—*Vide* item (9).

The Municipal Engineer's attention to be drawn once again to the fact that in another connection he has already been given instructions that the Council strongly disapproves of the incurring of expenditure in excess of estimates sanctioned, without the authority of the Council.

(26) (a) Tenders received for the construction of 18-in. drains and repairing existing drains at the Mahaiyawa labour lines. (W/M 19).—Recommended that the lowest tender received be accepted *i.e.*, Mr. J. W. William's tender for Rs. 424·50.

(b) Tenders received for the supply of 15 dustbins to the Health Department for scavenging purposes. (W/M 20/34).—Recommended that Messrs. Majid & Faleel's tender for Rs. 1,200 be accepted.

(27) Applications for metered water services to—

(a) 19/22, Madawela road—Annual value, Rs. 620.

(b) 157, Trincomalee street—Annual value, Rs. 253.

(c) 223, Colombo street—Annual value, Rs. 900.

(d) 314, Trincomalee street—Annual value, Rs. 330.

(e) Large bungalow in Primrose Gardens in course of construction.

(f) 39, Peradeniya road,—Annual value, Rs. 320.

(g) 420, Peradeniya road—Annual value, Rs. 320.

(h) 54, Castle Hill street—Annual value, Rs. 362.

Not recommended, pending augmentation of the present water supply.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on July 21, 1934.

(28) To obtain approval to address Government for authority to carry out electric lighting extensions beyond Municipal limits in the following areas as suggested by the Municipal Electrical Engineer. (F 38).

(a) Panwila road to a distance of 1,110 yards from the present point. (b) Gampola-Heendeniya road to a distance of one mile from the present point. (c) Galagedera road to a distance of $\frac{1}{4}$ mile.—Recommended.

(29) To consider the desirability or otherwise of applying the tender system to purchases below Rs. 1,000 made by the Electricity Department.—Recommended that it is sufficient if quotations are called for in the case of purchases over Rs. 500: the quotations to be addressed to the Chairman.

(30) To obtain sanction for asking the Manager of Electrical Undertakings to arrange to have the annual inspection of the Power Station carried out by the same officer who inspected last year, with a view to ascertaining how far the defects he then pointed out have since been remedied. (F 118).—Recommended.

(31) Estimate for Rs. 1,570 from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for extending the electric lighting main along Lady Anderson's road.—Recommended consideration of the estimate with the Budget.

(32) Estimates from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for Rs. 110 and Rs. 302 for lighting the path leading to the Deyamewela Model Dwellings and the path at Hospital Hantane road. (F 206).—Recommended.

(33) To obtain sanction for permitting the Municipal Electrical Engineer to use articles reported as obsolete at the 1933 verification of electrical stores for fittings work at 25 per cent. off their book values, in view of the likelihood of their not fetching a fraction of their cost, if sold by public auction.—Recommended.

(34) To obtain sanction for transfer of Rs. 460 from the balance of Rs. 2,866·92 left in the vote allowed for electric lighting improvements in Katugastota area to defray the cost of an oil storage tank for the Power Station.—Recommended.

(35) Estimate for Rs. 73 from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for supplying and erecting a karri timber pole to support the overhead electric main in Gregory road. (F 211).—Recommended.

(36) Letter dated May 1, 1934, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer applying for approval to purchase six meters for the Mains Control Board from Messrs. Brown & Co. at an approximate cost of Rs. 510.—Recommended.

Resolution of Council on the recommendations:—

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted with the exception of the recommendations on items (4), (16), and (25).

In regard to the recommendation of item (4), it was resolved that it be amended by the addition of the words "and provided that the site and premises are deemed suitable for the purpose by the Medical Officer of Health".

In regard to the recommendation on item (16), it was resolved to approve of the expenditure involved in the two estimates, and, in regard to the proposed King Street Stand, to look into the question as to whether another site is available in a less congested part of the same street which might be more suitable for the purpose than the site now proposed.

In regard to item (25) the Chairman indicated that owing to an error in the computation of the totals of the various items connected with the steel work on the part of Messrs. Walker Sons & Co., which had been overlooked by the Works Department, the supplementary vote applied for on this account was Rs. 1,000 short of the actual cost. The inclusion of this sum, plus sums of Rs. 500 and Rs. 60·26 stipulated in the recommendation, and of a further sum of Rs. 424·51 incurred in building the drain by the Sports Pavilion to protect the Pavilion abutments and foundations, which in the opinion of the Works Committee was more appropriately chargeable to the pavilion Expenditure, instead of the estimate allowed for sub-soil drainage of Bogambara, would bring the total amount of the supplementary vote required to Rs. 7,805·59.

Mr. De Silva opposed the allowance of any supplementary votes on the ground that the work had been done without Council's previous sanction.

It was resolved to allow a supplementary vote for Rs. 7,805·59 to cover all the items outlined above, subject to the proviso that a full explanation be obtained from the Municipal Engineer, on his return, in respect of the excesses, and that the Council reserves the right to take any further action which it might deem necessary in the circumstance of the Municipal Engineer's explanation being unsatisfactory.

Mr. de Silva dissented from this resolution.

10. Papers *re* the arrangements proposed to accord a civic reception to H. R. H. the Duke of Gloucester in connection with his visit to Kandy on September 23.

Council resolved itself into Committee to discuss the arrangements, informally.

The Chairman made a statement in which he outlined the details of the programme, indicating that on H. R. H.'s arrival in Kandy on September 23rd morning, the Council members would be presented to His Royal Highness at the Esplanade, after inspection of a C. P. R. C. Guard of Honour by him.

The Chairman also tabled a statement from Mr. Mottram outlining the illumination arrangements proposed for the night of September 23.

It was resolved to present an Address of Welcome to His Royal Highness on behalf of the Council and to approve of the flood lighting and illumination scheme submitted by Mr. Mottram, votes of Rs. 300 and Rs. 600 respectively, being allowed for the purposes.

11. Ratwatte Adigar proposed "That a vote of appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Council by Dr. L. C. Wijesinha as a nominated member of the Council from June 4, 1932, be placed on record".

Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake and the Chairman associated themselves with the expression of appreciation, and it was carried unanimously.

Present :—Mr. E. T. Dyson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. W. Beven; Dr. L. C. Wijesinha; Mr. O. T. Nettleton.

1. Mr. Wijayatilake moved the following motion which was deferred from the previous meeting for consideration at the special meeting :—“ That in view of the low state of the finances of the Council at present, the Government be requested to allow the present arrangement of having the Government Agent, Central Province, to act as Chairman of the Council to continue till such time as the Council is reformed ”.—Mr. Usoof Ismail seconded.

On the Chairman's suggestion the mover agreed to amend the motion by substituting the words “ for the time being ” for the words “ to continue till such time as the Council is reformed ”.

The motion as amended was put to the house and carried. Mr. Beven dissenting.

2. The Chairman tabled the report of the Salaries Committee dated April 16, 1934, and connected memoranda, with a statement showing the comparative cost of the existing and proposed schemes.

On the motion of Mr. de Silva, the Council moved into Committee to consider the report.

Proceedings of Council in Committee.

A. With reference to paragraph 4 and Salaries Committee's recommendations contained in Schedule 1B—

“ To consider confirmation in a permanent capacity, of the post of clerk allowed in 1929, on daily pay for the period of continuance of supply of electric fittings by the Electricity Department ”.

“ Recommended to make the post permanent and to decide on the grade when considering the question of cadre ”.

Resolved that the recommendation be adopted and the officer (Mr. C. M. de Silva) be placed in Class III. of the New Scheme commencing on the salary scale of Rs. 720 per annum with effect from August 1, 1934, in view of his continued employment since 1929 ”.

“ B. Memorial from Officers in the Clerical establishment and Inspectorate praying for an enhanced scale of salaries.—Recommended—

(1) That enhanced salary scale be not allowed.

(2) That the salary scale of the special grade post in the existing scheme be altered to Rs. 3,180—Rs. 180—Rs. 4,200.

(3) That the Special Grade Post be filled immediately, and the officer appointed be required to act for the Secretary, whenever the latter is on leave.

(4) That the number of appointments in Grades I. and II. be increased to 3 and 8 respectively against 2 and 6 provided in the 1922 scheme ”.

I. Resolved that the recommendations (1) and (2) be adopted.

II. In connection with recommendation (3) the proposal contained in the members' memorandum dated July 2, 1934, suggesting provision of 2 posts in the Special Class (hitherto known as Special Grade) of the Clerical establishment and Inspectorate (one for outdoor staff and one for indoor staff) was considered.

Mr. Beven moved—“ That only 1 Special Class post be provided ”.—Dr. Wijesinha seconded.

The motion was put to the house and carried by a majority of 6 to 4 votes, the division being as follows :—

Ayes.—Ratwatte Adigar, Mr. Geo. E. de Silva, Mr. O. T. Nettleton, Mr. W. Beven, Dr. L. C. Wijesinha, Chairman, *Noes.*—Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake, Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail, Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle.

Resolved further that the officer holding the Special Class post be given the designation of “ Assistant Secretary ” and that his duties include the duty of assisting the Secretary generally and acting for him when the latter is on leave, provided no increase in cadre is caused thereby.

III. Regarding recommendation (4) resolved that the number of appointments in Grades I. and II. of the existing scheme be increased to 4 and 7 respectively subject to a halt of two years at the top of Grade I. and three years at the top of Grade II., Mr. Beven dissenting and suggesting 3 and 8 posts respectively.

C. With reference to paragraph 7—Schedule 2—

I. Resolved that for the post of Municipal Engineer, in lieu of the salary scale proposed in Schedule 2, the salary scale of a District Engineer in the Public Works Department be adopted, viz., Rs. 6,840 rising to Rs. 11,520 per annum by ten annual increments of Rs. 384 and 2 of Rs. 420.

II. Resolved that for the post of Municipal Veterinary Surgeon in lieu of salary scale proposed in Schedule 2, the salary scale suggested in Members' memorandum dated July 2, 1934, be adopted, viz., Rs. 1,800—Rs. 180—Rs. 3,600.

III. Resolved further that the salary scales proposed in Schedule 2 be adopted substituting the amendments in I. and II. above “ subject to the initial salary in respect of the posts of Municipal Engineer, Medical Officer of Health, and Secretary and Accountant being fixed according to age and experience of the selected candidate, and subject to posts of Assistant Municipal Engineer and Assistant Municipal Electrical Engineer being filled in the event of a vacancy, only if the Council so decides.

D. With reference to paragraph 7—Schedule 3—

Resolved that the salary scales proposed in schedule 3 be adopted subject to the following amendments :—

I. *Waterworks Inspectors : Junior Grade.*—Same salary scale as for Class III. of the Clerical Service. Senior Grade—Same salary scale as for Class II. of the Clerical Service. Age of admission 18–25.

II. *Distraint Inspectors.*—Rs. 600—Rs. 48—Rs. 1,080, halt of 3 years on Rs. 1,080 and Rs. 1,140—Rs. 60—Rs. 1,500. Age of admission 18–25.

III. *Shorthand Writer.*—Rs. 1,200—Rs. 90—Rs. 1,740, halt of 3 years on Rs. 1,740. Efficiency Bar and Rs. 1,860—Rs. 120—Rs. 2,460.

IV. *Engineering Draughtsman.*—Rs. 900—Rs. 60—Rs. 1,500, halt of 3 years on Rs. 1,500. Efficiency Bar and Rs. 1,620—Rs. 72—Rs. 2,100.

V. *Fire Brigade Officer.*—Rs. 1,200—Rs. 120—Rs. 2,100.

VI. *Librarian.*—Rs. 900 per annum.

VII. *Health Visitors.*—Rs. 1,020—Rs. 60—Rs. 1,500.

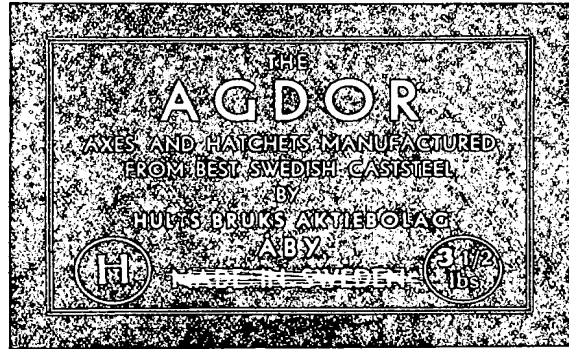
