A PROCLAMATION.

R. E. STUBBS.

KNOW Ye that We, the Governor, in the exercise of the powers in Us vested by Article 4 of the Ceylon Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Order in Council, 1934, do hereby proclaim that of the classes of textile goods severally described in the first column of the Schedule hereto and manufactured in the foreign countries mentioned in the second column of that Schedule the total quantities which may be imported into the Island during the quota periods specified at the head of the third column of that Schedule shall be the amounts expressed in yards of standard width in the corresponding entries in the third column of that Schedule.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor under Article 10 of the Ceylon Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Order in Council, 1934.

Citation of Regulations

Interpretation.

Colombo, July 31, 1934.

Cotton piece goods and artificial silk

piece goods.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Textile Quotas Regulations, 1934.

2. (a) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires-

Regulations.

- "Order in Council" means the Ceylon Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Order in Council, 1934;
- "Schedule " means the Schedule to these regulations;

"Time of Importation" when used with reference to regulated textiles means the time at which such textiles are entered for payment of duty or to be warehoused.

(b) Unless the contrary intention appears, an expression defined in Article 2 of the Order in Council shall, when used in these regulations, have the same meaning as in the Order in Council.

3. For the purpose of determining the classes of textile goods described in the first column of the Schedule to the Proclamation issued under Article 4 of the Order in Council and for the purpose of these regulations

(a) piece goods containing 50 per centum or more of cotton shall be deemed to be cotton piece goods;

- (b) piece goods containing 50 per centum or more of artificial silk shall be deemed to be artificial silk piece goods; and
 (c) piece goods containing 50 per centum of cotton and 50 per centum of artificial silk
- shall be deemed to be artificial silk piece goods.

Standard width.

4. (1) For the purpose of reckoning or recording the yardage of regulated textiles, the "standard width" of any textile or class of textiles mentioned in the first column of the subjoined Table shall mean a width not exceeding the number of inches specified for that textile or class of textiles in the second column of that Table.

(2) If the width of any regulated textile imported into the Island exceeds the standard width prescribed in this regulation for that textile, the yardage of that textile shall be reckoned and recorded as if it had been increased to a yardage which bears to the actual yardage the same proportion as the actual width bears to the standard width of that textile.

5. No regulated textiles shall be entered for payment of duty or to be warehoused except at the Custom House in Colombo.

The return of the quantity, class and origin of imported goods required under Article 5 of the Order in Council to be submitted to the Collector at the time of importation of regulated textiles shall be substantially in Form A of the Schedule.

The declaration of origin required under Article 5 of the Order in Council to be submitted to the Collector at the time of importation of regulated textiles shall be substantially in Form B of the Schedule.

8. Notwithstanding anything in any other written law contained, no stamp duty shall be levied or payable in respect of any declaration made by any person in a return which is substantially in Form A or in a declaration of origin which is substantially in Form B of the Schedule.

A fee of one rupee shall be paid to the Collector for every statement furnished by him 9. under Article 6 (2) of the Order in Council in respect of each foreign country.

10. Upon the issue in the *Gazette* of a notice under Article 6 (3) of the Order in Council to the effect that the quota in respect of any regulated textiles manufactured in any foreign country has been attained, the Collector shall forthwith cause a notice to the like effect to be exhibited at the Custom House in Colombo.

11. The penalty for an offence under Article 8 of the Order in Council shall be a fine not exceeding five thousand rupees.

12. (1) Licences in Form C of the Schedule may be issued by the Collector authorizing the importation of-

> (a) regulated textiles imported as passengers' personal luggage in quantities which the Collector considers reasonable ;

(b) regulated textiles imported by parcel post in quantities considered reasonable by (c) regulated textiles imported during the first quota period and proved to the satisfaction

of the Collector to have been ordered and paid for before the 7th May, 1934.

(2) Regulated textiles imported under a licence in Form C shall not be taken into account for the purpose of determining whether any quota in respect of any regulated textiles manufactured in any foreign country has been attained. (3) A licence in Form C may be issued by the Collector notwithstanding the issue under

Article 6(3) of the Order in Council of a notice to the effect that the quota has been attained in respect of the regulated textiles sought to be imported under that licence.
