KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, by virtue of the powers vested in Us by section 31 of the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1895, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, do hereby amend with effect from the first day of January, 1935, the schedule to the Proclamation under the said section dated June 7, 1932, published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,930 of June 16, 1932, by substituting for the definition of Galkissa (Mount Lavinia) in the Colombo District of the Western Province, therein appearing and reproduced in Column I. of the schedule hereto, the definition appearing in Column II. of the schedule hereto.

Column I.

Division as defined by Proclamation dated June 7, 1932.

Boundaries—

North : The Municipal limits of Colombo to a point three chains to the north-east of the Pamankada bridge on the Kirillapone canal. From this point a line drawn south-east parallel to the Colombo-Kesbewa Public Works Department road three chains distant from it to the north-east till it meets the Kalubowila-Kirillapone village boundary.

East : The village boundary of Kalubowila to a point three chains to the east of the Gansabhawa road running from Kalubowila southwards to Nedimale. From this point a line running south parallel to the said Gansabhawa road to a point three chains to the north of the Dehiwala-Pepiliyana District Road Committee road. From this point a line drawn parallel to the said District Road Committee road eastwards to a point three chains to the east of the junction of the said road with the District Road Committee road running south to Attidiya. From this point a line running south and parallel to the said District Road Committee road and three chains to the east of it as far as the canal. The canal westwards as far as the point from where the said canal turns northwards. From this point a line drawn due south until it meets the Ratmalana-Attidiya road. From this point the said Ratmalana-Attidiya road till it joins the Colombo-Galle road. Thence the Colombo-Galle road southwards as far as the point at which the Kaldemulla Gansabhawa road branches off to the west.

South : The village boundary between Ratmalana South and Kaldemulla and the village boundary between Ratmalana South and Angulana.

West : The sea.

Column II.

Division as defined by this Notification.

Boundaries—

North : From the high water mark of the sea north-eastwards along the centre of the Dehiwala canal (along the Municipal limits of Colombo) up to a point on the centre of the said Dehiwala canal 3 chains to the north-east of the Pamankada bridge; thence south-eastwards along a line everywhere parallel to and 3 chains to the north-east from the northern boundary of the Colombo-Kesbewa road up to the point where it meets the village limit between Kalubowila East and Kirillapone East; thence along the last mentioned village limit and along the village limit between Kalubowila East and Nugegoda up to the point where it meets the village limit between Kalubowila East and Gangodawila.

East : From the last mentioned point along the village limit between Kalubowila East and Gangodawila, the village limit between Kalubowila East and Pepiliyana and the village limit between Kalubowila East and Nedimale up to a point 3 chains to the east from the eastern boundary of the Gansabhawa road running from Kalubowila southwards to Nedimale; thence from the said point southwards along a line everywhere parallel to and 3 chains to the east from the eastern boundary of the said Gansabhawa road up to the point which is also 3 chains to the north from the northern boundary of the Dehiwala-Pepiliyana road; thence north-eastwards along a line everywhere parallel to and 3 chains to the north from the northern boundary of the last mentioned road up to a point 4 chains to the north-east from the centre of the junction of the last mentioned road with the road running south to Attidiya; thence due south in a straight line up to a point on the southern boundary of the Dehiwala-Pepiliyana road 3 chains to the east from the eastern boundary of the road to Attidiya; thence southwards along a line everywhere parallel to and 3 chains to the east from the eastern boundary of the said road to Attidiya as far as the point where it meets the centre of the canal; thence north-westwards along the centre of the said canal up to a point on the centre of the said canal at the bend due south of the north-western corner of lot 8391 in P. P. 10,449; thence due south in a straight line as far as the point where it meets the centre of the Ratmalana-Attidiya road 25 chains to the north-east from the centre of the junction of the Colombo-Galle road with the Ratmalana-Attidiya road; thence south-eastwards along a line everywhere parallel to and 25 chains to the north-east from the centre of the Colombo-Galle road up to the point where it meets the northern boundary of the road that runs along the southern boundary of the Deaf and Dumb School premises.

South : From the last mentioned point south-westwards along the northern boundary of the last mentioned road up to the point where it meets the village limit between Ratmalana South and Kaldemulla; thence south-westwards along the village limit between Ratmalana South and Kaldemulla and the village limit between Ratmalana South and Angulana up to the high water mark of the sea.

West : By the high water mark of the sea.

THE following rule under section 91 (b) of the Ceylon State Mortgage Bank Ordinance, 1931, made by the Board of Directors with the approval of His Excellency the Governor is hereby published for general information.

RULE.

The rules under section 91 (b) published by Notification in the *Gazette* of August 12, 1932, as amended by Notification in the *Gazette* of June 30, 1933, are hereby amended as follows :—

I. In rule 1, by the deletion of all the words from "When they travel outside Colombo" to the end of the rule, and the substitution of the following therefor :—

"The travelling allowance payable to an Inspector travelling to any property on the business of the Bank shall be at the following rates :—

- (1) Where the entire journey can be performed by railway or omnibus, or other public conveyance—a sum equal to the second class return railway fare or to the omnibus or other fare to the station or place nearest to the property, as the case may be.
- (2) Where only a part of the journey can be performed by railway or omnibus or other public conveyance—a sum ascertained in accordance with paragraph (1) for the part of the journey which can be so performed, together with a sum equal to the actual hire of any conveyance engaged by him thereafter to reach the property.
- (3) Where for any reason approved by the Board, a hired conveyance is used for the entire journey—a sum equal to the actual hire of the conveyance engaged by him.

II. By the addition of the following new rules 7, 8, and 9 :—

7. Any travelling allowance, offered in addition to the fee or the subsistence allowance to a Valuator visiting any property on the business of the Bank, shall be at the following rates :—

- (1) Where his own car or conveyance is used for the entire journey—25 cents a mile.
- (2) Where a hired car or conveyance is used for the entire journey—a sum equal to the actual hire paid by him for that car or conveyance.
- (3) Where the entire journey is performed by him by railway or omnibus or other public conveyance—a sum equal to the first class return railway fare or the return omnibus or other fare to the station or place nearest to the property, as the case may be.
- (4) Where for any reason he has been specially requested by the Board to perform the whole or any part of the journey by railway, or omnibus or other public conveyance—a sum equal to the first class return railway fare or the return omnibus or other fare, to the station, terminus, or place indicated by the Board or nearest to the property, together with a sum equal to the actual hire paid by him for any car or other conveyance engaged by him thereafter to reach the property.

8. Where two or more of the Valuers and Inspectors travel together in one hired conveyance on the business of the Bank, the travelling allowance shall be a sum equal to the actual hire paid by them for that conveyance and shall be distributed among them in equal proportions.

9. The travelling allowance claimed by a Valuator or an Inspector shall not be paid without the special sanction of the Board, in any case where the hire stated to have been paid for the car or conveyance engaged by him exceeds 25 cents a mile.

BY-LAW.

THE IRRIGATION ORDINANCE, NO. 45 OF 1917.

RULES under section 11 of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 45 of 1917, made by the prescribed majority of the proprietors within the Kuchchaveli Irrigation District in the Trincomalee District of the Eastern Province, at a meeting duly held on May 12, 1933, and approved by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 19 of the said Ordinance and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

Rules.

1. In these rules, unless the context otherwise requires—
 - "Vaddai" means a tract or a series of tracts of fields;
 - "Vaddai Vidanai" means the Irrigation Headman for any tract or area, elected or appointed under sections 20 and 21 of the Ordinance;
 - "Irrigation Superintendent" means the officer seconded from service in the Irrigation Department to superintend the maintenance of major irrigation works and the construction and maintenance of minor irrigation works under the supervision of the Assistant Government Agent;
 - "Cultivation Officer" means the officer appointed by the Assistant Government Agent to supervise cultivation in all irrigable lands, and may or may not be identical with the Irrigation Superintendent.

PART I.

2. It shall be the duty of a Vaddai Vidanai—
 - (a) to reside during the cultivation season within 3 miles of his Vaddai, and in the event of his absenting himself during such season or at any time when his services are required, to make special arrangements for the discharge of his duties to the satisfaction of the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer;
 - (b) to supervise all paddy cultivation within his Vaddai under the control, and in accordance with the instructions of, the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer;

(c) to prepare lists of proprietors and others liable to perform labour, give notice of proposed works, call out labour, apportion work among those liable or attending to perform labour, and to report defaulters to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer;

(d) to apportion the water from the irrigation works, when it reaches the Vaddai, to the various fields therein; and

(e) to enforce these rules within his Vaddai and to give information of any breach thereof to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer.

3. No Vaddai Vidanai during his term of office shall hold any other appointment without the sanction of the Assistant Government Agent.

4. No Vaddai Vidanai shall hold office for a longer period than three years from the date of his election or appointment, but nothing in this rule shall be deemed to prohibit the re-election or re-appointment of any such officer, if he is otherwise eligible, for further periods of the like duration.

5. The remuneration payable to Vaddai Vidanais shall be at the rates set out below for each acre of land for which dappu has been furnished: Provided, however, that the Cultivation Officer may exempt from payment any land which has remained uncultivated after the furnishing of dappu.

Rates.

In the Police Vidanai's division of Nilaveli—5 measures per acre.

In the Police Vidanai's division of Kumburupiddi—2½ measures per acre.

In the Police Vidanai's division of Kuchchaveli—2½ measures per acre.

In the Police Vidanai's division of Thiriyai—2½ measures per acre.

6. Where any Vaddai Vidanai has failed for any reason to attend to his duties, or where the duties have not been performed satisfactorily, the Assistant Government Agent may appoint any person to collect the remuneration payable to such officer and order it to be paid instead to any person who has acted for such Vaddai Vidanai or into the Irrigation Fine Fund and devote any portion of it to meet the cost of collection.

7. Where no order under rule 6 has been made by the Assistant Government Agent, every proprietor shall hand over the remuneration due to the Vaddai Vidanai, or its equivalent in money at the current market rates, within four months of the close of the harvest, and obtain a formal receipt in acknowledgment thereof.

8. (1) As the season for cultivation approaches, whether it be munmari, kala vellannai, pimmari, or other harvest, a meeting of the proprietors of lands concerned shall be convened and presided over by the Assistant Government Agent or some person deputed in writing by the Assistant Government Agent for the purpose.

(2) Of the time and place fixed for the meeting by the Assistant Government Agent or person deputed by him as aforesaid, at least seven days' notice shall be given in such manner as shall appear to him best adapted for giving publicity thereto.

9. The meeting convened under rule 8 shall determine—

- (a) the most suitable dates for the commencement and completion of sowing and irrigation and the clearing of channels;
- (b) the most suitable dates for furnishing dappus;
- (c) the most suitable dates for the completion of fencing and erection of watch huts;
- (d) the extent to be cultivated;
- (e) the last date for issue of water;
- (f) the order in which the different Vaddais shall be sown;
- (g) the method of cultivation;
- (h) the kind of paddy to be sown in each Vaddai;
- (i) the place and manner in which black cattle and buffaloes are to be confined during cultivation; and
- (j) the exemption from cultivation duties to be allowed on applications from proprietors.

10. (1) If for any reason it is not possible to commence cultivation on the date determined under rule 9, or if the supply of water is likely to be insufficient to irrigate the whole area decided on originally, a further date, or the proportion of the tracts to be abandoned, shall be determined at a meeting of the proprietors duly convened for the purpose: Provided that, if after due notice, no proprietors attend, or if the meeting so convened is not able to arrive at a unanimous decision as regards the area to be

abandoned, the Assistant Government Agent or such officer as may be deputed by him in writing shall have power to determine the area that is to be abandoned.

(2) Each of the proprietors of the area which it was originally decided to irrigate, shall have a right to cultivate a proportionate share of the reduced area.

11. The Assistant Government Agent or officer deputed by him shall cause the decision of a meeting under rule 9 or rule 10 to be published by beat of tom-tom or by fixing written notices in conspicuous places or by other suitable means. All proprietors shall be bound by the decisions of the meeting.

12. (1) Each proprietor shall deliver to the Vaddai Vidanai not later than the day fixed therefor under rule 9 a list (dappu) of the mullaikkaran and cultivators to be employed in his field.

(2) The list shall be substantially in the form set out in the schedule to these rules, and shall be furnished on the printed forms supplied by the Assistant Government Agent, Irrigation Superintendent, or Cultivation Officer, and shall bear the signatures of the proprietor and of the mullaikkaran and cultivators of their marks made before two witnesses.

(3) All the information required by this form shall be accurately filled in, and any person supplying false information shall be guilty of an offence.

(4) From the date of the delivery of the list, the mullaikkaran and cultivators, as well as the proprietors, shall be liable for all works of cultivation, and in the event of neglect or default without sufficient reason, shall be guilty of an offence.

13. In the absence of a legal document showing that another person has been duly placed and is in actual possession of the land, the dappu shall be accepted, in every case from the person who furnished the dappu for the preceding harvest.

14. (1) In the event of any proprietor deciding not to cultivate his land for any season and giving his written consent to its being cultivated by any other proprietor or other applicant, the Vaddai Vidanai shall forthwith send information of the fact to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer.

(2) On receipt of such information the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer may in his discretion either—

(a) exclude the land from the tract to be irrigated, and allow it to remain uncultivated for that season, subject to the condition that the proprietor whose land is so excluded continues to be liable to erect his share of the fence, or

(b) permit the land to be cultivated by the other proprietor nominated by the proprietor or by any other proprietor owning lands in that tract, or failing any such proprietor, by any other applicant found to possess the necessary knowledge and experience of paddy cultivation.

(3) No rent or share of produce or other dues shall be payable to the proprietor of the land by any other proprietor or applicant so permitted to cultivate it; but every such other proprietor or applicant shall be liable to perform all irrigation duties and comply with all the requirements of these rules in the same manner as if he were the actual proprietor of that land.

(4) Any proprietor deciding not to cultivate his land and withholding his consent to the land being cultivated by any other proprietor or applicant, shall continue to be liable to perform all irrigation duties and comply with the requirements of these rules.

(5) Where any land remains uncultivated and the whereabouts of the proprietor cannot be ascertained, the Assistant Government Agent may dispense with his consent for the purposes of this rule, and permit the land to be cultivated by any other proprietor or applicant; but the proprietor thereof shall not in that event be entitled to claim any rent or share of the produce or damages from the proprietor or applicant so cultivating it.

15. (1) Every proprietor shall be liable to contribute labour and perform the duties required by these rules for the season's cultivation, unless exempted at the meeting under rule 9.

(2) In the event of any proprietor failing to perform any work, the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer may cause the work to be done; and the actual cost thereof may be recovered in the manner prescribed by section 23 of the Ordinance.

16. All tanks, dams, channels, water-courses, and the like, which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation, shall be kept in a proper state of repair, and all fields shall be levelled and field-ridges constructed, to the satisfaction of the Assistant Government Agent, by the proprietors in proportion to their respective holdings.

17. Every proprietor shall remove all trees or jungle on his land likely to occasion damage by giving cover to birds or wild animals.

18. (1) All paths between cultivated fields shall be kept open by the proprietors of such fields, according to the limits prescribed by ancient custom, and in proportion to their respective shares.

(2) Inspection-paths through cultivated fields shall also be constructed and maintained by the proprietors, if required by the Assistant Government Agent.

19. (1) When water from the irrigation work has reached any tract, the Vaddai Vidanai thereof may, subject to the control of the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer, cut or close any dam or channel, not in charge of the Director of Irrigation, which impedes the distribution of water to the fields in such tract.

(2) It shall not be lawful for the Vaddai Vidanai at any other time to interfere with any dam or channel outside his Vaddai.

20. (1) No proprietor shall wilfully prevent water from flowing to the field below, or obstruct the flow of surplus water from the field above or in any other way interfere with the general distribution of the water within the Vaddais, or present any obstruction to the customary drainage of a field or tract.

(2) In the event of any person so doing, the Vaddai Vidanai shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps or remove the obstruction himself.

21. No person shall issue, apportion, cut off, divert, or use, the water in any manner except in accordance with the instructions of the Vaddai Vidanai.

22. (1) The fence round the whole Vaddai shall be measured by the Vaddai Vidanai, within three days of the completion of the sowing, and the work of constructing the fence shall be apportioned among the several proprietors of the Vaddai in proportion to their holdings, irrespective of the actual position of their fields in relation to the fence.

(2) The Vaddai Vidanai shall forthwith after such apportionment send a list to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer showing the length of fence apportioned to each proprietor.

(3) If fresh sticks are required, the Vaddai Vidanai shall communicate with the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer as early as possible, and obtain through him the necessary free licence to have them cut.

23. The proprietors shall finish the construction of the fence and the necessary watch huts within the time fixed at the meeting under rule 9 and keep both fence and watch huts in repair throughout the season.

24. (1) Every proprietor shall keep regular watch in accordance with the orders of the Vaddai Vidanai.

(2) No person shall be employed as watcher who is under the age of 16 years or suffers from any physical disability.

25. (1) Any proprietor may reap the crop on his fields as soon as it reaches maturity, but such crop shall not be threshed or removed from the tract without the permission of the Vaddai Vidanai.

(2) Every such proprietor shall continue to keep watch over the fields, and to maintain the fence, until the crop on the rest of the tract has been reaped and stored: Provided, however, that no proprietor shall be bound to keep watch or to maintain the fence until the ripening of the crop on any portion which was not sown at the time or with the description of paddy determined under rules 9 and 10.

26. (1) After the reaping is over the Vaddai Vidanai shall order the removal of the fence, and shall cause the fence sticks to be heaped by the cultivators in such places as he may direct.

(2) Proprietors may, with the consent of the Vaddai Vidanai, remove the fence sticks from the fields; but in every such case they shall furnish the Vaddai Vidanai with a receipt for the number taken, and return them to the land for the following harvest, whether they cultivate their fields or not, or shall be liable for the assessed value of the sticks so removed.

27. No paddy shall be removed from the fields at the termination of the harvest until the wages due to all persons engaged in the harvest and the hire of cattle and other cultivation charges have been paid, and in the case of a field cultivated for share until the landlord's dues have been paid: Provided, however, that in any case where there is a serious risk of damage to any paddy left on the threshing-floor, the proprietor may remove it after taking such steps as are approved by the Vaddai Vidanai for safeguarding the claims of the other parties concerned.

28. (1) All field-channels and water-courses which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation shall be in charge of the Vaddai Vidanais acting under the instructions of the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer.

(2) No person shall fill up, or encroach upon, such channels or water-courses or any of their reservations.

(3) No paddy shall be sown in any irrigation or other channel.

29. (1) Any channel, dam, or other work required, whether outside or inside any field, shall be constructed by the proprietors interested in proportion to their holdings.

(2) Where a scheme is in charge of the Director of Irrigation, all applications for permission to construct such works shall be made in writing to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer.

(3) Every proprietor of new lands which have been surveyed and demarcated by land marks with reservations for field-channels, shall construct his proportion of the field-channel intended to irrigate the group of lots in which his holding is situated, in accordance with alignments approved by the Irrigation Officer.

(4) If any proprietor of such lands is unable to obtain water for irrigation owing to the neglect of any other proprietors to cut their shares of the field-channels, such other proprietors shall be called upon by the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer to do the necessary work.

30. (1) Every proprietor shall grant way leave for field-channels, dams, or other works approved by the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer, even though his own land may not be benefited thereby.

(2) All proprietors whose lands are benefited by any such work shall be liable under this rule to pay to the owners of lands, which suffer damage by the construction of the work, compensation for any land taken, or damage done, in proportion to the area of the holdings benefited and according to such rates as may be determined by the Assistant Government Agent.

31. (1) No person shall in any way alter or injure any ridge or boundary between two fields in the same tract.

(2) On receipt of any information that such alteration or injury has been effected, the Vaddai Vidanai shall, after due notice to the owners, proceed to the spot with witnesses, and call upon the owners to restore the boundary to its original state; and in the event of their failing to do so within three days thereafter, the Vaddai Vidanai shall report the matter to the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer.

32. Whenever any new land is declared irrigable and included in the specification of lands irrigable under any tank or work, the proprietor of such land shall—

- (a) be entitled to water from any part of the existing field-channels without payment of compensation to the proprietors by whom such channels were constructed;
- (b) be entitled to all the rights and privileges enjoyed by the proprietors of the lands already irrigated under the tank or work; and
- (c) be liable to perform all the duties imposed on proprietors by these rules.

33. Every proprietor shall, when required by the Assistant Government Agent, Irrigation Superintendent, or Cultivation Officer, erect bunds or other suitable marks to define the boundaries of his fields.

34. Any proprietor who takes water out of his turn or for a longer period than he is entitled to, or who after having had his full share allows the water to run to waste through negligence, or who misappropriates his neighbour's water through the boundary ridges, shall forfeit the right to his share in the turn next following, and shall be guilty of an offence punishable under Chapter V. of the Ordinance.

35. The customary right of way for taking cattle and agricultural implements, and for transporting fence sticks, paddy, and for other agricultural purposes, shall be allowed to all proprietors under any irrigation work.

36. During the cultivation season it shall be lawful for the Vaddai Vidanai to seize all cattle found on any tank bund or bank of an irrigation channel in his Vaddai, or straying near the fields and likely to endanger the crops, and to hand over such cattle to the local Police Headman to be produced before the Village Tribunal.

37. (1) Every proprietor who employs cultivators, shall keep a book and enter therein all advances of paddy or money paid to his cultivators under the dates upon which such advances are made.

(2) He shall go through the accounts with his cultivators at least three times, namely—

- (a) immediately after the sowing has been completed,
- (b) immediately after the harvest, and
- (c) after the threshing;

and shall take their signatures or thumb marks to the accounts in the books, if those are admitted by them to be correct.

PART II.

Special rules relating to the maintenance of irrigation works within the Kuchchaveli Irrigation District which are in charge of the Assistant Government Agent and for which no irrigation rate is recovered:—

1. Subject to the admission that the tank is the property of Government, so long as the tract of fields attached to it is cultivated, it shall for agricultural purposes be considered to be the joint property of the proprietors of the fields in proportion to the shares held by them.

2. (1) In distributing water from the tank to the fields in a tract, the water shall first be taken to the fields on the higher level and thence to those on the lower level.

(2) No person shall in any way interfere to the prejudice of others with the distribution of water.

3. No person other than the proprietor of any land under the tank shall be entitled to the use of water from the tank for agricultural purposes.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to issue the water of the tank for the cultivation of any land under any other tank, or for the shareholders of lands cultivated under the tank to utilize for their cultivation the water of any other tank, without first obtaining the sanction of the Assistant Government Agent.

5. No person shall cut the bund, or do any act likely to damage the bund, or block up the spill of the tank, without the permission of the Assistant Government Agent or Cultivation Officer or Irrigation Superintendent, or carry out any work upon the bund, spill, or channels contrary to the orders of any of these officers: Provided that in any case where such action is necessary to prevent otherwise inevitable damage to the tank, and it is impossible to communicate with any of the above-mentioned officers in time, permission may be dispensed with, but the burden of proving such special circumstances shall lie upon the persons taking such action.

6. No fence shall be put on any part of the tank bund without the authority of the Assistant Government Agent or Cultivation Officer or Irrigation Superintendent.

7. For the repair or improvement of the tank and the dams, minor channels, or water-courses, and for such other minor works as the Assistant Government Agent may consider necessary, each proprietor shall be liable to contribute labour in proportion to the extent of his land which is to be benefited by the work in question.

8. The bund of the tank shall be divided among the proprietors of the lands under it in proportion to the extent of land owned by each proprietor, and each proprietor shall keep the portion assigned to him properly turfed and free at all times from jungle, brushwood, and overgrowth of every description, and from white ants' nests.

9. (1) The full amount of labour which each proprietor shall be liable under rule 7 to contribute shall not exceed—

- (i) 2 cubes of earthwork per acre, or
- (ii) 4 days' labour per acre, or
- (iii) a money payment in commutation of such labour, at such rate per acre, in accordance with the rate prevailing in the district at the time, as may be specified by notice in that behalf each year.

(2) A day's labour shall for purposes of this rule be taken to mean a day of six hours at any time between sunrise and sunset.

10. In addition to the ordinary work of the year as above provided for, whenever the Assistant Government Agent, or any person authorized by him to supervise the work, gives notice of the need of labour for any urgent work of repair or of prevention of impending damage, every proprietor shall at once contribute the necessary labour or cause his share of the work to be done at his own expense: Provided that double the ordinary amount of labour prescribed under rule 9 shall not be exceeded in any year under this rule.

11. No person other than the Irrigation Superintendent or Chief Headman, or a person duly authorized by either of these officers in that behalf, shall in any way interfere with, or alter the level of, the spill or sluice of the tank.

12. The tank bed shall not be cultivated, unless the majority of the proprietors under the tank decide to cultivate the bed, and the permission of the Assistant Government Agent is obtained.

13. If any proprietor fails to perform his share of any work required under these rules, the Irrigation Superintendent or Cultivation Officer may cause the work to be done and the cost thereof may be recovered in the manner prescribed by section 23 of the Ordinance.

Instructions to be observed.

- (a) This list is to be prepared in duplicate and signed by the proprietor or lessee and delivered to the Vaddai Vidana.
- (b) The Vaddai Vidana having personally satisfied himself that this agreement is genuine will sign both lists, retain one and return the other to the person who furnished the dappu. He is to make all necessary inquiries to prove to his satisfaction that the list is genuine and that the agreements are properly entered into, signed, and witnessed by reliable persons.
- (c) The Vaddai Vidana will be held personally responsible for the acceptance of fraudulent or mischievous dappus.
- (d) On or before the date of commencement of cultivation the Vaddai Vidana shall present all dappus accepted by him to the Irrigation Superintendent or Chief Headman for examination and signature.
- (e) The list shall be retained by the Vaddai Vidana until the reaping of crops is over and shall then be forwarded to the Irrigation Superintendent or Chief Headman for record purposes.
- (f) The acceptance of this dappu entitles the cultivation of the land mentioned and involves the due observance of the Irrigation Rules on all persons therein mentioned (witnesses excepted) but is in no way a document supporting claims of ownership or land mortgages or other matters which must be referred to the Courts.
- (g) The Vaddai Vidana shall refer all disputes as to ownership of land to the Irrigation Superintendent or Chief Headman, who if unable to settle the matter will apply to the Assistant Government Agent for instructions.
- (h) Proprietors or lessees should engage reliable persons for cultivation and secure witnesses who are acquainted with or able to identify afterwards all persons concerned.
- (i) All complaints respecting the Vaddai Vidanas should be addressed to the Assistant Government Agent.
- (j) It is recommended that proprietors and others should peruse the decisions of the cultivation meetings and Irrigation Rules which are available at the Offices of the Irrigation Superintendent or Chief Headman.

BY-LAWS REGARDING SLAUGHTER-HOUSES.

1. No animal shall be slaughtered in any slaughter-house within the administrative limits of this Council, unless 48 hours' notice of the proposed slaughter shall have been given, and until such animal has been approved as fit for slaughter in writing by the Health Unit Medical Officer, Beruwala, or any other officer appointed for the purpose by this Council.

2. Any animal rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.

3. If after the slaughter of any animal which has been approved as aforesaid, the carcass shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer, or the officer appointed by the Council, shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.

4. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said Medical Officer or the officer appointed by the Council, any meat which has been declared to be unfit for human food.

5. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of other animals, or until the carcass of any animal previously slaughtered shall have been removed or screened off and the premises cleansed.

6. The following fees shall be paid in advance to the Council for the use of any slaughter-house established by the Council :—

These rates shall cover exposure in the proper place for 24 hours. An additional fee at one half the above rates shall be paid for each further period of 24 hours' exposure or any part thereof.

7. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall transport or permit any person to transport any meat from a slaughter-house except in a covered zinc-lined cart.

8. Any person committing a breach of any one of the above by-laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50.

Provided that no such endorsement shall be deemed to be valid, and no substitute shall be employed in pursuance thereof,

(a) after the fifteenth day from the date of the endorsement, or

(b) after the licensee is informed in writing by any officer of the Excise Department not below the grade of Inspector that the substitute is for any reason unsuitable for such employment.

3. (1) When the licensee himself taps the trees, this licence shall be on the person of the licensee at all times when he is engaged in tapping, or in transporting, or in selling the toddy, or kept with the toddy while the toddy is in his possession or under his control.

(2) Where the licensee employs a tapper, this licence or such duplicate of it as may be issued by the Superintendent of Excise for the use of the tapper, shall be on the person of the tapper at all times when he is engaged in tapping, or in transporting, or in selling the toddy, or kept with the

toddy while the toddy is in his possession or under his control.

4. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be sold at any place whatsoever other than the place or garden specified in the schedule hereto.

5. No spirits shall be manufactured from the toddy drawn under this licence.

6. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be transported to any place other than the approved place of sale specified in the schedule hereto, except on a special permit for transport and possession, and in no case shall it be transported outside the limits of the Maniagar's Division of Valikamam North.

7. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be sold or given to any person who holds a licence to sell fermented toddy either under the tree tax or the tavern system, or to any tapper licensed to tap trees for the supply of toddy to a Toddy Tavern.

8. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be supplied to any Toddy Tavern, even though such supply be free of charge.

9. Neither the licensee nor the tapper shall possess any toddy other than toddy drawn under this licence, or any quantity of toddy in excess of _____ gallons of coconut toddy and _____ gallons of palmyra toddy.

10. This licence shall be liable to cancellation for any breach of any of the conditions either by the licensee or by the aforesaid tapper or by the tapper substituted under condition 2.

KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.**The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on November 17, 1934, at 8.45 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated November 13, 1934.**

Present :—Mr. E. T. Dyson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. Walter Beven; Mr. O. T. Nettleton; Dr. D. T. de Krestler; Mr. D. M. de S. Abhayanayake.

Before proceeding to the business the Chairman welcomed the new Member Mr. Abhayanayake.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on October 20, 1934, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1933 to October 31, 1934, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for October, 1934.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of October, 1934.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended November 17, 1934.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910", be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—(a) Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during October, 1934. (b) Report from the Municipal Engineer on the condition of the various drives in Kandy.

4. Petitions :—Mr. Wijayatilake presented (1) petition from Messrs. O. Naina Mohamado and O. Peer Mohamado applying for a reduction in the rent of stalls Nos. 23 and 24 which are used for the sale of sundry goods.

Mr. Abhayanayake presented (2) petition from Mr. A. V. Perera on the question of extension of electric main along Lady Manning's Drive to enable him to provide electric lights at his new bungalow, and

Mr. Usoof Ismail presented (3) petition from Mr. A. R. Suwaris, Contractor, stating that if the construction of any of the remaining wells is given to others he would be placed at a great disadvantage.

The Chairman undertook to refer (1) to Markets Committee, (2) to Electricity Committee, and (3) to Works Committee for consideration.

5. Correspondence :—Letter No. H. 151 of October 19, 1934, from the Commissioner of Local Government stating that the Executive Committee of Local Administration has approved of the temporary arrangement whereby the Government Agent, Central Province, is performing the duties of Chairman, Municipal Council, Kandy, in addition to his own. (O 311).—Tabled.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Usoof Ismail asked the following questions which the Chairman replied :—

(1) With reference to the amalgamation of the posts of Secretary and Accountant in 1932, and the saving of Rs. 6,930 indicated to result from the measure, will the Chairman kindly state whether—

Q.—(a) The amalgamation has in actual practice proved a success? A.—The amalgamation has in my opinion proved a success.

From a financial point of view the saving on the establishment vote has been more than the anticipated Rs. 6,930 per annum. The arrangements was adopted from September 1, 1932, and the saving in the first twelve months after allowing for the salary of the additional junior clerk was Rs. 8,010, in 1933-34, Rs. 7,458.

From an administrative point of view my predecessor was, I believe, entirely satisfied with the working of the scheme and I consider that it is working well. Its only drawback is that with the control of the office so centralized it is difficult to arrange for the Secretary to have leave. This drawback will be remedied as soon as the appointment, which the Council approved in August of the officer selected for promotion to the Special Grade post as Assistant Secretary, is made.

Q.—(b) It has been possible to work the amalgamation as a permanent arrangement with the addition of only one Grade III. clerk to the accounting side stipulated for by the Accountant as the only additional staff necessary to secure the success of the measure. A.—Yes.

Q.—(c) Has it been found necessary to augment the staff on the accounting side from time to time since by the appointment of additional clerks to the accounting side? A.—No.

Q.—(d) If the answer to (c) is in the affirmative, how many new clerks have been so appointed, and what is the additional expenditure incurred on these appointments, as opposed to the saving? A.—The only additional clerk necessitated by the amalgamation of the offices is the one junior clerk referred to in (a). The two clerks and two peons added last year were taken on as the result of the adoption of a system of office collections of rates, &c., instead of collection by collectors which has resulted in a saving of over Rs. 6,000 per annum.

Q.—(e) Whether additional appointments are necessary and are contemplated to further augment the staff in the near future? A.—No.

Q.—(f) Does not the fact of clerks putting in overtime work daily, indicate that the present staff is either inefficient or inadequate to cope with the work? A.—Financial work cannot be evenly distributed throughout any given period. There are rush periods, *i.e.*, account closing periods, collection periods, &c., when officers are required to put in extra time. To compensate they have slack periods too.

Q.—(g) Is the appointment of an "Assistant Secretary" (contemplated as a full time arrangement in the Secretary's memo. on the subject) being resorted to as a permanent measure to relieve the present Secretary from Secretarial duties so as to give more time to accounting matters? A.—It is the decision of Council that the Special Grade post should be filled and the officer appointed should act for the Secretary when the latter goes on leave. The Council has accepted the suggestion that the post should be designated Assistant Secretary, to give the officer necessary status in the office and to enable him to be in close contact with Secretary's duties. Ordinarily the Secretary does not expect more than an hour's assistance from him and the rest of his time will be devoted to the duties of a senior clerk.

Q.—(h) If the answer to (g) is in the affirmative, does it not suggest that the amalgamation of the two offices has failed in actual practice? A.—This does not arise in view of reply to (g).

Q.—(i) What further expenditure is likely to result from the promotion of an officer to the Special Grade Post? A.—Annual increment of Rs. 180 and rent allowance of Rs. 18 per annum.

(2) With further reference to the replies given to my questions at the last meeting, will the Chairman kindly state—

Q.—(a) Have readings been taken of the inflow into the experimental well at Peradeniya during recent drought, so as to indicate whether the anticipated 250,000 gallons could be expected from all wells in a period of excessive drought? A.—Yes. Gaugings taken between September 13, 1934, and October 2, 1934, indicated 6 ft. 8 in. of water, as against gaugings between January and February, 1934, when the water level was 6 ft. 6 in.

Working on the data of 6 ft. 6 in. Mr. Garment has computed on a yield of 327,987 gallons per diem from the three wells, *vide* page 11 of Mr. Garment's report of February 16, 1934.

Q.—(b) Is it a fact that there was hardly any water in the experimental well, when the last drought was at its worst? A.—No. The lowest level reached was 6 ft. 8 in.

Q.—(c) If the answer to (b) is in the affirmative, does the Chairman entertain any apprehensions as regards the requisite 250,000 to augment the supply being available in such a crisis? A.—In view of replies to (a) and (b) this does not arise.

Q.—(d) If any doubt is entertained, would it not be desirable to get expert advice on this aspect of the question before proceeding with the expensive details of the Scheme such as acquisition of land and installation of machinery? A.—There is no doubt in my mind.

6A. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Abhayanayake asked the following questions which the Chairman replied:—

Q.—(1) How many wells are there within the Municipal limits? A.—A list of all wells within Municipal limits is not available.

Q.—(2) How many of these can be utilized for public purposes? A.—According to a census taken in 1929, there are 40 wells within the water served area of the Kandy Municipality. Of these, 31 have been cleaned and are being used for public purposes.

Q.—(3) What will it cost to maintain all such wells in a permanent state of repair? A.—Most of the wells are on private properties and are either unbuilt or not properly built. If they are to be permitted for regular use they should be first reconstructed in accordance with sanitary requirements. If they are so rebuilt their annual maintenance cost cannot be anything appreciable.

Q.—(4) What has it cost the Council to chlorinate, transport and supply water to the ratepayers during the recent water crisis? A.—Rs. 3,334.11 from September 17 to November 15, 1934.

Q.—(5) Is not well water more sanitary than and preferable to chlorinated water from the Kandy lake? A.—No.

7. To table the draft budget for 1935 and to fix a date for its consideration. Tabled.

Resolved that a special meeting to consider the budget be convened for December 1, 1934, at 8 A.M.

8. Recommendations of Standing Committees:—

(4) Letter dated July 28, 1934, from Mr. P. M. Siyatu Banda, the joint licensee of Market Stall No. 59 asking that the name of Messrs. P. S. Fernando & Bros. be entered in the licence, as he has made over the entire business to them.—Recommended.

When tenants fail to redeem, such properties are to be sold by public auction when the trustee may bid and buy for the vihare.

(7) Accountant's memo dated October 1, 1934, dealing with the points raised at the last Council meeting and referred to the Finance Committee as to the possibility of discontinuing the day labour charge and of restricting the operation of the conservancy rate to premises which are actually conserved.—Tabled.

(8) To obtain sanction for the sale by public auction of premises No. 1 Siyambalagastenna sold for default of payment of rates, purchased by the Council and since vested in it, owing to the failure of their reputed owner to come to an agreement with the Council to pay the arrears due and to obtain a reconveyance thereof, after production of the title deeds.—Recommended.

(9) Papers *re* the proposal to improve the water supply to premises No. 2, Artillery Hill, at an estimated cost of Rs. 72.—Not recommended.

(10) To define whether an officer acting for another officer absent on sick leave for a period of over one month should or should not be entitled to receive overtime pay in respect of the first month's acting in view of the ambiguity in Municipal Council resolution 5 (6) of September 15, 1934, passed on the subject of acting arrangements.—Recommended that for the first month acting should be *without* overtime.

(11) To consider the desirability of allowing a day's wages to all daily paid employees in the Council's various Departments, in honour of H. R. H. the Duke of Gloucester's visit, and to obtain a vote for Rs. 365 for the purpose.—Recommended.

(12) Applications from Messrs. A. A. de Alwis, D. J. A. Abeyasinghe, and P. de Lanerolle, for promotion to the post in the Special Grade to be designated as "Assistant Secretary".—Recommended appointment of Mr. A. A. de Alwis as from January 1, 1935, Mr. Ismail dissenting.

(13) Applications from Messrs. F. V. de Alwis and S. S. M. Mohideen for promotion to Grade II. in the Council's service without passing the Efficiency Bar Examination, under the exemption provided by the Council in the new Salary Scheme.—Recommended as from January 1, 1935.

(14) Application from Mr. W. E. Wadugodapitiya, clerk, Electricity Revenue Branch, and part time collector of Electricity Dues, for an enhanced salary. (O 180).—Recommended to increase the travelling allowance to Rs. 20.

(15) Application from M. Sinniah, Peon, Works Department, for an enhanced salary scale. (O 44).—Recommended to place peons Sinniah and Costa on the new Salary Scheme for peons starting on Rs. 300 each as from January 1, 1935.

(16) Application from Mr. G. K. V. Wettasinghe, 2nd Switchboard Attendant, Electricity Department, for an enhanced salary scale.—Not recommended.

(17) Application from the Interpreter of the Police Court for an enhanced allowance for doing the Tamil and Sinhalese interpretation work of the Municipal Court. (O 505).—Not recommended.

(18) Papers *re* points raised by the Auditor-General as to the desirability of levying excess water charges in respect of water supplied to dispensaries and school boarding establishments.—Recommended that dispensaries are not liable for excess water charges and that school boarding house supplies be not metered.

(19) To obtain sanction for the waiver of a sum of Rs. 13.33 representing licence duty due on Motor Vehicles D 1868 and B 322 in consideration of the non-user of the vehicles by their owners for the period for which licence duty is claimed.—Recommended.

(20) To obtain a supplementary vote for Rs. 500 to meet the cost of house service connections up to the end of this year.—Recommended.

(21) To obtain supplementary votes in the following amounts under Budget Heads of Expenditure 3 and 9 to meet the expenditure up to the end of the year:—(a) Rs. 75 under Head 3, Collectors' Commission. (b) Rs. 2,200 under Head 9, Public Lighting—Lighting of Streets. Rs. 750 under Head 9, Public Lighting—Lighting of Model Tenements.—Recommended.

(22) To obtain sanction for the transfer of (a) Rs. 1,000 from item 12 in Head 6—Conservancy, to item 13—Upkeep of Standby Lorry. (b) Rs. 1,000 from item 11 in Head 5—Scavenging, to item 12—Upkeep of Standby Lorry, and for supplementary votes for Rs. 1,000 under Head 6, Conservancy—Upkeep of Standby Lorry, and Rs. 200 under Head 5, Scavenging—Upkeep of Standby Lorry, to meet possible excesses of expenditure over the estimates provided for the year in respect of the upkeep of lorries.—Recommended.

(23) Tenders for tolls, 1935.—Recommended acceptance of the following tenders:—(a) Halloluwa Ferry: H. John's tender for Rs. 1,162. (b) Gonawatte Ferry: M. G. Ukku Banda's tender for Rs. 263. (c) Lewella Ferry: M. Kalu Banda's tender for Rs. 2,855.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on October 20, 1934.

(24) Application from Contractor Brumpy, for an extension of time up to September 30, 1934, for completing the work on the road to Gohagoda Trenching Grounds, for which he was allowed time up to May 27, 1934, under the agreement.—Recommended penalty of Rs. 10.

Item (30) resolved to allow day and night load, if consumption is over 2500 units per mensem at 12 cents per unit for Printing Department and 20 cents per unit for other departments and living quarters.

9. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on November 5, 1934, to consider the Auditor-General's report for 1933, and further report from the Accountant dated October 16, 1934.*

(1) In regard to excesses on votes—

Resolved (a) That the Committee accepts the report of the Accountant dated October 16, 1934, containing explanations of the excesses as satisfactory. (b) That the rule now enforced in the Electricity Department in terms of Municipal Council resolution of March 17, 1928, viz., "That no purchase exceeding Rs. 1,000 be made without the previous approval of Council, and no purchase exceeding Rs. 100 be made without the previous approval of the Chairman" be made applicable to all Municipal Departments. (c) That the monthly progress statement of expenditure in respect of works be prepared under the various items in each estimate.

(2) In regard to diminution of Electricity Department profits—

Resolved that the statement submitted with the Accountant's report dated October 16, 1934, fully establishes the fact that the falling off in profits is due to the reduction in rates charged for the sale of current which came into force on August 1, 1931, and not to carelessness or slackness of officers.

(3) In regard to Grant on Police Bill Account—

Resolved that the Committee recognizes the failure to claim the grant was due to a misconception as regards the terms on which the grant was made and appreciates that without Audit intervention a serious oversight would have resulted.

(4) In regard to arrears of revenue—

Resolved that the Committee notes that due attention is being given to the recovery of arrears and requests the Chairman to press the Distraing Inspectors to recover the arrears immediately.

(5) In regard to Job Agreements—

Resolved that the Committee recommends that hereafter the practice of giving out work on job agreements should be abandoned and that tenders should be called for.

Resolved that consideration be deferred to the Special Budget Meeting.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, in terms of section 98 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," as amended by Ordinance No. 21 of 1929, on Saturday, December 1, 1934, at 8 a.m. to consider the Draft Budget for 1935.

Present :—Mr. E. T. Dyson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. Walter Beven; Mr. O. T. Nettelton; Dr. D. T. de Kretser; Mr. D. M. de S. Abhayanayake.

Before proceeding with the Budget, the Chairman, with the leave of Council, introduced the following subjects, as matters of urgency, for Council's consideration :—

(1) Tenders for Market Daily Rents, 1935. (D42).—Resolved that the tender of Mr. L. S. Fernando of Rs. 6,765 for the right to collect Fair Market Rents and Rs. 13,510 for the right to collect Daily Space Rents be accepted.

(2) To approve of the lighter type of fence for fencing Railway reservation in Market street. (D 40).—Resolved that the lighter type be approved.

(3) To approve of the following terms for the supply of electrical energy to Messrs. Miller & Co., Ltd. :—

Printing Department.—Day load at 12 cents per unit; Night load at 20 cents per unit.

Other Departments and Living Quarters.—Day and night load at 20 cents per unit.

Provided consumption is over 1,500 units per mensem in all Departments. (E 54).—Resolved that the terms be approved.

(4) To obtain sanction to appropriate a sum of Rs. 2,413·95 from the saving under the vote for "Laying Feeder Cable between Queen's Pillar Box No. 15, and Power Station" for a new service main to King's Pavilion. (F 295).—Resolved that the transfer of vote be approved.

2. To consider the Draft Budget for 1935.

Chairman explained the comparative position of Revenue and Expenditure in the Draft, and the present state of the Council's surplus balances, and moved the Council into Committee to consider the Budget in detail.

After Messrs. de Silva, Wijayatilake, Beven, Abhayanayake, and Ratwatte Adigar had offered general comments the Council resolved into Committee.

Upkeep of lorries for Rs. 11,133·78—substituted petrol, tyres, tubes, lubricants Rs. 8,530·98 ; repairs to lorries Rs. 2,269·58.

(f) Head 6, Conservancy of Latrines—

Upkeep of lorries for Rs. 7,440·93—substituted petrol, tyres, tubes, lubricants Rs. 5,705·73 ; repairs to lorries Rs. 2,068·66.

The continuance of the Temporary Licensed Surveyor for 1935 was approved, and vote of Rs. 2,160 was passed.

GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, November 24, 1934, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated November 19, 1934.

Present :—Mr. W. J. L. Rogerson, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. A. M. Saheed; Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna; Mr. E. A. Paulas; Mr. R. L. Ephraums; Mr. A. C. Mohammedo; and Mr. C. H. Bradley.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting held on October 20, 1934, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read, and confirmed.

2. Three petitions were presented, one each by Messrs. Amarasuriya, Karunaratna, and Mohammedo. The Chairman said that they would receive consideration.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya asked the following questions :—(1) How many landlords have been served with notices by the Medical Officer of Health during the years 1933 and 1934 to convert pit latrines into dry earth latrines? (2) Of these how many outside the Police area have been served with notices? (3) Is the Chairman aware that the owner-occupiers residing outside the Police area are unable to undergo the expense of converting their existing latrines into dry earth latrines on account of poverty? (4) Will the Chairman be pleased to suspend the service of notices outside the Police area until conditions improve? (5) Is the Chairman aware that the cattle seizers employed by the Council are unduly causing inconvenience to the rate-payers? (6) Is it a fact that one Mr. P. J. Serasinghe was charged for allowing his bull to trespass on the public road? (7) Is the Chairman aware that Mr. P. J. Serasinghe was acquitted by the Municipal Magistrate? (8) Will the Chairman be pleased to state whether any action has been taken against the cattle seizer in question? (9) In view of the fact that Mr. Serasinghe was acquitted will the Chairman be pleased to state whether he is able to refund the expenses incurred by Mr. Serasinghe in connection with this case?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) 1933, 47; 1934, 35. (2) 1933, 29; 1934, 24. (3) I understand that the obstacle is not the inability of the owner-occupier to pay the cost of converting the pit latrine into a dry earth latrine but his unwillingness or inability to pay the necessary fee which he will be bound to pay under the by-laws for the conservancy of a dry earth latrine. Notices have been issued only in the case of insanitary pit latrines. If the owner-occupiers keep their pit latrines in a sanitary condition they will not be served with notices. (4) In view of the reply to question No. 3, it is not considered advisable to suspend the service of such notices entirely. If an owner-occupier has an insanitary pit latrine his neighbours must be protected and their health preserved by removal of the nuisance. (5) No, but complaints against some of them have been received by me from time to time. (6) Yes. (7) Yes. (8) When the case against Mr. Serasinghe was tried this cattle seizer's licence had already been cancelled as he was found to be unsatisfactory, and after a perusal of the record in the case I was not prepared to take any further action. (9) There is no provision to enable me to make a refund, and I have already declined to do so.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved :—(1) That an application be made by this Council to Government for a grant of Rs. 150,000 for the purpose of erecting granaries in the town. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded. Mr. J. E. Perera moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Four Standing Committees for consideration. The mover and seconder agreed to the amendment which was then put to the meeting and carried. (2) That a Committee of this Council be appointed, with effect from January 1, 1935, to report upon as to what steps should be taken to improve the housing and general conditions of this town. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded.—Carried unanimously. (3) That early steps be taken to employ lorries in the scavenging of the town. On the suggestion of Mr. J. E. Perera it was resolved that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment for consideration. (4) That seven collectors be appointed as from January 1, 1935, to collect rates and taxes in the seven wards of the town on a salary of Rs. 720 per annum each, with prospects of rising in the Councils service. Mr. E. A. Paulas seconded. Messrs. J. E. Perera and E. M. Karunaratna spoke against the motion. The Chairman said that his own experience had shown him that much more satisfactory results were obtained from employing collectors on a commission basis than on a monthly salary. He thought it would be unwise to make any change in the present system. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the meeting and declared lost. Dr. Dahanayaka called for a division which resulted as follows :—*For*—Messrs. S. H. Dahanayaka, E. A. Paulas, and A. M. Saheed. *Against*—Chairman, Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. M. Karunaratna, D. I. Durham, Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka, F. Magdon Ismail, C. H. Bradley, A. C. Mohammedo, R. L. Ephraums, and Thomas Amarasuriya. (5) That the electric lighting scheme be extended to the Gintota bridge and to the Kalegana area. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded, and Mr. A. M. Saheed supported the motion. Messrs. J. E. Perera and F. Magdon Ismail also spoke. At this stage Mr. E. M. Karunaratna moved Council into Committee to consider the motion. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee decided, after discussion, that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Municipal Works for consideration.

Council resumed, and Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Municipal Works for consideration. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded.—Carried unanimously.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved:— (1) That the drains in Small Cross street be covered up with cement slabs so that vehicles may be able to use it. Mr. A. M. Saheed seconded. The Chairman said that, according to an estimate obtained from the Superintendent of Works, the work would cost Rs. 325. It was then resolved that the amount required for the work be provided in the Budget for next year for early consideration and that meanwhile the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health on the matter be obtained. (2) That disinfectants be supplied at the instance of the Council free of charge to house holders. Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka seconded. Mr. J. E. Perera opposed the motion, which was then put to the meeting and declared lost—3 voting for, and 9 against. (3) That the cleaning of the bucket chambers may be made part of the duty of the conservancy labourers. Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka seconded, and Mr. A. M. Saheed supported the motion. Messrs. E. M. Karunaratna, J. E. Perera, and S. H. Dahanayaka also spoke. Mr. A. M. Saheed then moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Standing Committees on Finance and Assessment and Markets and Sanitation for consideration. Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya seconded—(1) Carried; (2) Resolved that the Medical Officer of Health be requested to submit a report on the matter. (4) That the enforcement of the Housing Ordinance be suspended for the present. The Chairman said he could not accept the motion as it stood, and suggested that it be brought up again in another form. The mover agreed, and with the permission of the Council the motion was accordingly deferred.

6. To submit letter No. H. 159 of November 7, 1934, from the Commissioner of Local Government on the subject of the exhibition in Galle of the Sinhalese Crown and Throne.—Submitted.

7. To consider the question of the payment of a gratuity to conservancy labourer D. M. Harmanis, who has been condemned by a Medical Board as unfit for further service. Resolved to recommend, in terms of rule 21 of the Municipal Pension Minute, the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 170.

8. To consider the beggar nuisance in the town.—Resolved that the Superintendent of Police, Southern Province, be informed that the Council is unable at the present time to meet the cost of maintaining beggars in the House of Detention, Colombo, and that he be requested to take the necessary steps for the vigorous enforcement of the provisions of the Vagrants Ordinance against all able-bodied beggars in the town.

9. To consider the desirability of passing and enforcing regulations prohibiting the slaughter of all cows and other useful milch and agricultural animals of or under 9 years of age.—Resolved that the necessary by-law be passed under section 110 (9) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910.

10. To consider an application from the Chairman, Galle Municipal Education District Committee, for a grant of Rs. 500, towards the purchase of a lantern and slides in order to arrange for lectures on sanitation and health at schools within the Municipal area.—Resolved that the Chairman, Galle Municipal Education District Committee, be informed that the Council regrets that the application cannot be granted.

11. To sanction a rate of 55 cents per unit for electricity supplied on prepayment meters.—Sanctioned.

12. To sanction the following supplemental votes:—(a) Rs. 250 under Head 16—Administrative charges: Contingencies; (b) Rs. 500 under Head 61—Legal expenses; (c) Rs. 225 under Head 58—Water Works: Contingencies; (d) Rs. 1,650 under Electricity, Head E 1—Fuel and oil; (e) Rs. 275 under Electricity, Head E 5—Salaries of out-door staff.—Sanctioned.

13. To consider the results of the resale of unsold market stalls for 1935.—Resolved, with regard to the meat market that the resale of stalls 3, 4, and 6 be confirmed and, as regard the unsold stall No. 8, that efforts be made to lease it out, if possible, for any purposes other than the sale of pork. With regard to the unsold stalls in the offal market the Kaluwella meat market and the Kaluwella vegetable market, that no further action be taken but that they be disposed of at the discretion of the Chairman whenever any offers for them are received. With regard to the fish market, that the resale of stalls 10 and 11 be confirmed, and, as regards the unsold stall No. 17, that no further action be taken.

14. To submit the budget for 1935 as approved by the Four Standing Committees.—Submitted.

15. Repairs to the roof of the Esplanade Pavilion.—In connection with item 13 (15) of the Minutes of Council of October 20, 1934, the Chairman explained that tiles had been used instead of asbestos sheets owing to the high cost of the latter.

16. To fix a date for the next General Meeting of Council.—Agreed that the next General Meeting of the Council be held on Friday, December 7, 1934, at 2 p.m., and the Special Meeting to consider finally the Budget for 1935 in the same date immediately after the General Meeting.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

17. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of November 17, 1934.*

(2) To consider 8 applications for water service.—Recommended that five applications be passed, and as regards the remaining three, which are outside the water area, that consideration be deferred pending further investigations into the whole question of the water supply to the town.

(3) To consider the schedule of rates submitted by the Superintendent of Works.—Recommended that the schedule of rates be approved for 1935 with the following amendments:—Item No. 16 from Rs. 35 to Rs. 32.50; item No. 22 from 40 cents to 30 cents; item No. 23 from 50 cents to 40 cents; item No. 43 from 75 cents to 65 cents; and item No. 44 from Rs. 3 to Rs. 2.25.—Recommended further that the following new item be inserted as No. 26A:—“Brickwork in lime mortar 1: 2 above foundations up to 4 feet high—Rs. 42.50 per cube”.

(5) To consider Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka's motion at the General Meeting of Council on July 26, 1934, viz.:—That this Council do request His Excellency the Governor to suspend for three years the execution of section 18 (Chapter ii.) of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915 as far as it relates to the High street of the Galle bazaar.—Recommended, in view of the opinion expressed by the Council's lawyer, that no action be taken.

(6) To consider an estimate of Rs. 1,350.80 for improvements to the Galle Esplanade in accordance with the first interim report of the Special Committee appointed to report on the future development of the Esplanade.—Recommended: (1) that the estimate be passed and that a supplemental vote be taken for the purpose—the work to be done departmentally, (2) that, instead of Casuarina a shoe flower hedge be first tried as an experiment.

(7) To consider the advisability of framing regulations under section 44 (8) of Ordinance No. 20 of 1927 relating to the intersection of highways.—Recommended that steps be taken to frame regulations under section 44 (8) of Ordinance No. 20 of 1927, in respect of the following junctions:—(1) The junction of Kandewatta road, Cripp's road and Wakwella road—Wakwella road being considered to be the main road. (2) The junction of Kumbalwella road, Richmond Hill road, and Wakwella road—Wakwella road being considered to be the main road. (3) The junction of Bope road, Kitulampitiya road, and Wakwella road—Wakwella road being considered to be the main road. (4) The junction of Cripp's road, Circular road, and Hirimbura road—Hirimbura road being considered to be the main road. (5) The junction of Kumbalwella road, Hirimbura Cross road, and Hirimbura road—Hirimbura road being considered to be the main road. (6) The junction of Kitulampitiya road and Hirimbura road—Hirimbura road being considered to be the main road. (7) The junction of the Baddegama road and Hirimbura road—the Baddegama road being considered to be the main road and the Hirimbura road to Labduva being considered a minor road. (8) The junction of Kong Tree road, Circular road, and Talapitiya Cross road—Circular road being considered the main road; and (9) the junction of Circular road and the road to Udugama—Circular road being considered the main road.—Recommended further, that a supplemental vote of Rs. 600 be passed to meet the cost of the warning signs and standards.

(8) To consider Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka's motion at the General Meeting of Council on July 26, 1934, viz.:—That the block of land between the awassa and the property of the late collector, Jayasinghe, situated at Minuwangoda, and bordering on the Wakwella road be acquired for a playground.—Recommended that the papers be referred to the Council's lawyer for his opinion as to whether it would be possible to acquire the block of land in question on the basis of the present annual value.—Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka undertaking to quote the recent Supreme Court decision on the matter.

(9) To recommend the expenditure of a sum of Rs. 375 from the vote for “New Drainage” for the purpose of constructing a new drain along Wakwella road from culvert No. 1 to the turn off to the pirivena.—Recommended.

Resolution.

With regard to item 6, it was resolved that recommendation (1) be adopted, but as regards recommendation (2) it was resolved that steps be taken to plant a Casuarina hedge round the Esplanade and also a shoe flower hedge until such time as the former hedge is completed. It was further resolved, as regards the fence, that a barbed wire strand be run along the top throughout its entire length.

In connection with this item it was also understood by the Council—although no entry to this effect appears in the minutes under reference—that the Works Committee had decided that whenever in the opinion of the Superintendent of Works the Esplanade grounds are unfit for play owing to rain he (the Superintendent of Works) should be instructed to make the necessary arrangements for giving notice thereof by planting a red flag on the grounds or taking such other action as may seem suitable to him in the circumstances.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

18. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of November 17, 1934.*

- (2) List of demolished buildings in wards 2, 3, and 4.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.
 (3) To consider in terms of rule 21 of the Municipal Pension Minute, the grant of a Long Service Allowance to D. J. Dewasurendara, Town Clock-keeper, who is due to retire at the end of the current year.—Recommended the grant of a Long Service Allowance of Rs. 750 per mensem with effect from January 1, 1935.
 (4) To write off as irrecoverable a sum of Rs. 554, being arrears of conservancy fees for 1933.—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 554 being arrears of conservancy fees for 1933, be written off as irrecoverable.
 (5) To sanction the excess leave of 41 days granted to the Shroff (the late Mr. K. S. Mohideen Lebbe) in 1934, owing to ill-health.—Recommended that the excess leave of 41 days be sanctioned.
 (6) To consider what steps should be taken with regard to filling the vacant post of Shroff.—Recommended: (1) that application for the post be called for on a salary of Rs. 1,200 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 90 to Rs. 1,800 per annum with security in Rs. 6,000 by hypothecation of property, the appointment to take effect from January 1, 1935; (2) that meanwhile the Assistant Shroff at the Kachcheri be invited to act as Shroff on a salary of Rs. 100 per mensem and on condition that he furnishes immediate security in Rs. 6,000 by hypothecation of property; and, in case he does not accept the offer, that the Chairman be authorized to make such arrangements as may be necessary on similar terms.
 (7) Flood relief in Municipal area.—Recommended that a total supplemental vote of Rs. 4,500 be sanctioned (inclusive of the sum of Rs. 500 previously voted by the Council for the issue of food in deserving cases), for the purpose of giving financial assistance to the owner-occupiers of houses which have been damaged by the recent floods in order to enable them to rebuild their houses.

Resolution.

With regard to item (6) Mr. A. M. Saheed moved as an amendment that the following sentence be included in recommendation (1):—“and that the qualification required should be the E. S. L. C. or other higher examination”. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka seconded. The amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost—3 voting for, and 8 against.

Resolved that recommendation (1) be adopted with the following addition after the words “hypothecation of property”, or “by any guarantee association approved by the Council”.

With regard to recommendation (2), Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the present Assistant Shroff be allowed to act in the post till the end of the year on the same conditions. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded. The amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost—3 voting for, and 8 against.

Resolved that recommendation (2) also be adopted.

With regard to item 7 it was resolved that the maximum sum to be paid to any one person should be Rs. 50, that the total amount payable from the Council's funds should not in any case be more than Rs. 4,500 and that if the amount of damages recommended to be paid exceeds this sum, the compensation should be calculated on a *pro rata* basis.

It was also resolved that the owners of vegetable gardens in wards 4 and 5 damaged by the recent floods should be compensated at the rate of Rs. 5 each.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.
