KNOW Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, by virtue of the powers vested in Us by section 31 of the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1895, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, do by this Proclamation (1) declare that the provisions of the said section 31 of the Ordinance and of the six sections following thereafter shall come into operation from and after the first day of January, 1934, in the town and place mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereto, and (2) define the limits of the said town and place, within which the said sections shall come into operation, in the manner set out in the second column of the said schedule.

## SCHEDULE.

## Column I.

*Town and Place.*

Bandarawela Town and the remaining portions of the area within the administration limits of the Bandarawela Urban District Council in the Badulla District of the Province of Uva.

## Column II.

*Limits.*

*North*: From the Dadamasketubokotuwa ambalam, situated about seven-eighths of a mile on the road to Welimada, a line along the well-defined boundaries of title plans 124,063 and 118,037 as far as the junction of the latter with the road to Etalapitiya from the junction a straight line to the Circular road, from thence the Circular road with its two-chain reservation until it leaves the Kabiliwela village boundary, and from that point a straight line to the bridge on the Badulla road over the Kabiliwelakandura.

*East*: The Kabiliwelakandura and the smaller kandura named Etakehellanda *alias* Walasbaddekandura, which joins it, flowing along the eastern boundaries of title plans 114,303 and 121,082 (the latter being known as the Bush Bungalow), a line in continuation of the said kandura up to the ridge.

*South*: Thence along the ridge westwards to the trigonometrical station known as Dambulkanda, thence along a trenched boundary so as to include the reservoir to the trigonometrical station called Bandarawela, thence a straight line to the 18th milepost on the main road to Haputale.

*West*: Thence a straight line to the western limit of title plan 88,247 where it leaves Godapitawatta along the boundary of Godapitawatta to the junction of a cart road and footpath to Kahatawela, thence along a one-chain reservation to be marked on west of road to the boundary of title plan 115,979, along the eastern boundary of title plan 115,979 to the road leading to Welimada near the ambalam called Dadamasketubokotuwa.

## SCHEDULE.

*Rule.*

Rule 16 in section IX. of the rules of the Port of Colombo, as amended by Proclamation of August 6, 1930, published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,797 of August 8, 1930, is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

16. (1) All launches plying for the conveyance of passengers or goods within the limits of the port shall carry—

(a) buoyant apparatus of a type approved by the Master Attendant and sufficient in amount to

provide buoyancy for at least 40 per cent. of the total number of persons licensed to be carried on board; and

(b) life-buoys of a type approved by the Master Attendant, not less in number than the minimum prescribed in the Schedule to this rule, and sufficient in combination with the buoyant apparatus aforesaid to provide buoyancy for at least 70 per cent. of the total number of persons licensed to be carried on board, each of the said life-buoys being capable of providing buoyancy for three persons:

Provided that in any case where a launch is incapable of carrying the aforesaid amount of buoyant apparatus, the Master Attendant may in his discretion permit the deficiency in the amount of buoyant apparatus to be made good with such additional supply of approved life-buoys as he may consider sufficient.

(2) No buoyant apparatus or life-buoy shall be lashed down in any launch, but shall be so stowed and carried as to be ready for immediate use at any time.

## SCHEDULE.

*Minimum Number of approved Life-buoys.*

For a launch not exceeding 30 feet in length: 2 life-buoys.  
For a launch exceeding 30 feet and not exceeding 35 feet: 4 life-buoys.  
For a launch exceeding 35 feet and not exceeding 40 feet: 6 life-buoys.  
For a launch exceeding 40 feet and not exceeding 50 feet: 8 life-buoys.  
For a launch exceeding 50 feet and not exceeding 70 feet: 10 life-buoys.

Rule 6 of the rules relating to the Colombo Graving Dock published in *Government Gazette* No. 6,499 dated April 19, 1912, is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

6. (a) *Explosives*.—No vessel shall be docked with gunpowder or other explosive material on board without special permission in writing from the Superintendent of the Graving Dock, and the master of any vessel on which gunpowder or other explosive material is found shall, unless such special permission has first been obtained, be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 100.

(b) *Oil Vessels*.—No vessel, which has carried petroleum or any similar oil or other inflammable fluid or substance in bulk, will be allowed to enter the Graving Dock, unless the Master or the Agents of the vessel produce a certificate from a qualified analyst, approved by the Superintendent of the Graving Dock, that the vessel has been tested and is free of dangerous gas.

“THE HOUSING AND TOWN IMPROVEMENT ORDINANCE, No. 19 OF 1915.”

BY-LAWS made by the Dehiwala-Mount Lavinia Urban District Council, under the provisions of section 27 of “The Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915,” and approved by the Officer Administering the Government by virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by the said section and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

BY-LAWS.

I.—Definitions.

In these by-laws, unless the context otherwise requires,—

“warehouse” means any building used mainly for the storing of goods or wares by merchants or traders, but does not include a shop, boutique, or other place used mainly for the sale of goods or wares by retail;

“workshop” means any building where any work of making, altering, ornamenting, finishing, or repairing articles or goods is carried on by manual labour for the purposes of trade;

“factory” means any workshop where mechanical power of any kind is used.

II.—Residential Areas.

Each of the areas within the administrative limits of this Council defined in Schedule I. hereto is hereby declared to be a “residential area.”

III.—New Buildings in Residential Areas.

1. (1) From and after the date on which these by-laws come into force, no new building shall be erected within a residential area, except with the written permission of the Chairman of this Council, for the purpose of being used as a factory, workshop, or warehouse or as a boutique or as tenements, or as stables, galas, or cattle-pens.

(2) Such permission may be refused or withheld by the Chairman unless or until the following conditions are fulfilled, namely:—

- (a) that the site selected for such building is not in close proximity to existing residential buildings;
- (b) that the site selected is not situated in such a prominent place as to make the erection of the building likely to mar the amenities of the residential area;

(c) in the case of a workshop, that the business or industry for which it is to be used is not likely to create any kind of nuisance whatsoever;

(d) in the case of a shop or boutique, that the site selected will serve an area really in need of such conveniences, and that the design of the building will harmonize with the surroundings.

2. It shall be lawful for the Chairman by notice in writing to direct that an air-space of not less than 7½ feet be provided between each side of any new building and the boundary on that side, irrespective of the question whether there are windows in the wall on that side of the building.

IV.—Existing Buildings in Residential Areas.

1. Within a residential area, except with the written permission of the Chairman—

(1) no building used for residential purposes at the date on which these by-laws come into force, shall be used for any other purpose whatsoever;

(2) no building used at that date for the purpose of any one of the following, namely, a workshop, warehouse, boutique, tenement, stable, gala, or cattle-pen, shall be used for any other of the said purposes; and

(3) no building shall be used for any of the purposes set out in the foregoing paragraph of this by-law, if at that date it was not in actual use for that purpose.

2. (1) Within a residential area no building used as a factory, workshop, or warehouse, at the date on which these by-laws come into force, shall be enlarged, extended, or added to except with the written permission of the Chairman.

(2) Such permission shall be refused by the Chairman—

(a) in any case in which the building is used for the purposes of any of the dangerous or offensive trades enumerated in Schedule II. hereto; and

(b) in any case where the boundaries of the premises on which the building stands have not been registered in the books of the Council within six months of the date on which these by-laws come into force.

3. Within a residential area no building shall be used for the purposes of any of the dangerous or offensive trades enumerated in Schedule II. unless it can be shown to have been in use for such purposes on the date on which these by-laws come into force.

V.—Commercial Areas.

1. Each of the areas within the administrative limits of this Council defined in Schedule III. hereto, is hereby declared to be a “commercial area.”

2. Within a commercial area, new buildings may be erected and existing buildings may be used for any lawful purpose other than that of carrying on any of the dangerous or offensive trades enumerated in Schedule II.

3. Any building within a commercial area which can be shown to have been used for the purposes of any of the aforesaid dangerous or offensive trades at the date on which these by-laws come into force, may continue to be so used and may with the written permission of the Chairman be added to or extended to the full limit of the premises on which it stands, if the boundaries of such premises have been registered in the books of the Council within six months of the date on which these by-laws come into force.

VI.—Penalties.

The chief occupier of any building who contravenes any of the provisions of the foregoing by-laws or any owner or occupier who fails to comply with any written notice or directions given by the Chairman thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence in respect of each day during which such contravention or non-compliance continues, and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 25 for each such offence.

VII.—Repeal.

The by-laws regarding “residential areas” made by the Council and published in the *Gazette* of July 10, 1931, are hereby repealed.

SCHEDULE I.

Residential Areas.

Division No. 1 (Dehiwala)—

(a) The whole area between the Galle road and the sea. Boundaries: north, Dehiwala canal; south, Dehiwala Station road; east, Galle high road; west, the sea.



(b) The area round the Council's Offices. Boundaries as follows: on the north by a line 100 yards north of Botejue lane up to the bend thereof; on the east by a line drawn from the said bend of Botejue lane due south to the point where it meets Quarry road, thence along Allan avenue up to its junction with the New Park lane and along eastern boundary of Council properties up to the boundary of Zoo Grounds; on the south by the centre line of Park lane and the Waidiya crescent up to the Galle road; on the west by the centre line of the Galle high road.

*Division No. 3 (Karagampitiya)—*

(a) The whole area between the centre line of the Galle road and the sea. Boundaries as follows: on the north by the centre line of the Dehiwala Station road; on the east by the centre line of the Galle high road; on the south by a line within 100 yards of the Galkissa Cemetery northern boundary up to the sea; on the west by the sea.

(b) The areas 100 yards on either side of Kawdana road up to its junction with Pallidora road, with reservations up to a distance of 50 yards from the Kawdana and Pallidora junction for commercial purposes.

(c) Watarappola road.—100 yards on the northern side of the road up to a distance of 100 yards of the fields at the eastern end of the road.

*Division No. 4 (Mt. Lavinia)—*

The whole area between the Galle road and the sea. Boundaries: on the north by a line drawn due east within 100 yards south of Galkissa Cemetery; on the east by the centre line of Galle high road to a point 100 yards south up to its junction with Mount Lavinia Southern Station Approach road; on the south by a line drawn 100 yards parallel to the Southern Station Approach road due west from Galle road to the sea; on the west by the sea.

*Division No. 5 (Watarappola)—*

(a) 100 yards on either side of Templar road.

(b) 100 yards on south side of Watarappola road up to a distance of 100 yards of the fields at the eastern end of the road.

RULES.

1. In these rules unless the context otherwise requires—

- “the Board” shall mean the Sanitary Board of the Mannar District;
- “officer” shall mean the holder of any permanent office under the Board, employed on a monthly salary;
- “servant” shall mean any person employed by the Board on a daily wage;
- “completed service” shall mean the net period of service ascertained by making the necessary deductions, in respect of half-pay leave and other absence or interruption from the total period of service.

2. The gratuity payable by the Board to any officer or servant on the termination of his services, shall be computed, and awarded by a special resolution of the Board, in accordance with the rates, conditions, and provisions hereinafter set out.

3. (1) No officer or servant shall in any circumstance whatsoever be deemed to have an absolute right to any gratuity upon the termination of his service under the Board.

(2) Such gratuity shall be awarded only in cases of faithful and meritorious service; and where the testimony as to fidelity, diligence, and merit is in any respect defective or unsatisfactory, a deduction may be made by resolution of the Board from the amount of the gratuity otherwise payable under these rules.

(3) Where there has been obvious negligence, irregularity, or misconduct, the gratuity may by resolution of the Board be altogether withheld.

4. (1) The gratuity awarded by the Board shall be subject in every case to the approval of the Governor.

(2) In order to obtain such approval, the following shall in every case be forwarded, through the Commissioner of Local Government and the Auditor-General, to the Controller of Establishments, namely:—

- (a) the application for the gratuity;
- (b) a statement showing the computation by which the amount is ascertained;
- (c) a certificate from the Chairman of the Board as to the applicant's period of service, age, and conduct and the grounds of his retirement; and
- (d) the terms of the special resolution passed by the Board.

5. No gratuity shall be awarded to any officer under the age of 55 years, unless his service has been terminated upon the abolition of the office held by him, or unless two medical practitioners certify to the satisfaction of the Board that such officer is by reason of his ill-health unfit for further service.

6. For the purposes of these rules—

- (1) the service of an officer shall be deemed to have commenced from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Board; but any uninterrupted service completed by any officer, as a servant or on the temporary establishment of the Board, immediately before his first permanent appointment, may be reckoned as service;
- (2) no service completed by any officer or servant before he attains his sixteenth year of age, shall in any circumstances be taken into account;
- (3) all full-pay leave and half the period of all half-pay leave, but no other leave or absence, shall be reckoned as completed service.

7. The gratuity awarded to an officer shall be computed upon the salary drawn by him in respect of the permanent office or offices held by him at the time of his retirement, if he has held such office or offices, or an office or offices to which the same fixed salary or incremental scale of salary is attached for a period of not less than three years next preceding the date of retirement; otherwise the gratuity shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent office or offices held by an officer during the three years next preceding the date of retirement.

8. Any officer retiring after not less than 120 months' total service on account of age or under the provisions of the foregoing rule 5, may receive a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/12th of his final salary or average of salaries as in the foregoing rule prescribed for each month of completed service, fractions of a month being excluded for this purpose.

Provided always that it shall be competent for the Board to grant, where the circumstances of any case seem to warrant such special treatment, to any officer retiring on account of illness or age after more than 60 months' but less than 120 months' total service, a gratuity calculated in the manner aforesaid.

9. In the event of the abolition of any permanent office held on a monthly salary, and the consequent termination of the service of any officer, the gratuity payable to such officer, shall, if he has completed 120 months' gross service or in special cases 60 months' gross service, be calculated in the manner laid down in rule 8.

10. In the event of an officer, who has qualified for a gratuity by length of service, dying whilst in the service of the Board, it shall be competent to the Board, by resolution to grant to the widow, or if there is no widow, to the children of such officer, a gratuity not exceeding six months' salary of the officer at the rate drawn by him at the time of his death, but the amount so granted shall in no case exceed the amount of gratuity that would have been payable to the officer, had he then retired in circumstances entitling him to a gratuity.

11. Any servant who after 180 months' continuous service, is to the satisfaction of the Board certified by two medical practitioners to be unfit for further service, or proved to have attained 55 years of age, may be awarded a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/18th of a month's pay for each month's service, a month's pay being calculated on the basis of 26 days for a month and fractions of a month being excluded for this purpose.

Provided that breaks in the continuity of service may be condoned by resolution of the Board.

12. In the event of the death, whilst he is still in service, or on leave with or without pay, of any servant who at the time of his death would have been eligible for a gratuity under any of these rules, the gratuity, that would in the ordinary course have been paid to him had he retired, may be paid to his widow, or if there is no widow, to his children.

13. If the services of any officer or servant are dispensed with on the certificate of two medical practitioners that he is unfit for further service by reason of any permanent injury or illness specially attributable to the nature of his duty, he may be granted by a resolution of the Board a gratuity calculated in the manner laid down in rule 8 or rule 11, as the case may be, or a special enhanced gratuity not exceeding Rs. 750 in the case of an officer and Rs. 250 in the case of a servant.

Provided that the gratuity so calculated may be reduced by resolution of the Board, if the injury or illness was caused by contributory negligence on the part of such officer or servant or does not incapacitate him from earning a livelihood in other employment.

14. When an officer or servant of the Board is killed on duty or dies as a direct result of injuries received while on duty, it shall be competent for the Board, with the sanction of the Governor, to award gratuities as follows:—

- (a) to the widow of the deceased, a sum not exceeding the equivalent of one year's pay at the substantive rate drawn by the deceased at the time of his death;
- (b) where the deceased leaves young children, but no widow, a gratuity not exceeding Rs. 10 to each child for every year by which his or her age at the time of the father's death shall be less than fifteen. Provided that in no case shall the total payment to the children exceed the amount that would have been payable to a widow under (a) of this rule; and provided further that where, without this limitation the sum payable to the children would have exceeded the sum payable to the widow, the amount payable to each child shall be reduced in proportion to the reduction made in the total sum on that account.

15. Any gratuity awarded in accordance with these rules to any officer or servant may be paid, at the discretion of the Board, either in a lump sum, or in monthly instalments of such an amount as the Board may by resolution determine, until the whole sum due is paid out: Provided that any instalments so paid to any officer or servant shall not be less than half the monthly salary or wages of such officer or servant at the time of retirement; and provided further that, if such officer or servant dies before the full amount of gratuity due is paid, the balance remaining due shall be paid to his or her lawful heirs, either in full or by instalments, as the Board may by resolution decide.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. No person shall use any net other than a net registered in accordance with these regulations for fishing within the area of the territorial waters of the Island adjoining the seaboard between a point 3½ miles to the south and a point 5½ miles to the north of the Sanitary Board town of Udappu in the Puttalam and Chilaw District of the North-Western Province.
2. No net other than ma-del, adasi-del, kumbalawalai, kattawalai, surawalai, kanniwalai, and kudupuwalai shall be registered for the purposes of these regulations.
3. (1) Every person intending to use any such net for fishing in the aforesaid area shall register such net at the office of the Assistant Government Agent of the Puttalam and Chilaw District before the 30th day of September in the year in which he acquires possession of the net.  
(2) Every application for registration shall set out the name and address of the owner or person entitled to the possession of the net and the type of net.
4. No fee shall be payable for such registration; and it shall not be necessary to register a net more than once except on a change of ownership.
5. No person fishing with any of the nets known as kumbalawalai, kattawalai, surawalai, kanniwalai, or kudupuwalai shall allow any such net to remain in the waters after 7.30 A.M. on any day.
6. No person fishing with ma-del or adasi-del shall spread any such net before 7.30 A.M. on any day.

## General Clerical Examination, 1934.

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will be held commencing on January 23, 1934. This examination is confined to British subjects whose families are permanently resident in Ceylon.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Education, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10, and must be in the prescribed form (Schedule A). Forms can be obtained at the Education Office, Colombo, and application for the same must be sent so as to reach that office by November 20, 1933. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to have been born on or after January 1, 1911, but not later than December 31, 1917, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,\* to the satisfaction of the Director of Education, must be attached to the form of application. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration from the register of past births, the certificates will be accepted only after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, (a) the parent or guardian in the case of a candidate under the age of 21 years should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 21 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1895, as amended by Ordinance No. 23 of 1900; and (b) in the case of a candidate over the age of 21 years, he should produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Director of Education that the certificate of birth forwarded applies to him. Certificates of birth issued for the purposes of the Code for Assisted Schools will not be accepted for this examination.

3. Candidates other than those eligible under paragraph 5 must also furnish proof when forwarding their applications that they have previously passed either—

- (a) The Cambridge Senior or the London Matriculation or higher examinations of the University of London; or
- (b) The Senior School Certificate Examination (English).

4. (a) If a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission to the examination a refund will be made of  $\frac{3}{4}$  the value of stamps affixed to his entry.

(b) (i.) Except in cases referred to in paragraph 4 (a) no refund will be made, but if notice of a candidate's withdrawal is received in the Education Office by December 5, a voucher will be issued. This voucher will entitle the candidate to enter once more for the same examination, without fee, provided that the examination is held within a year and that the regulations are complied with in other respects.

(ii.) Candidates who withdraw on account of illness will receive vouchers as in (i.) provided the notice of withdrawal is received in the Education Office before the examination commences, and is accompanied by the perfected entry form and a medical certificate from a qualified Medical Officer.

5. Clerks in Government Service (other than members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, Harbour Engineer's or Railway Departments; but including those clerks of the Railway Clerical Service who are at present temporarily employed in General Clerical Service posts) from whatever funds they may be paid, who shall have completed three years' service, before the date of the examination and whose service has been throughout satisfactory, are eligible for examination, irrespective of age and without fee, and although they may not have passed the examination or examinations referred to in paragraph 3. Their applications (in the same form) for admission to the examination must be forwarded to the Director of Education through the Heads of their Departments.

6. Clerks in Government Service (other than members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, Harbour Engineer's or Railway Departments; but including those clerks of the Railway Clerical Service who are at present temporarily employed in General Clerical Service posts) if within the age prescribed in paragraph 2 above will be admitted without fee, even though they have not completed three years' service under Government, but they must have passed the examination or examinations referred to in paragraph 3.

7. Candidates in Government Service who are not eligible under paragraphs 5 and 6 may enter for the examination under the conditions laid down in paragraphs 2 and 3.

8. Applications must reach the Director of Education not later than 2 P.M. on November 28, 1933. Any applications received after that hour will be rejected.

9. The Director of Education will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved applications shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Education. A candidate not producing such form will be refused admittance to the examination.

10. The examination will be held in Colombo only at places which will be notified to the candidates in due course. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments whose applications have been returned to them approved by the Director of Education leave to present themselves for the examination.

11. The examination will be competitive. The number of places in Class II. assigned for general competition will be 17. Appointments in Class III. will be offered, as vacancies occur, to the first 20 of those who are not selected for appointment to Class II.

12. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

13. Appointments to Class II. will be on two years' probation in the first instance and (for new entrants to the Public Service) will be on the salary scale recommended by the Salaries and Cadres Commission, 1932, viz., Rs. 720 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 108 to Rs. 2,448 per annum (less temporary levy). Rent allowance is payable. Appointments are pensionable.

14. Appointments to Class III. will be on two years' probation in the first instance and will be on the salary scale recommended by the Salaries and Cadres Commission, 1932, viz., Rs. 420 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 30 to Rs. 1,020 per annum (less temporary levy). Rent allowance is payable. Appointments are pensionable.

15. Persons appointed, who are new entrants to the Public Service, will be eligible for Leave and Holiday Warrants in terms of section 19 of Sessional Paper XVI. of 1932 and section 19 of Sessional Paper XII. of 1932, respectively.

\* If the candidate has been educated at a Government or Assisted School, the certificate must be from the Principal of the last Government or Assisted School which he has attended; otherwise it may be from the candidate's teacher or schoolmaster by preference, or a member of the Public Service, a Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Advocate, Proctor, or Notary, or generally speaking, some person whose name is known and to whom reference can readily be made.

16. Clerical Servants are required to pass a test in typewriting before they are eligible for their first increment.

17. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule B of this notice. The examination will be held in two parts. The first part is a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, Arithmetic, and English Language and Essay. The papers of any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting and Spelling and half the marks allowed for Arithmetic and English Language and Essay will not be considered for the second part of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The second part of the examination will be in the remaining subjects in Schedule B. Credit will not be given for any paper in which a candidate scores less than 25 per cent. of the maximum marks. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

18. Clerks admitted under paragraph 5, who fail to secure places in the general competition under conditions in paragraph 17, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves for four appointments, if in the first part of this examination they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Handwriting and Spelling, and 33 per cent. in Arithmetic, English Language and Essay.

19. The Government does not undertake to provide the successful candidates with posts immediately, but they will be given appointments as suitable vacancies occur.

Varusa Mohammado & Bros. of the Public Market objecting to the proposal to transfer the Market Fair Day from the Public Market premises to Mahaiyawa on the ground that it will result in loss to the vegetable dealers now established in the Public Market. (2) Mr. P. A. K. Abdul Cader asking for permission to transfer the rice depôt held by him to Mr. K. A. Peer Mohammado. (3) The daily-paid Overseers of the Health and Works Departments asking that they be placed on the pensionable establishment and a definite salary scale be laid down for them.

The Chairman agreed to refer petitions (1) and (2) to the Markets and Sanitation Committee.

In regard to (3), Mr. de Silva moved "that as a matter of definite procedure for future guidance it be laid down that petitions from the Municipal staff should not be entertained direct by the Council but that they should in the first instance be submitted to the Chairman who would deal with them as the Head of the Department". Mr. Nettelton seconded. Mr. Wijayatilake supported.—Carried unanimously.

4A. Pursuant to notice, Dr. Attygalle asked the following questions to which the Chairman replied :—

(a) Q.—Was Cecilia Perera a Municipal midwife paid out of Municipal funds, given a month's legal notice of the discontinuance of her services? A.—Yes.

(b) Q.—Before such action was taken did the Chairman call upon her to show cause why her services should not be discontinued? A.—No. The Maternity and Child Welfare Committee charged with the direction and control of Municipal midwives after consideration of the reasons given by the midwife for the continued unsatisfactory character of her services and investigation of the complaints against her unanimously recommended her discontinuance.

(c) Q.—Did the Chairman hold any inquiry to ascertain whether there were sufficient grounds for the discontinuance of the midwife's services? A.—The Chairman examined the grounds given by the Committee for its recommendation and further satisfied himself as regards their sufficiency by inquiry from the Chairman of the Committee.

(d) Q.—If not, will the Chairman be prepared to hold an inquiry? A.—See reply to question (c) above. No further inquiry is considered necessary.

(e) Q.—If not, does the Chairman consider it fair that a Municipal employee should be dismissed without being given an opportunity of meeting any charges against her? A.—The Chairman considers that the midwife has been fairly dealt with and given every opportunity over a long period for mending her ways to the satisfaction of the Committee.

(f) Q.—Is the Chairman aware that the said midwife has been a victim of a wicked conspiracy engineered by the machinations of a Supervisor? A.—No.

(g) Q.—What are the qualifications of these Supervisors as regards (i.) General Nursing? (ii.) Midwifery?

(h) Q.—Is the Chairman prepared to endorse any action of an outside Committee even if it involves a gross miscarriage of justice? A.—No.

(i) Q.—Is it the case that the Chairman obediently adopts recommendations of the said outside Committee whose activities are financed by the Municipal Council to the extent of Rs. 15,000 per annum? A.—The present Chairman has dealt with one recommendation of the Committee only, namely, the discontinuance of the services of midwife Cecilia Perera. If the implication of the question is that the Chairman regards himself as divested of independent judgment in considering a recommendation of the Committee, the answer is in the negative. On the other hand the Chairman would always give full consideration to the views of the Committee appointed to administer the Maternity and Child Welfare Services and to direct and control Midwives and Health Visitors.

(j) Q.—Whether the Medical Officer of Health as the responsible officer held any inquiry personally at any time in the first instance, likewise summoning the necessary witnesses as well as the midwife? A.—No independent personal inquiry was held by the Medical Officer of Health, who, however, as Chairman of the Committee considered the complaints against and the explanations of the midwife in common with the other members of the Committee with whose unanimous finding he was in complete agreement.

(k) Q.—Will the Chairman circulate all papers connected with the case? A.—The papers connected with the case have already been made available to Members.

4B. With the leave of the Council, Dr. Attygalle asked, as a supplementary question, that the Chairman should kindly quote the resolution which delegated power to the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee to administer Maternity and Child Welfare work.

The Chairman made a statement on the matter, indicating that the Council had on December 15, 1924, consulted the Kandy Social Service League and the Kandy District Nurses' Association as to whether they would come to the Council's aid by adopting a scheme whereby a Committee to be called "The Maternity and Child Welfare Committee" was to be called into existence consisting of three members of the Kandy Social Service League, three members of the Kandy District Nurses' Association, and the Medical Officer of Health, and entrusted with the administration and control of Maternity and Child Welfare work in Kandy, which was to be subsidized entirely by Municipal funds.



He read extracts from the letter addressed to these organizations on the occasion and said that as a result of these organizations approving the scheme and expressing their willingness to co-operate with the Council, the Council had by resolution of December 20, 1924, adopted the scheme which had been in operation ever since. The Committee submitted monthly reports on the work of the Midwives and Health Visitors, which were tabled at the meetings of the Sanitation Committee and later circulated to Council and an annual report of the work of the Committee by the Secretary was incorporated in the Chairman's Administration Report.

He believed that it was the Council's opinion that the scheme had proved a great success, and the confidence placed in the Committee by the Council was shown by the increasingly large sums of money which the Council had placed at the disposal of the Committee. He thought he was voicing the sentiments of the Council in expressing its deep appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Municipality by the Committee.

In view of the Chairman's statement, Dr. Attygalle withdrew the following motion which stood in his name numbered 5A, with the leave of the Council:—"That from the beginning of the year, or earlier if possible, the control and management of the Municipal Health Nurses and Midwives shall be brought under the immediate and direct supervision of the Medical Officer of Health, who shall forward the report of their work monthly to the Council through the Standing Committee on Sanitation."

5. Pursuant to notice, Dr. Attygalle moved—"That this Council do take immediate steps for the reconstruction of the Public Market and better arrangements be made for its supervision." Mr. Wijayatilake seconded.

Mr. Soysa while sympathizing with the motion said that more urgent needs like the question of the water supply should receive priority.

Mr. de Silva said that the most effective way of relieving congestion in the present market was to provide markets at Katugastota and Peradeniya to serve those areas.

The Chairman, while agreeing that the present market needed improvement in many ways, suggested that as the question of rebuilding was one which required careful and detailed consideration, a Special Committee should be appointed to go into the whole matter and report to the Council. The Committee could, of course, avail itself of the very valuable data furnished by Dr. Attygalle in connection with his motion, in considering the matter.

With the permission of the Council, Dr. Attygalle amended his motion as follows:—"That this Council do consider the reconstruction of the Public Market and appoint a Special Committee at the beginning of 1934, to go into the whole question and submit definite proposals to the Council for the purpose." The motion as amended was unanimously adopted.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Wijayatilake moved—(1) "That the Deyannawela road from near the Model Tenements to the Hospital road be properly constructed to make it available for traffic and that the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit an estimate for the purpose." (2) "That the footpath leading from the Railway Yard to the Deyannawela road be improved and that the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit an estimate for such improvement." (3) "That the Municipal Electrical Engineer be asked to submit an estimate for providing some additional lights on Deyannawela road and on the footpath referred to in the previous motion." Mr. Geo. E. de Silva seconded.

The Chairman stated in regard to (1) that the widening of the road would entail acquisition of private property at great expense and so far as improvement was concerned he thought it would satisfy the public if an obstructing standpost were removed and the road metalled. The Municipal Engineer had prepared an estimate for Rs. 2,600 for metalling the road, which he proposed to bring up with the Budget. He thought it best to leave the matter of widening to the Government.

In regard to (2) he said that the footpath had been made by the public by usage, and widening it would entail acquisition of private land. He would place the matter before the Works Committee.

In regard to (3) the Chairman said that he proposed to take up the question with the question of providing lighting to the Deyannawela Model Tenement site.

Mr. Wijayatilake expressed himself satisfied with the Chairman's explanation and he asked for the leave of the house not to proceed with the motions.

Leave was accordingly allowed.

7. To consider the report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the proposal to establish a Fair Day in Kandy.

Mr. de Silva moved that the Committee's recommendations be adopted. Mr. Soysa seconded.

The motion was passed, Ratwatte Adigar dissenting and expressing the view that the use of the site at Mahaiyawa for the Fair Day should be conditional to the provision of proper drainage to prevent the pollution of the stream in the locality, and higher up where there were residential bungalows.

8. To consider proposal to abolish the present system of charging bucket fees and to levy a conservancy rate in lieu thereof within the area at present conserved from January 1, 1934.

Mr. de Silva moved—"That the present system of charging bucket fees be abolished as from January 1, 1934, and that a rate of 2½ per cent. be levied as part of the consolidated rates in lieu thereof, in the areas served by conservancy, subject to the passing of the necessary enabling legislation before January 1, 1934." Dr. Attygalle seconded.—Carried.

9. To fix the consolidated rates leviable for the year 1934.

Resolved that the same rates as in 1933 be levied, *i.e.*, 16 per cent. in the water served area and 8 per cent. in the non-water served area, in addition to the conservancy rate of 2½ per cent.

10. To consider applications received for the temporary post of Surveyor.

The Chairman submitted the names of Messrs. Stotesbury and Ginge, who were selected by the Works Committee, after interviewing the five selected candidates who were called up. In the same connection the Chairman said that the Works Committee desired the Council to consider the possibility of giving the work on contract for a consolidated fee. Mr. Nettelton had put forward that proposition as being more advantageous to the Council in view of the fact that owing to the small salary offered it was impracticable to bind a private surveyor appointed not to accept outside work. If the Council concurred with that view, the Works Committee desired that Mr. Spencer's name also should be added and the three of them should be asked to tender for the work, after being given an opportunity of making themselves acquainted with the Council's exact requirements in the matter of the surveys.

Mr. de Silva proposed that all five candidates be asked to tender for the work, the Council not binding itself to accept the lowest tender. Mr. Wijayatilake seconded.—Carried.

11. Chairman's Administration Report for the year 1932.—Tabled.

In regard to (15), it was resolved to allow a vote for Rs. 1,048 on the revised estimate of Messrs. Miller & Co., Ltd., in consideration of the printed copy of the by-laws running into 160 pages as against the 84 pages for which the firm was originally asked to quote.

13. To restore Mr. Walter Beven, who has been absent from three consecutive meetings, to the office of Councillor in terms of sections 29 and 30 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance.

The Chairman moved that Mr. Beven be restored to office. Mr. de Silva seconded.—Carried.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on October 7, 1933, at 9.20 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated October 3, 1933, to make an appointment for the Post of Temporary Licensed Surveyor.

*Present* :—Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Dr. L. C. Wijesinha; Mr. O. T. Nettelton; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva.

The Chairman explained that resolution No. 10 passed by the Council at the meeting held on September 23, 1933, was in the opinion of the Council's Lawyer, *ultra vires*, under Council's by-law 19A and the special meeting had been convened to consider afresh the recommendation contained in the following extract from minutes of meeting of the Works Committee held on September 23, 1933 :—

"The Chairman tabled the applications of the five selected candidates.

The Committee proceeded to interview the candidates in the following order :—Mr. P. Spencer, Mr. H. A. Jayawickrema, Mr. H. C. Stotesbury, Mr. Chas. de S. Ginige, Mr. F. Mapalagama.

The Committee agreed that Messrs. Stotesbury and Ginige were the most eligible candidates for the appointment on a full time basis and it was decided to submit their names to the General Meeting of the Council following."

Mr. de Silva moved the Council into Committee to consider the matter. Chairman seconded, and the Council accordingly resolved into Committee.

Mr. de Silva submitted that the resolution in question was not *ultra vires*, as it was open to the Council to reconsider any previous decision with the permission of the house.

The Chairman explained that the Council's Lawyer had expressed the opinion that the resolution passed on September 23, was in conflict with the resolution of August 19, and, therefore, the resolution of September 23 was *ultra vires*.

The Council decided to abide by the Lawyer's opinion, Mr. de Silva dissenting.

## GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

## Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, September 16, 1933, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to notice dated September 9, 1933.

*Present* :—Mr. J. D. Brown, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. A. J. R. Scherenguivel; Mr. A. M. Saheed; Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. A. Paulas; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna; Mr. R. L. Ephraums; and Mr. A. C. Mohammedo.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of August 19, 1933, were amended as regards item 6 (a) by the addition of the words "Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded" after the word "Council" in line 5, and as regards item 11 by the addition of the words "This was unanimously agreed to" after the sentence "The Chairman moved Council into Committee to consider item (3)."

The Minutes, as amended, were taken as read, and confirmed.

2. Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka presented 2 petitions, one from the stall holders of the Fruit Market asking for a reduction of the rents and the other from T. G. John Appuhamy and A. S. A. Pedrick Appuhamy requesting a reduction of the annual tax levied on hand carts. The former was referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment and the Chairman said the latter would receive consideration.

3. Two petitions were presented by Mr. A. C. Mohammedo, one from the residents of Talapitiya requesting that the Cross road from Talapitiya road to Halls road be improved at an early date, and the other from the stall holders of the Green Market asking that they be given the same concession allowed them last year as regards the deposits made in respect of stall rents. The petitions were tabled and the Chairman said that they would receive consideration.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. F. Magdon Ismail asked the following questions:—(1) Is the hawking of fish without a licence prohibited throughout the Galle Municipal area or only in parts of it? (2) If only in parts to which divisions does it apply? (3) How and from when was the hawking of fish without a licence prohibited? (4) Who is entitled to the grant of a licence for this purpose? (5) Are licences for this purpose granted without inquiry into the character of the applicant? (6) Is the Chairman aware that great dissatisfaction prevails within the Fort due to the present system of granting licences? (7) Is the Chairman aware that this system is causing great hardship to the residents of the Fort and that much profiteering is done by the present licence holder for that area? (8) Will the Chairman be pleased to inquire into the character of the licence holder who is hawking fish within the Fort area?

The Chairman replied as follows:—(1) The hawking of fish without a licence is prohibited throughout the Galle Municipal area. (2) This question does not arise. (3) By-law 9 of Chapter VI. prohibits the hawking of meat or fish without a special licence from the Council.

On March 14, 1925, Council resolved (a) that hawking licences (for fish) be issued on application only to stall holders of the Fish Market upon payment of a fee of Rs. 6 per annum and (b) that unlicensed hawkers be prosecuted.

On February 8, 1930, Council again considered the question as to whether the hawking of fish should be permitted in the Town. It was resolved "that the Council is not in favour of taking action at the present moment." (I presume this meant that the Council was not in favour of preventing unlicensed hawking).

On March 14, 1931, the question was again considered (as a result of a petition from the stall holders that their trade was being interfered with) and Council resolved that unlicensed hawking should be stopped, and the old practice reverted to of issuing permits to stall holders of the Fish Market on payment of a fee of 50 cents per mensem.

This resolution is still in force.—(4) This question has already been answered. (5) Yes, as the applicant is the stall holder. (6) No. (7) No. (8) Yes, if specific charges are put forward against him.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. A. Paulas asked the following questions:—(1) Is the Chairman aware that the seats at the Victoria Park are not well kept? (2) Is the Chairman aware that the West end corner of the Victoria Park is in a very insanitary condition? (3) If so what action does he propose to take? (4) What will it cost to extend the Electric Main, from Julgaha Junction to Kalegana Junction?

The Chairman replied as follows:—(1) At my inspection on the 13th one seat was found broken. The Park-keeper had failed to inform the Superintendent of Works of the fact. Action will be taken to have this seat mended or replaced. The rest of the seats are in as good order as one could expect, considering the handicaps of the dirty feet of those who squat on them, the attentions of crows, and the action of sea air. (2) A rubbish pit used for preparing mould for the flower beds has not been dug deep enough, and I have ordered the Park-keeper to remedy this small defect. I do not consider the Member is at all justified in using the words "in a very insanitary condition." (3) I have already indicated the only action which I consider to be necessary. (4) The Superintendent of the Electricity Department is preparing figures of cost for a High Tension Scheme to extend the service of lights to the Northern area of the Municipality. Quotations have to be obtained from England and I am not in a position to reply to this question now. I might add that the extension mentioned by the Member would not be practicable without the introduction of the High Tension System in the area concerned.

6. Assessment Rates for 1934:—The Chairman moved—(a) To make and assess for the calendar year 1934, a rate of 17½ per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the Police limits, and a rate of 7 per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever outside the Police but within the Municipal limits of Galle as required by section 115 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, payable by four instalments on or before the following dates:—First instalment on or before March 31, 1934. Second instalment on or before June 30, 1934. Third instalment on or before September 30, 1934. Fourth instalment on or before December 31, 1934. (b) To adopt the valuation of properties for the current year subject to such alterations as the Chairman may from time to time find necessary to make for the purpose of rating for the calendar year 1934. Mr. R. L. Ephraums seconded.

Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the rate of 17½ per cent. levied within Police limits be reduced to 15 per cent. and the rate of 7 per cent. outside Police limits to 5 per cent.—Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as a further amendment that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment for consideration. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded, and Mr. A. C. Mohammedo supported the further amendment.

The Chairman said that the Council's surplus balances were gradually diminishing, and if the amendment proposed by Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka was passed it would mean that all new works would have to be completely shut down, which would have the effect of undoing the little progress that had been made during the past few years. He realized that the members had to take notice of what their electors said, but to say that the electors wish for a reduction of the rates is merely giving voice to an axiom. The Council would be utterly failing in its duty if it gave in to the clamour of the electors on this question and brought about a reduction of the rates. He said the amendment proposed by Mr. Dahanayaka should be rejected.

The further amendment proposed by Mr. F. Magdon Ismail that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment was then put to the meeting and carried by 6 votes to 5.

Mr. Dahanayaka called for a division which resulted as follows:—

*Ayes*.—Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, J. E. Perera, A. J. R. Scherenguivel, A. M. Saheed, A. C. Mohammedo, and R. L. Ephraums. *Noes*.—Messrs. S. H. Dahanayaka, E. M. Karunaratna, Thomas Amarasuriya, E. A. Paulas, and Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka.

It was arranged that Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka should attend the meeting of this Committee.

7. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya moved:—That in the opinion of this Council, Government be approached with a view to secure assistance towards the relief of the unemployed. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded—Carried unanimously.

8. Pursuant to notice, Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved:—That it is the opinion of this Council that the proceedings of the Committee meetings be opened to the Press. Mr. W. E. Paulus seconded.

Mr. E. M. Karunaratna moved as an amendment "that in the opinion of this Council the Minutes of the Committee meetings shall be available to the Press, provided that any particular Committee or the Council shall always have the power to withhold such minutes from publication if in their opinion such publication is not in the best interests of the Council". Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded and Mr. J. E. Perera supported the amendment.



Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya supported the original motion.

The mover replied.

The Chairman said he considered that it would be quite in order if the minutes of the Committee meetings were given to the Press before the date of the next General Meeting, but he certainly thought that the discussions at Committee Meetings should not be open to the Press. He was very much in favour of the amendment proposed by Mr. E. M. Karunaratna. The amendment was put to the meeting and carried by 9 votes to 2.

The original motion was then put to the meeting and declared lost.

9. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. A. Paulas moved :—(1) That the Government be requested to reduce the rent of these office buildings by 25 per cent. In doing so he stated that the Revenue of the Council was steadily going down, and further, that the Council has had to reduce the assessments of a large number of buildings. It was only right, therefore, that some reduction in the present rent should be obtained. Mr. J. E. Perera, in seconding, pointed out that the Council were unable to get Government even to cement the office floor.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

10. The following motions stood in the name of Mr. E. A. Paulas :—

(a) That the collection of rates from all lands and buildings attached to Buddhist Temples and Mosques be suspended till the end of 1933.

The mover asked the leave of Council to withdraw this motion. The leave of Council having been granted the motion was withdrawn.

(b) That the monthly meetings of this Council be held on week days.

With the permission of Council this motion was deferred till the next meeting, the mover undertaking to bring it up in another form.

11. To consider letter No. B317 from the Commissioner of Local Government containing proposals regarding the publication of the list of voters and Councillors, Minutes of meetings, and Financial Statements :—Resolved that this Council has nothing further to add to its original resolution dated July 15, 1933, to which the Council adheres.

12. To consider the following resolution of the Standing Committee on Law and General subjects of August 12, 1933, regarding the regulations relating to the Prevention of Plague published in the *Government Gazette* No. 7,991 of July 7, 1932.—“Recommended that the Regulations be adopted and that steps be taken to have the necessary powers delegated to the Council under section 12 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1897, for the enforcement and execution of the Regulations within the Municipal limits of Galle, subject, however to the proviso that any action taken thereon shall have the direct approval of the Chairman.”

Resolved that the above recommendation be adopted.

13. To submit in terms of section 16 (11) of the Municipal Councils Pension Rules, a list of Municipal Officers and servants who are more than 60 years of age :—Resolved that no action be taken.

14. To consider tenders for services for the year 1934 :—Resolved that the matter be referred to the Works Committee for consideration.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council :—

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on August 26, 1933.*

(2) To consider 6 applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(3) To recommend a supplemental vote for Works Contingencies (Vote 42).—Recommended that a Supplemental Vote of Rs. 750 be passed.

#### Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

16. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of August 26, 1933.*

(2) To consider the question of appointing a temporary clerk for about three months to assist in the Assessment Department on a salary of Re. 1 per diem. Recommended that the services of a temporary Clerk be engaged for two months on a salary of Re. 1 per diem.

(3) To consider what action should be taken with regard to the lease of Market stalls, Municipal shops, boutiques, &c., for 1934 :—(1) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation ; (2) Recommended that the lease of the Market stalls, Municipal shops, and boutiques for 1934, be offered to the present stall holders and tenants at the same rental as in 1933.

(4) To write off as irrecoverable a sum of Rs. 40·80, being arrears of water rents for 1932.—Recommended that the sum of Rs. 40·80 be written off as irrecoverable.

#### Resolution.

With regard to item (3) it was resolved to add the following :—“And that the security deposits of lessees who renew their leases be dealt with in the same manner as last year.”

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

17. *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation of August 26, 1933.*

(2) To consider what action should be taken with regard to the lease of Market stalls, Municipal shops, and boutiques for 1934 :—(1) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment. (2) Recommended that the lease of the Market stalls, Municipal shops, and boutiques for 1934, be offered to the present stall holders and tenants at the same rental as in 1933.

(3) To consider the question of having fixed rates for the sale of beef and mutton.—Recommended that, with effect from October 1, 1933, the following scale of rates be adopted for the sale of beef and mutton in the Municipal Market and that such rates be posted up at each of the stalls in which the meat is exposed for sale.—Beef without bones (undercut), 30 cents per lb. ; beef with bones (excepted), 25 cents per lb. ; mutton without bones (imported goats), 70 cents per lb. ; mutton with bones (imported goats), 60 cents per lb. ; mutton without bones (local goats), 80 cents per lb. ; mutton with bones (local goats), 70 cents per lb.

#### Resolution.

With regard to item (2) it was resolved to add the following “and that the security deposits of lessees who renew their leases be dealt with in the same manner as last year.”

With regard to item (3) Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka moved as an amendment that the following scale of rates be adopted : Beef without bones (undercut), 20 cents per lb. ; beef with bones (excepted), 15 cents per lb. ; mutton without bones (imported or otherwise), 60 cents per lb. ; mutton with bones (imported or otherwise), 50 cents per lb.—Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as a further amendment that the following scale of rates be adopted :—Beef without bones (undercut), 25 cents per lb. ; beef with bones (excepted), 20 cents per lb. ; mutton without bones (imported or otherwise), 70 cents per lb. ; mutton with bones (imported or otherwise), 60 cents per lb. Mr. R. L. Ephraums seconded.

Mr. A. M. Saheed supported the recommendation of the Standing Committee.

The Chairman moved that the matter be referred back to the Standing Committee for further consideration along with the amendments proposed by Messrs. S. H. Dahanayaka and F. Magdon Ismail. Mr. A. J. R. Scharanguivel seconded.—Carried.

It was also agreed that Messrs. S. H. Dahanayaka and F. Magdon Ismail be co-opted to serve on this Committee for this purpose.

**Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Galle Municipal Council, held at the Municipal Office on Saturday, October 7, 1933, to pass a vote of condolence on the Death of His Excellency the late Governor, Sir Graeme Thomson.**
