BY-LAW.

By-law 144 of the by-laws dated December 18, 1906, as amended by Proclamation in *Gazette* No. 7,411 of August 22, 1924, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

144. The Council may in its discretion on the application of the owner of any house, allow a private service of water to such house for domestic purposes on the following conditions:—

- (a) In respect of premises, the annual value of which has been assessed at Rs. 1,200 or above that amount, the supply of water shall be free of all charges other than those recoverable under the provisions of by-law 157 in case of waste or undue consumption.
- (b) In respect of premises the annual value of which is below Rs. 1,200 the supply of water shall be regulated by a meter fixed on the service pipe, and the owner or occupier of such premises shall pay meter rent as provided by by-law 160, but the supply of water shall be free of all charges other than those recoverable under the provisions of by-law 157 in case of waste or undue consumption.
- (c) Any owner applying for a water service to any premises under the foregoing condition (b) shall, by an agreement in writing, bind himself to comply with all the requirements mentioned in that condition.
- (d) The connection between the Municipal main and the premises to be served as well as the necessary service pipes and fittings shall be made, laid and affixed by Municipal workmen under the supervision of the Municipal Engineer, at the expense of the owner who may be required to pay the estimated cost of installing such private service into the Municipal Fund before the work in connection therewith is commenced, and who shall also pay the estimated cost of all future repairs, extensions and alterations.

The amended by-laws dated February 14, 1933, published under the heading "Chapter XVII.—Bakeries" in the *Gazette* of February 17, 1933, are hereby further amended—

(1) by the renumbering of the existing paragraph (1) of by-law 20 as paragraph 1 (a) and by the insertion of the following immediately after that paragraph as new paragraph 1 (b):—

(b) No person shall, within the limits of the Council, sell, offer, hawk, or expose for sale bread from any bakery situated outside the limits of the Council unless the bread

is carried in a covered receptacle and unless he has in his possession a card of registration issued by the Chairman as aforesaid upon the application of the proprietor of such bakery; and such card shall not be issued unless the conditions prescribed by the foregoing by-law 19 are fulfilled and unless the Chairman is satisfied from a report of the Medical Officer of Health of the District in which the bakery is situated, that the said bakery conforms to the requirements of these by-laws.

(2) by the insertion of the following new by-law immediately after by-law 21:—

22. No licensee of a bakery shall in any place within the limits of this Council, allow his registered bread vendors to hawk or expose bread for sale otherwise than in a receptacle which is suitably covered.

BY-LAWS.

(Conditions for the Issue of Licences for Dangerous and Offensive Trades as defined under the General By-laws relating to Licensed Trades, published in the Government Gazette of July 14, 1933.)

1. All materials required for the purpose of carrying on any dangerous or offensive trade as defined in by-law 1 of the general by-laws relating to licences shall be so stored as to prevent the diffusion of effluvia or other similar nuisance; and all such materials which have to be brought along any public thoroughfare, and which are likely to give off effluvia or be otherwise offensive shall be transported in non-absorbent covered receptacles or in such other manner as the Chairman may direct, so as to obviate the creation of any nuisance.

2. All offensive vapours or gases emitted during any process or manufacture, shall either be discharged into the external air in such manner and at such a height as to ensure their absorption into the upper air without injurious or offensive effects upon the neighbourhood, or be passed directly through a fire into a condensing apparatus.

3. (1) All premises shall be adequately drained and the drains kept in efficient order and washed daily.

(2) Floors shall be maintained in a proper state of repair and cleansed daily, and when so ordered by the Chairman shall be reconstructed of any impermeable material he may specify.

(3) Walls shall be kept in good order so as to prevent the absorption of filth, and whitewashed twice at least annually and at such other times as the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health may by written notice specify.

4. (1) All apparatus including implements and vessels shall be kept clean, and where possible they shall be cleansed daily.

(2) All refuse, sweepings, and scrapings, together with waste and bye-products, shall be removed daily from the premises in covered receptacles, unless intended to be forthwith subjected to further trade purposes on the premises.

5. All tanks, used for washing or soaking skins, or any other similar materials, shall be emptied and cleansed as often as may be necessary to prevent the creation or diffusion of effluvia.

6. No person carrying on any dangerous or offensive trade, and no owner or occupier of any land or premises upon which such dangerous or offensive trade is carried on, shall pollute any river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water, by discharging thereinto or suffering to flow thereinto, any foul, ill-smelling, or offensive water or other fluid, or by throwing thereinto, or suffering to be washed thereinto, any offensive substance, nor shall be in any other way pollute or contaminate such river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water.

7. The owner or occupier of any land from which clay, earth, stone, gravel, cabook, or any other material is cut for the manufacture of bricks or tiles, or for building, or for any other purpose, shall take all necessary steps to ensure that proper drainage is provided, and that the pits or trenches cut are afterwards so filled as to prevent the collection of stagnant water therein.

8. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of the above by-laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs. 25 for any such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 5 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction, or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

RULES OF THE CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Interpretation.

1. In these rules the following words shall have the following meanings unless such meanings be inconsistent with or repugnant to the subject or context:—

- (a) "the Chamber" shall mean The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce incorporated under the provisions of The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Ordinance, 1895, as amended by The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Amendment Ordinance, 1932, and by any other existing or future statutory amendment or notification hereof;
- (b) "the Ordinance" shall mean The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Ordinance, 1895, as amended by The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Amendment Ordinance 1932, and by any future statutory amendment or modification thereof;
- (c) "the Committee" shall mean the Committee provided for in section 3 of the Ordinance and appointed in accordance with these rules or the rules for the time being of the Chamber;
- (d) "the Secretary" shall mean the Secretary or Acting Secretary or the Assistant Secretary or acting Assistant Secretary for the time being of the Chamber;
- (e) "a member" or "the members" shall mean a member or the members as the case may be of the Chamber unless the context otherwise requires;
- (f) "the rules" shall mean these rules and the rules of the Chamber from time to time in force.

Coming into operation.

2. These rules shall be deemed to come into operation as on and from the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-four.

Election of Members.

Existing Members.

3. Save to the extent to which they are hereinafter required to comply with any of the rules, all firms, companies, corporations, and individuals who are members on the 31st day of December, 1933, shall be deemed, on the coming into operation of the rules, to have duly complied with and fulfilled the provisions of these rules relating to election for membership and accordingly shall be deemed to be members duly elected under and shall be bound by the rules.

Eligibility for membership.

4. (a) The provisions of the rules relating to election of members shall apply as well to companies, corporations, and firms as to individuals;

(b) Any firm, company, corporation, or individual engaged or interested in the general trade of Ceylon and willing to aid in carrying into effect the objects of the Chamber may apply to the Secretary for election as a member of the Chamber.

5. (a) Each individual who is a member on the 31st December, 1933, and each individual who applies for membership after the said date shall furnish the Secretary with an address which shall be deemed to be the address of such individual for all purposes of the rules;

(b) Each firm, company, or corporation which is a member on the 31st December, 1933, and each firm, company, or corporation which applies for membership after the said date shall send to the Secretary a written statement of the names and addresses of the partners of the firm or, in the case of a company or corporation of the directors thereof, and of all persons holding powers of attorney from or authorized to sign *per procuracionem* the name of the firm, company, or corporation as the case may be;

(c) In the case of individuals, firms, companies, and corporations which apply for membership after the 31st day of December, 1933, the particulars required by rules 5 (a) and (b) shall be sent to the Secretary with the application for membership provided for in rule 6;

(d) Whenever any change shall take place in the particulars furnished under rule 5, particulars of such change shall forthwith be notified in writing to the Secretary;

(e) The Secretary shall enter the particulars from time to time furnished to him as required above in a register to be kept for the purpose;

(f) All persons whose names appear in the said register shall be entitled to attend meetings of the members, but only one of such persons shall be entitled to vote on behalf of the firm, company, or corporation of which he is registered as a partner, director, or attorney as the case may be.

Election of members.

6. (i.) A candidate for membership of the Chamber shall send to the Secretary a signed application for election together with a signed agreement to be bound, if elected, by the rules, by-laws, and decisions of the Chamber and by the decisions of the Committee. Such application shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by two members stating that the candidate is, in their opinion, in every way suitable for membership. The application, agreement, and certificate above mentioned shall be in the forms contained in the schedule hereto.

(ii.) Each application for membership shall on receipt by the Secretary be notified by him to all members and after not less than fourteen days from the date of such notification shall be submitted to a meeting of the Committee, when the candidate shall (subject to the payment of the fees hereinafter mentioned) be admitted as a member on the vote of at least two-thirds of the Committee members present at such meeting. The candidate shall thereupon be informed by the Secretary of his admission to membership and shall forthwith pay to the Chamber any entrance fee and the membership-subscription for the half year current at the date of admission. Such admission and the payment of such entrance fee and membership subscription as aforesaid shall alone constitute election and shall entitle the candidate to have his name inscribed in the register referred to in section 4 of the Ordinance and in rule 5 (e).

(iii.) In the event of a change in the name of an individual who may be a member or of a change in the style of a firm which may be a member or of a change in the name of a company which may be a member, the individual, firm, or company in question shall re-apply for membership in accordance with the foregoing rules, and shall if the Committee think fit, pay another entrance fee.

7. At any General Meeting of the Chamber, the members present thereat may by resolution passed by a majority of such members admit as Honorary Members of the Chamber persons distinguished in commerce, finance, art or administration, or who shall have rendered to the Chamber services which the Chamber Committee considers to be of a special nature. Honorary Members shall not be required to sign the application or agreement mentioned in rule 6 or to pay any entrance fee or subscription.

Honorary Members.

Committee of Management.

8. (i.) Until the Annual General Meeting in the year 1934, the business and affairs of the Chamber shall be managed by the Committee appointed under the rules of the Chamber in force prior to the said 1st day of January, 1934, but the said Committee shall be governed by these rules, save with regard to its constitution.

Composition of Committee.

(ii.) Without prejudice to the provisions of rule 8 (i.), the business and affairs of the Chamber shall be managed by a Committee consisting of the following Committee members:—

- (a) a number of persons, one to be nominated by each of the Trade Sections formed under rule 44 and one to be nominated by each such Association and other body of persons as the retiring Committee may approve (hereinafter referred to as an "approved Association");
- (b) a number of persons (but not exceeding six as the retiring Committee may determine) elected by members to represent General Interests; and
- (c) two additional persons to be appointed, if it thinks fit so to do, by the Committee consisting of the persons referred to in rules 8 (ii.) (a) and (b), either prior to its assumption of office or at any time during the period of its office.

(iii.) (a) Any vacancy occurring in the number of nominated members shall as soon as conveniently possible be reported to the Trade Section or approved Association whose nominated Committee member occupies the vacancy, and such Trade Section or approved Association shall thereupon nominate another person to take the place of the vacating Committee member;

Casual vacancies.

(b) Any vacancy occurring in the number of elected Committee members or in the number of additional Committee members shall be filled by the remaining members of the Committee;

(c) Any person chosen to fill a vacancy shall only hold office as a member of the Committee for so long as the vacating Committee member would have held the same if no vacancy had occurred. Provided that in the event of a vacancy occurring by absence of a Committee member from the Island for more than four consecutive months the Trade Section, approved Association or remaining members of the Committee as the case may be, when filling such vacancy, fix the period for which the person appointed to fill the vacancy shall hold office.

9. Any individual who is a member of the Chamber, a partner of any firm which is a member of the Chamber, a director of any company or corporation which is a member of the Chamber, a person authorized to sign *per procuracionem* the name of any firm which is a member of the Chamber, a person authorized to sign *per procuracionem* any company or corporation which is a member of the Chamber, and a person holding a power of attorney from any firm or company or corporation which is a member of the Chamber shall be eligible to serve as a member of the Committee (whether nominated, elected, or additional). Provided always that in the case of a firm not more than one partner, person authorized to sign *per procuracionem* the name of such firm or person holding a power of attorney from such firm shall serve on the Committee at one and the same time and in the case of a company or corporation not more than one director, person authorized to sign *per procuracionem* such company or corporation or person holding a power of attorney from such company or corporation shall serve on the Committee at one and the same time.

Eligibility to serve as Committee member.

10. (i.) At a date not later than the 10th day of January in each year the retiring Committee shall call upon—

- (a) each of the Trade Sections formed under rule 44, and
- (b) each of the approved Associations referred to in rule 8 (ii.) (a)

to nominate its representative to serve on the Committee, such nomination to be received by the Secretary not later than the 20th day of January of that year.

(ii.) The retiring Committee shall, not later than 21 days before the date of the Annual General Meeting of the same year, issue a circular to members—

- (a) reporting the nominations received by the Secretary under rule 10 (i.);
- (b) stating the number of Committee members determined by the retiring Committee to represent General Interests;
- (c) submitting the names of any members of the retiring Committee (not included in (a) above) who are willing to be re-elected to represent General Interests together with any other names they may think fit to recommend as candidates for this purpose; and
- (d) calling for any names in addition to those submitted under (c) above which members may wish to propose as candidates to represent General Interests.

Nomination and election of Committee.

Nomination of candidates for election as Committee members.

11. (i.) All members shall on receipt of the circular referred to in the preceding rule be entitled to nominate names of persons as candidates for the elected seats on the Committee to represent General Interests. Such names shall be submitted in writing enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the Secretary and must be received by the Secretary on or before a date specified for the purpose in the circular referred to in rule 10 (ii.), which date shall not be later than ten days prior to the Annual General Meeting of that year.

(ii.) Each such nomination must be supported by at least six members and must state any special or particular interest that the nominee is in a position to represent in addition to General Interests and each nominee must signify in writing his willingness to be so nominated.

(iii.) As soon as convenient after the date specified for the purpose in the circular referred to in rule 10 (ii.), the names submitted and/or recommended by the retiring Committee under rule 10 (ii.) (c) and the names received by the Secretary under rule 11 (i.) shall be issued to each member in the form of a ballot paper in accordance with the next succeeding rule, for the election of the elected persons referred to in rule 8 (ii.) (b). Provided, however, that if only six or a smaller number of names fall to be included in the ballot paper, the persons so named shall be deemed to have been duly elected as members of the Committee without the necessity for a ballot, unless the number of elected members as determined by the retiring Committee shall be less than the number of such names in which event there shall be an election by ballot.

Ballot papers for election of Committee.

12. (i.) (a) Ballot papers shall indicate against the name of each candidate any special or particular interest (if any) that he is in a position to represent in addition to General Interests, and shall contain a space opposite each name in which the vote is to be recorded;

(b) Ballot papers shall also indicate which candidates are nominated and recommended respectively by the retiring Committee and which are nominated by members under rule 11 (i.), and shall state the time and date on or before which they must be returned under sealed cover addressed

to "The Committee Scrutineers" which date shall not be less than four days prior to the date of the Annual General Meeting. Ballot papers may also include such further instructions and information as may be considered necessary for their proper attention and return;

(c) Members shall use a circle to indicate support and a cross to indicate the contrary;

(d) Members shall not sign their names to ballot papers.

(ii.) On the business day next succeeding the date specified for the return of the ballot papers the ballot papers received shall be opened by two Scrutineers appointed by the retiring Committee from their number, and the votes secured by each of the several candidates shall be counted. The six candidates who secure the largest number of votes shall be deemed to have been duly elected as members of the Committee for the purpose of rule 8 (ii.) (b). If two or more candidates secure an equal number of votes, the retiring Committee may decide that all of them shall be members of the Committee or may select by lot from such candidates the candidate or candidates who are to be members of the Committee.

(iii.) The ballot papers may be opened by the Committee Scrutineers on the day mentioned in sub-clause (ii.) above, even though all ballot papers issued to members may not have been received. Any ballot papers received after the time and date fixed for their return shall be destroyed by the Committee Scrutineers without being opened.

Election of
Chairman, Vice-
Chairman and
Deputy Chairman.

13. (i.) The Committee appointed in accordance with the foregoing provisions shall assume office immediately after the holding of the next succeeding Annual General Meeting and shall, as soon as practicable after its appointment and in any case prior to such Annual General Meeting, elect from among its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Deputy Chairman of the Chamber for the period during which such Committee shall hold office.

Vacancy in
Chairmanship, &c.

(ii.) Should any vacancy occur in the office of Chairman, Vice-Chairman or Deputy Chairman by death, insolvency, resignation, or otherwise or in the event of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman or Deputy Chairman for the time being ceasing to be qualified as a member of the Committee, the Committee shall fill the vacancy or vacancies from its number and should any vacancy occur by absence from the Island for more than four consecutive months the Committee may appoint one of its number to fill such vacancy and may fix the period for which the person so appointed shall hold office.

Retirement of
Committee.

14. At each Annual General Meeting the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Deputy Chairman, and all the other members of the Committee shall retire unless they shall have been reappointed.

Powers of the Committee.

Purchase, lease,
sale, mortgage.

15. The Committee shall have power to purchase and/or take on lease any lands or building for and on behalf of the Chamber at or for such price or prices, and/or for such rent or rents, and under such title and upon such terms and conditions as the Committee shall think fit and proper and also to erect and construct any building or buildings on any land or lands purchased or leased or to be purchased or leased as aforesaid. They shall also have power, with the consent of the majority of the members present at any General meeting, to sell or mortgage the whole or any part or parts of the property of the Chamber whether movable or immovable.

Letting.

16. The Committee shall also have power to lease or let on any form of tenancy any lands or buildings or any parts or portions thereof respectively belonging to the Chamber for such periods, and at such rents, and upon such terms and conditions as it shall think fit and proper.

Payments from
funds.

17. The Committee shall pay out of the funds of the Chamber all costs and expenses incurred in and about the business and affairs of the Chamber including (a) remuneration to the officers, representatives, agents, and servants of the Chamber either in Ceylon or abroad and to any other person or persons for services rendered; (b) contributions to a Provident Fund or Funds for the benefit of the officers, employees, and servants of the Chamber; and (c) the cost of any lands and buildings.

Bank Accounts.

18. The Committee shall also have power to open from time to time on behalf of the Chamber any account or accounts with such Bank or Banks as it may select or appoint, and also by such signatures as it shall appoint to draw, accept, make, endorse, sign and enter into cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds, mortgages, appointments to any proctor or proctors, contracts, or agreements on behalf and for the purposes of the Chamber. They shall also have power to place the whole or any part of the funds of the Chamber in fixed deposit in one or more of the local banks, or to invest the same as it may think fit in Ceylon or Indian Government securities, or securities of the Government of the United Kingdom, or by way of loan or loans to any joint stock company or companies registered in Ceylon, or by way of loan or loans on a primary mortgage of immovable property in Ceylon, or in or upon any security authorized by the law of Ceylon for the time being for the investment of trust funds.

Hiring of Rooms,
&c.

19. The Committee shall have power to place the rooms of the Chamber at the disposal of any other person or body of persons, or to hire them for the purpose of public sales or of any meetings and/or for any other purpose, at times when they are not required for the use of the Chamber.

Borrowing money,
&c.

20. The Committee shall have power from time to time, at its discretion, to borrow money for the purpose of the Chamber, to such an extent, in such manner, and upon such terms and conditions as it may think fit, and for such purposes to grant bonds, promissory notes, bills, debentures, interest warrants, bonds for cash credit, trust deeds or other documents, to issue letters of credit.

Statistics.

21. The Committee shall give such directions as it may deem necessary for the collection and classification of information bearing on the wants and interests of the Chamber and for the collection and circulation among members of statistics and other information connected with the trade, manufactures, and industries of Ceylon.

General.

23. In furtherance and not in limitation of and without prejudice to the general powers conferred upon the Committee by the Ordinance, it is hereby expressly declared that the Committee shall have the powers following, that is to say:—

(a) To make rules or regulations for and otherwise control the management of the property of the Chamber;

(b) To appoint officers, clerks, and servants with such remuneration and at such salaries and on such conditions as it may consider advisable and to pay the expenses occasioned thereby, as well as the current expenses for periodicals, rent or otherwise, out of the funds of the Chamber and should such expenses exceed the amount of the annual income of the Chamber the deficit shall be borne by the members in equal proportions. Provided that the contributions of each member towards such deficit shall not exceed the sum of One hundred and fifty rupees (Rs. 150) in any one year, every such contribution being exclusive of the liability of each member under section 12 of the Ordinance;

(c) To appoint any member or members of the Committee or any other member or members or other person or persons as agent or agents for the management of the affairs of the Chamber and the accomplishment of its objects (including the appointment of any person or persons as representative or representatives or agent or agents of the Chamber for the purpose of representing commercial interests in the State

Council of Ceylon or elsewhere in Ceylon and to likewise appoint any person or persons as representative or representatives to visit any country or countries, abroad in the interests of commerce or trade);

- (d) To establish and support Provident Funds for the benefit of the officers, employees or servants of the Chamber upon such terms and conditions and subject to such rules as the Committee may think fit;
- (e) To remunerate as the Committee may think fit the services of and to pay any expenses of the Chairman and/or Vice-Chairman and/or Deputy Chairman and/or any other member or members and/or any representative or representatives and/or agent or agents referred to in sub-clause (c) above and/or any representatives visiting any country or countries abroad in the interests of commerce or trade and from time to time to fix and vary the amount of such remuneration;
- (f) From time to time to remove or to suspend all or any of the officers, clerks, or servants for such reasons as the Committee may think proper and advisable and without assigning any cause;
- (g) To institute, conduct, defend, compromise, settle, or abandon any legal proceedings on behalf of the Chamber, and also to compound and allow time for payment or satisfaction of any debts due to or from the Chamber, and any claims or demands by or against the Chamber;
- (h) To refer any claims or demands by or against the Chamber to arbitration, and observe and perform the awards;
- (i) To make and give receipts, releases, and other discharges for money payable to the Chamber and for claims and demands by the Chamber;
- (j) To act on behalf of the Chamber in all matters relating to bankrupts and insolvents.

Proceedings of the Committee.

23. (i.) The Committee shall meet regularly for the despatch of business once at least in each and every month or as often as occasion may require, or when summoned—

- (a) by the Chairman and/or the Vice-Chairman and/or the Deputy Chairman, or
- (b) on the requisition of five members at least of the Committee (in which case the business to be dealt with thereat shall be intimated in the requisition).

(ii.) Any requisition as aforesaid shall be addressed to the Secretary and deposited at the office of the Secretary and may consist of several documents in like form each signed by one or more of the requisitionists. Upon receipt of such requisition the Secretary shall forthwith proceed to convene a meeting of the Committee to be held at such time and place as he may determine. If he does not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the date of the deposit of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene a meeting of the Committee to be held at such time and place as they may themselves fix, of which seven days' notice at least shall be given, but any meeting so convened shall not be held after twenty days from the date of such deposit.

(iii.) No business shall be transacted at a meeting of the Committee unless there shall be present at the commencement of the business at least ten members of the Committee.

(iv.) Meetings of the Committee shall be presided over by the Chairman or in his absence by the Vice-Chairman or in his absence by the Deputy Chairman, and if at the time appointed for holding any meeting none of them is present the members of the Committee present shall appoint a Chairman from among their number.

(v.) All matters before the Committee shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in the case of an equality of votes the Chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a Member of the Committee.

24. If any nominated member objects to the Committee coming to a final decision on any matter which decision is in his opinion likely to affect the interests which he represents such question shall be referred to the Trade Section or approved Association represented by such nominated member with a request that a report on such question should be submitted to the Committee within such period as the Committee shall fix, and, upon receipt of such report but without in any way being bound by such report, the Committee shall finally deal with the matter.

25. (i.) (a) In the event of any member of the Committee failing to attend three consecutive Committee meetings, the Committee shall have power to declare his seat vacant. In the event of any member of the Committee resigning, dying, or becoming insolvent, or being in arrear with his annual subscription for more than one month or if the firm, company, or corporation to which such member of the Committee belongs shall be in arrear with its subscription for more than one month, the Committee shall declare his seat vacant, and any such vacancy shall thereupon be filled in manner provided in rule 8 (iii.);

(b) A member of the Committee may be excused from attendance by a resolution of the Committee passed either before or after his failure to so attend.

(ii.) The Committee shall have full power to act notwithstanding that any vacancy may not have been filled.

(iii.) The members shall from time to time be notified of any change or changes in the Committee under this rule.

26. In accordance with the provisions of section 3 of the Ordinance, the Committee may delegate the administration of any portion or portions of the affairs of the Chamber to one or more sub-Committees consisting of such of its members as the Committee may think fit, and the Committee may from time to time revoke the appointment of and discharge any such sub-Committee either wholly or in part and either as to persons or purposes but every sub-Committee so formed shall in exercise of the powers delegated to it conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Committee. All acts done by any such sub-Committee in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of its appointment shall have the like force and effect as if done by the Committee.

27. All acts of the Committee or of any sub-Committee shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Committee or sub-Committee or any defect in the appointment of any member of the Committee or sub-Committee and notwithstanding that it be afterwards found that any such member was disqualified from being a member of the Committee or sub-Committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect or disqualification had existed, and as if every person had been duly appointed and was qualified to act as a member of the Committee.

28. A resolution in writing signed by a majority of the members of the Committee or of a sub-Committee shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Committee or of such sub-Committee duly convened and constituted. Provided that in the case of the Committee no fewer than ten members thereof shall sign it and in the case of a sub-Committee no fewer of its members than the number constituting a quorum (as prescribed by the Committee) shall sign it.

29. The Committee shall cause minutes to be made in a book or books to be provided and used solely for that purpose of the following matters, to wit:—

- (1) of all the names of Committee members present at each meeting of the Committee;
- (2) of all appointments of officers, Committee members, sub-Committees, and others made by the Committee;

Committee Meetings.

Requisition.

Quorum.

Chairman.

Decision by majority and Chairman to have casting vote.

Decision of Committee affecting interests of nominated members.

Attendance of Committee members, vacancies, resignations, &c.

Sub-Committees.

Validity of acts of Committee, sub-Committees, &c.

Resolution in writing.

Minutes.

- (3) of all orders made by the Committee ;
- (4) of all resolutions and proceedings of meetings of the Chamber, of the Committee, and of each sub-Committee ;
- (5) of the use of the seal of the Chamber.

All such minutes shall be signed by the person or one of the persons who shall have presided as Chairman at the meeting of the Chamber, the Committee, or sub-Committee, at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person or one of the persons who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing meeting of the Chamber, the Committee, or sub-Committee respectively. All minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any meeting of the Chamber, the Committee, or sub-Committee as the case may be shall for all purposes whatsoever be *prima facie* evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be recorded in such minutes, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the Chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman, and of the date on which such meeting was held.

Finance.

- Financial Year. 30. (i.) The financial year of the Chamber shall be from the 1st day of January to the 31st day of December of each year.
- Entrance fee Annual Subscription. (ii.) The entrance fee and annual subscription for membership shall be fixed from time to time by the members in General Meeting.
- (iii.) The annual subscription for membership shall be payable half yearly in advance on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in each year. Candidates for membership elected as members during the course of either of the half-yearly periods succeeding the said respective dates shall be liable for membership subscription for the full half-yearly period in which they are so elected as members.
- (iv.) Any member whose subscription is in arrears for more than one month shall be debarred from voting at any meeting of the members until such subscription shall have been paid.
- (v.) Any member whose subscription is in arrears for more than three months shall forfeit all privileges of membership and the name of such member shall after one month's notice be removed from the register of members unless prior to the expiration of such notice such arrears shall have been paid and, if so removed, members shall be notified accordingly but the amount unpaid shall nevertheless be a debt due to and recoverable by the Chamber.

Membership.

- Cessation and resignation of membership. 31. (i.) Any company or corporation which goes into liquidation whether voluntary or otherwise, or which suspends payment and any individual or firm which becomes insolvent or suspends payment, shall thereupon cease to be a member.
- (ii.) Any member may resign on giving one calendar month's notice in writing to the Secretary, but such member shall be liable for the membership subscription for the half year in which the date of resignation falls.
- Expulsion of members. 32. Two-thirds of the members present and voting at a General Meeting of the Chamber may by resolution expel any member whose conduct in their opinion renders such member unsuitable to be a member of the Chamber and any member so expelled shall on the passing of such resolution cease to be a member of the Chamber but he shall not be entitled to refund of any membership subscriptions previously paid by him or any part thereof.
- Membership of enemy and ex-enemy subjects. 33. Any member who is a subject of a country between which and Great Britain a state of War exists shall, *ipso facto*, cease to be a member. Provided that any member who shall cease to be a member under this rule may, within two years of the signing of Peace between Great Britain and the country with whom a state of War existed, re-apply for election and such member shall, if elected, be allowed to resume membership.

Meetings.

- Annual General Meeting. 34. The Annual General Meeting of the Chamber shall be held not later than the 31st day of March in each year as the Committee for the time being shall decide for the purpose of the following business :—
- (i.) To receive the report of the Committee and the audited accounts of the Chamber for the previous financial year.
 - (ii.) To notify the composition of the new Committee.
 - (iii.) To confirm the appointment of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Deputy Chairman.
 - (iv.) To elect Auditors.
 - (v.) To consider and take such action as may be decided upon with reference to any other business, motion, or resolution of which due notice shall have been given.
- Annual Report. 35. A report of the proceedings of the Chamber for each financial year shall be prepared by the Committee and circulated for the information of members at least seven days prior to the Annual General Meeting at which it is to be submitted.
- Ordinary General Meetings. 36. (i.) Ordinary General Meetings of the Chamber shall be convened by the Secretary at the direction of the Committee or on the requisition of not less than ten members.
- (ii.) Any requisition by members shall be addressed to the Secretary and shall state the business to be dealt with at the meeting to be called, and shall be deposited at the office of the Secretary. A requisition may consist of several documents in like form each signed by one or more of the requisitionists. Upon receipt of such requisition the Secretary shall forthwith proceed to convene a meeting of the members to be held within twenty days of the deposit of such requisition. If the Secretary does not proceed to convene the meeting the requisitionists may themselves convene a meeting of the members to be held at such time and place as they may themselves fix but any meeting so convened shall not be held after thirty days from the date of the deposit of such requisition.
37. Any member may, on giving not less than ten days previous notice in writing of any business, motion, or resolution, submit the same to any general meeting. Such notice shall be sent to the Secretary.
- Annual and Ordinary General Meetings notice. Business. 38. (i.) Not less than seven clear days' notice shall be given of all Annual or Ordinary General Meetings specifying the time and place of such meeting and the purpose for which it is to be held, by posting or delivering such notice to the registered address of each member.
- (ii.) No business shall be brought before or transacted at any General Meeting other than the business specified in such notice.
- Quorum. (iii.) Twenty-five members shall form a quorum.
- (iv.) If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for a meeting the required number of members shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of members, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place and no notice of such adjournment need be given, and at such adjourned meeting the business shall be transacted by the members present thereat, notwithstanding that a quorum may not be present.

(v.) No resolution of a General Meeting shall be rescinded except by another General Meeting convened either solely for that purpose or partly for that purpose and partly for another purpose or other purposes.

39. The Chairman of the Chamber or in his absence the Vice-Chairman or in the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman the Deputy Chairman shall preside at any General Meeting; in their absence the meeting shall elect a Chairman from among those present.

Chairman of a General Meeting.

40. (i.) At any general meeting, save as otherwise provided in the rules, a resolution put to the vote of the meeting shall be decided on a show of hands unless upon the declaration of the result of the show of hands a poll be demanded by at least one-fourth of the persons present thereat and entitled to vote and unless a poll be so demanded the declaration by the Chairman of the meeting that a resolution has been carried or lost shall be conclusive, and an entry to that effect in the minute book of the Chamber shall be conclusive evidence thereof, without proof of the number of the votes recorded in favour of or against any such resolution.

Resolutions at General Meetings.

(ii.) Each member shall have one vote and, in the case of a firm, company, or corporation which is a member, such firm, company, or corporation shall vote through one of its partners, directors, or attorneys as the case may be whose names appear in the register mentioned in rule 5 (e).

Voting Powers.

(iii.) In the case of an equality of votes, either on a show of hands or at a poll, the Chairman shall be entitled to a further or casting vote, in addition to the vote to which he may be entitled as a member.

Chairman of Meeting to have casting vote.

(iv.) If a poll be demanded in manner aforesaid, it shall be taken in the manner provided in rule 41 but before such date as the Chairman of the meeting shall fix, and the result of the poll shall be deemed to be a resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded. No poll shall be demanded on the election of a Chairman of a meeting or on any question of adjournment.

Poll.

41. A poll shall be taken by means of voting papers sent by post to each member entitled to vote at his or its registered address. The voting papers shall state the question to be voted upon, and the time and date (to be fixed at the meeting at which the poll is demanded or thereafter by the Chairman of that meeting) within which the voting papers are to be returned. Any voting paper not returned within that time shall be rejected. The voting papers shall be addressed to the "Poll Scrutineers" who shall be appointed at the meeting at which the poll is demanded; and the report of the said Scrutineers (which shall be final) as to the result of the poll shall be exhibited at the office of the Chamber and entered in the minute book. Such entry shall be conclusive evidence of the result of the poll, without proof of the number of the votes recorded in favour of or against the question voted upon.

Poll, how taken.

42. The Committee shall determine what may and what may not be published in connection with the business or proceedings of the Chamber.

Publication of Proceedings.

43. The Chairman may, with the consent of the meeting, adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.

Adjournment of meetings.

Trade Sections.

44. (i.) Any number of members, who may desire to associate themselves together in a Trade Section with a view to representing more effectually the interest of any particular business or trade, may address the Committee to that effect and the Committee thereupon may, if it thinks fit, authorize the formation of such a Trade Section and the Committee may also at any time, if it thinks fit, revoke such authority, whereupon such Trade Section shall not be entitled to representation on the Committee.

Trade Sections.

(ii.) The affairs of each Trade Section shall be managed by a Committee elected from its own members and each Trade Section shall frame its own rules for the conduct of its affairs and of the particular business interest it represents, but all such rules and any amendments thereto shall be first submitted for the approval of the Committee. A register shall be kept by each Trade Section of the names of the members thereof, but no person shall be eligible for membership of a Trade Section who is not a member of the Chamber.

(iii.) The Secretary shall be *ex officio* Secretary of any Trade Section unless it is considered desirable by the Committee in consultation with the Committee of the Trade Section concerned that other arrangements should be made.

(iv.) No resolution of any Trade Section shall be binding on the Chamber as a whole until confirmed by the Committee, but in the case of an emergency the Chairman of the Chamber in consultation with the Vice-Chairman or Deputy Chairman of the Chamber may confirm such resolutions which shall thereupon be binding on the Chamber as a whole.

Decisions of a Trade Section.

45. Each Trade Section and approved Association represented on the Committee shall furnish for inclusion in the Annual Report of the Chamber a brief report on the working of such Trade Section and approved Association during the year for which such Annual Report of the Chamber is prepared together with a list of its members as at the 31st December of that year.

Reports of Trade Section.

Common Seal.

46. The seal of the Chamber shall not be used or affixed to any document except in the presence of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman or Deputy Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Chamber, who shall attest the sealing thereof. Any document so sealed shall be presumed to be duly executed by the Chamber.

Seal.

Notices.

47. (i.) Notice may be authenticated by the signature (printed, written, or by some other mode of representing words in a visible form) of the Secretary or of any other person appointed by the Committee to do so.

(ii.) A notice may be served upon a member either personally or by sending it through the post in a prepaid letter addressed to such member at his registered address and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served for all purposes.

(iii.) Any notice if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day on which the letter containing the same would in ordinary course of post have been delivered at its address, and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put into a post box or posted at a post office, and the entry in the Chamber's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

Miscellaneous.

48. Subject to such alterations, additions, amendments, and cancellations as may from time to time be made or determined by the Chamber in General Meeting, the rules appearing in the appendices hereto shall apply to the matters respectively referred to in the said appendices.

APPENDIX B.

Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale of Tea by Auction, and Forms of Green Tea and Forward Tea Contracts.

BYE-LAWS.

1. Sales shall be held weekly at the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Sale Rooms at such time and under such arrangement as the Committee of the Colombo Tea Traders Association, hereinafter referred to as the Association, shall from time to time decide.
2. Prices realized for individual lots at such sales shall not be published.
3. No teas shall be catalogued until they have arrived and catalogues shall be closed and samples and catalogues delivered to Buyers at such times and dates as the Committee shall, from time to time, decide.
4. No teas shall be catalogued for sale except through Members of the Colombo Tea Traders' Association as Principals or unless they are guaranteed by the Selling Broker as first hand teas on garden account, or unless they are first bulked and repacked in the store of a Member of the Association and remain there pending delivery.
5. 1,000 lb. of tea and upwards shall constitute a large break, a smaller quantity being regarded as a small break, but no lot of less than 500 lb. shall be catalogued except dust and fannings in which cases no lot of less than 300 lb. shall be catalogued.

Conditions of Sale.

1. The highest bidder shall be the purchaser and any dispute that may arise shall be settled by the Selling Broker, who shall not declare the name of the Buyer until after the lot is knocked down, unless, in his opinion, there shall be any uncertainty as to the actual bidder. The Seller of the Tea or any agent employed by him shall have the right to bid.
2. All teas shall be sold by the lot at so much per lb., free of any Export Duty, which duty, if any, shall be payable by the Seller. No less advance than 1 cent per lb. to be made on any previous bid. When a bid is registered by the Selling Broker the bidder shall have the right to claim the Tea at any advance in price, such bids to be binding until 1 P.M. of the day following sale.
3. A deposit of 10 per cent. shall be made if required at the moment a lot is knocked down, failing which it shall be immediately put up for re-sale.
4. All teas shall be paid for on catalogued weights (less 4 lb. sample allowance on large breaks, and 3 lb. on small breaks) on or before prompt day, which shall be five days from date of sale, Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted. On receipt of payment the Seller shall issue a delivery order in favour of the Buyer, who shall thereupon take delivery at Seller's Stores. Should payment not be made before noon on prompt day the Seller shall have the right, on giving notice in writing to the Buyer, to re-sell the lot or lots at the risk of the Buyer, who shall be liable for any loss resulting from such re-sale, and the Buyer so defaulting shall be precluded from bidding at the next subsequent sale, and if settlement has not then been made, at any following sale until such time as settlement has been made. Buyers of tea shall take delivery of their purchases within twelve working days, after prompt day. The tea, notwithstanding the fact that it may have already been paid for, shall be at Seller's risk (to the amount of the contract value only) for two working days, after prompt day, unless previously delivered, and thereafter (except in the case of any dispute or disagreement arising, in which event it shall remain at Seller's risk pending settlement of such dispute or disagreement) it may remain in Seller's Stores at Buyer's risk (except in the case of loss or damage to tea by fire, which shall be at Seller's risk) for a further ten working days without any liability on the part of the Buyer for storage. If the Buyer shall not have taken delivery of tea purchasee by him within the period of twelve working days after prompt day, the tea, so long as it remains in Seller's Stores, shall be at Buyer's risk absolutely (except only in respect of loss or damage to tea arising from the Seller's own negligence or wilful act) and he shall in addition pay the Seller storage charges calculated at six cents per day per full chest and four cents per day per half chest until he shall take delivery thereof. Provided that any payment by the Buyer to the Seller on account of storage charges as aforesaid shall not make the Seller liable in any way whatsoever for any loss or damage to tea from whatever cause arising other than the Seller's own negligence or wilful act.

5. If required by the purchaser two separate delivery orders shall be granted for any parcel of tea consisting of or over 20 chests or 35 half chests.

6. The Selling Broker shall open, inspect, and sample the tea. The sample in the case of a large break shall consist of 4 lb. and a small break 3 lb. Four packages of a large break and three packages of a small break shall be sampled, 1 lb. exactly being drawn from each package. Where there are only two packages, 1½ lb. shall be drawn from each package. All packages sampled shall be marked accordingly by prominently stencilling the letter "S" thereon. Provided the samples so drawn are found to be similar, and of equal quality, such sampling as aforesaid shall be considered sufficient, but should there be any variation in quality every package shall be sampled, an equal quantity of tea being drawn from each package. No sampling whatsoever shall be done unless the entire lot shall have arrived at Seller's Stores. Catalogues shall state whether or not teas are bulked and hooped, and in the case of teas not bulked every package shall be sampled, an equal quantity being drawn from each package.

7. All teas offered for sale shall be packed in good merchantable packages and the Selling Broker shall declare in his catalogue whether such packages are "momi", "native wood", "patent", or "metal". The type of all packages and linings shall be declared together with the weight or gauge of the linings.

8. (a) All packages shall have the gross and nett weights marked thereon previous to being offered for sale, and in the event of a shortage in weight being proved to the satisfaction of the Seller he shall be liable for such shortage, and also for the cost of weighing, which shall not exceed 12½ cents per package ;

(b) All objections as to quality, description, packing, or weights must be made on or before the tenth day after date of sale, Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted.

9. Brokers buying or selling tea shall declare in writing their principals immediately after the sale, otherwise they themselves shall be held responsible as principals.

10. Should any dispute or disagreement arise between Buyer and Seller the same shall be referred to the arbitration of one arbitrator to be appointed by both parties, or, if the parties cannot agree as to an arbitrator, to the arbitration of two arbitrators, one to be appointed by each party. The arbitrators shall, before proceeding with the business of the arbitration, appoint an umpire, to the arbitration of whom shall be referred all questions on which the arbitrators are unable to agree. The award of such arbitrator, arbitrators, or umpire (as the case may be) shall be final, conclusive, and binding on all parties. If either party shall refuse or neglect to appoint an arbitrator within three days after the other party shall have appointed an arbitrator on his part, and shall have served or posted, under registered cover, written notice requiring him to make such appointment, then the arbitrator appointed as aforesaid shall, at the request of the party appointing him, proceed to arbitrate on the matter in dispute as if he were an arbitrator appointed by both parties for that purpose.

11. Additions or alterations to the foregoing Bye-Laws and/or Conditions of Sale may be made from time to time as occasion arises at a General Meeting of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce to be called for such purpose in accordance with the rules of the Corporation.

APPENDIX C.

Conditions of Sale of Parchment Coffee.

1. The Buyer of Parchment Coffee, in the absence of any stipulation to the contrary, is not to be required to take delivery of what is tendered in execution of a contract unless the same is in good merchantable condition, by which is meant dried to a degree fit for keeping, not heated, free from fungus beans, and the quantity of light and pulper-cut beans not to exceed 5 per cent.

2. In the case of f.o.b. contract for prepared Coffee, it is understood that the Seller does not guarantee either the out-turn or the proportion of driage, but merely that the Coffee shall be what it professes to be, the out-turn of first parchment or otherwise according to the contract.

3. When a crop is sold as consisting of a certain number of bushels more or less, the estimate being a *bona fide* one, the Seller shall not be bound to make up any deficiency in the yield.

4. When a certain number of bushels are sold as part of a crop, the Seller is bound to deliver that quantity, no stipulation to the contrary having been made.

5. When a crop is sold in two or more lots, delivery to be according to date of sale, the first sold to be first delivered.

6. When the crop sold exceeds the estimate, the Buyer is to have the option either of receiving or refusing the quantity in excess.

7. The delivery shall be at Buyer's store.

8. The days for delivery are to be mentioned in the contract, and the coffee shall be tendered at Buyer's store by 10 o'clock A.M. on any one of the days named for delivery. The Buyer shall be bound to receive it and grant receipt on the same day. Should the Buyer fail to receive the Coffee tendered in accordance with the foregoing condition, it shall be competent to the Seller to return the Coffee to his store, and the Buyer shall pay the cost of cart hire and loading.

9. That until paid for the Coffee shall in every case be held by the Buyer for account of the Seller, insured against the risk of fire. On payment of the purchase-money the Coffee shall vest in the Buyer.

APPENDIX D.

Conditions of Sale of Cinchona Bark.

1. Delivery shall be at Buyer's store within three days from date of contract, Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted.

2. The Buyer shall give notice to the Seller of the day or days on which he is prepared to receive the bark purchased, and, provided that it be tendered at Buyer's Store at 10 o'clock A.M. on the day or days named in the notice, Buyer shall be bound to receive it and grant receipt for the quantity on the same day.

3. Should the Buyer fail to receive the bark tendered in accordance with the foregoing condition, it shall be competent to the Seller to return the bark to his store, and the buyer shall pay the cart-hire and loading.

4. That until paid for the bark shall, in every case, be held by the Buyer for account of the Seller, insured against risk of fire. On payment of the purchase money the bark shall vest in the Buyer.

Conditions of Sale of Cocoa and Cardamoms.

The same as for Parchment Coffee in so far as they apply, except sales f.o.b., when they come under the Rules for all f.o.b. contracts.

APPENDIX E.

Conditions of Sale of F.O.B. Contracts Generally.

1. F.o.b. shall mean free on board the ship, export duty and/or royalty and harbour dues paid by the Seller, risk of craft from shore to ship to be borne by the Seller.

2. When produce of any kind has been sold f.o.b., it shall be inspected by the purchaser at the Seller's Stores before shipment, due facilities being given by the Seller for that purpose.

After being passed by the buyer, the quality and condition shall be deemed to be in accordance with the contract, and no claim in respect thereto shall afterwards lie against the Seller.

3. Payment shall be made in exchange for mate's receipt, or within three days of tender of delivery, if shipment is delayed.

8. The seller shall pay the brokerage except in the case of Government Stock, when ½ per cent. is to be charged to the Buyer and ½ per cent. to Seller

APPENDIX G.

SURVEY REPORTS AND ARBITRATION AWARDS.

Whereas it has been represented to the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce that, in order to give to Survey Reports and Arbitration Awards an official character that they have not at present, and which circumstances have proved to be necessary, it is desirable that such Reports and Awards be made by Surveyors and Arbitrators or by Umpires who shall be selected from among gentlemen nominated by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce in accordance with the regulations in this Appendix hereinafter set forth and contained and that the same should be certified by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

Official List.

Members are furnished with a copy of this list as revised from year to year.

Regulations relating to the Appointment of Arbitrators and Surveyors.

1. The Board of Directors shall, during the month of December in each and every year, select and make a list of gentlemen who may be willing to serve as Arbitrators and Surveyors for the next ensuing year and shall circulate to all members a printed copy of such list. Such new appointments shall be for one year only from 1st of January and shall terminate together with any additional appointments made during any year on the 31st December of that year.

2. All Survey Reports made by gentlemen as Surveyors to the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce shall be forwarded to the Chamber, in triplicate, together with a fee of Rs. 2·50 per Report.* The original and one copy of each Report shall be viséed with the stamp of the Chamber and attested by the Secretary, and returned to the Surveyor, and the other copy shall be filed with the Chamber records.

3. Surveyors are only entitled to sign themselves as "Of the Board of Surveyors appointed by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce" in the matter of surveys of that particular commodity or classification under which their names appear in the official lists for the year in which the survey is made, and their signatures should be above the following designation :—

Of the Board of Surveyors for ——— (commodity or classification) appointed by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

Provided, however, that where the examination and report upon goods is more in the nature of an Arbitration Award than of a Survey Report, Surveyors shall be entitled to head such awards accordingly and to sign thereunder as :—

Of the Board of Arbitrators and Surveyors for ——— (commodity or classification) appointed by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

* Except in the case of Baled Cargo and Coconut Shipment measurements.

4. Chamber Surveyors shall not undertake surveys for their own firms or, in the case of coconut shipments and baled cargo, for produce shipped by steamer lines for which their firms are agents; subject to the following exceptions:—

Insurance Surveys.—This ruling does not apply to Chamber Surveyors actually employed by Insurance Companies, but to those Chamber Surveyors who are employees of firms acting as Insurance Agents. The latter Surveyors are not entitled to undertake surveys on property owned by their own firms.

Fire Surveys.—Engineering and other Chamber Surveyors may report on damage by fire for their own firms, provided an outside Assessor from the Chamber's list is also employed.

OFFICIAL MEASURER AND SURVEYOR.

Regulations relating to the appointment of the Official Measurer and Surveyor for Colombo by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

1. The Official Measurer and Surveyor shall be a whole-time officer paid by the Chamber and his services, unless unavailable, shall be used by all Chamber Members in all cases where the services of a Measurer or Surveyor shall be required:—

(a) For the measuring of baled cargo, the weighing of coconuts in bags and any other cargo for which certificates are required by the rules of the Chamber.

(b) For the loading or unloading of cargo.

(c) For the stowage of cargo and inspection of holds and for such other purposes as may be found necessary in the working of vessels.

2. All fees for surveys undertaken by the Official Measurer and Surveyor shall be paid to the Chamber and shall be kept in a separate account from which all charges connected with the appointment shall be paid.

3. The rates for weighing and measuring fees which shall be payable payable by the shipper and be subject to alteration by the Chamber Committee shall be as follows:—

Rates for any other kind of cargo that may require to be measured or weighed shall be decided on and fixed by the Chamber Committee as and when occasion arises.

4. Fees for surveys and reports (which shall be payable by the applicant) on the stowage of cargo and for reports on hatches and/or holds shall be Rs. 50 for each report, and at such rates as may be decided upon by the Chamber Committee for a number of surveys on the same vessel according to the time and work involved.

5. The rules for the measurement of baled cargo and the rules for weighing shipments of coconuts in bags appearing as Appendices "N" and "P" respectively to the schedule to the Chamber of Commerce Ordinance, 1895, shall *mutatis mutandis* apply to all surveys and measurements made by the Official Measurer and Surveyor.

6. In the event of the services of the Official Measurer and Surveyor not being available when required, members shall apply to the Secretary of the Chamber mentioning the name of the Surveyor from the appropriate lists of this Chamber's annual appointments whom they would like to carry out the work. If the Surveyor named is unable or unwilling to act the Secretary shall then nominate a Surveyor, as far as possible, in rotation from that list. In such cases the survey fee shall be paid direct to the Surveyor, who will remit 10 per cent. of the amount in the case of Measurement or Weight certificates or Rs. 2.50 in the case of other surveys to the Chamber as fee for registration of the certificate.

After-hour Fees.

An after-hour fee of Rs. 5 will be charged on all surveys which have to be undertaken at any time on Sundays, and outside the following hours:—

9 A.M. to 5 P.M. on week days.

9 A.M. to 1 P.M. on Saturdays.

On occasions when surveys have to be undertaken at short notice and after office hours, the Official Measurer is given discretion to waive this additional charge.

APPENDIX H.

Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale of Rubber.

Bye-laws governing Auctions.

1. The auctions shall be confined to Members of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce, the Colombo Rubber Trader's Association (hereinafter called and referred to as "the Association"), the Colombo Brokers' Association, and the Low-country Products Association of Ceylon.

2. Prices realized for individual lots at such auctions shall not be published.

3. Auctions shall be held weekly on Thursdays, commencing at 10.15 A.M., at the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Sale Rooms, unless otherwise specially arranged by the Committee of the Association.

4. Sealed samples of all lots catalogued for sale shall be on view at the selling brokers' offices, and shall be labelled as per Form No. 1 annexed.

5. Printing, sampling, and lot money shall be paid for at the rate of 50 cents per lot.

6. No single lot of rubber under 150 lb. shall be catalogued for sale.

7. The auctioneer in the rostrum has the right to object to any private business being transacted in the room during the disposal of his catalogue. Such objection shall be officially noted by the Secretary of the Association.

8. No samples of catalogued lots shall be exhibited in the Auction Room.

9. All sales at auction must be confirmed by the selling brokers as soon as possible after the sale of their catalogue.

10. While it is desirable that rubber sold at auction and by private treaty shall have the estate of origin stated, sellers must use every effort to see that this is correct. Any cases of incorrect statement will be dealt with by the Committee of the Association.

11. (a) The privileges of the provisions of condition of sale 7 shall be extended to such members of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and of the Colombo Brokers' Association who shall be elected to membership of those bodies on or after the 20th day of May, 1927, and to such non-member sellers whose stores shall have been approved by the Committee of the Association and thereafter registered with the Secretary of the Association. Provided that such stores shall not be registered unless they shall—

(1) be so constructed as to admit of sufficient daylight and possess all the general amenities of a store;

(2) possess good scales of adequate gauge and proper weights;

(3) have ample facilities for weighing;

(4) contain adequate space for storing so as to enable 20 per cent. of rubber stored being inspected easily; and

(5) be situated within a radius of 3 miles of the Colombo Goods Yard and within the local limits of the Municipality of Colombo,

and buyers shall take delivery from such stores as in Condition of Sale 7 provided.

(b) For the purposes of inspection only of stores registered under this Bye-law a permanent right of entry shall be extended to any member or members of the Committee of the Association duly appointed in writing by the Committee.

(c) The Committee of the Association shall by a majority of the members thereof have the right to withdraw from any non-member seller the privileges extended to him by the provisions of this Bye-law upon being satisfied that he has committed a breach of this Bye-law or of the Conditions of Sale.

12. No rubber shall be put up for sale at the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce Sale Room except by Members of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce, the Association, or the Colombo Brokers' Association as Principals.

13. For the purposes of these Bye-laws and the Conditions of Sale, (a) the word "member" shall mean and include all present and future members of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce, the Association, and the Colombo Brokers' Association; (b) the word "non-member" shall mean and include any person, firm, or corporation who or which is not a member of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce, the Association, or the Colombo Brokers' Association.

All transactions, both "Spot" and "Forward", purporting to be made subject to the Rules of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce shall be governed by the following Conditions of Sale.

CONDITIONS OF SALE.

1. Rubber in Auction shall be sold on sample only. The seller or his broker shall open, inspect, and sample the rubber. No rubber shall be catalogued until the seller has weighed the rubber at his store (fractions of a pound in the nett weight of each lot to be disregarded) and the weights so obtained shall be those catalogued. All catalogues shall be closed by 5 P.M. on the Friday previous to the sale, unless otherwise specially arranged by the Committee of the Colombo Rubber Traders' Association, hereinafter referred to as the Association. Catalogues shall be delivered to buyers, and samples be on view at the brokers' offices by 10 A.M. on the following Tuesday.

2. The highest bidder shall be the purchaser; any dispute that may arise to be settled by the auctioneer, who is not to declare the name of the buyer until after the lot is knocked down, unless, in his opinion, there shall be any uncertainty as to the actual bidder. The seller of the rubber, or any agent employed by him, or the auctioneer, shall have the right to bid. Auctioneers wishing to bid upon lots in their own catalogues must first solicit bids from the room. No bid shall be taken by the auctioneer until the previous lot has been knocked down.

3. (a) All spot sales of rubber shall be by lot at so much per lb. *ex* warehouse or store, Colombo.

(b) With regard to the sale of forward rubber which shall also be *ex* store or warehouse the Contract of Sale shall clearly state:—

(i.) in the case of locally produced rubber, that the sale price is based on duty being payable at a given rate and that such sale price falls to be increased or decreased by any fluctuation in the rate of duty, which may take place prior to the day on which the goods are tendered,

(ii.) in the case of imported rubber that the export duty (including Medical Wants and Rubber Research Cess) of ——— per pound in force at date of contract has been taken into account in fixing the price of the contract and it is agreed that the seller shall furnish the buyer with an Export Duty Exemption Certificate for this amount or for such other amount as shall be in force at date of each tender without any additional charge.

(c) Rubber packed in chests (ordinary 5 cubic ft. shipment size) or half chest (ordinary 17 in. × 17 in. × 17 in.) made of "Momi or other imported wood", "Native wood" or "Patent" shall be so declared.

(d) Any rubber which has been brushed or cleaned with the object of freeing it from mould shall be so declared.

(e) No less advance than $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per lb. shall be made on the previous bid.

(f) When a bid is registered by the auctioneer the bidder shall have the right to claim the rubber at any advance in price. All bids registered on lots of rubber taken out from the auction shall hold good only until 3.30 P.M. on the same day.

4. A deposit of ten per cent. shall be made, if required, at the moment a lot is knocked down, failing which it will be immediately put up for re-sale.

5. Brokers buying or selling rubber shall declare in writing their principals immediately after the sale, otherwise they themselves will be held responsible as principals.

6. All rubber shall be ready for inspection immediately after the sale, and be paid for on catalogued weights on or before prompt day, which shall be five days from date of sale (Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted).

Samples of lots bought become the property of the buyers immediately on being knocked down and should be weighed-in with the bulk.

7. (a) On receipt of payment on or before noon on prompt day the rubber shall vest in the buyer, and the seller, subject to the provisions of Conditions 7 (e) and (f), shall forthwith issue delivery orders in favour of the buyer who shall thereafter take delivery of such rubber at Seller's store.

(b) In the event of the seller failing to give delivery on demand, the buyer shall give notice in writing of his intention to take delivery, and, if, on the expiration of 24 hours after receipt of this notice, the seller has failed to give delivery, buyer shall have the option of buying against seller, and unless mutually arranged between the parties the contract or portion of same shall be closed by means of invoicing back at a price and weight to be fixed by the Committee of the Association.

(c) The buyer shall have the right of weighing any rubber purchased at Seller's stores, the seller providing the requisite scales and weights and having the rubber ready for delivery during usual working hours between 7 A.M. and 5 P.M. (Saturdays, 7 A.M. and 1 P.M.), and in the event of any discrepancy between catalogued and actual nett weight being discovered the contract value of any such difference in weight shall be immediately adjusted (fractions of a pound to be disregarded). If, however, the weight of any lot proves to be more than one per cent. above or below the quantity catalogued, buyers shall have the right to refuse any excess or claim any deficiency.

(d) Should payment not be made by noon on prompt day, the seller shall have the right, on giving notice in writing to the buyer, to re-sell the lot or lots at the risk of the buyer, who shall be liable for any loss resulting from such re-sale.

(e) If the rubber sold belong to a member elected as such on or after the 20th day of May, 1927, or to a non-member and be lying at a store or stores which has not or have not been registered under Bye-law 11 the seller shall deliver the rubber at Buyer's store.

(f) Notwithstanding the provisions of Condition of Sale 5, for the purpose of Condition 7 (a), payment shall, in the event of the rubber sold lying in a non-member's store registered under Bye-law 11, be made to the selling broker as principal who shall thereupon forthwith issue delivery orders in favour of the buyer and the buyer shall thereafter take delivery of such rubber at such registered store.

8. The rubber shall, notwithstanding the fact that it may have already been paid for, be at seller's risk (to the amount of the contract value only) until and including prompt day, unless previously delivered and thereafter (except in the case of any dispute arising as to quality, colour, description, packing or, weights, in which case it shall remain at sellers' risk until such dispute is settled) it may remain in Seller's store at buyer's risk (except in the case of loss or damage to rubber by fire which shall be at seller's risk) for a further period of sixteen running days from prompt day, or, in the case of forward contracts, as provided in Condition No. 12, without any liability on the part of the buyer for storage. If the buyer shall not have taken delivery within the aforesaid period of sixteen running days from prompt day, or in the case of forward contracts as provided in Condition No. 12, the rubber shall, so long as it remains in Seller's stores, be at buyer's risk absolutely (except only in respect of loss or damage to rubber arising from the seller's own negligence or wilful act) and he shall in addition pay to the seller storage charges calculated at six cents per day per full chest and four cents per day per half chest until he shall take delivery thereof. Provided that any payment by the buyer to the seller on account of storage charges as aforesaid shall not make the seller liable in any way whatsoever for any loss or damage to rubber from whatever cause arising other than the seller's own negligence or wilful act.

9. All objections as to quality, colour, description, packing or weights, shall be made on or before delivery, and no objection can be admitted subsequent to eleven running days from date of sale. Should packages be found to be in an unmerchantable condition, the same shall be notified by the selling broker, prior to sale.

10. Should any dispute arise between buyer and seller, the same shall be referred to the arbitration of one arbitrator to be appointed by both parties, or, if the parties cannot agree as to an arbitrator, to the arbitration of two arbitrators, one to be appointed by each party. The arbitrators shall, before proceeding with the business of the arbitration, appoint an umpire, to the arbitration of whom shall be referred all questions on which the arbitrators are unable to agree. The award of such arbitrator, arbitrators, or umpire (as the case may be) shall be final, conclusive, and binding on all parties. If either party shall refuse or neglect to appoint an arbitrator within three days after the other party shall have appointed an arbitrator on his part, and shall have served or posted, under registered cover, written notice requiring him to make such appointment, then the arbitrator appointed as aforesaid, shall, at the request of the party appointing him, proceed to arbitrate on the matter in dispute as if he were an arbitrator appointed by both parties for that purpose.

On any arbitration each arbitrator or umpire shall be entitled to a fee in accordance with the following scale, such fee to be based on the actual amount of rubber being adjudicated upon and not on the amount of the whole break or contract :—

Rs. 25 up to 10 tons of rubber, plus Rs. 5 for every additional 5 tons or fraction thereof.

11. For the convenience of members a panel of arbitrators shall be appointed consisting of eight or more members. The election of such members shall be in the hands of the Committee of the Association who, from time to time, may fill any vacancy by the appointment of any partner, manager, or employee of a firm or company which is a member of the Association.

12. In all forward contracts for rubber, whether made on sample or description for a specified delivery or shipment, the rubber when tendered must be in sound order and condition. Unless otherwise provided in the contract, tender must be made not less than six clear working days before the end of month of delivery, and buyers must take delivery within ten running days of receipt of tender.

Prompt day for forward contracts shall be three days (Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted) from the date of tender.

13. All contracts for a specified quantity shall be filled within 100 lb. either way. Each tender shall be treated as a separate contract except as regards the total contract quantity.

14. Buyers shall have the option of refusing any tender under ten cwt. against contracts in excess of such quantity except where such tender is in completion of a contract.

15. Whenever it may be admitted by the seller or decided by arbitration that the seller has failed to give delivery or ship in terms of the contract, whether the default be for the whole or part of the contracted quantity, the buyer shall be at liberty to buy in the open market to cover or close by invoicing back at a price and weight to be mutually agreed upon, or to accept delivery after the due date subject to allowance and in any of these cases the buyer may claim a penalty for default which shall in no case be less than one cent per lb. nor more than 15 cents per lb. In the event of the parties not being able to agree on the amount of any such price, weight, allowance or penalty, it shall be fixed by arbitrators. Differences shall be due in cash not later than seven days after the amount is settled.

Official Form of Contract (Form No. 2) and of Tender (Form No. 3) are annexed.

BYE-LAWS GOVERNING CONTRACTS FOR STANDARD QUALITY.

16. A Standard Qualities Committee shall be appointed consisting of eight persons of whom four shall be sellers of rubber elected by sellers only being members of the Association, and four shall be buyers of rubber elected by the Colombo Rubber Buyers' Association.

17. The Standard Qualities Committee shall have power at any time and from time to time to fill any vacancy occurring on the Standard Qualities Committee by the appointment of any partner, manager, or employee of a firm or company which is a member of the Association, but any person so appointed by the Committee shall only hold office until the next ballot for members of the Committee.

18. On June 30 in each year, two members of the Standard Qualities Committee shall retire from office. The members to retire shall be the members who have been the longest in office and, as between members of equal seniority, the members to retire shall be selected from among them by lot.

19. The vacancies to be caused by the retirement of members appointed by the Standard Qualities Committee during the year as provided in Rule 17 hereof, and by the retirement in rotation of two members of Committee as provided in Rule 18 hereof, shall be filled during the month of June in each year in the following manner, viz., sellers shall be elected by a ballot of sellers of rubber only being members of the Colombo Rubber Traders' Association, and buyers shall be elected by the Colombo Rubber Buyers' Association.

20. Retiring members of the Standard Qualities Committee shall be eligible for re-election and a list of the names of such Committee indicating the names of those members to retire in accordance with these rules shall be circulated with notice of the annual ballot.

21. The Standard Qualities Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Deputy Chairman from among its members, one of whom shall preside at all meetings of the Committee. The Chairman presiding at any meeting shall, in the event of an equality of voting on any matter brought before the Committee, have a second or casting vote.

22. Any member of the Standard Qualities Committee who shall absent himself from five consecutive meetings shall cease to be a member of the Committee.

23. At any meeting a quorum shall consist of not less than three members.

24. The time and place of meeting shall be at the offices of the Association at 9.30 A.M. on Wednesdays, or at such other place and time as the Standard Qualities Committee shall determine. All decisions shall be recorded by 1 P.M. on the day of meeting.

25. The individual members of the Standard Qualities Committee shall receive such remuneration as shall be decided upon by the Committee of the Association.

26. It shall be the aim of the Standard Qualities Committee to establish a Standard Quality, which may represent the bulk of the crop of No. 1 Qualities, but the Committee shall have power to vary their decision in accordance with ruling conditions. Lots of a mixed character (from various estates) bulked into one parcel shall not constitute Standard Quality, and in all cases estate names must be furnished.

27. The Standard Qualities Committee to meet once a week or as and when necessary, and its duties to consist of examining all guaranteed samples submitted to them and establishing whether they are found to be—

CEYLON STANDARD FIRST LATEX CREPE. CEYLON STANDARD RIBBED SMOKED SHEET.

28. Ceylon Standard First Latex Crepe shall be well prepared dry rubber of good quality, of even pale colour, and free from all stains, spots, or traces of oxidization.

29. Ceylon Standard Ribbed Smoked Sheet shall be clean tough rubber, free from mould, rust, dampness, under or over-smoked sheets and not massed. Slight traces of air bubbles may be allowed subject to the discretion of the Standard Qualities Committee.

30. Only members of the Association may submit lots for award. Applications for award must be made in duplicate on the official form No. 4, in the Appendix to these Rules, and must be accompanied by samples sealed by the applicant, bearing an official label giving the particulars laid down in form No. 5, in the Appendix to these Rules. Samples for award at any meeting of the Standard Qualities Committee must be deposited with the Secretary of the Association not later than 4 P.M. on the day preceding such meeting.

31. When a sample has passed the Standard Qualities Committee, the Secretary of the Association shall affix the seal of the Committee thereto, with the award number, and shall issue an award as laid down in form No. 6 in the Appendix, similarly numbered. The award form shall be signed by the Secretary and handed to sellers. The award shall remain in force for a period of 16 running days from the date of the award (and no rubber shall be catalogued or sold in auction as bearing such award).

32. For each lot presented to the Standard Qualities Committee for award, a fee of Rs. 2 per sample shall be paid to the Association; such fees to be paid at the time samples are submitted.

33. Samples of the awarded lots must be removed from the Committee Room by 4 P.M. on the day of the award.

34. All rubber sold as Standard Quality must be certified by the Standard Qualities Committee before tender, and sellers must be in a position to deliver the rubber at the time the tender is made. All tenders shall be made in duplicate on the official form as shown in Appendix form No. 7, which shall be obtainable from the Secretary of the Association, and such forms must show the number and date of award, reference number and the name of the seller and selling broker, date of contract, quantity sold, description, delivery, and to what month's contract the tender applies. The buyer shall endorse date and hour of receipt on the duplicate tender form and return same to the seller, which date shall constitute date of tender.

35. Only members of the Association may have the use of the official tender forms, and official tender forms shall not pass into the hands of other than such members.

36. Sellers must in all cases clearly state on the tender to which month of delivery the tender applies, and in no case shall such tender be applied against any other month or term or delivery than that specified.

37. All rubber sold under Standard descriptions shall be subject to the above-mentioned Standard Quality Bye-laws, and, excepting in the special instances named in these Bye-laws, all transactions shall be strictly in accordance with the Rules and general Bye-laws of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

38. Additions or alterations to the foregoing Bye-laws and/or Conditions of Sale may be made from time to time as occasion arises at a General Meeting of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce to be called for such purposes in accordance with the Rules of the Corporation.

The Seller shall not be responsible for any specified quantity, and the Buyer is not compelled to accept more than _____ per cent. in excess of the estimated quantity.

Buyer's store weights to be accepted, the Seller having the option of being present at the weighing.

Payment to be made against Buyer's Storekeeper's receipt for each delivery, and until paid for the Copra shall in every case be held by the Buyer for account of the Seller, insured against risk of fire. On payment of the purchase money, the Copra shall vest in the Buyer.

Accounts to be rendered by the Seller without undue delay.

If in the opinion of the Buyer the Copra tendered is inferior to the description above he shall have the option to refuse acceptance of same or to claim an allowance; on the exercise of this option any question between the parties as to quality and/or amount of allowance (as the case may be) shall be referred to the arbitration of one arbitrator to be appointed by both parties, or if the parties cannot agree as to an arbitrator, to the arbitration of two arbitrators, one to be appointed by each party. The arbitrators shall before proceeding with the business of the arbitration appoint an umpire to the arbitration of whom shall be referred all questions on which the arbitrators are unable to agree. The award of such arbitrator, arbitrators or umpire (as the case may be) shall be final, conclusive, and binding on all parties. If either party shall refuse or neglect to appoint an arbitrator within three days after the other party shall have appointed an arbitrator on his part and shall have served or posted, under registered cover, written notice requiring him to make such appointment, then the arbitrator appointed as aforesaid shall, at the request of the party appointing him, proceed to arbitrate on the matter in dispute as if he were an arbitrator appointed by both parties for that purpose.

Any other dispute arising out of this Contract to be settled by arbitration in the manner above described.

Should, however, Great Britain be engaged in War with any European or other Power or the country to which the Copra is to be sold be engaged in War, this contract is subject to cancellation.

APPENDIX J.

Conditions of Sale of Coconut Oil.

F. O. B. TERMS.

1. Payments against Mates' Receipts or five days from date of tender (Sundays and Bank Holidays excepted).
2. Buyers to provide freight within the period named, but not to have the right to claim the Oil until five days before the expiry of the first half of the Contract period.
3. Sellers to have the right to tender the Oil five days before the expiry of the first half of the Contract period, should freight not have been provided by Buyers earlier and such tenders shall be governed by clause 8 below.
4. Risk from Sellers' stores to ship to be borne by Sellers.
5. Export duty, if any, to be paid by Sellers.
6. In the event of the whole or a portion of shipment being shut out, it may be returned to the Sellers' yard and all charges in connection therewith, including leakage and rent, are to be for Buyers' account from the date of the return of the Oil to the Sellers' yard.
7. On Buyers' calling for delivery, both Oil and packages to be approved by them in Sellers' yard within five days of notice having been received that they are ready for inspection, and no objection can be entertained after these five days have elapsed.
8. On Oil being tendered by Sellers under clause 3:—
 - (a) The Oil is to be inspected by Buyers within five days of such tender (in terms of clause 7) the packages being inspected at a subsequent date when the date of shipment has been advised to Seller by Buyer;
 - (b) Seller to provide Buyer with a Store Warrant on payment;
 - (c) Oil lying in Sellers' yard to be at their risk until expiry of the Contract period when it shall lie there at Buyers' risk until removal or shipment;
 - (d) The following charges to be paid by Buyer:—
 - Rent at the rate of Rs. 12 per ton per annum from the end of the Contract period to date of removal or shipment.
 - Leakage at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum for Oil stored in wooden packages and $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum for Oil stored in tanks, iron or steel drums, and steel cylindrical packages for the same period;
 - (e) Seller not to be obliged to retain the Oil in his yard longer than six weeks after expiry of Contract period;
 - (f) Insurance from date of expiry of Contract period to time of removal or shipment to be effected by Buyer unless arranged to the contrary.
9. Should shipment be delayed by Fire, Strikes, Lock-outs, or Riots or any other cause comprehended in the term *force majeure*, the time of shipment shall be extended by one month; but should the delay exceed one month the Buyer shall have the option of accepting the Oil for shipment as soon as possible or of cancelling the Contract, such option to be declared as soon as the Sellers announce their inability to ship within the extended period, a reasonable time being allowed for passing on such announcements.
10. Any dispute arising out of the Contract to be referred to Arbitration under the Rules of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

APPENDIX K.

Stowage Rules for Oil and Plumbago.

1. *General Rules.*—A solid level to be laid in ship's hold for the ground tier where coconut oil is shipped. The tier to be well bedded and quarter coigned, and a strict cantline to be observed.

Wings of bottom tier to be made up with dunnage wood. No small packages to be stowed in the wings, unless they can be protected from the weight of the next and following tiers above. This can be done by having uprights in wing and strong cross beds to rest on.

It is permissible to stow plumbago over oil, but not oil over plumbago.

Top tier in lower hold and top tier in 'tween decks must be well chocked and wedged off to prevent shifting. *This rule should have particular attention.* No packages to be stowed athwartship except in top tier.

Vessels without 'tween decks must lay one or a platform with 2 inches hardwood planks not more than 6 inches apart.

No cargo of a specially heating nature, such as poonac, copra, jaggery, dates, &c., must be stowed over or on the same level as oil without a space of at least two feet intervening at time of shipment—such space to be filled up with neutral cargo and/or dunnage.

2. *Coconut Oil Packages* to be well bedded and coigned, and a strict cantline and tier to be kept.

Casks must be well chocked off with dunnage wood and be stowed bung-up and bilge free. Not more than 4 tiers of pipes to be allowed without an intervening platform as described above. No packages to be stowed athwartship except in top tier.

3. *Plumbago.*—When commencing to stow plumbago on oil a perfect level should first be made with dunnage so as to form a platform. The barrels to be stowed in square tiers, full bilge and cantline, and to be well bedded in the first tier.

Particular care should be taken that the barrels are stowed in such a manner that the head staves are perpendicular.

Old sails and/or mats to be put under the plumbago so as to enable the discharging Stevedore to readily collect sweepings from leakage and broken barrels. No more than three tiers with oil and five tiers where no oil to be allowed without an intervening deck, and no barrels to be stowed athwartship except in top tier, and then only to make a chock.

4. *Essential Oil* should be stowed away from any cargo liable to be affected by smell.

5. Dunnage wood to be used in sufficient quantity to properly bed, chock, and secure cargo so as to prevent any possibility of shifting.

6. Ventilation requires particular attention of Captains. If properly carried out by removing fore and aft hatch in cool and fine weather, it will chill the oil and prevent all leakage. Coconut oil will congeal at a temperature of 60° F.

7. Packages in bad order and showing signs of leakage should not be stowed away until properly attended to by shippers' coopers. If the defect be serious and cannot be repaired on board, the package must be returned without delay.

APPENDIX L.

Stowage Rules for Coconut Oil in Iron or Steel Drums.

1. Six tiers of drums without an intervening platform may be stowed in any one hold.

2. Dunnage wood and/or ballots of mattress fibre should be used for chocking off, and each tier should be carried on one inch planks or slabs, the packages in no case being allowed to rest one upon the other.

N.B.—This rule regarding planks or slabs to apply only when five or six tiers are stowed, as it is considered that these are not absolutely essential when only two, three, or four tiers are stowed, although it is desirable that light planks as well as the usual dunnage should be used at all times.

(3) Other Rules with regard to the stowage of this cargo to be the same as those already laid down for the stowage of Oil in wooden packages, except that the precaution to avoid the stowage of cargo of a heating nature in close proximity to the Oil may be disregarded.

APPENDIX M.

Rules applying to the Dimensions, Construction, and Stowage of Coconut Oil in Steel Cylindrical Packages.

Size and Gauge.—The package should not exceed 2 ft. 7 in. diameter by 4 ft. length, the heads should not be thinner than 12 gauge, and the cylinders 16 gauge.

Construction.—Welding should be in accordance with the following practice, viz. :—Thermoacetylene or other system rendering the connections a homogeneous whole.

Stowage.—(1) A solid level to be laid in ship's hold for ground tier. This tier must be well chocked and wedged off to prevent shifting, and a strict cantline must be observed. No packages to be stowed athwartship.

(2) Second and upper tiers should be stowed bilge to cantline. Dunnage wood and/or ballots of mattress fibre may be used for chocking off.

(3) No limit as to the number of tiers and no other precautions are considered necessary for the stowage of Oil in these packages, but it is considered advisable that the bungs and welding of the cylinders should be uppermost.

(4) If plumbago is stowed on the top of these packages, a solid level should be laid above the top tier of Oil cylinders, and the barrels stowed in square tiers, full bilge and cantline, and well bedded in the first tier.

APPENDIX N.

Rules for the Measurement of Baled Cargo.

1. Upon receipt of an application to make a survey of bales of cargo, the Surveyor shall obtain from the shipper a statement giving the number of bales to be shipped and their weight: such statement to show the reputed weight of each type of bale, also the name of the Lighterage Co., responsible for the shipment.

2. Surveyors shall satisfy themselves that the whole of the shipment for which a measurement certificate is required is actually at the wharf, except under exceptional circumstances when Surveyors may use their discretion. In all cases Surveyors shall state on their certificates whether they have seen the whole shipment or not.

3. If a shipment appears to contain bales of different sizes, indicating the output from different presses, Surveyors shall measure at least 10 per cent. of the bales of each size.

4. Not less than 10 per cent. of the number of bales constituting a shipment shall be measured, the bales to be selected at random and to include as far as possible some of those forming the inner part as well as the outside of the stack.

5. All measurements shall be taken on the over-all length, width, and depth of the bale; fractions of half an inch and under to be ignored and those over half an inch to be taken as one inch.

6. Surveyors shall advise the Lighterage Co., responsible when they have completed their survey.

7. Measurements shall only be made with callipers provided by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

8. The fee payable by the shipper to a Surveyor for a measurement certificate issued under these Rules shall be 70 cents for each shipping ton calculated from the measurements taken; fractions of under half a ton being ignored and a half ton and over being counted as one ton.

9. Chamber registration fee for a measurement certificate shall be 10 per cent. of the Surveyor's charges and shall be payable by the Surveyor.

APPENDIX O.

Rules for the Registration of Piece Goods, Letters and Numerals and Combinations thereof.

The objects of the Register referred to in these Rules is to provide at any time a record of letters and numerals and combinations thereof in use on piece goods by any Chamber Member concerned, it being understood that such registrations are to be regarded as the property of the firms against which they are recorded.

It is, therefore, incumbent upon all members concerned to make a careful examination of the Register before instituting any new letters, numerals and combinations thereof.

1. The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce shall keep a Register for the registration of letters and numerals and combinations thereof under which piece goods of all kinds are placed on the market by its Members.

2. The Register must be used and adhered to by all Chamber Members concerned.

3. All applications for registration shall be circulated by the Secretary of the Chamber within one week of receipt, with full particulars to those Members actually using the register at the time and to such other Members who apply for this information.

In the event of any resultant protest, which must be notified to the Chamber within 14 days of the date of circulation of the application, the merits of such application and the objections thereto shall be referred for settlement to an Arbitrator or Arbitrators nominated by the parties concerned from Chamber Member firms.

4. On the adoption of these Rules, and annually thereafter, all Members shall be called upon to submit for deletion from the Register—

A list of letters and numerals and combinations thereof standing in their names which have not been made use of by them within the last seven years.

5. All entries on the Register in use previous to the adoption of these Rules shall be finally revised and approved by the Chamber Members concerned and shall form the nucleus of the Register to be governed by these Rules.

6. Any dispute arising in the matter of the above registrations not herein provided for shall be referred to the Chamber Committee for a ruling.

APPENDIX P.

Rules for Weighing Shipments of Coconuts in Bags.

1. Upon receipt of an application to weigh a shipment of coconuts in bags, the Surveyor shall obtain from the shipper a statement giving the reputed number and gross weight of the bags of each mark comprising the shipment, also the name of the Lighterage Company responsible for loading the shipment.

2. Surveyors shall satisfy themselves that the whole of the shipment for which a weight certificate is required is actually at the wharf at the time of survey, except under exceptional circumstances when Surveyors may use their discretion. In all cases Surveyors shall state on their certificates whether they have seen the whole shipment or not.

3. Surveyors shall weigh not less than 10 per cent. of the bags of each of the marks comprising the shipment. The bags so weighed shall be selected at random and shall include as far as possible bags from inside as well as from different points round the outside of the stack. The gross weight of each mark shall be recorded separately in the certificate.

4. Surveyors shall advise the Lighterage Company responsible when they have completed their survey.

5. The fee payable by a shipper to a Surveyor for a weight certificate issued under these rules shall be 50 cents per shipping ton calculated from the weights taken; fractions of under half a ton being ignored and half a ton and over being counted as one ton.

6. The Chamber registration fee for a weight certificate shall be 10 per cent. of the Surveyor's charges and shall be payable by the Surveyor.

7. All weight certificates shall be on the form issued by this Chamber.

APPENDIX Q.

Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale of Fertilizers.

Reasons of Rules.

Whereas in the United Kingdom the seller of a fertilizer is required to guarantee only the total percentage of the various plant foods it contains and not the percentages in each of its ingredients the practice in Ceylon is for the buyer to specify the ingredients of the mixture, such ingredients being individually of guaranteed analysis. The buyer is, therefore, entitled to protection against ingredients being used other than those he specifies and it becomes necessary for the analyst to state not only the total percentages of plant food found but also what ingredients are present and if in the correct proportions, and to give an opinion, in so far as his methods of examination made this possible, as to whether or not the mixture has been made up in conformity with the invoice.

It was the intention of Government to introduce a new Fertilizer Ordinance in place of the present Ordinance No. 12 of 1901 in which the above requirements would have been provided for, but in view of the uncertainty as to when the proposed new Fertilizer Ordinance will be introduced the following Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale have been framed to regulate the sale of fertilizers between Members of the Chamber.

Fertilizers must contain plant food.

1. No article shall be sold as a fertilizer which is not guaranteed by the seller to contain in some form or combination, available as plant food, nitrogen, phosphoric, or potash.

2. All fertilizers sold shall be invoiced as prescribed in form "A" in the appendix hereto showing the analyses guaranteed, and such invoice shall have effect as a warranty by the seller of the statement contained therein. Invoice to be warranted by seller.
3. The invoice, in addition to stating the weight sold and the price per ton, shall state also the proportions and/or weights and analysis of each fertilizing ingredient comprising a mixture. Only the minimum guarantee of the essential constituent or constituents of ingredients shall be stated on the invoice. Invoice to state minimum analysis.
4. The guarantee of the seller does not apply where incompatibles have been mixed on the instructions of the purchaser. No guarantee of incompatibles.
5. All fertilizers shall be sold *ex* warehouse or works packed in sound merchantable bags or packages securely fastened, each bag or package to bear the distinctive mark shown on the invoice. Packing.
6. The buyer of any fertilizer or fertilizer mixture shall be entitled to have such fertilizer or fertilizer mixture analyzed by one or more of the analysts appointed by the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce and to receive from him a certificate of his analysis and, in the case of a mixture, a statement of the proportion of the various ingredients which such analysis or examination has shown to have been incorporated together with an opinion as to the correctness of the proportions. Purchasers' right or have samples taken for analysis.
7. The certificate of the analyst shall be as prescribed in form "B" in the appendix hereto, state the nitrogen, phosphorus pentoxide (P_2O_5) and potassium monoxide (K_2O) and shall be substantially as prescribed. Form of Certificate.
8. The sample to be submitted for analysis shall be taken in the manner prescribed in No. 12 of these Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale, viz., either :
 (a) Before despatch (*i.e.*, at the works, premises or mills of the seller), or
 (b) After despatch (*i.e.*, at the Railway premises or buyer's store, shed or any convenient place specified). Samples may be drawn before or after despatch.
9. If the purchaser elects to have samples taken before despatch he or his representative shall have power to enter the seller's works, premises, or mills at any reasonable time for that purpose on advice by the seller that the consignment is ready for sampling. Sampling before despatch.
10. If the purchaser elects to have samples taken after despatch he shall give due notice in writing to the seller not later than three days following the receipt of the seller's despatch note, and giving the seller five days' notice of such sampling, with particulars of place, date, and hour so that he or his representative may be present. Sampling after despatch.
11. The sample for analysis may be drawn by the purchaser, his agent or official sampler. Samples must be drawn in accordance with Bye-law No. 12 and the sampler shall sign a declaration in triplicate as prescribed in form "C" in the appendix hereto. Where the sample is drawn by the purchaser in the presence of the seller the declaration shall be signed by the latter as well as by the buyer. One copy of the declaration shall accompany each sample and the sample sent to the analyst and shall be accompanied by a certified copy of the invoice with the name of the seller omitted. Purchaser may draw sample.
- Should the sample be drawn by an analyst appointed by the Chamber, or his agent, he shall be considered to act for both parties and shall sign the necessary declaration on their behalf.
12. The method of taking samples shall be as follows :— Method of taking samples.
- (a) When the fertilizer is in bulk all lumps shall be broken up and scattered over the heap: equal portions of the fertilizer shall be taken from the base, top, and middle of the heap totalling five per cent. of the weight of the whole up to a maximum of 5 cwt. and shall be bulked together in a separate heap. This heap shall be sampled as under (b);
- (b) When the fertilizer is in bags, five per cent. of the number of bags shall be selected up to a maximum of twenty bags, except in the case of small bags containing 100 lb. or less when the maximum shall be increased to 30 bags. The contents of the selected bags shall be emptied on to a clean, dry floor, all lumps broken up, the whole turned over once, quartered and opposite quarters taken. These two quarters shall be mixed, quartered again, and opposite quarters taken and mixed as before. This procedure shall be continued until a heap of about 10 lb. is obtained. This shall be divided into three portions of about 3 lb. each: the three portions are the samples;
- (c) As an alternative method where neither the seller nor the buyer signifies objection thereto, fertilizers in bags may be sampled by means of a sampling spear, which shall not be less than two inches in diameter and twenty-four inches in length and the spear should be introduced to its full length and the bag sampled. The total quantity so abstracted for each sampling shall not be less than 5 lb. where the quantity of the fertilizer does not exceed five tons, and not less than 10 lb. where the quantity exceeds five tons, and shall be drawn from ten per cent. of the bags;
- (d) The process of sampling shall be continuous and as expeditious as is consistent with due care, so that the samples obtained represent the consignment;
- (e) The samples shall be placed in a clean, dry container which can be made secure. Tin, wood, or glass containers with close covers are recommended so that the sample will not be exposed to outside agencies. The junction of container and lid shall be sealed with a distinctive mark and the container labelled, and the whole shall be wrapped in a stout cover sealed at the flaps with a distinctive mark and shall be labelled in such a manner that the particulars so marked can be seen without breaking the seal or seals. The wrapped up container shall be placed in an outer wrapper for post or other transport.
13. The samples shall be marked with the description and approximate weight of the consignment and with the place of sampling. They shall be signed and dated by the sampler and by the seller or his representative if present. Method of labelling of sample.
14. One of the three samples drawn in the prescribed manner shall be handed or sent to the analyst, one to the seller and the third shall be retained by the buyer. Disposal of sample.
15. All costs incidental to the drawing of samples and the obtaining of any analysis, as provided in these Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale, shall be borne by the seller or the purchaser in accordance with the results of the analysis or analyses. Cost of sampling and analysis.

- Appeal against analysis.** 16. If the seller or purchaser objects to the certificate of the analyst, one of the samples selected may, at the request of the party objecting, be submitted with a certified copy of the invoice to the Government Test House, Alipore, Calcutta, for purpose of analysis and the result of such analysis shall be final and binding upon both parties.
- Claims.** 17. Claims may be made by the purchaser against the seller if there are any deficiencies in the ingredients of a mixture as shown by analysis and/or if the total percentage of the various plant foods are not of guaranteed analysis.
- Limits of error.** 18. There are variations incidental to the analysis of fertilizers which are partly due to the operator and partly inherent in certain methods employed. In addition, owing to the difficulty of obtaining samples of fertilizer mixtures which are accurately representative of the bulk, it is necessary to allow for errors due to sampling and mixing. It is customary to combine the errors from all sources and to lay down "Limits of Error" defining the extremes within which the analytical figures must lie if they are to be accepted.
- Unmixed fertilizers.** In Ceylon, as a result of experience, vendors of fertilizers have fixed the minimum analysis guaranteed for unmixed fertilizers to allow for these limits of error, and, for the purpose of these Bye-laws and Conditions of Sale, the guarantees contained in the prices current of vendors shall be taken for the purpose of determining whether unmixed fertilizers conform to the guarantee of the seller, and no limits of error shall be allowed.
- Mixed fertilizers.** The following limits of error shall be taken into account when mixed fertilizers are analyzed for the purpose of determining whether the mixtures conform to the guarantee of the seller :—
Nitrogen.—When the total nitrogen in the mixture guaranteed from all sources is 7 per cent. or less, the limit of error shall be 0.45 per cent., with a further allowance of, viz., 0.10 per cent. for every 1 per cent. or part of 1 per cent. of nitrogen guaranteed, in excess of a total of 7 per cent.
 Owing to technical difficulties in the determination of ammoniacal nitrogen in presence of certain organic materials, a correction may be applied in the case of mixtures containing blood meal or any fish or whale products. The correction shall amount to 0.20 per cent. deducted from the ammoniacal nitrogen found and added to the organic nitrogen. When the organic material consists only of cakes this correction shall not be made.
Phosphoric acid.—Soluble or insoluble, the limit of error shall be 0.5 per cent. irrespective of the amount guaranteed.
Potash.—The limit of error shall be 0.5 per cent. irrespective of the amount guaranteed.
- Definitions.** 19. The following definitions shall be observed :—
Groundnut cake.—The residual cake after expressing the oil from groundnuts, and which shall contain not less than 7 per cent. nitrogen.
Castor cake.—The residual cake after expressing the oil from castor seeds, and which shall contain not less than 4 per cent. nitrogen.
Crushed fish.—The material obtained by drying and crushing fish, and which shall contain not less than 4 per cent. nitrogen and 4 per cent. phosphoric acid.
Fish and whale guano.—The material obtained after the removal of part or all of the oil originally contained in fish or in whale flesh, and which shall contain not less than 7 per cent. nitrogen and 8 per cent. phosphoric acid.
 In the case of these guanos, it frequently happens that the analysis of the material after the removal of oil does not conform to the above figures and it is necessary to make additions of phosphates and/or nitrogen to bring the analysis to the required figure. In such cases the guanos shall be called "Guano compounds" and the nature of the additions shall be disclosed to the buyer if required.
Bone meal.—The material obtained by crushing bones, and which shall contain not less than 3 per cent. nitrogen and 22 per cent. phosphoric acid.
Steamed bone meal.—The material obtained by crushing bones after treatment with steam, and which shall contain not less than 3 per cent. nitrogen and 22 per cent. phosphoric acid.
Blood meal.—The material obtained by drying and crushing blood, and which shall contain not less than the percentage of nitrogen guaranteed by the seller.
Chemical fertilizers shall conform to the description and analysis guaranteed by the vendor.

General Meeting.

Wednesday, November 1, 1933, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice, dated October 25, 1933.

1. The Minutes of the Adjourned General Meeting of October 11, 1933, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the Adjourned General Meeting of October 11, 1933, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. R. A. Razik presented a petition from the laundrymen of the Paradise Place Laundry at Armour street.

3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. E. A. Coorey asked the following questions which the Chairman answered :—

Will the Chairman be pleased to state—

(1) Q.—In view of the statements made by the Government Assessor to the then Chairman of this Council on January 7, 1932, that he was instructed by the Government to discuss the valuation with the Municipal Assessor and, if possible, obtain the latter's agreement before finally presenting the figures and as the Municipal Assessor is of opinion that he is not able to say whether the valuation is fair unless he has access to all data upon which the valuation is made, whether the Chairman will press on the Government the urgent need for submitting to this Council, at least all details of the assessment of Government properties the mere total figures of which only have now been submitted to Council? A.—Steps will be taken to impress on the Government the urgent necessity of furnishing the Municipal Assessor with the fullest information to enable him to report to the Council on the Government's assessment of all its properties.

(2) Q.—As the list of Government properties assessed does not include the values of electric mains, oil mains, the Railway except a sketch valuation of the Railway running line only, and as the breakwaters, the jetties, pilot stations, harbour entrance lights, &c., are totally excluded from the list, though they are all assessable subjects according to the considered opinion of the Municipal Assessor, whether the Chairman will point out to Government this serious omission which results in heavy loss to this Council and urge the speedy inclusion of these assessments in the list? A.—Yes.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. R. A. Razik moved :—“That the bleaching of arecanuts be permitted in the Grandpass area where the bleaching of fibre is allowed and that to give effect to this the necessary proviso be added to by-law No. 4 of the Zoning by-laws.” Dr. E. A. Coorey seconded.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved, as an amendment, that the matter be referred to the Housing and Town Improvement Committee for consideration. Mr. A. E. Goonesinha seconded.

Mr. M. L. M. Reyal supported the amendment.

Mr. A. R. A. Razik accepted the amendment.

Dr. E. A. Coorey suggested that the matter be referred to the Sanitation Committee also.

This was agreed to and the motion, viz., that the matter be referred to the Housing and Town Improvement Committee and Sanitation Committee, was put to the meeting and Carried.

5. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved :—That the Council do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the agenda. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee—

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of October 16, 1933, were considered.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

(9) To consider :—(a) An application from Dr. L. Kahawita, who was appointed in May, 1933, to act for the City Microbiologist, requesting that the travelling allowance of Rs. 50 attached to the post of City Microbiologist, be paid to him. (b) Reports thereon of the Medical Officer of Health and the Acting Municipal Treasurer. Registered No. 1,636.—Recommended.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on November 18, 1933, at 9 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated November 13, 1933.

Present:—Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman; Ratwatta Adigar; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. Walter Beven; Dr. L. C. Wijesinha; Mr. O. T. Nettelton; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on October 21, 1933, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted:—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1932 to October 31, 1933, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to September 30, 1933.
- (c) Health Officer's report for October, 1933.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of October, 1933.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended November 18, 1933.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910", be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table:—(a) Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during October, 1933. (b) Report from the Municipal Engineer on the condition of the various drives in Kandy.

3A. Ratwatta Adigar observed that a report on Gansabhawa paths had not been submitted yet though called for. The Chairman replied that information for the preparation of a schedule of village, public roads and paths was being collected by the Municipal Engineer which would be submitted in due course.

Mr. de Silva suggested that all village paths might be shown in a map to which the Chairman agreed.

Mr. de Silva having asked for information regarding the opening of the further section of Lady Manning's drive to connect it to Lady Blake's drive, the Chairman desired notice of the question.

Dr. Attygalle observed that Lady Horton's and Lady Longdon's drives were not properly maintained.

The Chairman replied that they were sand roads and were being maintained as far as possible.

Mr. Beven drew attention to the silting in the upper portions of the lake and the Chairman agreed to take necessary steps.

4. Petitions :—Mr. Usoof Ismail presented (1) petition from Mr. Mohideen Pitche asking for water service to his recently erected houses in Cemetery road.

Dr. Attygalle presented (2) petition from Mr. R. de Alwis asking that Mahaiyawa-ela be paved in the same way as the Meda-ela.

Mr. de Silva presented (3) petition from betel sellers at the Public Market objecting to betel being allowed for sale at the proposed Fair at Mahaiyawa.

The Chairman undertook to look into the matters referred to in the petitions.

5. Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on October 21, 1933.

(1) Papers *re* the proposal to amend sections 40 (1) and 82 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910", so as to dispense with the requirement as regards gazetting of lists of potential Councillors and Voters and the Minutes of Meetings and financial statements of Councils, and to provide for copies of these being made available at the Municipal Offices for issue on payment to those applying for them. (O 73.)—Recommended to approve of the amendment of the sections in question on the lines suggested, subject to the Council notifying the public through the *Gazette* and the newspapers that the lists of potential Councillors and Voters are available for inspection at the Municipal Office.

(2) Papers *re* encroachments made by Mr. Martin Wijesuriya of an extent of 1 rood and 37 perches, and by Mr. N. H. D. P. Jayasinghe of an extent of .01 perch, on the Nittawela Trenching Grounds. (O 65.)—Recommended to institute legal proceedings against Mr. Wijesuriya and not to take any action in regard to the encroachment by Mr. Jayasinghe.

(3) Proposed amendments to by-law 131 to permit of the sale of "Nettalie" or sprats being excluded from the definition of "dry fish" and allowed at any place within Municipal limits at the Chairman's discretion subject to the enforcement of certain conditions and the issue of a licence for the purpose. (C 16.)—Recommended.

(4) Proposed amendment of by-law 188 so as to permit of the levy of bucket fees from premises within the conservancy area but exempted from the conservancy rate from January 1, 1934, and the recovery of arrears of bucket fees outstanding under the old system after December 31, 1933. (O 55.)—Recommended.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on October 21, 1933.

(5) Letter dated September 16, 1933, from Mr. P. A. J. Abdul Cader, Licensee of Retail Rice Dépôt H, asking for permission to transfer the dépôt to Mr. K. A. Peer Mohammado. (D/St. 80.)—Recommended.

After Council resumed, Mr. Soysa moved that in view of the loss the Council is likely to incur by the transfer of the Fair to Mahaiyawa, and the heavy expenditure the Council is faced with in erecting sheds and providing other requirements, no action be taken in establishing the Fair at Mahaiyawa for another year. Mr. Beven seconded.

Mr. de Silva moved as an amendment that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted limiting the expenditure to the amount of the accepted tender plus cost of lighting. Dr. Attygalle seconded.

The amendment was put to the meeting and lost by 5 to 4.

Ayes.—Mr. de Silva, Dr. Attygalle, Dr. Wijesinha, Mr. Nettelton.

Noes.—Mr. Soysa, Mr. Beven, Ratwatte Adigar, Mr. Usoof Ismail, The Chairman.

The motion of Mr. Soysa was declared carried.

Resolution of Council on item (8).—Mr. de Silva moved that a Special Committee be appointed to consider all salary questions on the agenda, and also to report whether salaries should be increased or a salary cut should be imposed. Dr. Attygalle seconded.

The Chairman moved as an amendment that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Mr. Usoof Ismail seconded.

The amendment was put to the Meeting and carried by 6 to 4.

Ayes.—Mr. Usoof Ismail, Ratwatte Adigar, Mr. Beven, Dr. Wijesinha, Mr. Nettelton, The Chairman.

Noes.—Mr. de Silva, Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Soysa, Mr. Wijayatilake.

Mr. de Silva's motion was declared lost.

Resolution of Council on item (9).—(a) The Chairman moved that the Senior Waterworks Inspector's travelling allowance be increased to Rs. 40 on condition he keeps a motor cycle. Mr. Nettelton seconded.—Carried, Mr. de Silva dissenting.

(b) and (c)—Resolved that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted, Mr. Beven dissenting.

(d) Mr. Beven moved that the Chief Revenue Inspector's travelling allowance be not increased. Dr. Attygalle seconded.

The motion was put to the house and declared lost, the mover and seconder and Dr. Wijesinha voting for it.

The recommendation of the Finance Committee fixing the allowance at Rs. 60 per mensem was then declared carried.

Dr. Attygalle then moved that the allowance of the other two Revenue Inspectors be also increased to Rs. 60 each per mensem. Dr. Wijesinha seconded.

The motion was put to the house and declared lost.

Resolution of Council on item (10).—Mr. Nettelton moved that the question of the Assistant to the Municipal Engineer's salary and increment be considered with the Budget. Mr. Beven seconded.

The motion was put to the house and declared lost only the mover and seconder voting for it.

The recommendation of the Finance Committee was then declared carried.

Resolution of Council on item (11).—Resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

Resolution of Council on item (12).—Mr. Usoof Ismail moved that the usual cycle allowance of Rs. 2.50 each per mensem be allowed. Mr. Wijayatilake seconded.—Carried.

Resolution of Council on items (13) to (23).—Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.

6. To table the Draft Budget for 1934 and to fix a date for its consideration.—Tabled.

Resolved that the Budget be considered at a Special Meeting to be convened for December 2, 1933, at 8.15 a.m.

7. Tenders received for the construction of temporary sheds, &c., at Mahaiyawa necessary for shifting the Fair Day there from January 1, 1934. (W/M 228.) This item was not considered in view of the resolution passed under item 5 (7) of the Standing Committee recommendations.

8. To obtain a vote for Rs. 50 for an Address of Welcome to the Governor-Elect on his arrival in Kandy. (O 257.)

Resolved that a vote of Rs. 50 be allowed.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, in terms of Section 98 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," as amended by Ordinance No. 21 of 1929, on Saturday, December 2, 1933, at 8.30 a.m. to consider the Draft Budget for 1934.

Present.—Mr. H. P. Kaufmann, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. Walter Beven; Dr. L. C. Wijesinghe; Mr. O. T. Nettelton; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva.

The Chairman submitted the Draft Budget for 1934 as tabled at the meeting of Council held on November 18, 1933, and made a brief statement in explanation of the Budget.

2. Proposed by Ratwatte Adigar, seconded by Mr. Usoof Ismail, the Council moved into Committee to consider the Budget in detail.

Proceedings of Council in Committee.

3. Dr. Attygalle observed that when the item of Rs. 15,000 under revenue—Head 10, which had already been paid to the Council by Government is deleted, the Draft Budget actually showed a deficit instead of a surplus. He also argued if "other charges" were taken into consideration with the Personal Emoluments overhead charges absorbed 34 per cent. of the Revenue which was a very high percentage on Establishment.

Mr. de Silva raised the question of possibility of reducing the Consolidated Rates by 1 per cent.

The Chairman explained that the item of Rs. 15,000 will be deleted but the amount will be available for expenditure in 1934 as it has not been budgeted for in 1933. He also submitted that in estimating the Personal Emoluments bill, charges other than salaries, should not be taken into account.

As regards Mr. de Silva's question the Chairman explained that he would have to overrule any motion for a reduction of rates fixed at the meeting of Council held on September 23, 1933, under By-law 19A.

4. The Draft Budget was then considered in detail and the following amendments were made:—

A.—GENERAL REVENUE ACCOUNT.

(1) *Revenue.*

Head 3, Tolls—

Halloluwa—substituted Rs. 862 for Rs. 1,330; Lewella—substituted Rs. 2,602 for Rs. 2,575.

Head 6, Conservancy—

Bucket fees (non-rated premises) included Rs. 600.

Head 7, Rents—

Tenders received for the right to collect daily rents and Fair Day rents during 1934 were considered at this stage and it was resolved to readvertise the rents; Market Daily Space rents—substituted Rs. 12,545 for Rs. 14,000; Other lands, buildings, and encroachments—substituted Rs. 12,600 for Rs. 12,000.

Head 10, Government Grants—

In aid of the Maintenance of Police, deleted Rs. 15,000.

(2) *Expenditure.*

Head 1, Administrative—

Personal Emoluments substituted Rs. 130,511·08 for Rs. 129,576·08 in view of the enhanced scale of pay sanctioned for the Municipal Veterinary Officer and the enhanced increments of the Assistant to the Municipal Engineer.

At this stage the following recommendations of the Finance Committee and pending applications on salary questions were tabled :—

Recommendations of the Finance Committee (*vide* Minute of Finance Committee Meeting of November 18, 1933).

(a) Applications from Mr. J. L. Rodrigo and Mr. R. V. Selliah asking that they be placed in Grade III. of the Council's service.—Recommended that the applications be considered when the officers have reached the maximum in their present scales.

(b) Application dated October 23, 1933, from Mr. T. H. Cox, Fire Brigade Officer and Superintendent of the Council's Mechanical Vehicles, for an enhanced salary on an incremental scale.—Recommended that he be placed on the salary scale of Rs. 1,500 rising to Rs. 3,300 by annual increments of Rs. 180.

(c) Application dated November 3, 1933, from Mr. A. H. Waidialankara, Assistant Physician, Kandy Municipal Free Ayurvedic Dispensary, for an increase of salary.—Not recommended.

(d) Application from Mr. L. Dias, Supervisor of Conservancy, for increments beyond salary scale of Rs. 1,200 without passing the Efficiency Bar Examination.—Recommended to defer Efficiency Bar to Rs. 1,800 after he stagnates for three years on Rs. 1,200.

(e) Application from Kaluhamy, Garden labourer, for an increase of salary.—Not recommended.

(f) Application from Mr. P. Gunaratne, Storekeeper, Works Department, for an allowance in consideration of the duties and responsibilities of his post.—Recommended to pay him an allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Report on Vital Statistics of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 16, 1933.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 179 (11 Burghers, 102 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 25 Moors, 8 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1933, *viz.*, 294,400) was 31.7, as against 36.8 in the preceding week, 38.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.3 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 139 (5 Burghers, 89 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 10 Moors, 6 Malays, and 5 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 24.6, as against 28.3 in the previous week, 29.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 139 total deaths, 32 were of infants under one year of age, as against 40 in the preceding week, 45 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 15.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fourteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents) and 1 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, Maradana South, Slave Island and Wellawatta South, as against 34 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in Slave Island and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena South and Maradana hospitals, as against 13 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Maradana hospitals (of a non-resident) and Maradana South, as against nil, in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

2. Nine deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 5 in Maradana hospitals and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Slave Island and Kollupitiya, as against 5 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year.

3. (a) Nine deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents) and 2 in Kotahena South, as against 5 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

(b) One death from *Enteric Fever* of a resident of Colombo town occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week.

4. Eight deaths each from *Worms* and *Enteritis* were registered, 5 from *Debility*, 4 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 3 from *Dysentery*, 2 from *Puerperal Septicaemia*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Homicide* and *Accident* and 66 from *Other Causes*.

5. *Reported Cases.*—Twenty-six cases of *Measles*, 8 of *Chickenpox*, and 2 of *Diphtheria* were reported during the week, as against 6, 7, and nil, respectively, in the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.4°, against 78.9° in the preceding week and 78.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.831 in., against 29.869 in. in the preceding week and 29.941 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.39 in., against 0.39 in. in the preceding week and 2.67 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
