KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, do hereby proclaim the by law set out hereunder, made by the

Municipal Council of Colombo, under sections 109 and 110 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910, and confirmed by Us by virtue of the powers vested in Us by the said section 109 and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

### GOD SAVE THE KING.

### By-LAW.

By-law 30 of the "Municipal Leave By-laws," published by Proclamation dated October 26, 1914, in the Gazette of November 20, 1914, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :-

30. The Council may grant study leave to any officer who holds a pensionable appointment in the Municipal Service for the purpose of enabling him to obtain technical training or professional qualifications in his particular branch of work, subject to the following conditions :-

- (a) He shall have had at least 5 years continuous service
- (b) The Council shall be satisfied that his work in the Municipal Service has been exceptionally satis-factory and that he possesses the qualifications necessary to enable him to take full advantage of the concession granted.
- (c) The study leave may include any vacation, half-pay, or commuted half-pay leave and special half-pay leave under rule 20 to which the officer may subject to the Municipal Leave Regulations be otherwise entitled, with such additional leave on no pay as the Council may decide to allow: Provided that the total period of leave allowed whall ordinarily not marked there every in allowed shall ordinarily not exceed three years in all: Provided further that on special grounds the Council may extend such period.
- (d) He shall on his return to the Municipal Service revert to his appointment and subject to the special sanction of the Council, his rate of salary shall thereon be augmented by such ordinary or extraordinary increments as would have accrued during the period of his absence. Without such special sanction he will receive the salary of his appointment at the date of the expiration of his vacation, half-pay or commuted half-pay or special half-pay leave under rule 20. If the officer does not qualify himself in the manner for which the leave was granted, his salary on reversion to his post shall be that which he drew when he went on leave.
- (e) The study leave will not be granted unless the Council can dispense with the officer's services.
- (f) It shall be a condition precedent to the grant of study leave that the officer understands he shall on his returnhave no special claim by reason of such leave to any higher appointment in the Municipal service.
- (g) When the 6 months' special half-pay leave under rule 20 is granted, the officer shall, prior to the commencement of such leave, sign an undertaking to repay the salary drawn by him during the period of special half-pay leave should he, through any cause within his control, fail to serve the Council for at least three years on his return to Ceylon.

### Examination for Admission to Class III. of the General Clerical Service, February 9, 1935.

AN examination for candidates wishing to enter Class III. of the General Clerical Service will be held in Colombo on February 9, 1935. The examination will be competitive and will be confined to British subjects whose families are permanently resident in Ceylon.

2. Candidates must have been born after February 1, 1912, and not later than February 1, 1918, and must have passed at least (a) the Cambridge Senior or the London Matriculation Examination or (b) the Senior School Certificate Examination (English).

3. Forms of application may be obtained from the Education Office, Colombo, from January 25 to 29 inclusive.

4. Applications duly filled in and with stamps of the value of Rs. 5 affixed to each must be forwarded so as to reach the Director of Education not later than 3 P.M. on February 1, 1935.

Candidates are requested to see that the forms are accurately filled in. Those whose applications contain inaccurate information may be disqualified from the competition.

5. Proofs of age need not accompany the applications. They will be called for later, if necessary, and candidates must be prepared to forward them immediately after they are asked to do so.

6. (a) If a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission to the examination a refund will be made of 3/5 the value of stamps affixed to his entry.

(5) Except in cases referred to in paragraph 6 (a) no refund will be made. Candidates who withdraw on account of illness will receive vouchers, provided the. notice of withdrawal is received in the Education Office before the examination commences, and is accompanied by the perfected entry form and a medical certificate from a qualified Medical Officer. This voucher will entitle the candidate to enter once more for the same examination, without fee, provided that the examination is held within a year and that the regulations are complied with in other respects.

7. The examination will consist of (1) English Composition and Language, a one and a half hour paper which will include a precis, (2) General Paper, a two hour paper in three sections which will contain questions testing general and local knowledge, intelligence and accuracy with figures and (3) a Viva Voce test. In both written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling. Candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be disqualified.

8. Candidates who attain a satisfactory standard in (1) and (2) above will be summoned to Colombo for the Viva Voce test on a date to be notified later to the candidates concerned. 9. The successful candidates will be required to pass

a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

10. Appointments will be made, as vacancies occur, on two years' probation in the first instance.

RULES made under section 29 (33) of the Village Communities Ordinance, No. 9 of 1924, by the Village Committee of Malimmada subdivision in Matara District, Southern Province, in pursuance of the powers delegated to the Committee under section 14 (1), and approved by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 30 of the Ordinance and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

### RULES.

This Committee shall be called the Village Committee, Malimmada, in Weligam korale.

The meetings of this Committee shall be of two 2.

kinds: viz.:--(a) Ordinary and (b) Special.
3. Ordinary meetings shall be held at least once a month at the Malimmada Village Tribunal Court and shall be convened by the Chairman.

At least one week before the date of each ordinary 4. meeting the Chairman shall forward to each member a copy of the agenda; the agenda shall set out the business as provided for in rule 8.

5. Special meetings shall be convened by the Chairman whenever he deems them necessary, by giving the other members at least four days' notice thereof in writing.

6. Any duly convened meeting may be adjourned to a specified day, time, and place, if a majority of the members present and voting so decide.

7. Seven members shall form a quorum for any ordinary meeting and four including the Chairman for any special 8. The business of the Committee shall be taken in the

following order, viz. :--

- (a) The minutes of the previous meeting shall be read and confirmed after such correction as may be necessary, the Chairman signing such confirmation.
- (b) Memorials, petitions, complaints, and communications addressed to the Committee shall be laid before the Committee and necessary action taken thereon.
- (c) Questions of which previous notice has been given as hereinafter provided, shall be asked. (d) Motions or resolutions, of which previous notice
- has been given as hereinafter provided, shall be made.
- (e) Any other matter that comes before the Committee shall be considered :

Provided that the Committee may, if it sees fit, deviate from the order herein prescribed.

9. (1) Notice of motions, resolutions, or questions shall be sent to the Chairman ten clear days before the date of the meeting at which they are to be taken up : Provided that when the matter is specially urgent or important six days' notice shall be deemed to be sufficient.

(2) The Chairman may in his discretion refuse to place any motion, resolution, or question on the agenda and shall in every such case give in writing his reasons for such refusal

(3) If any matter so rejected by the Chairman is referred to him again over the signature of not less than four members, the Chairman shall convene a special meeting to consider such matter.

10. As soon after the time appointed for any meeting as a quorum shall assemble, the business shall begin. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the mosting shall not be held meeting shall not be held.

11. No member shall bring before the Committee any motion, resolution, or question which is not set down in the agenda for the meeting, provided however that any member may with the permission of the Chairman bring a motion, resolution, or question which has not been set down.

12. No member shall present any petition or communication which is not respectful in tone throughout

13. Every member while speaking shall address the Chair, and shall stand while so doing. In discussing any motion, resolution, or question 14. no member shall speak more than once, except on a point

of order or of personal explanation. 15. (1) Any member wishing to oppose a motion, resolution, or an amendment shall do so only after it has

been seconded. (2) No remarks touching an original motion or resolution

shall be offered while an amendment on it is before the Committee.

16. In debate, only the mover of a motion, resolution, or an amendment shall have the right of reply.

17. (1) Until an amendment duly proposed and seconded has been put to the vote and declared lost no further amendment shall be proposed.

(2) The original motion or resolution shall be put to the vote only after all the amendments proposed have been declared lost.

(3) The Chairman may in his discretion close the discussion on any amendment, motion, or resolution by putting it to the vote.

18. All questions, motions, or resolutions shall be determined by a majority of the votes of those present and voting.

The Chairman shall have the right to vote; and in the event of an equality of votes in any matter he shall have a casting vote in addition.

19 No motion or resolution duly declared lost at a meeting shall again be brought forward until after the expiration of at least three months from the date it was so declared lost, and no motion or resolution in any way contrary to one already passed by the Committee at any meeting duly held shall be entertained until the expiration

of the same period from the date it was passed. 20. The Chairman shall preserve order at meetings and decide on all points of order. His decision in all such matters shall be final and conclusive.

21. Any member causing any disturbance or otherwise conducting himself in a disorderly manner at any meeting and continuing to do so after being called to order by the Chairman, may be ordered by the Chairman to leave the meeting and may be suspended from attending any number of subsequent meetings, not exceeding four, by a resolution of the Committee carried by a majority of those present and voting at such meeting.22. The Chairman shall keep a journal of proceedings

into which he shall transcribe, or cause to be transcribed, in a fair handwriting, the proceedings at every meeting in the order in which they occur ; and the entries made of such proceedings shall constitute the minutes of such meeting.

RULES.

The cultivation of the different ranges under Galaoya anicut shall be regulated as follows :-

- (1) Dodangolla, Egoda-arawa, Pitamulla, Duramulla, Madippalamulla, Boragodawela, Digawela, and Watawana range from October to January
- (2) Pallewela, Helawela, Kaderadena, Bibilewela, Kanulwela, and Ekiriyanpola range from December to March.
- (3) Warakawela and Iwela range from October to February.

The cultivation for maha shall take place between 2. October and March in each year.

3. The following intervals between cultivation seasons are required for general repairs and maintenance of the works, and no water will be issued through any sluice or canals for distribution to the fields during these periods, viz.. August and September.

4. No person other than the officer in charge of the work or some person deputed by him shall open or interfere with the sluices of the irrigation work or channels or issue water therefrom.

The Manager of the fields shall furnish the irrigation headmen, within 15 days before commencing cultivation, with a list of persons who have been employed as Coiyas,

showing the extent which each Goiya cultivates.6. It shall be the duty of the Vel-Vidanes to make written application to the irrigation officer for water stating the area requiring water, and they shall take action to prevent any waste of the water issued thereupon.

It shall be the duty of each of the proprietors whose lands are irrigable from any Government channel to con-struct, in accordance with the directions and specifications given in that behalf such part of the subsidiary channels required to irrigate the lands as may be marked out by the officer in charge of the work as the share proportionate to the holding of such proprietor.

8. All field channels shall be maintained in good order by the proprietors whose lands are irrigable thereby, and it shall be their duty to have their channels cleared before every cultivation, and to maintain them clear during the cultivation, and in the event of any default it shall be lawful for the Government Agent to cause the work to be done and to recover the cost thereof from the defaulter in the manner prescribed by section 65 of the Ordinance.

9. No person shall construct any dam across any channel except on instructions from the officer in charge of the work.

10. Ploughing shall be commenced from the agawata to the mulata fields and sowing in like manner, and no mulata proprietor shall plough his field before the agata proprietor, if the latter ploughs in time.

11. The fence round the whole tract shall be measured off in proportion to the extent each person cultivates, and the portion assigned to each proprietor shall be completed within six days of the notice given in that behalf by the Vel-Vidane.

The aforesaid fence shall in like manner be maintained in good repair by the proprietors until the crop is reaped and gathered.

12. Each proprietor shall erect a proper watch hut adjoining the field cultivated by him before the sowing commences, and shall keep watch regularly until the crop is reaped and gathered although his own paddy may have been reaped earlier.

13. It shall be the duty of each of the proprietors of the lands irrigated by any water-course to which any sudden or unforeseen damage has accidently been caused, on being given reasonable notice thereof by the officer in charge of the work through the Vel-Vidane, by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, to attend at the place indicated and to contribute labour towards the repair of such damage, in person or by substitute, until the work is completed.

14. It shall be the duty of the irrigation headmen elected or appointed under section 21 of the Ordinance to regulate the use of any water issued by the irrigation officer from the Government channels or other sources, to supervise the cultivation of lands under the work, and generally to enforce the observance of those rules.

All lands under cultivation shall be liable to the 15. Vel-Vidane for four kurinies per amunam of sowing extent for yala and maha as huwandiram and the Vel-Vidane shall make over one-fourth of such huwandiram to the Ela-Vidane if such officer has been elected or appointed.

Provided that in any case where the Government Agent has disallowed any portion of the huwandiram due to any Vel-Vidane or Ela-Vidane who has been guilty of neglect of duty, only the remaining portion shall be payable by each proprietor to such Vel-Vidane, or by the Vel-Vidane to such Éla-Vidane.

16. Such huwandiram shall be paid and a receipt obtained therefor by each proprietor before any part of his harvest is removed from the threshing-floor.

17. If any proprietor makes default in payment of huwandiram, the equivalent in money may be recovered in the manner prescribed by section 65 of the Ordinance.

18. The question of constructing any new channel that may be required shall be decided by the majority of the proprietors, subject to the right of the minority to appeal to the village council; and in the event of such an appeal, the decision of the council shall be final.

19. If any new channel or any part thereof, decided upon as aforesaid, has to pass through the fields of one or more of the proprietors, it shall be the duty of each such proprietor to open and construct that part of the channel which falls within his field.

20. If any new channel or any part thereof, decided upon as aforesaid, falls outside the fields under cultivation, it shall be the duty of each of the proprietors to contribute, towards the construction of such channel or part labour proportionate to his holding.

21. Except with the permission of the Government Agent or other authorized officer no water from any tank or other irrigation work shall be allowed or used for any purpose other than that of irrigating paddy plants.

22. The rules for the afore-mentioned district of Galaoya channels published by the Proclamation in the Gazette of October 3, 1913, and deemed to be in force heretofore by virtue of the provisions of section 2 of the Ordinance, are hereby repealed.





Any animal grazed in contravention of the foregoing by-laws may be seized by any person authorized thereto in writing by the Chairman, and the provisions of section 103 of the Ordinance shall apply to such animal.

6. Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 25.

1. It shall be lawful for every mortgagee of any immovable property situate within the administrative limits of the Council, or for any of the heirs or the legal representative of any deceased mortgagee, to cause any such mortgage to be registered at the office of the Council.

2. Every person desiring to have a mortgage so registered shall forward or cause to be forwarded to the Chairman a statement setting out-

- (1) the name and address of the mortgagee or of any heir or legal representative of the mortgagee, if he is deceased ;
- (2) the name and address of the mortgagor; and
  (3) a description of the property or such particulars as may be necessary for identifying it.

On receipt of such statement and on payment by the applicant of a registration fee, which is hereby fixed at Re. 1, the Chairman shall cause the names and addresses and necessary particulars to be entered in the register kept for that purpose in the office of the Council.

4. Such register shall be open for inspection at all times during the office hours of the Council; and a fee of Re. 1 shall be paid by any person who desires to have such inspection.

5. In the event of any seizure, in execution for the recovery of rates, taxes, or charges due to the Council, of any property concerning which any mortgage and names and addresses may have been registered as aforesaid, the Chairman shall, at least 14 days before advertising such property for sale, serve or cause to be served on the person or persons whose names and addresses may have been so registered, a notice in writing of the seizure, the date fixed for the sale, and the amount for the recovery of which the seizure was effected.

6. If at any time before the sale, the amount specified in the notice is paid to the Council, the property shall be released from seizure.

### Interpretation of Terms.

In these by-laws-

- "the Council" means the Badulla Urban District Council:
- "the Chairman " means the Chairman of the Badulla Urban District Council; "market area" means the Badulla market area
- hereinafter defined.

1. The area within the following boundaries is hereby assigned to the public markets established or maintained by the Badulla Urban District Council, and shall be called " and known as "The Badulla Market Area" :---

# Western Boundary.

From Galapitagala Check Pole (old trigonometrical station) northwards along the top of the ridge which forms the eastern limit of Udakohowila village, northwards and eastwards along the south-eastern limit of Kohowilakitulwattegama and Udalaelegama villages which follows the same ridge and also forms the boundary between Rilpola and Soranatota korales, to the point where this village limit of Udalaelegama turns east, approximately 15 chains west of the  $1\frac{1}{2}$  milepost on the Badulla-Taldena cart road.

### . Northern Boundary.

From this point eastwards along the landmarked village limit of Udalaelegama to meet the Badulla-Taldena cart road, thence, crossing the said cart road, eastwards along the village limit through Ridipana estate to meet the Badulla-oya approximately 22 chains south of the Dunhinda Falls.

### Eastern Boundary.

\* From this point southwards along the middle of the Badulla-oya to its confluence with the Rambukpota-oya, and thence southwards and eastwards along the middle of the Rambukpota-oya to the anicut from which the Hanwella-ela begins.

# Southern Boundary.

From the Rambukpota-oya anicut southwards and westwards along the eastern bank of the Hanwella-ela to the main road from Badulla to Passara, thence crossing the said main road westwards and southwards along the eastern bank of the said Hanwella-ela to the cart road from Badulla to Spring Valley estate, thence crossing the said cart road southwards and south-westwards along the eastern bank of the said Hanwella-ela up to the southern boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1018 (title plan No. 181,799), thence westwards along the southern boundary of the said land to the Gansabhawa road, thence southwards along the eastern boundary of the said Gansabhawa road and crossing the kandura to the southern boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1635, thence south-westwards along the southern boundary of the said land to the Kuda-oya, thence to the centre of the said Kuda-oya and then south-westwards along the centre of the said Kuda-oya up to the confluence of the Hewaliya with the Kuda-oya a distance of about 19 chains, thence westwards along the northern bank of the said Hewaliya up to where it joins Dalada-ela, thence south-westwards along the centre of the said Dalada-ela up to the minor road from Badulla to Spring Valley, thence across the said minor road to the iron rail on the western side of it and thence south-westwards along the northern bank of the Dalada-ela (abandoned) up to the iron rail on the northern side of it, thence crossing the said Dalada-ela (abandoned) and Dalada-ela southwards along the eastern boundary of lot 8B in supplementary to final village plan No. 5 to the iron rail on the eastern bank of the Dalada-ela, thence crossing the said Dalada-ela westwards along the northern boundary of the footpath, to the Local Board boundary stone, thence south-westwards along the southeastern boundaries (live fence) of the lands bearing assessment Nos. 1663 and 1664 (title plan No. 66,375) to the Hewaliya, thence westwards along the northern bank of the said Hewaliya and crossing the Yakdehi-ela to the Local Board boundary stone on the western bank of it, thence north-westwards along the western bank of the said Yakdehi-ela to the point where it meets the Galgekandura, thence south-westwards along the southern banks of the said Galgekandura and the stream up to the Local Board rock boundary mark on the eastern boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1740 (title plan No. 45,608), thence south-eastwards and south-westwards along the eastern and southern boundaries (landmarked) of the land bearing assessment No. 1740 (title plan No. 45,608) to the landmark at the south-western corner of the said land, thence north-westwards along the eastern boundaries (landmarked) of lots 11 and 11m in final village plan No. 112 crossing the streams and bridle roads up to the Kankanankandura, thence to the centre of the said Kankanankandura, thence about 1 chain south-westwards along the centre of the said Kankanankandura, and thence north-westwards along the western boundaries of the lands bearing assessment Nos. 1771A1, A2, and A3 (title plan No. 122,953) to the Local Board rock boundary mark on the southern bank of the dry water-course, thence to the centre of the said dry water-course, thence eastwards along the centre of the said dry water-course to the eastern boundary of the lands bearing assessment Nos. 1771A1, A2, and A3 (title plan No. 122,953), thence along the said boundary and along the eastern boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1771 (title plan No. 122,953) up to where it meets the Kankanankandura, thence to the centre of the said Kankanankandura, and thence eastwards along the centre of the said Kankanankandura for a distance of about 4 chains, thence northwards up to the Local Board boundary stone on the south-western corner of the land bearing assessment No. 1772 (title plan No. 66,376), thence northwards and westwards along the western and southern boundaries of the lands bearing assessment Nos. 1772 and 1773 respectively, thence northwestwards along the western boundary of the said land bearing assessment No. 1773 to the footpath from Elladaluwa to Badulla, thence north-westwards along the

western boundary of the said footpath and along the western boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1775 to the Local Board boundary stone, thence westwards along the southern boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1785 to the Local Board rock boundary mark near the eastern bank of the Kiulekandura, thence to the centre of the said Kiulekandura, and thence north-eastwards along the centre of the said Kiulekandura for a distance of about 5 chains till it reaches the western boundary of the land bearing assessment No. 1769A and thence northwards along the western boundary of the said land bearing assessment No. 1769A to the cart road from Elladaluwa estate to Badulla, thence crossing the said cart road to the Local Board boundary stone on the eastern side of the said cart road, thence north-westwards along the north-eastern boundary of the said cart road to the centre of the junction where it crosses the Malaoda, thence north-eastwards along the centre of the said Malaoda to the Local Board boundary stone on the northern bank of it, and thence north-westwards along the western boundaries of the lands bearing assessment Nos. 1791, 1792, 1792A, and 1766 (title plan No. 66,708) to the Local Board boundary stone about 1 chain south-east of the  $180\frac{1}{2}$  milepost near the railway tunnel, thence south-westwards along the southern boundary of the railway reservation defined with iron rails up to the Local Board rock boundary mark on the eastern bank of the stream, thence to the centre of the said stream and thence northwards along the centre of the said stream crossing the railway line from Bandarawela to Badulla to the confluence of the said stream with the Badulla-oya, and thence westwards along the southern bank of the Badulla-oya to the southern end of the Kendala-ela-Badulla-oya anicut, thence along the western side of the said anicut to the centre of the Badulla-oya, thence southwestwards along the centre of the Baoulla oya (up stream) for a distance of about 16 chains and thence westwards to the Local Board boundary stone on the western bank of the said Badalla-oya, thence westwards through Alutwelagama crossing Badulupitiya-ela, Alut-ela, abandoned bridle roads and approach roads to the Govern-ment bungalows along the boundary defined with Local Board boundary stones and Local Board rock boundary mark up to the 1/82 milestone on the eastern side of the Bandarawela-Badulla cart road, thence crossing the said cart road and bridle paths westwards along the boundary defined with Local Board boundary stones and Local Board rock boundary marks to the Galapitagala Check Pole (old trigonometrical station).

### Public Markets.

2. Notice of not less than fourteen days stall, by beat of tom-tom within the administrative limits of the Council, be given of the date fixed for the opening of any public market which the Council decides to establish.

3. No person shall use or occupy any stall, seat, or space, in any public market, unless he is the holder, or the servant or agent of the holder, of a permit or a ticket issued under these by laws by or by the authority of the Chairman. 4. (1) A permit in Form A of the schedule shall be

4. (1) A permit in Form A of the schedule shall be issued in every case where the tenancy of a stall, seat, or space, is to be for a period of not less than one month. (2) The use or occupation of a stall for any shorter period

(2) The use or occupation of a stall for any shorter period shall be authorized by a ticket issued daily in Form B of the schedule and available for the period of issue only.

5. Every holder of a permit or ticket shall pay a rent or fee at the rates hereinafter prescribed.

6. In the case of any public market where the Council does not employ an officer to collect rents and fees, it may lease the right of collecting the rents and fees to any approved person—

- (a) by private treaty, or
- (b) by calling for tenders, or
- (c) by putting up the right to public auction.

7. The rent or fee for each stall, seat, or space, in a public market, shall be paid in advance to the Chairman or the lessee, or to the collector appointed by the Council or by the lessee—

- (a) where a permit is issued, either at the time of the issue thereof, or in monthly instalments on the first day of each calendar month of the period for which the permit is issued; and
- (b) where a ticket is issued, at the time of the issue thereof:

Provided, however, that any holder of a permit may, for good cause, be allowed time not exceeding one week for the payment of any rent due from him; and every such holder shall, after the lapse of such time, be liable to pay the amount due on demand.

8. Every permit or ticket shall be subject to the conditions set out thereon.

9. (1) No holder of a permit or ticket shall without the written permission of the Chairman-

- (a) transfer the permit or ticket to any other person; or (b) sublet any part of the stall, seat, or space, allowed to him; or
- (c) permit any person, other than his servant or agent, to use or occupy any part of the stall, seat, or space

(2) No person shall use or occupy any part of any stall or space under any alleged transfer, without the written permission of the Chairman.

10. Every holder of a permit for any period exceeding one month shall, when he decides to terminate his tenancy, give the Chairman one calendar month's notice of his intention or pay one month's rent in lieu of such notice.

- 11. Every holder of a permit shall-
- (a) cause every bench, shelf, counter, or table, on which articles of food or drink are kept or exposed for sale, to be thoroughly cleaned daily, and every board on which meat or fish is kept or exposed for sale, to be scraped and washed daily;
- (b) sweep or cause to be swept, daily, the stall or space occupied by him and any open space forming the approach or entrance to his stall or space, and
- (c) keep near his stall or space a flyproof receptacle with a close fitting lid, and place all sweepings, rubbish, and refuse matter therein.
- 12. No holder of a permit or ticket shall-
- (a) subject any person resorting to the market to any
- insult, vexation, annoyance, or delay; or
  (b) occupy his stall or place or take part in any sale therein, while he is suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or employ or permit any person suffering from any such disease to occupy the stall or space or to take part in any sale therein; or
- (c) enclose any part of his stall or space, or erect any screen or awning, or make any alterations whether temporary or permanent in the stall or space, without the written permission of the Chairman;  $\mathbf{or}$
- (d) bring into, or keep in, his stall or space any box, table, chair, or other similar furniture, which is not the property of the Council, or construct any shelves or other fixtures in the stall or space, without the written permission of the Chairman; or
- (e) expose or keep for sale in his stall or space any article which is not specified in his permit or ticket, or which is prohibited by the Council, or which is unwholesome or in any way injurious to the public health; or
- (f) throw any bones, fins or scales of fish, or any refuse matter, or any rubbish or sweepings, in any drain or on any part of the market premises; or
- (g) expose the skin or hide of any animal, for the purpose of drying or curing, in any part of the market premises.

13. No person shall, within a public market or its premises-

- (a) carry on any cooking; or
- (b) be found drunk or behaving in a disorderly manner, or create any noise or disturbance, or fight with any other person, or use insulting, abusive, or obscene language ; or
- (c) beg; or
- (d) lotter without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, or remain after being ordered to leave by the market keeper or an officer of the Council or a headman or police constable or any person acting under the orders of the Chairman.
- 14. No person shall-
- (a) damage or deface any part of the market buildings
- (a) dumine of definition and parts of the market of the furniture, lamps, or other property of the Council in or about a public market; or
  (b) defile, pollute, or waste, the water provided for use in a public market; or wash himself or any animal, clothes, or article, in that water.

(1) A list of the rents or fees, payable for the 15.occupation of a stall, space, or seat, at any public market, shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in that market.

- (2) No market keeper of lessee or person appointed by the lessee to collect rents or fees, shall-
- (a) demand or take any higher amount, by way of rent or
- (a) demand of take any ingret another, by way of tone of fee, than that specified in the aforesaid list; or
  (b) subject any person to unnecessary or vexatious treatment under pretext of performing any duty or exercising any authority imposed or conferred upon him.

16. The Chairman shall have power to inquire into any dispute relating to any rent or fee, and make such order thereon as to him may seem just.

# Private Markets and other Authorized Premises.

17. (1) Within the market area no person shall sell or expose for sale any meat, paultry, fresh fish, fresh fruits, or vegetables, except at a private market or other premises, authorized for the sale of such articles by a licence under the hand of the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance. with the conditions of such licence.

(2) No licence shall be issued for any private market or other premises within a radius of one half mile from any public market.

(3) Every such licence shall be annual, and the fee payable therefor shall be Rs. 25.

(4) Nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to prohibit or in any way to affect-

- (a) the sale of poultry, fruit, or vegetables, by itinerant vendors as defined in section 163 (5) of the Ordinance, or
- (b) the sale, by the licensee of an eating house or a tea or coffee boutique, of fruits for consumption on the premises; or
- (c) the sale by any person of oranges, ripe plantains, or young coconuts; or
- (d) the sale of any article at the Badulla Sunday Market established by the Council at Mailagastenna.

# The Badulla Sunday Market.

18. (1) This by-law shall apply only to the Sunday Fair or Market, established by the Council at Mailagastenna. (2) The fair shall be called and known as "The Badulla Sunday Market."

(3) Fruits, vegetables, country rice, paddy, cereals, berries, yams, jaggery, and any other garden or chena produce grown in the Badulla District, may be sold or exposed for sale within the market premises, without any payment to the Council, between the hours of 4 A.M. and 6 P.M. on every Sunday by the bona fide grower or producer of such articles.

(4) (a) Dried or salted meat and fish may be similarly sold or exposed for sale by vendors without any payment to the Council.

(b) No fresh fish or fresh meat of any kind shall be sold or exposed for sale or brought within the market premises.

(5) Within the market premises, on any Sunday between the hours of 4 A.M. and 6 P.M., it shall not be lawful for any person-

- (a) to read or offer to read the palm, or tell the fortune, of any person visiting the market; or
  (b) to advertise, sell, or expose for sale, medicines or drugs of any kind whatsoever; or
- (c) to beg for alms in or near the market premises from. persons attending the market ; or
- (d) to preach on any religion, or to make public speeches, or to collect subscriptions from persons attending the market.

(6) All disputes arising between the vendors, or between them and the public, shall be settled by the market keeper appointed by the Chairman, or any officer of the Council on duty at the market for the time being.

(7) Order within the market premises shall be maintained by the market keeper or other officer of the Council who may be on duty for the time being.


(8) All persons attending the said market for the sale or purchase of goods, shall comply with the lawful orders given by the market keeper or other officer of the Council in settlement of any dispute or for the maintenance of order.

# General.

19. No carcase or meat of any animal, not slaughtered at a public slaughter-house or at a licensed slaughtering place, shall be brought into, or exposed for sale, or sold, at any market or licensed premises within the administrative limits of the Council : Provided that this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat imported into the Island or of game.

(1) It shall be the duty of every holder of a permit in respect of a stall at a public market, and of every licensee of a private market or other authorized premises, to keep such stall market or other authorized premises open to the public for business between the hours of A.M. and 9 P.M. (2) Any such permit-holder or licensee, wilfully neglecting

or refusing to serve the public during two consecutive days without the written leave of the Chairman, shall be guilty of an offence punishable, on the second or any subsequent conviction, with the suspension or cancellation of the permit or licence in addition to such fine as may lawfully be imposed for the breach of this by-law.



21. The Chairman may in his discretion refuse

- (a) to issue a licence or permit to any person, who, to his knowledge, or by common repute, is of bad character, or is for any other reason unsuited to be the holder of a licence or permit; or
- (b) to issue a fresh licence or permit to any person whose licence has been suspended or cancelled for, or who has been convicted of, any breach of these by-laws.

22. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or for any officer of the Council acting under the authority of the Chairman, to inspect any market or fair and to seize any article of food introduced into or exposed for sale therein, which appears to him to be unwholesome and to convey the same to the Medical Officer of Health of Badulla or the District Medical Officer of Badulla or his Assistant and if that officer or his Assistant certifies that any article of food so seized is unwholesome, such article may be destroyed without payment of compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

23. It shall be an offence for any person to resist, obstruct, hinder, or molest, any market keeper, or that officer or person appointed by the Council to superintend any market or fair or to collect rents or fees therein, in the execution of his duty.

24. Any person contravening any of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine of fifty rupees, and with an additional fine of ten rupees for each day during which the offence is continued after a conviction thereof or after written notice from the Chairman of the contravention of the by-law.

25. The following rents and fees shall be paid by the holders of permits and tickets in the public markets within the Badulla Market Area :-

### ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF "THE MEDICAL AND GENERAL SUPPLIERS, LIMITED'

The regulations contained in Table C of the schedule annexed to the Joint Stock Company Ordinance, No. 4 of 1861, shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, additions, or alterations by special resolution.

### BUSINESS.

1. The business of the Company shall include the several objects expressed in the Memorandum of Association and all matters incidental thereto.

2. The business of the Company shall be under the control of Directors, in accordance with these regulations, but subject to the control of the General Meeting.

3. All or any of the employees of the Company may be required to give security for the faithful discharge of their duties.

### SHARES.

4. The shares of the Company shall be under the control of the Directors who may allot or otherwise dispose of them to persons whom they deem fit.

5. Any persons taking any share in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by writing under his hand in such form as the Directors may from time to time specify.6. If on or before the day appointed for payment any

Shareholder fails to pay his amount due, then such Share-holder shall become liable to pay interest for the same at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum, commencing from the date of default thereof, till payment in full. ### MUNICIPAL COUNCIL LEAVE BY-LAWS.

## Existing By-law 30.

30. The Council may grant special leave without pay to an officer who holds a pensionable appointment in the Municipal Service for the purpose of enabling him to obtain technical training or professional qualifications in his particular branch of work, subject to the following conditions:—-

- (a) He shall have had at least 5 years' continuous service in the Municipality.
- (b) The Council shall be satisfied that his work in the Municipal Service has been exceptionally satisfactory, and that he possesses the qualifications necessary to enable him to take full advantage of the concession granted.
- (c) The special leave without pay shall be continuous with any vacation, half-pay or commuted half-pay leave to which the officer may, subject to the Municipal Leave Regulations, be ordinarily entitled, and such leave without pay together with any such vacation, half-pay or full pay leave, shall not exceed the period of three years.
- (d) He shall on his return to the Municipal Service revert to his appointment and subject to the special sanction of the Council, his rate of salary shall thereon be augmented by such ordinary or extraordinary increments as would have accrued during the period of his absence. Without such special sanction he will receive the salary of his appointment at the date of the expiration of his vacation, half-pay or commuted half-pay leave. If the officer does not qualify himself in the manner for which the leave was granted, his salary on reversion to his post shall be that which he drew when he went on leave.
- (e) Teh special leave will not be granted unless the Council can dispense with the officer's services.
- (f) It shall be a condition precedent to the grant of such special leave that the officer understands he shall on his return have no special claim by reason of such leave to any higher appointment in the Municipal service.

30. The Council may grant study leave to any officer who holds a pensionable appointment in the Municipal Service for the purpose of enabling him to obtain technical training or professional qualifications in his particular branch of work, subject to the following conditions :---

Proposed By-law 30.

- (a) He shall have had at least 5 years' continuous service in the Municipality.
- (b) The Council shall be satisfied that his work in the Municipal Service has been exceptionally satisfactory and that he possesses the qualifications necessary to enable him to take full advantage of the concession granted.
- (c) The study leave may include any vacation, half-pay or commuted half-pay leave and special half-pay leave under rule 20 to which the officer may subject to the Municipal Leave Regulations be otherwise entitled, with such additional leave on no pay as the Council may decide to allow, provided that the total period of leave allowed shall ordinarily not exceed three years in all. On special grounds the Council may extend this period.
- (d) He shall on his return to the Municipal Service revert to his appointment and subject to the special sanction of the Council, his rate of salary shall thereon be augmented by such ordinary or extraordinary increments as would have accrued during the period of his absence. Without such special sanction he will receive the salary of his appointment at the date of the expiration of his vacation, half-pay or commuted half-pay or special half-pay leave under rule 20. If the officer does not qualify himself in the manner for which the leave was granted, his salary on reversion to his postshall be that which he drew when he went on leave.
- (e) The study leave will not be granted unless the Council can dispense with the officer's services.
- (f) It shall be a condition precedent to the grant of study leave that the officer understands he shall on his return have no special claim by reason of such leave to any higher appointment in the Municipal service.
- (g) When the 6 months' special half-pay leave under rule 20 is granted, the officer should, prior to the commencement of such leave, sign an undertaking to repay the salary drawn by him during the period of special half-pay leave should he, through any cause within his control, fail to serve the Council for at least three years on his return to Ceylon.

### Special Budget Meeting.

# Wednesday, December 12, 1934, at 3 p.m.

### THE ESTIMATED REVENUE.

B. Licences.—Item 8, motor vehicles. Mr. A. E. Goonesinha suggested that the same concession as was granted this year of one month's grace be allowed next year also. The Chairman agreed to this.

H. Water.—Item 52, sale of water. Mr. C. F. Whitaker moved that the rate charged for sale of water for shipping be reduced.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando spoke opposing any reduction of the existing charges.

The Chairman explained the previous history and the present position with regard to the sale of water for shipping, and suggested that, if he so desired, the member should, after giving due notice, introduce a motion before the Council which could then be considered by the Four Standing Committees.

The Chairman moved that the estimated revenue amounting to Rs. 5,865,146 be passed. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman moved that as no estimates or particulars were in hand a sum of Rs. 50,000 be placed in reserve and that the question of financing the widening of this road be considered when plans and estimates were ready.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha suggested that the sum of Rs. 100,000 be retained to be spent in carrying on the work and that a loan be raised to meet the balance required to complete the work.

The Chairman undertook that if his motion were accepted, he would submit a scheme to the Four Standing Committees before his departure on leave in March.

The Ward Member accepted the undertaking and the Chairman's motion was thereupon adopted by the Council. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando suggested the desirability of raising a loan to finance all the works enumerated in list "B" of the Chairman's memorandum.

The Chairman stated that the estimated expenditure on page 1 of the draft budget should be altered from Rs. 6,535,545 to Rs. 6,437,075 and that instead of a deficit of Rs. 48,399 there will be an estimated surplus of Rs. 71.

The Chairman moved that the estimated expenditure, as shown in the draft budget, amended as stated by him amounting to Rs. 6,437,075 be passed. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman moved that the Council do resume. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.-Carried.

### Council Resumed.

The Chairman formally moved in Council that the Budget for 1935, as amended, and the resolutions of Council in Committee, be adopted. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader moved that the Council do place on record their appreciation of the good work done by the Municipal Treasurer and his staff in framing the budget. The Chairman seconded.—Carried.

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#### KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

# The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on December 15, 1934, at 8.45 a.m., in accordance with the notice dated December 11, 1934.

-Mr. E. T. Dyson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. Beven; Mr. O. T. Present :-

Nettleton; Dr. D. T. de Kretser; Mr. D. M. de S. Abhayanayake. 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on November 17, 1934, and of the Special Meeting held on December 1, 1934, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and copies thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

The following documents were submitted :

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1933 to November 30, 1934, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to October 31, 1934.
- (c) Health Officer's report for November, 1934.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors. and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of November, 1934.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended December 15, 1934.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the Government Gazette.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—(a) Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during November, 1934. (b) Report from the Municipal Engineer on the condition of the various Drives in Kandy.

4A. Ratwatte Adigar suggested that the Medical Officer of Health should be asked to make a statement on the

situation as regards the Malaria Epidemic in the town. The Medical Officer of Health was called in and stated that the worst affected areas were Mavilmada, Nittawela, Lewella, Getambe, and the villages around and that 10,000 tabloids of quinine had been distributed and an intensive Anti-mosquito Campaign had been started in all parts of the town. He indicated that medical comforts were needed for the poorer classes which he was unable to supply for want of funds.

At this stage the Chairman introduced the following recommendation of the Finance Committee made at its meeting on December 15, 1934 :—" Application from the Kandy District Nurses' Association for a grant in aid of relief work during the Malaira Epidemic.—Recommended a grant of Rs. 100". Resolved that the recommendation be adopted. With the leave of the Council Mr. Wijayatilake moved that "In view of the serious distress caused by the severe

epidemic of fever now prevalent, the Medical Officer of Health be asked to take immediate steps to alleviate such distress and to render such relief as may be necessary, and that this Council do vote a sum of Rs. 1,500 to meet the expenses in this connection ". Ratwatte Adigar seconded. Carried, subject to the grant of Rs. 100 to the District Nurses' Association being made from this vote.

It was agreed to leave the administration of the fund entirely in the hands of the Medical Officer of Health.

4B. The Chairman tabled a letter received from Mr. Usoof Ismail, M.M.C., suggesting that quinine injections be given from house to house by the Medical Officer of Health and the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon.

On the unfavourable opinions expressed on the subject by the Provincial Surgeon and the Medical Officer of Health, the Council agreed that the suggestion was impracticable.

5. Petitions :-- Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake presented (1) petition from Mr. D. A. Alwis Perera dated December 14, 1934, asking that the commission deducted owing to his failure to collect the required percentage of items from the village areas be refunded to him, and (2) petition from Mr. A. R. Suwaris stating that excavations on wells which had been entrusted to him on a written contract are now carried on departmentally in violation of the contract and to his prejudice. It was agreed to refer (1) to the Finance Committee and (2) to the Law Committee and the Works Committee.

6. Recommendations of Standing Committees :-




