Column 1.

Subdivision of the Chief Headman's Division of Katugampola Hatpattu in the Kurunegala District made by Proclamation dated August 9, 1890.

Pannala subdivision consisting of Medapattu West, Medapattu East and Pitigal korales.

Column 2.

Subdivisions now defined.

1. Pannala subdivision consisting of Medapattu korale west.

2. Hamangalla subdivision consisting of Medapattu korale east.

3. Makandura subdivision consisting of Pitigal korale.

SCHEDULE B.

1. The inhabitants of each of the new subdivisions set out in column 2 of the foregoing Schedule A shall be the successors of the inhabitants of the original subdivision set out in column 1 of the said schedule for all such purposes of the Ordinance as may relate to that new subdivision.

2. (i.) Any balance of the moneys deposited with the Government Agent and lying to the credit of the original subdivision on June 30, 1935, shall be divided into three equal portions and these portions credited to the respective accounts of the new subdivisions on July 1, 1935.

(ii.) All other movable property of the inhabitants of the original subdivision shall be deemed to be vested in three equal shares in the respective inhabitants of the three new subdivisions.

(iii.) Such of the immovable property of the inhabitants of the original subdivision as lies within the boundaries of any particular new subdivision shall be deemed to be vested exclusively in the inhabitants of that particular subdivision.

3. All the rights, powers and duties, debts, liabilities, and obligations of the inhabitants of the original subdivision shall so far as they relate to any of the new subdivisions be deemed to be transferred to the inhabitants of such new subdivision.

4. All rules now in force under the provisions of the Ordinance in the original subdivision shall be in force in each of the new subdivisions as if they had been made by, or by virtue of the powers delegated by, the inhabitants of the new subdivisions.

5. The Committee now in office in the original subdivision shall not be deemed to have been dissolved by reason of the division of the said subdivision into new subdivisions but shall remain in office until June 30, 1935, or until the respective fresh Committees elected for the new subdivisions come into office.

No. 11 of 1920.

BY-LAWS.

The by-laws published by Notification in the *Gazette* of January 18, 1929, as amended by Notifications in the *Gazettes* of February 13, 1931, June 5, 1931, August 18, 1933, and November 16, 1934, are hereby further amended as follows :—

- (a) by the insertion of the words "hair-dressing saloon, barber's shop," after the word "factory," and before the word "or" in line 5 of by-law 2; and
- (b) by the addition of the following by-laws after those regarding "Public Bathing Places" :—

HAIR-DRESSING SALOONS OR BARBERS' SHOPS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to keep a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

1. That the building is of permanent materials, well lighted and well ventilated, with a floor space of not less than 120 square feet. The walls shall be lime-plastered and lime-washed; the roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white; and the floor shall be cemented, with rounded corners at its junction with the walls.
2. That it is provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation.
3. That the living quarters, if any, attached to a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop conform to the requirements of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915.
4. That a sufficient supply of water is available at all times on the premises.
5. That the saloon or shop is provided with means for securing a supply of boiling water adequate for the purpose of sterilizing implements and washing the appliances in daily use.
6. That a sufficient supply of towels and overalls is available for the use of the customers.
7. That facilities are provided for the barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work.
8. That the saloon or shop is provided with a sufficient number of spittoons which shall be kept by the seats readily available to customers and employees.
9. That for the reception of hair and sweepings a movable sanitary bin made of galvanized iron or other equally suitable and impervious material is provided and kept covered with a close-fitting lid.
10. That each washstand is provided with a vessel for a disinfectant for sterilizing razors, scissors, clippers, or other instruments.
11. A tray with disinfectants shall be kept in the saloon for keeping the instruments and combs after use.

II.—Regulations for Licensed Hair-dressing Saloons.

1. Every licensee of a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with the words "Licensed Hair-dressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop."
2. Every licensee of a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung up in a prominent place on the premises.
3. The walls of every Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be lime-washed and the ceiling painted twice a year in the months of June and December.
4. No Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be used as a place for sleeping or eating during the night or day.
5. No person suffering from or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any infectious or contagious disease shall enter a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop or be employed therein in any capacity. Every person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall submit himself for examination by the

Medical Officer of Health and obtain a certificate from him to the effect that such person is free from any infectious or contagious disease. The certificate will be issued free of charge.

6. Every person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall observe the utmost cleanliness in his work. He shall keep his person and his wearing apparel clean and in a sanitary condition. He shall keep his finger-nails short and clean and shall wash his hands with soap and water immediately before attending each customer.

7. The floor, walls, ceiling, furniture, and fixtures of every Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be kept clean at all times.

8. The razors, scissors, and other implements shall be disinfected immediately after each occasion on which they are used and before they are employed for another customer by dipping them in boiling water or by any other method approved of by the Medical Officer of Health.

Such razors, scissors, and other implements, when not in use, shall be kept in the tray with disinfectants provided for the purpose.

9. All spittoons shall always be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. Each spittoon shall be emptied and cleansed once daily, or more frequently if necessary, with a disinfectant approved by the Medical Officer of Health, and a small quantity of disinfectant left in the spittoon.

10. Hair-brushes and combs shall be thoroughly washed, cleaned, and sterilized every day before use and kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.

11. Shaving mugs, cups, and shaving brushes shall be thoroughly rinsed in hot water after each occasion on which they are used.

12. The use of styptic pencils, powder puffs, and sponges is forbidden. Alum or other material used to stop bleeding shall be applied in powder or liquid form.

13. Every licensee shall supply each customer with fresh clean towels and overalls. All towels or overalls shall be boiled and laundered after each occasion on which they are used.

14. No person shall expectorate within the premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

15. No person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall attend on any customer who is suffering from an infectious skin disease or any other infectious ailment.

16. If it so happens that a customer with any visible skin disease has been attended to, the hands of the barber shall be immediately cleansed and the instruments used sterilized.

17. After attention to each customer all hair cuttings shall be gathered and deposited in the sanitary dust bin provided. Such cuttings shall on no account be allowed to lie about in the premises.

BY-LAWS.

1. These by-laws shall apply only to the area of the Minneriya Development Scheme, more fully defined in the schedule hereto.

2. (1) The proprietor or licensee, or the person placed in charge by the proprietor or licensee, of every boutique, manufactory or place of business, shall at all times keep the building and the premises thereof in a clean and sanitary condition.

(2) No dust, ashes, rubbish, filth, manure, dung, or soil collected in any boutique, manufactory or place of business, shall be thrown on any part of the premises thereof or of any road or roadside drain, or shall be deposited for removal otherwise than in a closed flyproof receptacle.

3. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman of this Board, by written notice, order to the owner, occupier, or person in charge of any land or premises within a period specified in the notice—

(a) to fill up or to drain all pits, holes, trenches, or hollows on such land or premises, in which water is likely to collect or stagnate, and

(b) to clear the land or premises of all discarded tins, bottles, coconut shells, and other similar vessels capable of affording breeding places for mosquitoes.

(2) No person served with a notice under paragraph (1) of this by-law, shall fail or neglect to carry out the order within the period specified therein or within such further time as the Chairman may on application allow in the special circumstances of any case.

3. *Ordinary Anti-Malarial Measures.*—It shall be the duty of the occupier of any land to take or adopt each of the following measures for preventing the breeding of mosquitoes upon that land :—

- (i.) the removal and destruction or other effective disposal of all open tins, bottles, vases, boxes, coconut shells, split coconuts, and other articles capable of holding accumulations of stagnant water ;
- (ii.) the maintenance of all gutters, downpipes, and drains, clear of all obstruction to the flow of water ;
- (iii.) the maintenance of all cisterns, tanks, and other receptacles for water in good repair, keeping them at all times so closed or covered as to make them mosquito-proof and emptying them at least once every week ;
- (iv.) in the event of there being on the land any artificial pond so constructed as to be capable of being emptied, emptying it at least once every week ;
- (v.) the maintenance of all water-courses, streams, canals, or channels passing through the land, in a condition capable of preventing the formation of pools along their course ;
- (vi.) the draining of any casual collection of water in any court-yard, garden, or other part of the land ; and
- (vii.) the removal of scrub or undergrowth and of all vegetation, other than that grown for the purposes of food or of ornament, from all that part of the land which is within a radius of fifty yards of any building or structure used as a human dwelling.

THE QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASES ORDINANCE, 1897.

REGULATIONS under sections 4 and 5 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance, 1897, made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the said section 4 and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

REGULATIONS.

1. *Short Title.*—These regulations may be cited as the Malaria (Epidemic) Regulations, 1935.

2. *Interpretation.*—In these regulations unless the context otherwise requires—

“land” includes any house, building, or structure, and the bed of any pond, tank, lake, water-course, channel, canal, or stream, situated thereon ;

“occupier” means the person in occupation of any land or having the charge, management, or control thereof, whether on his own account or as agent of another, but does not include a lodger ;

“proper authority” means the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services acting through the Provincial Surgeon of a province or the Medical Officer of Health of a district for the Island as a whole ; or in any area within the administrative limits of a Municipal Council, Urban District Council, Local Board, or Sanitary Board the Chairman of that Council or Board, and in any area where there is no such Council or Board, the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent within whose province or district that area is situated.

4. *Right of Entry for Purposes of Inspection.*—It shall be lawful for the proper authority, or any officer or officers authorized by him thereto in writing, to enter any land between the hours of sunrise and sunset and to inspect any part of it, for the purpose of ascertaining—

- (i.) whether the requirements of regulation 3 have been complied with by the occupier thereof ; or
- (ii.) what measures, if any, are necessary for destroying mosquitoes and preventing the further breeding of mosquitoes therein.

5. *Special Anti-Malarial Measures.*—(1) It shall be lawful for the proper authority, after such inspection as he may deem necessary by notice in writing to direct the occupier of any land to take or adopt with respect to that land, within such time as may be specified in the notice, any one or more of the following precautions or measures :—

- (i.) the repair of all gutters, downpipes, and drains ;
- (ii.) the construction or reconstruction of any cistern, tank, or artificial pond required by the occupier, in such manner as may make it capable of being emptied periodically ;
- (iii.) the temporary draining and the clearing of any such cistern, tank, or pond, and the closing thereof when it is no longer required by the occupier ;
- (iv.) the filling up or the draining of any disused well, cesspit, pond, or other collection of water ;
- (v.) the filling up of natural pits and hollows and low-lying parts of the land ;
- (vi.) the filling up, or the draining, or the treatment with larvicide, of swamps and water-logged parts of the land.

(2) Service of any such notice may be effected upon an occupier either personally or by leaving the notice with some adult person living with the occupier or by posting up the notice on some conspicuous part of the land.

(3) It shall be the duty of every person so served with a notice, to comply with the directions set out within the time specified therein.

6. *Arrangements during Temporary Absence of Occupier.*—It shall be the duty of the occupier of every land to make arrangements for due compliance with the requirements of regulation 3 or with the directions set out in any notice served on him under regulation 5, during any period when he is temporarily absent from the land; and no plea of temporary absence shall be accepted as a lawful excuse for any neglect, failure, or default with which he may be charged.

7. *Owner's Liability during Interval between Tenancies.*—The owner, lessee, or other person by whatever right entitled to the rent or produce of any land which is habitually let or sub-let to other persons, shall be held liable for any neglect or failure to comply with the requirements of regulation 3 during the period intervening between the termination of one tenancy and the commencement of the next tenancy.

8. *Liability of Co-owners in Joint Occupation.*—Where any land is in the joint occupation of two or more co-owners, each of the co-owners shall be severally liable for any neglect or failure to comply with the requirements of regulation 3 or with the directions set out in any notice duly served under regulation 5 on any one of them.

9. *Right of Entry for carrying out Works.*—It shall be lawful for the proper authority, or any officer or servant authorized thereto by him in writing, to enter any land between the hours of sunrise and sunset for the purpose of carrying out on any part thereof, at the expense of the proper authority, such works or measures as may be necessary for destroying mosquitoes and for preventing the further breeding of mosquitoes upon that land.

10. *Resistance to Officers or Servants.*—No person shall knowingly or wilfully resist or obstruct the proper authority or any authorized officer or servant of the proper authority in the lawful exercise of his duty under any of these regulations.

11. These regulations shall be in force for a period of six months from the date of their publication in the *Gazette*.

THE QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASES ORDINANCE, 1897.

REGULATIONS for the area comprised within the Municipality of Kandy, made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by sections 4 and 5 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance, 1897, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

REGULATIONS.

1. In these regulations unless the context otherwise requires—

“owner” in relation to any premises shall include—

- (a) the person in possession thereof or claiming to be entitled thereto,
- (b) any person receiving the rent thereof, whether on his own account, or as agent or trustee for any other person, or who would receive such rent if the premises were let to a tenant,
- (c) the lessee, and
- (d) the person in charge of the premises in any capacity whatsoever;

“proprietor” in relation to any grain boutique or store shall mean the owner of the business carried on therein, as distinguished from the owner of the building and premises.

“five bags” of any kind of grain shall be deemed to be the equivalent of $12\frac{1}{2}$ bushels or 350 measures of that grain;

“grain” shall denote any grain which is used as human or animal food, and shall include forage and other mixtures composed partly of grain and partly of other products;

“grain boutique” shall mean any premises where not more than five bags of grain are at any one time kept for sale;

“grain store” shall mean any building where more than five bags of grain are stored at any one time for sale or for any other purpose;

“Municipality” shall mean the area within the Municipal limits of Kandy;

“Chairman” shall mean the Chairman of the Municipal Council of Kandy.

2. No person shall within the Municipality cause or permit any grain exceeding five bags in quantity to be stored or kept at any one time in any building of which he is the owner unless that building has been licensed under these regulations as a grain store.

3. (1) Any person desirous of storing, keeping, or having in his possession at any time in any building within the Municipality any grain exceeding five bags in quantity shall apply to the Chairman for a licence authorizing the use of that building as a grain store.

(2) No building shall be licensed for the purposes of a grain store which in the opinion of the Chairman is unsuitable for those purposes by reason of its surroundings and its situation either in a crowded or unhealthy locality, or in a quarter which is primarily residential.

(3) Every such licence shall be under the hand of the Chairman and shall specify the maximum quantity of grain to be stored in the building to which it relates.

(4) Every licence under this regulation shall be in force for a period of twelve months from the date thereof, and no licensee shall have any right after the expiry of that period to store or keep in that building at any one time any grain exceeding five bags in quantity, unless he obtains a renewal of his licence for a further period.

4. (1) Any person desirous of erecting within the Municipality any building which is to be used as a grain store shall apply in writing to the Chairman for permission to erect such building, and shall, along with such application, submit plans and specifications of the proposed building.

(2) Any application for such permission may—

(a) be refused by the Chairman if in his opinion the site of the proposed building is in a crowded or unhealthy locality or in an area which is primarily residential; or

(b) be allowed on such terms as to the alteration and modification of plans and specifications as the Chairman may on grounds of public health think fit to impose.

5. No person shall keep or store at any one time in any licensed grain store any grain in excess of the maximum quantity specified in the licence issued for that store.

6. If any grain exceeding five bags in quantity is found within the Municipality in any place other than a licensed grain store, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause the grain to be removed to any rat-proof grain store that he may consider suitable, and all expenses of such removal and the charge of storage in such store shall, if they are not paid by the owner, be recovered as a debt due from him to the Municipal Council.

7. No person shall store grain in, or sell grain from, any grain boutique which is not rat-proof.

8. For the purpose of these regulations, a grain boutique shall be deemed to be rat-proof when it is in all respects constructed and maintained in accordance with the following requirements:—

(a) *Drains.*—All existing drains or sewers on the site, whether used or disused which are likely in the opinion of the Chairman, to harbour rats, shall be filled up, removed or altered to the satisfaction of the Chairman by the owner of the site or of the buildings. All underground drains or sewers shall be properly trapped. There shall not be any opening from a drain to the interior of a grain boutique.

(b) *Materials.*—The cement used in the construction of a grain boutique shall be up to British standard specification, and the sand shall be clean river sand. The cement mortar shall be composed of one part of cement and two parts of sand. The concrete of the floors shall not be less than 4 inches thick and shall be composed of one part of cement, two parts of sand, and four parts of stone broken to pass through a ring 1 inch in diameter. The concrete with which rat-proof bins are protected shall be not less than $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick, and shall be composed of one part of cement, two parts of sand, and four parts of stone broken to pass through a ring $\frac{3}{4}$ inch in diameter. Wire screens shall not be less than No. 12 B.W.G. and not greater than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch mesh.

(c) *Floors.*—The floor of a grain boutique shall be above the highest recorded flood level, and shall be of concrete securely connected to the walls and laid at least 6 inches above the surrounding ground on a layer of hard dry rubble or filling and so laid as to fall towards the street drain. The floor shall have its upper surface plastered

smooth in cement mortar at least half an inch thick. Holes or openings in floors or walls for drainage or other purposes shall be rat-proofed by means of wire screens, metal plates, or metal bars firmly fixed, and having apertures not larger than half an inch either way.

- (d) *Walls*.—The walls of a grain boutique shall be internally plastered smooth in cement mortar not less than half an inch in thickness to a height at least 3 feet from the floor.
- (e) *Maintenance*.—To cement plastering of floors and walls shall at all times be maintained in perfect condition, and all broken and damaged plaster shall be repaired immediately.
- (f) *Ceilings*.—No ceiling, loft, or platform shall be constructed or maintained, which in the opinion of the Chairman is likely to conceal or harbour rats or to which rats are likely to gain access.
- (g) *Rat-proof Bins*.—A rat-proof bin shall be provided for the storage of grain and shall be constructed of metal or wood protected with metal sheeting or concrete or such other suitable material capable of resisting attacks by rats. It shall be furnished with a hinged tightly fitting lid of impervious material and be fitted with a strong lock. All grain shall be placed therein and sold therefrom and the bin shall be closed and locked at the end of each day's business. The internal dimensions of the bin shall not exceed 5 feet in length, 3 feet in width, and 3 feet in height.

9. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or for any officer or officers of the Council duly authorized by the Chairman to enter any grain store or grain boutique and cause the grain in it to be measured, and the proprietor or person in charge of the store or boutique shall not refuse to allow such grain to be measured, or resist, obstruct, or prevent the measurement of such grain.

10. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman to inspect, and for any officer or officers of the Council authorized by the Chairman from time to time to inspect and report upon, the condition of all grain stores and grain boutiques within the Municipality, and, if on such inspection or on the report of an authorized officer it appears to the Chairman that any such grain store or grain boutique is in need of any repairs, the Chairman may by a notice under his hand direct the proprietor or person in charge of the said grain store or grain boutique to effect such repairs as may be specified within such time as may be prescribed in the notice.

(2) If the repairs specified are not effected within the time prescribed in the notice it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause the grain in that store or boutique to be removed to any other suitable store or boutique, and the expenses of such removal and the charge of storage in such other store or boutique shall, if not paid by the proprietor, be recovered as a rate due from the proprietor to the Municipal Council. The Chairman may, in addition to removing the grain to another store or boutique, cancel or suspend the licence in respect of the first-mentioned store or boutique, and may, if at any time thereafter the repairs specified are effected to his satisfaction, restore the licence on such terms as he may think fit to impose.

11. No person shall refuse to allow a grain store or grain boutique to be fully and properly inspected or resist, obstruct, or prevent such inspection.

12. (1) In the event of any case of human or rat plague occurring or being suspected to have occurred at any grain store or grain boutique or within a radius of 100 feet therefrom, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause—

- (a) all grain to be removed from such store or boutique, and disinfected by exposure to the direct rays of the sun, or by fumigation or otherwise, and
- (b) the store or boutique to be treated with a pulicide and otherwise disinfected, cleansed, or repaired as the circumstances may require.

(2) The expenses incurred in taking measures under paragraph (1) of this regulation shall be recoverable from the proprietor of the grain store or grain boutique as a debt due to the Municipal Council.

13. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman by written notice posted up at conspicuous places within any area where human or rat plague has occurred to prohibit the storage and sale of grain within that area or any defined portion thereof for such period of time as he may deem necessary for the protection of the public health.

(2) Within any area in respect of which a notice has been so published, no person shall store or sell grain in contravention of this notice.

14. Where a building used for the storage of grain has either a verandah or open space on any side of it, the occupier of such building shall not cause or permit any

article whatsoever to be kept or placed in such open space or verandah within 15 feet of the outer edge of the roof of such building.

15. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman at any time by notice in writing to direct all such measures to be taken in respect of any house, building, or premises, as may in his opinion be necessary or expedient for preventing the introduction and the spread of plague within such area.

(2) Such notice may be given, in the case of a place of worship, to the trustee thereof, or if there is no duly appointed trustee, to the manager of the affairs of such place of worship, or to the principal custodian thereof, and in the case of any house or building whether used as a place of residence or as a place of trade or business, to the chief occupant, or if distinct portions of such house or building are in separate occupation, to the chief occupant of each such portion, or where such house or building is unoccupied, or the owner or lessee is bound to carry out repairs, to such owner or lessee.

16. (1) Every such notice shall specify a reasonable period within which the directions or requirements therein set out are to be complied with.

(2) Service of any such notice may be effected—

- (a) upon an occupier, either personally or by leaving the notice with some adult inmate of the building or premises to which the other notice relates, and by putting up the notice on some conspicuous part of such building or premises ;
- (b) upon an owner or trustee or a manager or a principal custodian or a lessee, either personally, and by leaving the notice at the place of residence, or of business of such owner or trustee or manager or principal custodian or lessee or his authorized agent, or by posting a registered letter addressed to such owner or trustee or manager or principal custodian or lessee or agent at his last known place of residence or of business.

17. The notice aforesaid may extend to all such matters of construction, renovation, repair, or maintenance or cleaning, disinfecting or limewashing, or removal or demolition, as may be deemed necessary by the Chairman, and may include among others, any or all of the following directions and requirements :—

- (1) the erection across doors, windows, drains, and similar openings of screens, barriers or traps, whether of cement concrete, expanded metal or wire netting, of any design or type that may be approved by the Chairman as adequate for the purpose of preventing the entry of rats into such building or premises ;
- (2) the effective filling up with broken glass and cement, of all holes in walls and floors which may afford habourage or breeding places for rats ;
- (3) the alteration, removal, or demolition of walls or partitions affording or likely to afford habourage or breeding places for rats ;
- (4) the filling up and closing of disused drains and drains inside a house or building ;
- (5) the conversion or diversion of underground drains into open air surface drains ;
- (6) the erection of mesh barriers or metal traps in the underground drains so as to prevent the entry of rats through such drains into the building ;
- (7) the providing of sufficient light and ventilation—
 - (a) in the case of rooms with one or more walls abutting on the open air, by means of windows or both doors and windows in such walls of an aggregate opening of one-seventh of the floor area of the room, the windows not being less than one-fifteenth of the floor area, in the event of both doors and windows being provided ;
 - (b) in the case of rooms which do not and cannot be made to abut on the open air, by means of dormer windows and glass tiles equal in the aggregate to one-fifteenth of the floor area ;
- (8) the cleansing and disinfecting of the house, building, or premises, both externally and internally, the limewashing of walls, the cementing of the floor and the like ;
- (9) the removal or demolition of any loft or structure, fixture, or other thing, which obstructs or is likely to obstruct the proper cleansing of, and the maintenance of sanitary conditions in, any house, building, or premises.

18. No person served with any notice as aforesaid shall refuse or fail or neglect for any reason whatsoever, to comply with the terms of such notice within the period specified therein.

19. Every house, building, or premises of any kind, whether used as a place of residence or as a place of trade

or business or worship, shall at all times be kept by the occupier, and in the case of a place of worship, by the trustee or trustees, or manager or principal custodian, in a clean and sanitary condition to the satisfaction of the Chairman.

20. No rubbish, manure, or waste or decaying matter shall be dumped, or left, or permitted to remain, or to accumulate upon the floor, courtyard, or garden of any house, building, or premises of any kind. The chief occupant of such house, building, or premises shall be liable for any breach of this regulation.

21. Any failure or neglect to sweep with reasonable regularity and to keep clean and free of rubbish and of weeds, any yard, court, or garden, or passage, path, or backlane common to several houses, buildings, or apartments which are in separate occupation shall be an offence for which the chief occupant of each of the said houses, buildings, or apartments in separate occupation, shall be severally liable.

22. Every building, structure, or premises used as a place of trade or business, shall be provided with a metal dust bin not less than $4\frac{1}{2}$ cubic feet in capacity in which shall be stored all the garbage and waste matter of the said premises; and except when garbage or waste matter is being deposited or taken from the said metal bin, it shall at all times be covered with a metal cover.

23. The ground floor of all buildings used for trade purposes and as stores shall be of cement concrete not less than 4 inches thick, and the cementing shall be carried over the lower end of the walls to a height of 3 feet.

24. (1) No articles of food or drink whether raw or cooked or other similar goods or merchandise, shall be kept in any building used for purposes of trade, except on platforms as hereinafter specified.

(2) Such platforms shall be not less than 18 inches in height and shall be open on the sides, and so constructed as not to interfere with the lighting and the ventilation or the cleaning and sweeping of such building, and shall be so placed as to allow of a clear space of at least 18 inches on all sides.

(3) No goods or articles of any kind whatsoever shall be placed or stored either under the platforms or within 4 feet of the roof or ceiling.

(4) One-fourth of the floor area of any room or hall or enclosed space, where any of the aforesaid goods or articles are stored, shall be left free and unoccupied.

25. Once during each of the months of March, June, September, and December in each year, every occupier of any building, or premises used for purposes of trade, shall take out all goods and merchandise stored therein, and before replacing them cause all rat-holes in walls and floor to be filled up with broken glass and cement and every part of such building to be thoroughly cleaned and repaired or renewed when necessary: Provided that the Chairman may exempt from the provisions of this regulation any building or premises, the goods stored in which are incapable of attracting rats or affording them harbourage or breeding places.

26. No person shall remove, or cover up, or in any other way interfere with, any rat traps or poison baits laid in any building or premises by any officer authorized by the Chairman.

27. (1) It shall be the duty of the occupier of any house, building, or premises in which any rat, other than a rat caught or killed in a trap, dies or is found dead, to remove the body with a pair of tongs or such other contrivance and place it in a vessel containing kerosene oil, and forthwith to report the fact of such death to the Chairman.

(2) No person shall place or throw the body of any rat so dying or found dead into or upon any drain, street, path, garden, or other place or open space or dispose of such body in any way other than that aforesaid.

BY-LAWS.

1. (1) An ordinary meeting of the Committee shall be held on the third Monday of each of the months of February, April, June, August, October, and December, unless the Chairman by written notice of not less than one week prior to the date appointed for any meeting, gives information to the members that for want of sufficient business such meeting will not be held or that it will be held on some other date specified in the notice.

(2) A special meeting may be summoned by the Chairman by written notice, setting out the nature of the proposed business, served on the members not less than one week before the date selected by him for such meeting.

(3) The Chairman shall record in a minute book the proceedings of each meeting in the order in which they occur, and shall cause a copy of the minutes of every meeting to be sent to each member as early as may be convenient after such meeting.

2. (1) The areas specified in Schedule A hereto, are hereby declared to be areas within which efficient provision has been made for elementary education by means of schools recognized by the Department of Education.

(2) In these by-laws the term "school" shall mean any one of the schools within this District that have already been or may hereafter be recognized by the Department of Education.

3. Within this Education District it shall be the duty of—

- (a) the parent of every boy of not less than six and not more than fourteen years of age, and
- (b) the parent of every girl of not less than six and not more than twelve years of age,

to cause such boy or girl to attend school, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless the Chairman of the Committee has exempted such boy or girl on the ground of poverty or illness from attendance at school.

Provided however that such attendance at school shall not be compulsory—

- (a) for Muslim and Tamil girls of over ten years of age; or
- (b) for any boy under fourteen years of age or any girl under twelve years of age, who is the holder of a certificate issued by an Inspecting Officer of the Department of Education to the effect that such boy or girl has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic the examination prescribed by the Code for the fourth standard, and who is engaged in some remunerative employment or other beneficial occupation to the satisfaction of the Chairman; or
- (c) for any boy under eight years of age or any girl, whose home or place of residence is more than one mile distant, or for any boy over eight years of age whose home or place of residence is more than two miles distant, along the shortest route from any school.

4. (1) The period of daily attendance of any child for the purposes of these by-laws shall be the entire period during which the school is open daily for the instruction of children of similar age: Provided however that any child may be excused attendance during the time when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 15 (2) of the Ordinance.

5. Any parent failing to observe the provisions of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 5 and in the case of a continuing offence with an additional fine not exceeding Re. 1 for the second and each subsequent day during which the offence continues.

6. The following by-laws are hereby repealed:—
