IN THE CEYLON CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1935.

 An Open Competitive Examination for Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners concurrently in London and Colombo in July and August, 1935. The actual dates will be notified later.
 It is expected that at least three vacancies will be filled from this examination.

3. These Cadetships will be reserved for Ceylonese and candidates must be natural born male British subjects either of Ceylonese descent on both sides or of mixed European and Ceylonese descent. Candidates successful in the competition may be called upon to satisfy the Secretary of State for the Colonies that they fulfil the above requirements as regards descent.

4. Candidates must have attained the age of 22 and must not have attained the age of 24 on August 1, 1935.

5. Candidates are required to obtain a written nomination from the Governor. Candidates who propose to attend for examination in London should take steps to provide themselves in advance with that written nomination by application to the Chief Secretary's Office, Colombo, and it should be forwarded by them to the Civil Service Commissioners with their forms of application.

6. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight and physically qualified for service in tropical climates and they will be called upon to undergo a strict medical examination to test these points.

7. A married candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a Ceylon Cadetship without the special consent of the Governor.

8. The examination will include the following subjects.* The numerical value is shown against each subject.

(a) The auxiliary language in Section A will be tested by means of translation from the language. The following languages may be offered :--French, German, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Norwegian, Swedish, Danish, Russian, Latin, Ancient Greek.

Instead of an auxiliary language a candidate whose mother tongue is a Ceylonese language may offer as subject 5 either General Anthropology or Special Anthropology.

No candidate may offer any language or General Anthropology or Special Anthropology twice in the examination. Only a candidate who takes two modern languages in Section B may offer Latin or Ancient Greek as an auxiliary language.

(b) No candidate who offers Roman or Greek Civilization may also offer European History Period I.

(c) In subjects 50 to 67 the civilization subject associated with a language can only be taken by candidates who offer the language itself for examination in Section B.

(d) A candidate desiring to offer subject 24 or any of the subjects 31 to 43 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Commissioners of Laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (29), Geography (44), the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (46), and Agriculture (47), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as a part of the examination.

(c) From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

(f) Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.*

9. Further information respecting the examination to be held in London should be obtained from the Civil Service Commissioners.

The following regulations are applicable to candidates who wish to present themselves for examination in Colombo.

10. The fee for examination will be-

- (a) Rs. 100 for the competitive examination which should be paid to the Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Chartered Bank of India, &c. See note 5 of application form. The bank receipt should be attached to the application form
- bank receipt should be attached to the application form.
 (b) Rs. 10.50 for the medical examination. Candidates will be notified later the manner in which this fee is to be paid.

11. Nominations to candidates sitting in Colombo will be limited to those who have passed the Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of London or any other public examination which may be deemed to be of an equally high standard.

12. Candidates who possess the necessary qualifications and who propose to sit for the examination in Colombo will, on application to the Chief Secretary, be supplied with copies of the Regulations, Syllabus, and Application Form

13. Nominations for the examination will be considered on the receipt of the forms of application which must be filled in by the applicants in their own handwriting and must reach the Chief Secretary's Office on or before Friday, March 22, 1935.

14. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post can be considered. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

15. Acknowledgments of application forms are sent and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should at once write to the Chief Secretary, Colombo. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

16. Syllabus of the Competition to be held in the Year 1935 for Appointment to Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service.

Evidence of Training.-Candidates who desire to offer any of the subjects 24, 29, 31-44, 46 (Physical Anthropology branch only), or 47 must annex to their forms of application the evidence of training described on pages 319, 320. Such evidence should be in the form of a certificate signed by a responsible officer of the institution. In the case of an institution not situated in the British Isles, the certificate must state that the institution in which the work has been done is authorized to prepare candidates in that subject for a degree.

SECTION A.

1. Essay .- An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.

2. English.—A paper of questions to test the understanding of English and the workmanlike use of words. An optional exercise in the writing of verse will be included.

3. Present Day.—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, and political. A liberal choice of questions

Present Day.—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, and political. A liberal choice of questions will be given. Effective and skilful exposition will be expected.

 Everyday Science.—In this subject such knowledge will be expected as candidates will have who have studied science intelligently at school and have since then kept their eyes open. A liberal choice of questions will be given. Attention should be paid to orderly, effective, and exact expression.
 Auxiliary Language.—Passages dealing with history and politics may be set, but no technoial matter. Verse is not excluded. Accuracy and skill in the use of English will be expected.
 Viva Voce.—The examination will be in matters of general interest, not in matters of academic interest; it is intended to test the candidate's alertness, intelligence, and intellectual outlook. The candidate will be afforded an opportunity of furnishing the record of his life and education. On the interview and record the Commissioners judge the value

tunity of furnishing the record of his life and education. On the interview and record the Commissioners judge the value of the candidate's personality for each service for which he is entered. His value may differ for different services, and in that case the mark by which the Commissioners express their decision will differ for different services.

SECTION B.

HISTORY. Subjects 7-10.-A history subject will deal with the life of the people as a whole, political, social, economic. literary, artistic, scientific.

Candidates should know something of the original authorities, and have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history. When a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, a candidate will be expected to know in general outline

how the initial position was reached; similarly, when a fixed date is given for the end of the period, candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the subsequent development of movements which continued beyond the period. 7, 8. British History.—Period 1, to 1660; Period 2, 1660 to the present day. Candidates will be expected to

know so much of European history as will make the external action of this country fully intelligible and will explain those movements at home which had their beginnings abroad, e.g., the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the reactions in this country of the French Revolution. In subject 8 the outstanding incidents and movements in the history of British possessions will be included.

9, 10. European History.—Period 1, Greek and Roman history as given in the syllabus under Greek Civilization (subject 53) and Roman Civilization (subject 51); Period 2, from 400 to 1494; Period 3, from 1494 to 1763; Period 4, from 1763 to the present day. The history of the United States of America, of India, and of the Far East, will be included in so far as it influences European fortunes to an important degree. 11. General Economics.—The subject will be treated as a whole, and candidates should be prepared to illustrate

the theory by the facts and to analyse the facts by the help of the theory. The history of economic thought will be included.

12 Economic History.-Candidates will be expected to have a general acquaintance with the early economic history of England; but special attention will be paid to the economic development of the British Isles and other portions of the Empire during the last two or three centuries, and so much knowledge of European and American conditions will be expected as is necessary for the understanding of British economic history. 13. Public Economics.—The questions will deal with the parts played by the state and by local authorities in the

economic sphere.

14. Political Theory .-- Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, political theory being understood to mean not only the theory of legislation, but also the general history of the state and its con-nexion with kindred studies such as ethics, psychology, jurisprudence, public international law, and economics. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of original authorities.

15. Political Organization.—This will include constitutional forms (representative government, federalism, &c.), and public administration, central and local. The history of institutions is not included, but candidates will be expected to know the earlier stages from which existing institutions have directly developed.
16. Constitutional Law.—The constitutional law of the United Kingdom and of the British Empire.
17. Private Law.—The following branches of English private law :—The law of real and personal property (including

the law of succession), contracts, and torts. 18. Roman Law.--Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and

Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial processes. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.

 International Law.—Public international law.
 Moral Philosophy.—The history of the subject will be included. Candidates will have an opportunity of showing their strength either in ancient philosophy or in modern philosophy.

Metaphysics.-As for Moral Philosophy. 21.

22. Logic.—The subject will be interpreted in a wide sense. Epistemology in its bearing on logical problems will be included, together with formal logic and scientific method. Questions may be set on mathematical logic, *i.e.*, on the logic of mathematics, symbolic logic, and the logic of probability; and also on the history of logic. A considerable choice of questions will be allowed.

 Psychology.—Questions on the history of the subject may be included.
 Experimental Psychology.—A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank.

MATHEMATICS. Subjects 25-28.—The use of the slide-rule and of mathematical tables will be allowed.

25. Lower Pure Mathematics.-Geometry of two and of three dimensions according to Euclid (synthetic geometry) to Descartes (analytical geometry), and to Monge (descriptive geometry, dealing with three-dimensional figures by the use of plan and elevation). The method of vectors including scalar and vector products, with applications. Only the main properties of conics and quadrics, including those of poles, polars and polar planes, are expected.

Algebra: complex numbers; uniformly converging infinite series; the elements of the theory of equations, including the numerical solution of algebraic equations, but not including the formal solution of the cubic and quartic. Infinitesimal calculus of real variables to partial differentiation and multiple integrals, with applications to geometry. Candidates should be able to deal with the types of differential equations occurring in elementary mechanics. The proof of Taylor's series will not be required.

No great skill will be expected in solving complicated problems of an elementary nature. The questions will involve the use of mathematical instruments.

-Lower Pure Mathematics together with :---26. Higher Pure Mathematics.

The geometry of curves and surfaces. Tensor calculus.

Elementary analysis, including simple functions of a complex variable and contour integration. Differential equations in one independent variable. Elementary treatment of partial differential equations, with special reference to the differential equations of mathematical physics. Existence theorems are excluded. Mathematical theory of probability, including theory of errors, method of least squares, curve fitting, and

correlation.

Calculus of finite differences, including numerical integration and summation and linear difference equations.

A considerable choice of questions will be allowed, so that full marks may be obtained by covering about half the range stated.

27. Lower Applied Mathematics.-Statics, hydrostatics, dynamics, elementary theory of electricity and magnet-ism, including the induction of currents. Questions will be of an elementary character, but will not be confined to two dimensions; they will involve the use of the calculus. Candidates are free to use differential equations, but a knowledge thereof will not be necessary to answer the questions. Attention will be paid to problems which arise naturally and to general principles; artificial problems will be avoided. The questions will involve the use of mathematical instruments.

28.Higher Applied Mathematics.-Lower Applied Mathematics together with :-

Statics to a more advanced stage, including graphical treatment.

Dynamics to the equations of Euler and Lagrange and including the theory of the vibration of strings and other simple systems.

Hydrodynamics, including the elementary theory of the motion of solids through a liquid, surface waves, and vibrations in gases

Elasticity, including the elements of the vibrations of rods, plates, and bars.

Electricity and magnetism.

Thermodynamics, kinetic theory of gases, radiation.

A considerable choice of questions will be allowed, so that full marks may be obtained by covering about half the range stated.

29. Astronomy.-Geometrical optics will be included.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of at least 20 hours' practical training in an observatory. 30. Statistics.—Some knowledge of the nature of the data available for the statistical discussion of prices, wages,

incomes, trade transport, production, consumption, population, births, deaths, migration. Frequency distributions, averages, percentiles, simple methods of measuring dispersion; graphic methods; elementary treatment of qualitative data; miscellaneous methods used in handling statistics of experiments and observations; interpolation.

Elements of modern mathematical theory of statistics :--frequency curves and the mathematical representation of groups generally; accuracy of sampling as affecting averages, percentages, standard deviation; significance of observed

differences between averages of groups, &c. ; the theory of correlation for two variables. NATURAL SCIENCE. Subjects 31-42.—The standard of the higher division of a science will be that which is required in the main subject for an honours degree at the universities. The standard for the lower division of a science will be that required in a subject subsidiary to the main subject whether required at the final degree examination or at a preceding examination

A candidate who desires to offer a science must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of

Mineralogy will be included in each division. Higher Geology 38.

43. Engineering.-Strength of materials; theory of structures; mechanism and dynamics of machines; heat and thermodynamics; surveying; hydraulics, including hydraulic machines; electrical technology. The subject will be treated in a general manner and the questions will be confined to the more elemantary parts of

the subject. The candidate will be expected to be familiar with graphical methods and to have some skill in mechanical drawing.

A candidate who desires to offer Engineering must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

44. Geography.—Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany, and geology. There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank. 45. General Anthropology.—Primitive culture in its various aspects, including :—economic pursuits (food collect-

ing, hunting, fishing, domestication of animals, agriculture); the genreal scheme of primitive social organization; early religion and magic, mythology, beliefs, rituals and ceremonial; decorative art, music, dancing. Candidates will be expected to show some knowledge of the customs, institutions, and beliefs of living races of rude culture rather than

expected to show some knowledge of the customs, institutions, and beliefs of living races of rude culture rather than knowledge of prehistory, archæology, or evolutional or historical conjectures.
46. Special Anthropology.—Candidates will choose between Social Anthropology and Physical Anthropology.
Social Anthropology.—A fuller knowledge of primitive social organization will be here expected : the tribe, the village community, kinship grouping and the family. Study of the manner in which law works among primitive people and of their forms of administering justice. The economic organization of the primary pursuits and industries ; the types of distribution, exchange, and trade. Exchange and the beginnings of currency. Adjustments of European economic systems, laws and morality to races on an earlier level or of a different type of culture. Early forms of magical and religious belief and ritual. The relation between faith and knowledge in primitive societies.

Physical Anthropology, with which are included prehistoric archaeology and technology. Candidates will be expected to have such knowledge as may be acquired by laboratory and museum work, consisting mainly in the handling and study of specimens and exhibits. The subject will be treated with special, but not exclusive, reference to peoples of rude culture, including prehistoric civilizations.

A candidate who desires to offer Physical Anthropology must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an institution of university rank.

47. Agriculture.-Agricultural chemistry, agricultural botany, and agricultural zoology will be included.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an approved institution.

48, 49. English Literature.—Period 1, to 1700; Period 2, from 1660. In Period 1 candidates can obtain full credit by studying the period 1350–1700 in accordance with the particulars given below. Questions on Old and Middle English literature will be set ; but such questions will be optional, and will be confined to the best-known works.

Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the works of the following authors and of their place in the history of their country :-

Questions on other writers will not be excluded, but, on the whole, the questions will be directed to the best-known authors and their best-known works. Candidates should know so much of the history as is necessary to understand the literature in its relation to other activities of the nation.

Questions will not be set on the history of the language; the history of workmanship, style, and prosody will not be excluded.

LANGUAGES AND CIVILIZATIONS. Subjects 50-67.—In these the civilization subject associated with a language can be taken only by candidates who also offer themselves for examination in the language itself.

A civilization subject will include literature and history. It will deal with the life of the people as a whole, literary, political, social, economic, artistic, scientific.

In literature candidates will be expected to have a first-hand knowledge of the authors.

In history candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history. 50. Latin Language.—Translation, and prose or verse composition. The composition paper will be so arranged

that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or, if they prefer, may take some prose and some verse.

51. Roman Civilization. -In history the outlines of the history and development down to 180 A.D. should be known; but the main stress will be laid on the period 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

52. Greek Language.-As for Latin.

53. Greek Civilization.-In history the main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.

53. Greek Cuvilization.—In mistory the main stress will be on the period of 0 B.C. to 0.20 B.C.
54. French Language. —Translation, free composition, set composition, and conversation.
55. French Civilization.—The outlines of the history prior to 1589 should be known; the period from 1589 to 1660 in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1660 to the present day.

56. German Language.-As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

57. German Civilization.-In history candidates should know in outline the history of the Medieval Empire, of the growth of the German cities, of the Reformation in Germany, and of the Thirty Years War; but the main stress will be on the period from the accession of Frederick the Great to the present day.

58. Spanish, Italian, Language.—As for French.
59. Spanish Civilization.—In history the main stress will be on the periods from the Union of Castile and Aragon under Ferdinand and Isabella to the liberation of the Netherlands, and again from 1800 to the present day. Italian Civilization.—In history the main stress will be on the 15th century and the first half of the 16th century, and again on the period from 1789 to the present day. Sufficient should be known of the earlier period to understand the present of the resent day. position of the Pope and the Emperor in Italy, the rise of the towns, and the position of Dante.

60. Russian Language.—As for French.

61. Russian Civilization.—Only the broadest outlines of the history prior to Peter the Great will be required; the period from the accession of Peter the Great to 1800 should be known in somewhat more detail; but the main stress

will be on the period from 1800'to the present day. 62. Arabic Language.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

63. Arabic Civilization.—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period from the middle of the 6th century A.D. to the middle of the 13th century A.D.

64. Persian Language -- Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

65. Persian Civilization .--- The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period 1000 A.D. to 1500 A.D. Candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of the history of Persia before 1000 A.D. and from 1500 A.D. to the present time.

Sanskrit Language.-Translation, prose composition, and questions on Vedic and Sanskrit grammar. 66. Vedic and classical Sanskrit passages will be set for translation; composition will be required in classical Sanskrit alone. 67. Sanskrit Civilization.—Sanskrit literature and the history of the civilization and thought of India from the

Vedic period to 1200 A.D.

No pig shall be kept within the limits of the Council except in a sty or enclosure situated, if the land is available, at a distance of not less than 50 feet, and in every other case, at a distance of not less than 20 feet from any dwelling house or place of human habitation or from any well, spring, or water supply.

well, spring, or water supply. 2. Every pigsty or enclosure shall be subject to inspection by the officers of the Council and shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition.

3. Every pig found straying outside the sty or enclosure in which it should be kept shall be liable to seizure by any person thereto authorized by the Chairman in writing.

4. Every pig so seized shall be placed in a pound, and the following charges shall be paid before the removal of any pig so impounded, viz. :--

For occupation, 50 cents a head for a day or part of a day. For food, if supplied, 15 cents a head for a day or part of a day.

5. Every pig seized and not claimed and removed within three days may be sold by public auction and the charges and costs recovered from the proceeds.

BY-LAWS.

Establishment and Regulation of Public Markets.

1. The Council shall give not less than ten days' notice, by beat of tom-tom, of the date fixed for the opening of any public market it may decide to establish within this area. 2. After the establishment of such public market, no person shall, without a licence granted by the Chairman of the Council, publicly expose for sale any meat, poultry, fresh fish, fresh fruit or vegetables in any place within the limits of the Council other than the public market: Provided that this by-law shall not apply (a) to the sale of poultry, fruit or vegetables by itinerant vendors as defined in section 163 (5) of the Ordinance, or (b) to the sale by the licensee of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique of fruits for consumption on the premises.

3. (1) Every licence referred to in the last preceding by-law shall be substantially in the form A in Schedule I. to these by-laws, and shall be in force for such period not exceeding twelve months or less than one month as may be specified in that licence.

(2) Every such licence shall be paid for in advance at the rate of 50 cents for each month for which it is to be in force.

(3) Every licensee shall have his name and the names of his salesmen registered at the Office of the Council.

(4) It shall not be lawful for any salesman whose name has not been so registered to take part in any sale in any licensed premises.

licensed premises. 4. (1) No person shall hold, use, or occupy any stall in a public market without a permit in the form B in the Schedule.

(2) No person holding a permit shall contravene any of the conditions set out on the back of such permit.

5. Rents or fees at the respective rates set out in Schedule II. to these by-laws shall be payable for the use or occupation of the several stalls, spaces or seats in the public markets specified therein.

public markets specified therein. 6. (1) There shall be placed in a conspicuous position at each public market a table of the rents, or fees leviable for the use of a stall, space or seat at that market, printed in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

(2) It shall not be lawful for any person to demand or receive higher sums than those authorized by such notice.

7. The several rents and fees payable in respect of stalls in a public market shall be paid in advance from time to time to the Council, or their lessee, or any other person authorized by the Council or by the lessee to collect rents and fees.

8. No person shall keep or expose for sale in any market any article the keeping or sale of which therein is prohibited by the Council by notice under the hand of the Chairman posted in the market in pursuance of these by-laws.

9. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any stall or portion of any public market reserved for any specified article or class of articles, any other article or class of articles.

10. No occupant of a stall in any public market shall (1) enclose in any way any portion of such stall or market or erect any awning or screen or fixture of any kind, or (2) leave any goods in the market outside his own stall between the hours of 9 P.M. and 6 A.M. without first having obtained the sanction of the Chairman.

11. (1) Every occupant of a stall, space or seat in any public market shall keep such stall, space or seat clean and free from filth or rubbish.

(2) No person who is affected with or is suffering from any contagious or infectious disease or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall occupy any stall, seat or place in any public market, or expose for sale thereat any provisions whatsoever.

12. No person using or occupying any public market shall—

- (a) behave in a disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market; or
- (b) carry on any cooking in such market; or
- (c) remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself; or
- (d) damage, or in anywise deface, any portion of the buildings, stalls, lamps, or any property of the Council in or about such market, or defile or pollute in any way the water provided for use in such market, or sit on the platform on which fish is intended to be exposed; or
 (e) introduce or cause to be introduced or keep any dog,
- (e) introduce or cause to be introduced or keep any dog, cat, domestic animal or bird or reptile in such market.

13. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer acting under his authority to inspect any market and to seize any unwholesome articles of food introduced into or exposed for sale in any market and to convey the same to the Medical Officer of Health or in his absence to the District Medical Officer or if there be no such officers to the Magistrate and if it appear to such Health Officer or District Medical Officer or Magistrate that any article of food so seized is unwholesome or unfit for human food, he shall order the same to be destroyed, or to be so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for such food, without the payment of any compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

14. All public markets shall be open daily from 6 A.M. to 9 P.M.

15. (1) It shall be the duty of the market-keeper or of the lessee of a public market to maintain order within the limits of the market.

(2) It shall be an offence to obstruct or resist in the execution of his duty any person appointed by the Chairman or by the Council to superintend any public market, or to collect the rents, tolls, or fees, or to enforce order or cleanliness therein.

16. Whenever the Council, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer, decides that the use or consumption by the public of any particular kind of fish is injurious, or that during the prevalence of any epidemic the use or consumption of any particular kind of fruit or vegetable is harmful, and by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice prohibits for such time as may appear necessary the sale or the introduction of any such fish, fruit or vegetable in any market or other place within the limits of the Council, it shall be lawful for any authorized officer of the Council to seize and destroy, in such manner as the Council or the Chairman may direct, any such article sold or exposed for sale in contravention of such prohibition.

17. No licensed butcher shall sell or keep for sale any meat or any portion of a slaughtered animal in any place other than a public market or in any part of a public market other than the stall rented by him.
18. No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market

18. No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market premises for a longer period than is necessary for loading or unloading.

19. Every person occupying a stall in a public market shall keep on or near such stall a fly-proof covered receptacle, and shall deposit therein all rubbish and refuse matter.

20. No person shall throw or deposit any rubbish, refuse, bones, skins of animals, or other articles likely to be offensive or injurious to public health, in or upon any public market or its premises except into a receptacle provided for such purpose.

21. No meat of any animal not slaughtered at the public slaughter-house provided by the Council, shall be brought into or sold or exposed for sale in any public or private market or any place specially licensed, except with the special written authority of the Chairman: Provided that this by-law shall not apply to frozen meat, game, or fish imported into the Island.

22. It shall be an offence for any person occupying a stall in any public market, wilfully or without reasonable cause, to neglect or refuse to serve the public during two consecutive days.

23. On the second or any subsequent conviction of any person of a breach of any of these by-laws, the court may in its discretion cancel the licence issued to such person.

24. In the event of non-compliance with the provisions of any of the foregoing by-laws or of the cancellation of any licence by a competent court, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to refuse a licence or a fresh licence, as the case may be.

25. Any person contravening any of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 20 and in the case of a continuing offence with an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 5 for every day during which the offence is continued after conviction or after written notice from the Chairman drawing attention to such contravention.

The general rules dated August 12, 1926, published in the Gazette of August 20, 1926, as amended by notification in the Gazette of June 8, 1934, are hereby further amended as follows :-

(1) By the deletion of the amended rule 162 and the substitution of the following new rule therefor :---

162. The clothing supplied under rule 108 to a prisoner on his discharge, shall consist of the articles set out in the appropriate list in Schedule IV. to these rules :

AGREEMENT BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT IN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF ESTONIA SUPPLEMENTARY TO THE TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION OF JANUARY 18, 1926 (WITH PROTOCOL AND NOTES).

London, July 11, 1934.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, August 29, 1934.]

THE Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the President of the Republic of Estonia;

Affirming their common determination to uphold and carry out the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, signed at Tallinn on the 18th January, 1926; and

Considering it to be expedient, in order to increase and facilitate trade and commerce, to supplement the said treaty of 1926 by certain additional provisions relating to trade and commerce; and Being desirous of concluding an agreement for this

purpose have agreed as follows :-

ARTICLE 1.

The articles enumerated in Part I of the First Schedule to this Agreement, produced or manufactured in the United Kingdom, shall not on importation into Estonia, from whatever place arriving, be subjected to duties or charges other or higher than those specified in the Schedule. The articles enumerated in Part II of the First Schedule

to this Agreement, produced or manufactured in any British Colony, overseas territory, any territory under British protection or any mandated territory in respect of which the mandate is exercised by the Government of the United Kingdom, shall not on importation into Estonia, from whatever place arriving, he subjected to duties or charges other or higher than those specified in the Schedule, provided that such colony or territory enjoys most-favouredor Article 29 of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation signed on the 18th January, 1926.

ARTICLE 2.

The articles enumerated in the Second Schedule to this Agreement, produced or manufactured in Estonia, shall not on importation into the United Kingdom, from whatever place arriving, he subjected to duties or charges other or higher than those specified in the Schedule.

The Government of Estonia will consider sympathetically any proposal of the Government of the United Kingdom for replacing in whole or in part by specific duties any of the ad valorem duties or by ad valorem duties any of the specific duties set out in this Schedule.

ARTICLE 3.

1. The Government of Estonia will not impose new import restrictions on the goods mentioned in Parts I and II of the First Schedule which are not already subjected to restrictions on importation into Estonia, and, as regards such of these goods as are at present subjected to restrictions on importation into Estonia, any restrictions in force shall be operated in such a manner as not to prevent the full benefits of the tariff concessions specified in Parts I and II of the First Schedule from accruing to gccds the produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom or of the territories referred to in paragraph 2 of Article 1 respec-

tively. 2. Imports into Estonia of goods, for which special arrangements are not made in this Agreement, from the United Kingdom or from any of the territories referred to in paragraph 2 of Article 1 shall in no case be restricted below in the very 1923 below imports in the year 1933.

3. If the Government of Estonia decide to impose restrictions on the importation into Estonia of goods which are not mentioned in Parts I and II of the First Schedule and which are at present unrestricted, consultation shall take place between them and the Government of the United Kingdom with a view to steps being taken to ensure that such restrictions shall not operate in a manner contrary to the undertaking in paragraph 2 above.

ARTICLE 4.

The Government of the United Kingdom will not impose quantitative restrictions on imports into the United Kingdom which would have the effect of preventing the benefits of the tariff concessions specified in the Second Schedule from accruing to goods, the produce or manu-facture of Estonia, provided that this Article shall not apply to such restrictions of imports as may be necessary to secure the effective operation of a scheme or schemes for the regulation of the marketing in the United Kingdom of agricultural products.

ARTICLE 5.

1. In addition to the obligations which they assume under Articles 2 and 4 of this Agreement, the Government of the United Kingdom undertake not to regulate the quantity of imports into the United Kingdom of butter and bacon and hams, the produce of Estonia, except in so far as such regulation may be necessary to secure the effective operation of a scheme or schemes for the regulation of the marketing of domestic supplies of these or related preducts. In the event of such regulation of imports being introduced, in the case of all or any of these products paragraphs 2 to 7 of this Article shall have effect in so far as they may be applicable.

The Government of the United Kingdom will allot 2. to Estonia an equitable share of permitted foreign imports having regard to the position which Estonia has held in past years as a supplier of these products to the United Kingdom market. Allocations to Estonia will be made on the same basis as, and on conditions not less favourable

the same basis as, and on conditions not less favourable than, allocations to any other foreign country. 3. The Government of the United Kingdom will not regulate compulsorily the quantity of imports into the United Kingdom of any of these produces, the produce of Estonia, without first giving the Government of Estonia an opportunity of discussing the allocation to Estonia. 4. In the event of the total quantity of any of the

In the event of the total quantity of any of the aforesaid products allowed to be imported into the United Kingdom from foreign countries being increased during any period of regulation, additional allocations shall be made to Estonia, but any temporary inability on the part of Estonia to supply the whole or a part of any such additional allocation shall not prejudice, as regards any subsequent period, the undertakings given in paragraphs 2 and 3 above.

5. In the event of any other foreign supplying country renouncing or forfeiting in whole or in part its allocation of any of the aforesaid products, the allocation to Estonia shall be increased in a ratio no less favourable than that accorded to any other foreign country.

6. Having regard to the fact that in recent years the imports of the following agricultural products, viz., eggs, potato flour, milk powder, condensed milk, meat and fish conserves, cheese and poultry, from Estonia into the United Kingdom have been insignificant in quantity in comparison with imports from other countries, the Government of the United Kingdom will endeavour to arrange that in the event of any quantitative regulation being imposed on imports of these products, imports of such products produced in Estonia shall remain unregulated. If, however, imports from Estonia of any such product increase to such an extent that it is necessary to regulate them quantitatively, the Government of the United Kingdom undertake to enter into discussions with the Government of Estonia as to the quantity of such product to be allowed to be imported into the United Kingdom from Estonia.

The control of exports to the United Kingdom from 7. Estonia of any of the products mentioned in this Article shall be entrusted to the Government of Estonia so long as the Government of the United Kingdom are satisfied that such control is effectual and in conformity with the scheme or schemes of regulation of imports into the United Kingdom for the time being in force.

ARTICLE 6.

The tax levied on commercial travellers who visit Estonia on behalf of one or more companies or firms registered in, or having their principal place of business in, the United Kingdom shall not exceed 20 E. Krs. for each period of two weeks.

Directors and principal officers of any such company or firm shall be entitled to exemption from the tax if the company or firm carries on business in Estonia through an agent or agents resident in Estonia.

ARTICLE 7.

1. Except as provided in paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Article, nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to affect the rights or obligations arising out of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, signed at Tallinn on the 18th January, 1926.

2. No notice of termination shall be given under Article 30 of the said Treaty on behalf of either of the Contracting Parties before the 1st April, 1936.

In the event of either the Government of the United Kingdom or the Government of Estonia deciding on a general change of policy in regard to the treatment of foreign shipping, discussions shall take place between them with a view to replacing by new provisions any provisions of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, signed on the 19th Lonverse 1926, which relate to pavigation and the 18th January, 1926, which relate to navigation, signed on the treatment of shipping. If agreement on such new pro-visions is not reached within three months from the commencement of such discussions, either Contracting Party shall be at liberty to give notice of termination in respect of any of the said provisions of the Treaty of 1926. and such provisions shall cease to apply on the expiration, of three months from the date on which such notice was given.

ARTICLE 8.

Any dispute that may arise between the Contracting Parties as to the proper interpretation or application of any of the provisions of the present Agreement or of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, signed at Tallinn on the 18th January, 1926, shall, at the request of either of them, be referred to the Permanent Court of International Justice, unless in any particular case the Contracting Parties agree to submit the dispute to some other tribunal or to dispose of it by some other form of procedure.

In case any dispute shall fall to be submitted to the Permanent Court of International Justice the Court shall, unless the Contracting Parties otherwise agree, be requested to give its decision in accordance with the summary procedure provided for in Article 29 of the Statute of the Court.

ARTICLE 9.

The Agreement between the Government of Estonia and the Government of the United Kingdom concluded by an Exchange of Notes, dated the 15th July, 1933, shall cease to apply as from the date of coming into force of the present Agreement if still otherwise in force at that date.

ARTICLE 10.

The present Agreement shall be ratified and the ratifi-

cations shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible. The Agreement shall come into force ten days after the exchange of ratifications and shall, subject to the provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2 of Part II of the Protocol to this Agreement, remain in force until the 31st December, 1936.

In case neither of the Contracting Parties shall have given notice to the other six months before the said date of their intention to terminate this Agreement, it shall remain in force until the expiration of six months from the date on which notice of such intention is given.

In witness whereof the undersigned, duly authorised to that effect, have signed the present Agreement and have thereto affixed their seals.

Done in duplicate at London, in the English language, the 11th day of July, 1934.

A translation shall be made into the Estonian language as soon as possible and agreed upon between the two Governments.

PROTOCOL.

AT the moment of signing the Commercial Agreement of this day's date between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the President of the Republic of Estonia, the undersigned, being duly authorised to that effect, declare that they have agreed on the provisions set out in this Protocol, which shall form an integral part of the above-mentioned Agreement.

PART L

1. The Commercial Agreement having been concluded in the desire to maintain and facilitate still further trade and commerce between the United Kingdom and Estonia, the Government of Estonia having regard to the proportion of Estonian exports imported in the United Kingdom, will in furtherance of the objects of the Agreement, encourage and promote by all means at their disposal the importation into Estonia of goods produced or manufactured in the United Kingdom.

The Government of Estonia will refrain from any action which would affect prejudicially any British Shipping Company now engaged in the trade between Estonia and the United Kingdom and will consult with the Government of the United Kingdom if any difficulties should arise. The Government of Estonia will, moreover, encourage and promote by all means at their disposal the increased utilisation of British shipping services in trade between the two countries.

2. The sale in Estonia of herrings, salted or cured in the United Kingdom and exported therefrom, shall (apart from the levy of the import duty of 0.022 E. Kr. per kilogramme gross on salted or cured herrings) take place under conditions of free and fair competition with other herrings whether caught by Estonian vessels or salted or cured in Estonia, or imported salted or cured from other sources, and such other herrings shall not be placed in any more favourable position by subsidies or in any other manner than herrings salted or cured in the United Kingdom and exported therefrom. The import duty imposed on herrings, salted or cured in the United Kingdom shall in no case be greater than the duty imposed on salted or cured herrings imported from other foreign sources, whatever the size or weight of such herrings.

3. Representations having been made to the Estonian Delegation on behalf of certain United Kingdom industries as a result of which statements have been made on behalf of groups of Estonian importers, the two Governments take note of the following conversations and statements :

- (a) Conversations in respect of steps for facilitating the sale in Estonia of iron and steel, commercial motor vehicles, commodities for the use of the Estonian wood-working industries, fine chemicals and pharmaceutical products, agricultural, dairy and road-making machinery, wool yarn and cotton thread, all of United Kingdom manufacture.
- (b) Statements made on behalf of certain users of salt and salpetre regarding the purchase of these commo-dities from the United Kingdom.

PART II.

1. The Government of the United Kingdom shall have the right at any time to terminate the Agreement upon three months' notice, if in any one period of twelve months, commencing on the first day of the month following the date on which the Agreement comes into force and on the corresponding date in each subsequent year, the amount of coal of United Kingdom origin imported into Estonia is less than 85 per cent. of the total imports of coal into Estonia in that period as shown by the Estonian official statistics of total imports of coal and imports of coal of United Kingdom origin, or if the amount of such imports of coal of United Kingdom origin in that period is less than 35,000 metric tons, including an amount not exceeding 5,000 tons of coal described by Estonian users as "Smithy Peas.

2. The Agreement shall not be terminated in virtue of this arrangement if, during the period between the date when notice of termination is given and the date of its taking effect, quantities of coal of United Kingdom origin additional to the quantity that would normally be imported under the Agreement during that period are imported into Estonia sufficient to make good the deficiency.

The two Governments take note of a letter to the 3. Chairman of the Estonian Delegation for the negotiation of the Commercial Agreement, dated this day and signed on behalf of the United Kingdom coal industry by the Chairman of the Central Council of Colliery Owners and the Chairman of the British Coal Exporters' Federation, wherein they have expressed their desire and firm intention to fulfil the requirements of Estonian buyers and users of coal by every means within their power; and for this purpose have given to Estonian buyers and users the assurances contained in that letter with regard to prices, qualities, availability of supplies and other matters. agreed that the right of the Government of the United Kingdom, under paragraph 1 of this part of the Protocol, to terminate the Agreement upon three months' notice in the circumstances set out, is conditional upon these assurances

4. The Government of Estonia will take the necessary steps to restore and increase the share of the United Kingdom in the Estonian market for coke.

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PART III.

1. The Government of the United Kingdom hope that such regulation as may be necessary of imports of agricultural produce into the United Kingdom may be effected by voluntary co-operation between the Government of the United Kingdom on the one hand and the Governments of countries supplying these products to the United Kingdom on the other hand; and the Government of the United Kingdom will endeavour for their part to secure that any regulation applied to imports into the United Kingdom of agricultural produce from Estonia shall be effected in this way.

2. If any regulation of butter imports into the United Kingdom is found necessary the Government of the United Kingdom will do their best to see when allocations are being decided that due weight is given to the special importance of the butter trade to Estonia and to the extent to which it may have been affected by restrictions in other markets.

PART IV.

In the Commercial Agreement and in this Protocol to the Agreement, the term "foreign country" in relation to the United Kingdom means a country not being a territory under the sovereignty of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, or under His Majesty's suzerainty, protection or mandate; and the term "foreign imports" means imports from foreign countries as so defined.



The Chairman moved the reappointment of this Committee for 1935. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna seconded.-Carried

4. To decide the personnel of the Special Committee appointed with effect from January 1, 1935, to report upon as to what steps should be taken to improve the housing and general conditions of the town. Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of the Chairman and all the elected members with Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka as convenor—four to form a quorum.

5. The following questions stood in the name of Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka :—(1) What is the generating cost of a unit of electricity ? (2) What is the standing cost of a unit of electricity ? (3) What is the amount paid by the General Revenue for a unit of electricity for street lighting ?

The Chairman stated that the replies to these questions were not yet ready and that they would be answered at a subsequent meeting as the Superintendent of the Electricity Department was still in correspondence with the Chairman, Urban District Council, Kalutara, as regards the meaning of the expression "Standing cost."

6. The Chairman moved :—(a) That a supplementary grant of Rs. 250 be made to the Galle Friend-in-Need Society for the year 1935.—Carried.

(b) That steps be taken to have the Medical Officer of Health trained in Maternity and Child Welfare work at the expense of the Council:---The Chairman informed the meeting that the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, had intimated to him that the Public Health Department there would afford the Medical Officer of Health every facility to aquaint himself with Maternity and Child Welfare Work and that it was considered that ten to fourteen days training would be sufficient. The motion was then put to the meeting and carried. It was resolved, further, (1) that the training be for the first two weeks in February, and, if any extension was found to be necessary, that the Chairman be authorized to arrange accordingly; (2) that the Medical Officer of Health be requested to nominate a substitute to act for him on the usual terms.

(c) That the upset price for "Alaguduwa" fish be fixed at 5 cents per pound.—Carried, with effect from December 8, 1934.

7. Pursuant to notice Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved :—(a) That the Chairman do give six months time to householders to make their premises fit for human habitation before applying for a closing order under chapter 4 of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance of 1910. Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya seconded.—Messrs. J. E. Perera, A. M. Saheed, E. M. Karunaratna and S. H. Dahanayaka spoke against the motion. They were all of opinion that the matter should be left to the discretion of the Chairman.

The Chairman stated that he took into consideration the reports made to him by the Medical Officer of Health in these cases and gave the owners reasonable time. Extensions of time were also allowed by the court. He was, therefore, inclined to agree with the views of the members who had opposed the motion that the hands of the Chairman should not be tied in the manner suggested.

The motion was then put to the meeting and declared lost-3 voting for and 10 against.

(b) That the Municipal Engineer be requested to prepare an estimate as to what would be the cost of metalling and tarring the by-lanes within the Fort area. Mr. A. C. Mohammedo seconded.—The motion was put to the meeting and declared lost—2 voting for and 11 against.

8. To elect, by ballot, members to form the four Standing Committees for the year 1935 :— A ballot was taken and the Chairman declared that the following members had been elected : (1) Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment :— Mr. J. E. Perera, Mr. D. I. Durham, Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya. (2) Standing Committee on Municipal Works :— Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka, Mr. E. A. Paulas, and Mr. C. H. Bradley. (3) Standing Committee on Law and General subjects :— Mr. A. M. Saheed, Mr. F. Magdon Ismail, and Mr. E. M. Karunaratna. (4) Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation :— Mr. A. M. Saheed, Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka, and Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya.

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9. To sanction the following revotes for 1935 :---

(a) Rs. 1,925 for the construction of a 15-ft. span bridge over the Heen-ela and for improvements to the approach road to Kanampitiya.--Sanctioned.

(b) Rs. 1,350.80 for improvements to the Esplanade-hedge, fence, gates, &c.-Sanctioned.

(c) Rs. 600 for warning signs and standards for highways.-Sanctioned.

(d) Rs. $735 \cdot 26$ being unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 1,400 for providing electric lights to public latrines.—Sanctioned.

(c) Rs. 29,500 for a new 55 K. W. engine set in lieu of replacement of the Campbell Vertical Engine and the Campbell Horizontal Engine Set (Electricity Votes 26 and 34 of 1934).—(1) Sanctioned. (2) Resolved, Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka dissenting, that a complete Crossley 55 K. W. set consisting of Engine and Generator be purchased from Messrs. Walker & Greig, the Crossley Agents, at a cost of Rs. 26,750 and that the existing Campbell Vertical Engine be retained as a standby.

(f) Rs. 850 being unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 3,000 for an underground cable to the Fort area.—Sanctioned.
(g) Rs. 750 being cost of prepayment meters.—Sanctioned.

10. To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 900 under "Anti-Plague Measures" for the wages of the Disinfecting and cleansing Gang of the Anti-Plague Campaign.—Sanctioned.

11. To sanction the excess leave of 14 days granted to Mr. T. L. S. Wijesinghe, Storekeeper, Electricity Department in 1934 on account of illness.—Sanctioned.

The Chairman moved the Council into Committee to consider the next two items.

12. To consider applications for the post of Shroff:-

Council in Committee recommended, after discussion, that copies of the 15 applications selected by the Special Committee appointed for that purpose be sent to each member and that the matter be further considered at a Special Meeting of the Council to be held on Monday the 28th instant at 2 p.M.

13. To consider the qualifications required for the post of Chief Clerk and Accountant.

Mr. J. E. Perera moved that, in view of the fact that Mr. M. A. Marikar has not been given sufficient opportunity to show his ability to hold the permanent post of Chief Clerk and Accountant and also to act for the Secretary when an occasion arises, he (Mr. Marikar) be given a further three months time from February 1, 1935, in which to do so, and that meanwhile the present arrangements do continue. The Chairman seconded.—Carried.

Council resumed and the Chairman moved that the above recommendation and resolution of the Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried.

14. To consider the question as to whether the land required for the proposed approach road to Gangarama Bridge should be acquired by the Council at a cost of Rs. 6,575. Resolved that consideration be deferred till the next meeting and that meanwhile the papers on the subject be sent to Mr. J. E. Perera for his perusal.

15. To fix a date for the next General Meeting of the Council :---Agreed that the next General Meeting of Council be held on Friday February 15, 1935, at 2 P.M.

16. The following documents were laid on the table :---

(2) Progress report of works done on estimates during December, 1934.


