THE text of the following Order of His Majesty the King in Council applying the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1932; of the Imperial Parliament in the case of the United States of America is published for general information.

TEXT.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 6th day of
June, 1935.

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870(a) to 1932(b) it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas by Orders in Council dated the 21st March, 1890, the 26th June, 1901, and the 11th February, 1907, the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, were respectively made applicable in the case of the United States of America under and in accordance with the several Conventions concluded between His Majesty and the President of the United States on the 12th July, 1889, the 13th December, 1900, and the 12th April, 1905:

And whereas a Treaty was signed on the 22nd day of December, 1931, between His Majesty and the President of the United States of America for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India,

And the President of the United States of America;

Desiring to make more adequate provision for the reciprocal extradition of criminals,

Have resolved to conclude a Treaty for that purpose, and to that end have appointed as their plenipotentiaries:—

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India:
for Great Britain and Northern Ireland:

The Right Honourable Sir John Simon, G.C.S.I., M.P.,
His Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs;

And the President of the United States of America;

General Charles G. Dawes, Ambassador Extraordinary
and Plenipotentiary of the United States of America
at the Court of St. James;

who, having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed as follows:—

ARTICLE 1.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article 3, committed within the jurisdiction of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE 2.

For the purposes of the present Treaty the territory of His Britannic Majesty shall be deemed to be Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and all parts of His Britannic Majesty's dominions overseas other than those enumerated in Article 14, together with the territories enumerated in Article 16 and any territories to which it may be extended under Article 17. It is understood that in respect of all territory of His Britannic Majesty as above defined other than Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, the present Treaty shall be applied so far as the laws permit.

For the purposes of the present Treaty the territory of the United States shall be deemed to be all territory wherever situated belonging to the United States, including its dependencies and all other territories under its exclusive administration or control.

ARTICLE 3.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:—

- (1) Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
- (2) Manslaughter.
- (3) Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
- (4) Rape.
- (5) Unlawful carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age.
- (6) Indecent assault if such crime or offence be indictable in the place where the accused or convicted person is apprehended.
- (7) Kidnapping or false imprisonment.
- (8) Child stealing, including abandoning, exposing or unlawfully detaining.
- (9) Abduction.
- (10) Procuration: that is to say the procuring or transporting of a woman or girl under age, even with her consent, for immoral purposes, or of a woman or girl over age, by fraud, threats, or compulsion, for such purposes with a view in either case to gratifying the passions of another person provided that such crime or offence is punishable by imprisonment for at least one year or by more severe punishment.
- (11) Bigamy.
- (12) Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
- (13) Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
- (14) Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
- (15) Arson.
- (16) Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny or embezzlement.
- (17) Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, or fraudulent conversion.
- (18) Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods, by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
- (19) (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.
(b) Knowingly and without lawful authority making or having in possession any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin.
- (20) Forgery, or uttering what is forged.
- (21) Crimes or offences against bankruptcy law.
- (22) Bribery, defined to be the offering, giving or receiving of bribes.
- (23) Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.
- (24) Crimes or offences or attempted crimes or offences in connection with the traffic in dangerous drugs.
- (25) Malicious injury to property, if such crime or offence be indictable.
- (26) (a) Piracy by the law of nations.
(b) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master; wrongfully sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting to do so; assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to do grievous bodily harm.
- (27) Dealing in slaves.

Extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes or offences, provided that such participation be punishable by the laws of both High Contracting Parties.

ARTICLE 4.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territories of the High Contracting Party applied to, for the crime or offence for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed should be under examination or under punishment in the territories of the High Contracting Party applied to for any other crime or offence, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE 5.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime or offence or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the High Contracting Party applying or applied to.

ARTICLE 6.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the crime or offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for a crime or offence of a political character.

ARTICLE 7.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in custody or be brought to trial in the territories of the High Contracting Party to whom the surrender has been made for any other crime or offence, or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the territories of the High Contracting Party by whom he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes or offences committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE 8.

The extradition of fugitive criminals under the provisions of this Treaty shall be carried out in the United States and in the territory of His Britannic Majesty respectively, in conformity with the laws regulating extradition for the time being in force in the territory from which the surrender of the fugitive criminal is claimed.

ARTICLE 9.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the High Contracting Party applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime or offence had been committed in the territory of such High Contracting Party, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the courts of the High Contracting Party who makes the requisition, and that the crime or offence of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the High Contracting Party applied to.

ARTICLE 10.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed within their respective jurisdictions, his extradition shall be granted to the Power whose claim is earliest in date, unless such claim is waived.

ARTICLE 11.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the High Contracting Party applied to, or the proper tribunal of such High Contracting Party, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE 12.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, and any articles that may serve as a proof of the crime or offence shall be given up when the extradition takes place, in so far as this may be permitted by the law of the High Contracting Party granting the extradition.

ARTICLE 13.

All expenses connected with the extradition shall be borne by the High Contracting Party making the application.

ARTICLE 14.

His Britannic Majesty may accede to the present Treaty on behalf of any of his Dominions hereafter named—that is to say, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State, and Newfoundland—and India. Such accession shall be effected by a notice to that effect given by the appropriate diplomatic representative of His Majesty at Washington which shall specify the authority to which the requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in the Dominion concerned, or India, as the case may be, shall be addressed. From the date when such notice comes into effect the

territory of the Dominion concerned or of India shall be deemed to be territory of His Britannic Majesty for the purposes of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of the above-mentioned Dominions or India, on behalf of which His Britannic Majesty has acceded, shall be made by the appropriate diplomatic or consular officer of the United States of America.

Either High Contracting Party may terminate this Treaty separately in respect of any of the above-mentioned Dominions or India. Such termination shall be effected by a notice given in accordance with the provisions of Article 18.

Any notice given under the first paragraph of this Article in respect of one of His Britannic Majesty's Dominions may include any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, and which is being administered by the Government of the Dominion concerned; such territory shall, if so included, be deemed to be territory of His Britannic Majesty for the purposes of the present Treaty. Any notice given under the third paragraph of this Article shall be applicable to such mandated territory.

ARTICLE 15.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any territory of His Britannic Majesty other than Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man, or the Dominions or India mentioned in Article 14 shall be made to the Governor, or chief authority, of such territory by the appropriate consular officer of the United States of America.

Such requisition shall be dealt with by the competent authorities of such territory; provided, nevertheless, that if an order for the committal of the fugitive criminal to prison to await surrender shall be made, the said Governor or chief authority may, instead of issuing a warrant for the surrender of such fugitive, refer the matter to His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

ARTICLE 16.

This Treaty shall apply in the same manner as if they were Possessions of His Britannic Majesty to the following British Protectorates, that is to say, the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Gambia Protectorate, Kenya Protectorate, Nigeria Protectorate, Northern Rhodesia, Northern Territories of the Gold Coast, Nyasaland, Sierra Leone Protectorate, Solomon Islands Protectorate, Somaliland Protectorate, Swaziland, Uganda Protectorate and Zanzibar, and to the following territories in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, that is to say, Camerouns under British mandate, Togoland under British mandate, and the Tanganyika Territory.

ARTICLE 17.

If after the signature of the present Treaty it is considered advisable to extend its provisions to any British Protectorates other than those mentioned in the preceding Article or to any British-protected State, or to any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, other than those mandated territories mentioned in Articles 14 and 16, the stipulations of Articles 14 and 15 shall be deemed to apply to such Protectorates or States or mandated territories from the date and in the manner prescribed in the notes to be exchanged for the purpose of effecting such extension.

ARTICLE 18.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

In the absence of an express provision to that effect, a notice given under the first paragraph of this Article shall not affect the operation of the Treaty as between the United States of America and any territory in respect of which notice of accession has been given under Article 14.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

On the coming into force of the present Treaty the provisions of Article 10 of the treaty of the 9th August, 1842, of the Convention of the 12th July, 1889, of the supplementary Convention of the 13th December, 1900, and of the supplementary Convention of the 12th April, 1905, relative to extradition, shall cease to have effect, save that in the case of each of the Dominions and India, mentioned in Article 14, those provisions shall remain in

force until such Dominion or India shall have acceded to the present Treaty in accordance with Article 14 until replaced by other treaty arrangements.

In faith whereof the above-named plenipotentiaries have signed the present Treaty and have affixed thereto their seals.

Done in duplicate at London this twenty-second day of December, 1931.

And whereas in accordance with the provisions of Article 18 of the said Treaty, on the coming into force thereof, the above-mentioned Conventions and the provisions of Article 10 of the treaty signed on the 9th August, 1842, between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the President of the United States of America will cease to have effect in respect of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man and all British Colonies:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) From and after the 24th day of June, 1935, the Extradition Acts, 1870–1932, shall apply in respect of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, and all British Colonies in the case of the United States of America under and in accordance with the said Treaty of the 22nd December, 1931.

(2) From and after the 24th day of June, 1935, the said Orders in Council shall be revoked in so far as they relate to the above-mentioned parts of His Majesty's dominions.

This Order may be cited as the "United States of America (Extradition) Order in Council, 1935."

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

The General by-laws relating to licences, published by Notification in the *Gazette* of October 20, 1933, are hereby amended by the omission of the by-laws under the headings "Public Bathing Places. I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence" and "II.—Regulations for Public Bathing Places," and by the substitution therefor of the following:—

PUBLIC AND LICENSED BATHING PLACES

In these by-laws—

"licensed bathing place" means any premises or place in respect of which a licence has been issued in accordance with these by-laws, authorizing the keeping of such premises or place as a bathing place for the use of the public or any section or class of the public.

“public bathing place” means any place (or any part of a licensed bathing place)—

- (a) which is now used as a place for bathing by the public or any section or class of the public, whether on payment of money or not; or
- (b) which is specially set apart by the Council, as hereinafter provided, as a bathing place for the use of the public.

PUBLIC BATHING PLACES.

1. The Council may by resolution set apart as a public bathing place the whole or any defined portion of any public place over which it has control.
2. A list of the places so set apart shall be published by the Chairman in the *Government Gazette* and proclaimed within the administrative limits of the Council by beat of tom-tom.
3. No person shall wash any animal, clothes, mats or other articles in any public bathing place within the administrative limit of the Council.
4. No person shall commit a nuisance by obeying a call of nature at or near any public bathing place, except in a latrine provided for that purpose.
5. No person suffering, or who has recently suffered, from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall bathe or wash in, or in any way use the water of any public bathing place, unless such water is drawn for such person by some healthy person and carried for use to a safe distance from such bathing place.

LICENSED BATHING PLACES.

1.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a licensed bathing place unless he shall satisfy the Chairman that the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions :—

- (1) That the bathing place is located in a sufficiently secluded spot or is screened from public view.
- (2) That a portion of the premises is suitably screened off for the exclusive use of women and children.
- (3) That the water used is obtained from the public water supply where such exists, or where the bathing place is served by a well—
 - (a) That the well is provided with a protecting wall at least 2 feet high all round, or, if there is no wall, that it is constructed in such a way that none of the water drawn for bathing can find its way back into the well;
 - (b) That the ground immediately surrounding such well is sloped and paved or concreted, so as to allow the water to run into a leadaway drain of a sufficient length to prevent any percolation of dirty water into the well.

2.—Regulations for Licensed Bathing Places.

1. Every licensee of a licensed bathing place shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position outside his premises a board with his name and the words “Licensed Bathing Place” legibly painted thereon in the English and vernacular languages.
2. Every licensee of a licensed bathing place shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises, and he shall cause a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be at all times kept in the licensed premises, so as to be available for inspection.
3. (a) If tubs are used in a licensed bathing place the licensee of such bathing place shall cause them to be cleaned daily and painted twice annually in June and December.
- (b) If cemented cisterns are used he shall cause them to be kept in good repair and cleaned daily.
- (c) If a large tank or bath is used he shall cause the water to be frequently changed so that it does not become offensive or unfit for human bathing.
4. Every licensee of a licensed bathing place shall cause every part of such bathing place, its surroundings, drains, and equipment to be kept clean and in good repair.
5. No person suffering from or who has recently suffered from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person

suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash in, or in any way use the water of any licensed bathing place, unless such water shall be drawn for such person by some healthy person and carried for use to a safe distance from such bathing place.

6. Whenever a licensed bathing place is served by a well, no person shall use such well for washing cattle or any other animals, or mats, or any other things, or any clothes, except those worn at the time of bathing, and if such clothes be slapped upon a stone or otherwise beaten this shall be done at such distance from the well that the splash therefrom cannot fall into the well.

7. No person shall commit a nuisance by obeying a call of nature at or near any licensed bathing place, except in a latrine provided for such purpose.

8. (e) On the expiration of the scholarship or in the event of the Scholarship being terminated owing to ill-health or for any other reason, the holder shall return to Ceylon as and when required by the Honourable the Chief Secretary.

(f) The grant of the Scholarship will not necessarily entitle the scholar, on completion of his course, to be appointed to the post of Inspector of Mines. He will, however, be required to give an undertaking that after completion of his training in Dhanbad, he will return to Ceylon, as and when required by the Honourable the Chief Secretary, to whom he will report himself on his return to Ceylon, and, if so required, will serve for a term of 7 years in any post under the Ceylon Government, provided that nothing in this rule shall require the holder to accept a post carrying an initial salary of less than Rs. 225 per mensem.

3. Subject to due compliance with the above conditions the Ceylon Government will pay—

- (i) all tuition fees, examination fees, &c., payable to the school,
- (ii) the cost of text-books, and instruments necessary for the course, as recommended by the Principal of the School,
- (iii) the expenses, at second class rates, of the journey to Dhanbad to take up the course and of the return journey to Ceylon on termination of the full course or on the prior termination of the scholarship on account of ill-health or other cause,
- (iv) an allowance for the living expenses of the scholar not exceeding Rs. 960 per annum,
- (v) medical expenses recommended by the Principal of the School up to a limit of Rs. 750 for the whole period of 2 years.

4. The scholar's father or guardian and the scholar will be required to enter into a bond to pay to the Ceylon Government, jointly and severally, in the event of breach of conditions (e) and (f) of paragraph 2 above, or the prior termination of the Scholarship under condition (d)—

- (1) all expenses incurred by the Ceylon Government in connection with the training of the scholar,
- (2) an additional sum to be decided on by the Honourable the Chief Secretary, not exceeding Rs. 2,000 if the Scholarship is terminated before November 1, 1936, or Rs. 4,000 if the Scholarship is terminated after that date,
- (3) medical expenses of the scholar up to a limit of Rs. 750 beyond the sum of Rs. 750 to be paid by the Ceylon Government under paragraph 3 (v.) above.

5. Applications for the Scholarship will be received by me up to 12 noon on Saturday, September 14, 1935. Candidates may forward copies of not more than six certificates of character.

The Chairman thanked Mr. A. E. Goonesinha and the other Members of the Council.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committees be adopted.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

(13) To consider the recommendation of the Library Committee that Mr. Walter Dias be placed on a suitable scale of salary as Ist Assistant Librarian and that he be required to give up his work at the Garden Club. Registered No. 1,352.—Recommended that Mr. Walter Dias be placed in scale 6 of the 1924 Salary Scheme on the maximum of Rs. 3,180 a year with effect from the date he gives up his work at the Garden Club.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha moved that Mr. Walter Dias be placed in scale 4 of the 1924 Salary Scheme on the step of Rs. 3,600 a year. Mr. M. L. M. Reyal seconded.

The Chairman explained the reasons which prompted the Members of the Four Standing Committees to place Mr. Dias on the maximum of scale 6, i.e., Rs. 3,180 a year.

Mr. Aelian W. Pereria moved, as an amendment, that Mr. Dias be placed on the maximum of scale 5, viz., Rs. 3,684 a year. Mr. A. R. A. Razik seconded.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha withdrew his motion, with the permission of the seconder.

The amendment of Mr. Aelian W. Pereira then became the substantive motion.

Mr. C. F. Whitaker also spoke.

The amendment of Mr. Aelian W. Pereira which has become the substantive motion was put to the meeting and lost.

The Chairman thereupon put the recommendation of the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) to the meeting and carried

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

(16) To consider a memorandum of the Medical Officer of Health, dated June 25, 1935, suggesting that tenders be called for from the Registered Eating-house keepers for the supply of cooked provisions for Municipal Maternity Homes. The Municipal Treasurer approves of the above suggestion. Registered No. 1,376.—Recommended.

GENERAL.

(18) To consider a letter, dated June 21, 1935, the from Honorary Secretary, British Medical Association (Ceylon Branch), suggesting that a civic reception be accorded to the representatives and delegates from Great Britain to the Annual Meeting of the British Medical Association, to be held at Melbourne, who will be passing through Colombo on October 16, 1935. Registered No. 1,357.—Recommended that the delegates be welcomed at the Jetty by the Chairman and Members of Council.

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of June 26, 1935, were considered.

MUNICIPAL TREASURER'S DEPARTMENT.

(27) To reconsider :—(a) A petition dated March 25, 1934, from James Appu and others of Borella Market praying that the sale of vegetables in private premises be prohibited. (b) Reports thereon of the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health and the Municipal Treasurer. Registered No. 1,195.—Recommended that the sale of fruits and vegetables within a radius of half a mile from any Municipal Market be prohibited and that by-law No. 9 of Chapter XIII of the Municipal Council By-laws be amended by the insertion of the words "or fruits or vegetables" between the words "offal" and "in" in line two thereof and also between the words "fish" and "except" in line 9 thereof.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha opposed the recommendation of the Standing Committee and moved that the matter be referred to the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) for consideration and report.—Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando seconded.

The Chairman explained facts and stated that he has no objection to the matter being referred to the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) and accepted the motion of Mr. A. E. Goonesinha.—The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

(28) To consider :—(a) A letter dated April 18, 1935, from the Empire Frozen Produce Co., Ltd., applying for a licence to sell frozen meat and fish at premises No. 215, Colpetty road. (b) Reports thereon of the Medical Officer of Health and the Municipal Treasurer stating that there is no objection from a sanitary point of view and that sanction of Council is necessary to issue the licence as the premises are within the market area. Registered No. 1,221.—Recommended.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

(30) With reference to the resolution of Council of May 15, 1935, sanctioning the purchase of 62 lb. of quinine from Messrs. Miller & Co., Ltd., to consider a report of the Medical Officer of Health, dated May 24, 1935, stating that Messrs. Miller & Co., Ltd., reports that they are unable to supply the quinine which is urgently required, and requesting sanction of Council to purchase the 62 lb. of quinine from the Central Medical Stores, at Rs. 25·50 per lb. *Note.*—The total cost of the 62 lb. of quinine will be Rs. 1,581. Registered No. 821.—Recommended.

(32) To consider :—(a) An application, dated May 21, 1935, from the Acting City Microbiologist, stating that he has been requested to conduct lectures and practical classes in Bacteriology at the Medical College from the 24th instant; 20 lectures of an hour's duration each on Mondays and Fridays from 2 to 3 P.M., at a remuneration of Rs. 200 for the whole course and requisits permission to do so as he has conducted these lectures in the past when he was Bacteriologist at the Government Institute. (b) Reports thereon of the Municipal Treasurer. Registered No. 1,137.—Recommended that the application be allowed subject to the usual condition, *i.e.*, as the fee exceeds Rs. 100 half the fee to be credited to Council.

3. The Chairman moved in Committee—That the Council do resume. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

4. The Chairman formally moved in Council that the resolutions of Council in Committee, and the recommendations of the various Committee, subject to any amendments of such recommendations by the Council in Committee, be adopted. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved, as an amendment, that the Chairman's motion be adopted, subject to the exclusion of item No. 31 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Finance Committee of June 19, 1935, which should be referred to the Four Standing Committees (meeting together) for consideration and report. Mr. A. E. Goonesinha seconded.

The amendment was put to the meeting and lost.

The motion of the Chairman was thereupon put to the meeting and carried.

KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on July 20, 1935, at 8.45 a.m., in accordance with the Notice dated July 16, 1935.

Present :—Mr. T. A. Hodson, Chairman; Ratwatte Adigar; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. W. Beven; Mr. O. T. Nettleton; Dr. D. T. de Kretser.

Before proceeding with the business of the meeting the Chairman moved—“That this Council place on record its sense of loss caused by the death of Mr. D. M. de S. Abhayanayake, who rendered valuable service to the town as a Member of Council since his election in October, 1934, and that an expression of its sympathy be conveyed to the widow and children in their sad bereavement”. Ratwatte Adigar seconded. The motion was passed all Members standing.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on June 15, 1935, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ended July 20, 1935.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of “The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910” be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—(a) Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during June, 1935. (b) Report from the Municipal Engineer on the condition of the various drives in Kandy.

4. Petitions :—Ratwatte Adigar presented—(1) petition signed by Mr. D. B. Mavilmade and several other villagers praying that the paddy fields in Mavilmada, Siyambalagastenne, Nitawala and Watapuluwa be exempted from liability to rates as the crops had failed and that the Distraining Officers be ordered not to harass them. (2) Petition signed by Chandra Joti Thero and several villagers of Mavilmada dated July 19, 1935, suggesting that the construction of a tank for the purpose of irrigating paddy fields in Mavilmada be undertaken as a relief work.

Resolved that (1) be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report, and (2) to the Municipal Engineer for report.

5. Pursuant to notice Ratwatte Adigar moved :—“That Government be asked to prepare detail plans and estimates in connection with the Hunasgiriya Water Scheme”. Mr. Soysa seconded. Mr. de Silva offered comments.

Mr. Wijayatilake moved as an amendment :—“That Government be written to inquiring what contribution the Council could expect from Government in the event of the Council undertaking a Major Water Scheme”. Mr. Usoof Ismail seconded.

The Chairman observed that it was advisable to wait until the Minor (River) Pumping Scheme now under construction is completed and given a fair trial, and suggested the withdrawal of both the motion and the amendment.

They were accordingly withdrawn.

6. Chairman's Administration Report for the year 1934—tabled.

7. Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects held on June 15, 1935.

(1) To consider the question of levying a fee of 50 cents per mensem from meat stall holders outside the public market under by-laws 61 and 63.—Recommended that this fee be not charged this year, but that the payment of this fee, viz., Rs. 6 per year, in advance, be insisted on as a condition precedent to the renewal of licence for 1936 and thereafter.

(2) Memo from the Accountant dated June 9, 1935, stating that a large number of buildings are now exempted from taxation on the ground that they are used for religious purposes, and to consider whether such buildings are entitled to free water supply. The Law Committee by 3 to 1 being of opinion that buildings exempted from payment of rates are not entitled to free water supply recommend the installation of meters to limit this free supply and the passing of a by-law for charging for water in excess of the free supply : meter rent to be charged. (Mr. de Silva dissents.)

(3) To approve of the insertion of an additional clause in the licence issued to bakeries and eating houses restricting the hours during which gramophones, radio, &c., can be played.—Recommended.

(4) Papers relating to the registration of property owners' names in the assessment register.

Resolved to recommend legislation to make the registration of owners' names compulsory.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation held on June 15, 1935.

(5) Application dated May 13, 1935, from J. M. Pakeer Mohamedu stating that his father, Mr. J. Mohideen Batcha, who was the licensee of stall No. 9, Public Market, died on April 18 last, and requesting that the licence of the stall be issued in his favour.—Recommended.

(6) Letter dated March 8, 1935, from Mr. S. M. Abdul Majeed applying for the transfer of half share of Fish Stall No. 67, till recently held by the Ceylon Fisheries, Ltd., in his favour.—Recommended.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment held on June 15, 1935.

(7) To obtain sanction for the outright sale of the undermentioned properties in which temple interests are involved immediately after vesting, and to entrust the sale to Messrs. Schokman & Samarawickrema, and Jonklaas & Ludocivi, Licensed Auctioneers :—Aruppola, 4, 7, 19, 35, 36, 43, 44, 64. Deyannawela road, 38F, 98, 98c, 100, 100B, 101A, 102c, 102D, 102c. Galagedera road, 75/8, 75/9, 75/13, 75/14. Yatinuwera Talwatta, 20, 27, 28A, 30A.—Recommended.

(8) To obtain sanction for payment to the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon of a special travelling allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem from December 19 to February, 28, 1935; and Rs. 25 thereafter for the use of his car for the daily visits to various Malaria Relief Centres.—Recommended special travelling allowance of Rs. 35 from December 19, 1934, to February 28, 1935; and Rs. 17.50 thereafter.

(9) To sanction the payment of additional compensation of Rs. 30 to Miss M. S. Fernando for her house on Municipal land at the head of the lake, which was demolished at the instance of the Council.—Recommended.

(10) To obtain sanction for the write off of a sum of Rs. 120.03 being arrears of rates due on premises Nos. 393, 394, 395/97 and 398, Peradeniya road which were sold and bought by the Council.—Recommended.

(11) To obtain sanction for the write off of a sum of Rs. 83.90 being rates and costs due on premises No. 34, Deyannawela, for the period 2nd quarter 1921, to 2nd quarter 1932, which has been acquired by Council for the construction of model tenements.—Recommended.

(12) To obtain sanction for the write off of a sum of Rs. 20.94 shown in error in the books as due on account of rates on premises No. 26 on road between Peradeniya road and Primrose Hill.—Recommended.

(13) To obtain sanction for the write off of a sum of Rs. 5,402.37 being irrecoverable conservancy bucket fees for the year 1933.—Recommended.

Extract from the Minutes of the Special Meeting of the Finance Committee held on June 26, 1935.

(14) Statements of overtime paid to Municipal Officers and servants during 12 months ended May 31, 1935, were tabled.—Recommended—(i.) that minor employees rated at annual and monthly salaries (*i.e.*, peons and labourers and other employees whose salaries do not exceed the peons' scale) and daily-paid employees be not regarded as coming within the scope of the resolution of June 15, 1935; (ii.) that the principle recognized by the Council in resolutions Nos. 5 (6) of September 15, 1934, and 8 (10) of November 17, 1934, on the subject of acting pay given to officers on the footing of overtime for performing the duties of an absent officer after one month's acting without overtime, be not regarded as over-ruled by the resolution of June 15, 1935, provided that the acting pay does not exceed half the initial salary of the absent officer; (iii.) that from and after July 1, 1935, records be kept of overtime done by Waterworks Inspectors and submitted to Council in due course for consideration with a view to grant of bonuses in lieu of overtime; (iv.) that the extra hours of work now devolving on some of the Waterworks Inspectors be distributed as equitably as possible among all the Waterworks Inspectors; (v.) that in order to relieve the pressure put on the Waterworks Inspectors at present, the plumber be employed as an additional Waterworks Inspector temporarily on his own pay, and a temporary man be engaged in place of the plumber on a pay of Rs. 40 per mensem; (vi.) that from and after July 1, 1935, records be kept of overtime done by the workmen of the Electricity Department who are in receipt of monthly pay above the scale of minor employees, and brought up in due course for Council's consideration with a view to grant of bonuses.

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works held on June 15, 1935.

(15) Estimate for Rs. 75 from the Municipal Engineer for improvements to the road leading to Pata Hewahetta Talwatte.—Recommended.

Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Electricity Committee held on June 15, 1935.

(16) Estimate for Rs. 50 from the Municipal Electrical Engineer for carrying out repairs to the quarters occupied by the Head Wireman of the Katugastota sub-station, under item 4 (a) Generation of Electricity—Repairs and Maintenance of Buildings.—Recommended.

Resolution of Council on the Standing Committee recommendations.

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted substituting Rs. 25 for Rs. 17.50 in item No. 7 (8).

8. Nine tenders received for the erection of a reinforced concrete storage tank of 250,000 gallons capacity for the Minor (River) Pumping Scheme. (W/PW 45.)

Council moved into Committee to consider the tenders.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Resolved that the work be entrusted to Mr. Ponweera at the figures tendered by Mr. Suwaris, viz., Rs. 24,842.80, and if refused by him it be given to Mr. Suwaris.

The Council resumed and the resolution made in Committee was adopted.

9. Chairman's memo. of June 27, 1935, explaining why a contract system is not practicable in regard to the removal of silt from the lake. (G 148.)—Tabled.

10. Letter from the Government Agent, Central Province, No. VC 6266 of June 20, 1935, stating that (a) Gonawatta ferry should be made over to the Village Committee of Gandaha North in Pata Hewahetta; and (b) Illukmodera-Kundasale ferry to the Village Committee in Udagampaha in Pata Dumbara.

Resolved that in terms of section 130 (3) of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910" as amended by Ordinance No. 8 of 1935, the Council make over (a) the toll in respect of the ferry at Gonawatta to the Village Committee of Gandaha North in Pata Hewahetta; and (b) the toll in respect of the ferry at Illukmodera-Kundasale to the Village Committee of Udagampaha in Pata Hewahetta, with effect from July 1, 1935.

11. Application from the Municipal Engineer for a supplementary vote of Rs. 7,245 for distribution of water by cart and lorry.

Resolved to sanction the vote and to reduce the lorries now employed by one.

12. To sanction the establishment of Rickshaw Stands as follows:—(1) Stand on west side of Brownrigg street lying to the north of its junction with Cross street for rickshaws not exceeding six in number. (2) Stands on the south side of King street lying between its junctions with Brownrigg street and Back lane for rickshaws not exceeding three in number.

Resolved to establish stands accordingly.
