The by-laws made by the Kandy Municipal Council under sections 109 and 110 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910, and published in the *Gazette* of November 15, 1929, as last amended by Proclamation in the *Gazette* of February 3, 1933, are hereby further amended—

(1) by the substitution, for paragraph (a) of by-law 297, of the following new paragraph:—

"(a) No person shall within the limits of the Council keep any bakery or eating house without an annual licence from the Chairman, which licence the Chairman shall issue to all persons complying with the conditions provided for the issue of such licence: Provided however that it shall be lawful for the Chairman to refuse to issue a licence for a bakery or eating house within any area which the Council has by resolution declared to be a residential area. Every such licence shall remain in force until December thirty-first of the year in respect of which such licence is issued unless such licence shall have been previously cancelled as provided in paragraphs (i) and (j) of this by-law"; and

(2) in by-law 300—

(a) by the substitution for paragraph (2) of the following new paragraph :—

“(2) That the walls of every room in every part are not less than seven feet in height and are built or made of brick, stone, cabook, or any other material which the Chairman may in his discretion consider suitable ; and the inside surface of every such wall is lime plastered and lime washed or oil painted to the satisfaction of the Chairman.”

(b) by the substitution, for paragraph (6) of the following new paragraph :—

“(6) That the ground floor is cemented throughout.”

## Rules.

## 1.—PRELIMINARY.

1. *Short Title.*—These rules may be cited as the Petroleum (Minor Installations and Transport) Rules, 1935.

2. *Date.*—These rules shall come into operation from and after the First day of January, 1936, and the rules published in the *Government Gazettes* dated September 28, 1900, April 8, 1921, and May 21, 1926, shall from the said date be repealed. Rules dated September 3, 1924, published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,413 dated September 5, 1924, shall also be repealed from the same date in so far as the provisions therein do not apply to major installations including the measuring tanks depot at Bloemendahl.

3. *Definitions.*—(a) Such of the words and expressions used in these rules as are defined in the Ordinance shall have in these rules the meanings respectively assigned to them by the Ordinance.

(b) In these rules—

“Ordinary Petroleum” means petroleum with a flashing point of and above 73°F Abel close test and below 150°F Pensky Marten’s close test.

“Petroleum in bulk” means petroleum in quantities exceeding sixty-five gallons contained in any one vessel or receptacle.

“Installation” means a place specially prepared for the storage of petroleum in bulk, non-bulk or for bulk combined with non-bulk storage, and may be either a major or minor installation.

“Major Installation” means an installation—

(1) capable of containing an amount of petroleum, whether in bulk, non-bulk or in combined bulk and non-bulk storage, exceeding fifty thousand gallons, or (2) in which tin making operations are carried on in addition to storage of petroleum.

“Minor Installation” means an installation—

(1) capable of containing an amount of petroleum, whether in bulk, non-bulk or in combined bulk and non-bulk storage, not exceeding fifty thousand gallons, and

(2) in which no tin making operations are carried on.

“Storage Shed” shall include “filling shed” and means a building used for the storage of petroleum otherwise than in bulk.

“Filling Shed” means a building used solely for the purposes of the filling of metal vessels with petroleum, and the storage of the same in properly sealed vessels, such as comply with the requirements of the rules framed in accordance with these rules under section 15 of the Petroleum Ordinance.

“Filling Bay” means an area used solely for the purpose of filling with petroleum licensed distributing vehicles.

“Protected Works” means and includes buildings in which persons dwell or assemble, docks, wharves, timber yards, running lines, other petroleum stores, and any other place not forming part of an installation which the Governor may by notification declare as such.

“Running Lines” means any main railways or loops over which trains pass when proceeding from station to station and do not include storage or shunting sidings.

“Closed System of Discharging” means a system of discharging whereby the gases from a tank which is being filled are passed by pipes to the tank which is being emptied, so that none of the gases can escape into the air.

“Tank Wagon” means railway tank wagons which are specially constructed for the conveyance of petroleum in bulk.

“Tank Lorry” means a vehicle which is mechanically propelled and is specially constructed for the conveyance of petroleum in bulk.

“Tank Cart” means a vehicle which is drawn by hand or by animals and is specially constructed for the conveyance of petroleum in bulk.

## 2.—REGULATIONS FOR THE STORAGE OF PETROLEUM.

1. The possession of petroleum with a flashing point of 150°F and over will not be subject to control.

2. The storage shed or sheds in the installation shall be constructed of masonry or other non-inflammable materials with concrete or tiled or paved or earthen floors, but the beams, rafters, columns, windows, and doors may be of wood.

3. In the case of all storage or filling sheds either (a) the doorways and other openings of the building shall be built up to a height of 2 feet above the level of the ground outside it, or the floor sunk to a depth of 2 feet below the ground, so that the petroleum cannot flow out from the building in case of its escape from the receptacles in which it is contained, or (b) the building itself shall be surrounded with a masonry wall or embankment (or both) not less than 2 feet high. When the quantity of petroleum stored exceeds 16,000 gallons, the height or depth shall be 3 feet. A combination of these methods is permissible, but the total height and depth is not to exceed three feet. In any case the safety space so formed must be sufficient to contain the total licensed capacity of storage shed or filling shed.

4. Where there are any pipes or openings for draining out water in any enclosure, arrangements shall be made whereby they can be closed, and they shall only be kept open when actually necessary for drainage purposes. It must be possible to operate the means of closing the pipes or openings from outside the enclosure.

5. Petroleum tanks shall be constructed of mild steel plates properly welded or rivetted together and caulked and designed according to sound engineering practice.

6. Every tank or other receptacle for the storage of petroleum in bulk, except a tank or receptacle which is not of sufficient capacity to contain ten thousand gallons of petroleum and which is so situated as not to be liable to cause danger in the event of the petroleum being ignited, shall be efficiently earthed.

*Explanation:* A tank or receptacle shall be deemed to be so situated as not to be liable to cause danger in the event of the petroleum being ignited, if it is not in close proximity to any other tank or receptacle, or to any building not forming part of the installation and if it is surrounded by a wall, or embankment, or sunk in an excavation the enclosure thus formed being sufficient to contain the whole contents of the tank or receptacle with an addition of ten per cent. in the case of dangerous petroleum.

7. Every tank containing petroleum in bulk shall either be separately surrounded by a wall or embankment of substantial construction, or shall be entirely sunk in an excavation. The enclosure thus formed shall be of dimensions sufficient to contain the total quantity of petroleum capable of being contained in the tank or tanks, and where dangerous petroleum is stored packed in a storage shed within the same perimeter the dimensions should be increased by ten per cent., and the walls or embankments should be so constructed as to prevent the escape therefrom of any oil in the form of liquid whether under the action of fire or otherwise. The space enclosed by such wall or excavation and not occupied by the tanks shall be kept entirely clear and unoccupied. All dangerous petroleum in bulk stored in minor installations shall be stored in underground tanks with their upper surface at least 12 inches below ground level and covered and rammed round with earth or other suitable materials at least 12 inches in thickness. On opening up the ground should the sides and foundations be found unsuitable for the reception of the tank, a pit of masonry or concrete must be built and the tank laid therein and securely strapped down if necessary, the pit being afterwards filled and covered with an approved filling material and the upper surface covered with rammed earth or other suitable material at least 12 inches in thickness. The entire installation shall be surrounded by a masonry wall or embankment or a combination of these forming an enclosure of dimensions sufficient to contain and prevent the overflow of all the oil that may be stored at any one time within such walls, or embankments. Underground tanks must be examined periodically to see that they are staunch and not likely to leak.

8. (a) Dangerous petroleum otherwise than in bulk shall be packed in gas-tight, tinned, or galvanized sheet iron, steel or lead plate receptacles containing each not more than 65 gallons and fitted with well-made screwed bungs or faucet bodies and faucet caps. The screwed bungs or the faucet caps as the case may be shall be fitted with suitable jointing material to ensure that no leakage can take place. Such receptacle for the purpose of transport shall be contained in strong wooden cases, the thickness of the wood to be not less than three-eighths of an inch: provided that wooden cases shall not be necessary



when the receptacles are made of tinned or galvanized sheet iron or steel, and have the following thickness of metal :—

	Not less than
1. When the capacity does not exceed 2 gallons ..	27 B. W. G.
2. When the capacity exceeds 2 gallons, but does not exceed 4 gallons ..	22 B. W. G.
3. When the capacity exceeds 4 gallons, but does not exceed 8 gallons ..	20 B. W. G.
4. When the capacity exceeds 8 gallons, but does not exceed 20 gallons ..	16 B. W. G.
5. When the capacity exceeds 20 gallons, but does not exceed 30 gallons ..	14 B. W. G.

(b) An air space of at least one-twentieth of its capacity shall be left in each receptacle at the time of filling.

(c) The receptacles shall be so substantially constructed and secured as not to be liable except under circumstances of grave negligence or extraordinary accident to be broken or become defective, leaky, or insecure.

(d) All receptacles shall bear the name of the importer and the nature of the contents thereof with the addition of the words "highly inflammable".

(e) Any receptacle before being repaired, shall be cleared of all dangerous petroleum and of all dangerous vapours arising from the same.

(f) All due precautions shall be taken for the prevention of unauthorized persons having access to any dangerous petroleum kept, and to receptacles containing or having actually contained the same.

(g) Every person managing, or employed on or in connection with the storage shed shall abstain from any act whatever not being reasonably necessary for a lawful purpose which tends to cause fire or explosion, and shall prevent any other person from doing such act.

(h) The drum or other receptacle containing dangerous petroleum shall only be opened on the licensed premises at or immediately adjoining the storage shed and for the time necessary for drawing off the petroleum, and during such drawing off every reasonable precaution shall be adopted for preventing the escape of dangerous petroleum or the vapour therefrom.

9. The capacity in gallons of every tank other than buried tanks in an installation shall be conspicuously marked on it, and shall be calculated for this purpose at the rate of 6.25 gallons per cubic foot.

10. The distance to be kept clear between a tank and the walls or embankments which surround it shall be, measuring from the ground level—

(a) for horizontal tanks, not less than one-third height of the tank ;

(b) for perpendicular tanks, not less than one-half the height of the tank ;

(c) Any tank or tanks containing dangerous petroleum in bulk in a minor installation to be surrounded by a corrugated iron fence, or masonry, concrete or brick wall, not less than 7 ft. 6 in. high and not less than 5 feet from the nearest part of any tank, except in special cases where the local authority may allow this limit to be reduced to 3 feet.

11. The height of walls and embankments, referred to in 10 (a) and (b) to be not less than 2 ft. 6 in. from the ground level.

12. The following distances shall be kept clear between protected works not forming part of the installation and the enclosure walls or embankments :—

Where the number of Gallons stored is :	Distance to be kept clear :
Over 500 and up to 5,000 ..	Not less than 15 feet
Over 5,000 and up to 50,000 ..	Not less than 20 feet

When any quantity of dangerous petroleum in bulk is stored in tanks in a minor installation, the distance to be kept clear shall be 200 feet, except in the case of running lines, where it shall be 30 feet.

Provided that in the case of minor installations belonging to separate companies the local authority could waive the safety distance between such installations, provided that the company concerned applied for the concession and that the total amount of all products of petroleum so stored in any such combination of minor installations should not exceed 100,000 gallons.

13. The ground in the interior of an installation shall be kept clean and free from goods of a combustible nature, vegetation, and rubbish.

14. No smoking, lighting of matches and the carrying of unprotected lights shall be permitted, and no inflammable goods of any kind, except petroleum or other inflammable

and packing materials used in connection therewith, shall be stored inside any installation or storage shed. Notices in English and the vernaculars prohibiting smoking, lighting of matches and the carrying of unprotected lights must be provided and fixed in prominent positions in and about the premises.

All operations within any installation or storage shed shall be conducted under the supervision of a responsible agent or supervisor.

15. No installation or storage shed shall be open and no work in any installation or storage shed shall be permitted between sunset and sunrise ; provided that in cases where electric lighting is installed in accordance with the "Instructions for Electric Wiring in Service Stations and Minor Installations" contained in Schedule III. to these rules, night working may be permitted by the local authority.

16. (i.) Soldering shall only be permitted in a separate room or building placed not less than 30 feet from any place where dangerous petroleum is stored or handled. No more tins shall be allowed in the soldering room at any one time than are necessary for expeditious working.

(ii.) (a) Filling of cans, drums, or other receptacles must be carried out in specially constructed filling sheds.

(b) For the purpose of determining the size of the filling shed, the internal measurements to the level of the eaves must provide for not less than four cubic feet of air space for every gallon of dangerous petroleum to be kept in the shed.

(c) Receptacles must be filled only from an approved filling machine fitted with a service tank connected with the main storage tank by a pipe line and supplied under seal. The filling machine and service tank must both be situated within the filling shed.

17. No fire or lights, except those necessary in the soldering room, and as permitted by rule 15 shall be permitted.

18. Due precautions shall at all times be taken for the prevention of accident from fire, and a quantity of sand (not less than 1 ton) must be kept adjacent to the premises in covered iron receptacles which will keep it dry at all times, and from which it can be removed in case of fire by means of a scoop or buckets provided for the purpose. Fire buckets filled with sand must also be hung in convenient positions within the premises or chemical extinguishers provided of approved make.

19. Not less than once in every year the licensee shall cause tests to be made to ensure that the tanks are efficiently earthed.

20. Any officer appointed by the local authority may enter any installation for the purpose of inspecting the same or of satisfying himself that the tanks are efficiently earthed.

### 3.—REGULATIONS FOR THE TRANSPORT OF PETROLEUM.

1. The transport of fuel oil with a flashing point of 150°F or over will not be subject to control.

2. Transport in packages should be allowed only in properly constructed and sealed receptacles. Where a quantity in excess of 50 gallons is being transported by lorry or bullock cart the vehicle will be required to display a red flag.

3. The following rules must be observed when filling or emptying tank wagons :—

(a) When tank wagons are to be filled from tank lorries, the engine of the lorry must be brought to a dead stop before covers are removed or any valves are opened. All pipe connections must be securely made and the lorry tank efficiently earthed before any valves are opened.

(b) If the petroleum be not discharged under the Closed System, a distance of 60 feet from the filling point must be kept clear in each direction and roped off, and red flags exhibited. Where petroleum is discharged under the Closed System the distance may be reduced to not less than 20 feet at the joint discretion of the General Manager of the Railway and the local authority, but watchers must be provided by the installation authorities to prevent unauthorized persons from coming within the danger zone.

(c) When discharging operations are completed the lids, valves, inlets and outlets of the tank wagon and the tank lorry must be closed and made gas-tight before any connections are broken or the roped enclosure is removed. This procedure must be repeated each time the contents of a tank lorry are discharged into the tank wagons.

Provided, however, that only in cases of emergency shall dangerous petroleum be transferred from one tank wagon into another tank wagon or tank lorry. In such cases before the operation of transfer is commenced red flags must be placed at a distance of 50 feet from the ends

and outer sides of the wagon or wagons. Such transfer shall be made only if the adjacent sidings or running lines are clear of locomotives up to a distance of 30 feet; and no locomotive shall be allowed to enter into or pass this area (danger zone) during the operation of transfer.

(d) Filling of tank wagons from other tank wagons must be carried out under the "Closed System."

(e) Emptying of tank wagons must be performed in daylight only. The Station Master must be advised before pumping commences and red flags must be placed by the installation authorities upon the tank wagons in a conspicuous position until the operation is completed, and the tank wagon is sealed up again. Watchers must be provided by the installation authorities to prevent unauthorized persons from coming within the danger zone during the process of discharging the dangerous petroleum from the Railway tank wagon to the storage tank. Tank wagons must not be emptied within 60 feet of a flame or furnace nor within 60 feet of any spot on which the wagon would be exposed to sparks. Where the closed system of discharging a tank wagon is used, the safety distance shall be 30 feet. Provided always that if in the joint opinion of the General Manager of the Railway and the local authority conditions are such that this distance cannot be observed or if special conditions obtain which would warrant a reduction or if special precautions approved jointly by the General Manager of the Railway and the local authority are taken this distance may be reduced to 20 feet.

(f) The lid and all inlets and all outlets of the tank wagon must be properly secured and made gas-tight before discharging is commenced and both the tank wagon and storage tank must be similarly secured after discharging is completed.

(g) The tank wagon manhole may be opened, prior to discharge for the purpose of ascertaining the dip and temperature of the wagon contents, after which the manhole shall be closed and shall not be reopened until the wagon is discharged, except under exceptional circumstances preventing the discharge of petroleum.

(h) All pipe connections shall be securely made and the tank wagon efficiently "earthed" before any valves on the tank wagon, main tank or pumping arrangements are opened.

(i) There shall be a continuous electrical connection from the tank wagon to the tank.

(j) In filling tank wagons or storage tanks, an air space must be left of not less than 5 per cent. of the total capacity of the tank wagon or storage tank.

(k) Filling of tank wagons must be carried out in daylight only.

4. The following rules must be observed when filling tank lorries or tank carts:—

(a) Filling of tank lorries or carts shall be carried out only in filling bays.

(b) Filling bays must not be constructed less than 30 feet from a fire or a source of sparks.

(c) Filling bays must be surrounded by a fence 7 ft. 6 in. high of corrugated iron or wall with movable doors for the ingress and egress of tank lorries. A space of not more than 6 inches may be left between ground level and bottom of the fence.

(d) No receptacles other than tank lorries or tank carts shall be filled at filling bays.

5. Any vehicle on which dangerous petroleum otherwise than in bulk is conveyed shall be constructed strongly and with sides and back of adequate height, and shall be maintained in good condition.

6. Dangerous petroleum otherwise than in bulk shall be conveyed in strong metal receptacles in good condition and securely closed so as to prevent leakage as described in rule 8 of the rules to regulate the possession and storage of all products of petroleum. The receptacles shall be packed so as not to project beyond the sides or back of the vehicle.

7. If a vehicle is mechanically driven, the engine and fuel tank thereof shall be effectively screened from the body of the vehicle by a fire-resisting shield carried up above the height of the load and down to within twelve inches of the ground, and the exhaust shall be wholly in front of this shield. A quick action cut-off valve shall be fitted to the fuel feed pipe in an easily accessible position.

Provided that in the event of a breakdown of any vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum, and of there not being any vehicle constructed in accordance with the requirements of this regulation available within reasonable time to replace it, it shall be permissible to use a vehicle not so constructed and fitted for the purpose of conveying the dangerous petroleum to its destination.

8. Not more than one trailer shall be attached to any vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum.

9. A tank vehicle used for the conveyance of dangerous petroleum shall be constructed in accordance with the

provisions contained in Schedule II. to these rules and together with its connections and fittings shall be maintained in good condition.

10. The capacity of a tank vehicle shall not exceed 2,500 gallons. If the capacity of the tank exceeds 1,500 gallons, the weight of the engine and the load shall be distributed over the three axles of a six-wheeled combination vehicle (tractor and trailer) and when the vehicle is engaged in the conveyance and delivery of dangerous petroleum it shall be constantly attended by not less than two competent persons.

Trailers shall not be employed with tank vehicles except under the following conditions:—

(i.) only four-wheeled tank trailers shall be employed and not more than one such trailer shall be attached;

(ii.) the capacity of the tank trailer shall not exceed 800 gallons;

(iii.) the tank vehicle and trailer while in use shall be constantly attended by not less than three competent persons.

The foregoing limitation on the capacity of a tank vehicle shall be constructed so as to permit of the tank containing the amount specified under varying degrees of temperature.

11. During the filling or emptying of a tank vehicle the following precautions shall be observed:—

(i.) If a vehicle is mechanically driven the engine shall be stopped the whole time the filling or emptying is proceeding and shall not be started again until all tanks have been securely closed.

(ii.) If the vehicle is animal drawn, the animals shall be removed and the wheels securely scotched before the filling or emptying is begun.

(iii.) The filling pipe shall be made of metal and where a flexible non-metal hose pipe is fitted to the end of the filling pipe the part entering the tank shall be made of brass or copper to avoid the risk of mechanical sparking and there shall be electrical continuity between the brass or copper and piece of the flexible hose and the metal of the filling pipe. The filling pipe shall be efficiently earthed.

(iv.) An efficient earth with a flexible wire connection should be provided at each position at a road tank vehicle filling bay, and every tank vehicle shall be provided with a suitable terminal or socket, electrically bonded to the metal of the tank, to which the wire from the earth can be attached.

(v.) The metal of the tank should be electrically connected to the metal of the filling pipe.

(vi.) In the case of a road tank lorry, filling should not be commenced until steps have been taken to ensure that there is no risk of sparking from any electrical equipment.

(vii.) Filling bays should, where practicable, be situated away from the main traffic route, and no possible source of ignition, including a rail or road locomotive or a running motor car, should be allowed near the filling bay whilst filling is in progress.

(viii.) An adequate supply of fire extinguishing apparatus should be provided in close proximity to the filling bay.

12. Dangerous petroleum in cans or other packages shall not be conveyed on any tank vehicle used for the conveyance of dangerous petroleum unless such composite vehicle is so constructed as to comply with the conditions applicable to conveyance of dangerous petroleum on vehicles other than tank vehicles as well as with the conditions applicable to conveyance of dangerous petroleum on tank vehicles.

13. No fire or artificial light capable of igniting inflammable vapour shall be allowed on any vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum, nor shall any explosive substance or substance or article capable of causing fire or explosion be carried on such vehicle.

14. If electric lighting is employed on any vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum, the following conditions shall be complied with:—

(i.) The pressure shall not exceed fourteen volts.

(ii.) The circuit shall be heavily insulated from the chassis and the wiring shall be so fixed and protected as to reduce as far as possible risk of damage.

(iii.) The generator, battery, switches, and fuses shall be carried in front of the fire-resisting screen when fitted and the battery shall be in an easily accessible position.

(iv.) Means of cutting off the current close to the battery by a double pole switch or other suitable method shall be provided.

15. A supply of sand or other efficient means of extinguishing an outbreak of fire shall be carried in an easily accessible position on every vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum.

16. A person while on or attending to any vehicle conveying dangerous petroleum shall not smoke.

17. Dangerous petroleum, except as prescribed in rule 23 of these rules, shall not be conveyed on any public vehicle while carrying passengers.

18. All persons engaged in the loading, unloading, or conveyance of petroleum shall observe all precautions necessary for preventing fire or explosion.

19. It shall be illegal on a highway to fill or replenish with dangerous petroleum the fuel tanks of mechanically driven vehicles direct from vehicle carrying dangerous petroleum in bulk.

20. Proper care shall be taken to prevent dangerous petroleum from escaping into any part of a house or building, or of the curtilage thereof or into a drain or sewer.

21. The owner of a vehicle used for the conveyance of dangerous petroleum, who employs any person in connection with such conveyance, shall furnish a copy of these regulations to or affix a copy thereof in some place where it can be conveniently read by any such person and shall take all other measures necessary to ensure that any such person understands and carries out the provisions of these regulations. The copy of the regulations to be so furnished or affixed should be in all three languages: English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

22. These regulations shall not apply to the conveyance of dangerous petroleum on a vehicle (not being a tank vehicle or a public vehicle used for the conveyance of passengers) in a quantity not exceeding thirty gallons of dangerous petroleum in securely closed containers of a capacity not exceeding two gallons or in securely closed metal cans or drums of a capacity not exceeding ten gallons, or in a quantity not exceeding sixty five gallons of dangerous petroleum contained in a single securely closed steel barrel.

23. The foregoing regulations do not apply to the conveyance of dangerous petroleum on any vehicle for use in the propulsion of such vehicle. Public passenger vehicles may carry a quantity not exceeding 10 two-gallon tins of dangerous petroleum in reserve.

24. Any attempt to commit any breach of these regulations shall, without prejudice to any other liability, be deemed to be an offence liable to the same punishment and forfeiture as an actual breach of the regulations.

#### 4.—LICENCES AND FEES.

##### A.—For the Possession of Petroleum.

1. Every application for a licence for the possession of petroleum in minor installations shall specify (a) the quantity of petroleum of each kind which the applicant desires to keep; (b) the name and position of the premises intended to be used for the storage of such petroleum, and whether the said premises fulfil the conditions prescribed by the forms set out in Schedule I. to these rules, as the case may be; (c) the amount of petroleum, if any, already licensed to be kept on the same premises.

If the application be made for the first time in respect of any installation, or, if the quantity of petroleum to be stored in such installation is to be increased, the application shall be accompanied by specifications and plans drawn to scale.

2. The local authority in his discretion and subject to the rules hereinbefore prescribed may grant a licence for the possession of such quantity of petroleum, not exceeding fifty thousand gallons, in a minor installation, as he thinks fit. Every such licence shall be in the appropriate form as set out in Schedule I. hereto, and shall remain in force until December 31 next following the date of issue of the licence. A separate licence shall be obtained for each separate installation.

3. The licensing authority may, for reasons to be communicated to the applicant, refuse the licence in any case.

4. Every licence granted under these rules shall contain all the particulars appearing in the form prescribed for it by these rules; provided that in the case of installations and storage sheds in existence before these rules were made, the licence may contain in lieu of the particulars contained in the form prescribed for it by these rules, either such particulars as may have been entered in the licence granted for such installation or storage shed under the rules heretofore in force, or such particulars as have been or may in each case be approved by the local authority.

5. Notwithstanding anything in any previous rule contained, a licence shall be granted by the local authority for the possession and storage of any stated quantity of

petroleum in any place specially prepared in accordance with specification and plans approved by the Governor, for the possession and storage and handling and packing of petroleum.

6. Every application for the renewal of a licence shall be made at a date not less than thirty days before the date on which the original licence expires, and, if the application is so made, the premises shall be held to be duly licensed until such date as the licensing authority issues the renewed licence, or until an intimation that the renewal of the licence is refused has been communicated to the applicant. The same fee shall be charged for the renewal of a licence as for a new licence.

7. (a) The holder of a licence may, at any time before its expiry, apply for permission to transfer it to another person. Such application shall be made to the local authority, who shall, if he approves of the transfer, enter upon the licence, an endorsement to the effect that the licence has been transferred to the person named.

(b) A fee of Re. 1 shall be charged on each such application.

(c) The person to whom the licence is so transferred shall enjoy the same powers and be subject to the same obligations under the licence as the original holder.

8. The following fees shall be charged for licences to possess petroleum in minor installations:—

9. Every licence granted under these rules shall be liable to be forfeited for any contravention of the provisions of the Ordinance, or of any rule thereunder, or of any condition contained in any such licence.

##### B.—For the Transport of Petroleum.

1. The local authority in his discretion and subject to the rules hereinbefore prescribed may grant a licence for the transport of petroleum. Every such licence shall be in the appropriate form as set out in the Schedule I. hereto and shall remain in force until December 31 next following the date of the issue of the licence. A separate licence shall be obtained in respect of each vehicle for the transport of petroleum.

2. The licensing authority may, for reasons to be communicated to the applicant, refuse the licence in any case.

3. Licences for the transport of petroleum shall be valid throughout the Island.

4. Every application for the renewal of a licence shall be made at a date not less than thirty days before the date on which the current licence expires, and if the application is so made, the vehicle for transport shall be held to be duly licensed until such date as the licensing authority issues the renewed licence, or until an intimation that the renewal of the licence is refused has been communicated to the applicant. The same fee shall be charged for the renewal of a licence as for a new licence.

5. (a) The holder of a licence may at any time before its expiry apply for permission to transfer it to another person. Such application shall be made to the local authority who shall, if he approves of the transfer, enter upon the licence, an endorsement to the effect that the licence has been transferred to the person named.

(b) A fee of Re. 1 shall be charged on each such application.

(c) The person to whom the licence is so transferred shall enjoy the same powers and be subject to the same obligations as the original holder.

6. The following fees shall be charged for licences to transport petroleum in tank lorries and tank carts:—

7. Every licence granted under these rules shall be liable to be forfeited for any contravention of the provisions of the Ordinance, or of any rule thereunder, or of any condition contained in any such licence.

8. No licence for transport shall be required when petroleum is transported in railway waggons.

*C.—For hawking Petroleum.*

1. Ordinary petroleum to be hawked shall be conveyed in a cart specially constructed for the purpose, which has been licensed in writing under the hand of the local authority for the conveyance of such petroleum, and is free from leakage.

2. The local authority in his discretion and subject to the rules hereinbefore prescribed may grant such licence for hawking ordinary petroleum. Every such licence shall in the appropriate form as set out in the Schedule I. hereto and shall remain in force until December 31 next following the date of issue of the licence. A separate licence shall be obtained in respect of each vehicle for hawking ordinary petroleum.

3. The licensing authority may, for reasons to be communicated to the applicant, refuse the licence in any case.

4. Licences for hawking ordinary petroleum shall be valid only throughout the Revenue District of the local authority.

5. Every application for the renewal of a licence shall be made at a date not less than thirty days before the date on which the current licence expires, and if the application is so made, the vehicle for hawking shall be held to be duly licensed until such date as the licensing authority issues the renewed licence or until an intimation that the renewal of the licence is refused has been communicated to the applicant. The same fee shall be charged for the renewal of a licence as for a new licence.

6. (a) The holder of a licence may, at any time before its expiry apply for permission to transfer it to another person. Such application shall be made to the local authority, who shall, if he approves of the transfer, enter upon the licence, an endorsement to the effect that the licence has been transferred to the person named.

(b) A fee of Re. 1 shall be charged on each such application.

(c) The person to whom the licence is so transferred shall enjoy the same powers and be subject to the same obligations under the licence as the original holder.

7. The licence fee for a vehicle for hawking ordinary petroleum shall be Rs. 2.50.

8. Hawking by night is absolutely prohibited.

9. The hawking of dangerous petroleum is prohibited; but the delivery of dangerous petroleum to premises licensed under the Ordinance shall not be deemed to be hawking of dangerous petroleum within the meaning of these regulations.

10. All due precaution shall be taken for the prevention of accidents by fire or explosion, and for preventing unauthorized persons having access to vessels containing the petroleum, and every person concerned in hawking the petroleum shall abstain from any act whatever which tends to cause fire or explosion, and is not reasonably necessary for the purpose of such hawking.

11. No article or substance of an explosive or inflammable character other than ordinary petroleum, nor any article liable to cause or communicate fire or explosion, shall be in the vehicle while such vehicle is being used for the purpose of hawking petroleum.

12. Every licence granted under these rules shall be liable to be forfeited for any contravention of the provisions of the Ordinance or of any rule thereunder, or of any condition contained in any such licence.

1. Dangerous petroleum shall be kept only in securely closed metal vessels, each containing not more than two gallons, which shall for the purposes of storage be kept in a properly constructed bin of concrete, stone, or brick construction, free from all leakage, and of such size as to contain only the quantity licensed: the bin to be securely closed by a strong lid which shall be properly locked and secured except when issues are being made.

2. The words "HIGHLY INFLAMMABLE" shall be conspicuously painted on the storage bin in English and the Vernaculars.

3. No other goods of any description shall be stored in or upon the storage bin.

4. No fire, furnace, or similar source of heat shall be allowed within twenty feet of the storage bin unless it is effectively protected by a wall or screen, and no artificial light capable of igniting inflammable vapour shall at any time be present in or near the store.

5. An adequate supply of dry sand shall always be kept in the premises for the purpose of extinguishing any outbreak of fire.

6. Proper means of ventilation must be provided to carry off any fumes which may accumulate either in the storage bin or the building in which this is situated.

7. Under no circumstances shall the room in which the storage bin is situated be used as a sleeping or living quarter.

## SCHEDULE II. (Rules 9 and 12, Section 3).

## A.—Mechanically driven Road Tank Lorry.

1. The vehicle, including the tank and fittings, shall be strongly constructed of fire-resisting materials and shall be maintained in thoroughly good condition. The engine and fuel tank shall be effectively screened from the tank by a fire-resisting shield carried up above the top of the tank and down to within 12 inches of the ground, and the exhaust shall be wholly in front of this shield. The shield may have a fixed glass screen only of sufficient size to enable the driver to see behind him. The tank shall be securely fastened to the frame of the vehicle, provided that in the case of a composite vehicle to which Regulation 8 applies a removable tank securely fastened to a cradle may be used. A space of not less than three inches which will be left clear and unobstructed except for any part of the framework of the wagon shall intervene between the tank and the fire resisting shield.

2. The tank if of more than 600 gallons capacity shall be divided into self-contained compartments, one of which shall contain more than 600 gallons.

3. The draw-off pipes shall be fitted with internal valves in addition to strong and secure taps and screw caps; and the taps shall be enclosed in a strong locked box of hard wood or other suitable material or shall be locked or sealed and those at the rear shall be protected by the rear cross member of the frame, such protection being extended when necessary to the lower rear portion of the tank. Where a siphon system of emptying the tank is employed, internal valves are not required.

Provided that in the case of a composite vehicle to which Regulation 8 applies, the taps of the tank, if not projecting behind the back of the vehicle, need not be enclosed in a box.

4. (a) The filling pipes (if filling is not done through the draw-off pipe) shall be carried down nearly to the bottom of the tank and shall each terminate in such a way as to provide at all times a liquid seal at the bottom of the pipe; or alternatively.

(b) The covers over the filling openings shall be kept locked or sealed except during the operation of filling.

5. The dipping pipes shall be carried down to the bottom of the tank, and any openings in them other than the upper orifice shall be covered with fine wire gauze of not less than 28 meshes to the linear inch.

6. The ventilating openings, if fitted, shall be covered with fine wire gauze of not less than 28 meshes to the linear inch, protected by covers when not in use.

## B.—Animal Drawn Road Tank Cart.

7. The vehicle, including the carriage, the tank, and the fittings, shall be strongly constructed, and the tank shall be securely fastened to the undercarriage.

The capacity of the tank shall not exceed 300 gallons with an allowance of not less than 5 per cent. for expansion of load.

The body of the tank shall be circular or elliptical in cross section and shall be constructed throughout of mild steel or iron plate not less than  $\frac{1}{8}$  in. thick with "petrol-tight" lap-welded joints.

The ends of the tank shall be of dished plates double-lap-welded to the body, or, alternatively, flat end plates may be used, provided they are welded to iron supports and double-welded to the tank shell.

A splash plate lap-welded longitudinally to the inside of the shell along its central horizontal plane shall be provided in all animal drawn road tank vehicles, sufficient openings being left at either end of such plate to allow of the free flow of the load from one side of the plate to the other.

The draw-off cocks shall be strong and "petrol-tight," closed at the outlet with brass screwed caps, and enclosed in a strong box of hard wood, or other suitable material, and fitted with good lock.

The filling orifice of the tank shall be fitted with a strong well-made screwed metal bung of ample dimensions capable of making an absolutely "gas-tight" joint when screwed down.

All tanks used for the conveyance of dangerous petroleum by road shall be capable of withstanding an internal hydraulic test pressure of 10 lb. per square inch maintained for fifteen minutes without "starting," or leaking at the joints, or showing any other signs of failure.

If ventilators are fitted to tanks, they shall be covered with fine wire gauze not less than 28 meshes to the linear inch.

When filling or discharging dangerous petroleum, the tank body must be effectively "earthed."

The vehicle as a whole shall be kept in an efficient state of repair at all times, and the surface of all wood or metal work composing it shall be adequately protected by galvanizing, painting, tarring, &c., as required.

8. The draw-off pipes shall be fitted with internal valves in addition to the draw-off cocks described in foregoing sections.

9. The ventilating openings, if fitted, shall be covered with fine wire gauze of not less than 28 meshes to the linear inch, protected by covers when not in use.

## SCHEDULE III. (See Rule 15 in Section 2.)

*Instructions for Electric Wiring in Service Stations and Minor Installations.*

1. All electric wiring shall be carried out on one of the following systems:—

(a) Rubber insulated wires in heavy screwed metal conduit; the whole of the conduit and fittings to be in strict accordance with the regulations for screwed conduit installations contained in the I. E. E. rules, 9th Edition of May, 1927.

(b) Metal sheathed or armoured wiring may be used, instead of wiring in screwed conduit, provided that the wires and method of installation comply in every respect with the requirements of the I. E. E. rules for this class of wiring in the 9th Edition of May, 1927.

2. All cables laid underground shall be lead sheathed and armoured and laid at a depth of not less than 2 ft. 6 in. These cables shall be effectively earthed and bounded on to the metal covering of the wiring of the installation. No conduits shall be allowed underground.

3. All conduits, fittings, and metal sheathing shall be efficiently earthed, so that the resistance in ohms of the earthed metal when tested to an independent earth (*e.g.*, a water pipe) shall not exceed 2 ohms.

4. Switches, fuses, and fittings shall be metal covered and water-tight, and effectively bonded to the metal covering of the wiring system.

5. All fuses must be enclosed in an iron clad water-tight and gas-tight distribution box provided with a suitable lock and seal.

6. All switches and fuses shall be fixed at least 6 feet above ground and removed as far as possible from danger of contact with petrol vapour.

7. Lamps must not be suspended by flexible conductors but must be supported rigidly and enclosed in a gas-tight fitting. No portable lamps, fans, or other fittings shall be allowed.

8. All cables and apparatus shall be constructed, installed, protected, worked, and maintained so that in the normal working thereof there shall be no risk of open sparking.

9. All motors shall be so constructed that where any part is live all rubbing contacts are so arranged as to prevent sparking.

10. The pressure shall be switched off apparatus forthwith if open sparking occurs.

11. All installations shall be examined and tested at least once in every six months and any defects immediately made good.

12. The insulation resistance of any installation shall before it is connected to the electricity supply system comply strictly with the conditions laid down in clause 127 of the I. E. E. rules, 9th Edition of May, 1927, and it shall at all times be maintained up to that standard.

13. All material used on any installation shall comply with the requirements for the highest class of work and the appropriate British Standard Specifications. All wires and cables are to have an insulation resistance of not less than 600 megohms per mile.

#### RULES.

1. These rules may be cited as the Overseas Radio Telephone Rules.

2. (1) The first unit period of conversation for an Overseas Radio Telephone call shall be three minutes, and the second and subsequent unit periods shall be one minute each, and for this purpose any interval of more than 5 seconds and less than 60 seconds shall be reckoned as one minute.

(2) There shall be no prescribed maximum period for any one call: Provided, however, that in case of pressure of traffic, calls may be limited to the first unit period only.

(3) No caller shall be permitted to engage the Overseas Radio Telephone Service for more than one call at a time to the exclusion of any other caller who may desire to use the service.

3. (1) An Overseas Radio Telephone Call may be booked not more than seven days in advance, either—

(a) as an ordinary call, that is to say, a call from any specified number to any other specified number, only the calling and the called numbers being recorded, or

(b) as a personal call, that is to say, a call from a specified person at the calling number to a specified person at the called number.

(2) A caller booking a personal call shall have the option of naming a substitute for himself and a substitute for the specified person at the called number or at any other number specified as an alternative.

(3) In the case of an ordinary call, the first unit period of conversation shall be deemed to commence at the moment when the calling number is placed in communication with the called number, and in the case of a personal call, at the moment when the caller or his named substitute is placed in communication with the called person or that person's substitute.

4. (1) The fee to be charged for an Overseas Radio Telephone Call for the first unit period of conversation shall be made up as follows:—

(a) for the section of trunk line in Ceylon up to Talaimannar, a sum of Rs. 2.90, irrespective of distance;

(b) for the section of trunk line in Submarine cable between Talaimannar in Ceylon and Rameswaram in India, a sum of Re. 1.10;

(c) for the section of trunk line and any radio service, beyond Rameswaram in India, the charges according to the Indian rates for Overseas Radio Telephone Service between India and the place outside India where the called telephone number is situated.

(2) The fee to be charged for the second and subsequent unit periods of conversation, shall be made up as follows:—

(a) for the section of trunk line in Ceylon up to Talaimannar, a sum of 90 cents, irrespective of distance;

(b) for the section of trunk line in Submarine cable between Talaimannar in Ceylon and Rameswaram in India, a sum of 40 cents;

(c) for the section of trunk line and any radio service, beyond Rameswaram in India, one-third of the charges payable under paragraph (1) (c) of this rule.

(3) (i.) The sum of the fees payable under paragraphs (1) (a) and (1) (b) of this rule or the sum of the fees payable under paragraphs (1) (a), (1) (b), (2) (a), and (2) (b) of this rule, as the case may be, shall be known as the Ceylon Regional Charge.

(ii.) The fee payable under paragraph (1) (c) of this rule or the sum of the fees payable under paragraphs (1) (c) and (2) (c) of this rule, as the case may be, shall be known as the Indian Overseas Charges.

(iii.) The total fees payable under paragraph (1) of this rule or the sum of the fees payable under paragraphs (1) and (2) of this rule, as the case may be, shall be known as the Overseas Radio Telephone Charges from Ceylon.

5. (1) In lieu of the fee specified in rule 4, a Report Charge shall be payable in respect of a personal call—

(i.) if the call is abandoned after communication has been established with the called number, and the caller or failing him, someone at his telephone, is notified that neither the called person nor that person's substitute is available to speak;

(ii.) if, at the time when the call is ready to mature with the called number, the caller or the called person is not available, or is unwilling to speak, or there is no reply from the caller or called person's telephone;

(iii.) if the called person has no telephone and arrangements were made for him to come to a specified telephone number and communication is not established owing to failure to secure his presence at such telephone number; or

(iv.) if the call is not completed on the particular day for which the call is booked and the caller does not wish to have it held over and put through on the next working day.

(2) No Report Charge shall be levied in any of the following cases:—

(i.) in the case of calls required immediately, if

(a) a report is not given to the caller within one hour of the booking of the call, or within an hour and a half in the case of any service delay reported to the caller within that hour, or

(b) by reason of any mishandling or pressure of traffic or loss or shortage of radio communication, the call is not completed within one hour after the time when both parties are reported to be available;

(ii.) in the case of calls required at any time later than the time of booking, if—

(a) a report has been given to the caller that the called person is available and the call is not completed within one hour after the latest time specified by the caller owing to any of the causes enumerated in paragraph (i.) (b) of this proviso; or

(b) the called person is reported available at a definite time and within one hour after that time no further report is received owing to any of the causes enumerated in paragraph (i.) (b) of this proviso and the call is for that reason abandoned ;

(iii.) in any case where the booking is cancelled—

(a) by the caller before a report on it has been given to him or communication is established with any person at the called number, or

(b) by the Exchange owing to service defects or unsatisfactory transmission or the prior connection of an in-coming call (called a cross-call) between the same parties.

(3) The Report Charge payable under paragraph (1) of this rule shall be made up as follows :—

(a) for the section of trunk line in Ceylon up to Talaimannar, a sum of 90 cents, irrespective of distance ;

(b) for the section of trunk line in Submarine cable between Talaimannar in Ceylon and Rameswaram in India, a sum of 40 cents ;

(c) for the section of trunk line and any radio service, beyond Rameswaram in India, the Report Charges according to the Indian rates for Overseas Radio Telephone Service between India and the place outside India where the called telephone number is situated.

(4) (i.) The sum of the fees payable under paragraphs (3) (a) and (3) (b) of this rule shall be known as the Ceylon Regional Report Charge.

(ii.) The fee payable under paragraph (3) (c) of this rule shall be known as the Indian Overseas Report Charge.

(iii.) The total fees payable under paragraph (3) of this rule shall be known as the Overseas Radio Report Charges from Ceylon.

(5) The decision of the Telegraph Authority as to when a Report Charge is payable shall be final.

6. (1) The first unit period of conversation for an Urgent Overseas Radio Telephone Call made outside the working hours of the service, shall be six minutes, and the second and subsequent unit periods shall be one minute each.

(2) The fee payable for the first unit period of each such Call shall be twice the fee payable under paragraph (1) of rule 4.

(3) The fee payable for the second and each subsequent unit period of each such Call shall be the fee specified in paragraph (2) of rule 4.

(4) Any Report Charge payable in respect of any such Call shall be the fee specified in rule 5.

7. The odd cents forming part of any sum payable under paragraphs (1) (c) or (2) (c) of rule 4 or paragraph (3) (c) of rule 5, shall be rounded off to the nearest multiple of 25 cents.

8. (1) The disturbance fees prescribed by Notification in the *Gazette* of September 13, 1912, shall be payable on every Overseas Radio Telephone call made from and through Exchanges and Call Offices in Ceylon which are closed during any part of the working period of the Overseas Radio Telephone Service.

(2) The reduced disturbance fee prescribed by Notification in the *Gazette* of September 13, 1912, shall be payable on similar calls where only a Report Charge is due.

(3) No disturbance fee shall be payable when a call is ineffective owing to service or other reasons.

9. Any call which has been booked may be cancelled without payment of any fee if such cancellation is requested before the call matures: Provided, however, that in the case of a personal call the Report Charge shall be payable if a report is given to the caller or someone at his telephone before the cancellation is requested.

10. (1) The Overseas Radio Telephone Service shall be available between the hours of 2.30 P.M. and 6.30 P.M. (Ceylon Standard Time) on week days from such Exchanges and Call Offices as may be determined by the Postmaster-General.

(2) The service shall be closed on Sundays and on such holidays as the British Postal Administration may decide: Provided, however, that the service may be temporarily made available outside the working hours on week days and also on Sundays and holidays for the purpose of making any Urgent Overseas Radio Telephone Calls.

11. All calls shall be put through in the order in which they are booked and as the trunk lines and the radio service concerned become disengaged: Provided, however, that a caller may at the time a call is booked specify the time

at which or before which or the hours between which he desires the call to mature on any specified date, subject to the condition that in the event of the call not maturing as required he shall not be entitled to claim the remission of any charges that may fall due.

12. (1) Towards the end of each three minute period of effective conversation the operator shall announce to the caller the number of minutes of effective conversation the caller will have had at the end of that period.

(2) Conversation will not otherwise be interrupted at all, unless an interruption is necessary for the purposes of the service, and the caller may end or extend the call as he wishes without being specifically asked by the operator whether an extension is desired: Provided, however, that a caller may when booking a call request that it be limited to a specified number of minutes, in which case the operator shall terminate the connection as soon as the caller has had the specified period of effective conversation, unless at the end of such period the caller definitely asks for a further extension.

13. (1) In the case of a call made from a Call Office, the period of conversation required shall in every case be booked in advance, and no extension shall be given at the end of such period at the request of the caller, and where a caller terminates his conversation before the full period so booked by him expires, he shall be charged for the actual period of effective conversation he has had or for the first unit period of conversation, whichever of these is the longer.

(2) In the case of a call made from a Call Office, all charges shall be prepaid: Provided, however, that where the controlling exchange is not in a position to quote in advance the actual charge payable, the caller shall be required to deposit any reasonable sum, and any difference between such deposit and the actual charges due from him shall be paid or recovered by him, as the case may be, at the conclusion of the call.

14. No call originating from a subscriber's own telephone shall be put through unless that subscriber has—

(1) deposited as security with the Post Office Exchange with which his telephone is connected—

(a) in the first instance the sum of Rs. 100; and

(b) where the daily average charge payable by that subscriber calculated over a period of one week exceeds Rs. 100, to make the deposit equal to that average; and

(2) given a written undertaking to the following effect :—

“I undertake to settle the bills for any Overseas Radio Telephone Calls made by me within three days from the date the bills are rendered.”

Provided, however, that every subscriber who intends to originate calls only on Saturdays and only to England, Scotland, Wales, the Isle of Man and Northern Ireland, shall deposit as security a sum of Rs. 50. Provided, further, that this rule shall not prevent a subscriber, who desires to originate an occasional call, from making successive deposits from day to day to meet the cost of the calls which he intends to originate.

15. (1) Bills on account of Overseas Radio Telephone Calls shall be rendered daily.

(2) If a bill is not settled within three days from the date on which it is rendered, Overseas Radio Telephone facilities shall be withdrawn without further notice. Indian and inland trunk facilities may also be withdrawn until any outstanding Overseas Radio Telephone account is settled, in addition to any other steps the Postmaster-General may take under the relevant conditions in the Telephone Agreement.

**BY-LAWS.**

1. In these by-laws, unless the context otherwise requires—

- “the Council” means the Weligama Urban District Council;
- “the Chairman” means the Chairman of the Weligama Urban District Council; and
- “public market” means any market established or maintained by the Council.

2. Every public market shall be open daily from 6 A.M. to 10 P.M.

3. (1) No person shall use or occupy any stall seat or space in a public market, unless he is the holder of a licence issued by or by the authority of the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance with these by-laws and with such conditions as may be set out in the licence issued to him.

(2) Every such licence shall be in the form set out in Schedule A hereto.

4. Every holder of a licence shall pay, in respect of the stall seat or space occupied by him, rents or fees at the rates set out in Schedule B hereto.

5. In the case of any public market where the Council does not employ an officer to collect rents or fees, it may lease the right of collecting the rents or fees to any person by private treaty or by public auction.

6. The rent or fee, due for each stall seat or space in a public market, shall be paid in advance to the Chairman or the lessee or to the collector appointed by the Chairman or the lessee.

7. Where by notice exhibited at the spot by or by the authority of the Chairman, the Council sets apart any public market or any part of a public market for the exclusive sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall sell or keep or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in that public market or part of the public market.

8. No person using or occupying any stall seat or space in a public market shall—

- (a) contravene any of the conditions of the licence issued to him; or
- (b) expose or keep for sale therein, any article prohibited by these by-laws or by resolution of the Council; or
- (c) enclose in any way any portion of the market, or erect any awning or screen or fixture of any kind therein; or
- (d) leave any goods in the market between the hours of 10 P.M. and 6 A.M. without the written permission of the Chairman previously obtained; or
- (e) keep his stall seat or space otherwise than in a condition free from filth or rubbish, and clean in all respects; or

(f) occupy his stall seat or space or take part in any sale therein while he is suffering from any cutaneous contagious or infectious disease, or employ or permit any person suffering from any such disease to take part in any sale therein; or

(g) throw any rubbish, bones, skins, or fins or scales of fish, or any other refuse or article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, in or upon the market or its premises otherwise than in the receptacle provided for the purpose by the Council; or

(h) carry on any cooking therein; or

(i) damage or deface any part of the buildings, fixtures, lamps or other property of the Council in or upon the market or its premises; or

(j) defile or pollute in any way the water provided for use therein; or

(k) introduce or cause or permit to be introduced into the market any dog or cat or bird or reptile; or

(l) behave in a disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about the market or its premises.

9. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or for any officer acting under his authority, to inspect any market and to seize any unwholesome articles of food introduced into or exposed for sale in any market, and to convey the same to the Medical Officer of Health or to the District Medical Officer, Weligama, and if it appears to such Medical Officer that any article of food so seized is unwholesome, such article may be destroyed without the payment of any compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

10. Whenever it appears that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Council on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice to prohibit, for such time as to it may appear necessary, the introduction or sale of any such article of food in any market.

11. No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market premises for a longer period than is necessary for loading or unloading. No cart or vehicle shall enter on the cemented portion of the market premises.

12. No meat of any animal not slaughtered at the public slaughter-house provided by the Council, shall be brought into a public or private market except with the special written authority of the Chairman: Provided that this by-law shall not apply to frozen meat, or fish imported into the Island or to game.

13. On the second or any subsequent conviction of any person of a breach of any of these by-laws, the court may in its discretion cancel the licence issued to that person.

14. In the event of the non-compliance by any person with the provisions of any of these by-laws, or of the cancellation of any person's licence by a competent court, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to refuse a fresh licence to that person.

15. Any person contravening any of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 for any one offence, and in the case of a continuing offence with an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 10 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction or written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

## GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

## Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on Friday, August 16, 1935, at 2 p.m., pursuant to notice dated August 10, 1935.

*Present* :—Mr. W. J. L. Rogerson, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. A. M. Saheed; Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. A. Paulas; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna; Mr. R. L. Epharums; and Mr. C. H. Bradley.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 12, 1935, and of the Special Meeting of July 19, 1935, copies thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read, and confirmed.
2. Two petitions were presented, one by Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka, and one by Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya.
3. To submit letter No. R. S. 33 of July 24, 1935, from the Director of Public Works *re* construction of side drains along Government roads.—Submitted.
4. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka was, with the permission of Council, deferred until the next meeting :—"That the authorities concerned be requested to defray half the expenses of building drains on either side of the Public Works Department roads within the Municipal limits of Galle."
5. To submit letter No. B 28 of July 31, 1935, from the Secretary to the Officer Administering the Government, conveying an expression of His Majesty's appreciation of the address presented by the Council on the occasion of His Majesty's Silver Jubilee.—Submitted.
6. Considered a proposed amendment of section 74 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910, *re* investment of Municipal Funds.—Resolved that the Secretary to the Minister for Local Administration be informed that the Council agrees to the proposed amendment.
7. To confirm the appointment of Mr. M. A. Jamaldeen as Shroff of the Council.—Resolved that the appointment of Mr. Jamaldeen as Shroff of the Council be confirmed.
8. To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 150 under Head 36, Scavenging Contingencies.—Sanctioned.
9. The Chairman's Administration Report for the Year 1934 :—Mr. J. E. Perera moved that, in terms of section 102 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Chairman's Administration Report for the year 1934 be submitted to His Excellency the Governor. Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya seconded.—Carried.
10. Considered the question of increasing the strength of the present Inspectorate.—Resolved that a sixth Inspector be appointed and that the Chairman be authorized to employ Mr. B. H. Wickremnayaka, Government Sanitary Inspector, on his present salary plus the usual allowances.
11. Considered a letter from Mr. M. A. Marikar on the question of his appointment as Accountant :—The Chairman moved that the following scale of salary be attached to the Post of Accountant and that Mr. Marikar be placed on this scale as from the date of his appointment as Accountant :—Rs. 1,560 per annum, rising by annual increments of Rs. 90 to Rs. 2,400 per annum.—Carried unanimously.
12. Considered an application made by Mr. M. S. Marikar, Proctor, Galle, on behalf of the widow of the late Shroff, Mr. K. S. Mohideen Lebbe, for payment to her of a sum of Rs. 525 being the amount of the gratuity to which she is entitled in respect of her three minor sons.—Resolved that the applicant be informed that the Council is not prepared to grant the request made.
13. Considered an application from the Public Service Recreation Club for the lease of a site in Victoria Park for the purpose of laying down two tennis courts :—The Chairman moved that the Public Service Recreation Club be given a five years' lease of a site in Victoria Park—which will be pointed out to them by the Municipal Engineer—for the purpose of laying out one tennis court only, on payment of an annual rental of Rs. 12.—Carried by 9 votes to 1, Mr. S. H. Dahanayaka alone voting against.
14. Final consideration of applications for the post of Chief Clerk. The Chairman moved Council into Committee to consider this item.

*Council in Committee* :—

Council in Committee interviewed the following applicants :—Messrs. Lekamge, Alfred, and H. V. C. de Silva. A ballot was taken and resulted as follows :—Mr. Lekamge 6 votes, Mr. de Silva 3 votes, and Mr. Alfred no votes.

Resolved that Council in Committee do recommend that Mr. Lekamge be appointed with effect from September 1, 1935.

The Chairman moved that Council do resume and that the recommendation of the Council in Committee be adopted.—Carried.

15. Considered the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of June 29, 1935 :—"Considered the question of appointing a Buildings Inspector for the Works Department.—Recommended that Mr. J. H. W. Austin, the present Waste Detection Overseer, be appointed Buildings Inspector on six months probation on a salary of Rs. 720—60—Rs. 1,200 and that instead of a Waste Detection Overseer a Waterworks Kangany be appointed on a salary of Rs. 360—12—Rs. 600."

Resolved (1) that applications be invited for the post of Buildings Inspector on a salary of Rs. 720 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 60 to Rs. 1,200 per annum; (b) that applicants should be under 30 years of age; and (c) that preference be given to those who have a knowledge of surveying and levelling and who also hold a certificate in building construction from the Government Technical College.

16. Considered the draft by-laws relating to Dairies as amended and approved by the Law Committee.—Resolved that the draft by-laws be approved.

17. Considered papers relating to the licensing by the Council of Vehicles and Animals from outside Municipal limits.—Resolved that consideration be deferred.

18. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works were laid before the Council :—

(a) *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of July 30, 1935* :—

(2) Acquisition of land at Kandewatta for a playground :—Considered a proposal by the Rector of St. Aloysius' College that a larger area of land approximately 12 acres in extent, instead of the 4 acres originally decided on, be acquired to serve as a recreation ground both for the College and the general public.—Recommended that the proposal be accepted on the following conditions :—(a) That an area of 3 acres adjoining Humes road be converted into a playground for the use of the general public; (b) that the remainder of the land be leased to the College on a 99 years lease for a sports ground at a rental to be decided subsequently by agreement; (c) that the cost of acquisition of the portion to be leased to the College be paid to the Council by the College; (d) that the portion to be leased to the College be filled by them at their own expense and in accordance with the requirements and directions of the Council; (e) that while it is being filled the Council should deposit on the land all the refuse and sweepings of the town to be at the disposal of the College on payment by them of a nominal sum per annum; and (f) that the Parana-ela be diverted eastwards so as to leave sufficient space between it and the Wakwella road in order to safeguard the health and convenience of the inhabitants of the area.

(3) Considered five applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be passed.

(4) Considered the following estimates :—(a) Rs. 2,100 for constructing side drains on the northern side of the Galle-Matara road along the Dewatta Market.—Recommended that the estimate be passed and that the work be done on tender.

(b) Rs. 425 for constructing a Blacksmiths' and Carpenters' shed at the Electrical Department Power Station.—Recommended.

(d) Rs. 400 for constructing a Traffic Control Box at the junction of Dickson road with the Galle-Matara road.—Recommended that the estimate be passed and that a supplemental vote be sanctioned for the purpose.

(e) Rs. 290 for improvements to the Public Bathing Well No. 2 situated at Talbot town.—Recommended that the estimate be passed and that a supplemental vote be sanctioned for the purpose.

*Resolution.*

With regard to item (2) it was resolved that, in view of the opinion expressed by the Council's Lawyer, consideration of the matter be deferred pending further negotiations with the College authorities.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of August 12, 1935 :—*

(2) Considered five applications for water service.—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(3) Considered the following estimates :—(a) Rs. 21,500 for constructing a bus stand on the Minor Esplanade alongside China Garden Cross road.—Recommended (1) that the estimate be passed with the increase of Rs. 300 in order to allow for the construction of a suitable stand for the Police Constable on duty; (2) that a supplemental vote of Rs. 21,800 be sanctioned; (3) that the work, except the tarring which should be done departmentally, be carried out on tender; and (4) that for the purpose of calling for tenders the estimate be divided into two sections, viz., (i.) bottoming, metalling, and consolidating; (ii.) constructional work.

The Committee were also agreed on the following points :—(1) that the width of the track should be 8 feet, (2) that the height of the curbs should be 8 inches; and (3) that the curbs should be constructed of granolithic concrete and doweled at the joints.

(b) Rs. 1,172 for the purchase of various fire protection appliances and also for repairs and improvements to the existing appliances as recommended by the Superintendent of Police.—Recommended that the estimate be passed and that the vote of Rs. 1,000 provided in the budget for "Fire Protection" be increased to Rs. 2,000 in order to allow also for the erection of a "Fire Shed" on a suitable site in close proximity to the Galle Town Police Station.

(4) Maintenance of the Electricity Distribution System.—Recommended, with effect from October 1, 1935, (1) that the town be divided into sections, as suggested by the Inspecting Engineer of the Electrical Undertakings Department, each section to be in charge of a wireman and two labourers; (2) that two additional ladder carts be procured at a cost of Rs. 450; (3) that the following allowances be paid to each wireman, viz., a bicycle allowance of Rs. 2 per mensem and a further allowance of Rs. 2.50 per mensem for accommodating the ladder cart and stores; and (4) that the necessary supplemental expenditure be sanctioned.

*Resolution.*

With regard to item (3) (a) it was resolved to defer consideration till the next meeting and meanwhile to circulate the papers to the members.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

20. Considered an application from the Manager of "Playland" for permission to extend his licence for a further period of 4 weeks from the 19th instant.—Resolved by 10 votes to 1 that the licence issued be extended for a further period of 2 weeks only from the 19th instant and that the Manager be definitely informed that no further extension will be allowed.

21. To fix a date for the next General Meeting of the Council.—Agreed that the next General Meeting of the Council be held on Friday, September 13, 1935, at 2 P.M.

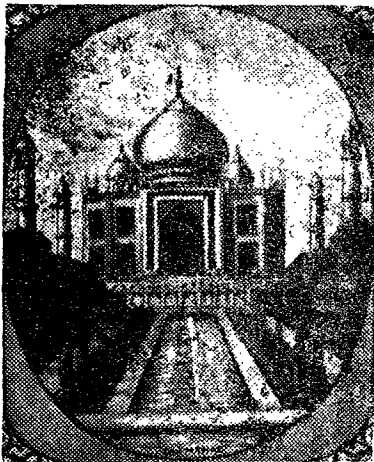
