THE SOCIETIES' ORDINANCE, 1891.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in the Governor by sections 3 (2) and 4 of the Societies' Ordinance, 1891, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, His Excellency the Governor of Ceylon hereby—

- (1) authorizes the purpose for which the Central Province Saiva Maha Sabhai, Limited, has been formed, as a purpose to which the powers and facilities of the said Ordinance ought to be extended; and
- (2) limits the application of the Ordinance to the aforesaid society by exempting the society from the following:—
 - (a) the provisions of section 5 (1) so far as they relate to a subscribed capital of at least ten thousand rupees;
 - (b) the provisions of section 5 (4); and
 - (c) the provisions of section 7 (1) so far as they relate to that part of paragraph 2 of the schedule which requires rules to be made in respect of “the conditions under which any member may become entitled to any benefit assured thereby, and the fines and forfeitures to be imposed on any member.”

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ORDINANCE,
No. 11 of 1920.

BY-LAWS made by the Beruwala Urban District Council under sections 164 and 168 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, and approved by the Local Government Board and confirmed by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the said section 164 and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

BY-LAWS.

The by-laws published by Notification in the *Gazette* of June 9, 1933, as amended by Notifications in the *Gazettes* of August 4, 1933, and October 27, 1933, are hereby further amended as follows:—

- (a) by the insertion of the words "hair dressing saloon, barber's shop", after the word "factory," and before the word "or" in line 5 of by-law 2; and
- (b) by the addition of the following by-laws after those regarding "Public Bathing Places":—

HAIR-DRESSING SALOONS OR BARBERS' SHOPS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to keep a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

1. That the building is of permanent materials, well lighted and well ventilated, with a floor space of not less than 120 square feet. The walls shall be lime-plastered and lime-washed, the roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white; and the floor shall be cemented, with rounded corners at the junction with the walls.
2. That it is provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation.
3. That the living quarters, if any, attached to a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop conform to the requirements of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915.
4. That a sufficient supply of water is available at all times on the premises.
5. That the saloon or shop is provided with means for securing a supply of boiling water adequate for the purpose of sterilizing implements and washing the appliances in daily use.
6. That a sufficient supply of towels and overalls is available for the use of the customers.
7. That facilities are provided for the barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work.
8. That the saloon or shop is provided with a sufficient number of spittoons which shall be kept by the seats readily available to customers and employees.
9. That for the reception of hair and sweepings a movable sanitary bin made of galvanized iron or other equally suitable and impervious material is provided and kept covered with a close-fitting lid.
10. That each washstand is provided with a vessel for a disinfectant for sterilizing razors, scissors, clippers, or other instruments.
11. A tray with disinfectants shall be kept in the saloon for keeping the instruments and combs after use.

II.—Regulations for Licensed Hair-dressing Saloons.

1. Every licensee of a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with the words "Licensed Hair-dressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop".
2. Every licensee of a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung up in a prominent place on the premises.
3. The walls of every Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be lime-washed and the ceiling painted twice a year in the months of June and December.
4. No Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be used as a place for sleeping or eating during the night or day.
5. No person suffering from or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any infectious or contagious disease shall enter a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop or be employed therein in any capacity. Every person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall submit himself for examination by the Medical Officer of Health and obtain a certificate from him

to the effect that such person is free from any infectious or contagious disease. The certificate will be issued free of charge.

6. Every person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall observe the utmost cleanliness in his work. He shall keep his person and his wearing apparel clean and in a sanitary condition. He shall keep his finger-nails short and clean and shall wash his hands with soap and water immediately before attending each customer.

7. The floor, walls, ceiling, furniture, and fixtures of every Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall be kept clean at all times.

8. The razors, scissors, and other implements shall be disinfected immediately after each occasion on which they are used and before they are employed for another customer by dipping them in boiling water or by any other method approved of by the Medical Officer of Health.

Such razors, scissors, and other implements, when not in use, shall be kept in the tray with disinfectants provided for the purpose.

9. All spittoons shall always be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. Each spittoon shall be emptied and cleansed once daily, or more frequently if necessary, with a disinfectant approved by the Medical Officer of Health, and a small quantity of disinfectant left in the spittoon.

10. Hair-brushes and combs shall be thoroughly washed, cleaned, and sterilized every day before use and kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.

11. Shaving mugs, cups, and shaving brushes shall be thoroughly rinsed in hot water after each occasion on which they are used.

12. The use of styptic pencils, powder puffs, and sponges is forbidden. Alum or other material used to stop bleeding shall be applied in powder or liquid form.

13. Every licensee shall supply each customer with fresh clean towels and overalls. All towels or overalls shall be boiled and laundered after each occasion on which they are used.

14. No person shall expectorate within the premises except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

15. No person employed in a Hair-dressing Saloon or Barber's Shop shall attend on any customer who is suffering from an infectious skin disease or any other infectious ailment.

16. If it so happens that a customer with any visible skin disease has been attended to, the hands of the barber shall be immediately cleansed and the instruments used sterilized.

17. After attention to each customer all hair cuttings shall be gathered and deposited in the sanitary dust bin provided. Such cuttings shall on no account be allowed to lie about in the premises.

THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892.

REGULATIONS.

1. No person shall export any rubber produced in the Island to any territory not mentioned in section 43 (1) of the Rubber Control Ordinance, No. 6 of 1934, unless such rubber is accompanied by a Certificate of Origin in the form prescribed for the purposes of that section.

2. No person shall import any rubber (other than articles and things manufactured wholly or partly of rubber) from any territory not mentioned in section 43 (1) of the Rubber Control Ordinance, No. 6 of 1934, unless such rubber is accompanied by a Certificate of Origin.

REGULATIONS.

1. If it is established to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs that the whole quantity of any rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin is to be re-exported in one shipment and in the form in which it was originally imported, the Principal Collector of Customs shall authorize the re-export of such rubber by making an endorsement on the Certificate of Origin in the following form:—

I hereby authorize the re-export to _____ per SS/MV. _____ of _____ pounds of rubber, which is the identical rubber specified in the foregoing Certificate of Origin.

2. Where any quantity of scrap rubber has been imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin, an exporter who desires to re-export in one shipment the whole quantity of that scrap rubber—

- (1) in the form of crepe rubber which has been milled from that scrap rubber, or
- (2) partly in its original form and partly in the form of crepe rubber which has been milled from that scrap rubber,

shall furnish to the Principal Collector of Customs a Declaration in the Form L set out in the schedule hereto; and the Principal Collector of Customs shall, if he is satisfied that the statements made in that Declaration are true and accurate, authorize the re-export of such rubber by making an endorsement on the Certificate of Origin in the following form:—

I hereby authorize the re-export to _____ per SS/MV _____ of _____

- (1) _____ pounds of scrap rubber which is a part of the identical rubber specified in the foregoing Certificate of Origin;
- (2) _____ pounds of crepe rubber milled in Ceylon from _____ pounds of the identical rubber specified in the foregoing Certificate of Origin.

3. For the purpose of determining the amount of rubber which may be re-exported as crepe rubber which has been milled from imported scrap rubber, scrap rubber of the quantity and grade mentioned in the first column of the Conversion Table subjoined to this regulation shall be deemed to be incapable of producing a quantity of crepe rubber in excess of the quantity specified in the corresponding entry in the second-column of that Table.

4. No person shall re-export or be entitled to re-export in one shipment the whole quantity of any rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin unless that Certificate of Origin is endorsed by the Principal Collector of Customs in the form prescribed in regulation 1 or regulation 2.

5. Where a part only of the total quantity of scrap rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin is re-exported either in its original form or after conversion into crepe rubber, or where a part only of the total quantity of crepe rubber or sheet rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin is re-exported in its original form, such scrap rubber, crepe rubber, or sheet rubber, as the case may be, shall not be re-exported on the original Certificate of Origin but may be re-exported on a copy thereof if the Principal Collector of Customs authorizes the re-export of such scrap rubber, crepe rubber, or sheet rubber by a certificate issued in Form M(3) set out in the schedule hereto. The Certificate of Origin which accompanied any such rubber when it was originally imported into the Island shall, after the issue of the certificate in Form M(3) be retained in the office of the Principal Collector of Customs.

6. The Principal Collector of Customs shall not issue his certificate in Form M(3) unless—

- (1) he is satisfied that the rubber to be re-exported on such certificate is a part of the original rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin which accompanied such rubber at the time of importation ;
- (2) the exporter furnishes to the Principal Collector of Customs, in duplicate, a Declaration in Form M(2) set out in the schedule hereto, and a Declaration from the original importer in Form M(1) set out in the schedule hereto ;
- (3) the exporter furnishes to the Principal Collector of Customs two copies of the original Certificate of Origin relating to the rubber sought to be re-exported ;
- (4) the exporter surrenders to the Principal Collector of Customs the original Certificate of Origin relating to the rubber sought to be re-exported, unless that Certificate of Origin has previously been surrendered to the Principal Collector of Customs for the purpose of the re-export of any rubber under these regulations.

7. The certificate of the Principal Collector of Customs in Form M(3), together with one copy of the Declaration of the importer in Form M(1) and one copy of the Declaration of the exporter in Form M(2) shall be attached to one of the two copies of the original Certificate of Origin furnished under regulation 6. The other copy of the Certificate of Origin, together with a copy of the certificate in Form M(3), and the other copies of the Declarations in Forms M(1) and M(2), shall be retained in the office of the Principal Collector of Customs.

8. The certificate of the Principal Collector of Customs in Form M(3), together with a copy of the original Certificate of Origin, shall be sufficient authority for the re-export from the Island of the rubber authorized by the Principal Collector of Customs to be re-exported.

9. No person shall re-export or be entitled to re-export from the Island, whether in its original or in a converted form, any part of any rubber imported into the Island on a Certificate of Origin unless the re-export of that divided part of the rubber originally imported is authorized by the Principal Collector of Customs in the manner hereinbefore provided.

10. Any person who desires to re-export any rubber under these regulations shall, on payment of a fee computed at the rates prescribed in section 2 of Ordinance No. 12 of 1864, be entitled to obtain from the Principal Collector of Customs one or more copies of the Certificate of Origin relating to that rubber if that Certificate of Origin has been previously surrendered to the Principal Collector of Customs under these regulations.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Friday, November 22, 1935, at 2 p.m., pursuant to notice dated November 16, 1935.

Present : Mr. C. Harrison-Jones, Chairman ; Mr. J. E. Perera ; Mr. D. I. Durham ; Mr. A. M. Saheed ; Dr. H. E. Ekanayaka ; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail ; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya ; Mr. E. A. Paulas ; Mr. E. M. Karunaratna ; Mr. C. H. Bradley ; Mr. A. C. Mohammedo ; and Mr. W. Dahanayaka.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting held on October 11, 1935, and of the Special Meeting held on November 5, 1935, copies thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Three petitions were presented by Mr. A. C. Mohammedo, two by Mr. E. M. Karunaratna, one by Mr. E. A. Paulas, and ten by Mr. W. Dahanayaka. These were tabled and the Chairman said they would receive consideration.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. W. Dahanayaka asked the following questions :—(1) When a street electric wire or a street light is in disorder, how long does it take for those on duty at the Power Station to know of it ? (2) Is there an instrument at present in working order by which such mishaps are instantaneously recorded at the Power Station ? (3) How often and when has such instrument not been in working order during October and November this year ? (4) Following on a mishap being recorded on this instrument what is the exact procedure pursued ? (5) Did Mr. C. J. D. Lanktree, when he was acting Chairman of this Council, order that a detailed description of light failures and other electric mishaps be submitted to the Chairman for his information on a specified form ? (6) If this very desirable procedure has been dropped will the Chairman be pleased to re-introduce it ? (7) Is the Chairman aware that a six months old baby named Ariaratna of Wellaboda died on August 30, 1935, after having been attended to by the Public Health Nurse of the Council for about a week ? (8) Is it a fact that this baby was in the Galle Hospital till August 22, suffering from Pneumonia ? (9) Did the mother of the baby state to the Medical Officer of Health of the Council that the baby had been discharged from the Galle Hospital before he had sufficiently recovered ? (10) Does the diary of the Public Health Nurse support the statement of the baby's mother ? (11) If so, will the Chairman be pleased to submit the facts of this case to the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services for suitable action ?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) It depends on the nature of the fault. It may be found out in the Power Station immediately it occurs or it may be some hours before it is reported to the Power Station either verbally or by telephone. (2) There is no instrument to record all faults in the Electrical System. There is an Earth Recorder but this instrument is for recording "Earths" only. (3) The Earth Recorder has not been out of order during any part of October or November, 1935. (4) If by "mishap" is meant "accident" this Earth Recorder does not record such accident and is not meant to do so. (5) Yes. (6) On the advice of the Inspecting Engineer of the Government Electrical Department the form was done away with and a Register of faults was introduced. The particulars in the Register are practically the same as those in the form introduced by Mr. Lanktree. The book is regularly inspected by the technical Officers of the Government Electrical Department. (7) Yes, I am now aware of it. (8) According to the daily reports of the Public Health Nurse the baby was in the Galle Hospital for nearly three weeks suffering from pneumonia, and was discharged on August 22, 1935. (9) Yes. (10) No. (11) I am not prepared to do so as I understand that the Medical Officer of Health has already reported the matter to the Superintendent of the Galle Hospital for inquiry.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya asked the following questions :—(1) Will the Chairman be pleased to state whether he held a full inquiry in connection with the electrocution of a milk vendor, which occurred at Milliduwa Junction on the morning of October 17, 1935 ? (2) If so, will the Chairman be pleased to table all papers relating to his inquiry for the information of the members of this Council ? (3) Is it the fact that the Government Electrical Engineer while on his quarterly inspections inquired into the cause of this unfortunate incident ? (4) Has he submitted to the Chairman a report of his inquiry ? (5) If so, will the Chairman be good enough to circulate this report to the members of this Council ? (6) In view of the frequency of accidents of this nature, will the Chairman consider the desirability of taking adequate steps to prevent these accidents occurring in future ?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) No, but I understand that my predecessor inspected the scene of the accident with the Superintendent of the Electricity Department at about 10 a.m. on October 17, and that he (the Chairman) was of opinion that this was an unavoidable accident for which the Council's Electricity Department could not be held responsible. (2) The papers relating to this matter are tabled for the information of the members. (3) Yes. (4) No. (5) This question does not arise. (6) In my opinion the only action possible to minimize accidents of this nature would be for the Council to remove all trees higher than the electric mains which are situated within a distance of 30 feet from the mains. But in view of the enormous cost of such an undertaking I am not prepared to recommend it to the Council.

Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya then asked for a public inquiry into the matter and stated that it was advisable in the interest of the Electricity Department itself that such an inquiry should be held. Mr. W. Dahanayaka supported the request made by Mr. Amarasuriya. The Chairman replied that he would first obtain a report from the Government Electrical Engineer who inquired into the cause of the accident and circulate it for the information of the members.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. E. Perera moved :—That compensation be paid by the Council up to half the value of trees cut in connection with the extension of electric lights within the Municipality.

Mr. A. C. Mohammedo seconded. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved as an amendment that with effect from July 1, 1935, compensation be paid by the Council for trees cut down in connection with the extension of electric lights within the Municipality. The mover and seconder agreed to the amendment. Mr. E. M. Karunaratna said he was in sympathy with the motion but he did not see the necessity for it in view of the by-law passed by the Council in 1932, which gave the Chairman the power to cut down trees and pay reasonable compensation. The Chairman stated that there was no objection to the motion being passed because the by-law of 1932, merely said that compensation may be paid. Mr. W. Dahanayaka was of opinion that compensation should be paid in all cases where trees are cut for the electric lights—whether for purposes of extension or maintenance, and moved as a further amendment that adequate compensation be paid by the Council for all trees cut in connection with the street electric lights within the Municipality. Mr. E. A. Paulas seconded. After further discussion, however, Mr. Dahanayaka with the permission of Council withdrew his amendment.

The motion, as amended, was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. W. Dahanayaka moved :—(1) That the annual licence fees for bicycles be Re. 1 per bicycle as from January 1, 1936.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded, and Mr. E. M. Karunaratna supported the motion. Messrs. J. E. Perera and A. M. Saheed also spoke. The motion was then put to the meeting and carried by 7 votes to 4.

(2) That steps be taken to establish a Municipal play centre at the Galle Esplanade for the children of the crowded localities round about, who are at present deprived of the benefits of organized recreation.

Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya seconded the motion which was supported also by Messrs. J. E. Perera and E. M. Karunaratna. The motion was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously. It was further resolved that the matter be referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. M. Karunaratna, Thomas Amarasuriya, and W. Dahanayaka with Mr. Dahanayaka as convener, and two members to form a quorum.

(3) That the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit to this Council a report with the probable cost for a scheme of model tenements for the working classes.

Mr. E. A. Paulas seconded. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail said that the Council must first decide on the site for the suggested model tenements before taking action to obtain a report on the matter. Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya agreed with Mr. Magdon Ismail and suggested that the question be deferred pending the report of the Town Planning Expert. The mover thereupon with the permission of Council, withdrew the motion.

(4) That the closing orders issued to householders be not enforced, pending the report of the Town Planning Expert and the erection by this Council of a number of model tenements; that in the meantime householders on whom notices have been served be permitted to live in their respective houses and effect such repairs as the Chairman deems absolutely necessary.

Mr. J. E. Perera seconded. Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, A. C. Mohammedo, and Thomas Amarasuriya also spoke. On the Chairman undertaking to take a sympathetic view of the matter and to give full consideration to the merits of each case this motion also was, with the permission of Council withdrawn by the mover.

7. Considered Audit Query No. 41 I M of August 24, 1935, relating to the free supply of buckets and coir dust to private houses:—Resolved that the present practice do continue.

8. Considered the question of recovering the costs due to the Council in D. C., Galle, case No. 33,425:—Resolved, in view of the report of the Council's Lawyer, that no steps be taken for the present to recover the costs due to the Council, but that the question be re-considered at the end of six months.

9. Considered an application from the Honorary Secretary of the Galle Municipal Sports Club requesting permission for the Club to use the Crest of the Council:—Resolved that permission be granted.

10. Considered papers relating to the licensing by the Council of vehicles and animals from outside Municipal limits:—Resolved that consideration be deferred and that meanwhile the papers, together with Mr. Saheed's report on the matter, be circulated again to the members.

11. To submit the draft Budget for 1936 as approved by the Four Standing Committees on Law, Sanitation, Finance and Works of November 12 and 13, 1935:—Submitted.

12. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—

(a) *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of November 2, 1935:—*

(2) Considered 7 applications for water service:—Recommended that the applications be allowed.

(4) Considered the question of appointing a Road Overseer:—Recommended that a Road Overseer be appointed with effect from January 1, 1936, on a salary of Rs. 600 per annum and that applications for the post be called for.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

(b) *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of November 2, 1935:—*

(2) Considered the question of writing off on the ground of poverty of the owner the rates due for the current year on property No. 463, Gintota:—Recommended that the rates due for 1935 amount to 75 cents be written off.

(3) List of demolished buildings in Ward 2:—Recommended that the rates be struck off.

(4) Considered the question what action should be taken with regard to the following properties purchased by Council for non-payment of rates:—92, Katugoda, and 580, Maitipe:—Recommended that in both cases the rates due for 1935, be waived under the proviso to section 137 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

(5) Considered the question of retransferring to the owner property No. 70, Katugoda, purchased by and vested in the Council for non-payment of rates:—Recommended, in view of the fact that all the arrears of rates due (and costs) have now been paid, that the property be retransferred to the owner at his own expense.

(6) To declare in terms of Rule 2 of the Municipal Pension Minute the following posts in the Municipal Service to be pensionable:—(a) Accountant, (b) Buildings Inspector:—Recommended that in terms of Rule 2 of the Municipal Pension Minute the above two posts be declared pensionable.

(7) Lease of Meat Market Stalls Nos. 9 to 14 for the year 1936:—Recommended that the offers made by the present lessees to lease the stalls at this year's rates be accepted.

(8) Lease of fruit trees at the Segregation Camp and the Infectious Diseases Hospital for the year, 1936:—Recommended that the offer of Rs. 200 made by the present lessee be accepted.

(9) Considered tenders for the lease of the Betel Shed in the Fort for the year 1936:—Recommended that the only tender received, viz., Rs. 251 from the present lessee, be accepted.

(10) Lease of Fish Market Stalls 9, 10, 11, 13, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22:—Recommended, in view of the fact that there were no bidders at the re-sales of the stalls, that no further action be taken.

(11) To recommend the following supplemental votes:—(a) Rs. 150 under Vote 21—Sanitation—Contingencies. (b) Rs. 750 under Vote 42—Maintenance of Buildings. (c) Rs. 250 under Vote 71—Electric Lighting of Markets. (d) Rs. 200 under Vote 45—Upkeep of carts:—Recommended.

(12) Considered a memorandum from the Superintendent of the Electricity Department regarding the present bicycle allowance of the Electrical Inspector:—Recommended that with effect from January 1, 1936, the Electrical Inspector be paid a Motor Bicycle allowance of Rs. 300 per annum.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

13. To fix dates for the next General Meeting and for the Special Meeting to consider finally the Budget for 1936:—Agreed that the next General Meeting of the Council be held on Saturday, December 14, 1935, at 9 a.m. and the Special Meeting to consider finally the Budget for 1936, on the same day immediately after the General Meeting.

With the permission of Council the following item which did not appear on the agenda was next taken up for consideration:—

14. To sanction a supplemental vote of Rs. 300 under Electricity Head E 10—Materials for Service Mains:—Sanctioned.

(2) Progress report of works done on estimates during October, 1935.

(3) Report of the Inspector of Vehicles on carriages plying for hire during October, 1935.
