PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR ELIBANK HAVELOCK, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS by section 13 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that the Proclamation establishing a Police Force in any town shall also specify and define the limits of such town, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time, as occasion may require, by Proclamation to alter or vary such limits:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the 20th day of September, 1886, a Police Force was, under the provisions of the said Ordinance, established in the town of Pánaduré, and the limits of the said town were, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, specified and defined in the schedule thereto:

And whereas it is expedient to alter such limits, and to re-define and specify the limits of the said town of Panaduré for the purposes aforesaid:

PART I.—Page 559

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby alter the limits of the said town of Pánaduré as defined in the schedule to the Proclamation of the 20th day of September, 1886, aforesaid, by substituting the limits set out in the schedule hereto for those set out in the Proclamation aforesaid, as from and after the 1st day of January, 1896.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-five.

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1895.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala crops are being harvested in some villages, and the prospects of a fairly good maha continue to be favourable.

Dry-grain: in Siyane korale east a small extent has been sown with el-wi.

Other products: the supply of vegetables is good and prices are moderate, but fruit is very scarce and dear. Prices of staple products: rice from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts, from Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 a thousand.

Rainfall: scanty, but towards the end of the month more abundant.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: a fairly good yala harvest can be expected.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT. •

Paddy: the crops of the fields cultivated for the yala harvest are being reaped and threshed. Maha harvest: the fields look promising in Hapitigam korale, but in Alutkuru korale north they have suffered from the drought.

Dry grain grops are good, and have been harvested in Alutkuru korale north; in Hapitigam korale the cultiva-

tion has begun.

Other products: vegetables are plentiful in Alutkuru korale north, but scarce in Hápitigam korale; the fruit season is drawing to a close.

Prices of staple products: rice Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel, paddy Re. 1:50 per bushel, cocoanuts Rs. 27 to Rs. 32 per thousand.

Rainfall: a few showers during the latter part of the month.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: fair.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy the reaping of the yala harvest is still going on; fields are being prepared and sown for the maha

Dry grain: in the Pusdun korale east the harvesting of the dry grain is over; in Pasdun korale west and in Rayigam korale there was very little dry grain cultivated, and none in the Kalutara and Panadure Totamunes.

Other products: fruits are scarce in the whole district, and vegetables in the Pasdun korales east and west:

in Rayigam korale and the Totamunes vegetables are abundant.

Price of staple products: imported rice, Rs. 3-50 to Rs. 4 per bushel; country rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, prices vary from Rs. 30 to Rs. 50 per thousand in different parts of the district.

Rainfall: moderate in Pasdun korale east and the Totamunes, heavy in Rayigam korale, and abundant in Pasdun korale west.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: fair.

CENTRAL PROVINCE

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: in Udunuwara, Harispattu, and Uda Bulatgama the fields are being transplanted. In other

divisions fields are yet being cultivated and sown. Crop or propects: too early to form an opinion.

Yala fields are being harvested. Crops or prospects: fair.

Dry grain, maha: hill paddy chenas in Tumpane, Harispattu, and Pata Dumbara are being transplanted: kurakkan chenas in Udunuwara and Yatinuwara are being harvested; and in Uda Dumbara and Pata Hewaheta they are being cleared. Crops or prospects: in Udunuwara, fair; in Yatinuwara, bad; in other divisions, too early to

form an opinion.
Yala: kurakkan chenas in Tumpane, Harispattu, Uda Dumbara, and Pata Hewaheta are being harvested: in Pata Dumbara they are ripening; and in Udapalata being sown Crop or prospects: good in Harispattu; fair in

other districts.

Rainfall : generally sufficient.

Prices : paddy, Re. 1 50 a bushel ; kurakkan, Rs. 2 25 a bushel ; cocoanuts, Rs. 4 per thousand.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Matale south: a rainfall of 5.03 has been registered during the month at Matale. There has been slight rain all over this division, which was favourable for the chenas recently sown. The yala crop is ripe, and is being harvested;

returns fair except in Asgiri korales and Kohonsiya pattu, where the crops have suffered damage by drought.

Matale north: the rainfall recorded at Dambulla is 3.24. The paddy crops gathered from the yala harvest are poor. Chenas are being sown with fine grain in all the korales. Prospects are good; there has been no rain yet to begin operations for the maha sowing of paddy fields.

Matale east: the yala fields are being reaped in nearly all the villages with satisfactory returns. Chenas are being cleared for kurakkan, and will be sown during the latter part of October. Prospects are promising.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: Kotmale—maha paddy plants one to three months old, and being weeded and transplanted. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane—yala paddy in young plants.

Dry grain: Kotmale-kurakkan in ear; prospects good. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane-clearing and burning of chenas commenced for kurakkan.

Rain: Kotmale-rain sufficient. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane-rain not sufficient.

Fruits and regetable are scarce in Walapane, and not abundant in Uda Hewaheta and Kotmale.

Prices of staple articles: påddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan and indiancorn, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 a bushel: cocoanuts Rs. 6 to Rs. 7 a bushel.

Health: generally good.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there was some heavy rain almost throughout the district on the 11th, 13th, and 24th, and some partial showers on the 21st, 22nd, 25th, and 28th. The rainfall registered at the Public Works Department Office,

Jaffina, was 2-25 in.

Paddy, kalapokam of 1896: sowing of paddy was general throughout the district during the month, but rain is much wanted in some divisions to complete the sowing. The earlier sowings are in plants.

Dry grain crops: sowing of varaku was almost completed, and the young plants have come up in most divisions

Other dry grains: kurakkan and payaru in ear, and prospects reported good.

Palmirah fruits: the crop of palmirah fruit was gathered in, and the outturn was reported to be fair.

Price of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.80 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.56 per bushel; tinaichchami, Re. 1.50 per bushel; panichchami, Re. 1.30 per bushel; varaku, Re. 1.30 per bushel; pinaddu, Rs. 3.25 per koodai.

MANNAR DISTRICT.—Report not received.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Sowing of the kalapokam paddy fields going on throughout the district. More sowing took place in maritime pattus and Mulliavalai.

Prices of food articles: paddy, Re. 1:50 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3:50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1:25 per bushel; varaku, Re. 1 per bushel; manioc, 4 cents per lb.

There was rain throught the district; maritime pattus and Mulliavalai received more than Tunukkai.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

A few showers of rain throughout the district, save in the Metkumulai division, where there has been no rain

for many months past, and everything looks parched up.

. Fencing, ploughing, and sowing for the next kalapokam cultivation going on, chiefly in tank beds. Paddy sown in same parts have already germinated. Caterpillars appeared in some tanks during the latter part of the month, and caused damage to the paddy plants.

A few old chenas allowed to certain exceptional cases of hardship are being cleared for kurakkan in the

Metkumulai and Panankamam divisions.

Price of paddy per bushel varies from Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50; kurakkan, Re. 1.28 to Re. 1.50 per bushel; gingelly, Rs. 4 to Rs. 4.80 per bushel.

Cattle disease is nearly dying out in villages declared infected. Reports have been received of its outbreak in Tavasiakulam in Naducheddikulam and Marutamadu in Kilakkumulai north.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: cultivation was begun in all the pattus.

Dry grain: no preparation yet made for the cultivation of dry grain.

Miscellaneous: jak, plantain, and breadfruit are scarce; brinjals, pumpkins, cucumber, and potatoes are in fair supply. Cocoanuts plentiful, price per thousand Rs. 30.

Price of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3:50 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1:25; mederi and kurakkan, Re. 1:25 to Re. 1:50 per bushel; amu, Re. 1.

Health: fever is on the decrease; there have been cases of chickenpox, measles, and dysentery in Talpe and Wellaboda pattus. Cattle free from disease.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Magam Pattu.

Paddy, maha: muddings are going on at Tissamaharama. No cultivation yet in eastern walakada owing to the scarcity of water. Yala crops in western walakada being reaped.

Dry grain: no dry grain in this pattu; some chenas are being cleared on permits.

Miscellaneous: prices of articles same as last month.

Fast Giruwa Pattu.

Paddy: the remaining crops mentioned in the last report have all been reaped, but not harvested as yet. Rain: there were occasional showers during the month.

Cattle disease: hoof-and-mouth disease has disappeared.

Health: a few cases of fever and dysentery have been reported in the pattu, otherwise the health of the people

Prices of articles: paddy, Rs. 10 per amunam; fine grain, Rs. 9 per amunam; cocoanuts, Rs. 40 per thousand; vegetables scarce.

West Giruwa Pattu.

Paddy: the yala crop has been harvested almost entirely, which was for the most part bad, owing to the drought. The yield of lands irrigated by the Udukiriwila tank was fair. The crop of about 125 amunams' extent

bounder the Kirama stream, perished entirely owing to the severe drought.

Dry grain: applications for permits to clear chenas are still made.

Miscellaneous: jak, breadfruit, and sweet potatoes are scarce. The yield of the cocoanut tree is also poor.

There seems to be a fair supply of vegetables. In some interior villages most of the people are reported to be badly

off for their food supply.

Prices of staple products: paddy, Re. 1.62½ per bushel; rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; breadfruit, Rs. 5 per hundred, scarce; sweet potatoes, Re. 1.50 per cwt.; plantain, Rs. 45 per hundred bunches; indiancorn, 75 cents per hundred pods; cocoanuts, from Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per thousand; jakfruit, from Rs. 30 to Rs. 37.50 per hundred, scarce; pumpkins, Rs. 25 per hundred.

Rainfall: there has been light rainfall in the month, which is very favourable.

Haelth: the health of the inhabitants has been good on the whole. There have been a few cases of fever,

Health: the health of the inhabitants has been good on the whole. There have been a few cases of fever, diarrhosa, and chickenpox in some of the villages of the district.

Cattle: still there are a few cases of hoof-and-mouth disease.

MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: sowing for maha is still going on; the young crop is coming up very well.

Dry grain : good. Prices : paddy, Re. 1.62 per bushel.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: sowing of early munmari has commenced.
Dry grain: indiancorn being planted in chenas and on private high lands.

Price of paddy: Re. 1 per bushel. Rainfall: 1 09 in.

Health of people: on the whole good; here and there cases of dysentery

Health of cattle : a few cases of murrain, stepped by segregation. Hoof disease decreasing.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rainfall: 5.97 in.

Paddy: the pinmari crop has almost been reaped and the outturn is not satisfactory, except in the Tamblegam division. Lands are being prepared in the Koddiyar and Kaddukulam pattus for the munmari cultivation.

Dry grain: no dry grain cultivated.

Tobaccout the crops have all been reaped, and the yield is considered fair, but the price of the article has greatly fallen owing to want of sufficient demand at the Jaffna market.

Manioca crops: the yield is reported poor, and is estimated at about one-third of the usual crop.

Fisheries: moderate.

Price of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1:50 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3:50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1:75 per bushel.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNEGALA DISTRICT.

Occasional showers fell during the month. Rain very sparing beyond the Deduru-oya.

This side of the Deduru-oya, harvesting of yala and ploughing and sowing for maha were continued. For these operations weather was favourable. Extent sown below average as yet.

Beyond the Deduru-oya, namely, in the Vanni and in Hiriyala, harvesting was completed. Cultivation for maha

not yet properly in hand. Awaiting rain.

All tanks more or less empty, and drinking water short.

Health of people and cattle good.

Rainfall registered at Kurunegala during the month, 4:34.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division: fields being prepared for maha cultivation and ilankali paddy being sown; chenas being

Central division: yala crop reaped and stacked; crop good; flooding of Kadupitiya-oya damaged 121 bushels sown extent; 7,739 bushels harvested. Fine grain, reapediand stacked; crop good; 1,116 bushels harvested. Sowing for maha over. About 5,384 bushels sown. Plants in good condition, but in some villages dying for want of water.

Southern Avision: yala crop in Otarapalata not reaped owing to recent rains. Sowing for maha over. About 66 bushels paddy and 6 bushels fine grain sown.

Tobacco crop promises to be good.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala crop in some of the palatas of Demala hatpattu is reaped and stacked. Condition fair. Paddy is sown for maha in some villages of Puttalam and Akkarai pattus. For want of rain there is no cultivation in other divisions.

Dry grain: chenas are being cleared and sown for maha harvest.

Staple products: rice, from Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4; cocoanuts, Rs. 4 to Rs. 5 per hundred.

Rainfall: weather very dry during the month.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT.

The rainfall during the month has been .96 in., as registered at Anuradhapura Some of the paddy crops cultivated late for the yala harvest are being reaped. In some places the crops have failed for want of water.

Paddy chenas and tanks, and kurakkan chenas for the next maha harvest, are being sown. Only a few tanks are half or quarter full. The rest are empty. Scarcity of food is reported in Hurulapalata.

Cattle murrain prevails in Nuwaragampalata and Kalagampalata.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

BADULLA DISTRICT.

Yatikinda: yala fields have been sown. Chenas have been burnt and prepared for seed.

Wellassa: yala cultivation not begun yet. Chenas are ready for seed.

Udukinda: maha crops being harvested. Results poor owing to drought and wind.

Wellawaya: maha crops were good. Kurakkan sowing in progress.

Buttala: maha crops were good. A few yala fields in cultivation. Kurakkan sowing will begin with the rain in a few days.

Bintenna: maha harvest fair. Chenas being cleared.

Wiyaluwa: yala crops of good promise. Chenas being got ready.

Rainfall: in Badulla 1.96.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 5.25 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; Indian corn.

Re. 1.25 per bushel; salt, Rs. 4 per cwt.; cocoanuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 8 per hundred.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the yala crop throughout the district has been harvested except in Nawadun korale, where the harvesting operations are still proceeding. In Kadawatu and Meda korales, and in the villages of Kolonna korale, except those benefited by the Kitalabokka irrigation works, the yield has been unsatisfactory on account of the drought which prevailed. In other korales the harvest was fairly good.

Dry grain: in Kuruwiti korale the crop on chenas is in good condition. In Nawadun korale the crop on yala chenas have been harvested and maha chenas have been sown. In Atakalan korale elwi crops are ripening.

In Kolonna, Kadawatu, and Meda korales, and in the Kandawela and Tamblegam pattus of Atakalan korale, kurakkan chenas are being cleared. In Kukulu korale yala chenas are been reaped and maha chenas have been cleared, but not yet burnt on account of rain.

No cattle murrain: foot-and-mouth disease in some parts of Kuruwiti and of Kolonna korales have been

Health: normal.

KEGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala is being harvested; yield fair. Ploughing and sowing for maha are in progress. Fields already sown for maha are doing well. The present weather is favourable.

Dry grain: hill paddy, iringu, and amu prospects are good. Kurakkan is being harvested; outturn is generally good. Mun sown in Four korales is being harvested; yield fair. Tana in Paranakuru korale is being reaped;

Prices: paddy, Re. 1·25 to Re. 1·50 per bushel; hill paddy, Re. 1 to Re. 1·25 per bushel; kurakkan, 75 cents to 87 cents per bushel; amu, 75 cents per bushel.

Rainfall: registered at Ambanpitiya, 6·13; Ruwanwella, 16·61.

The district is free from cattle disease. Health of the people is generally good.

HEREAS by the 83rd section of "The Ceylon Postal and Telegraph Ordinance, 1892," it is enacted that the Governor may, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time make rules and regulations touching the limit of deposits, the rate of interest to be allowed thereon, the sale or disposal of securities or investments, the deposits of minors and trustees, and the mode of payment thereof, and for all matters relating to the general management of such Savings Banks, and such rules and regulations from time to time to add to, amend, alter, and repeal:

And whereas it is enacted that all such rules and regulations when made, added to, amended, altered, or repealed, shall be published in the Government Gazette, and upon the publication of such rules as shall be so made, added to, amended, or altered, they shall be as legal, valid, and effectual as if the same had been enacted in the said Ordinance:

It is hereby notified that the following rules and regulations published in the Government Gazette of December 29, 1893, are cancelled:

Rule No. 12 under Regulations.

"No charge for postage shall be made upon the depositors for the transmission of their books to the Postmaster-General, or for the return thereof to them, or for any applications they may have to make for acknowledgments of deposits, or for any application or necessary letter of inquiry respecting the sums deposited by them, or for the replies thereto."

Rule No. 5 under Principal Rules.

"No charge for postage will be made to the depositor for any letter passing between him and the Savings Bank Department with regard to his deposits, or with regard to the withdrawal of the same, or for the transmission of his deposit book between him and the Savings Bank Department, and letters addressed to the Controllor or Savings Bank business need not be prepaid."

And the following rule made under section 67 of the said Ordinance shall come into force after October 1, 1895 :-

All communications addressed by a depositor in the Post Office Savings Bank to the Postmaster-General must be prepaid. Deposit books to Postmaster-General will be liable to postage at book rates.

'A' deposit of Rs. 20 will be required before any form of tender is issued; and should any tenderer decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or fail to furnish approved security, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

4. Sufficient sureties will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of the contract.

5. The amount of the bond, and all other necessary

information, can be ascertained upon application at the office of the Provincial Engineer, Kurunegala.

6. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.

Persons whose tenders are accepted by Government will be required to bear the expense of having security bonds prepared for the due fulfilment of their contract, which bonds will be subject to the approval of the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderers' own lawyers, whose name or stamp should be affixed to the document.

8. Every alteration should bear the initials of the tenderers, and all tenders not bearing the tenderers' initials will be treated as informal and rejected.

9. Samples of all materials to be deposited with the Provincial Engineer, North-Western Province, labelled with the name of the tenderer, on or before October 28, 1895.
