No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before June 1, 1896, an application on the prescribed form, accompanied by a list of the subjects in which the Candidate desires to be examined.

The Order for admission to the Examination will be posted on July 21, 1896, to the address given on the Form of Application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which Candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee $(\pounds 6)$ is to be paid.

REGULATIONS.

oo, The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year. .

An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in 1. London in August of each year. The date of the Examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners. 2.

No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners-

That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

(ii.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-three years on the first day of the

(ii.) That his age will be above twenty-one years and under twenty-inco years on the line age of years on the state of the examination is to be held.
[N.B.—In the case of natives of India it will be necessary for a Candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Nutive State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]
(iii) That he has no disease constitutional affection, or hodily infimity unfitting him, or likely to unfit

(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India. (iv.) That he is of good moral character.

Should the evidence upon the above points be primâ facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the Candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the Examination. The Commissioners may however, in their discretion at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any Candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

7. The Examination will be conducted on paper and vivâ voce, as may be deemed necessary. 8. The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above-mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be selected Candidates for the Uvil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In this Examination, as in the Open Competition, the merit of the Candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the Open Competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The Examination will be conducted on paper and viva voce, as may be deemed necessary. This Examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the "Final Examination." 10. The Selected Candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding.

The examinations in riding will be held as follows :-

(1) Shortly after the result of the Open Competitive Examination has been declared, or at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.

English Composition.—An Essay to be written on one of several subjects specified by the Civil Service Commissioners on their Examination Paper.

English Language and Literature.-The Examination will be in two parts. In the one the Candidates will be

expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English Literature, as represented (mainly) by the following writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III. and the accession of Queen Victoria:

Verse--Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Pope, Gray, Collins, Johnson, Goldsmith, Crabbe, Cowper, Campbell, Wordsworth, Scott, Byron, Coleridge, Shelley, Keats. Prose--Bacon, Sir Thomas Browne, Milton, Cowley, Bunyan, Dryden, Swift, Defoe, Addison, Johnson, Burke, Scott, Macaulay (Essays and Biographies).

A minute knowledge of the works of these authors will not be looked for in this part of the Examination, which will, however, test how far the Candidates have studied the chief productions of the greatest English writers in themselves, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English literature. Candidates will also be expected to show that they have studied in these authors the history of the English language in respect of its vocabulary, syntax, and prosody.

The other part of the Examination will relate to one of the periods named below, which will follow each other year by year in the order indicated :-

The Examination in this part will require from Candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English language and literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners.³ The names placed under the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of Examination. All the works of Shakespeare, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1700; all the works of Swift within the period 1700 to 1800; all the works of Scott and Wordsworth, and all the works of Macaulay within the period 1800 to 1832.

French Language and Literature .-- Translation from French into English, and from English into French. Critical questions on the French Language and Literature. German Language and Literature.—Translation from German into English, and from English into German.

Critical questions on the German Language and Literature.

Latin Language and Literature.-Translation from Latin into English, Composition in Prose and Verse, or (as an alternative for Verse Composition) questions on Latin Philology. Critical questions on the Latin Language and Literature.

Greek Language and Literature .-- Translation from Greek into English, Composition in Prose and Verse, or (as an alternative for Verse-Composition) questions on Greek Philology. Oritical questions on the Greek Language and Literature.

Sanskrit Language and Literature.—Translation from Sanskrit into English, and from English into Sanskrit ; History of Sanskrit Literature (including knowledge of such Indian History as bears upon the subject); Sanskrit Grammar ; Vedic Philology.

Arubic Language and Literature.-Translations as in Sanskrit ; History of Arabic Literature ; Arabic Grammar ; Arabic Prosody.

English History.—General questions on English History from 800 A.D. to 1848 A.D.; questions on the Constitutional History of England from 800 A.D. to 1848 A.D.

General Modern History.-Candidates may, at their choice, be examined in any one of the following periods :-

From the accession of Charlemagne to the Third Crusade. [800 A.D. to 1193 A.D.]
 From the Third Crusade to the Diet of Worms. [1193 A.D. to 1521 A.D.]
 From the Diet of Worms to the death of Louis XIV. [1521 A.D. to 1715 A.D.]
 From the Accession of Louis XV. to the French Revolution of 1848. [1715 A.D. to 1848 A.D.]

Periods (3) and (4) will include Indian History

Greek History.-Questions on the General History of Greece to the death of Alexander; questions on the Constitutional History of Greece during the same period. Roman History.-Questions on the General History of Rome to the death of Vespasian; questions on the

Constitutional History of Rome during the same period.

In Greek and Roman History Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities.

Mathematics.-Pure Mathematics : Algebra, Geometry (Euclid and Geometrical Conic Sections), Plane Trigonometry, Plane Analytical Geometry (less advanced portions), Differential Calculus (Elementary), Integral Calculus (Elementary).

Applied Mathematics : Statics, Dynamics of a Particle, Hydrostatics, Geometrical Optics ; all treated without the aid of the Differential or Integral Calculus.

Advanced Mathematics.—Pure Mathematics : Higher Algebra, including Theory of Equations, Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Differential Calculus, Integral Calculus, Differential Equations, Analytical Geometry, Plane and Solid.

Applied Mathematics : Statics, including Attractions, Dynamics of a Particle, Rigid Dynamics, Hydromechanics, Geometrical and Physical Optics, and Geometrical Astronomy.

Political Economy and Economic History.-Candidates will be expected to possess a knowledge of economic theory as treated in the larger text books, also a knowledge of the existing economic conditious, and of statistical methods as applied to economic inquiries, together with a general knowledge of the history of industry, land tenure,

and economic legislation in the United Kingdom. Logic and Mental Philosophy (Ancient and Modern).—Logic will include both Deductive and Inductive Logic. Mental Philosophy will include Psychology and Metaphysics.

Political Science.-The Examination will not be confined to Analytical Jurisprudence, Early Institutions, and Theory of Legislation, but may embrace Comparative Politics, the History of Political Theories, &c.

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ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1895.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: the recent rains have done some damage to the crops, but a fairly good maha is expected on the whole.

Dry grain : no cultivation during the month.

Other products : the snoply of vegetables is good and prices are moderate, but fruit is rather scarce and dear. Prices or staple products : rice from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts from Rs. 30 to Rs. 38 per 1,000.

R infall : during the month there was abundance of rain.

Ronarks on harvest prospects generally : on the whole a fairly good maha is expected.

· NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy : yala harvest, nil. Maha harvest : the fields sown seem to thrive well, excepting some damaged by floods.

Dry grain : in Hapitigam korale cultivation is going on. Other products : vegetables are plentiful in Alutkuru korale north, but scarce in Hapitigam korale. Fruit plentiful in Hapitigam korale ; scarce in Alutkuru korale north.

Prices of staple products : rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 425 per bushel ; paddy, Re. 150 per bushel ; coccoanuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 per 1,000. Rainfall : plentiful.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : good.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : In Pasdun korale east and west the cultivation of the fields for the maha harvest is over. In Rayigam korale and in the Totamunes the crop is about three months old, and it has been damaged by the recent rains. Dry grain : none.

Other products : fruits and vegetables are abundant in Rayigam korale. In other parts of the district they are scarce.

Prices of staple products : imported rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel ; country-grown rice, same rate ; cocoanuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 per 1,000.

Rainfall : heavy.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : prospects unfavourable owing to heavy rain in Pasdun korale east and the Totamunes, but fair in Pasdun korale west and Rayigam korale.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha : the fields in Udunuwara, Harispattu, Pata Dumbara, Uda Dumbara, Pata Hewaheta, Udapalata, and in Uda Bulatgama are being transplanted; in Yatinuwara and Tumpane being sown. Crop or prospects : too early to form an opinion.

Yala : the fields in Tumpane and Harispattu are being harvested. Crop or prospects : good.

Dry grain, maha : hill paddy chenas in Yatinuwara, Tumpane, Harrispattu, and Pata Dumbara blossoming ; in Uda Dumbara being sown ; kurakkan chenas in Pata Dumbara and Uda Dumbara are being sown. The chenas sown

in Pata Hewaheta are dying up for want of rain. Crop or prospects : too early to form an opinion. Yala : kurakkan and amu chenas in Tumpane and Harispattu are being harvested. Crop or prospects : good. • Rainfall : sufficient in Yatinuwara, Tumpane, Harispattu, Udapalata, and Uda Bulatgama. Insufficient in other divisions.

Prices : paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1.25 per bushel ; coccanuts, Rs. 35 per 1,000.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Matale south : the rainfall recorded in Matale is 4.83 inches. A fair extent of paddy land was ploughed with a view to sowing it with hondarawala, but the November rains did not come up to expectations, and some may have to be given up. The kurakkan and el-vi chenas are doing remarkably well.

Matale north : the rainfall recorded at Dambulla is 6.10 inches. The paddy cultivation for maha under tanks is very satisfactory, and comparatively better than that of the last maha; chenas are doing well except at Inamalawa and Wagapanaha Pallesiya pattus, where the chenas had to be sown a second time, the plants of the first sowing having been destroyed by polangeti and welipannwo.

Matale east : cultivation is very satisfactory, and the weather is most favourable.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy, Kotmale : paddy plants four months old ; general appearance good. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane : yala harvest near.

Dry grain, Kotmale : a good crop of kurakkan is being reaped. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane kurakkan : young plants.

Rain : Kotmale and Walapane not sufficient.

Fruits and vegetables not abundant.

Prices of staple articles : paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.37 to Re. 1.75 per bushel; Indian corn Re. 1.37 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 6 per 100; cardamoms, 87 cents a lb.

Health : generally good. Cattle : a very few cases of hoof disease reported from Walapane.

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NOBTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather : there was heavy rain almost throughout the district on the 4th and almost daily between the 20th

Weather : there was heavy rain almost throughout the district on the 4th and almost daily between the 20th and 30th. The rainfall registered at the Public Works Department Office, Jaffna, was 12:83 inches. Paddy, kalapokam of 1896 : transplanting was continued during the month. The paddy plants of the first sowing are in ear ; the plants of the second sowing are thriving well, and the plants of the third sowing are reported in some divisions to have been affected by chental (barren shoot), as it is called, owing to the blowing of the south-west wind while the paddy was in plants. The prospects of the crop in general, however, are so far good. Dry grain crop : varaku is in plants and ear, and the prospects are reported to be fair. Kurakkan is in ear in some parts, and in others it is being cut, and the prospects good. Putchami, payaru, uluntho, and kollu are in tender plants in some divisions, and being sown in others. Price of staple articles : paddy, Re. 1.75 per bushel ; rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel ; tinaichami, Re. 1.52 per bushel ; panichchami, Re. 1.52 per bushel ; varaku, Re. 1.30 per bushel ; and pinaddu, Rs. 3 per kudai.

per kudai.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

Lands sown in the latter part of October (maha paddy) are in plant. Ploughing is still in progress on the main land.

The extent of land sown on the main land is considerably under the average, owing to scarcity of seed paddy and buffaloes, large numbers of the latter having died during the late drought. The chena cultivation of dry or fine grain both in Mannar island and on the main land is in plant, and promises a good crop.

Health of people : satisfactory, with the exception of a few stray cases of fever. Health of cattle : good ; they have now good pasture and plenty of water. Paddy sells at Re. 1.62 per bushel ; kurakkan at Re. 1.50 per bushel. Sea fishing has been very successful during the month, and sales of salt are large.

Rainfall : 8.16 inches.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Sowing of some fields under tanks took place in Mulliavalai and Tunukkai divisions. Paddy plants are flourishing.

Prices of food articles : paddy, Re. 1 50 per bushel ; rice, Rs. 3 50 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1 25 per bushel ; and varaku, Re. 1 per bushel.

Good rain throughout the district. Almost all the tanks have collected sufficient water for cultivation. The weather was chilly, the north-east wind blowing hard. Cold and fever prevalent among people in general.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

Incessant and heavy rain, unprecedented for many years past, fell during the month. Tanks and wells full and filling everywhere. The restored tanks, Mamadu and Maha Rambaikulam, spilled for the second time during the month, hesides some village tanks, whilst the other tanks have collected sufficient water for the kalapokam cultivation, and in some cases the idaipokam cultivation also. A few small tanks breached and were repaired. Rainfall registered at Vavuniya during the month is 10:43 inches, as against 5:15 inches during the corresponding

month of last year.

Paddy in tank beds partly damaged by floods in Kilakkumulai. The plants both in beds and fields are thriving well generally. Sowing continues in fields. Greater extents sown throughout the district. Want of seed paddy and also buffaloes for ploughing, consequent on the havoc caused by murrain, have been impediments to the progress of cultivation. An application per advance of seed paddy from the Panankamam division has been recommended to Government.

The few chenas are also thriving well.

On the whole there is every prospect of a good harvest next year.

Prices of articles of food, particularly rice and cocoanut, have risen high; paddy, Re. 1.50 to Re. 1.75 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.30 to Re. 1.75 per bushel; gingelly, Rs. 4 per bushel; rice, Rs. 4 to Rs. 4.30 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 7.50 per 100.

Cattle disease still lingers in a few villages, but in a less virulent form, a sign of its dying out soon.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy and dry grain, maha : the crops raised are young, and looking healthy. Some of the low-lying lands where paddy was destroyed by floods during the previous month have been re-sown. Miscellaneous : breadfruit, jak, plantain, and other vegetables are scarce; cocoanut crop is poor; price,

Rs. 30 per thousand. Price of staple products: Coast rice, Rs. 3 per bushel ; country rice, Rs. 4; paddy, Re. 1.50; mederi and kurakkan, Rs. 2; amu, Re. 1.

Rainfall : 11.44 inches.

Health : satisfactory on the whole ; fever, dysentery, chickenpox, and influenza, which have prevailed in the gravets and Talpe and Wellaboda pattu being on the decrease.

Cattle : hoof-and-throat disease was prevalent in Wellaboda pattu and gravets, and a few head of cattle have died.

MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : good.

Dry grain : good. Prices : paddy and fine grain, Re. 1.50 per bushel.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

West Girawa Pattu.

Paddy : almost all the lands prescribed for second maha have been cultivated, and the crop is fair ; cultivation of lands dependent on tanks has been carried on on a small scale owing to the absence of local rain.

Dry grain : the dry grain crop in some villages fair, and in some others rather poor.

Miscellaneous : there is a good supply of vegetables ; the food supply of the inhabitants of the pattu is limited. Price of articles : same as in the previous month. ÷ . Rainfall : there has been some rainfall in the month.

Health : fever prevails in some villages of the interior.

East Girawa Pattu.

Faddy: preparations are being made for the maha cultivation in Kanuketiya upper and lower divisious. Fine grain: owing to the scarcity of rain most of the chenas have failed; but it is supposed that chenas in the Paranagam and Wewgam palatas are likely to be successful. Price of articles: same as in the previous month.

Magam Pattu.

Paddy : maha muddings and sowings already completed, and the plants are thriving well at Tissa.

Western Walakada : the maha muddings have not yet been completed. Eastern and Mid Walakadas : preparations are being made for the second maha.

Fine grain : although permits were issued for chenas in this pattu to a limited extent, the chenas cleared could not have been set on fire owing to untimely rainfall, and as a consequence have failed in most places.

Prices of articles of food : same as in previous month.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy : sowing of early munmari lands under ploughing system on about 35,000 acres is over. Preparations being made to commence sowing of later munmari with three months paddy on about 15,000 acres.

Dry grain : Indian corn, plants in excellent condition, and an excellent harvest is expected.

Prices : paddy, Re. 1 per bushel. Dry grain : nil. Rainfall : 18'73 inches.

Health of people and cattle on the whole good.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rainfall: 14.20 inches.

Paddy : the munmari paddy plants are thriving well in Koddiyar, Tamblegam, and Kaddukkulam pattus.

Manioca : manioca gave a fair return in Koddiyar and Tamblegam pattus.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNEGALA DISTRICT.

The activity in sowing which October's rains produced has been maintained during the past month. An area considerably over the average for several years is now under cultivation. The prospects of tank-fed fields are excellent. For the rest, all depends upon future rain. The rain during the past month was unequally distributed.

Health of people and cattle good. The rainfall registered at Kurunegala was 2.90 inches.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division : a large extent of paddy has been damaged by rain ; fine grain crop is thriving. A large

extent of land is being ploughed. Central division : 6,281 bushels of paddy sown, of which about 1,907 bushels have been abandoned in consequence of heavy rain and floods ; remaining crop is in good condition. The cultivators are ploughing again to sow bálawi. Fine grain crops considerably damaged by rain. Rainfall 1st to 24th, 6.35 inches. Southern division : 23 bushels of paddy and 8 bushels of fine grain sown during the month : crops on low lands damaged by flood. Vegetable crop good ; tobacco curing is nearly over.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: in some villages of Demala hatpattu paddy is in ear, and in others ploughing and sowing opera-tions are being carried on for the maha harvest. In Puttalam pattu young plants are thriving in some villages, while sowing operations are being carried on in others; paddy sown on high lands has been destroyed by floods. Prospects generally good. Dry grain: some chenas in Demala hatpattu are in ear, and others are being sown. Sowing of chenas in Puttalam pattu completed and young plants have appointed up. Prospects good

Puttalam pattu completed, and young plants have sprouted up. Prospects good. Staple products : rice from Rs. 3 50 to Rs. 4 ; cocoanut, Rs. 4 to Rs. 5 per 100.

Rainfall : the weather has been wet, but seasonable during the month ; the rainfall amounts to 6 66 inches.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT.

The rainfall during the month, as registered at Anuradhapura, is 7.83 inches.

The crop on paddy chenas and fields in Nuwaragampalata and Hurulupalata is still young. In Kalagam-palata and Tamankadnwa fields are being sown. Some tavaln crops were damaged by submersion. The crops on kurakkan chenas are young. Some chenas are still being sown. Kurakkan crops in Hurulupalata and Tamankaduwa are reputed to be damaged by insects.

Most of the tanks in Kalagampalata are quite full. In other palatas a few are full, and others are half full or quarter full.

Cattle murrain is still prevailing in Nuwaragampalata, and people in some of the villages in this palata experience difficulty in cultivating their fields in consequence.

Food is reported to be scarce amongst the people of Hurulupalata, but there is every reason to hope for good erops next harvest.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

BADULLA DISTRICT.

Yatikinda : yala crops promising ; fruits and vegetables plentiful. Weather showery. Fever and sore-eyes prevalent.

Udukinda : maha harvest gathered, and yield good. Yala crops ripening, and prospects good. Weather wet. Vegetables scarce. A few cases of dysentery have been reported, otherwise public health good.

Wellassa : ploughing of maha fields going on. Sowing of chenas over. Weather showery. Fever and sore-eyes prevalent. Vegetables plentiful.

Viyaluwa : yala crop ripe, and prospects good. Sowing of chenas over. Vegetables plentiful. Weather wet. Fever, sore-eyes, and measles prevalent.

Buttala : yala crops were bad, having suffered from rain during harvest. Preparations for malía cultivation being made. Sowing of chenas over. Cocoanuts plentiful. Vegetables scarce. Public health good. Weather showery. Wellawaya : preparation to cultivate paddy being made. Sowing of chenas over. Vegetables scarce. Dysentery and messles prevalent. Weather showery.

Bintenna : preparations to cultivate paddy being made. Chenas being sown. Vegetables scarce. Weather wet.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy : in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, and Atakalan korales, maha crops are just beginning to blossom. In the other korales fields are not so far advanced.

Preparations for the yala cultivation have commenced, and in Nawadun korale fields for the yala have been

sown; prospects favourable. Dry grain : chena crops in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, and Atakalan korales are just blossoming, and in good con-dition. In the Bintenna of Atakalan, Kolonna, and Meda korales the kurakkan chenas are growing well. In Kukulu korale amn has been sown.

No cattle disease has been reported.

Health of district fair.

Fever prevalent.

KEGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy : maha prospects are generally good. Late maha fields are being sown in parts of Galboda and Kinigoda korales.

Dry grain : hill paddy, iringu, and amu prospects are generally good. Meneri and kurakkan prospects in

Beligal korale are good. Prices : paddy, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 per bushel ; hill paddy, Re. 1 per bushel ; kurakkan, 87 cents to Re. 1 per bushel : amu, 75 cents per bushel.

The district is free from cattle disease. The health of the people in Four Korales is generally good. Chickenpox, measles, and dysentery are prevailing in parts of Three Korales.

6. Every alteration should bear the initials of the tenderers, and all tenders containing alterations not bearing the tenderers' initials will be treated as informal and rejected. 7. Ev

NDER directions from the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the following copy of an Order of the Queen in Council, of October 3, 1895, is published for general information.

Colonial Secretary's Office. Colombo, December 6, 1895. By His Excellency's command, W. T. TAYLOR, Acting Colonial Secretary.

At the Court at Balmoral, the 3rd day of October, 1895. Present :

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Order in Council dated the 30th July, 1868, made by Her Majesty in exercise W of the powers conferred upon Her by the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that the merchant ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof should after the 1st January, 1865, have been ascertained and denoted on the registers and other national papers of such ships, testified by the dates thereof, should be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships, after making therefrom the same deductions, in respect of crew, space, and engine room, as would, if such ships were British, be made from their gross tonnage under the laws relating to British ships :

And whereas by another Order in Council dated the 19th March, 1883, made in exercise of the aforesaid powers, Her Majesty was pleased to direct as follows :-

(1) As regards sailing ships : that merchant sailing ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof after the 5th August, 1882, has been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such sailing ships, testified by the date thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers and other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British sailing ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships.

(2) As regards steamships : that merchant ships belonging to the United States of America, which are propelled by steam or any other power requiring engine room, the measurement whereof shall, after the said 5th day of August, 1882, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such steamships, testified by the dates thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships. Provided, nevertheless, that if the owner or master of any such American steamship desires the deduction for engine room in his ship to be estimated under the rules for engine room measurement, and deduction applicable to British ships instead of under the American rule, the engine room shall be measured, and the deduction calculated according to the British rules.

And whereas by section 84 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that, whenever it appears to Her Majesty the Queen in Council that the tonnage regulations of that Act have been adopted by any foreign country, and are in force there. Her Majesty in Council may order that the ships of that country shall, without being re-measured in Her Majesty's dominions, be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty in Council that the tonnage regulations of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, have been adopted by the United States of America, and such regulations are now in force there, having come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1895:

And whereas there still are or may be ships belonging to the United States of America to which the hereinbefore recited Orders of 30th July, 1868, and the 19th March, 1883, may respectively apply, and it is expedient not to revoke the same, but to let the said recited orders remain in force so long as there are any ships to which the same may so respectively apply : And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with :

Now therefore Her Majesty, in pursuance and exercise of the powers hereinbefore mentioned, is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the merchant ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof shall, after the 1st day of April, 1895, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such ships, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship.
