KNOW Ye that in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by section 6 (1) of the Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, 1899, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, We, the Governor of Ceylon, do by this Proclamation establish from the date hereof a general cemetery on the land described in Schedule A hereto for the burial or cremation of the dead within the limits specified and defined in Schedule B hereto.

And We do further, under section 6 (3), wholly exempt the general cemetery so established from the operation of sections 11, 16, 17, and 24 of the Ordinance.

The Regulations relating to the Ceylon Cadet Battalion of the Ceylon Defence Force published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,245 of September 25, 1936, as amended by Regulation published in *Gazette* No. 8,255 of November 6, 1936, are hereby further amended as follows:—

Delete the existing section 28 and substitute the following therefor:—

28. Officers who have been paid from votes for services exclusive of Establishments or from Loan Funds shall, when transferred to appointments on the Establishment, be allowed to count for pension two-thirds of such service as may have been continuous with their subsequent service on the Establishment.

Provided that—

(1) When an officer's service has been mainly on the Establishment but has been interrupted by one or more casual periods during which he was paid from votes for services exclusive of the Establishment, the Governor may order that the whole period of the officer's service shall count for pension in full.

(2) The service of Overseers in the Public Works and Survey Departments shall be deemed to be continuous if the breaks therein have been caused by no fault of their own.

(3) Those periods of service during which the officers referred to in Part I. of Schedule B were remunerated from Surplus Balances and those periods of service during which the officers referred to in Part II. of Schedule B were remunerated either from votes for services exclusive of Establishments or from Loan Funds or from Surplus Balances may count in full for pension.

(4) Officers who have already retired at the date of the coming into force of the third proviso may be granted with effect from the date of their retirement additional gratuities and pensions equal to the difference between the pensions and gratuities granted and those for which the officers would have been eligible if the third proviso had been in force when they retired.

Delete sub-section (ii.) of section 9 and renumber sub-section (iii.) as (ii.).

This Council resolves under section 17 of Ordinance No. 17 of 1869 that on and after the date succeeding that on which this resolution is notified in the *Government Gazette* after submission to and sanction by the Secretary of State, port dues shall be levied and paid on ships arriving at or departing from the several ports of this Island and upon cargo imported to or exported from the port of Colombo, at the rates and subject to the conditions, exceptions, and provisions prescribed in the schedule hereto, in lieu of—

- (a) the port dues leviable and payable, and
(b) the conditions, exceptions and provisions in force with regard to the charge and payment of such port dues,

on the date of this resolution.

- (i.) vessels which, while in harbour, carry out none but the following operations :—
- taking in coal or oil for bunkers ;
 - taking in water ;
 - taking in provisions ;
 - awaiting or receiving orders ;
 - taking in or discharging mails ;
 - discharging sick persons, their attendants, and families ;
 - discharging or taking in crews ;
 - going into dock ;
 - repairs ; and
 - discharging or shipping overcarried cargo ;

shall be charged a special consolidated rate of Rs. 200 only to cover pilotage, entering dues, use of tugs, and bill of health granted by day :

- (ii.) vessels employed in the steamer service between Colombo and Tuticorin shall be given a rebate of 10 per cent. on the harbour dues payable by them for the second and every subsequent entrance by the same vessel within a week :
- (iii.) trawlers operating from a Ceylon port and duly registered at a port of registry in Ceylon shall be allowed to compound for entering dues at Colombo for twelve months at 50 cents per ton of the registered tonnage :

- (iv.) vessels halting outside the harbour but within the limits of the port shall be exempted from the payment of entering dues, provided they carry out none but the following operations :—

- visual signalling ;
- receiving orders ;
- discharging sick and injured persons, their attendants, and families ; stowaways and persons overcarried :

- (v.) vessels halting outside the harbour but within the limits of the port, which receive passengers on the written authority of the Collector of Customs and after examination by the Port Surgeon, and not otherwise, shall be charged a special consolidated rate of Rs. 200 :

- (vi.) vessels re-entering the harbour within 12 hours of their departure to discharge persons who have been overcarried shall be exempted from the payment of entering dues, if they do not moor :

- (vii.) men-of-war, vessels of the Imperial Light Service, troopships, hospital ships, and Royal Fleet Auxiliaries belonging to the Admiralty or on Admiralty Charter which normally fly the Blue Ensign with Admiralty Badge and carry no cargo on which freight is paid, and private yachts shall be exempt from all entering dues.

2. Payment of these charges or of the consolidated special rate shall clear a vessel inwards and outwards, if her stay in the port does not exceed 96 hours.

Over-hour and Buoy Rent Charges.

If any vessel's stay in port exceeds 96 hours and does not exceed 288 hours, one-half of the charges shall be added. If it exceeds 288 hours the same rate shall be paid outwards as was paid inwards, and in addition a buoy rent shall be payable on demand by the Collector, or if not sooner demanded, on clearance outwards, of Rs. 19 for every day or part of a day of her stay in port after the expiration of such 288 hours :

Provided that—

- (i.) buoy rent shall not be payable—
- in respect of any time beyond the said period during which a vessel has stayed in port without discharging or shipping cargo, either for repairs or because she was unable to put to sea without risk, if the Master Attendant is satisfied that such stay was necessary and was not unduly prolonged ; or
 - in respect of any time during which a vessel is on the slips or in dry dock ; or
 - in respect of any time during which any vessel, declared by the Governor by notification in the *Gazette* to be a reserve vessel, is kept in port as a reserve vessel to maintain the regularity of the mail service or for other important public service :
- (ii.) buoy rent shall be payable at Rs. 5 only per day or part of a day by sailing vessels and native craft of 300 tons burthen and under ; native craft, for the purposes of this schedule, being taken to mean any vessel owned and manned by Ceylonese, Indians, or Maldivians and employed in trade between any port in Ceylon and any other port in Ceylon, the Maldivian Islands, or India :
- (iii.) the vessel bearing the annual Tribute from the Maldivian Government shall be exempted from payment of buoy rent for one calendar month reckoned from the date of its entry into the harbour :
- (iv.) men-of-war, vessels of the Imperial Light Service, troopships, hospital ships, and Royal Fleet Auxiliaries belonging to the Admiralty or on Admiralty Charter, which normally fly the Blue Ensign with Admiralty Badge and carry no cargo on which freight is paid, and private yachts shall be exempt from all over-hour and buoy rent charges.

Tonnage Dues.

The following shall be the rates of the tonnage dues payable by ships discharging or loading cargo :—

- sixteen cents per ton upon all cargo discharged or loaded by vessels up to 200 tons register ; thirty-two cents per ton upon all cargo discharged or loaded by vessels above 200 tons register ;
- twenty-five cents per ton upon all petroleum or liquid fuel in bulk, or coal or coke which may be discharged, 250 gallons of petroleum or liquid fuel being reckoned as a ton for this purpose ;

Provided that—

- (i.) cargo brought to the port for transhipment shall be free of dues under this heading if it is not landed or if being landed it is not entered for duty;
- (ii.) vessels of 300 tons and under shall be allowed to land or ship 5 tons of cargo free, and vessels of over 300 tons shall be allowed to land or ship 10 tons of cargo free;
- (iii.) men-of-war, troopships, hospital ships, and Royal Fleet Auxiliaries belonging to the Admiralty or on Admiralty Charter, which normally fly the Blue Ensign with Admiralty Badge and carry no cargo on which freight is paid shall be exempt from tonnage dues in respect of any cargo discharged or loaded which is exempt from duty under Ordinance No. 3 of 1927.

Note.—Tonnage of cargo shall be reckoned according to scales approved and published by the Principal Collector of Customs.

2. On payment of the above dues, goods shall be allowed to remain at the Wharf for three clear days, exclusive of Sundays and Customs Holidays. This period shall be known as the period of First Harbour Dues and the rate applicable thereto as First Harbour Dues. Thereafter, a similar rate shall be charged for each succeeding day or part thereof, including Sundays and Customs Holidays and the day of removal or shipment.

Exemptions.—Imported Goods.

3. The following goods shall be exempt from first harbour dues:—

6. Coastwise goods which are brought for transshipment or reshipment and are not through cargo shall, if they are landed, pay both import and export dues; if they are transhipped without being landed, they shall be liable to export dues only.

7. In the case of opium intended for transshipment, if it is deposited in the Strong Room and not transhipped on the same day, the reshipment harbour dues payable shall be deemed to be included in the consolidated rate of fifteen cents per package which shall be charged for each day (including the day of landing or deposit, day of removal, Sundays, and Customs Holidays) or for any period less than a day, during which it remains in the Strong Room.

- (d) on any mail steamer entering or leaving the port of Talaimannar or on any ferry steamer or dhony run in connection with the Indo-Ceylon train service;
- (e) on any private yacht, vessel of the Imperial Light Service, man-of-war, troopship, hospital ship or Royal Fleet, Auxiliary, belonging to the Admiralty or on Admiralty Charter, normally flying the Blue Ensign with Admiralty Badge and carrying no cargo on which freight is payable;
- (f) on any vessel entering or leaving the port of Trincomalee solely on account of the Lighthouse Services.

The following rule shall be added immediately after rule 32 under Head 3 (Records) of Part VIII. (Miscellaneous) of the Rules of Civil Procedure for Village Tribunals, published in *Gazette* No. 7,568 of February 18, 1927, and shall have effect as rule 32A of the said rules:—

"32A. The President of a Village Tribunal, or the Government Agent, who is for the time being responsible for the custody of the record or journal of proceedings of any civil case instituted in that Village Tribunal shall, on the application of any person, furnish that person with a copy of such record or journal, or of any part of such record or journal, on payment of a fee of 12 cents for every folio of 120 words: provided that the President or the Government Agent may, in his discretion, waive any such fee, if for any reason he is of opinion that any copy should be furnished to any person free of charge."

"44. The President, or the Chairman, or the Government Agent, who is for the time being responsible for the custody of the record or journal of proceedings of any case shall, on the application of any person affected by any judgment or order entered in that case, furnish to that person a copy of such record or journal, or of any part of such record or journal on payment of a fee of 12 cents for every folio of 120 words: provided that the President or the Chairman or the Government Agent may, in his discretion, waive any such fee if for any reason he is of opinion that any copy should be furnished to that person free of charge."

6. Alterations and erasures must be initialled by the tenderers, otherwise the tenders may be treated as informal and rejected.

7. A cash deposit according to the schedule hereunder will be required to be made at the Office of the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services or at a Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued. Should any person decline or fail to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or fail to furnish the approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing of the acceptance of the tender, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature to the contract. Notice of acceptance of the tender will be deemed to have been received by the tenderer if it has been sent by post addressed to, or left at, the address given by the tenderer.

8. William Silva and several other residents of Kandy protesting against the reduction in the vote allowed for the purchase of medical herbs and oils for the Municipal Free Ayurvedic Dispensary. Considered. Resolved that a supplementary vote can be granted during 1937 if found necessary for 1937.

Mr. Marikar suggested that a change in the constitution of the Board of Management might also be considered.

Mr. Marikar presented—(2) Petition dated December 11, 1936, from Space Holders in the Kandy Public Market protesting against the extension of the time allowed for the Market Fair. Resolved to reply that the time fixed merely regularises the existing practice. It was also suggested that another site might be chosen for holding the Fair in due course.

5. Correspondence :—(a) Copy of letter No. H. 55 of November 24, 1936, from the Secretary to the Minister for Local Administration to the address of Dr. E. S. Godlieb informing him that he has been nominated as a member of the Kandy Municipal Council in place of Dr. D. T. de Kretser, with effect from October 29, 1936, for the remainder of the period ending December 31, 1938, for the information of the Chairman.—Tabled.

(b) Copy of letter No. H. 55 of December 10, 1936, from the Secretary to the Minister for Local Administration to the address of Mr. C. H. Bradley informing him that he has been nominated as a member of the Kandy Municipal Council in place of Mr. O. T. Nettleton, with effect from December 9, 1936, for the remainder of the period ending December 31, 1938, for the information of the Chairman.—Tabled.

6. Quotations received for painting Deyannawela Model Dwellings. Resolved that the lowest tender, viz., that of R. James for Rs. 346.50 be accepted, the Chairman, Dr. Godlieb and Mr. Bradley dissenting on the ground that the rate was too low to enable satisfactory work to be done.

7. Quotations received for cement washing Deyannawela Model Dwellings. Resolved that the lowest tender, viz., that of R. James for Rs. 46.65 be accepted, the Chairman, Dr. Godlieb and Mr. Bradley dissenting on the ground that the rate was too low to enable satisfactory work to be done.

8. To obtain sanction for leasing the premises of the Municipal Free Library from their owner for a further term of 3 years on a rental of Rs. 61.30 per mensem. Resolved to continue on a monthly tenancy.

9. Papers *re* the cessation of work on unemployment relief account. Tabled.

10. To obtain sanction for the transfer of a sum of Rs. 160 out of the saving on Estimate 8 "Market Buildings" to Estimate 62 "Repairs to Barrel Drains passing premises No. 312, Trincomalee street." Resolved that the transfer be approved.

11. To table papers relating to the legal position in respect of encroachments on streets. (O 657.)—Tabled.

12. Papers relating to the occupation of quarters near the Lake Spill Stores by Mr. Kaimal, Waterworks Inspector.

The Chairman read his report dated December 18, 1936.

Mr. de Silva thought that the officer should be punished for removing part of the ornamental wall without authority.

Further consideration was deferred for the next meeting, when any previous papers on the subject should be available.

13. Municipal Electrical Engineer's letter dated September 10, 1936, suggesting the installation of a 500 K.W.D.C. Engine set at the Power Station at an inclusive cost of Rs. 125,000.

The Chairman moved the Council into Committee to consider the subject.

The Chairman then read Municipal Electrical Engineer's further letter dated December 17, 1936, pointing out the urgent necessity for installing additional generating plant to meet the increasing demand.

Mr. de Silva observed that what was necessary was only to effect repairs to the existing small engine and moved "That a new Engine Set be not purchased." Mr. Ismail seconded.

The Chairman indicated that repairs to the small engine cannot be effected unless new generating plant was available to replace the small engine during the period of repair.

Mr. de Silva's motion was put to the meeting and carried by 5 to 3.

Ayes.—Messrs. de Silva, Ismail, Marikar, Wijayatilake, and Soysa. *Noes.*—The Chairman, Dr. Godlieb, and Mr. Bradley.

The Council resumed and the resolution passed in Committee was adopted by 5 to 3. The division being the same as in Committee.

The Council agreed that his security should be forfeited and the lease readvertised in due course.

22. The Chairman tabled tenders received for the lease of the land lying to the north of the Kandy Public Market and moved the Council into Committee to consider them.

In Committee the Chairman gave details of the five tenders received and the special conditions suggested by the tenderers, and moved that all tenders be rejected as they were unsatisfactory and that the lease be readvertised when times are opportune after revising conditions 3 of the conditions of tender. Mr. Ismail seconded.—Carried.

The Council then resumed and the resolution passed in Committee was adopted.

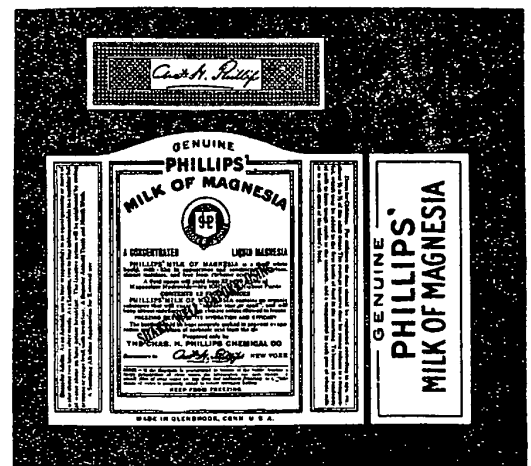

Any applications received after that hour will be rejected.

Candidates must be British Subjects whose families are permanently resident in Ceylon. They must furnish proof when forwarding their applications that

they have previously passed at least the Cambridge Junior or the Junior School Certificate (English) Examination. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be not less than 17 nor more than 23 years of age on March 6, 1937, together with a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person to the satisfaction of the Director of Education must be attached to the form of application. All applications must also bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 5. Final selection for appointment will be made by the Deputy Chief Secretary after interview.

The appointments will be on 2 years' probation in the first instance and will be on the salary scale of Rs. 480 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 30 to Rs. 1,200 per annum. The appointments are pensionable.

The successful candidates not already in Government service will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness to serve in any part of the Island.
