THE AIR NAVIGATION (COLONIES, PROTECTORATES, AND MANDATED TERRITORIES) (AMENDMENT) (No. 2) ORDER, 1936.

THE text of the above Order in Council, which amends the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates, and Mandated Territories) Order, 1927, and came into operation in Ceylon on the first day of January, 1937, is hereby published for general information.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the Air Navigation Act, 1920, His late Majesty King George the Fifth in Council was pleased, by the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) Order, 1927, and the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1929, the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1931, the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1932, and the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1935, amending the first mentioned Order, to make certain provisions of the Air Navigation (Consolidation) Order, 1923, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1925, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1927, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1928, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 3) Order, 1928, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 4) Order, 1928, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 2) Order, 1929, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 3) Order, 1929, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 2) Order, 1930, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1931, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1932, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1933, the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1934, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 2) Order, 1934, the Air Navigation (Amendment) (No. 3) Order, 1934, and the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1935, applicable to certain British Possessions and certain territories under His Majesty's protection and to registered aircraft being the property of British subjects resident or companies incorporated therein:

And whereas in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the said Act His Majesty has been pleased to make further Orders in Council, namely, the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates, and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1936, amending the said Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates, and Mandated Territories)

Order, 1927, as previously amended, and the Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1936, amending the said Air Navigation (Consolidation) Order, 1923, as previously amended:

And whereas it is expedient that the first mentioned Order as so amended (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") should be further amended so as to make certain of the provisions of the said Air Navigation (Amendment) Order, 1936, applicable to the British possessions and territories mentioned in Schedules VIII and IX of the said principal Order and to registered aircraft being the property of British subjects resident or companies incorporated therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of all the powers enabling Him in this behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The following sub-paragraph shall be inserted at the end of the proviso to paragraph (1) of Article 4 of the principal Order:—

"(d) Condition (iv) in so far as it relates to journey log books shall not apply in the case of a British aircraft registered in the Colony except when engaged in international navigation."

2. The following sub-paragraph (1) of Article 5 of the principal Order:—

"(e) Condition (v) in so far as it relates to the carrying in the aircraft of the prescribed certificates as to airworthiness shall not apply in the case of a British aircraft registered in the Colony except when engaged in international navigation or when flying as a public transport aircraft or an aerial work aircraft."

3. The following Article shall be substituted for Article 6 of the principal Order:—

Licensed aerodromes.

6.—(1) The Governor may, on application made in the prescribed manner, license an aerodrome either for public use or for use by particular persons or classes of persons, and for use either by aircraft of all classes and descriptions or by particular aircraft or classes or descriptions of aircraft.

(2) The Governor may grant a licence in respect of an aerodrome on such conditions as may be prescribed or specified in the licence, and any conditions so prescribed or specified shall be complied with by the proprietor of the aerodrome as if they were contained in this Order.

(3) Any licence granted by the Governor in respect of an aerodrome shall remain in force for such period as may be specified therein not exceeding such period as may be prescribed by directions issued by the Governor. The Governor may from time to time on application made in the prescribed manner renew any licence granted by the Governor in respect of an aerodrome and such renewal may be with or without variation of any conditions previously prescribed or specified in the licence."

4. The following Articles shall be substituted for Article 8 of the principal Order:—

Accessibility of and charges at aerodromes.

8.—(1) The proprietor of an aerodrome to which this Article applies shall

- allow the aircraft of all countries alike to use the aerodrome to the same extent and upon the same conditions;
- exhibit and keep exhibited in a conspicuous place in the aerodrome a tariff of charges;
- not make, in respect of a service rendered to an aircraft, any charge which is greater than the charge authorized by the said tariff in respect of that service.

(2) Every such tariff as aforesaid shall include charges for landing and length of stay applicable to the aircraft of all countries alike and shall be in such form and on such a scale as respects charges as may be approved by the Governor, and no tariff shall be exhibited in any aerodrome to which this Article applies unless it has been so approved by the Governor.

(3) The approval of the Governor of any such tariff as aforesaid shall have effect during such period and subject to such conditions with regard to the termination or renewal thereof as may be specified therein.

(4) This Article applies to aerodromes which are

- licensed by the Governor for public use; or
- open to public use by British aircraft on payment of charges;

but does not apply to Royal Air Force aerodromes or aerodromes under the control of the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor.

Passenger aerodromes.

8A.—(1) No aircraft carrying passengers for hire or reward shall use as a regular place of landing or departure any place in the Colony other than

- (a) an aerodrome licensed for use by such an aircraft ; or
- (b) a Royal Air Force aerodrome or an aerodrome under the control of the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor, which has been authorised by the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor, as the case may be, to be used as such a place.

(2) No person, being the proprietor of an aerodrome other than an aerodrome mentioned in paragraph (1) of this Article, shall permit his aerodrome to be used by an aircraft in contravention of that paragraph.

Use of Royal Air Force aerodromes or aerodromes under the control of the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor.

8B. Any directions issued by the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor as to the use of Royal Air Force aerodromes or aerodromes under the control of the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor the use of which has been authorised by the Secretary of State for Air or the Governor, as the case may be, shall be complied with."

5. The following Article shall be substituted for Article 16 of the principal Order :—

" 16. Save as otherwise expressly provided for in this Order there shall be carried by a British aircraft registered in the Colony :—

- (1) when engaged in international navigation, the following documents :—
 - (a) its certificate of registration ;
 - (b) its certificate of airworthiness and any other certificate relating to the aircraft, which may be required by this Order to be carried in the aircraft ;
 - (c) the certificates of competency and licences of its personnel ;
 - (d) its journey log book ;
 - (e) any licence to use wireless apparatus in the aircraft for the time being in force ;
 - (f) if it carries passengers, a list of their names ;
 - (g) if it carries freight, bills of lading and manifest in respect thereof ;
- (2) when not engaged in international navigation but when flying as a public transport aircraft or an aerial work aircraft, the documents specified in (b) and (c) of paragraph (1) of this Article."

6. The following Article shall be substituted for Article 17 of the principal Order :—

" 17. The certificate of airworthiness of a British aircraft registered in the Colony shall be kept in the pocket of the journey log book when that log book is required under this Order to be carried in the aircraft."

7. The following Article shall be substituted for Article 18 of the principal Order :—

" 18.—(1) The person in charge of an aircraft shall, on demand made on the landing or departure of the aircraft by an authorised person, produce to that person any of the following documents relating to the aircraft or its personnel :—

- (a) its certificate of registration ;
- (b) its certificate of airworthiness and in the case of a British aircraft registered in the Colony any other certificate relating to the aircraft which may be required by this Order to be carried in the aircraft ;
- (c) the certificates of competency and licences of its personnel ;
- (d) its journey log book in all cases in which the journey log book is required under this Order to be carried in the aircraft ;
- (e) any licence to use wireless apparatus in the aircraft for the time being in force ;
- (f) if it is engaged in international navigation and carries passengers, a list of their names ;
- (g) if it is engaged in international navigation and carries freight, bills of lading and manifest in respect thereof ;

Provided that, in the case of a British aircraft registered in the Colony which is within the Colony and is not engaged in international navigation, it shall be deemed to be a sufficient compliance with this paragraph, except as regards the production of the documents specified in (b) and (c) above in the case of an aircraft flying as a public transport aircraft or aerial work aircraft, if the person in charge of such aircraft to whom any such

demand has been made to produce any of the said documents shall, within five days after such demand has been made, produce or cause to be produced the document or documents so demanded at such police station as may be specified by him at the time of such demand.

(2) The owner of a British aircraft registered in the Colony shall, on demand made by an authorised person, produce or cause to be produced, within a reasonable time, to that person—

- (a) any certificate of registration or certificate of airworthiness for the time being in force with respect to the aircraft ;
- (b) any journey log book and any other log book required by this Order to be kept in respect of the aircraft wherein any entry was made within the period of two years next before the date of the demand ;
- (c) any licence to use wireless apparatus in the aircraft for the time being in force.

(3) The holder of any licence granted or rendered valid under this Order and any person required under this Order to be provided with a licence shall, on demand made by an authorised person, produce the licence :

Provided that, in the case of a demand being made as aforesaid for the production of a licence granted or rendered valid under Schedule V to this Order and not being a licence entitling the holder thereof to act as commander, pilot, navigator, engineer, or other operative member of the crew of a public transport aircraft or an aerial work aircraft, it shall be deemed to be a sufficient compliance with this paragraph if the holder of such licence shall, within five days after such demand has been made, produce or cause to be produced the licence so demanded at such police station as may be specified by him at the time of such demand.

(4) A pilot licensed under this Order shall, on demand made by an authorised person, produce or cause to be produced, within a reasonable time, to that person any pilot's log book kept by him wherein any entry was made within the period of two years next before the date of the demand.

(5) For the purpose of this Article the expression ' authorised person ' means a police officer, or a person authorised for the purpose by the Governor."

8. Article 25 of the principal Order shall be amended by inserting in sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph (1) thereof after the word " certificate " the words " or the endorsement on a pilot's licence of authority by the Governor to give instruction in flying in accordance with sub-paragraph (c) of paragraph (1) of Article 10A of this Order."

9. Sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (3) of Article 28 of the principal Order shall be amended as follows :—

(1) At the beginning of the sub-paragraph there shall be inserted the words " who contravenes or fails to comply with or ".

(2) The following sub-paragraph shall be substituted for sub-paragraph (ii) :—

" (ii) by reason only of a contravention of, or non-compliance with, any of the following provisions of this Order, that is to say, paragraphs (1) and (2) of Article 8, Articles 16, 17 and 18, and paragraph 3A of Schedule V, or ".

10. The following sub-paragraph shall be substituted for sub-paragraph (1) of paragraph 1 of Schedule III to the principal Order :—

" 1.—(1) The following log books shall be kept in respect of British aircraft registered in the Colony :—

- (a) for every aircraft when engaged in international navigation or when flying on a regular line or service of public air transport, a journey log book ;
- (b) in addition, for every passenger or goods aircraft, an aircraft log book ;
- (c) in addition, for every passenger or goods aircraft fitted with an engine, an engine log book, and if fitted with more than one engine, a separate log book for each engine."

11. The following paragraph shall be inserted after paragraph 3 of Schedule V to the principal Order :—

" 3A. On the issue of a licence to an applicant he shall forthwith sign his name on the licence as the holder thereof with his ordinary signature."

12.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates, and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) (No. 2) Order, 1936.

(2) This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1937.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.
Open Competition of 1937.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service will be held in London in 1937. The *viva voce* test will take place in July, the written examination will begin on a date in July to be announced later.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination has not yet been decided.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 10th April, 1937, an application in the candidate's own handwriting on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an Application Form or a letter respecting such Form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office Certificate of Posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk. A fee of £2, being an instalment of the prescribed fee of £8, must accompany the Application Form; this instalment is not returnable in any circumstances.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W.1. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

*The Time Table of the written part of the examination will probably be posted about the middle of June to the address given on the Form of Application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend. Candidates will be notified at the same time of the date and place fixed for the *viva voce* test and of the manner in which the balance (£6) of the prescribed fee of £8 is to be paid.*

NOTE.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following Services, viz. :—

Burma Civil Service (Class I);
Ceylon Civil Service;
Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service;

should be held in 1937 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Indian Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, etc., will be admitted to compete for any two or more of these Services, subject to the following conditions :—

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for one or more of the following Services, viz., Indian Civil Service, Burma Civil Service, Ceylon Civil Service, as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma or Ceylon Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or Burma Service (or both) as well as for the Ceylon Service will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma Service or on the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Burma Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for any two or more of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8, of which £2 will be payable on application for permission to attend the examination and the balance (£6) on admission to the examination.

Procedure.

Immediately the results of the examination are known, all successful candidates will be summoned to attend at the Civil Service Commission to be medically examined and to state their choice among the Services open to them and among the various Departments, Provinces, etc. That statement of choice is irrevocable.

Evidence of Age.

A candidate born in the United Kingdom must not send in a birth certificate with this form but must be prepared to produce it when required.

A European or Anglo-Indian who was born in India must be prepared to produce when required a certificate of baptism from the district in which he was baptized. If this does not also mention the date of birth it must be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth.

An Indian born in India must send in with this form a certificate as required by Clause 4 of the Regulations for the Indian Civil Service. If the candidate's family is resident in British India the certificate must be signed by the Secretary to the Government of their Province or by the Commissioner of their Division. If they reside in an Indian State it must be signed by the highest political officer accredited to that State.

A candidate who is a native of Burma must send in with this form a certificate as required by Clause 4 of the Regulations for the Burma Civil Service (Class I.). The certificate must be signed by the Secretary to the Government of Burma or the Commissioner of the Division within which the candidate's family resides.

A candidate for a Ceylon Cadetship should send in with this form a written nomination as required by Clause 4 of the Regulations for the Ceylon Civil Service.

Administrative Group of Competitions.—Syllabus for such competitions as may be held in London in the year 1937 for appointment to the following services :—

- Indian Civil Service.
- Burma Civil Service (Class I.).
- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service.
- Ceylon Civil Service.
- Foreign Office and Diplomatic Service.
- Consular Service and Assistant Officer Grade in the Department of Overseas Trade.

Evidence of Training.—Candidates who desire to offer any of the subjects 22, 36–50 or 52 (Physical Anthropology branch only) must send to the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, so as to arrive not later than 10th April, 1937, the evidence of training described on pages 191 and 192. Such evidence should be in the form of a certificate signed by a responsible officer of the institution. In the case of an institution not situated in the British Isles, the certificate must state that the institution in which the work has been done is authorized to prepare candidates in that subject for a degree.

SECTION A.

1. *Essay.*—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.
2. *English.*—A paper of questions to test the understanding of English and the workmanlike use of words. An optional exercise in the writing of verse will be included.
3. *Present Day.*—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, political, and scientific. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

Elementary Economics (for Foreign Office and Consular Service Groups only).—Organization of production; the association of land, labour, and capital in productive enterprise; the chief types of industrial units.

Demand and supply; organization of distribution; value.
Exchange; an elementary knowledge of the theory of money and the relations of money and prices, and of the nature of banks and their functions.

State action; taxation; tariff policy; unemployment.

4. *Viva Voce.*—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his (or her) career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to enable the Board to assess his suitability for each of the Services for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and alertness, his vigour and strength of character, and his potential qualities of leadership.

SECTION B.

HISTORY: Subjects 5–8.—Candidates should know something of the original authorities, and have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history.

When a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached; similarly, when a fixed date is given for the end of the period, candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the subsequent development of movements which continued beyond the period.

5, 6. *British History*.—Period 1, to 1660; Period 2, 1660 to the present day. The subject will deal with the life of the people as a whole, political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific, with the main stress on the political and economic aspects. Candidates will be expected to know so much of European history as will make the external action of this country fully intelligible and will explain those movements at home which had their beginnings abroad, e.g., the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the reactions in this country of the French Revolution. Questions on Scottish history will be set, but such questions will be optional. In subject 6 the outstanding incidents and movements in the history of British possessions will be included.

7, 8. *European History*.—Period 1, from 400 to 1494; Period 2, from 1494 to 1763; Period 3, from 1763 to the present day. The political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific aspects will all be included. The history of the United States of America, of India, and of the Far East will be included in so far as it influences European fortunes to an important degree.

9, 10. *Private Law*.—Part 1, the law of real and personal property (including the law of succession). Part 2, contracts and torts. This subject is confined to English law.

11. *Jurisprudence*.—Theories as to the nature of law, including the theory of sovereignty. The sources of law and its development, with particular reference to English and Roman law. The character and classification of rights and duties (legal and equitable). The analysis of the leading conceptions employed in law.

12. *Constitutional Law*.—The constitutional law of the United Kingdom, including the relations between the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire.

13. *Roman Law*.—Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial processes. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.

14. *International Law*.—Public international law.

15, 16, 17. *Metaphysics*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, questions on the period from Descartes to Kant, both included. Paper 3, questions on ancient philosophy and post-Kantian philosophy; this paper will be arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to Plato and Aristotle among the ancient philosophers or to post-Kantian philosophy.

18, 19. *Moral Philosophy*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, a paper on ancient and modern philosophy arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to either.

20. *Logic*.—The subject will be interpreted in a wide sense. Epistemology in its bearing on logical problems will be included, together with formal logic and scientific method. Questions may be set on mathematical logic, i.e., on the logic of mathematics, symbolic logic, and the logic of probability; and also on the history of logic. A considerable choice of questions will be given.

21. *Psychology*.—Questions on the history of the subject may be included.

22. *Experimental Psychology*.—A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank.

23. *Political Theory*.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, including the theory of the state in its relation to kindred studies such as ethics, economics, and political history. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period beginning with the French Revolution.

24. *Political Organization*.—This will include constitutional forms (representative government, federalism, &c.) and public administration, central and local. The history of institutions is not included, but candidates will be expected to know the earlier stages from which existing institutions have developed.

25. *International Relations*.—The subject includes the study of the relations both between governments and between peoples, and of the principles underlying their development; in particular, the study, in connexion with twentieth-century history, of the machinery and processes of international co-operation, including the organization and activities of the League of Nations and other international bodies. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected.

26. *General Economics*.—Economic theory in general. Candidates will be expected to illustrate theory by facts and to analyse problems by the help of theory. The history of economic thought will be included.

27. *Industry and Trade*.—The organization of industry and trade; the economic theories and practical problems involved.

28. *Money, Banking, and Exchange*.—Systems of currency, banking, foreign exchanges; the theories and problems involved.

29. *Public Finance*.—The subject will deal with matters connected with the raising and spending of revenue and loans by Governments (central and local).

30. *Social Economics*.—The economic aspect of matters affecting labour and social welfare, including social structure and legislation, with special reference to Great Britain.

31. *Economic History*.—Questions will be set on the economic history of England up to 1700; but the main stress will be on the economic development of Great Britain since 1700. So much knowledge of developments in the other parts of the British Empire, in the Continent of Europe and in the United States of America will be expected as is necessary to the full understanding of British economic history. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period since 1700.

32. *Economic Statistics*.—Elementary methods of handling numerical data. Tabulation. Frequency distributions, averages, deviations. Graphic methods, applied to groups and to time series. Simple interpolation. Index-numbers.

Some knowledge of the nature of the statistical data available from British sources and the principal statistical publications of the League of Nations, in relation to prices, wages, incomes, trade, transport, production, consumption, population, births, deaths, marriages, migration, and of the methods usually applied to analysis of such data.

Elements of the mathematical theory of statistics, with special reference to economic and sociological problems. The mathematical treatment of frequency groups and of time series. The more elementary parts of the method of correlation. Sampling, and measurement of the precision of its results. Such formulas as Pareto's for income and the logarithmic curve. Application of statistical methods to the analysis of elasticity of demand and other theoretical economic concepts.

33. *Lower Pure Mathematics*.—Geometry of two and three dimensions, synthetic and analytical; a specialized knowledge of particular curves and surfaces will not be required. Descriptive geometry. The method of vectors.

Algebra and trigonometry, including series, complex numbers, the numerical solution of equations.

Infinitesimal calculus of real variables, including development in series, partial differentiation, multiple integrals, ordinary differential equations, with applications to geometry.

No great skill will be expected in solving complicated problems of an elementary character. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.

34. *Lower Applied Mathematics*.—Statics, hydrostatics, dynamics, elementary theory of electricity and magnetism, including the induction of currents. The questions will be of an elementary character, but will not be confined to two dimensions; they will involve the use of the calculus. Candidates are free to use differential equations, but a knowledge thereof will not be necessary to answer the questions. Attention will be paid to problems which arise naturally and to general principles; artificial problems will be avoided. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.

35. *Higher Mathematics*.—

(1) Geometry, including differential geometry and tensor calculus.

(2) Analysis, including the elements of the theory of functions of real and complex variables.

(3) The calculus of observations, including probability, and the solution of differential and finite difference equations.

(4) Mechanics, including the elementary mechanics of fluids, but excluding elastic solids, the whole being treated from a physical standpoint.

(5) The classical theory of electricity and physical optics.

(6) Thermodynamics. The elements of the quantum theory and the theory of relativity.

Two question papers will be set. In each of them all sections of the syllabus will be represented and in each paper the same number of questions will be set on each section. There will be no restriction on the candidate's choice of questions; he can, however, obtain full credit by confining himself to any two of the sections.

36. *Astronomy*.—General and spherical astronomy, and the elements of astrophysics, including instruments and observatory practice.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of at least 20 hours' practical training in an observatory.

NATURAL SCIENCE: *Subjects 37-48*.—The standard of the higher division of a science will be that which is required in the main subject for an honours degree at the universities. The standard for the lower division of a science will be that required in a subject subsidiary to the main subject whether required at the final degree examination or at a preceding examination.

A candidate who desires to offer a science must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in that science in an institution of university rank; the period of training required is one academic year, whether the candidate offers the higher division of the science or the lower division or both divisions.

43. *Lower Geology*

44. *Higher Geology*

Mineralogy will be included in each division.

49. *Engineering*.—Strength of materials; theory of structures; mechanism and dynamics of machines; heat and thermodynamics; hydraulics, including hydraulic machines; electrical technology.

Candidates will be expected to be familiar with graphical methods and to have some skill in drawing.

A candidate who desires to offer Engineering must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

50. *Geography*.—Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany and geology. There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

51. *General Anthropology*.—The study of human cultures, notably in their simpler forms, and the analysis of such cultures into their component aspects: social organization, economics including technology, education, political systems, law, magico-religious ideas and practices, games and recreation, knowledge, language, art; the analysis should include the common elements in human institutions, customs, and beliefs, and the specific variations characteristic of individual cultures. The application of anthropological knowledge to practical affairs: in administration and economic co-operation; in missionary and educational work. The candidate will be expected to have some comparative knowledge of anthropological methods and of anthropological theories, including for example the concepts of evolution, diffusion, function, and the influence of environment.

52. *Special Anthropology*.—Candidates will choose between Social Anthropology and Physical Anthropology.

Social Anthropology.—The social organization of human societies, with special reference to primitive societies at various stages of development and the effect of the modern conditions of world-wide contact of races and the spread of cultural ideas upon such organization. The constitution of domestic groups, wider kinship units, local communities and tribal systems. Political organization, including problems of leadership, tribal councils, rank; the working of law and the administration of justice. Economic organization of primary pursuits and industries; types of distribution, exchange, consumption and land tenure. Educational methods, native and introduced, including the influence of the family; professional and technical instruction, initiation, age-grades, apprenticeship in occupational groups. Early forms of magico-religious beliefs and ritual in their sociological aspect: ancestor-worship, totemism, conceptions of the soul, eschatology, beliefs in mana, magic, and witchcraft. Tradition, oral or written, in its influence upon the collective behaviour of the group. Apart from a general knowledge of the literature candidates will be expected to have an acquaintance, first hand or from written sources, with at least one ethnographic area.

Physical Anthropology, with which are included prehistoric archaeology and technology. Candidates will be expected to have such knowledge as may be acquired by laboratory and museum work, consisting mainly in the handling and study of specimens and exhibits. The subject will be treated with special, but not exclusive, reference to peoples of rude culture, including prehistoric civilizations.

A candidate who desires to offer Physical Anthropology must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an institution of university rank.

53. *Old and Middle English*.—Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the following works:—the principal anonymous monuments of Old English verse, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle; the Ancrene Wisse, the Owl and the Nightingale, Havelok, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight; and of some part of the work or works of Cynewulf, Ælfric, Layamon, Langland, Gower, Chaucer. Questions will be set relative to these works and authors, and to other matters of literary history in the period.

Questions on the history of the language will be included, but will not be compulsory.

54, 55. *English Literature*.—Period 1, 1350 to 1700; Period 2, from 1660. Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the works of the following authors and of their place in the history of their country:—

Questions on other writers will not be excluded, but, on the whole, the questions will be directed to the best-known authors and their best-known works. Candidates should know so much of the history as is necessary to understand the literature in its relation to other activities of the nation.

Questions will be set on the history of the language, but will not be compulsory.

56. *Welsh Civilization*.—A general knowledge of the political, social and literary history of Wales from 1100 A.D. to the present day. Candidates will also be required to show a special knowledge of the literature of the period 1350 to 1650, and of the history of the period 1700 to the present day. Candidates will be required to write some of their answers in Welsh.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND CIVILIZATIONS: *Subjects 57-89*.—Greek Literature (60) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (57), Latin Literature (64) only by those who offer Latin Translation (61), and Buddhist Civilization (89) only by those who offer Pali Language (88). In subjects 68-87 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (68), German History (71), Spanish or Italian History (74), Russian History (77), may not offer either subject 7 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 8 (European History, Period 3).

In history candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history. In literature candidates will be expected to have a first-hand knowledge of the authors. Passages of literature may be set for comment on matters of

social, literary, and historical interest. In French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, questions on philology and the older forms of the languages will be set, but will not be compulsory. The papers in both history and literature will deal with the life of the people as a whole, literary, political, social, economic, artistic, scientific.

58. *Greek Composition.*—The paper will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition, or, if they prefer, may take some prose and some verse.

59. *Greek History.*—The main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.; but candidates will be given an opportunity of showing knowledge of the period before 510 B.C.

62. *Latin Composition.*—As for Greek.

63. *Roman History.*—The outlines of the history and development down to 180 A.D. should be known; but the main stress will be laid on the period 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

65, 66. *Classical Archaeology.*—Paper 1, Greek and Roman sculpture and architecture. Paper 2, Greek coins down to 322 B.C., Roman coins down to 98 A.D.; Greek vases; Greek and Roman painting. A considerable choice of questions will be given in each paper.

67. *French Language.*—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation.

68. *French History.*—The outlines of the history prior to 1589 should be known; the period from 1589 to 1660 in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1660 to the present day.

70. *German Language.*—As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

71. *German History.*—In history candidates should know in outline the history of the Medieval Empire, of the growth of the German cities, of the Reformation in Germany, and of the Thirty Years War; but the main stress will be on the period from the accession of Frederick the Great to the present day.

73. *Spanish, Italian, Language.*—As for French.

74. *Spanish History.*—The main stress will be on the periods from the Union of Castile and Aragon under Ferdinand and Isabella to the liberation of the Netherlands, and again from 1800 to the present day.

Italian History.—The main stress will be on the 15th century and the first half of the 16th century, and again on the period from 1789 to the present day. Sufficient should be known of the earlier period to understand the position of the Pope and the Emperor in Italy, and the rise of the towns.

76. *Russian Language.*—As for French.

77. *Russian History.*—Only the broadest outlines of the history prior to Peter the Great will be required; the period from the accession of Peter the Great to 1800 should be known in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1800 to the present day.

79. *Arabic Language.*—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

80, 81. *Arabic History, Arabic Literature.*—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period from the middle of the 6th century A.D. to the middle of the 13th century A.D.

82. *Persian Language.*—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

83, 84. *Persian History, Persian Literature.*—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period 1000 A.D. to 1500 A.D. Candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of the history of Persia before 1000 A.D. and from 1500 A.D. to the present time.

85. *Sanskrit Language.* (For the Indian, Burma, and Ceylon Civil Services only)—Translation, prose composition, and questions on Vedic and Sanskrit grammar. Both Vedic and classical Sanskrit passages will be set for translation; composition will be required in classical Sanskrit alone.

86, 87. *Indian History, Sanskrit Literature.* (For the Indian, Burma, and Ceylon Civil Services only)—The history of the civilization and thought of India and Sanskrit literature from the Vedic period to 1200 A.D.

88. *Pali Language.* (For the Ceylon Civil Service only)—Translation from Pali, prose composition in Pali, questions on Pali grammar.

89. *Buddhist Civilization.* (For the Ceylon Civil Service only)—Pali literature and the history of Buddhist civilization and the growth of ideas in Buddhism from the time of the Buddha to 1800 A.D. in India, Ceylon, Burma, and Siam.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

Regulations for Admission to the Indian Civil Service.

* * * *The following Regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India, will be applied to admission to the Indian Civil Service by examination in the United Kingdom after the coming into force of Part III. of the Government of India Act, 1935, on the 1st April, 1937. They are liable to alteration from year to year.*

1. An examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in the summer of each year, for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. A Candidate must be a male and either :—

(a) a British subject of *European descent*, or of *Indian domicile or descent*, whose father (if alive) is a British subject or a subject of a State in India, or (if dead) was at the time of his death either a British subject or a subject of a State in India or a person in the permanent service of the Crown or a person who had retired from that service; or

(b) *a ruler or a subject of a State in India in respect of whom a declaration has been made under section 96A of the Government of India Act, or, after the commencement of Part III. of the Government of India Act, 1935, under Section 263 (3) of that Act.

Provided that in the case of a male British subject the requirements of this rule may be waived by the Secretary of State if he is satisfied that their observance would occasion exceptional hardship, and the Candidate is so closely connected by ancestry or upbringing with His Majesty's dominions as to justify special treatment.

3. A Candidate must have attained the age of 21 and must not have attained the age of 24 on the 1st day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

4. A Candidate who is a native of India must obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued in accordance with such Instructions as the Governor-General in Council may, from time to time prescribe, and signed, should he be resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or, should he reside in an Indian State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.

5. Candidates who are not of European descent must have passed an examination qualifying for an Honours Degree at an approved University in the British Isles, or have passed an examination of equivalent standard at an approved institution of University rank (other than a University) in the British Isles, after residence as full time members for at least two academic years at such University or Institution, or at one of the University Colleges enumerated in the footnote †. This requirement will not be enforced in full until the examination of 1939.

* The candidate referred to in Rule 2 (b) should apply to the local Political Officer for the issue of the necessary declaration.

† Candidates should be careful to see that the wording of this certificate is strictly in accordance with the appropriate form laid down in the instructions published in the Government of India, Home Department Notification No. F. 266/30 Ests., dated the 21st February, 1931.

‡ The following is a list of Universities and University Colleges approved for the purpose of this Regulation :—Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, Birmingham, Bristol, Durham, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Reading, Sheffield, Wales, Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Glasgow, St. Andrews; The Queen's University, Belfast; Trinity College, Dublin; The National University of Ireland. University Colleges of Exeter, Hull, Leicester, Nottingham, Southampton.

In order to be eligible to compete at the examination in 1937 and 1938 Candidates who are not of European descent and who have not obtained the academic qualifications stated above must, in the case of Candidates competing in 1937, satisfy the condition as to residence for the academic year 1936-37, and, in the case of Candidates competing in 1938, for the academic years 1936-37 and 1937-38, and must throughout have been engaged in reading for an Honours Degree or an approved alternative.

Candidates will be required to produce a certificate from the authorities of the University or University College of which they are members, showing that these conditions have been fulfilled.

Cases in which it is represented that strict enforcement of the terms of this Regulation would impose undue hardship, will be considered by the Secretary of State on their merits.

Any enquiry concerning the interpretation of this Regulation should be addressed to the Under Secretary of State for India.

6. A Candidate must be free from disease, constitutional affection or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Indian Civil Service*.

7. A Candidate must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for appointment in the Indian Civil Service.

8. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a Probationer for the Indian Civil Service or for the Burma Civil Service (Class I.), and subsequently resigned his position as a Probationer, will be admitted to the examination.

9. No person will be admitted to the examination whose employment in the Indian Civil Service would in the opinion of the Secretary of State, acting with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, be detrimental to the public interest.

10. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the Candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination.

The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of their Certificate of Qualification, institute such further enquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such enquiries in the case of any Candidate shall be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Indian Civil Service, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

11. The examination will include the following subjects†. The numerical value is shown against each subject.

Probationers are required to be inoculated against enteric fever before they proceed to India on first appointment; but exemption from this requirement may be granted to any Candidate of Asiatic domicile, unless he has been continually resident out of Asia for five years prior to the date of his appointment.

12. In Section B a Candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a Candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subject he proposes to offer.

13. The following restrictions apply to particular subjects in Section B.

International Relations (25), may not be taken by a Candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8), or Constitutional Law (12).

Greek Literature (60), may be taken only by Candidate, who offer Greek Translation (57), and Latin Literature (64) only by those who offer Latin Translation (61).

In subjects 68 to 87 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by Candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A Candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (68), German History (71), Spanish or Italian History (74), Russian History (77), may not offer either subject 7 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 8 (European History, Period 3).

14. A Candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (22), or any of the subjects 37 to 48 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (36), Engineering (49), Geography (50), and the physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (52), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

15. From the marks assigned to Candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

16. Moreover, Candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a further deduction of marks on that account.*

17. Candidates must obtain such a mark in the *viva voce* (subject 4) and such an aggregate of marks in the written tests as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

18. A list of the Candidates shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each Candidate, and in that order so many European Candidates and so many Candidates of Indian domicile or descent, up to the determined number of appointments for each of these groups, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination in accordance with Clause 17, shall be designated to be Probationers for the Indian Civil Service, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any Probationer become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy shall be filled or not.

19. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the Candidate at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

BURMA CIVIL SERVICE (CLASS I).

Open Competition of 1937.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Burma Civil Service will be held in London in 1937. The *viva voce* test will take place in July, the written examination will begin on a date in July to be announced later.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination has not yet been decided.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 10th April, 1937, an application in the candidate's own handwriting on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an Application Form or a letter respecting such Form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office Certificate of Posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk. A fee of £2, being an instalment of the prescribed fee of £8, must accompany the Application Form; this instalment is not returnable in any circumstances.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W 1. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

*The Time Table of the written part of the examination will probably be posted about the middle of June to the address given on the Form of Application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend. Candidates will be notified at the same time of the date and place fixed for the *viva voce* test and of the manner in which the balance (£6) of the prescribed fee of £8 is to be paid.*

NOTE.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following services, viz. :—

- Indian Civil Service ;
- Ceylon Civil Service ;
- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service ;

should be held in 1937 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Burma Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, &c., will be admitted to compete for any two or more of these services, subject to the following conditions :—

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for one or more of the following services, viz., Indian Civil Service, Burma Civil Service, Ceylon Civil Service, as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma or Ceylon Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or Burma Service (or both) as well as for the Ceylon Service will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma Service or on the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Burma Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for any two or more of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8, of which £2 will be payable on application for permission to attend the examination and the balance (£6) on admission to the examination.

12. In Section B a candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

13. The following restrictions apply to particular subjects in Section B:—

International Relations (25), may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8), or Constitutional Law (12).

Greek Literature (60), may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (57), and Latin Literature (64) only by those who offer Latin Translation (61).

In subjects 68 to 87 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (68), German History (71), Spanish or Italian History (74), Russian History (77), may not offer either subject 7 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 8 (European History, Period 3).

14. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (22), or any of the subjects 37 to 48 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (36), Engineering (49), Geography (50), and the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (52) other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

15. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

16. Moreover, candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a further deduction of marks on that account*.

17. Candidates must obtain such a mark in the *viva voce* (subject 4) and such an aggregate of marks in the written tests as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

18. A list of the candidates shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each candidate, and in that order so many European candidates and so many candidates of Burman domicile or descent, up to the determined number of appointments for each of these groups, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination in accordance with Clause 17, shall be designated to be Probationers for the Burma Civil Service, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any Probationer become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy shall be filled or not.

19. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

The Overseas Radio Telephone Rules made under section 7 of the Ceylon Telegraph Ordinance, 1908, and published in *Gazette* No. 8,148 of September 27, 1935, are hereby amended as follows:—

(1) in rule 2—

(a) by the substitution, for paragraph (1) thereof, of the following:—

“ 2. (1) The first unit period of conversation for an Overseas Radio Telephone call shall be three minutes' chargeable time, and the second and subsequent unit periods shall be one minute chargeable time each, and for this purpose any interval of more than 5 seconds and less than 60 seconds' chargeable time shall be reckoned as one minute.”;

(b) in paragraph (2) thereof, by the substitution for the words “ the first unit period only ”, of the words “ six minutes' chargeable time ”;

(2) in rule 3, by the omission in paragraph (1) thereof of the words “ not more than seven days in advance ”;

(3) in rule 5—

(a) in paragraph (1) (ii.) thereof, by the substitution for the word “ telephone ”; of the words “ telephone, and the call is cancelled ”;

(b) in paragraph (1) (iii.) thereof, by the substitution for the words “ such telephone number ”; of the words “ such telephone number, or the call is cancelled before he comes ”;

(c) in paragraph (1) (iv.) thereof, by the substitution for the words “ the caller ” of the words “ the caller, having been given a chargeable report ”;

(d) in paragraph (2) (iii.) (b) thereof, by the substitution for the word “ parties ” of the words “ parties, or unintentional duplication of booking by the caller ”;

(4) in rule 6—

(a) by the renumbering of paragraphs (2), (3), and (4) as paragraphs (2) (ii.), (2) (iii.), and (2) (iv.) thereof, respectively;

(b) by the substitution for paragraph (1) thereof of the following:—

“ 6. (1) Urgent Overseas Radio Telephone calls made to countries other than Burma outside the working hours of the service shall be given at the same charge and under the same conditions as those for calls made during the working hours of the service ”;

(c) by the addition of the following immediately after paragraph (1) thereof:—

“ (2) (i.) The first unit period of conversation for an Urgent Overseas Radio Telephone call made to Burma outside the working hours of the service to that country shall be six minutes' chargeable time, and the second and subsequent unit periods shall be one minute chargeable time each ”;

(5) by the substitution, for rule 10, of the following:—

“ 10. (1) The Overseas Radio Telephone Service shall be available to all countries except Burma between the hours of 2.30 P.M. and 6.30 P.M. (Ceylon Standard Time) on week days, from such Exchanges and Call Offices as may be determined by the Postmaster-General. The service to Burma shall be available between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. on week days.

(2) The service to all countries including Burma shall be closed on Sundays and on such holidays as the British, Indian or Ceylon Postal

Administration may decide: Provided, however, that the service to all countries including Burma may be temporarily made available outside the working hours on week days and also on Sundays and holidays for the purpose of making any Urgent Overseas Radio Telephone Calls ”;

(6) in rule 11, by the substitution for the words “ fall due ” of the following:—

“ fall due, except under the provisions set forth in rule 5 (2) ”;

(7) in rule 12, by the substitution, in paragraph (2) thereof, for the words “ number of minutes ”, of the words “ number of chargeable minutes (subject to a minimum of three chargeable minutes, except in the case of urgent calls made outside the working hours of the service to Burma) ”;

(8) in rule 13, by the substitution of the following for paragraph (1) thereof:—

“ 13. (1) In the case of a call made from a Call Office, the period of conversation required shall in every case be booked in advance, and no extension shall be given at the end of such period at the request of the caller unless he has already deposited the appropriate fee for a further period of conversation, and where a caller terminates his conversation before the full period so booked by him expires, he shall be charged for the actual period of effective conversation he has had or for the first unit period of effective conversation, whichever of these is the longer ”; and

(9) by the substitution for rule 14 of the following:—

“ 14. No call originating from a subscriber's own telephone in Ceylon shall be put through unless the subscriber has—

(1) deposited as security with the Post Office Exchange with which his telephone is connected—

(a) in the first instance the sum of Rs. 100, and

(b) where the daily average charge payable by that subscriber calculated over a period of one week exceeds Rs. 100, such further sum as may be necessary to make the deposit equal to that average; and

(2) given a written undertaking to the following effect:—

“ I undertake to settle the bills for any Overseas Radio Telephone Calls made by me within three days from the date the bills are rendered.”

Provided, however, that every subscriber who intends to originate calls—

(a) only on Saturdays and only to England, Scotland, Wales, the Isle of Man and Northern Ireland shall deposit as security a sum of Rs. 50,

(b) only to Burma, shall deposit as security a sum of Rs. 40:

Provided further that this rule shall not prevent a subscriber, who desires to originate an occasional call, from making successive deposits from day to day to meet the cost of the calls which he intends to originate.”

BY-LAWS.

1. For the purpose of establishing, working, and maintaining the Council's Electrical Distribution System, the Chairman or any contractor or other agent duly

authorized in writing by the Chairman, may enter upon any land and cut down any tree or branch which may in any way injure or which is likely to injure, impede, or interfere with any post, standard, wire, or main of such system.

2.
