> THE ORDINANCE RELATING TO PILGRIMAGES, No. 13 of 1896.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 1 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to .Pilgrimages" and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, in anticipation of the customary pilgrimage to Kataragama for the Esala Festival commencing in July, 1937.

#### REGULATIONS.

- 1. (a) The duration of the Kataragama Esala Festival, 1937, and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and to shereby limited to seventeen days, namely, July 8 to 24, 1937, inclusive.
- (b) Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.
- 2. The camp shall be under the general control of the Government Agent, Province of Uva, and under the immediate supervision of an officer designated the "Supervising Officer" was shall be assisted by a Medical Officer and by a Police Officer.
- 3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the Supervising Officer to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads by which they have to travel.

- 4. The Supervising Officer shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama-
  - (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water for drinking and for natural offices;
  - (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims;
  - (c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of
  - pilgrims; (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims:
  - (e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying any lawful order given for any of these purposes by the Supervising Officer shall be guilty of an offence.

- For the purpose of these rules camp shall mean—
- (a) the area within half a mile of the Maha Dewala at Kataragama in every direction.
- (b) the area within a quarter of a mile of the Pillayar Kovil at Sella Kataragama in every direction.
- 6. Any Police Officer or any Sanitary Inspector is empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in the camp, by the Supervising Officer or by the Medical Officer, or in their absence, by the chief officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing such Police Officer or Sanitary Inspector in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be guilty of an offence.

7. Any person bringing any cattle or cart-bulls within one quarter of a mile of the camp without a permit from

the Supervising Officer or any person authorized by him to issue such permits shall be guilty of an offence.

8. The issue of such permits shall be subject to compliance by the permit-holder with such conditions as may be imposed by the Supervising Officer for the purpose of enforcing sanitation, maintaining the health of the camp, and regulating traffic.

9. (1) (a) Any person exposing commodities of any description for sale in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the Supervising Officer shall be guilty of an offence.

(b) Any person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Supervising Officer or by the Medical Officer, or in their absence, by the chief officer of Police shall be guilty of an offence.

(2) (a) All eating-houses and tea and coffee boutiques shall be kept clean and sanitary to the satisfaction of the Supervising Officer.

(b) All cakes, sweetmeats, and other cooked food exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

(c) No waste tea, coffee, or milk or remnants of food, cooking waste or refuse shall be thrown on the ground, but shall be collected in the receptacle hereinafter prescribed and be kept at all times ready for removal by the sanitary authorities.

(d) Every building, structure, or premises used as a place of trade or business shall be provided with a metal or wooden dust bin not less than 4½ cubic feet in capacity in which shall be stored all the garbage and waste matter of the said premises; and except when garbage or waste matter is being deposited or taken from the said bin, it shall at all times be covered with a metal or wooden cover.

10. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or shall fail to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the Supervising Officer shall be guilty of an offence.

11. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease and not reporting the same to the Supervising Officer or to the Medical Officer or the chief officer of Police, and any person aiding or abetting in the concealment of such disease shall be guilty of an offence.

12. All persons shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Supervising Officer or the chief officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp and any person declining or neglecting to do so shall be guilty of an offence.

13. Any person who, without the previous sanction of the Supervising Officer, constructs any booth or extends any building so as to encroach on the main streets of the camp shall be guilty of an offence.

14. No person shall keep any bakery, aerated water

manufactory, tea or coffee boutique, eating-house or gala within the camp without previously obtaining a licence from the Government Agent, Province of Uva, authorizing him to do so. Such licence shall be issued free of charge.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 16 of the Medical Ordinance, 1927, and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

## REGULATIONS.

- 1. Examination for Certificate of Efficiency as a Midwife shall be held on such dates, at such intervals, and at such places, as may from time to time be determined and notified by the College Council.
- The examination shall be held in English, in Sinhalese, and in Tamil, but no candidate shall present herself for examination in more than one of those languages

The examination shall consist of one or more papers

for written work, an oral test, and a practical test.
4. The examination shall be held in the subjects set out in the schedule hereto and questions may be set or asked on all or any of those subjects.

- 5. No person shall be admitted to the examination without the written permission of the Registrar of the Ceylon Medical College, who may require, as conditions for the grant of such permission, that such person shall have-
  - (a) passed the English, Sinhalese, or Tamil Junior School Certificate Examination or any other examination

of equal or higher status recognized by the Education Department; and

- (b) attended a year's course of training at the teaching hospital or a similar course at some other training centre approved by the Gollege Council.
- 6. Every person who is given permission by the Registrar to be a candidate at the examination shall pay the Registrar an examination fee of five rupees on or before the date notified as the last date for the payment of fees.

#### Condition for the Grant of the Certificate of Efficiency.

7. A candidate, notwithstanding that she is successful in the examination, shall not be entitled to the Certificate of Efficiency as a Midwife until she completes a six months' course of field work in such Health Unit of the Department of Sanitary Services as may be specified by the College Council.

#### Repeal.

The regulations under section 16 of the Ordinance published by Notification dated April 25, 1929, in Gazette No. 7,706 of April 26, 1929, are hereby rescinded.

#### MARKETS.

## Section 29 (1) and (4).

- 1. Whenever a Village Committee resolves to establish a village market, the Chairman shall give not less than 10 days' notice of the date and time fixed for the opening of the market, and such notice shall be published by beat of tom-tom.
- 2. Whenever the Committee sets apart any portion of a village market for the sale of any specified article, no person shall sell or expose for sale in any portion of the market so set apart any article other than the article so specified.
- 3. Every person using or occupying a stall or space in a village market shall pay a fee in respect of such use or occupation according to the scale set out in the schedule hereto.
- 4. The Chairman shall cause a notice, setting out the scale of fees in English, in Tamil, and in Sinhalese, to be posted up in a conspicuous place at each village market, and it shall not be lawful for any officer or other authorized person to demand or receive higher sums than those set out in such notice.
- 5. All fees shall be paid in advance to the Chairman or the lessee or other person authorized by the Chairman or the lessee to recover such fees. The person to whom any such fee is paid shall furnish a receipt for any fee paid, if such receipt is demanded.
- 6. Every occupant of a stall or space in any village market shall keep such stall or space clean and free from filth or rubbish.
- 7. No person suffering from any contagious or infectious disease shall occupy any stall or space in any village market or expose for sale thereat any goods whatsoever.
- 8. No person using or occupying any village market shall—  $\,$ 
  - (1) behave in a disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market; or

(2) carry on cooking in any such market; or

- (3) remain in, or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 8 r.m. without being able
- to give a satisfactory account of himself; or

  (4) damage, or in any way deface, any portion of the
  building, stall, lamps, or any property of the
  inhabitants in or about such market, or defile or
  pollute the water provided for use in such market;
- (5) enclose in any way any portion of such market, or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind in such market; or
- (6) leave any goods in such market between the hours of 8 P.M. and 5.30 A.M. without the special permission of the Chairman.

- 9. Every village market shall be open daily from 5.30 a.m. to 8 p.m. except on days approved by the Chairman. The Village Committee will make provision for the proper lighting of every village market.
- 10. No person shall obstruct or resist the market-keeper or other person appointed by the Committee to superintend any village market or to collect the fees or to enforce order or cleanliness therein, in the lawful execution of his duty.
- 11. No vehicle shall remain within, or alongside, any village market premises for a longer period than is necessary for loading or unloading goods.
- 12. (1) Every person occupying a stall or space in a village market shall keep on or near such stall or space a fly-proof dust-bin with a close fitting lid or cover, and deposit in such dust-bin all rubbish and refuse.
- (2) No person shall throw any rubbish, dirt, bones, skins of animals, or such other refuse, in or upon any village market or its premises.
- 13. No carcase or meat of any animal not slaughtered at an approved slaughter-house, shall be brought into, or sold or exposed for sale at, any village market; provided, however, that the provisions of this rule shall not apply to frozen meat, game, or fish.
- 14. No person shall keep or sell or expose for sale in any stall or space in a village market any article prohibited by the Committee.
- 15. It shall be an offence for any person occupying a stall or space in any village market to neglect or refuse to serve the public, wilfully or without being able to assign a satisfactory reason therefor, during two consecutive days.
- 16. It shall be the duty of the market-keeper to keep the market premises and buildings clean and free from filth and rubbish, and in a sanitary condition.
- 17. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorized in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any market or any article of food brought into, or exposed or kept for sale in such market.
- 18. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or for any officer acting under his authority, to inspect any market and to seize any unwholesome article of food introduced into or exposed for sale in any market and to convey such article to the Medical Officer of Health or the nearest Medical Officer, and if it appears to such Medical Officer that any article of food so seized is unwholesome, such article may be destroyed without the payment of any compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.




