The following rule shall be added immediately after rule 252 of the rules relating to the Ceylon Planters' Rifle Corps of the Ceylon Defence Force, published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,241 of August 28, 1936, and shall have effect as rule 252A:—

"252A. An allowance, to be known as the personal grant for efficiency, may be paid at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, acting with the advice of the Finance Committee, to any member of any rank on the active list who at the end of a training year has complied with the efficiency requirements in respect of that year and who has attended a minimum of 20 parades. The amount of such grant shall in no case exceed Rs. 10."

The regulations relating to the storage of Explosives, published in *Gazette* No. 5,858 of June 20, 1902, as amended by regulation published by Notification in *Gazette* No. 6,503 of May 17, 1912, are hereby further amended in the Table of reference thereto, under the sub-heading "Class V—Fulminate Class," by the substitution, for all the words from "chlorates of potash with sulphur" to "carbonaceous matter", of the words "Any preparation consisting of a mixture of a chlorate and a sulphide or sulphur."

SPECIAL ORDERS.

1. No person shall keep, import from any place out of the Colony, convey or sell any dangerous explosives commonly known as "Dashing Crackers", or any fireworks containing a mixture of potassium chlorate or any oxygen-carrier and any one or more of the following, namely, red phosphorus, yellow phosphorus, antimony sulphide, arsenic sulphide or aluminium powder.

2. The Special Orders under section 29 of the Ordinance published in *Gazette* No. 7,556 of November 19, 1926, are hereby cancelled.

THE PRISONS ORDINANCE, 1877.

IT is hereby notified that the following rule made by the Executive Committee of Home Affairs in pursuance of the powers vested in that Committee by section 76 of the Prisons Ordinance, 1877, has been approved by the State Council and ratified by the Governor.

RULE.

The general rules dated August 12, 1926, published in *Gazette* No. 7,542 of August 20, 1926, as last amended by rule published in *Gazette* No. 8,107 of March 1, 1935, are hereby further amended as follows:—

(1) in rule 1, by the omission of the words "in Colombo once at least in each month, and every other prison";

(2) in rule 3—

(a) by the substitution, for the words "specially visiting those in solitary confinement or punishment cells", of the words "giving special attention to every prisoner who for any reason is confined in a cell"; and

(b) by the substitution for all the words from "anything" to "contained" of the words "anything contained in the Prisons Ordinance, 1877, or in these rules or in any other written law applicable to the Prisons in Ceylon";

(3) in rule 11, by the addition after the figures "1877" of the words "or in any other written law applicable to the Prisons in Ceylon";

(4) in rule 16, by the substitution for the words "and these regulations", of the words "and these rules and any other written law applicable to the Prisons in Ceylon";

(5) in rule 20, by the substitution for the words "or cause to be read by a responsible officer appointed by him", of the words "or cause a responsible officer, wherever possible not below the rank of Jailer, to read";

(6) by the substitution for rule 24 of the following new rule:—

"24. He shall—

(a) cause an Inventory of the entire stock of stores, clothing, bedding, and similar articles to be kept by the Jailer;

(b) during the first week in October in each year or at such other time as may be approved by the Financial Secretary, cause a complete survey of all such articles to be made by a Departmental Board appointed in accordance with the Financial Regulations for the time being in force;

(c) satisfy himself on taking charge of the prison, and thereafter not less than twice in each year, as to the correctness of the Inventory and sign it as correct, or in the event of any discrepancies being discovered bring such discrepancies to the notice of the Inspector-General together with a report in explanation thereof;

(d) cause the stores and all the articles held in charge to be verified in strict accordance with the Financial Regulations for the time being in force, on each occasion on which the Jailer is transferred or is otherwise absent from duty for a period exceeding one month;

(e) cause any unserviceable article to be disposed of in accordance with the Financial Regulations for the time being in force."

(7) by the substitution for rule 27 of the following new rule:—

"27. He may, with the prior approval of the Inspector-General, interdict on the ground of misconduct, any Jailer or subordinate prison officer from duty, in accordance with the Public Service Regulations for the time being in force: provided that such prior approval shall not be necessary where, in his opinion, the offence is of such a grave nature, that the Jailer or officer should forthwith cease to perform duty; but in every such case, he shall forthwith report the particulars to the Inspector-General."

(8) by the substitution for rule 28 of the following new rule:—

"28. He may with the prior sanction of the Inspector-General engage temporarily such number of additional subordinate officers as may be required for the service

of the prison: provided that in a case of emergency it shall be sufficient if such sanction is obtained as soon as possible after such engagement."

(9) by the substitution for rule 33 of the following new rule:—

"33. He shall submit to the Inspector-General for reference to the Attorney-General any question as to the correctness of a warrant of commitment addressed to him. He shall also make application to Court under section 318 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1898, for the revision of any sentence of whipping which for any reason cannot be carried out."

(10) in rule 44, by the substitution for the words—

"he shall also visit every prisoner in punishment cell or solitary confinement" of the words "he shall also visit daily every place where prisoners are at work and every prisoner who for any reason is confined in a cell";

(11) by the substitution for rule 47 of the following new rule:—

"47. The Medical Officer shall, at least once a week, see every prisoner for whom light labour, change of diet, or additional clothing has been recommended, with a view to ascertaining whether such recommendation should be altered or continued."

(12) in rule 68—

(a) by the substitution for the words "Whenever a convict" of the words "Whenever a prisoner"; and

(b) by the substitution for the words "other convict Prison" of the words "other Prison";

(13) by the substitution for rule 80 of the following new rule:—

"80. When the Medical Officer is of opinion—

(a) that the life of a prisoner will be endangered by further imprisonment, and that the prisoner's condition cannot be improved by temporary removal to a public hospital for surgical or other treatment; or

(b) that the illness of a prisoner is likely to terminate fatally within a brief period, and before the expiration of the sentence, and that the prisoner is still capable of being removed, and there is reason to think that the prisoner has friends or relatives able and willing to take care of him in the event of his release; or

(c) that the mental condition of a prisoner will be adversely affected or endangered by further imprisonment,

the Medical Officer shall, without delay, transmit to the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services a full medical report of the case together with the particulars of the prisoner on Prison Form 26, which may be obtained from the Superintendent. The Director of Medical and Sanitary Services on receipt of such report shall appoint a medical board to examine the prisoner and to report on the case on Prison Form 30, and shall forward such report together with his own recommendation thereon and all papers relevant to the case, marked 'Urgent', to the Minister for Home Affairs through the Minister for Health for submission to the Governor."

(14) by the substitution for rule 109 of the following new rule:—

"109. The private property, other than articles of wearing apparel, of every prisoner, sentenced in the aggregate to imprisonment for a term exceeding one year shall be disposed of as follows:—

(a) If the prisoner so desires, such private property, and any money brought in by him or found on his person on first admission to Prison, shall be delivered to any friend or relative whom he may select, at the prison gate, in the presence of the prisoner, the Jailer, and the gatekeeper; and a record of such delivery and receipt shall be made by the Jailer in his register of private property, and signed by the prisoner, the gatekeeper, the Jailer, and the recipient.

(b) If not so delivered within one month of the date of the prisoner's admission to Prison, such private property shall be sold by public auction; and if the proceeds of such sale, and the money, if any, belonging to the prisoner, together amount to five rupees or over, the proceeds of such sale and such money shall be placed in deposit for the purpose of being paid to the prisoner on his discharge. If such proceeds, and the money, if any, together amount to less than five rupees, the proceeds of such sale and such money

shall be credited to Government; provided that no private property which is not readily saleable, or which is of importance or of sentimental value to the prisoner (such as certificates of character, charms, religious symbols, title deeds, motor driving licences, &c.), shall be sold without an authority in writing from the Superintendent."

(15) in rule 113, by the substitution for the words "hard labour convicts" of the words "convicted prisoners";

(16) in rule 136A by the substitution for each of the expressions "Superintendent of the Prison" and "Superintendent", of the expression "Inspector-General";

(17) by the substitution for rule 170 of the following new rule:—

"170. Every prisoner shall ordinarily be released at noon after the midday meal, on the day on which he is entitled to be discharged: Provided that in special cases, the Superintendent may authorize in writing a discharge at any earlier hour on that day after the morning unlock. No prisoner shall be released from prison between the hours of lock-up and unlock except upon an order in writing under the hand of the Inspector-General."

(18) in rule 178—

(a) by the substitution for the paragraphs (c) and (d) thereof, of the following new paragraphs:—

"(c) prisoners serving sentences of preventive detention";

and

"(d) prisoners under 22 years of age";

(19) by the insertion between rule 201 and rule 202 of the following new rule 201A:—

"201A. Where any prisoner awaiting trial or on remand, is an alien, he shall, if he so desires, be allowed to have communication with the consular representative of his country, and any interview between such prisoner and such consular representative may, at the discretion of the Superintendent, be permitted to be held out of the hearing, but within sight, of a prison officer."

(20) by the substitution for rule 221 of the following new rule:—

"221. (1) It shall be lawful for the Inspector-General to segregate in a Special Gang, which may be established in any one or more prisons appointed for that purpose in writing by him, any prisoner whose violent behaviour or continued misconduct necessitates such segregation. Such prisoner shall be considered to be under special discipline and supervision, and shall be kept entirely separate, at all times, from the rest of the inmates, and shall be employed on such cellular labour as the Inspector-General may direct from time to time. No such prisoner shall be removed from such Special Gang without the sanction of the Inspector-General.

(2) Whenever the Superintendent is satisfied that any prisoner is affected with mental abnormality, or temperamental instability, or has a record of violent conduct or shows any tendency to violence or is exercising a bad influence over others or that for this or any other sufficient cause, it will be dangerous or inexpedient or prejudicial to the discipline of the prison to allow that prisoner to work or to be located or to take part in the normal routine of the prison in association with other prisoners, the Superintendent shall report the case to the Inspector-General. On receipt of such report the Inspector-General may order, that such prisoner shall, for such period as the Inspector-General may specify, be subjected to special supervision on monthly reports and be prohibited from associating with other prisoners, in respect of location, labour, and the normal routine of the prison."

(21) in rule 222, by the substitution, for paragraph (1), of the following new paragraph:—

"(1) A prisoner shall be supplied with a sufficient quantity of plain and wholesome food and shall on first admission to the prison, be classified by the Superintendent for diet purposes as being entitled to either of the following dietary scales:—

(a) dietary scale A set out in Schedule I. to these rules, or

(b) dietary scale B set out in Schedule I. to these rules, if in the case of any prisoner the Medical Officer is of opinion that this scale is desirable in the interests of the health of that prisoner and having regard to the circumstances of such prisoner and the diet he was accustomed to before his imprisonment.

Except upon the authority of the Inspector-General obtained in the special circumstances of any case, or except as hereinafter provided in these rules, no classification made under this paragraph shall be altered, and no prisoner shall be given any food which is not in accordance with the dietary scales set out in Schedule I."

(22) in rule 223—

(a) by the renumbering of that rule as paragraph (1) thereof; and

(b) by the addition of the following immediately after the renumbered paragraph (1) as paragraph (2):—

"(2) Every prisoner shall also be given once in every week, on Sunday or such other day as may be specified by the Inspector-General, one-third of an ounce of gingelly or coconut oil for the hair.";

(23) by the substitution for rule 244 of the following new rule:—

"244. Books.—(1) No book or other printed matter shall be admitted into any prison for the use of prisoners, except upon the written authority of the Inspector-General or of the Superintendent, and the Jailer shall keep a catalogue of all books and printed matter admitted into the prison.

(2) Books for the use of prisoners shall be divided into the following classes:—

(a) Devotional Books,

(b) Text books.

(c) Books of general literature.

(a) *Devotional Books*.—Every prisoner shall, from the date of his admission, be allowed to retain in his cell or ward, throughout his sentence, not more than one devotional book according to his religion (e.g., the Bible for Christians, the Koran for Muslims, the Buddha Charitaya for Buddhists or the Tiruvagam for Hindus). Such book may be received from any person outside the prison or purchased from a prisoner's earnings if he is entitled to expend such earnings under these rules.

(b) *Text Books*.—A Superintendent may, if he is satisfied that this privilege is to a prisoner's professional or educational advantage, allow any prisoner who has completed the penal stage, to receive from any person outside the prison or to purchase from his earnings (if entitled to do so under these rules) and to retain in his cell or ward not more than three books falling under the following categories: Text books, grammars, dictionaries, atlases, or other books required for educational classes or for an approved course or study.

(c) *General Library Books*.—A prisoner who has completed his penal stage may, in addition to the aforementioned devotional and text books, be allowed to have in his cell or ward, at any one time, not more than two books of general literature issued from the prison library. Arrangements shall be made by the Superintendent for the changing of library books under the supervision of a Jailer, not less than once a week, on such days as may be appointed by the Superintendent. A library book may be retained for a fortnight or, if it is not required by other prisoners, for a longer period, and the issue and receipt of every such book shall be entered in a register to be kept for that purpose."

(24) by the substitution for rules 246 to 253, both inclusive, of the eleven new rules following:—

"246. When a prisoner has been reported for an offence, the Superintendent may order him to be kept apart from other prisoners pending adjudication.

247. A prisoner shall, before a report against him is dealt with, be informed of the offence with which he is charged and shall be given an opportunity of hearing the evidence against him, and of being heard and calling witnesses in his defence. Every punishment ordered by a Tribunal constituted under section 67 of the Ordinance, or by the Superintendent or a Visitor, shall be communicated to the prisoner by the Tribunal or the Superintendent or Visitor as the case may be.

248. Close confinement, confinement in a punishment cell or variation of diet, shall in no case be imposed, unless the Medical Officer has certified that the prisoner is in a fit state of health to undergo such punishment.

249. The use of the authorized mechanical restraints more fully described hereunder for the purposes of intramural discipline, under section 72 of the Ordinance, shall be subject to the following provisions:—

(1) (a) *The Loose canvas restraint jacket* (with fork strap for men prisoners and without fork strap for women prisoners) shall not be used except—

(i.) on the orders of the Medical Officer given on medical grounds, when restraint is necessary to prevent a patient who is suffering from a mental affection from injuring himself or others or destroying clothes or other articles, or

(ii.) on the orders of a prison officer not below the rank of Jailer, as an alternative means of restraint to the body-belt when for any reason the use of the body-belt is deemed inexpedient or insufficient.

(b) The Medical Officer shall personally see the prisoner before the loose canvas restraint jacket is applied, and give his instructions in writing, and the prison officer on duty shall personally see that such instructions are carried out. The Medical Officer shall visit the prisoner at least twice in every 24 hours.

(2) *The Body-belt* (with iron cuffs for men and with leather cuffs for women) shall not be used except on a prisoner who is violent, or creates a disturbance, or is insubordinate or mutinous, or except for the purpose of preventing injury to the prisoner himself or others, or damage to property. The order for such restraint shall specify the date and the hour when it is to be applied, and shall not be given on a mere report of misconduct from the officer in charge of the prisoner, but only after investigation of the necessity for doing so. In any case where a prisoner is restrained by order of the Jailer, such Jailer shall forthwith report the case to the Superintendent. At meal times the left hand or, in the case of a left handed prisoner, the right hand shall be released.

(3) *The Ankle strap* (a single leather strap 28½ inches long, whether for men or for women) may be used as a restraint on any prisoner who resists or is likely to resist removal from one part of the prison to another, in order to prevent him from injuring himself or others by kicking. The ankle strap shall be taken off as soon as the removal of the prisoner is completed. It may be used either singly or in conjunction with the loose canvas restraint jacket or the body-belt.

(4) (1) Handcuffs may be used either in front of or behind the body, when a prisoner succeeds in getting one or both hands out of the body-belt or as an alternative to the use of the body-belt or loose canvas jacket. Where handcuffs have been ordered to be placed with the hands behind the body, they shall be removed to the front at meal times and at bed time, and replaced if necessary. No prisoner shall be left for the night with handcuffs behind the body. If the handcuffs have to be left on for the night, they shall be in front; and shall not be placed behind again until the following morning, should that be necessary. In every case the body-belt shall first be applied. If that fails, the handcuffs may be used; and in that case, the hands shall be placed in front of the body. They shall not be placed behind the body unless the prisoner shows that he intends to repeat his violence as long as they are in front.

(2) Handcuffs may also be used, either in front of or behind the body, as ordered by the Superintendent, Visitor, or Tribunal constituted under section 67 of the Ordinance, whenever a prisoner, who is placed before such Superintendent, Visitor, or Tribunal for purposes of inquiry or adjudication, behaves or is likely to behave in a violent manner or creates a disturbance. In such a case the handcuffs shall be taken off after the prisoner has been removed from the place of inquiry or adjudication, if he offers no further violence or makes no further disturbance.

250. Every prisoner on whom any mechanical restraint is used shall be released temporarily or partially whenever it may be necessary to enable him to take his meals or to answer a call of nature.

251. The Register of Restraints kept by the Superintendent under section 74 of the Ordinance shall set out the name and registered number of the prisoner, the date and length of his sentence, the form of restraint used, the date and the hour on which the restraint was applied and removed and the authority for the application and the removal of the restraint.

252. A prisoner under mechanical restraint of any kind shall be visited by the officer immediately in charge of him at least once in every hour.

252A. Subject to the provisions of section 73 of the Ordinance, a prisoner on whom any of the foregoing mechanical means of restraint is used for purposes of discipline shall not be released therefrom except on the orders of the Inspector-General, Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent or officer acting as such, or except on the orders of a Medical Officer where the loose canvas restraint jacket has been used on his orders.

252B. The use of the authorized mechanical restraints more fully described hereunder for the purposes of extramural security shall be subject to the following provisions:—

(1) Handcuffs, with the hands placed in front of the body shall be used in every case where prisoners are in transit from one place to another or confined in an insecure place.

(2) A Gang-chain with single wristcuff shall be used when a party of two or more prisoners is in transit from one place to another, or confined in an insecure place.

(3) A light closeting chain with single wristcuff shall be used when a prisoner in transit from one place to another, or confined in an insecure place (*e.g.*, in civil hospitals, railway trains, &c.) requires to answer calls of nature. When such chain is used the wristcuff at each end of the chain shall be attached one to a wrist of the prisoner and the other to a wrist of the escorting officer.

(4) The body-belt shall not be used save in exceptional cases of violence, disturbance, mutinous conduct, escape or rescue, when a prisoner is in transit from one place to another or confined in an insecure place.

252c. No prison officer shall use on any prisoner any mechanical restraints other than those authorized by the foregoing rules 249 and 252b.

253. (1) Whenever an order for corporal punishment is made under section 67 of the Ordinance, the Superintendent of the Prison at which the inquiry is held, shall forthwith furnish to the Inspector-General, for transmission through the Minister for Home Affairs to the Governor, a copy of the proceedings of such inquiry, and a record of the sentence, together with the grounds on which it was passed. No order for corporal punishment shall be carried into effect unless and until it has been confirmed by the Governor.

(2) In forwarding such proceedings to the Inspector-General, the Superintendent shall annex a separate report of the prisoner's conduct in prison, together with a summary of his prison offences and punishments, if any; and, if the prisoner has on previous occasions used violence or has threatened to do so, the circumstances, the dates and the punishments awarded on such occasions."

(25) by the omission of rule 258;

(26) by the substitution for rule 259 of the following new rule:—

259. (1) The number of remission marks that may be forfeited under section 65 (2) or section 67 (3) (b) or section 67B (1) of the Ordinance shall in no case exceed the number in excess of six per day which the prisoner may have earned prior to the date on which such forfeiture is ordered.

HAIRDRESSING SALOONS OR BARBERS' SHOPS.

I.—Conditions of Issue of Licence.

No person shall be entitled to obtain a licence to keep a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop unless the building or part of the building to be used for the purpose, and the equipment of the saloon or shop, are in conformity with the following conditions and requirements:—

1. The building or part of the building—

(a) must be substantially constructed, and must have a floor space of not less than 120 square feet: provided that the requirements of this paragraph shall not apply to any building in which a saloon or shop is carried on or kept at the date of the publication of this by-law in the *Gazette*; and

(b) must have its walls lime-plastered and lime-washed, its roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white, its floor cemented, and the junction of the floor with the walls rounded off with cement; and

(c) must be well lighted and well ventilated; and

(d) must be provided with satisfactory drains, and with satisfactory latrine accommodation either within the building or on the premises.

2. If any part of the building is used or is intended to be used for residential purposes, that part must be in conformity with the requirements of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915.

3. The saloon or shop must be provided with—

- (a) a sufficient supply of water at all times during which the saloon or shop is open to customers;
- (b) means for securing an adequate supply either of boiling water or of disinfectants, for the purpose of washing or sterilizing the instruments or appliances in daily use;
- (c) facilities for the hairdressers or barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work;
- (d) a sufficient number of receptacles for the disinfectants to be used for sterilizing instruments or appliances;
- (e) a sufficient supply of towels and overalls for the use of the customers;
- (f) a sufficient number of spittoons, kept by the side of the seats in such manner as to be readily available to customers and employees; and
- (g) a covered and movable dust-bin made of galvanized iron or other impervious material, for the reception of hair-clippings and refuse.

II.—Regulations for Licensed Hairdressing Saloons or Barbers' Shops.

1. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position outside the saloon or shop, a board bearing the words "Licensed Hairdressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop", as the case may be; and
- (b) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position within the saloon or shop, a framed copy of these regulations in each of the languages, English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

2. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause the walls of such saloon or shop to be lime-washed and the ceiling painted at least once in six months; and
- (b) keep clean the floor, walls, ceiling, fixtures, furniture, and equipment of such saloon or shop.

3. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall cause every hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop—

- (a) to keep his person and his wearing apparel clean;
- (b) to keep his finger-nails short and free from dirt; and
- (c) to wash his hands with soap and water immediately before attending to each customer.

4. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause every spittoon in such saloon or shop to be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) cause every hair-brush or comb used in such saloon or shop to be washed or cleaned, and sterilized or disinfected, every day, and to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times;
- (c) cause every shaving mug or cup, shaving brush, clipper, razor, or other cutting instrument, used in such saloon or shop to be well rinsed and cleaned in hot water after each occasion on which it is used; and
- (d) cause all hair-clippings and other refuse to be collected after each customer has been attended to, and to be deposited in the dust-bin provided for the purpose.

5. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use, or permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop to use, on any customer—

- (a) any styptic pencil, powder-puff or sponge; or
- (b) any alum or other material for the purpose of stopping any bleeding, unless such alum or other material is in powder or liquid form.

6. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not supply, for the use of any customer, any towel which is not fresh from the wash or any overall which is not clean.

7. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not—

- (a) knowingly permit any person who is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease of any kind, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, to enter the saloon or shop for any purpose; or
- (b) employ any person referred to in paragraph (a) in any capacity in such saloon or shop; or

(c) knowingly permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him to attend in the saloon or shop on any person referred to in paragraph (a); or

(d) permit any such hairdresser or barber who, by error or accident, attends on any person referred to in paragraph (a), to attend on any other customer unless that hairdresser or barber washes and cleans his hands before attending on such other customer; or

(e) permit any instrument that has been used on any person referred to in paragraph (a) to be used on any other person until it is sterilized.

8. No person shall expectorate within any hairdressing saloon or barber's shop, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

9. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use or permit any other person to use the licensed premises—

(a) as a place for taking meals at any time; or

(b) as a place for sleeping, except at night when such premises are not open to customers.

REGULATIONS.

1. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Trincomalee Urban District Council;

"public stand" means any space within the urban area of Trincomalee which may from time to time be defined and reserved for the parking of motor cabs or omnibuses by a notice signed by the Chairman and exhibited at the spot.

2. The Chairman may issue permits authorizing motor cabs or omnibuses to use a public stand and charge fees for the permits in accordance with the scale specified in the schedule hereto.

3. No vehicle other than a motor cab or omnibus shall enter or be parked in a public stand.

4. No motor cab or omnibus shall be parked in any public place except in a public stand.

5. Where a public stand or any portion of a public stand is reserved for the use of motor cabs or omnibuses, no motor car not belonging to the class for which the stand or the portion thereof is reserved shall enter or be parked therein.

6. No motor cab or omnibus shall enter or be parked in a public stand unless its driver is in possession of a valid permit issued in respect of it under these regulations.

7. Where separate passages for entrance and exit have been provided and indicated by notice or signboard at a public stand for motor cabs or omnibuses, no motor cab or omnibus shall enter or leave that public stand except by the appropriate passage.

8. Throughout the period during which a motor cab or omnibus occupies a public stand the driver or a person capable of driving the motor cab or omnibus shall remain in charge thereof at the public stand.

9. The driver of every motor cab or omnibus occupying a public stand shall, whenever required to do so by a police officer, or by a person authorized for the purpose by the Chairman, produce for inspection the permit issued in respect of such motor cab or omnibus.

10. The driver or other person in charge of any motor cab or omnibus occupying a public stand shall conduct himself in an orderly manner.

11. (1) All motor cabs or omnibuses parked in a public stand shall be halted—

- (a) facing the same direction, and
(b) in accordance with such notice or sign as may be exhibited at such stand, either parallel to each other or one behind the other in the order of their arrival.

(2) All motor cabs and omnibuses parked one behind the other in a public stand, shall be moved up in due order as vacancies occur in front.

12. No driver of a lorry shall park the lorry on any highway within the urban area of Trincomalee declared by regulation to be suitable for use by lorries except—

- (a) for such time as may be necessary for effecting essential repairs in the event of a breakdown; or
(b) for such time as may be reasonably necessary for the purpose of loading or unloading goods.

13. No person shall park any motor car in the highways or parts of the highways specified hereunder:—

- (1) Dockyard road for a distance of 100 yards on either side of its junction with Court road.
(2) Inner Harbour road opposite Inner Harbour Market and tea boutique.
(3) Kachcheri road.
(4) Oil Monger street.
(5) North Coast road.

Provided that a motor car may be parked in Kacheheri road, Oil Monger street, or North Coast road for such time only as may be necessary for taking up or setting down passengers or for loading or unloading goods.

14. The by-laws made by the Local Board of Health and Improvement, Trincomalee, published in *Gazette* No. 7,575 of April 8, 1927, the regulations for the urban area within the administrative limits of the Trincomalee Local Board published in *Gazette* No. 7,685 of January 11, 1929, and the notification published by the Chairman, Local Board, Trincomalee, in *Gazette* No. 7,775 of May 2, 1930, and continuing in force by virtue of the provisions of section 247 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, are hereby revoked.

 - (8) To carry on business, and to act as merchants, traders, commission agents, shipowners, carriers or in any other capacity, in the Island of Ceylon or elsewhere, and to import, export, buy, sell, barter, exchange, pledge, make advances upon, or otherwise deal in goods, produce, articles and merchandise.
 - (9) To establish or acquire and carry on trading stations, factories, stores, and depots in the Island of Ceylon or elsewhere, and to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, carry on, develop and improve any business, or any real or personal property in the said Island of Ceylon or elsewhere, or any undivided or other interest whatsoever therein respectively.
 - (10) To buy and sell or otherwise deal in rice, paddy, rubber, coconuts, copra, tea, cocoa, and other produce generally as principals or agents.
 - (11) To carry on the business of retail and general supply store in all its branches and to transact all kinds of agency business in general.
 - (12) To hold, use, clear, manage, improve, carry on and develop the undertakings, lands and real and personal, immovable and movable property and assets of any kinds of the Company, or any part thereof.
 - (13) To acquire or establish and carry on any other business, which can be conveniently carried on in connection with any of the Company's general business; to apply for, purchase or otherwise

2A. With the permission of Council, Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader moved:—That the Council do record its cordial appreciation of the great services rendered to the Council and to the ratepayers of Colombo by Mr. W. L. Murphy, B.A., C.C.S., during the period he officiated as Chairman of this Council and Mayor of Colombo. Dr. E. A. Coorey, in seconding the motion, referred to the manner in which Mrs. Murphy had co-operated with the Mayor in his duties in the sphere of social service. The motion was carried with acclamation.

The first Meeting of the New Municipal Council was held at 10 a.m., this day, pursuant to notice, dated May 1, 1937, by the Acting Secretary, and to the summons, dated May 7, 1937, issued by the Commissioner, in terms of Section 60 (i.) of the Colombo Municipal Council (Constitution) Ordinance, No. 60 of 1935, for the purpose of electing a Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

(1) Dr. S. D. Fernando proposed that Mr. A. R. A. Razik be elected Deputy Mayor. Mr. N. M. M. Ishak seconded.

(2) Dr. A. F. J. Casie Chitty proposed that Mr. Geo R. de Silva be elected Deputy Mayor. Mr. D. R. Bentara-Aratchi seconded.

(3) Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando proposed that Mr. M. L. M. Reyal be elected Deputy Mayor. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

The Council then proceeded to elect the Deputy Mayor by secret ballot.

The Commissioner declared Mr. Geo. R. de Silva duly elected Deputy Mayor.

The Commissioner then invited the Mayor to preside.

The Mayor thereupon presided and thanked the Councillors for electing him as first Mayor of Colombo, and adjourned the meeting to 3 p.m. for the formal inauguration of the Council under the new Constitution (60 of 1935) by His Excellency the Governor.

General Meeting.

Friday, May 7, 1937, at 3 p.m.

The First General Meeting of the new Municipal Council was held this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice dated May 1, 1937.

Present : Dr. R. Saravanamuttu, the Mayor presiding; Mr. Geo. R. de Silva (Deputy Mayor); Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. M. T. Akbar, K.C.; Mr. D. R. Bentara-Aratchi; Dr. A. F. J. Casie Chitty; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. J. R. Dharmasena; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Dr. C. W. S. Fernando; Dr. S. D. Fernando; Mr. D. S. Fonseka; Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, M.S.C.; Mr. F. G. Husein; Mr. N. M. M. Ishak; Mr. C. G. C. Kerr, C.A.; Dr. A. Ratnapala; Mr. A. R. A. Razik, J.P., M.S.C.; Mr. M. L. M. Reyal; Dr. (Mrs.) M. H. Rutnam; Mr. N. Saravanamuttu; Mr. S. Saravanamuttu; Dr. V. R. Schokman, and Mr. M. Subbiah. The Municipal Commissioner (Mr. W. L. Murphy, B.A., C.C.S.) was present.

The Mayor announced that His Excellency the Governor would deliver his Address in inauguration of the new Council. His Excellency Sir Edward Stubbs, G.C.M.G., Governor, delivered his inaugural Address.

The Mayor announced that the meeting would adjourn for 20 minutes when he would introduce the Members of Council to His Excellency the Governor at the foot of the main staircase.

When the Council resumed, the Mayor announced the business on the Agenda.

2. To elect Members to form the Four Standing Committees for 1937, in terms of section 10 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 :—

- (1) Standing Committee on Finance.
- (2) Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects.
- (3) Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets.
- (4) Standing Committee on Municipal Works.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha moved that the election of the Standing Committees be postponed to enable the Members to decide and indicate to the Mayor the Committee on which they would each like to serve.

The Mayor stated that the Ordinance provides that this may be considered at the next General Meeting.

Mr. M. L. M. Reyal stated that it would be very essential for the Mayor to have some idea as to what Committees the Members were willing to serve in order to arrange some kind of compromise to prevent some Committees having too many and others too few Members. Dr. E. A. Coorey also spoke.

The Mayor agreed and pointed out that no Member could serve on more than two Standing Committees, and also that each Standing Committee should have six Members except the Standing Committee on Finance which should have five Members and the Mayor as an *ex officio* Member and Chairman of it.

It was resolved that the election of the Standing Committees be postponed and that in the meantime the Members be requested to indicate to the Commissioner on what Standing Committee or Committees they would each like to serve.

The Mayor then suggested that the Members should consider the question as to whether they would like to sit together in groups when the Council is in Session with a view to Members of the same group or party being able to sit adjacent to each other. If the Members were agreeable to his suggestion he requested that the leader of each group or party might indicate to the Commissioner the names of Members who would like to be grouped together.

The Mayor also referred to the question of the exact form in which the Constitution was to be expressed. He understood that there was a desire on the part of some Members to make Town Improvement, Slum Clearance and Housing the purpose of a Standing Committee.

He stated that next week he would be in his room at the Town Hall from 12 noon to 1 p.m. daily to meet Members in order to discuss various matters with them in regard to giving this Constitution shape and with a view to bringing up any decision reached in respect of this before the next meeting of Council.

The Mayor then referred to the question of delegation of powers, duties and functions under the Ordinance.

The list of powers delegated under Ordinance No. 6 of 1910 was being printed and copies of same would be made available by the Commissioner in about two weeks time. He suggested that this list could be considered at two or three informal meetings of Council before being brought up for final approval of Council.

Mr. M. T. Akbar referred to the provision for the continuance of the ex-Mayor as Commissioner under section 103 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935, and said that the temporary delegation of powers to him was immediately necessary.

The Mayor stated that he was coming later to the question of the delegation of powers to the Commissioner temporarily.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha stated that instead of informal meetings of the whole Council being held to consider the delegation of powers he would propose the appointment of a Special Committee to go into the matter and report to the Council.

The Mayor stated that there was no objection but the Special Committee should report to Council within a specified time.

On the motion of Mr. A. E. Goonesinha seconded by Mr. C. G. C. Kerr the following Special Committee with the Mayor as Chairman and the Commissioner as convener was appointed for the purpose. The Committee should submit its report, or at least an interim report, within two weeks of the list of powers now delegated, which is being printed, being made available by the Commissioner to the Members.

The Special Committee.

(1) The Mayor (the Chairman); (2) Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; (3) Mr. M. T. Akbar, K.C.; (4) Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; (5) Mr. A. E. Goonesinha; (6) Mr. C. G. C. Kerr; (7) Mr. A. R. A. Raziq; (8) Mr. M. L. M. Reyal; (The Commissioner as convener.)

3. To re-appoint the following Special Committees for 1937 (section 11 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935) :—

- (1) Special Committee regarding the Public Library.
- (2) Special Committee regarding Housing and Town Improvement.
- (3) Special Committee regarding Relief of Distress.

It was resolved that the reappointment of above Committees be also postponed.

Administrative and Executive Duties.

4. To make temporary arrangements for the carrying-on of the administrative and executive work of the Council pending a final decision as to the delegation of powers, duties and functions under section 9 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935.

The Mayor moved :—“That as an interim arrangement pending further consideration of the best means of carrying on the work of the Council it is resolved under section 9 (1) of the Colombo Municipal Council (Constitution) Ordinance, No. 60 of 1935, that all the powers, duties or functions which are required in terms of section 9 (2) to be exercised, performed or discharged, subject to the provisions of the Ordinance, by the Council, together with all powers, duties or functions vested in the Chairman by any resolution of the former Municipal Council, shall be and the same are hereby delegated to the Commissioner to be exercised, performed or discharged, subject to the provisions of the Ordinance, by him. It is further resolved that the Council under section 9 (4) consents to the delegation by the Commissioner to any Municipal Officer of any of the powers, duties, or functions delegated to him by this resolution or conferred or imposed or vested in him as Commissioner by the Ordinance or by any other written law.” Mr. C. G. C. Kerr seconded. Carried.
