Senanayake southwards parallel to and 2 chains from the western boundary of the Kosgama-Pugoda road to the southern boundary of the Colombo-Avissawella road, thence due south-eastwards in a straight line to a point one quarter of a mile distant, thence south-westwards parallel to and one quarter of a mile distant from the southern boundary of the Colombo-Avissawella road until it meets the southern boundary of lot 6718 in P. P. 9,893.

South.—A line drawn from the last mentioned point north-westwards and south-westwards parallel to and one quarter of a mile distant from the southern boundary of the Colombo-Avissawella road until it meets the Arapangan-ela.

BY-LAWS.

The by-laws under section 27 of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915, published by Notification in *Gazette* No. 8,015 of October 27, 1933, as last amended by Notification published in *Gazette* No. 8,259 of December 4, 1936, are hereby further amended as follows:—

(a) in Schedule I. thereto by the substitution for paragraph (a) under the heading "Division No. 1, Dehiwala" of the following new paragraph:—

"(a) The whole of the area between the Galle road and the sea, bounded on the north by a line drawn 100 feet south of and parallel to the Dehiwala canal; on the south by Dehiwala Station road; on the east by Galle High road; and on the west by the sea."; and

(b) in Schedule III. thereto, by the addition, immediately after paragraph (h) thereof under the heading "Commercial Areas", of the following new paragraphs:—

"(i) The area within a radius of 100 feet from the centre of the junction of Boteju road with the Galle road.

(j) The area within a radius of 150 feet from the centre of the junction of Allan avenue with Galle road.

(k) The area within a radius of 100 feet from the centre of the junction of Quarry road with Galle road.

(l) The area within a radius of 100 feet from the centre of the junction of Sri Maha Bodhi road with Galle road.

(m) The area within a radius of 100 feet from the centre of the junction of Waidya road with Galle road.

(n) The area within a radius of 150 feet from the centre of the junction of Waidya road with Allan avenue.

(o) The area within a radius of 100 feet from the centre of the junction of Waidya road with Park street.

(p) The area bounded on the north by the Dehiwala canal, on the west by the sea, on the south by a line drawn 100 feet distant from and parallel to the Dehiwala canal, and on the east by the Galle road."

THE NUISANCES ORDINANCE, 1862.

BY-LAWS for the Civil Area of Diyatalawa (as defined by the resolution of the State Council published in *Gazette* No. 8,251 of October 16, 1936), made by the Board of Health of the Province of Uva under section 5 of the Nuisances Ordinance, 1862, and confirmed by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the said section and by Article 93 of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931.

BY-LAWS.

Bakeries.

1. A bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread or the making of cakes or of biscuits for sale: Provided, however, that the term bakery shall not be deemed to include—

(a) any private residence or any other place where any process connected with the baking of bread or the making of cakes or of biscuits takes place not for sale but for the purpose of consumption on the premises; or

(b) any place where any process connected with the baking of bread or the making of cakes or of biscuits takes place, and where the bread or cakes or biscuits so made are sold mainly, if not wholly, for consumption on the premises.

Provided also that in the latter case it shall be lawful for the Chairman to authorize the use of such premises for the baking of bread or the making of cakes or of biscuits and to cancel such authorization if the bread or cakes or biscuits so made are not mainly sold for consumption on the premises.

2. No bakery shall be located in any compound within 100 feet of an open cesspit or surface latrine or in a position where bad odours will reach it, and no open cesspit or surface latrine shall be erected within 100 feet of any bakery.

3. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the inside of the walls shall be lime-plastered and shall be whitewashed every six months. The roof shall be of some permanent material. The ceiling shall be plastered and limewashed four times yearly, or may be made of closely fitting boards varnished or painted. The floor shall be cemented throughout and adequate drainage provided. Every room shall be provided with windows capable of being opened and having a superficial area of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space. The door of the oven shall not open directly into the kneading room. The kneading room shall not be less than 12 feet wide or 15 feet long.

4. Every bakery shall be kept in a clean condition and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, cesspit, or other nuisance.

5. The occupier of every building used as a bakery shall cause—

(a) the floor to be carefully scraped and swept and the drains to be flushed at least once every twenty-four hours;

(b) all dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from the premises to be deposited in a covered dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and

(c) such bin to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

6. The troughs and all the utensils used in the making of bread and pastry shall be kept clean.

7. The tops of the tables shall be of well seasoned closely fitting planks, or some non-harmful impervious material, and shall be scraped and cleaned daily.

8. No animal shall be kept in the bakery for any purpose whatsoever.

9. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of the bakery has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the bakery to enter the bakery or take part in the manufacture or sale, on the premises, of bread, biscuits, or confectionery.

10. All persons employed in the preparation and baking of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of breadmaking.

11. Clean water and soap shall be provided for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuits, and confectionery.

12. All bread, biscuits, confectionery, and sweetmeats exposed for sale shall be kept in receptacles free from contamination by flies. Such receptacles shall be kept clean.

13. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and the flour shall be kept at a height of not less than 18 inches above the ground.

14. No place situated on the same floor as the bakery and forming part of the same building shall be used as a sleeping place, unless it is effectually separated from the bakery by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling. No water closet, earth closet, privy or ashpit shall be opened or maintained within, or communicate directly with, the bakery.

15. The occupier of every building used as a bakery shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to bakeries to be hung up in a prominent place in such bakery.

Eating-houses and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. All eating-houses and tea and coffee boutiques shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

2. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms shall be well ventilated and lighted.

3. The occupier shall cause—
- (a) all refuse and dirt on or about the premises of any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique to be deposited in a covered dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
 - (b) such bin to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
4. No waste tea, coffee, or milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste, shall be thrown on the ground.
5. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the eating-house or tea or coffee boutique to be employed in or about any such eating-house or tea or coffee boutique.
6. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall at all times be kept clean.
7. The sugar used in such premises shall be kept in glass-stoppered bottles.
8. All cakes, sweetmeats, and similar articles exposed for sale shall be kept in receptacles free from contamination by flies. Such receptacles shall be kept clean.
9. The occupier of every building used as an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to eating-houses and tea and coffee boutiques to be hung up in a prominent place in such building.

Butchers' Stalls.

1. Every butcher's stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and shall be whitewashed at least four times a year, and the floor shall be cemented and sufficient drainage provided. All drains in or about a butcher's stall shall be flushed at least once a day.
2. Every room in which meat is kept shall be maintained in a clean condition.
3. Every table used in a butcher's stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.
4. (1) Every butcher shall provide himself with a fly-proof covered bin or receptacle of metal for waste material and refuse.
- (2) Every butcher shall cause—
- (a) all refuse, dirt, offal or other matter on or about the premises to be deposited in the bin or receptacle and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
 - (b) such bin or receptacle to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
5. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a butcher's stall has recently suffered from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the butcher's stall to be employed in such butcher's stall.
6. Every butcher shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to butchers' stalls to be hung up in a prominent place in the stall.

Fish Stalls.

1. (1) Every fish stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed. The floor shall be of smooth cement, having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement-rendered, and emptying into a bucket. The drain and bucket shall be washed with disinfectant at least twice a day, and the bucket shall not be allowed to overflow.
- Provided that in lieu of building such drain a fishmonger may use a large zinc sheet or concrete counter having a fall towards its centre and so arranged that the washings shall fall into the bucket.
- (2) The stall shall always be kept clean and free from stains of blood and dust, and the walls and floor kept in a state of good repair.

2. Every table used in a fish stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.

3. Fish baskets shall be washed daily and kept exposed to sun and air on a shelf and shall not be kept inside the fish stall.

4. (1) The holder of every fish stall shall provide himself with a covered fly-proof movable receptacle of metal for waste material.

(2) The holder of every fish stall shall cause—

- (a) all waste material on or about the premises to be deposited in the covered fly-proof movable receptacle and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
- (b) such receptacle to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

5. The drains in or about every fish stall shall be well flushed, at least once a day.

6. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a fish stall has recently suffered from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be employed in such fish stall.

7. The holder of every fish stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fish stalls to be hung up in a prominent place in the stall.

Fruit and Vegetable Stalls.

1. Every fruit and vegetable stall shall be well ventilated and the walls thereof shall be plastered and shall be whitewashed at least twice a year and the floor shall be cemented.

2. All fruits and vegetables exposed for sale shall be fresh and shall be kept at a height of not less than 18 inches from the floor.

3. The occupier of every fruit and vegetable stall shall cause—

- (a) all refuse and other unsaleable material on or about the premises to be deposited in a fly-proof dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
- (b) such bin to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

4. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a fruit or vegetable stall has recently suffered from any contagious or infectious disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the fruit and vegetable stall to be employed in such fruit and vegetable stall.

5. The occupier of every fruit and vegetable stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fruit and vegetable stalls to be hung up in a prominent place in such stall.

Cattle Sheds.

1. The yard of every cattle shed shall be properly levelled and drained and the ground shall either be paved or properly consolidated with broken metal, so that it keeps a hard and level surface.

2. (1) Every shed used for housing cattle shall be provided by the owner, tenant, or occupier of the premises on which the shed is situated with suitable cemented drains to carry off washings, urine, or rain water: Provided that the Chairman, if he considers it necessary, may require such drains to be so constructed as to convey the urine or washings into one or more covered receptacles constructed in such manner as the Chairman may direct, the contents of which shall be daily removed at the expense of such owner, tenant, or occupier and disposed of so that no nuisance is caused thereby.

(2) The floor of such shed shall be paved with brick rendered in cement, stone, cement concrete, asphalt, or other hard material which can readily be kept clean, and shall be kept even and in good repair. The roof shall be of tiles, corrugated iron sheets or similar material, and the walls of stone or brick cement-plastered to a height of 4 feet from the floor.

(3) Every cattle shed shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, being thoroughly cleansed daily, and all dung and refuse removed daily to such place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman may approve.

Dairies.

1. For the purposes of these by-laws a dairy shall include any farm, farmhouse, cowshed, milk store, milk shop, or other place from which milk is supplied or in which milk is stored or kept for the purposes of sale.

"dairyman" shall include any cow keeper, purveyor of milk, or occupier of a dairy, and in cases where a dairy is owned by more than one person, the manager or other person is actually managing such dairy.

2. No dairy shall be located in any compound within 100 feet of an open cesspit or surface latrine or in a position where bad odours will reach it, and no open cesspit or surface latrine shall be erected within 100 feet of any dairy.

3. The premises of every dairy shall be sufficiently provided with proper drainage and the drains shall be kept flushed. No foul water shall be allowed to stagnate in any such premises.

4. All cowdung and refuse or dirt on or about the premises of a dairy shall be collected and removed from the premises at least once a day.

5. A pure and protected supply of water shall be provided at a convenient distance for the use of every dairy. No bathing or washing of clothes shall take place at or near this water supply.

6. (1) No milch cow or buffalo shall be kept in a dairy or milked for the purposes of the milk supply unless it is free from disease.

(2) No person suffering from, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a dairy has recently suffered from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the dairy to be employed in such dairy.

7. (1) Every dairyman shall issue all such instructions to his employees and take all such measures as may be necessary to ensure that the udders and teats of each milch cow and buffalo are washed before milking.

(2) Every person employed for the purpose of milking cows or buffaloes in a dairy shall wash his hands with soap and water before milking.

(3) Every precaution shall be taken to prevent contamination of milk by dung or urine.

8. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a dairy shall be kept clean.

9. All vessels in which milk is sent out for distribution shall be clean, and shall be properly covered, stoppered, or corked with clean materials. No such vessel shall be carried under the ampit by the person distributing the milk.

10. Every shed in which cattle are kept in a dairy shall be in conformity with the requirements of by-law 2 under the foregoing heading "Cattle Sheds."

11. (1) Every dairy shall be provided with a milk room, erected in such position and at such distance from the cattle

sheds as the Chairman may approve, for the storing and preparation of milk, and for the storing after they are cleansed of all vessels used for the purposes of the dairy.

(2) The floor of the milk room shall be cemented with rounded corners at its junction with the walls, the walls shall be of plastered masonry, smooth boards, or ironwork, to be limewashed or painted periodically as directed by the Chairman. At least two opposite walls of the milk room shall abut on the open air. The roofs shall be ceiled with grooved boards to prevent the ingress of dust. There shall be at least one window and one door. The window shall be three feet by two feet without glass or shutters and be fitted with fly-proof netting. The door shall be opposite the window, be close fitting, and fitted with fly-proof netting, and shall be kept closed.

(3) Every table used or placed in a milk room shall have its top covered with marble, slate or zinc or other approved impermeable substance.

(4) The milk room shall not be used for any purpose other than that of storing and preparing milk or storing the clean vessels used for the purpose of the dairy.

12. Every dairyman shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to dairies to be hung up in a prominent place in the dairy.

GENERAL BY-LAWS.

1. Every part of any building used as a dwelling-house, church, school, or place of assembly shall be provided with sufficient light and ventilation, and shall whenever so ordered by the Chairman or any officer acting under his authority, be forthwith externally and internally limewashed, disinfected, or otherwise cleaned.

2. Latrines shall be constructed where in the opinion of the Chairman it is desirable that they should exist.

3. (1) The occupier of every dwelling-house or the person in charge of every church, school, or place of assembly shall deposit or cause to be deposited the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from the premises in a covered dust bin on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M., and shall remove such bin within the space of half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

(2) It shall not be lawful for any person to place or cause to be placed such dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse on any road except in such dust bins and except between the aforesaid hours.

4. It shall be lawful for any Inspector or any officer authorized in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon any building or premises within the limits of the Civil Area for the purposes of inspection and to do all things necessary for, or connected with, or incidental to, the preservation of health and the suppression of nuisances.

5. No person shall deposit or throw or cause or permit to be deposited or thrown any discarded bottles, tins, coconut shells, or other receptacles of any kind capable of holding rain water, in or about any land of which he is the owner or the occupier. Such bottles, tins, coconut shells, or other receptacles shall be burnt or buried or carried away to a suitable place approved by the Chairman.

IT is hereby notified that the following regulations made by the Executive Committee of Health under sections 71 and 76 of the Poisons, Opium, and Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1929, have been approved by the State Council and ratified by the Governor.

Regulations.

1. Part I. of the First Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended in the item commencing with the words "Lead in combination", by the substitution, for the word "disachylon", of the word "diachylon".

2. Part I. of the Second Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended as follows:—

(i.) in Regulation 2, by the substitution, for the words "All imported opium and dangerous drugs", of the words "All raw or prepared opium brought into Ceylon";

(ii.) in Regulation 5, by the substitution, for the words "Opium and dangerous drugs", of the words "Raw or prepared opium";

(iii.) in Regulation 6, by the omission of the words "or dangerous drug"; and

(iv.) in Regulation 7 (2), by the omission of the words "or dangerous drugs".

3. Part II. of the Second Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended as follows :—

- (i.) in Regulation 12, by the substitution in item (g) for the words "Colonial Auditor's" of the words "Auditor-General's";
- (ii.) in Regulation 13—

(a) by the substitution in paragraph (2) thereof, for all the words from "opium; or" to the end of that paragraph, of the word "opium"; and

(b) by the addition of the following new paragraph (3) thereto :—

"(3) For the purposes of this regulation 7,000 grains shall be deemed to be equal to one pound avoirdupois."; and

- (iii.) by the deletion of Regulation 14 and the substitution of the following new regulation therefor :—

"14. (1) Eating opium shall be sold in multiples of 50 grains whenever possible; but in no case shall a smaller quantity than 20 grains be sold by any opium officer. The last issue on any certificate in any month shall include any quantity less than 20 grains that would otherwise be left as a balance. Eating opium shall be issued in an even number of grains, and when in any month the balance on any certificate, remaining for the final issue, is an odd number of grains it shall be made even by the addition of one grain, and the total number of grains shall be charged for at the current rate.

(2) Smoking opium shall be sold in multiples of 50 grains whenever possible, but in no case shall a smaller quantity than 25 grains be sold. The last issue in any month shall include any quantity less than 25 grains that would otherwise be left as a balance.

(3) No opium shall be sold or delivered except on payment made on the spot at the time of sale or delivery."

4. Part III. of the Second Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended in Regulation 25 (5), by the substitution, for the words "Government Agent", of the words "Government Agent or opium officer".

5. Part V. of the Second Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended in Opium Form No. 13 by the deletion of the note commencing with "N.B." at the end of that Form.

6. Part II. of the Third Schedule to the Ordinance is hereby amended as follows :—

- (i.) by the substitution, for the note in parenthesis and the title standing at the head thereof, of the following :—
"(Sections 47 and 48).

Regulations as to the Import and Export of Dangerous Drugs.";

- (ii.) by the renumbering of Regulations 4 to 12 inclusive, as Regulations 5 to 13 respectively;
- (iii.) by the deletion of Regulations 1 to 3 inclusive, and the substitution of the following new Regulations 1 to 4 therefor :—

The Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice dated October 27, 1937.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of October 6, 1937, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were laid before the Council.

Mr. Geo. R. de Silva, Deputy Mayor, moved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of October 6, 1937, be taken as read and confirmed. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

Dr. E. A. Coorey referred to item No. 2 of the Minutes of the General Meeting of October 6, 1937, and inquired as to who was responsible for drawing up the list of prominent Citizens invited for the Tea party to meet H. E. Sir Andrew and Lady Caldecott.

The Mayor explained the procedure followed by him.

Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader inquired whether ex-members of Council were invited.

The Mayor replied.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. R. F. S. de Mel presented a petition from the residents of Slave Island South Ward praying for the provision of bathing places and additional lavatories to serve their needs, and moved that the matter be referred to the Sanitation Committee for consideration and report.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. N. Saravanamuttu asked the following questions which the Mayor answered :—

(1) Q.—Is it a fact that over 150 overseers are regularly employed on a temporary basis of pay by this Council on recurrent works? A.—I understand there are at least 150 Overseers so employed.

(2) Q.—If so, is this Council aware of the fact that most of these overseers have been regularly employed on a temporary basis for over 10 years and that they work nine hours per day? A.—Many of them have been so employed for 10 years and upwards and the normal working day is from 6.30 A.M. to 4.30 P.M. with an hour's break.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. R. F. S. de Mel asked the following questions which the Mayor answered :—

(1) Q.—How many full-time playground Instructors are employed by this Council? A.—Nine full-time Instructors.

(2) Q.—What are their names and the playgrounds to which they are attached? A.—Mr. D. S. Abraham, Chief Playground Instructor, supervising work of all Playgrounds.—Mr. R. F. Jirasinghe, Price park playground; Mr. S. Rajasingham, Ingram playground; Mr. L. V. Jayaweera, Newnham playground; Mr. G. Thiedeman, Coorey playground; Mr. O. H. Kumarasinghe, Cotta Road playground; Mr. A. D. H. Perera, White park playground; Mr. V. A. Jayasinghe, Demetagoda playground; Mr. T. Nathaniel, Alexander playground.

(3) Q.—What are the exact duties which they are expected to carry out and their hours of work? A.—As per list of duties of full-time Instructors attached.

(4) Q.—How many part-time playground Instructors and Instructresses are employed by this Council? A.—Four Instructors and three Instructresses.

(5) Q.—What are their duties and hours of work? A.—As per list of duties of part-time Instructors attached.

(6) Q.—What are their names and the playgrounds to which they are attached? A.—Mr. G. G. Jayakody, Ratnam playground; Mr. P. H. de Silva, Hubert playground; Mr. M. L. Ghany (temporary), Prince of Wales playground; Mr. M. A. Weerasena, Hyde park playground; Mrs. C. E. Lane, Rifle Garden playground; Miss D. Rodrigo, Mutiah playground; Mrs. C. Ambrose (acting), Elichouse park.

(7) Q.—In view of the fact that the daily average attendance at the two playgrounds in the Slave Island South Ward was 48 and 39 in the year 1935, and 65 and 130 in the year 1936, will the Mayor be good enough to have a report submitted for the consideration of this Council, making suggestions so as to render these playgrounds more attractive and popular among the children in these areas? A.—The matter is under consideration by the Relief of Distress Committee whose report will be placed before the Council in due course.

At this stage Dr. V. R. Schokman explained as to how he came to make those remarks regarding a petition he had received from certain Municipal Employees in connection with the Lady Lochore Fund and stated that the petition was not against the Charity Commissioner. He suggested that the words "concerning the Lady Lochore Fund" may be substituted for the words "against the Charity Commissioner".

The Mayor explained as to why he had permitted the questions of Mr. N. Saravanamuttu to be placed on the Agenda and appealed to all Members present to assist him in enforcing Standing Orders by refusing to acquiesce in any breach of them by officers.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. N. Saravanamuttu asked the following questions which the Mayor answered :—

(1) Q.—With reference to the statement made by Dr. V. R. Schokman at the meeting of this Council on October 6, 1937, that he had received a petition signed by many Municipal employees against the Charity Commissioner and Dr. V. R. Schokman's undertaking to forward to the Mayor the said petition, will the Mayor inform this house whether he has now received the petition in question? A.—No.

(2) Q.—If so, what disciplinary action does the Mayor propose to take against the employees of this Council who have signed and forwarded the said petition to the Member in contravention of the Standing Order?

(3) Q.—If no such petition has been received by the Mayor from Dr. V. R. Schokman will the Mayor take immediate steps to ascertain the names of the Municipal employees who are alleged to have signed the said petition? A.—In the absence of the petition, I do not propose to take any action. I would ask Members to assist me in enforcing Standing Orders by refusing to acquiesce in any breach of them by officers.

With the permission of the Mayor Dr. V. R. Schokman asked the following supplementary questions which the Mayor answered :—

Q.—Has the Mayor read my letter of October 17, 1937, regarding this matter? A.—Yes, I read it yesterday explaining that the petition was apparently destroyed with other papers.

Q.—Has the Mayor read the article on the subject which appeared in the "Times of Ceylon" dated August 27, 1937? A.—I do not remember having read it.

6. Pursuant to notice, the Mayor moved :—"That the Colombo Municipal Council records its profound regret at the death of Mr. C. P. Dias, M.B.E., J.P., who was a member of this Council from January, 1891, to December, 1926, and desires to express its deep sympathy with his relatives in their bereavement". (The Municipal Offices were closed at 2 p.m., on October 25, 1937, as a mark of respect to the deceased). Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded. Carried unanimously all present standing.

7. Pursuant to notice, the Mayor moved :—"That the Council do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the Agenda. Mr. Geo. R. de Silva, Deputy Mayor seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee.—

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of October 18, 1937, were considered.

MUNICIPAL TREASURER'S DEPARTMENT.

(2) With reference to the decision of the Standing Committees on Law and Sanitation (meeting together) of August 21, 1937, regarding the regulation of selling price of beef, &c., to consider the opinion of Dr. F. A. Hayley, K.C., on the subject. Registered No. 1,421.—Recommended that a notification be published for general information drawing attention to the fact that licences for stalls in public markets issued under By-law No. 15, Chapter XIII. of Council's By-laws will expire on December 31, 1937, and that these stalls will be re-allocated at the discretion of the Council.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Mr. A. R. A. Razik inquired as to the number of market stalls in the various markets in the City, and wished to know whether the proposed notification would apply to all the stalls.

The Commissioner explained.

A discussion ensued in which Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, the Mayor, Mr. M. Subbiah, Dr. E. A. Coorey, Mr. S. Saravanamuttu, Mr. M. L. M. Reyah, the Commissioner, Dr. V. R. Schokman, Dr. A. Ratnapala, and Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando took part.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha moved that the matter be referred to the Four Standing Committees for full investigation. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

Mr. C. G. C. Kerr thought that the substitution of the word "may" for the word "will" in the recommendation would meet the situation.

Mr. S. Saravanamuttu moved, as an amendment, that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted subject to the substitution of the word "may" for the word "will" in the last line of the recommendation. Mr. Geo. R. de Silva, Deputy Mayor, seconded.—Carried.

Mr. A. E. Goonesinha called for a division and the Council divided as follows :—

(The Mayor gave his casting vote in favour of the amendment.)

The amendment was thereupon put to the meeting as the substantive motion and carried.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

(49) To consider :—(a) Petition dated June 22, 1937, from P. Don Jeremias, licensee of beef stall No. 15, Deans road market, requesting that another entrance be provided to his beef stall. (b) A report thereon of the Municipal Engineer. (c) A memorandum of the Commissioner. Registered No. 1,158.—Recommended that the entrance asked for be provided.

(50) To consider the draft By-laws prepared by the Legal Draftsman in place of those approved by Council on August 4, 1937, for the regulation and control of swine. Registered No. 1,303.—Recommended, *vide* annexure "A".

(51) With reference to the resolution of the Sanitation Committee of August 9, 1937, regarding the proposed Analytical Laboratory, to consider the replies of the City Microbiologist and the Professor of Chemistry, Ceylon University College. Registered No. 1,390.—Recommended :—(a) That provision be included in the 1938 Budget for the building of Council's own laboratory for analytical work. (b) That applications be invited by advertisement for the post of Municipal Analyst on the scale of salary Rs. 3,600—Rs. 6,000 by 10 annual increments of Rs. 240. (c) That in the event of Mr. N. G. Baptist applying and being selected for the appointment, the University College Council be requested to grant him permission to change his course of studies.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Dr. A. Ratnapala, Chairman of the Sanitation Committee, moved that the matter be referred back to the Committee for reconsideration. Mr. M. L. M. Reyah seconded.—Carried.

(52) To consider :—(a) A memorandum of the Acting Chief Medical Officer of Health, dated September 13, 1937, requesting sanction of Council to an expenditure of Rs. 2,096.03 being the cost of drugs bought locally for usual intermediate requisitions as it was decided not to get this half year's drugs from England but to supply the dispensaries with the office stock which had accumulated. (b) A report of the Acting Municipal Treasurer stating that sanction of Council is necessary for the following purchases which have been made from Vote H. 30, "Drugs and chemicals" :—(1) From Messrs. Cargills, Ltd., at a cost of Rs. 752.22; (2) From Messrs. Miller & Co., Ltd., at a cost of Rs. 144.95; (3) From The Colombo Apothecaries Ltd., at a cost of Rs. 322.21; (4) From The Imperial Medical Stores, at a cost of Rs. 876.65; Total, Rs. 2,096.03. Registered No. 1,422.—Recommended.

(53) With resolution to the resolution of Council of October 6, 1937, regarding the conversion of a vacant stall in the Kotahena Market to be used as a pork stall, to reconsider a plan and detailed estimate for Rs. 175 from the Municipal Engineer (supported by the Acting Municipal Treasurer) for the conversion. Funds are available under Estimate I. 16, Maintenance of Markets, item I. 13. Sanction of Council is necessary. Registered No. 847.—Recommended the conversion of the stall as suggested by the Commissioner, *i.e.*, by closing the present entrance from the interior of the market and providing an entrance direct from the street.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Resolved that the corresponding recommendation of the Works Committee (item No. 6) be adopted.

(54) To consider the rules for regulating the duties of Dispensary Medical Officers. Registered No. 1,423.—Recommended that—(1) The present hours of work in the mornings be extended by 1 hour, *i.e.*, 7.30 A.M. to 11.30 A.M. instead of 10.30 A.M. (2) That new entrants as Dispensary Medical Officers be asked to reside in the Wards to which they are assigned.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Mr. S. Saravanamuttu moved that part (1) of the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted and as regards part (2) the following be adopted :—All Dispensary Medical Officers should reside in the respective wards they are expected to work in. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando seconded.

Dr. S. D. Fernando stated that Dispensary Medical Officers were not field officers.

Dr. V. R. Schokman explained the reasons that prompted him to vote for the recommendation of the Sanitation Committee.

Mr. M. T. Akbar suggested that sufficient notice should be given to the officers concerned to comply with the requirements of this resolution.

Mr. S. Saravanamuttu while agreeing to the suggestion of Mr. M. T. Akbar hoped that such notice would not be unreasonably long.

The motion, subject to the suggestion of Mr. M. T. Akbar, was put to the meeting as follows and carried.—"That part (1) of the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted and as regards part (2) the following be adopted :—All Dispensary Medical Officers should reside in the respective wards they are expected to work in and that sufficient notice be given to the officers concerned to comply with the requirements of this resolution."

(55) To consider :—(a) Letter No. Y 4,661, dated September 29, 1937, from the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services regarding Anti-Tuberculosis Work. (b) A report thereon of the Acting Chief Medical Officer of Health. (c) Memoranda of the Commissioner and the Mayor. Registered No. 1,408.—Recommended that Government be informed that the suggestion of the Ministry is contrary to the principle accepted by the Government and the Council and that Government must provide the treatment of segregated patients.

Veterinary Department.

(56) To consider the draft regulations to give effect to the recommendations of the Milk Committee for the establishment of a Central Depot for the quarantine of milch cattle brought into Colombo. Registered No. 1,105.—Recommended for immediate adoption the registration and licensing of all cattle kept within the City on payment of Re. 1 per head of cattle exclusive of calves under 1 year of age.—Recommended that the draft regulations, *vide* annexure "B" be adopted.

Resolution of Council in Committee.

Dr. E. A. Coorey moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted but that the registration of cattle kept within the City be done free of charge. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

The Mayor explained that the proposal of the Committee was the first step in a scheme towards the supply of pure milk and he hoped cheaper milk.

Dr. (Mrs.) M. H. Rutnam supported the recommendation of the Standing Committee.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

Dr. E. A. Coorey called for a division and the Council divided as follows:—

Registered No. 1,311.—Recommended that the recommendation of the Traffic Advisory Special Committee of October 21, 1937, be adopted, viz. :—That the Hon. the Minister of Local Administration be requested to make provision in the Motor Car Ordinance empowering the Local Authority to issue permits to allow light vans to run on roads prohibited for motor lorry traffic. It was decided that permits for a year be issued by the Commissioner and temporary permits be issued by the Superintendent of Police, Colombo.

The following Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee regarding Housing and Town Improvements of October 29, 1937, were considered.

(4) To consider :—(a) A memorandum of the Municipal Engineer dated July 15, 1937, submitting for consideration Plan No. 3,383 and detailed estimate for Rs. 37,835 being the cost of lighting, sewerage, channelling with culvert and step entrances, metalling, and bitumen painting to a width of 22 feet Forty-third lane, Wellawatta, and requesting that (1) Council resolves that Forty-third lane, Wellawatta, not being a public street is not constructed or maintained to its satisfaction, and (2) that the following notice showing apportionment be gazetted and served on frontaging owners for objections to the proposal to be duly heard :—“ That the Council through the Commissioner serve notices under section 25 (2) of Ordinance 19 of 1915, proposing a scheme of lighting, sewerage, channelling, metalling, and bitumen painting Forty-third lane, Wellawatta, at an approximate cost of Rs. 37,835, the plan and the particulars of the said works, together with a provisional apportionment of the cost thereof to be available for inspection at the Office of the Municipal Engineer at the Town Hall in order to afford an opportunity for the hearing by the Commissioner, for submission to the Council of objections to the proposed work or apportionment, provided that such objection is received by the Commissioner within 14 days of the service of such notices ”. (b) A report of the Acting Municipal Treasurer recommending that the option for repayment may be spread over a period not exceeding 10 years. Registered No. 1,010.—Recommended, and that the Council contribute 10 per cent. of the cost of construction.

(5) To consider :—(a) An application for a private street 263 feet long and 30 feet wide at premises No. 33, Kuruppu road. (b) A memorandum of the Municipal Engineer, dated August 18, 1937, stating that this street be declared as a minor street as provided for under rule 8 (2) of the schedule to Ordinance No. 19 of 1915, and requesting that the following resolution be adopted by Council :—“ To declare as a minor street, under rule 8 (2) of the schedule to Ordinance No. 19 of 1915, the proposed street 263 feet long and 30 feet wide at premises No. 33, Kuruppu road, as shown on Plan No. 938, signed by Mr. Leo P. Fernando (for Dr. E. A. Fernando), Mr. Edwin S. Dissanayake (for Mrs. E. S. Dissanayake), Mr. N. R. T. Allegacone (for Mrs. Allegacone), and Mr. V. Nagendra ”. Registered No. 1,160.—Recommended.

(7) To consider :—(a) A memorandum of the Municipal Engineer, dated September 3, 1937, submitting for consideration Plan No. 3,308A and detailed estimate for Rs. 15,732 being the cost of lighting, channelling, metalling, and bitumen painting to a width of 20 ft. Kinross avenue, Bambalapitiya, and requesting that (1) Council resolves that Kinross avenue, Bambalapitiya, not being a public street is not constructed or maintained to its satisfaction, (2) that the following notice showing apportionment be gazetted and served on frontaging owners for objections to the proposal to be duly heard :—“ That the Council through the Commissioner serve notices under section 25 (2) of Ordinance 19 of 1915 proposing a scheme of lighting, channelling, metalling, and bitumen painting, Kinross avenue, Bambalapitiya, at an approximate cost of Rs. 15,732 ; the plan and the particulars of the said works, together with a provisional apportionment of the cost thereof to be available for inspection at the Office of the Municipal Engineer at the Town Hall in order to afford an opportunity for the hearing by the Commissioner, for submission to the Council, of objections to the proposed work or apportionment, provided that such objection is received by the Commissioner within 14 days of the service of such notices.” (b) A report of the Acting Municipal Treasurer recommending that the option for repayment may be spread over a period not exceeding 10 years. Registered No. 1,315.—Recommended, and that the Council contribute 10 per cent. of the cost of construction.

(9) To sanction the laying down of street lines under section 18 (4) of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915 at No. 107, Molawatta road, marked G-H on Plan No. 1,803 of April 12, 1932, signed by Mr. H. Wijenathen, Municipal Engineer. Registered No. 1,323.—Recommended.

(12) To consider :—(a) A memorandum of the Municipal Engineer dated September 28, 1937, stating that Council on September 7, 1937, sanctioned street lines 30 feet for the west section of Manning place and declared it a minor street, and recommending that a slight amendment to these street lines be now sanctioned as shown in Plan No. 889 of July 21, 1937, submitted for reasons given by him. (b) A report of the Commissioner. Registered No. 1,394.—Recommended.

(15) To consider a memorandum of the Municipal Engineer dated October 21, 1937, regarding street lines through premises No. 206, Maligawatta road, suggesting the following resolution for sanction of Council :—“ To sanction the laying down of street lines under section 18 (4) of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915 for the road running through premises No. 206, Maligawatta connecting old and new Maligawatta roads for the lengths A-B and C-D only as depicted on Plan No. 3,600 dated October 2, 1937, signed by Mr. Stanley Fernando, Chief Assistant Municipal Engineer. Registered No. 1,548.—Recommended.

MUNICIPAL ASSESSOR'S DEPARTMENT.

(16) To consider a report of the Municipal Assessor dated September 23, 1937, recommending that the new roadway off Cotta road as shown in the sketch submitted by him be named “ Rodney place ”. Registered No. 1,385.—Recommended that the new road be named “ Rodney place ”.

(17) To consider a memorandum of the Municipal Assessor, dated October 19, 1937, recommending that the new road at premises No. 538, Kollupitiya road, be named Rheinland place or avenue for reasons given by him. Sanction of Council is necessary. Registered No. 1,541.—Recommended that the new road be named “ Rheinland place ”.

General.

(19) To consider a letter dated September 14, 1937, from Col. T. G. Jayewardene, V.D., J.P., requesting that the playground at Skinner's road south be named “ Jayewardene Playground ”. Registered No. 1,322. Recommended that this playground be named “ Jayewardene Playground ”.

ANNEXURE "A."

BY-LAWS.

1. In these by-laws unless the context otherwise requires—

"Commissioner" means the Municipal Commissioner appointed under the Colombo Municipal Council (Constitution) Ordinance, No. 60 of 1935, and "licensed premises" means the premises in which the holder of a licence under these by-laws is authorized to keep or rear swine.

2. No person shall keep or rear swine within the limits of the Municipality of Colombo unless he is the holder of an annual licence in that behalf issued by the Commissioner.

3. Every licence under these by-laws shall, unless earlier cancelled as hereinafter provided, remain in force until the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

4. For each licence under these by-laws a fee shall be payable at the rate of Re. 1 for each unit of twelve square feet of the floor area of the sty or sties intended to be used under the authority of the licence, any area less than that unit being reckoned as a unit for this purpose.

5. No licence issued under these by-laws shall be transferable.

6. No licence shall be issued in respect of any premises unless such premises and the sty or each of the sties to be used therein are in conformity with the following conditions :—

(a) That the site is approved by the Commissioner;

(b) That a proper and adequate water supply is provided;

(c) That adequate provision is made for draining the premises;

(d) That the sty or each of the sties has a floor of cement or other impervious material and is surrounded by a wall at least three feet in height and cement-plastered;

(e) That the sty or each of the sties is situated at least fifty feet away from any dwelling-house or street;

(f) That a fly-proof bin is provided for the depositing of dung, filth or other offensive or noxious matter resulting from the keeping of swine upon the premises;

(g) That adjoining the sty or sties there is a compound enclosed in a manner capable of preventing swine straying from such compound.

7. It shall be lawful for the Commissioner, or for any officer of the Council generally or specially authorized in writing thereto by the Commissioner, at all reasonable times between sunrise and sunset to enter upon and inspect any licensed premises.

8. In the event of the licensed premises ceasing to be in conformity with the conditions laid down for the issue of the licence in by-law 6, the Commissioner may, by written notice served on the licensee, require him to take such measures as may be specified in the notice in order to bring the premises into conformity with those conditions.

9. Where, for any reason, personal service of any notice under by-law 8 cannot be effected upon a licensee, the notice shall be deemed to be duly served on him if it is left at his last known place of residence or is affixed to some conspicuous object or in a conspicuous position upon the licensed premises.

10. The licensee shall comply with the requirements of any notice served on him, within such time as may be stated in the notice, and if no such time is stated, within seven days from the service of the notice.

11. Every licensee shall keep the licensed premises in a clean and sanitary condition.

12. Every licensee shall report forthwith to the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon any disease or death among the swine kept on the licensed premises.

13. In the event of any swine dying of disease upon the licensed premises, the licensee shall not bury or otherwise dispose of the carcass of such swine without the prior sanction of the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon.

14. It shall be lawful for any person, authorized by the Commissioner in writing, to seize or cause to be seized any swine found straying outside the licensed premises of the owner of such swine.

15. Every contravention of any of these by-laws shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 25, and in the case of a continuing offence with an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 5 for every day during which the offence is continued after conviction, or after written notice of such contravention.

16. On a second or subsequent conviction of a licensee by court of any contravention of any of these by-laws, the licence held by him shall be liable to cancellation by such court without prejudice to any other punishment that may lawfully be imposed in respect of such contravention.

ANNEXURE "B."

COLOMBO MILK SUPPLY.

Regulations made under section 9 (14) and (20) of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Ordinance, No. 25 of 1909, for the area comprised within the Municipal Limits of the City of Colombo.

1. A central depot shall be established at the Cattle Mart, Dematagoda, for the quarantine of all milch cattle arriving in or passing through Colombo.

2. It shall be the duty of all owners of milch cattle and persons in charge of milch cattle which are brought to or pass through Colombo to produce them at the Central Depot within three hours of their arrival in Colombo and such cattle shall be detained there for quarantine and examination for diseases for a period of three days in the first instance or for such further period as the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon may direct.

3. No milch cattle arriving in Colombo shall be taken to any dairy, cattle shed, or private premises without a certificate from the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon on a form approved by the Municipal Council.

4. It shall be an offence for any reason to keep in his premises without the authority required under Regulation 3 any milch cattle newly arriving in Colombo.

5. Milch cattle undergoing quarantine shall be milked under the supervision of any Municipal Officer authorized thereto generally or specially by the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon.

6. No person other than a dairyman or a milk vendor registered under Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, or in the case of privately owned cattle persons so authorized by the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon, shall remove milk from the Depot.

7. (a) No person shall engage in the milking of milch cattle or the handling of milk unless his person and clothing are clean.

(b) Milking of cattle shall be undertaken at such hours as may be fixed by the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon.

8. All lawful orders of the Superintendent of the Central Depot shall be obeyed by every owner of cattle or his accredited agent.

9. Any person committing a breach of these regulations shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 for each offence.

10. All milch cattle when under quarantine shall be fed at the expense of the owners.

The following fees will be charged for the housing of cattle at the Central Depot during the period of quarantine :—

RULE made by the Trincomalee Urban District Council, under section 60 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, and approved by the Local Government Board.

Rule.

The rules under section 60 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, published in *Gazette* No. 8,181 of December 13, 1935, are hereby amended as follows :—

(1) by the addition, immediately after rule 1 thereof, of the following new rule 1A :—

“ 1A. (1) No lunch, dinner, or garden party or other reception organized by, or on behalf of, any person or persons shall be held in the resthouse, except with the written permission of the Chairman of the Urban District Council.

(2) The Chairman may allow any person the use of the whole or any part of the resthouse for any of the purposes mentioned in paragraph (1), on payment of a fee for occupation calculated at the rate specified in the tariff appended hereto, and on such conditions as the Chairman may in his discretion determine.”

(2) by the substitution, for the tariff appended thereto, of the following new tariff :—

“ *Tariff.*

Fees Payable to the Urban District Council.

(1) OCCUPATION.

For each person occupying any portion of the resthouse, a consolidated fee of 10 cents for each complete period not exceeding one hour, subject to a minimum of 25 cents when any meal other than afternoon tea is taken, and to a maximum of Rs. 2 for any continuous period not exceeding 24 hours.

(This fee includes the use of towels, linen, beds, mosquito curtains, &c.)

For the use of the resthouse or any part thereof for any lunch, dinner, or garden party or other reception—

for any period not exceeding six hours ..	10 0

(2) GARAGE AND STABLING.
