East: From the last-mentioned point and along the eastern boundary of lot R 129 in preliminary plan No. 483, western edge of the Goda-ela, western boundary of lot N 128, northern boundary of M 128; northern and western boundaries of L 128, western boundaries of K 128, D 128, northern boundary of C 128, eastern boundary of B 127, northern and eastern boundaries of C 127, northern boundary of T 127, northern and eastern boundaries of U 127, eastern boundaries of W 127 and R 127, southern and western boundaries of Q 127, western boundaries of S 127 and T 127, southern boundary of C 127, eastern and northern boundaries of D 127, eastern, northern, and western boundaries of Y 126, western boundaries of D 127 and E 127, western and southern boundaries of I 127 in preliminary plan No. 483; and thence along the Hin-ela as far as the south-western corner of lot N 127 in preliminary plan No. 483; from this corner a line drawn south-westward to the north-eastern corner of title plan No. 74,983, thence a line drawn north-eastward to the north-western corner of title plan No. 264,063, along the northern boundary of this title plan eastward to the Madampe lake, thence along the edge of the Madampe lake southwards to a point 12 chains south of the landmark at the south-eastern corner of title plan No. 276,529.

C. de Silva and others to the landmark on the northern boundary of Bogahawatta claimed by U. P. Rairo Nona, thence north-eastwards along the boundary defined by banks and landmarks to the eastern boundary of Maha-Ambalangoda road; thence north-eastwards along the eastern boundary of the said road to its junction with Paniyanuduwa lane; thence north-westwards along the northern boundary of Paniyanuduwa lane, thence north-eastwards along the eastern boundary of Manana claimed by M. C. de Silva and the southern boundary of Addarawela claimed by B. Panis to the landmark on the north-western corner of Elamoderaobadaowitawela *alias* Mahadimanawela (lot I in P. P. A 45), thence southwards along the western boundary of the said lot to the landmark on its south-western corner thence southwards in a straight line to the point where the Bogahakumbure ela falls into the Madampe lake, thence southwards along the bank of the said lake to the western side of the wooden bridge on the road to Delduwa.

Southern Boundary: From the last-mentioned point westwards along the bank of the Madampe lake, to a point on the foreshore called Uswellewatta.

Western Boundary: From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the foreshore to the point on the foreshore called Galketiyewatta heretofore described as the starting point of the northern boundary.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

REDEFINED ELECTORAL DIVISIONS.

Division No. I. (Patabendimulla).

North : From the western extremity of the northern limit of the Urban District Council eastwards along the said limit to the centre of the Main street.

East : From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the centre of the Main street to a point where it meets the prolongation eastwards of the northern boundary of the market premises.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards in a straight line to meet the northern boundary of the market premises, thence along the said boundary of the market premises and in a straight line to meet the western limit of the Urban District Council.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Urban District Council up to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. II. (Patabendimulla).

North : From the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Division No. I. eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban District Council to the point at which it meets the western limit of Kaluwadumulla village.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the western limits of Kaluwadumulla and Poramba villages to the point where it meets the northern limit of Wiligoda village.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards along the northern limit of Wiligoda village until it meets the centre of the main track of the Colombo-Galle railway line, thence northwards along the centre of the said railway line to a point where it meets the prolongation eastwards of the centre of Wickramasuriya road or 3rd Cross road, thence westwards along the centre of Wickramasuriya road or 3rd Cross road until it meets the eastern limit of Division No. I.

West : From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the eastern limit of Division No. I. to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. III. (Kaluwadumulla-Poramba).

North : From the south-western corner of Mahaliyaddo claimed by R. de Silva eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban District Council as far as the landmark on the eastern boundary of Udumullekumbura claimed by K. T. E. Silva, thence eastwards along the village limit of Polwatta to a distance of 3 chains thereof.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the western limit of Polwatta village until it meets the eastern limit of the Urban District Council, thence southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban District Council until it meets the northern limit of Wiligoda village.

South : From the last-mentioned point south-westwards and north-westwards along the northern limit of Wiligoda village until it meets the eastern limit of Division No. II.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. II. to the northern limit of the Urban District Council, thence northwards along the northern limit of the Urban District Council to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. IV. (Polwatta-Paniyana).

North : From a point on the north-western corner of the Segregation Camp, eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban District Council up to its eastern extremity.

East and south : From the last-mentioned point southwards and north-westwards along the eastern limit of the Urban District Council to the point where it meets the eastern limit of Division No. III.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards and westwards along the eastern limit of Division No. III., until it meets the northern limit of the Urban District Council, thence northwards along the northern limit of the Urban District Council up to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. V. (Central).

North : From the western extremity of the southern limit of Division No. II. eastwards along the said limit as far as the centre of the main track of the Colombo-Galle railway line.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the centre of the main track of the Colombo-Galle railway line until it meets the centre of the 5th Cross road.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre of 5th Cross road as far as the centre of the junction of the said road with the Main street, thence southwards along the centre of the Main street as far as the point at which it meets the centre of the Resthouse approach road, thence westwards along the centre of the said road until it meets the eastern boundary of the Resthouse premises, thence southwards and westwards along the eastern and southern boundaries of the Resthouse premises to its western extremity, thence westwards in a straight line to meet the western limit of the Urban District Council.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Urban District Council until it meets the southern limit of Division No. I., thence eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. I. until it meets the eastern limit of the said division, thence northwards along the eastern limit of the said division to the starting point of the northern limit of Division No. V.

Division No. VI. (Wiligoda).

North : From the railway culvert at 52 miles 61 chains eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. II. until it meets the southern limit of Division No. III., thence south-eastwards and north-eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. III. until it meets the eastern limit of the Urban District Council.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban District Council to the point at which it meets the northern limit of Maha Ambalangoda village.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards along the northern limits of Maha Ambalangoda and Nambimulla villages until it meets southern extremity of the eastern limit of Division No. V.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. V. to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. VII. (Nambimulla).

North : From the western limit of the Urban District Council eastwards along the southern limits of Divisions Nos. V. and VI. to the point where it meets the western limit of Maha Ambalangoda village.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the western limit of Maha Ambalangoda village until it meets the southern limit of the Urban District Council.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards along the southern limit of the Urban District Council to its western extremity.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Urban District Council to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Division No. VIII. (Maha Ambalangoda).

North : From the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Division No. VII. eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. VI. until it meets the eastern limit of the Urban District Council, thence southwards and north-eastwards along the said limit of the Urban District Council as far as the northern boundary of the road from Maha Ambalangoda to Godahona.

East : From the last-mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban District Council to its southern extremity.

South : From the last-mentioned point westwards along the southern limit of the Urban District Council until it meets the eastern limit of Division No. VII.

West : From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. VII. to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Text.

CONVENTION BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY IN RESPECT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM AND THE REGENT OF THE KINGDOM OF HUNGARY REGARDING LEGAL PROCEEDINGS IN CIVIL AND COMMERCIAL MATTERS (WITH A NOTE).

Budapest, September 25, 1935.

[Ratifications exchanged at London on May 7, 1936.]

CONVENTION.

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Serene Highness the Regent of the Kingdom of Hungary: being desirous to render mutual assistance in the conduct of legal proceedings in civil and commercial matters, which are being dealt with or which it is anticipated may be dealt with by their respective judicial authorities; have resolved to conclude a Convention for this purpose and have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India:
For Great Britain and Northern Ireland:

The Honourable Sir Patrick William Maule Ramsay,
K.C.M.G., His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and
Minister Plenipotentiary at Budapest;

His Serene Highness the Regent of the Kingdom of Hungary:

M. Kálmán Kánya, de Royal Hungarian Minister for
Foreign Affairs;

Who having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed as follows:—

I.—Preliminary.

ARTICLE 1.

(a) This Convention applies only to civil and commercial matters, including non-contentious matters.

(b) In this Convention the words:

(1) "territory of one (or of the other) High Contracting Party" shall be interpreted (a) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, as meaning England and Wales and all territories in respect of which the Convention is in force by reason of extensions under Article 17 or accessions under Article 18; and (b) in relation to His Serene Highness the Regent of the Kingdom of Hungary, Hungary;

(2) "persons" shall be deemed to mean individuals and artificial persons;

(3) "artificial persons" shall be deemed to include partnerships, companies, societies and other corporations;

(4) "subjects or citizens of a High Contracting Party" shall be deemed to include artificial persons constituted or incorporated under the laws of the territory of such High Contracting Party;

(5) "subjects or citizens of one (or of the other) High Contracting Party" shall be deemed (a) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, to mean all subjects of His Majesty wherever domiciled, and all persons under His protection; and (b) in relation to His Serene Highness the Regent of the Kingdom of Hungary, all Hungarian citizens.

Legal Protection and Access to the Courts of Justice.

The subjects or citizens of one High Contracting Party shall enjoy in the territory of the other the same rights in respect of the legal protection of person or property and shall have free access to the courts of justice for the prosecution or defence of the rights under the same conditions (including taxes and fees payable) as subjects or citizens of the latter High Contracting Party.

II.—Service of Judicial and Extra-Judicial Documents.

ARTICLE 3.

(a) When judicial or extra-judicial documents drawn up in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties are required by a judicial authority situated therein to be served on persons in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such documents may be served on the recipient, by any of the methods provided in Articles 4 or 5 in cases where these articles are applicable.

(b) In Part II of this Convention the expression "country of origin" means the country from which the documents to be served emanate, and the expression "country of execution" means the country in which service of documents is to be effected.

ARTICLE 4.

(a) A request for service shall be addressed and sent by a Diplomatic or Consular Officer acting for the country of origin to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting such authority to cause the document in question to be served.

(b) The request for service shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution and shall state the names and descriptions of the parties, the name, description and address of the recipient and the nature of the document to be served, and shall enclose the document to be served together with a copy thereof.

(c) The document to be served shall either be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language unless the competent authority of the country of execution declares that a translation is unnecessary. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Diplomatic or Consular Officer acting for the country of origin or by an official or sworn translator of the country of execution or the country of origin.

(d) Requests for service shall be addressed and sent—

In England to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

In Hungary to the Royal Hungarian Ministry of Justice.

If the authority to whom a request for service has been sent is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(e) Service shall be effected by the competent authority of the country of execution, who shall serve the document in the manner prescribed by the municipal law of such country for the service of similar documents, except that, if a wish for some special manner of service is expressed in the request for service, such manner of service shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of that country; provided that, if the competent authority of the country of execution has declared the translation to be unnecessary and no translation is sent, such authority may limit his action to effecting service by the transmission of the document to the recipient if he is willing to accept it.

(f) The execution of a request for service, duly made in accordance with the preceding provisions of this Article, shall not be refused unless (1) the authenticity of the request for service is not established, or (2) the High Contracting Party in whose territory it is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a request for service is not executed by the authority to whom it has been sent, the latter will at once inform the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom the request was sent, stating the ground on which the execution of the request has been refused or the competent authority to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) The authority by whom the request for service is executed shall furnish a certificate proving the service or explaining the reason which has prevented such service, and setting forth the fact, the manner and the date of such service or attempted service, and shall send the said certificate to the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom

the request for service was sent. The certificate of service or of attempted service shall be placed on the copy or attached thereto.

ARTICLE 5.

(a) This article does not apply to the service of documents on persons who are subjects or citizens of the High Contracting Party in whose territory the service is to be effected.

(b) Service may be effected, without any request to or intervention of the authorities of the country of execution, by any of the following methods:—

- (1) By a Diplomatic or Consular Officer acting for the country of origin;
- (2) Through the post.

(c) It is understood that the question of the validity of any service effected by the use of any of the methods referred to in paragraph (b) of this Article will remain a matter for the free determination of the respective courts of the High Contracting Parties in accordance with their laws.

ARTICLE 6.

(a) In any case where documents have been served in accordance with the provisions of Article 4, the High Contracting Party, by whose Diplomatic or Consular Officer the request for service was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any charges and expenses which are payable under the law of the country of execution to the persons employed to effect service, and any charges and expenses incurred in effecting service in a special manner. These charges and expenses shall not exceed such as are usually allowed in the courts of that country.

(b) Repayment of these charges and expenses shall be claimed by the competent authority by whom the service has been effected from the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom the request was addressed, when sending to him the certificate provided for in Article 4 (h).

(c) Except as provided above, no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the service of any documents.

III.—Taking of Evidence.

ARTICLE 7.

(a) When a judicial authority in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties requires that evidence should be taken in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such evidence may be taken, in any one of the ways prescribed in Articles 8 or 9, in cases where these articles are applicable.

(b) In Part III of this Convention, the expressions—

(1) "taking of evidence" shall be deemed to include the taking of the statements of a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person on oath or otherwise; the submission to a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person of any oath with regard to any legal proceedings; and the production, identification and examination of documents, samples or other objects;

(2) "witness" shall be deemed to include any person from whom any evidence, as defined above, is required to be taken;

(3) "country of origin" shall be deemed to mean the country by whose judicial authority the evidence is required, and "country of execution" the country in which the evidence is to be taken.

ARTICLE 8.

(a) The judicial authority of the country of origin may, in accordance with the provisions of the law of his country, address himself by means of a Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting such authority to take the evidence.

(b) The Letter of Request shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Diplomatic or Consular Officer acting for the country of origin or by an official or sworn translator of the country of execution or of the country of origin. The Letter of Request shall state the nature of the proceedings for which the evidence is required, giving all necessary information in regard thereto, the names of the parties thereto, and the names, descriptions and addresses of the witnesses. They shall also either

(1) be accompanied by a list of interrogatories to be put to the witness or witnesses, or, as the case may be, by a description of the documents, samples or other objects to be produced, identified or examined, and a translation thereof, certified as correct in the manner heretofore provided; or (2) shall request the competent authority to allow such questions to be asked *in situ* as the parties or their representatives shall desire to ask.

(c) Letters of Request shall be transmitted—

In England by a Hungarian Diplomatic or Consular Officer to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

In Hungary by a British Diplomatic or Consular Officer to the Royal Hungarian Ministry of Justice.

In case the authority to whom any Letter of Request is transmitted is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(d) The competent authority of the country of execution shall give effect to the Letter of Request and obtain the evidence required by the use of the same compulsory measures and the same procedure as are employed in the execution of a commission or order emanating from the authorities of his own country, except that if a wish that some special procedure should be followed is expressed in the Letter of Request, such special procedure shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of the country of execution.

(e) The Diplomatic or Consular Officer, by whom the Letter of Request is transmitted, shall, if he so desires, be informed of the date when and the place where the proceedings will take place, in order that he may inform the interested party or parties, who shall be permitted to be present in person or to be represented, if they so desire, by any legal representatives who are competent to appear before the courts of the country of execution.

(f) The execution of a Letter of Request which complies with the preceding provisions of this Article can only be refused—

(1) If the authenticity of the Letter of Request is not established;

(2) If, in the country of execution, the execution of the Letter of Request in question does not fall within the functions of the judiciary;

(3) If the High Contracting Party in whose territory it is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a Letter of Request is not executed by the authority to whom it is addressed, the latter will at once inform the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted, stating the grounds on which the execution of the Letter of Request has been refused, or the competent authority to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) When a Letter of Request has been executed, the competent authority to whom it was transmitted or forwarded shall send to the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted the necessary documents establishing its execution.

ARTICLE 9.

(a) The evidence may also be taken, without any request to or the intervention of the authorities of the country of execution by a Diplomatic or Consular Officer acting for the country of origin.

(b) The Diplomatic or Consular Officer may request the individuals named by the court of the country of origin to appear before him and to give evidence. He may take all kinds of evidence which are not contrary to the law of the country of execution. The attendance and giving of evidence before such officer shall be entirely voluntary and no measures of compulsion shall be employed.

(c) The evidence may be taken in accordance with the procedure recognised by the law of the country of origin, and the parties will have the right to be present in person or to be represented by any legal representatives who are competent to appear before the courts either of the country of origin or of the country of execution.

(d)* Unless and until a notification is given through the Diplomatic channel by the Hungarian Government, the provisions of this article will not apply to the taking of evidence from persons who are subjects or citizens of the High Contracting Party in whose territory the evidence is to be taken.

ARTICLE 10.

The fact that an attempt to take evidence by the method laid down in Article 9 has failed owing to the refusal of any witness to appear or to give evidence does not preclude a request being subsequently made in accordance with Article 8.

ARTICLE 11.

(a) Where evidence is taken in the manner provided in Article 8 the High Contracting Party, by whose judicial authority the Letter of Request was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any expenses incurred by the competent authority of the latter in the execution of the request in respect of any charges and expenses payable to witnesses, experts, interpreters, or translators, the costs of obtaining the attendance of witnesses who have not appeared voluntarily, and the charges and expenses payable to any person whom such authority may have deputed to act, in cases where the law of the country of execution permits this to be done, and any charges and expenses incurred by reason of a special procedure being requested and followed. These expenses shall be such as are usually allowed in similar cases in the courts of the country of execution.

(b) The repayment of these expenses shall be claimed by the competent authority by whom the Letter of Request has been executed from the Diplomatic or Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted when sending to him the documents establishing its execution as provided in Article 8 (h).

(c) Except as above provided no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the taking of evidence.

IV.—*Judicial Assistance for Poor Persons, Security for Costs and Imprisonment for Debt.*

ARTICLE 12.

(a) The subjects or citizens of one High Contracting Party, resident in the territory of the other High Contracting Party where the proceedings are brought, shall not be compelled to give security for costs or court fees in any case where a subject or citizen of such other High Contracting Party would not be so compelled.

(b) The subjects or citizens of one High Contracting Party, resident outside the territory of the other where the proceedings are brought, shall not be obliged to give security for costs or court fees in any case where they possess in that territory immovable property, or other property of such a nature as not to be readily transferable, sufficient to cover the said costs or fees. It is understood that the expressions "immovable property" and "property not readily transferable" must be interpreted by the respective courts of the High Contracting Parties in accordance with their own laws.

ARTICLE 13.

The subjects or citizens of one High Contracting Party shall enjoy in the territory of the other High Contracting Party a perfect equality of treatment with subjects or citizens of the latter High Contracting Party as regards free legal assistance for poor persons.

ARTICLE 14.

The subjects or citizens of one High Contracting Party shall not, in the territory of the other, be liable to imprisonment as a means of execution for debt or as a conservatory measure, in any case where the subjects or citizens of the latter High Contracting Party would not be so liable.

V.—*General Provisions.*

ARTICLE 15.

Any difficulties which may arise in connexion with the operation of this Convention shall be settled through the diplomatic channel.

ARTICLE 16.

The present Convention, of which the English and Hungarian texts are equally authentic, shall be subject to ratification. Ratifications shall be exchanged in London. The Convention shall come into force one month after the date on which ratifications are exchanged and shall remain in force for three years after the date of its coming into force. If neither of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice through the diplomatic channel to the other not less than six months before the expiration of the said period of three years of his intention to terminate the Convention, it shall remain in force until the expiration of six months from the day on which either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to terminate it.

ARTICLE 17.

(a) This Convention shall not apply *ipso facto* to Scotland, Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, nor to any of the Colonies, overseas territories or Protectorates of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas; Emperor of India, nor to any territories under His suzerainty, nor to any mandated territories in respect of which the mandate is exercised by His Government in the United Kingdom, but His Majesty may at any time, while this Convention is in force, under Article 16 by a notification given through His Minister at Budapest, extend the operation of the Convention to any of the above-mentioned territories.

(b) Such notification shall state the authorities in the territory concerned to whom requests for service under Article 4 or Letters of Request under Article 8 are to be transmitted, and the language in which communications and translations are to be made. The date of the coming into force of any such extension shall be one month from the date of such notification.

(c) Either of the High Contracting Parties may, at any time after the expiry of three years from the coming into force of an extension of this Convention to any of the territories referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article, terminate such extension on giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel.

(d) The termination of the Convention under Article 16 shall, unless otherwise expressly agreed to by both High Contracting Parties, *ipso facto* terminate it in respect of any territories to which it has been extended under paragraph (a) of this Article.

ARTICLE 18.

(a) The High Contracting Parties agree that His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, may at any time, while this Convention is in force, either under Article 16 or by virtue of any accession under this Article, by a notification given through the diplomatic channel, accede to this Convention in respect of any other Member of the British Commonwealth of Nations whose Government may desire that such accession should be effected, provided that no notification of accession may be given at any time when His Serene Highness the Regent of the Kingdom of Hungary has given notice of termination in respect of all the territories of His Majesty to which the Convention applies. The provisions of Article 17 (b) shall be applicable to such notification. Any such accession shall take effect one month after the date of its notification.

(b) After the expiry of three years from the date of the coming into force of any accession under paragraph (a) of this Article, either of the High Contracting Parties may, by giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel, terminate the application of the Convention to any country in respect of which a notification of accession has been given. The termination of the Convention under Article 16 shall not affect its application to any such country.

(c) Any notification of accession under paragraph (a) of this Article may include any dependency or mandated territory administered by the Government of the country in respect of which such notification of accession is given; and any notice of termination in respect of any such country under paragraph (b) shall apply to any dependency or mandated territory which was included in the notification of accession in respect of that country.

WITH reference to Article 9 (d) of the Civil Procedure Convention signed to-day, His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom recognise that the question of the giving of the notification, provided for in that paragraph, is a matter entirely within the discretion of the Hungarian Government, and that no assurance has been given that it will be possible for them to give this notification.

WHEREAS by the Colonial Naval Defence Act, 1931 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that the legislature of any colony may, with the approval of His Majesty in Council, make provision for maintaining and using vessels of war; and that where the legislature of any colony has made provision for raising a force for the naval defence of the colony within its territorial waters, that legislature may, with the approval of His Majesty in Council, further make such provision regarding the discipline and service of officers and men of that force as is set out in the Act:

And whereas by the Act it is further provided that His Majesty in Council may, on such conditions as he thinks fit, authorise the Admiralty to accept any offer made by the Government of a colony to place at His Majesty's disposal for general service in the Royal Navy, vessels of war maintained, or officers or men of such force as aforesaid raised by the colony:

And whereas by the Naval Volunteer Ordinance, No. 1 of 1937, of the Legislature of the Colony of Ceylon (hereinafter referred to as "the Legislature") provision has been made for raising a force for the Naval Defence of the Island of Ceylon called the Ceylon Naval Volunteer Force (hereinafter referred to as "the Force"):

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the above recited provisions, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Ceylon Naval Defence Order, 1937."

2. Approval is hereby given to the exercise by the Legislature of the power contained in Section 1 of the Act, to make provision at the expense of the Colony for maintaining and using vessels of war:

3. The Admiralty is hereby authorised to accept any offer made by the Government of Ceylon to place at His Majesty's disposal for general service in the Royal Navy any vessel of war so maintained, provided that, as regards any such vessel maintained by the Colony in conjunction with any other colony a like offer is made by such last mentioned colony.

4. Approval is hereby given to the exercise by the Legislature of the powers contained in Subsection (1) of Section 2 of the Act namely, to provide that officers and men of the Force—

- (a) shall, whether serving ashore or afloat or within or without the limits of Ceylon, be subject to all the enactments and regulations for the time being in force for the enforcement of discipline in the Royal Navy, with such modifications and adaptations as may be made by the Legislature to adapt those enactments and regulations to the circumstances of Ceylon;
- (b) shall be liable to service and training in any ship, establishment or other place without the limits of Ceylon, whether belonging to Ceylon or not;
- (c) shall, in the case of officers or men entered on the express terms of accepting general service in the Royal Navy in emergency, form part of the Royal Naval Reserve or of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, or that some shall form part of the Royal Naval Reserve and others of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve.

5. The Admiralty is hereby authorised to accept any offer made by the Government of Ceylon to place at His Majesty's disposal for general service in the Royal Navy any officers and men of the Force.

ORDINANCE, 1909.

REGULATIONS.

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Regulations, 1937.

2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

- “Collector of Customs” has the same meaning as in Ordinance No. 17 of 1869 ;
 “Government Veterinary Officer” means the Government Veterinary Surgeon or an Assistant Veterinary Officer of the Department of Agriculture ;
 “infected area” means an area which is for the time being an infected area within the meaning of section 5 of the Ordinance ;
 “protective zone” means a zone of country which is for the time being a protective zone within the meaning of section 6 of the Ordinance.

PART II.

PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF DISEASE.

3. (a) The owner or person in charge of any animal or head of cattle which has died in an infected area shall forthwith cause every part of the carcase of such animal or head of cattle to be burned :

Provided, however, that the holder of a permit in that behalf under the hand of the Government Agent may, subject to such conditions as may be set out in such permit, preserve the hide, horns, hoofs, or bones of any animal or head of cattle which has been slaughtered in any such area for human consumption.

(b) The Government Agent may cause any carcase which has not been burned in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (a) to be destroyed, and the cost of such destruction shall be recoverable from the owner of the animal or head of cattle.

(c) Every person who finds the carcase of any animal or head of cattle lying dead and unburied in an infected area, shall inform the nearest headman or police officer, who shall forthwith cause the carcase to be burned.

4. The owner or person in charge of any animal or head of cattle which dies of disease shall, within a period of six hours after the time of the death, cause every part of the carcase of such animal or head of cattle to be—

- (i.) burned ; or
 (ii.) buried in a grave dug to a depth of not less than six feet.

5. The owner or occupier of every land on which disease exists, or the owner or person in charge of any diseased animal or head of cattle kept on any such land, shall cause the fresh dung and other excreta of, and the litter used for, every such animal or head of cattle to be burned.

6. Every person who buries or assists in the burial of the carcase of any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle or who is employed in tending any such animal or head of cattle shall bathe his body and cause his clothes to be boiled in water or to be otherwise disinfected, before he approaches any healthy animal or head of cattle.

7. No person shall expose any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle—

- (a) for sale in any private place ; or
 (b) for any purpose whatsoever in any market, gala, or other public place.

8. No person shall carry or cause or permit to be carried in a carriage or truck on the railway or in a boat or vessel on any river or canal any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle, or the dung or other excreta thereof.

9. No person shall carry, drive or lead, or cause or permit to be carried, driven or led, along any road or thoroughfare, or in any public place, any diseased or

suspected animal or head of cattle unless he is the holder of a permit in that behalf issued by or by the authority of the Government Agent.

10. No person shall keep any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle on any chena or unenclosed land or field, or in any land or field immediately adjoining a road or thoroughfare unless he is the holder of a permit issued by or by the authority of the Government Agent.

11. (1) Any officer appointed under the Ordinance or any person specially authorized by the Government Agent may seize any animal or head of cattle which is kept, exposed, driven, carried, or transported in contravention of any of the provisions of regulations 8, 9, and 10, and may keep such animal segregated at any convenient place.

(2) Where a Government Veterinary Officer certifies that any animal or head of cattle seized under paragraph (1), is infected with disease and should be destroyed in order to prevent the spread of disease, such animal or head of cattle shall be destroyed and its carcase disposed of by the Government Agent or any officer or person authorized by him, in the manner specified in regulation 4.

(3) Where a Government Veterinary Officer certifies that any animal or head of cattle seized under paragraph (1) may be released without risk of spreading disease, such animal or head of cattle shall be released from seizure.

(4) No compensation whatever shall be payable to the owner of any animal or head of cattle seized, detained, or destroyed under this regulation.

(5) The owner of every animal or head of cattle seized under this regulation shall pay all expenses incurred in connection with its seizure, maintenance, segregation, or destruction, or with the disposal of its carcase.

12. (1) No person shall lead, drive, or transport any animal or head of cattle, whether attached to a cart or not, into, in or out of, an infected area except upon a permit issued by or by the authority of the Government Agent.

(2) Every application for a permit under paragraph (1) must—

- (a) specify the number, age, sex, and brandmarks (if any) of the animal or head of cattle in respect of which the permit is required ;
 (b) specify the purpose for which the permit is required ;
 (c) specify the place to which and the route by which the animal or head of cattle will be led, driven, or transported ;
 (d) contain a written undertaking by the applicant that he will defray the cost of the disinfection of every vehicle, truck, or vessel used for the transport of the animal or head of cattle.

(3) Every permit issued under this regulation shall be substantially—

- (a) in the case of cattle or animals attached to a cart, in the Form A in Schedule I ;
 (b) in any other case, in the Form B in that schedule.

(4) The Government Agent may in his discretion refuse to issue a permit under this regulation if he is of opinion that the proposed movement of cattle or animals is likely to spread disease.

(5) The Government Agent may attach to any permit issued under this regulation such conditions as he may consider necessary in regard to the inspection of the animal or head of cattle in respect of which the permit is issued, the route along which it may be moved and the places at which it may be halted.

(6) Every person to whom a permit is issued under this regulation shall retain the permit in his custody and shall produce it for inspection when called upon to do so by the Government Agent, or by the Police Magistrate or President of the Village Tribunal having jurisdiction over the place of residence of that person or by the Village Headman of the division in which such place is situated, or by any person authorized to issue permits under this regulation.

(7) The General Manager of the Railway or any person authorized by him may refuse to permit the transportation by rail of any animal or head of cattle which has been in an infected area, unless a certificate, signed by a Government Veterinary Officer, to the effect that the animal or head of cattle is free from disease, is produced to him.

13. The owner or person in charge of every animal or head of cattle which is in a protective zone shall—

- (a) keep it within the zone in a fenced enclosure, or tether or otherwise secure it so as to prevent it from straying or running loose ; and
 (b) when ordered to do so by the Government Agent, remove it to any place in his possession or occupation outside the zone, or to any Crown land approved by the Government Agent.

14. The owner or person in charge of every animal or head of cattle which is in an infected area shall—

- (a) keep it in a fenced enclosure or tether or otherwise secure it so as to prevent it from straying or running loose or from drinking at any stream, pond, lake, or reservoir;
- (b) when ordered to do so by the Government Agent, segregate and detain it at such place as may be appointed by the Government Agent.

15. No person shall move into, in or out of, an infected area any carcase, dung, or other excreta, fodder, litter, or milk except upon a permit issued by or by the authority of the Government Agent or otherwise than in accordance with such terms or conditions as may be attached to such permit.

16. The owner or person in charge of every shed or other place in which any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle has been kept shall, before the shed or other place is used for healthy cattle or animals, cause—

- (a) such shed or place to be properly cleaned and swept and any refuse found therein to be burnt, and the walls thereof to be limewashed; and
- (b) the floor and the woodwork of such shed or place to be washed, sprayed, or brushed with a solution of any of the disinfectants specified in Schedule II. used at the rate of dilution indicated in that schedule.

17. No person shall dig up the carcase of any animal or head of cattle which has died in an infected area.

18. (1) A Government Agent may establish in any part of his Province one or more stations for the isolation or inoculation of cattle and animals, and may cause or order any animal or head of cattle to be removed to any such station if the isolation or inoculation of such animal or head of cattle is, in the opinion of the Government Agent, necessary for the purpose of preventing the spread of disease.

(2) The Government Agent may cause any animal or head of cattle removed to an isolation or inoculation station to be detained therein for such period as he may consider necessary.

(3) The owner of every animal or head of cattle detained in an isolation or inoculation station shall pay to the officer in charge of the station the expenses of feeding and maintaining the animal or head of cattle during the period of its detention. Such expenses shall be payable notwithstanding that the animal or head of cattle may have died or been destroyed at the station.

(4) When any animal or head of cattle detained in any isolation or inoculation station is fit to be removed from such station, the officer in charge of the station shall post at the entrance to the station a notice to the effect that such animal or head of cattle may be removed from the station.

(5) If any animal or head of cattle remains unclaimed after the expiry of 15 days from the date on which a notice in respect of it is posted under paragraph (4), the Government Agent may cause the animal or head of cattle to be sold by public auction in order to recover the expenses referred to in paragraph (3); and the balance of the proceeds of sale after deducting such expenses shall be paid to the owner of the animal or head of cattle if such balance is claimed within 3 months of the sale, and if it is not so claimed shall be credited to general revenue.

PART III.

LANDING OF CATTLE AND ANIMALS.

A.—General.

19. No person shall land, or cause or permit the landing of, any animal or head of cattle—

- (a) at any port or place in Ceylon, other than the port of Colombo or the port of Kayts; or
- (b) except in accordance with these regulations.

20. The Collector of Customs at any port, other than Colombo or Kayts, may take such steps as he may consider necessary to prevent the landing of any animal or head of cattle at such port, and no compensation shall be payable to any person in respect of any loss or damage suffered by reason of any act *bona fide* done or ordered to be done by the Collector in pursuance or supposed pursuance of the powers vested in him by this regulation.

21. No person shall land, or cause or permit the landing of, any diseased or suspected animal or head of cattle at any port or place in Ceylon: Provided that the Collector of Customs at Colombo or Kayts may in his discretion permit

the landing of any such animal or head of cattle, subject to such conditions as may be determined by him as to the quarantine of the animal or head of cattle.

B.—Cattle.

22. (1) No person shall land, or cause or permit the landing of, any head of cattle imported from any port or place in Asia or Africa for the purpose of slaughter.

(2) No person shall land, or cause or permit the landing of, any head of cattle imported from any port or place in Asia or Africa for any purpose other than that of slaughter—

- (a) except at the port of Kayts; and
- (b) unless a permit authorizing such landing has been granted by the Government Veterinary Surgeon:

Provided, however, that the Government Veterinary Surgeon may in his discretion grant a permit for the landing at the port of Colombo of any such cattle imported for the purpose of breeding stock.

23. (1) No person shall land at any place other than the Government Quarantine Station in Colombo any head of cattle imported at the port of Colombo from an Asiatic or African port.

(2) Every head of cattle imported at the port of Colombo from an Asiatic or African port shall be removed in a boat or lighter from the vessel in which it arrives, to the Government Quarantine Station, and no head of cattle shall be admitted to the station unless it is brought in such boat or lighter.

24. Every person importing cattle at the port of Colombo from any port or place outside Asia or Africa, shall immediately inform the Collector of Customs of the arrival of the cattle, and shall furnish to him a certificate issued by a qualified Veterinary Surgeon at the port of shipment—

- (a) describing each head of cattle to be imported by him;
- (b) declaring that every such head of cattle was, within a period of ten days before the date of shipment, tested by the Double Intradermic or the Subcutaneous Tuberculin Test and that it did not react to the test, and that it was found to be free from any infectious or contagious disease.

25. (1) No person shall, at the port of Colombo, land or cause or permit the landing of any head of cattle imported from any port or place outside Asia or Africa, unless written permission for such landing has been granted by the Collector of Customs.

(2) The Collector of Customs shall not grant permission under paragraph (1) to land any head of cattle unless it has been inspected and passed as fit by a Government Veterinary Officer.

(3) No person shall remove, or cause the removal of any head of cattle landed under paragraph (1), from the Customs premises without a permit issued by the Collector of Customs.

(4) In any case where a Government Veterinary Officer is, after inspection of any head of cattle, of opinion that it should be placed under observation or subjected to further tests, the Collector of Customs may, in granting permission for its removal under paragraph (3), prescribe conditions as to the place at which and the manner in which it shall be kept; and the person to whom such permit is issued shall keep the head of cattle in accordance with such conditions until such time as the Government Veterinary Surgeon authorizes its removal from such place.

(5) The importer of any cattle shall pay to the Government Veterinary Officer a fee calculated at the rates set out hereunder for the inspection of such cattle under this regulation: Provided that the fee payable by any one importer in respect of any one shipment of cattle shall not exceed twenty rupees.

26. No person shall remove any head of cattle imported from any port and landed at the port of Kayts to any place other than the Government Quarantine Station at Kayts.

C.—Sheep, Goats, and Swine.

27. No person shall land any imported sheep or goat at any port or place in Ceylon except under a licence issued by the Minister for Agriculture and Lands or by a person authorized by the Minister.

28. Application for a licence to land any imported sheep or goats shall be made in Colombo to the Veterinary Surgeon of the Colombo Municipal Council, and in any other place to

the Government Agent or the Assistant Government Agent ; and every licence which the Minister may decide to issue will be forwarded to the applicant through the officer to whom the application was made.

29. Every licence to land sheep or goats shall specify—

- (a) the number of animals which may be landed under the licence ;
- (b) the period for which the licence shall be in force ;
- (c) the port or place from which the animals may be brought, and the port in Ceylon at which they may be landed.

30. (1) No licence to land sheep or goats shall be issued save in accordance with such restrictions as to the numbers that may be landed—

- (a) at any specified port or place in the Island, or
- (b) from any specified vessel or line of vessels, or
- (c) from any vessel coming from any specified port or place of embarkation, and save in accordance with such conditions as to the fitness of the animals for human consumption and their freedom from infection or disease of any kind,

as the Executive Committee of Agriculture and Lands may by resolution from time to time impose.

(2) Every decision of the Executive Committee of Agriculture and Lands in any of the matters referred to in paragraph (1) shall in all cases be final and conclusive, and shall be published, by notice under the hand of the Minister, in the *Gazette* and in at least one English, one Sinhalese, and one Tamil newspaper circulating in Ceylon.

31. The Minister may upon application in that behalf made in the manner specified in regulation 28, issue a special licence authorizing the landing of any number of sheep or goats for the purpose of breeding stock, and such number may in his discretion be in addition to the number of sheep and goats permitted to be landed for the purpose of slaughter.

32. (1) The provisions of regulations 24 and 25 shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the inspection, landing, and removal of sheep, goats, and swine, imported at the port of Colombo from any port or place outside Asia or Africa.

(2) The importer of any sheep, goats, or swine shall pay to the Government Veterinary Officer a fee calculated at the rates set out hereunder for the inspection of such animals under the provisions of paragraph (1) :

Provided that the fee payable by any one importer in respect of any one shipment of sheep, goats, or swine shall not exceed twenty rupees.

33. All sheep, goats, or swine landed at the port of Colombo from any port or place in Asia or Africa for the purpose of slaughter shall within twelve hours of being landed be removed to the Municipal Quarantine Station :

Provided, however, that any such animal which is intended for slaughter within the Municipal limits of Colombo may be removed direct to the Municipal Slaughter-house at Colombo.

34. The provisions of regulation 23 shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the landing of sheep, goats, and swine imported at the port of Colombo from any port or place in Asia or Africa, for any purpose other than that of slaughter.

35. The provisions of regulation 26 shall apply *mutatis mutandis* in the case of sheep, goats, and swine landed at the port of Kayts.

D.—Horses, Asses, and Mules.

36. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in regulation 19, any horse, ass, or mule may, subject to the provisions of regulation 37 and of paragraphs (1) and (3) to (7) of regulation 38 be landed at the port of Talaimannar.

37. Every person importing horses, asses, or mules at any port shall immediately inform the Collector of Customs of the arrival of the animals, and shall furnish to him a certificate issued by a qualified Veterinary Surgeon at the port of shipment—

- (a) describing each animal to be imported by him ; and
- (b) declaring that every animal was inspected by that surgeon within a period of 5 days before the date of shipment and found to be free from disease.

38. (1) No person shall land any imported horse, ass, or mule at any port unless written permission for such landing has been granted by the Collector of Customs.

(2) The Collector of Customs at the port of Colombo or the port of Kayts shall not grant permission under paragraph (1) to land any horse, ass, or mule unless it has been inspected and passed as fit by a Government Veterinary Officer.

(3) No person shall remove, or cause the removal of, any horse, ass, or mule landed under paragraph (1), from the Customs premises, without a permit issued by the Collector of Customs.

(4) Every horse, ass, or mule landed at the port of Talaimannar under this regulation shall be forthwith removed by train to Colombo, or to such other place as the Collector of Customs at Talaimannar may direct, for the purpose of being inspected by a Government Veterinary Officer.

(5) No person shall remove any horse, ass, or mule brought to any railway station from the port of Talaimannar under paragraph (4) except with the written permission of the officer in charge of the station.

(6) The officer in charge of a railway station to which any horse, ass, or mule is brought from Talaimannar under paragraph (4) shall not permit such animal to be removed from the station except upon the production of a certificate from a Government Veterinary Officer to the effect that the animal is fit to be removed therefrom or that its removal is necessary for the purpose of inspection or quarantine.

(7) The importer of any horses, asses, or mules shall pay to the Government Veterinary Officer a fee calculated at the rates set out hereunder for the inspection of such animals under this regulation :

Provided that the fee payable by any one importer in respect of any one shipment of such animals shall not exceed twenty rupees.

E.—Fowls, &c.

39. No person shall land at any port or place in Ceylon any fowl, turkey, guinea fowl, duck, or goose imported from any port or place in Asia.

F.—Municipal Quarantine Station at Colombo.

40. The Municipal Quarantine Station at Colombo shall be under the control of the Municipal Commissioner.

Every animal removed to the Municipal Quarantine Station under these regulations shall be detained therein for a period of 15 days : Provided that the Municipal Commissioner or any person authorized by him may order any animal to be detained for such longer period as may, in his opinion, be necessary for the purpose of the prevention or control of the spread of disease.

41. The owner of every animal detained in the Municipal Quarantine Station shall feed and maintain the animal during the period of its detention therein :

Provided that where any owner neglects to feed and maintain any animal the animal may be fed and maintained by the officer in charge of the station and the costs of such feeding and maintenance shall be recoverable from the owner.

42. The owner of every animal detained at the Municipal Quarantine Station shall pay to the officer in charge of the station a fee calculated at the rates set out hereunder—

43. (1) Where the owner of any animal fails to pay any costs, fees, or charges recoverable under regulation 41 or regulation 42 in respect of the animal, the Municipal Commissioner or any person authorized by him may order the animal to be sold by public auction :

Provided, however, that the Municipal Commissioner or other such person may order the animal to be destroyed, if it is in his opinion unfit to be sold.

(2) Where the proceeds of any sale under paragraph (1) are insufficient to meet the costs and fees due in respect of the animal, or where the animal dies in the station, the Municipal Commissioner or any other person authorized by him may order one or more of the other animals, if any, belonging to the owner and detained in the station, to be sold by public auction after notice to the owner.

(3) The proceeds of the sale of any animal under this regulation shall after the deduction therefrom of the costs and fees due from the owner and of a charge of 10 per centum to meet the expenses of the sale, be paid to the owner.

G.—Government Quarantine Stations.

44. The Government Quarantine Stations at Colombo and Kayts shall be under the control of the Director of Agriculture and of the Government Agent, Northern Province, respectively.

45. Every animal or head of cattle removed to a Government Quarantine Station under these regulations shall be detained therein for a period of 15 days: Provided, however, that the officer in charge of the station may detain any animal for such longer period as may, in his opinion, be necessary for the purpose of the prevention or control of the spread of disease.

46. (1) The owner of every animal or head of cattle detained in a Government Quarantine Station shall feed and maintain it during the period of its detention.

(2) Where the owner of any animal or head of cattle fails or neglects to feed and maintain it, such animal or head of cattle shall be fed and maintained by the officer in charge of the station; and the owner shall pay to the officer the costs of feeding and maintenance in accordance with the rates set out hereunder.

(3) The owner of every animal or head of cattle detained at a Government Quarantine Station, or any person duly authorized by him, may enter and remain in the station, for the purpose of feeding and tending the animal, during such hours as the officer in charge of the station shall specify by notice posted on the notice board of the station: Provided that the officer in charge may in his discretion permit any owner or other such person to enter and remain in the station outside such hours for that purpose.

47. The owner of every animal or head of cattle detained at a Government Quarantine Station shall pay to the officer in charge of the station a fee at the rates set out hereunder.

48. (1) Where the owner of any animal or head of cattle, detained at the Government Quarantine Station at Colombo, fails to pay the costs or fees due under regulation 46 or regulation 47, the Director of Agriculture or any person authorized by him may order the animal or head of cattle to be sold by public auction:

Provided, however, that the Director or such other person may order the animal or head of cattle to be destroyed, if it is in his opinion unfit to be sold.

(2) Where the proceeds of any sale under paragraph (1) are insufficient to meet the costs and fees due in respect of the animal or head of cattle, or where the animal or head of cattle dies in the station, the Director of Agriculture or any other person authorized by him may order one or more of the other animals or cattle, if any, belonging to the owner and detained in the station, to be sold by public auction after notice to the owner.

(3) The proceeds of the sale of any animal or head of cattle under this regulation shall after the deduction therefrom of the costs and fees due from the owner and of a charge of 10 per centum to meet the expenses of the sale, be paid to the owner.

49. The provisions of regulation 48 shall apply in the case of any animal or head of cattle detained at the Government Quarantine Station at Kayts, and the powers exercisable by the Director of Agriculture under that regulation, shall in case of the station at Kayts be exercisable by the Government Agent.

50. The officer in charge of a Government Quarantine Station shall forthwith destroy or cause to be destroyed any animal or head of cattle in the station which develops rinderpest, and shall cremate its carcase or cause the carcase to be cremated.

51. The officer in charge of a Government Quarantine Station may destroy or cause to be destroyed any animal or head of cattle in the station which develops any infectious or contagious disease other than rinderpest, or

which has been in contact with an animal or head of cattle suffering from rinderpest, if such destruction is in his opinion necessary to prevent or control the spread of disease.

52. The owner of any animal or head of cattle destroyed under regulation 43 (1), regulation 48 (1), regulation 50, or regulation 51 shall not be entitled to, and shall have no claim for any compensation for any loss or damage suffered by reason of such destruction.

53. The officer in charge of a Government Quarantine Station or any Government Veterinary Officer may subject any animal or head of cattle detained in the station to any recognized test for diagnosing disease or may inoculate any such animal or head of cattle for the purpose of preventing disease.

PART IV.

DESTRUCTION OF CATTLE AND ANIMALS,
COMPENSATION, &C.

54. (1) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in regulation 56 any Government Veterinary Officer or other person, may, if he is specially authorized by the Director of Agriculture for the purpose, destroy any imported animal or head of cattle which when landed in Ceylon is found to be affected with disease, if he is satisfied that such destruction is necessary to prevent or control the spread of disease:

Provided, however, that no animal or head of cattle shall be destroyed under this regulation—

- without notice served personally or by registered post on the importer of the animal or head of cattle; and
- without the consent of the Government Agent, in any case where the importer requires that the prior consent of the Government Agent be obtained.

(2) The importer or owner of any animal or head of cattle which is destroyed under paragraph (1) shall not be entitled to, and shall have no claim for, any compensation in respect of any loss or damage suffered by reason of such destruction.

55. (1) Where a Government Veterinary Officer is satisfied that any horse, ass, or mule is affected with glanders or farcy, he shall forthwith notify the Government Agent of the fact; and the Government Agent shall cause the animal to be valued by a Board consisting of the Government Veterinary Surgeon and two other persons authorized by the Government Agent, and to be destroyed by a Government Veterinary Officer or by any other person authorized by the Government Agent.

(2) The owner of any animal destroyed under paragraph (1) shall be entitled to receive as compensation a sum equal to half the amount at which the animal was valued under that paragraph:

Provided, however, that the amount paid as compensation shall not, in case of any horse, exceed three hundred and fifty rupees, or in the case of an ass or mule, exceed seventy-five rupees.

56. (1) Any Government Veterinary Officer or other person may, if authorized in writing by the Government Agent for the purpose, destroy or cause to be destroyed, any animal or head of cattle affected or suspected to be affected with disease:

Provided, however, that—

- no animal or head of cattle affected or suspected to be affected with tuberculosis shall be destroyed until its market value has been—
 - fixed by written agreement signed by the Government Agent and by the owner of the animal or head of cattle; or
 - in default of such agreement, fixed and specified in a certificate signed by some person authorized in writing by the Government Agent for the purpose; and delivered to the Government Agent and to the owner or person in charge of the animal or head of cattle;
- no animal or head of cattle suspected to be affected with any disease other than tuberculosis shall be destroyed until the officer or other person destroying it or causing it to be destroyed has assessed its value and delivered to the owner or person in charge of the animal or head of cattle a certificate specifying its assessed value.

(2) For the purposes of paragraph (1) (a) (ii.), the market value of any animal or head of cattle shall be the price which, in the opinion of the person fixing its value under

that paragraph, would be paid by a purchaser at a sale in the open market after such inspection of the animal or head of cattle as is ordinarily made at such sale and without prior knowledge that it is affected or suspected to be affected with tuberculosis.

57. The owner of any animal or head of cattle, affected with any disease other than tuberculosis, which is destroyed under regulation 56, shall not be entitled to and shall have no claim for any compensation in respect of any loss or damage suffered by reason of such destruction.

58. The owner of any animal or head of cattle, suspected to be affected with any disease other than tuberculosis, which is destroyed under regulation 56, shall be entitled to receive as compensation a sum equal to one-half of the value of the animal or head of cattle as assessed under paragraph (b) of the proviso to that regulation:

Provided, however, that the amount to be paid as compensation in any case shall not exceed such amount as is, according to the table hereunder, appropriate to the case.

59. (1) Where any animal or head of cattle affected or suspected to be affected with tuberculosis is destroyed under regulation 56, a Government Veterinary Officer authorized by the Government Agent shall hold a post-mortem examination on the carcase of the animal or head of cattle and shall permit the owner thereof or an authorized representative of the owner, to be present at the examination.

(2) The officer holding a post-mortem examination under paragraph (1) shall deliver to the Government Agent, and to the owner of the animal or head of cattle or to his authorized representative, as the case may be, a certificate of the result of the examination.

(3) If the certificate delivered under paragraph (2) is to the effect that the animal or head of cattle was affected with advanced tuberculosis, the owner thereof shall be paid as compensation a sum equal to one-fourth the market value, fixed under regulation 56, of the animal or head of cattle, less half the cost of its valuation under that regulation.

(4) Where the certificate delivered under paragraph (2) is to the effect that the animal or head of cattle was affected with tuberculosis, but not with advanced tuberculosis, the owner thereof shall be paid as compensation a sum equal to three-fourths of the market value, fixed under regulation 56, of the animal or head of cattle, less half the cost of its valuation under that paragraph.

(5) Where the certificate delivered under paragraph (2) is to the effect that the animal was not affected with tuberculosis the owner thereof shall be paid as compensation a sum equal to the market value, fixed under regulation 56, of the animal or head of cattle.

(6) For the purposes of this regulation an animal or head of cattle shall be deemed to have been affected with advanced tuberculosis if the certificate under paragraph (2) is to the effect—

- that there was miliary tuberculosis of both lungs; or
- that lesions of tuberculosis were present on both the pleura and the peritonaeum; or
- that lesions of tuberculosis were present in the muscular system or in the lymphatic glands embedded in or between the muscles or that the infection of the lymphatic gland was sufficient to indicate that the disease was widespread; or
- that lesions of tuberculosis were present both in the respiratory and digestive tracts and in the substance or membranes of any two of the following, that is to say, the spleen, kidney, uterus, ovary, testicle, brain, and spinal cord.

60. Every application for compensation in respect of the destruction of any animal or head of cattle under these regulations shall be made to the Government Agent before the expiry of fourteen days after the date of the destruction, and shall be signed by the owner of the animal or head of cattle or by a person authorized by the owner.

61. Where any sum becomes payable under these regulations as compensation to the owner of any animal or head of cattle which has been destroyed, such sum shall be paid by the Government Agent out of moneys voted by the State Council for the purpose of the payment of compensation in respect of cattle and animals destroyed under these regulations.

62. Every officer or person upon whom any powers are conferred by or under these regulations shall be deemed to be an officer appointed to carry out the provisions of these regulations.

63. The regulations made under section 9 of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Ordinance, 1909, published in the *Gazettes* of February 10, 1911, May 22, 1914, April 9, 1915, February 9, 1923, April 20, 1923, February 27, 1925, September 4, 1925, January 4, 1929, January 13, 1930, July 8, 1931, September 18, 1931, June 10, 1932, November 10, 1933, and March 29, 1935, are hereby repealed.

The rules under section 60 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, published in *Gazette* No. 8,077 of September 7, 1934, are hereby amended by the substitution for the tariff appended thereto of the following new tariff:—

"TARIFF.

Fees payable to the Urban District Council.

(1) Occupation.

For each person occupying any portion of the resthouse a consolidated fee of 10 cents for each complete period not exceeding one hour, subject to a minimum of 25 cents when any meal other than afternoon tea is taken, and to a maximum of Rs. 2 for any continuous period not exceeding 24 hours.

(This fee includes the use of towels, linen, beds, mosquito curtain, lights, &c.)

(2) Garage and Stabling.

For each continuous period not exceeding 24 hours during which a garage is occupied by—

motor car	50 cents
a motor cycle	25 cents
any other vehicle	25 cents

For each continuous period not exceeding 24 hours during which a stable is occupied by a horse, 25 cents.

For each stable which is let by the month, Rs. 3 for each month."

"Improvements in or relating to machines for cutting manufactured tea and like dry substances".

Abstract.—The invention refers to a tea cutting machine comprising an inner cutting cylinder (hereinafter called basket) perforated with a plurality of holes, staggered if necessary, and an outer cutting cylinder (hereinafter called sleeve) mounted for rotation in opposite directions on concentric shafts, so that a scissor like cutting action is obtained on the tea passing through. The tea is fed into the interior of the basket by means of a hopper the delivery of which can be regulated by means of a sleeve valve. To prevent clogging of the holes in the basket, knives are arranged in close proximity to the inner face of the basket and rotating relatively thereto. To cut the tea to a further degree of fineness, a second pair of cylinders may be arranged with smaller holes than the first pair. The inventors state that it is preferable to have the inner sleeve and outer basket rotatably mounted on the same member, so as to take advantage of the centrifugal velocity imparted by the former. On the outermost rotating member vanes are arranged to create a draught to increase the velocity of passage of tea through the machine.
