Description of Colombo Airport.

The area of land comprising lots 1 to 79 in preliminary plan No. A 433, containing in extent 242 acres 1 rood and 1.7 perches, situated in Attidiya village in Salpiti korale of the Colombo Mudaliyar's Division in Colombo District, Western Province.

CADETSHIPS IN THE CEYLON CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1939.

1. An Open Competitive Examination for Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners concurrently in London and Colombo in July, 1939. The actual dates will be notified later.
 2. The number of vacancies will be notified later.
 3. Candidates for this examination must be natural born male British subjects either of Ceylonese descent on both sides or of mixed European and Ceylonese descent. The Governor may, however, grant a candidate who is a natural born male British subject, normally resident in Ceylon and whose family connections and interests are in Ceylon, permission to sit for the examination. Candidates successful in the competition may be called upon to satisfy the Secretary of State for the Colonies that they fulfil the above requirements as regards descent.
 4. Candidates must have attained the age of 22 and must not have attained the age of 24 on August 1, 1939.
 5. Candidates are required to obtain a written nomination from the Governor to sit for the Examination. Candidates who propose to sit for the examination in London should take steps to provide themselves in advance with that written nomination by application to the Chief Secretary's Office, Colombo, and it should be forwarded by them to the Civil Service Commissioners with their forms of application. Applicants for nomination to sit for the examination in London should furnish the same particulars as are given on the form of application for admission to the examination.
 6. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight and physically qualified for service in tropical climates and they will be called upon to undergo a strict medical examination to test these points.
 7. A married candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a Ceylon Cadetship without the special consent of the Governor.
 8. Application forms and further information respecting the examination to be held in London should be obtained from the Civil Service Commissioners, 6, Burlington Gardens, London W. 1.
- The following regulations are applicable to candidates who wish to present themselves for examination in Colombo.*
9. The fee for examination will be—
 - (a) Rs. 100 for the competitive examination which should be paid to the Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Chartered Bank of India, &c. See note 5 of application form. The bank receipt should be attached to the application form.
 - (b) Rs. 10·50 for the medical examination. Candidates will be notified later the manner in which this fee is to be paid.
 10. Nominations to candidates sitting in Colombo will be limited to those who have passed the Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of London or any other public examination which may be deemed to be of an equally high standard.
 11. Candidates who possess the necessary qualifications and who propose to sit for the examination in Colombo will, on application to the Chief Secretary, be supplied with copies of the Regulations, Syllabus, and Application Form.
 12. Nominations for the examination will be considered on the receipt of the forms of application which must be filled in by the applicants in their own handwriting and must reach the Chief Secretary's Office *on or before February 10, 1939.*
 13. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post can be considered. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.
 14. Acknowledgments of application forms are sent and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should at once write to the Chief Secretary, Colombo. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.
 15. Candidates will be notified as soon as possible of the dates and place fixed for their *vivá voce* test; the time table of the written part of the examination is likely to be sent early in July to the address given on the form of application and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend.
- Note.*—Information as to the salary and conditions of service on which these appointments will be made can be obtained on application to the Chief Secretary.

APPLICATION FORM.

For the use of candidates seeking admission to the Competitive Examination to be held in Colombo in July, 1939, for appointment to Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service.

Note 1.—This form is only for the use of Ceylonese candidates desiring to be examined at Colombo; a separate form is issued by the Civil Service Commissioners, for candidates who desire to be examined in London.

Note 2.—This form is to be filled up and returned to the Chief Secretary, Colombo, in time for delivery on or before *February 10, 1939.* No application form received after that date will be accepted.

A candidate who fills up and returns this application form and does not receive an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should inform the Chief Secretary.

Note 3.—Candidates should, by consulting the regulations, make certain that they are eligible to compete and that their selection of subjects conforms with the regulations. No scrutiny of the information which is given on this sheet is made by the Chief Secretary or the Civil Service Commissioners before the examination.

Note 4.—Should any of the particulars furnished by candidates be found to be false within their knowledge they will, if appointed, be liable to be dismissed; and, if otherwise entitled to superannuation allowance they will forfeit all claim thereto. The wilful suppression of any material fact will be similarly penalized.

Note 5.—The fee for the examination will be Rs. 100 which should be paid to the Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Chartered Bank of India, &c. A form for this purpose is annexed. The Bank receipt should be annexed to the application form. The full fee is returned to candidates who are not granted nominations to sit for the examination. If a candidate who has received nomination withdraws from the examination a refund of Rs. 73 will be made to him provided the form of admission to the examination is returned to reach the Chief Secretary at least 7 days before the examination.

2. In Section B a candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

3. The following restrictions apply to particular subjects in Section B.

International Relations (26), may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (9), or International Law (15).

Greek Literature (61), may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (58), Latin Literature (65) only by those who offer Latin Translation (62), and Buddhist Civilization (90) only by those who offer Pali Language (89).

In subjects 69 to 88 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (69), German History (72), Spanish or Italian History (75), Russian History (78), may not offer either subject 8 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 9 (European History, Period 3).

4. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (23), or any of the subjects 38 to 49 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (37), Engineering (50), Geography (51), and the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (53), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

5. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

6. Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.*

A syllabus defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects is published below :—

SYLLABUS.**SECTION A.**

1. *Essay*.—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.

2. *English*.—A paper of questions to test the understanding of English and the workmanlike use of words. An optional exercise in the writing of verse will be included.

3. *Present Day*.—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, political, and scientific. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

4. *Vivá Voce*.—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his (or her) career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to enable the Board to assess his suitability for each of the Services for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and alertness, his vigour and strength of character, and his potential qualities of leadership.

SECTION B.

HISTORY. *Subjects 5-9*.—Candidates should know something of the original authorities, and have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history.

When a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached; similarly, when a fixed date is given for the end of the period, candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the subsequent development of movements which continued beyond the period.

5, 6. *British History*.—Period 1, to 1660; Period 2, 1660 to the present day. The subject will deal with the life of the people as a whole, political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific, with the main stress on the political and economic aspects. Candidates will be expected to know so much of European history as will make the external action of this country fully intelligible and will explain those movements at home which had their beginnings abroad, *e.g.*, the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the reactions in this country of the French Revolution. In subject 6 the outstanding incidents and movements in the history of British possessions will be included.

7. *Scottish History*.—From 1057 to 1707, with special stress on the period from 1424 to 1567.

8, 9. *European History*.—Period 1, from 400 to 1494; Period 2, from 1494 to 1763; Period 3, from 1763 to the present day. The political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific aspects will all be included. The history of the United States of America, of India, and of the Far East will be included in so far as it influences European fortunes to an important degree.

10, 11. *Private Law*.—Part 1, the law of real and personal property (including the law of succession). Part 2, contracts and torts. This subject is confined to English law.

12. *Jurisprudence*.—Theories as to the nature of law, including the theory of sovereignty. The sources of law and its development, with particular reference to English and Roman law. The character and classification of rights and duties (legal and equitable). The analysis of the leading conceptions employed in law.

13. *Constitutional Law*.—The constitutional law of the United Kingdom, including the relations between the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire.

* It is notified for general information that the number of marks deducted for bad handwriting may be considerable.

14. *Roman Law*.—Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial processes. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.

15. *International Law*.—Public international law.

16, 17, 18. *Metaphysics*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, questions on the period from Descartes to Kant, both included. Paper 3, questions on ancient philosophy and post-Kantian philosophy; this paper will be arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to Plato and Aristotle among the ancient philosophers or to post-Kantian philosophy.

19, 20. *Moral Philosophy*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, a paper on ancient and modern philosophy arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to either.

21. *Logic*.—The subject will be interpreted in a wide sense. Epistemology in its bearing on logical problems will be included, together with formal logic and scientific method. Questions may be set on mathematical logic, *i.e.*, on the logic of mathematics, symbolic logic, and the logic of probability; and also on the history of logic. A considerable choice of questions will be given.

22. *Psychology*.—Questions on the history of the subject may be included.

23. *Experimental Psychology*.—A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank.

24. *Political Theory*.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, including the theory of the state in its relation to kindred studies such as ethics, economics, and political history. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period beginning with the French Revolution.

25. *Political Organization*.—This will include constitutional forms (representative government, federalism, &c.) and public administration, central and local. The history of institutions is not included, but candidates will be expected to know the earlier stages from which existing institutions have developed.

26. *International Relations*.—The subject includes the study of the relations both between governments and between peoples, and of the principles underlying their development; in particular, the study, in connexion with twentieth-century history, of the machinery and processes of international co-operation, including the organization and activities of the League of Nations and other international bodies. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected.

27. *General Economics*.—Economic theory in general. Candidates will be expected to illustrate theory by facts and to analyse problems by the help of theory. The history of economic thought will be included.

28. *Industry and Trade*.—The organization of industry and trade; the economic theories and practical problems involved.

29. *Money, Banking, and Exchange*.—Systems of currency, banking, foreign exchanges; the theories and problems involved.

30. *Public Finance*.—The subject will deal with matters connected with the raising and spending of revenue and loans by Governments (central and local).

31. *Social Economics*.—The economic aspect of matters affecting labour and social welfare, including social structure and legislation, with special reference to Great Britain.

32. *Economic History*.—Questions will be set on the economic history of England up to 1700; but the main stress will be on the economic development of Great Britain since 1700. So much knowledge of developments in the other parts of the British Empire, in the Continent of Europe and in the United States of America will be expected as is necessary to the full understanding of British economic history. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period since 1700.

33. *Economic Statistics*.—Elementary methods of handling numerical data. Tabulation. Frequency distributions, averages, deviations. Graphic methods, applied to groups and to time series. Simple interpolation. Index numbers.

Some knowledge of the nature of the statistical data available from British sources and the principal statistical publications of the League of Nations, in relation to prices, wages, incomes, trade, transport, production, consumption, population, births, deaths, marriages, migration, and of the methods usually applied to analysis of such data.

Elements of the mathematical theory of statistics, with special reference to economic and sociological problems. The mathematical treatment of frequency groups and of time series. The more elementary parts of the method of correlation. Sampling, and measurement of the precision of its results. Such formulas as Pareto's for income and the logarithmic curve. Application of statistical methods to the analysis of elasticity of demand and other theoretical economic concepts.

34. *Lower Pure Mathematics*.—Geometry of two and three dimensions, synthetic and analytical; a specialized knowledge of particular curves and surfaces will not be required. Descriptive geometry. The method of vectors. Algebra and trigonometry, including series, complex numbers, the numerical solution of equations.

Infinitesimal calculus of real variables, including development in series, partial differentiation, multiple integrals, ordinary differential equations, with applications to geometry.

No great skill will be expected in solving complicated problems of an elementary character. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.

35. *Lower Applied Mathematics*.—Statics, hydrostatics, dynamics, elementary theory of electricity and magnetism, including the induction of currents. The questions will be of an elementary character, but will not be confined to two dimensions; they will involve the use of the calculus. Candidates are free to use differential equations, but a knowledge thereof will not be necessary to answer the questions. Attention will be paid to problems which arise naturally and to general principles; artificial problems will be avoided. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.

36. *Higher Mathematics*.—

- (1) Geometry, including differential geometry.
- (2) Analysis, including the elements of the theory of functions of real and complex variables.
- (3) The calculus of observations, including probability, and the solution of differential and finite difference equations.
- (4) Mechanics, including the elementary mechanics of fluids, but excluding elastic solids, the whole being treated from a physical standpoint.
- (5) The classical theory of electricity and physical optics.
- (6) Thermodynamics. The elements of the quantum theory and the theory of relativity.

Two question papers will be set. In each of them all sections of the syllabus will be represented and in each paper the same number of questions will be set on each section. There will be no restriction on the candidate's choice of questions; he can, however, obtain full credit by confining himself to any two of the sections.

37. *Astronomy*.—General and spherical astronomy, and the elements of astrophysics, including instruments and observatory practice.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of at least 20 hours' practical training in an observatory.

NATURAL SCIENCE. *Subjects 38-49*.—The standard of the higher division of a science will be that which is required in the main subject for an honours degree at the universities. The standard for the lower division of a science will be that required in a subject subsidiary to the main subject whether required at the final degree examination or at a preceding examination.

A candidate who desires to offer a science must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in that science in an institution of university rank; the period of training required is one academic year, whether the candidate offers the higher division of the science or the lower division or both divisions.

44. *Lower Geology*.
45. *Higher Geology*.) Mineralogy will be included in each division.

50. *Engineering*.—Strength of materials; theory of structures; mechanism and dynamics of machines; heat and thermodynamics; hydraulics, including hydraulic machines; electrical technology.

Candidates will be expected to be familiar with graphical methods and to have some skill in drawing.

A candidate who desires to offer Engineering must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

51. *Geography*.—Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany and geology. There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

52. *General Anthropology*.—The study of human cultures, notably in their simpler forms, and the analysis of such cultures into their component aspects: social organization, economics including technology, education, political systems, law, magico-religious ideas and practices, games and recreation, knowledge, language, art; the analysis should include the common elements in human institutions, customs, and beliefs, and the specific variations characteristic of individual cultures. The application of anthropological knowledge to practical affairs: in administration and economic co-operation; in missionary and educational work. The candidate will be expected to have some comparative knowledge of anthropological methods and of anthropological theories, including for example the concepts of evolution, diffusion, function, and the influence of environment.

53. *Special Anthropology*.—Candidates will choose between Social Anthropology and Physical Anthropology.

Social Anthropology.—The social organization of human societies, with special reference to primitive societies at various stages of development and the effect of the modern conditions of world-wide contact of races and the spread of cultural ideas upon such organization. The constitution of domestic groups, wider kinship units, local communities and tribal systems. Political organization, including problems of leadership, tribal councils, rank; the working of law and the administration of justice. Economic organization of primary pursuits and industries; types of distribution, exchange, consumption and land tenure. Educational methods, native and introduced, including the influence of the family; professional and technical instruction, initiation, age-grades, apprenticeship in occupational groups. Early forms of magico-religious beliefs and ritual in their sociological aspect: ancestor-worship, totemism, conceptions of the soul, eschatology, beliefs in mana, magic, and witchcraft. Tradition, oral or written, in its influence upon the collective behaviour of the group. Apart from a general knowledge of the literature candidates will be expected to have an acquaintance, first hand or from written sources, with at least one ethnographic area.

Physical Anthropology, with which are included prehistoric archaeology and technology. Candidates will be expected to have such knowledge as may be acquired by laboratory and museum work, consisting mainly in the handling and study of specimens and exhibits. The subject will be treated with special, but not exclusive, reference to peoples of rude culture, including prehistoric civilizations.

A candidate who desires to offer Physical Anthropology must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an institution of university rank.

54. *Old and Middle English*.—Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the following works:—the principal anonymous monuments of Old English verse, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle; the Ancrene Wisse, the Owl and the Nightingale, Havelok, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight; and of some part of the work or works of Cynewulf, Ælfric, Layamon, Langland, Gower, Chaucer. Questions will be set relative to these works and authors, and to other matters of literary history in the period.

Questions on the history of the language will be included, but will not be compulsory.

55, 56. *English Literature*.—Period 1, 1350 to 1700; Period 2, from 1660. Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the works of the following authors and of their place in the history of their country:—

Questions on other writers will not be excluded, but, on the whole, the questions will be directed to the best-known authors and their best-known works. Candidates should know so much of the history as is necessary to understand the literature in its relation to other activities of the nation.

Questions will be set on the history of the language, but will not be compulsory.

57. *Welsh Civilization*.—A general knowledge of the political, social and literary history of Wales from 1100 A.D. to the present day. Candidates will also be required to show a special knowledge of the literature of the period 1350 to 1650, and of the history of the period 1700 to the present day. Candidates will be required to write some of their answers in Welsh.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND CIVILIZATIONS.—*Subjects 58–90*.—Greek Literature (61) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (58), Latin Literature (65) only by those who offer Latin Translation (62), and Buddhist Civilization (90) only by those who offer Pali Language (89). In subjects 69–88 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (69), German History (72), Spanish or Italian History (75), Russian History (78), may not offer either subject 8 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 9 (European History, Period 3).

In history candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history. In literature candidates will be expected to have a first-hand knowledge of the authors. Passages of literature may be set for comment on matters of social, literary, and historical interest. In French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, questions on philology and the older forms of the languages will be set, but will not be compulsory. The papers in both history and literature will deal with the life of the people as a whole, literary, political, social, economic, artistic, scientific.

59. *Greek Composition*.—The paper will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition, or, if they prefer, may take some prose and some verse.

60. *Greek History*.—The main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.; but candidates will be given an opportunity of showing knowledge of the period before 510 B.C.

63. *Latin Composition*.—As for Greek.

64. *Roman History*.—The outlines of the history and development down to 180 A.D. should be known; but the main stress will be laid on the period 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

66, 67. *Classical Archaeology*.—Paper 1, Greek and Roman sculpture and architecture. Paper 2, Greek coins down to 322 B.C., Roman coins down to 98 A.D.; Greek vases; Greek and Roman painting. A considerable choice of questions will be given in each paper.

68. *French Language*.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation.

69. *French History*.—The outlines of the history prior to 1589 should be known; the period from 1589 to 1660 in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1660 to the present day.

71. *German Language*.—As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

72. *German History.*—In history candidates should know in outline the history of the Medieval Empire, of the growth of the German cities, of the Reformation in Germany, and of the Thirty Years War; but the main stress will be on the period from the accession of Frederick the Great to the present day.

74. *Spanish, Italian, Language.*—As for French.

75. *Spanish History.*—The main stress will be on the periods from the Union of Castile and Aragon under Ferdinand and Isabella to the liberation of the Netherlands, and again from 1800 to the present day.

Italian History.—The main stress will be on the 15th century and the first half of the 16th century, and again on the period from 1789 to the present day. Sufficient should be known of the earlier period to understand the position of the Pope and the Emperor in Italy, and the rise of the towns.

77. *Russian Language.*—As for French.

78. *Russian History.*—Only the broadest outlines of the history prior to Peter the Great will be required; the period from the accession of Peter the Great to 1800 should be known in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1800 to the present day.

80. *Arabic Language.*—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

81, 82. *Arabic History, Arabic Literature.*—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period from the middle of the 6th century A.D. to the middle of the 13th century A.D.

83. *Persian Language.*—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

84, 85. *Persian History, Persian Literature.*—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period 1000 A.D. to 1500 A.D. Candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of the history of Persia before 1000 A.D. and from 1500 A.D. to the present time.

86. *Sanskrit Language.*—Translation, prose composition, and questions on Vedic and Sanskrit grammar. Both Vedic and classical Sanskrit passages will be set for translation; composition will be required in classical Sanskrit alone.

87, 88. *Indian History, Sanskrit Literature.*—The history of the civilization and thought of India and Sanskrit literature from the Vedic period to 1200 A.D.

89. *Pali Language.*—Translation from Pali, prose composition in Pali, questions on Pali grammar.

90. *Buddhist Civilization.*—Pali literature and the history of Buddhist civilization and the growth of ideas in Buddhism from the time of the Buddha to 1800 A.D. in India, Ceylon, Burma, and Siam.

SELECTION OF A CEYLONESE CANDIDATE FOR APPOINTMENT AS POLICE PROBATIONER.

This Notification applies to the Selection of Police Candidates for 1939 and there is no guarantee that the same Conditions will apply in Future Years.

THERE will be at least one vacancy in 1939 in the Ceylon Police Force in the rank of Probationary Assistant Superintendent to be filled by the appointment of a Ceylonese Probationer.

2. As recommended in the Report of the Select Committee of the Legislative Council on the Police Force (see Sessional Paper XI.—1926), Ceylonese candidates for appointment as Police Probationers will undergo a qualifying literary examination and will be selected by the Governor.

If any candidate is resident in the United Kingdom at the time when the literary examination is to be held, special arrangements will be necessary in order to enable the candidate to take the examination in London. Candidates who wish to take advantage of this procedure must notify the Chief Secretary before January 1st of the year in which the examination is held. In all cases candidates will be required first to obtain a nomination from the Governor in terms of section 4 (a) of these regulations.

Candidates who have obtained an Honours Degree at a British University are exempted from sitting for the qualifying literary examination.

3. The qualifying literary examination will be the Navy, Army, and Air Force Entrance Examination, which will be held concurrently in London and Colombo. The examination will begin on June 27, 1939.

4. **Method of Application.**—(a) Candidates must obtain the permission of the Governor before they can become eligible to sit at the examination. Application, on forms which can be obtained from the Chief Secretary's Office, must be sent in time for delivery to the Chief Secretary not later than January 31, 1939. No applications received after that date will be considered.

(b) On the forms supplied the candidate must fill in full particulars regarding his career and qualifications. He must name on the form two referees who can answer from personal knowledge for his character and ability. He must also obtain a certificate from a qualified medical practitioner giving his height and chest measurement. Any special remarks as to physical development, &c., should be made in the appropriate cage of the form of application.

The form when completed should be sent to the Chief Secretary's Office accompanied by the following documents (with copies):—

- (i.) birth certificate (or a certified copy).
- (ii.) the educational certificate required by section 5 (v).
- (iii.) testimonials (not more than six), including those from schools.
- (iv.) certificates from referees. These should not be seen by the candidates and should be enclosed in a sealed envelope. The testimonials referred to in (iii.) above can also be sent in this way if the candidate so desires.

The original documents will be returned, copies being retained in the Secretariat.

(c) Applications from candidates already in Government Service should be forwarded through the Heads of the Departments in which they are serving.

5. **Conditions of Eligibility.**—Every candidate must possess the following qualifications:—

- (i.) He must be a natural-born British subject.
- (ii.) His permanent home must be in Ceylon.
- (iii.) He must have been educated either in Ceylon or in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.
- (iv.) He must have been born not later than August 1, 1920, and not earlier than August 1, 1913.
- (v.) He must have passed the Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science of the University of London or any examination which the Chief Secretary may hold to be equivalent, provided that in the case of a Sub-Inspector or an Inspector in the Ceylon Police who joined the Force prior to October 1, 1937, the educational standard will be the London Matriculation Examination or the Cambridge Senior Examination with exemption from the London Matriculation.
- (vi.) He must be of good character.
- (vii.) He must be unmarried.
- (viii.) He must be of sound constitution, and physically fit for service in any part of the Island.
- (ix.) His minimum eye-sight must be 6/6 and 6/12, and colour vision must be normal. A candidate who requires the use of glasses will not be eligible.

Note.—No person will be deemed eligible as a candidate for examination who has not furnished satisfactory proof that he possesses all the qualifications set forth above.

6. **Permission to sit at the Examination.**—Candidates who have complied with the above instructions will be informed in due course whether they have been granted permission to sit at the examination. The grant of such permission will be at the absolute discretion of the Governor and he will not be prepared to give reasons for his decision on any application.

7. **Selection after the Examination.**—Qualification in the literary examination will not in itself imply that a candidate will be ultimately selected for appointment. Candidates who have qualified in the literary examination and candidates from a British University with an Honours Degree who have been exempted from undergoing the qualifying examination will be required to appear before a Selection Board at their own expense.

Those candidates will be selected who appear to the Governor to be most suitable on grounds of character, personal fitness, general education, and subsequent training and experience (if any).

The selection of the candidate will be at the absolute discretion of the Governor and he will not be prepared to give reasons for his decision on any application. Any attempt to interview any public servant or any member of the Selection Board on behalf of any candidate will render the candidate liable to disqualification.

8. **Reserve List.**—When a candidate has been selected to fill an existing vacancy, it will be at the discretion of the Governor to place certain of the unsuccessful candidates who have qualified in the literary examination on a reserve list. From this list candidates will be selected to fill any further vacancies that may occur during the course of the year 1939. No indication can be given, however, as to the possible occurrence of such vacancies.

9. **Medical Examination.**—Selected candidates will be required to undergo a medical examination as to physical fitness for service as a Police Officer in any part of the Island. No candidate will be finally selected who does not pass this medical examination.

10. **Scheme of Examination.**—The following are the subjects of the qualifying examination:—

Candidates may not offer more than two subjects in Part II. They must offer English and General Knowledge in Part I.

Except as provided below in the case of foreign languages no candidate may offer similar subjects in Parts I. and II. That is to say, a candidate taking Physics-plus-Chemistry or Biology may not offer Everyday Science; a candidate taking Lower or Higher Mathematics may not offer Elementary Mathematics; and a candidate taking Modern History may not offer British History. A candidate may not offer the same language in Part I. and Part II. nor may he offer more than two foreign languages, ancient, or modern, in all.

Any one of the following modern languages may be offered in Part I.: French, German, Italian, Spanish, Russian.

In addition to the above-named subjects, a candidate may take either freehand drawing or geometrical drawing, each of which carries 50 marks.

Successful candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the whole examination as to satisfy the examiners.

Fee.—Each candidate who sits for the examination should pay a fee of £5, which amount is due to the Civil Service Commissioners, and an additional local fee of Rs. 20 to meet the cost of supervision and other incidental expenses in connection with the examination. Instructions with regard to the manner in which the fee is to be paid will be sent with the Order for Admission to the examination which, together with a Time Table, will be forwarded in time to reach candidates about a fortnight before the examination.

11. The present establishment of the Ceylon Police Force is given below:—

- 41 Superintendents, Assistant Superintendents, and Probationers.

Note.—Every Ceylonese Probationer will be subject to any regulations concerning Probationers (not inconsistent with this paper) which may from time to time be made by the Ceylon Government, including regulations as to examinations in vernacular languages, riding test, &c.

Any probationer who may fail to pass the prescribed examinations within four years, or may be found unfit for police duties, will be liable to removal from the service.

Before an officer's salary reaches Rs. 4,200 per annum, and again before it reaches Rs. 4,800 per annum, Rs. 6,900 per annum, and Rs. 10,500 per annum, there is a strict efficiency bar; an officer will not be permitted to draw further increments beyond this bar unless his service is thoroughly satisfactory in every respect, and until he has shown sufficient ability, initiative and promise to justify the expectation that he will be fully capable of carrying out efficiently and will accept the further responsibility of his new rank.

Pension.

Subject to the exceptions and provisions contained in the Government Pension Minute, pension may be paid as follows to officers who retire from Service owing to ill-health on being condemned by a Medical Board or on attaining the age of 55 years:—

- (a) After 10 years' service, one quarter of the officer's salary.
- (b) 1/720th of the officer's salary is added for each additional month's service.
- (c) The maximum amount payable is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the salary which can be drawn after 35 years' service.

Note.—(i.) If an officer retires before the completion of 10 years' service on being condemned by a Medical Board, he may be granted a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/12th of a month's salary for each month of service.

(ii.) If an officer confirmed in a pensionable post dies while in service after the completion of 5 years' service (which may include service in any territory under His Majesty's protection) his dependant or dependants may be paid, with the approval of His Excellency the Governor, a gratuity not exceeding one year's pensionable emoluments.

Widows' and Orphans' Pension Fund.

An officer's widow and orphans are eligible for a pension from the Widows' and Orphans' Pension Fund to which every officer contributes monthly 4 per cent. of his salary from the date of confirmation.

II.—The Syllabus for the 1939 Examination will be similar to the Syllabus of the Examination for the year 1938.

SYLLABUS OF THE NAVY, ARMY, AND AIR FORCE ENTRANCE EXAMINATION, 1938.

1. **ENGLISH:** The tests in English will be designed to value understanding and command of the language. No essay will be asked for.

Précis.—A passage will usually be set for summary or précis. Limits may be prescribed for the number of words that the summary or précis should contain. Failure to keep within the prescribed limits will entail loss of marks. It is useful for the candidate to have some idea of the number of words he is accustomed to write on a foolscap page.

Handwriting.—In English, and in every other subject deductions for handwriting which is at all difficult to read will be made up to 20 per cent. of the maximum mark. An officer in the field may have to write under great difficulties, and his report may have to be read in a poor light by another officer tired out by a long day's work. If communications are to take place accurately in those circumstances, it is essential that under mere examination conditions the handwriting should be absolutely legible. Accordingly, perfection of legibility is the criterion; no preference will be accorded on other grounds to any particular style of handwriting.

Spelling.—In English, and in every other subject, deductions for bad English spelling will be made up to 10 per cent. of the maximum mark. A spelling recognized by any standard dictionary is accepted as correct.

Command of the English language is taken into account in all subjects.

2. **GENERAL KNOWLEDGE:** The questions in General Knowledge will be designed to test the knowledge and interest of candidates (1) in the more important topics of the day, (2) in literary, geographical and other questions.

4A. **MODERN LANGUAGE:** The test will include translation from the foreign language; set composition (in which an English passage is given to be put into the foreign language), and free composition (in which the candidates write in their own words on a prescribed subject). The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English.

For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

4B. **BRITISH HISTORY:** British History from 1714 to the present time. Attention will be confined to the great men and the great events, the great changes and the great movements, and the broad features of the general life. So much knowledge of foreign history is desirable as is necessary in order to understand the action of this country abroad and the action of other countries upon this country, and the knowledge of geography necessary for the comprehension of history will be tested.

4C. **ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS: 1.** Arithmetic, including problems about money, imperial and metric weights and measures, mensuration, percentages, and averages.

Knowledge of recurring decimals, scales of notation, stocks and shares, foreign exchange, and true discount is not required. Contracted methods are not required; when an approximate result is required candidates may work with all the figures supplied or make legitimate discards at any stage. The arithmetical rules for square and cube root are not required.

An arithmetical result may be asked for to a certain approximation, or the data may themselves be only approximate. In such a case, to give the result to a greater degree of accuracy than is asked for or is justified by the data will entail loss of marks. Candidates are expected to understand such phrases as "three significant figures", "four-figure accuracy".

2. A sound appreciation of the following geometry will be expected, but proofs will not be asked for:—

Properties of angles at a point, *e.g.*, that vertically opposite angles are equal. Congruence properties of triangles, *i.e.*, the nature and number of the conditions that determine a triangle. The conditions of similarity of two triangles, *i.e.*, the conditions which determine the shape of a triangle. The following plane loci: the locus of a point equidistant from two fixed points, and the locus of a point within a given angle at equal perpendicular distances from the arms of the angle. The condition of the parallelism of two straight lines, in its various forms. Proportion properties of parallels, the treatment of incommensurables not being required. Perimeter and area of a circle. Surface-areas and volumes of prisms, cylinders, pyramids, cones, with such simple problems on these figures as can be solved by the geometrical properties mentioned in this and the next paragraph. Surface-area and volume of a sphere. The representation of the simplest three-dimensional figures by means of plan and elevation.

3. Of the following geometry a sound appreciation will be expected, and proofs may be asked for. Candidates may base their proofs on the properties mentioned in the preceding paragraph or on other grounds:—

The angle-sum property of a triangle. Properties of the parallelogram. Solution of right-angled triangles by drawing and by the use of tables of trigonometrical functions. Pythagoras' theorem and the converse. Areas of triangles, quadrilaterals, &c. Simple properties associated with symmetry. Simple properties of circles, *viz.*, angle properties, rectangle properties, properties of chords and tangents. Similar figures. Measurements suitable for determining the position of a point in a plane, or in space. Measurement of the angle between two planes, and between a line and a plane.

4. Algebraic calculation in connection with the above geometry and with other problems, including: the expression of an arithmetical generalization in a formula, the interpretation of a formula, evaluation of a formula for numerical values of its variables; linear and quadratic equations with numerical coefficients; simple instances of varying magnitudes, statistical and mathematical, treated by means of graphs and otherwise; inversion of a formula (or change of the subject of a formula); use of logarithms; gradient of a graph.

A knowledge of algebraic square root and the theory and use of negative and fractional indices will not be expected. Questions will not be set upon lowest common multiple or highest common factor. Little skill is expected in algebraic manipulation, as, for instance, in long multiplication and division, factorization, transformation of expressions, identities, inequalities, and the simplification of fractions; only such manipulation will be expected as arises naturally out of simple problems.

5. *Mode of Treatment.*—Grasp of elementary principles and readiness in practical application will be looked for. Numerical results should be worked out to a few significant figures. Candidates may be required to apply rough checks of the accuracy of particular results; they may also save themselves from blunders

by applying checks even when not demanded. No great skill in the use of drawing instruments will be expected, but slovenly work will entail loss of marks.

Credit will be given for the clearness and aptness of the language of the answers; deductions will be made for obscurity or slovenliness, and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words or phrases. The use of mathematical symbols and of well-established abbreviations like lb. and cm. is permissible; a calculation can often be exhibited quite clearly without the use of words, and a tabular form is often appropriate; but incomplete sentences such as are appropriate in telegrams will involve loss of marks.

There will be no laboratory test.

4D. EVERYDAY SCIENCE: The questions will be on matters mainly physical, chemical, biological, hygienic. Such knowledge will be expected as a boy is likely to possess who has studied the subject intelligently at school up to the age of 16 and has kept his eyes open. A liberal choice of questions will be given.

There will be no laboratory test.

5. LATIN: Translation and prose composition. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English.

6. GREEK: As for Latin.

7. FRENCH: Translation from French; set composition; free composition; conversation. The candidates' translation must not only show that they understand the original; it must also be expressed in good English. The oral test will carry 75 marks.

8. GERMAN: As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

9. MODERN HISTORY: British history, including British colonial history, from 1660 to the present day, together with European history during the same period. European history will be treated mainly as affecting British history, and with special reference to the following subjects:—Decline of the power of Holland. The ambitions of Louis XIV. The rivalry of England and France for colonial empire in India and America. Frederick the Great and the rise of Prussia. The French Revolution and the First Empire. The unification of Italy. Bismarck and the Union of Germany. The action of Russia in the Near East, Middle East, and Far East. The causes and results of the Great War (1914–1918).

Although a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached. Such knowledge of geography as is necessary to make the history comprehensible will be required.

All questions, whether relating to European or to British history, will deal with the broad outlines of the subject and no more knowledge of detail will be expected than is necessary for the comprehension of the outlines.

Mathematics. Subjects 10, 11.—Credit will be given for the clearness and aptness of the language of the answers; deductions will be made for obscurity or slovenliness, and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words or phrases. The use of mathematical symbols and of well-established abbreviations like lb. and cm. is permissible; a calculation can often be exhibited quite clearly without the use of words, and a tabular form is often appropriate; but incomplete sentences such as are customary in telegrams will involve loss of marks.

10. LOWER MATHEMATICS: *Arithmetic.*—Arithmetic, including simple methods of dealing with statistical data.

The mensuration of plane areas and simple solid bodies. The use of callipers, vernier and other simple measuring instruments. The determination of area, volume, and density by displacement, by weighing, &c.

Geometry.—The substance of Euclid's six books. Elementary ideas in solid geometry treated informally: straight lines, planes, rectangular blocks, wedges, pyramids, cylinders, cones, and spheres. The construction of plans and elevations.

Algebra.—Formulas, their evaluation and transformation; the notion of a function; rate of change. The gradient and area of a graph. The solution of equations, linear and quadratic, simple and simultaneous. The use of logarithms; the meaning and simplest properties of negative and fractional indices. Arithmetical and finite geometrical sequences.

Trigonometry.—Solution of plane triangles; graphs of trigonometrical functions; use of four-figure tables; addition theorems.

Mechanics.—The lever, the inclined plane, the pulley, the balance and other simple machines; the composition and resolution of forces in one plane; moments; simple graphical methods; simple cases of equilibrium; properties of the centre of gravity; work; velocity ratio, mechanical advantage, and efficiency of a machine.

The composition and resolution of velocities and acceleration in one plane; rectilinear motion under uniform acceleration; the conservation of linear momentum; work, energy and power; graphical treatment of varying velocities, accelerations and forces.

Proofs of the parallelogram and triangle of forces, and of the principle of moments will not be asked for. Questions will not be set on curvilinear motion.

General.—In the absence of special instructions that a question is to be answered by a particular method, candidates are at liberty to choose their method from any branch of mathematics.

11. HIGHER MATHEMATICS: Includes Lower Mathematics, together with:—

Geometry.—Elements of solid geometrical drawing. Equations to the straight line, circle, ellipse, parabola, hyperbola, and other simple curves, in rectangular co-ordinates. Acquaintance is expected only with the simplest theorems about the curves. Candidates are free to use the methods of the infinitesimal calculus.

Algebra.—Elementary knowledge of the use of indeterminate coefficients, especially with partial fractions. Easy computation, including the numerical solution of equations.

Calculus.—Differentiation and integration of simple standard forms and other forms depending on them; application to easy geometrical, mechanical, and physical problems; to turning values, and to the expansion of simple algebraic and trigonometrical functions. A working knowledge (without rigorous fundamental demonstrations) of the elementary infinite series for $(1+x)^m$, e^x , $\log_e(1+x)$, and their use in approximate calculations.

Mechanics.—The equilibrium of bodies in two dimensions; link polygons. Harmonic motion. Simple and conical pendulums. Projectiles. Simple cases of linked mechanisms. The rotation of a rigid body about a fixed axis. The action of such mechanical devices as crank mechanisms, engine governors, cranes, brakes.

General.—In Higher Mathematics more analytical skill will be expected than in the earlier stage. In the absence of special instructions that a question is to be answered by a particular method, candidates are at liberty to choose their method from any branch of mathematics.

Science. Subjects 12, 13.—There will be no laboratory test in Physics-plus-Chemistry or Biology as a part of the examination.

In the valuation of candidates' work in these subjects credit will be given for lucidity, orderly development, and aptness of language; deductions will be made for incoherence, irrelevance, obscurity, slovenliness of expression and especially for bad grammar and the incorrect use of words and phrases. Chemical symbols must be restricted to their proper function and not used as shorthand symbols for the names of the substances.

12. PHYSICS-PLUS-CHEMISTRY.—Two question papers will be set. One paper will be two-thirds Electricity and one-third Chemistry, and the other paper two-thirds Physics other than Electricity and one-third Chemistry. In each paper candidates will be required to answer a question in Chemistry in order to obtain full credit.

Electricity.—The fundamental ideas concerning electric currents, difference of potential, resistance; construction and mode of action of the commoner primary batteries. The fundamental laws of electrolysis, and their application in secondary cells and electro-plating. Heating effect of a current: its application in incandescent and arc lamps, electric welding, cooking, &c. The phenomena of permanent and induced magnetism in iron; fields of magnetic force; the magnetic field associated with an electric current. The construction and action of an electro-magnet; application in electric bells and telephones. The simpler phenomena of electro-magnetic induction; broad principles and applications of the induction coil, magneto, dynamo, and motor. The fundamental ideas concerning wireless telegraphy. The simpler methods of measuring electric current, difference of potential, and resistance; practical definitions of ampere, volt, and ohm. Ohm's law. Construction and mode of action of simple measuring instruments; electric transmission of power by direct current; joule, watt, Board of Trade unit of electric energy.

Physics other than Electricity.—General: Principles of measurement. Solids, liquids, and gases.

Hydrostatics: Fluid pressure; floating bodies. Determination of specific gravity. Gaseous pressure. Boyle's law. Atmospheric pressure; barometers. Air and water pumps and other simple instruments.

Heat: Temperature; thermometers. Specific heat, latent heat, calorimeters. Expansion; measurement and simple illustrations. Transmission of heat; convection, conduction, and radiation; application to heating and ventilating. Vaporization; distillation; humidity, fog and cloud. Heat considered as energy; mechanical equivalent. Generation of heat; calorific values.

Optics: Transmission, reflexion, refraction of light. Prisms and lenses; the formation of images. Construction of simple telescopes and microscopes. The eye; spectacles. Intensity; principles of illumination; photometry. Dispersion; spectroscopes; colour.

Chemistry.—General Chemistry: Elements, compounds and mixtures. Laws of chemical combination. Equivalents, molecular and atomic weights. Structural formulae and valency. Outlines of the properties of solutions. Heat of reaction.

Inorganic Chemistry: The chemical properties of oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, chlorine, carbon, sulphur, phosphorus, and their common compounds.

The general characteristics and behaviour of the metals potassium, calcium, aluminium, copper, zinc, mercury, tin, lead and iron.

The preparation (without technical details) and uses of chemicals of industrial importance, such as oxygen, soda, sulphuric acid, coal gas, and of the more important metals.

Organic Chemistry: Outlines of the chemistry of the simple compounds of carbon, containing not more than two carbon atoms directly connected. An elementary knowledge of the properties of benzene and its simpler derivatives. The part played by carbon compounds in the life of animals and plants; fats, soap, starch and sugars, treated descriptively. Carbon compounds as sources of energy.

In Chemistry a choice of questions will be given so that full marks may be scored without a knowledge of organic chemistry.

13. **BIOLOGY:** 1. The contrast, with respect to energy, between living creatures and lifeless matter; the broad differences between plants and animals; respiration; anabolism and katabolism.

The main types of nutrition and their place in the economy of living nature; nitrifying and nitrogen-fixing organisms, plants, grazing animals; the essential constituents of human food.

Asexual and sexual reproduction as illustrated by yeast, common mould, a fern, and the flowering plant (*e.g.*, buttercup). The broad features of the development of the flowering plant (*e.g.*, bean) from the seed.

The interaction between plant and animal life as illustrated in simple cases.

2. A fuller treatment of the growth of plants; experiments upon germination, observations of the structure of seeds and bulbs, the characters of buds.

Comparison of the eggs of an animal (*e.g.*, the fowl, the frog) with seeds. The more obvious features of the development of the frog from the ovum to the end of larval life.

3. A fuller treatment of the physiology of the flowering plant. The chief ingredients of soil and their properties; main types of soil. The work of earth-worms, soil bacteria and protozoa. Relations between plants and soil; arrangements subserving the absorption of water by roots and loss by leaves.

Experiments upon the influence of light upon growth; respiration and assimilation; the structure and functions of the green leaf. Food reserves.

The main points in human physiology brought out by comparison and contrast with the physiology of the flowering plant.

4. A fuller treatment of the reproduction of the flowering plant. The chief features in the structure of flowers; pollination and cross-pollination and the means by which these are effected; fruiting, and the main types of fruits; seed-dispersal.

5. The broad features of the economy of the more important food-plants; the rotation of crops; the relation of crops to the needs of horses and of animals used for food.

6. The evidence for the doctrine of biogenesis, and for the connection of micro-organisms with putrefaction disease, &c.

7. The candidate should study some or all of the following types in illustration of the subject:—

Saccharomyces and bacteria; mucor and penicillium or eurotium; a unicellular green plant, *e.g.*, chlamydomonas or haematococcus or protococcus (a comparison of its nutrition with that of plants without chlorophyll); spirogyra, volvox, a moss, *e.g.*, funaria, a fern (a knowledge of the microscopical anatomy of the vegetative organs of the moss and fern is not required); flowering plants, both herbaceous and woody.

Amœba; paramecium or vorticella; monocystis; hydra; obelia; taenia (externals and life-history); lumbricus; periplaneta; honey bee (externals and life-history); aphid (externals and life-history); scyllium (skeleton); scyllium or a teleost (externals, vascular and respiratory systems); a mammal (rabbit or rat; skeleton, rabbit or dog).

FREEHAND DRAWING: There will be no deductions; candidates will be credited with all the marks gained.

There will be two tests in drawing. In the first a photograph or other representation of a landscape will be set before the candidate, who will be required to make an outline sketch of it in the style of a military panorama. The drawing should show with few lines all the important features of the landscape, so that officers using the sketch in action should be able to grasp the nature of the position and rapidly identify its landmarks. Correct proportions are essential. A conventional form of shading with oblique parallel lines may be used; but this must be strictly confined to parts of the sketch where such definition is helpful to the clearness of the whole. Roofs of buildings should be tinted with red chalk, water with blue, and roads with brown.

In the second test candidates will be asked to draw from memory some common objects, such as a chair or a saddle.

GEOMETRICAL DRAWING: The neat and accurate use of pencil, ruling pen, compass, scales, protractor, set squares. The application of geometrical drawing to simple problems in plane geometry. The construction of ordinary and diagonal scales. The setting out of words or sentences in good lettering.

The rules relating to Money Orders and Postal Orders, published in *Gazette* No. 6,408 of October 28, 1910, as last amended by rule published in *Gazette* No. 8,359 of March 18, 1938, are hereby further amended as follows:—

(1) by the insertion immediately after rule 7, of the following new rule 7A:—

“7A. (1) An inland money order may be crossed; it may be crossed generally by the addition on its face of two parallel transverse lines or of the words “and company” or any abbreviation thereof between two parallel transverse lines; it may be crossed specially by the addition on its face of the name of a banker, in which case the order shall be deemed to be crossed to that banker.

(2) An inland money order which is crossed generally may be crossed specially.

(3) A banker to whom an inland money order is crossed may again cross it specially to another banker as his agent for collection.

(4) Where an inland money order is crossed generally, a postmaster shall refuse to pay and money in respect of such money order except to a banker.

(5) Where an inland money order is crossed specially, a postmaster shall refuse to pay any money in respect of such money order except to the banker to whom it is crossed, or to his agent for collection.

(6) Where an inland money order is crossed specially to more than one banker, except when crossed to an agent for the purpose of collection, a postmaster shall refuse to pay any money in respect of such money order.”

(2) by the substitution, for rule 8, of the following new rule:—

“8. The following provisions shall apply to the payment of a Money Order otherwise than to a banker:—

(1) When a Money Order is presented for payment the person presenting the Order must give the name of the remitter, and, if required, produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Postmaster, that he is the payee of such Order or a person duly authorized by the payee to receive the amount of the Order.

(2) A receipt for the amount of the Order shall be signed by the payee, or by some person duly authorized to sign such receipt on his behalf.

(3) When an Order is made payable to a firm, company or society, the receipt shall be signed by some person duly authorized to sign on behalf of the firm, company or society as the case may be and the name of the firm, company or society shall also be stamped or written in the space set apart for the receipt in the Order. A receipt so completed shall be a valid discharge to the Postmaster-General for the amount of the Order.”

(3) by the addition, immediately after rule 8, of the following new rule 8A:—

“8A. The following provisions shall apply to the payment of a Money Order to a banker:—

(1) Money Orders payable at a Money Order Office in Ceylon may be presented for payment by a banker either at the office of payment or at the Money Order Office in Colombo or at any Office at which the payment of Money Orders presented by a banker may from time to time be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

(2) Where a Money Order is presented by or on behalf of a banker, the name of that banker written or stamped, by way of crossing or otherwise, upon the face of the Order, shall be a valid discharge to the Postmaster-General for the amount of such Order, and it shall not be necessary for such banker to give any information as to the remitter.

(3) Where a Money Order has been presented for payment by a banker and payment in respect of that Order has been made to such banker, and it is afterwards discovered that such payment should not have been made to such banker, the amount so paid may be deducted from any moneys which may thereafter become payable to such banker for or on account or in respect of Post Office Money Orders and no objection shall be taken by any banker to such deduction.”

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE INDIAN TRADING COMPANY, LIMITED.

1. The "Regulations for the management of the Company" contained in schedule "C" attached to Ordinance No. 4 of 1861, shall apply to "THE INDIAN TRADING COMPANY, LIMITED," in so far as they are not excluded or modified by the regulations below.

2. "Special resolution" has the meaning assigned thereto by the Ordinance. "Extraordinary resolution" means a resolution passed by three-fourths in number and value of such shareholders of the Company for the time being entitled to vote as may be present in person or by proxy at any meeting of which notice specifying the intention to propose such resolution has been duly given.

"Proxy" includes attorney duly constituted under a power of attorney.

3. The registered office shall be at Colombo or at such other places in Ceylon as the Directors may from time to time determine.

4. Notice of a call in respect of moneys unpaid on shares given by post or by publication in a newspaper shall be deemed sufficient.

5. The quorum for a meeting of Shareholders shall be eleven.

6. No business shall be transacted at a meeting unless there be the requisite quorum.

7. Every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share he holds up to ten, he shall have an additional vote for every complete five shares beyond the first ten.

8. The number of Directors shall not be less than five and not more than nine and two of them shall be nominated by the Managing Agents.

9. Four Directors attended in a Board Meeting shall form a quorum.

10. The minimum qualification for a Director shall be the holding in his own name of not less than twenty-five shares in the Company.

11. Directors shall be elected annually at the annual general meeting and retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.

12. If at any meeting at which election of Directors ought to take place no such election is made, the retiring Directors shall continue to act till the election takes place.

13. Any notice required to be given by the ordinance or regulations contained in schedule "C" herein adopted shall be deemed to have been duly given if published in any daily newspaper.

14. Wherever in the regulations under schedule "C" attached to Ordinance No. 4 of 1861, a printed copy of a document is referred to, a typewritten copy shall be deemed sufficient compliance.

15. The business of the Company shall be carried on by a body of Managing Agents, subject to the control and supervision of the Board of Directors.

16. The first body of Managing Agents of the Company shall be Messrs. S. Ramiah and R. M. Sellam Pillai who shall carry on business at Colombo under the name and style of Sella-Ram & Co., and their respective successors in business notwithstanding any change which may take place by the said firm are hereby appointed the Managing Agents of the Company for a term of fifty years certain and thereafter until that Company shall voluntarily resign the office or be subject to removal on palpable fraud or dishonesty found and decided by a competent Court of Justice or until they shall be removed by extraordinary resolution duly passed and of which not less than twelve calendar months notice shall be given.

17. The remuneration of the Managing Agents shall be firstly a monthly minimum of Rupees One hundred and fifty or such other increased amount sanctioned by the Directors or by the general meeting and a commission of 10 per cent. on profit or surplus of the Company and such commission shall be payable to them as soon as the accounts and balance sheet of the Company have been audited and passed in the general meeting.

19. Improvements in tea rolling machines.

Abstract.—The inventors describe a door operating mechanism for a tea rolling table as follows:—

The discharge door which is preferably conical in shape is screwed to a spindle which passes through a slide pivoted at the end of a long bent lever A. Interposed between the door and the slide block is a compressed spring

D extensible to a maximum allowed by a stop on the spindle itself. The slide block carries bosses which through the medium of links actuate plungers. These plungers enter housings mounted around the opening in the table and keep the door in the locked position. The lever A is pivoted at the bend near its centre by means of a horizontal pin E to the end of a lever B which is itself pivoted about a vertical stud F screwed to the underside of the table at its periphery. A handwheel mounted on B actuates a screwed spindle which engages a pivoted nut at the end of lever A remote from the door.

When it is desired to open the door, the handwheel is turned in one direction thereby making lever A move about E and depressing the end attached to the door; this enables spring D to expand and move the slide block which withdraws the plungers from their housings. Further rotation of the handwheel lowers the door completely. The whole mechanism comprising levers A and B, associated links, &c. may now be swung about F so that the door is clear of the opening.

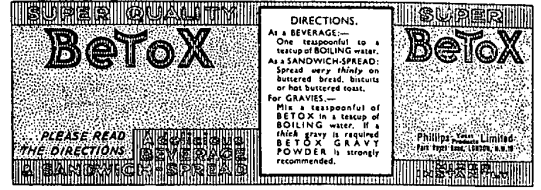
