REGULATION made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by sections 8, 9, and 10 of the Forest Ordinance, 1907.

REGULATION.

The regulations published in *Gazette* No. 8,213 of April 17, 1936, are hereby amended as follows :—

(1) by the substitution, for regulation 9 thereof, of the following new regulation :—

" 9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Conservator of Forests to authorize free grants of timber or other forest produce from any reserved forest in the following cases, if the removal of such timber or forest produce does not interfere with the silvicultural requirements of the forest :—

where
(a) Where the timber or other forest produce is required by the Forest Department for the construction or maintenance of any building, bridge, fence, or road under its management and control, or for the preparation of specimens of timber or for other similar purposes.

(b) Where the timber or other forest produce is required by the Survey Department for the purpose of putting up camps and erecting stages in connection with surveys, provided that no valuable (scheduled) timber is used for such purpose.

(c) Where the timber or other forest produce is required for works of public utility, in the construction or maintenance of which no contractor or other middleman is engaged with a view to profit, if other species of timber suitable for the purpose are not available in any other forest within a reasonable distance : provided that no free grant of timber shall be made to any District Road Committee, Village Committee, Education Committee, or other public body to which an annual grant is made from the public revenue, or to any school or other public institution maintained by the Government or for the maintenance of which a contribution is made from public revenue.

(2) Where any reserved forest is being managed with the approval of the Executive Committee as a forest intended mainly to meet the timber requirements of the villagers of a specified area, it shall be lawful for the Conservator of Forests in his discretion to authorize free grants of timber and forest produce from such reserved forest to indigent or distressed resident villagers, for the construction of village huts or well-sweeps or of fences and cattle pens and the like for domestic or agricultural purposes.

(3) The permit authorizing the issue of a free grant under this regulation shall be substantially in the Form ' I ' set out in the schedule hereto".

- No trees whatever shall be felled unless previously stamped with the Forest Department hammer, and numbered by a Forest Officer.
- Before any timber is removed from the forest it shall be shown to a Forest Officer, and this permit produced in order to enable him to endorse on it the dimensions of the timber to be removed.
- No felling, sawing, or removal shall take place after the expiry of this permit unless duly extended by the Divisional Forest Officer.
- A permit holder requiring such extension shall present this permit to the Range Forest Officer before expiry, and ask him to forward it with his recommendation to the Divisional Forest Officer.
- This permit shall be produced for examination when asked for by any Forest Officer.
- This permit shall be returned to the Divisional or Range Forest Officer within 2 days of its expiry.
- On any breach of the above conditions the permit holder will be liable to penalties under the Forest Ordinance

“ (c) Every aircraft in flight or in process of manoeuvring near the surface of the water shall as far as possible keep clear of all vessels and avoid impeding the navigation thereof.”

(3) The following paragraph shall be inserted after paragraph 50 :—

“ 50A.—(1) The person in charge of an aircraft flying along an international air traffic route or on a regular line or service of public air transport shall—

(a) before the aircraft commences any flight, procure such information as will enable him to acquire knowledge of the general meteorological situation and of the way in which it is developing ; and

(b) immediately before the departure of the aircraft on any flight ascertain, from such information as may be available at the aerodrome or other place of departure, what are the meteorological conditions anticipated along the routes he may follow for the period during which the aircraft will be flying and what are the latest observed

meteorological conditions at places along such routes or at places so near to such routes as to render the meteorological conditions existing at those places significant for the purpose of the intended flight.

(2) If at any aerodrome from which an aircraft to which this paragraph relates is about to depart a forecasting service is in operation, the person in charge of the aircraft shall, for the purposes of sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) of sub-paragraph (1) of this paragraph, consult personally the meteorologist employed on that service if he is available."

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting held on November 11, 1938, copies thereof having been furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed.
2. To submit the draft Budget for 1939 as approved by the Four Standing Committees.—Submitted.
3. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment of October 28, 1938:—

“Considered papers relating to the recovery of Electricity dues and the question of deposits made by consumers.—Recommended that in future the deposit required from a consumer should be equivalent to the cost of the monthly average consumption of current during the preceding six months, and that the Chairman be authorized to demand increased deposits accordingly wherever necessary.”

With regard to item B (1) it was resolved that consideration be deferred and that further particulars be obtained in the meantime from the Ceylon Hardware Stores who had submitted a tender for Rs. 150.

With regard to item B (2) it was resolved to accept the tender of the Ceylon Hardware Stores at Rs. 11 per cwt. for both 4 in. and 5 in. piping.

With regard to item B (3) it was resolved to accept the tender of the Ceylon Hardware Stores at Rs. 19 per cwt. for both 4 in. and 8 in. collars.

With regard to item C (4) it was resolved as regards rapid hardening cement, to accept the tender of M. A. Rahim at Rs. 11 per barrel.

The recommendations of the Tender Board with regard to all the remaining items under A, B, and C were adopted.

8. To approve the payment from the current year's vote of a sum of Rs. 250 being the second half-yearly contribution to the Galle Child Welfare Association for the year 1937 (Audit Query No. 40 I.M. of September 30, 1938).—Resolved that the payment be approved.

9. To sanction the following supplemental votes:—(a) Rs. 40 under Head 19, Overtime; (b) Rs. 180·34 under Head 69 (b), expenses in connection with the Water Works Survey by Mr. A. H. Nathanielsz.—Sanctioned.

10. To consider the case of Mr. Hamilton de Silva, Inspector of Works.

The Chairman moved Council into Committee to consider this item.

Council in Committee—

The Chairman read out to the Meeting his findings on the enquiry held by him into the allegations of bribery, &c., made by the five contractors, the charges which had been framed against Mr. de Silva, and his reply thereto, and after some discussion it was resolved that the matter be postponed for consideration at the next meeting so that all Members may have the opportunity of perusing the file of papers on the subject.

Council then resumed, and the Chairman moved that the above resolution of the Council in Committee be adopted.—Carried.

11. At this stage the Chairman made a statement with regard to the Accountant, Mr. S. M. Haniffa, and informed the Members that he had suspended Mr. Haniffa from duty as he had sanctioned a prosecution against him for temporary misappropriation of moneys which had been paid to him to be credited to Municipal Funds. The case was now pending in the Police Court of Galle.

12. To fix a date for the next General Meeting of the Council:—Agreed that the next General Meeting be held on Friday, January 20, 1939, at 2.30 P.M.

Albert Gödel. Crushing rolls adapted to the granulation of coals, without production of dust.

Abstract.—The invention is for an improved crusher for breaking up coal or charcoal into granules without producing much dust. According to the invention two cylindrical crusher rolls are employed, the top one having grooves which are longitudinal or set at a very small angle with the generators of the cylinder, and the bottom one having grooves set perpendicular or nearly perpendicular to the generators. The distance apart of the cylinders is adjustable to suit requirements. The inventor states that with such an appliance the fine dust produced is about 10 per cent whereas with existing machines is about 35 per cent. The machine is particularly useful for the granulation of coconut charcoal.

Improvements in or relating to the production of textile "ply" yarns or threads.

Abstract.—The object of this invention is to equalize the tension of the threads when forming ply yarn. As the component threads are run together from the yarn packages on to the holder on which they are finally wound for weaving (such as a shuttle pirn), they are subjected to the yielding drag offered by a grooved disc which acts on them collectively and individually.

The disc, which has a groove on its periphery, is also provided with a grooved collar over which passes an adjustable weight. Each of component threads passes once round the disc and frictionally engage it, while collectively they rotate it. After passing the disc the yarns pass over a light pulley carried by a resilient wire (which takes up any slack in the threads) and to a spring tension disc before passing on to the holder. The weight on the grooved collar can be so adjusted that if one thread breaks, the resistance offered by the disc causes the others to break.

Time might be wasted in winding from a yarn cop to the pirn owing to the frequent stoppages. It would be more economical to first form a large package of component threads from several yarn cops. Such a package may be a bottle bobbin wound with a taper wind. The ply yarn

is then unwound "overend" and rewound on the shuttle pirn by being passed through the tensioning and equalising device described above.
