INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.
Open Competition of 1939.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service will be held in London in 1939. The *vivâ voce* tests will probably begin towards the end of June and the written examination will begin early in July.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination has not yet been decided.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 11th April, 1939, an application in the candidate's own handwriting on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an Application Form or a letter respecting such Form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office Certificate of Posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk. A fee of £2, being an instalment of the prescribed fee of £8, must accompany the Application Form; this instalment is not returnable in any circumstances.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W1. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

The Time Table of the written part of the examination will probably be posted early in June to the address given on the Form of Application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend. Candidates will be notified at the same time of the date and place fixed for the *vivâ voce* test and of the manner in which the balance (£6) of the prescribed fee of £8 is to be paid.

NOTE.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following Services, viz. :—

- Burma Civil Service (Class I);
- Ceylon Civil Service;
- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service;

should be held in 1939 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Indian Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, etc., will be admitted to compete for any two or more of these Services, subject to the following conditions :—

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for one or more of the following Services, viz., Indian Civil Service, Burma Civil Service, Ceylon Civil Service, as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma or Ceylon Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or Burma Service (or both) as well as for the Ceylon Service will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma Service or on the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Burma Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for any two or more of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8, of which £2 will be payable on application for permission to attend the examination and the balance (£6) on admission to the examination.

Note 1.—This form is to be filled up in the candidate's own handwriting and returned to the Secretary (C. Room 19), Civil Service Commission, 6, Burlington Gardens, London, W.1, in time for delivery on or before 11th April, 1939. No Application Form received after that date will be accepted.

A candidate who fills up and returns this Application Form and does not receive an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should inform the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

Note 2.—Candidates should, by consulting the regulations, make certain that they are eligible to compete for the services for which they make application, and that their selection of subjects conforms with the regulations. The Commissioners do not undertake to scrutinize before the examination the information which is given on this sheet.

Note 3.—Women candidates are eligible to compete for the Home Civil Service only.

The competition for the Ceylon Civil Service is confined on this occasion to candidates who are either of pure Ceylonese descent or of mixed European and Ceylonese descent.

Note 4.—Should any of the particulars furnished by candidates be found to be false within their knowledge they will, if appointed, be liable to be dismissed; and, if otherwise entitled to Superannuation Allowance they will forfeit all claim thereto. The wilful suppression of any material fact will be similarly penalized.

Procedure.

Immediately the results of the examination are known, all successful candidates will be summoned to attend at the Civil Service Commission to be medically examined and to state their choice among the Services open to them and among the various Departments, Provinces, etc. That statement of choice is irrevocable.

Evidence of Age.

Except as indicated below, birth certificates should not be sent in with this form, but should be kept available for production when required.

A European or Anglo-Indian or Anglo-Burman born in India or Burma may produce as alternative evidence of age a certificate of Baptism from the district in which he was baptized, stating the date of birth.

Other candidates domiciled in India or Burma who are unable to produce certificates of birth or certificates of baptism stating the date of birth must send in with this form a certificate of nationality and age, in the case of candidates born or domiciled in India, as required by Clause 4 of the Regulations for the Indian Civil Service, and, in the case of candidates born or domiciled in Burma, as required by Clause 4 of the Regulations for the Burma Civil Service (Class I).

- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service.

- Foreign Office and Diplomatic Service.
- Consular Service and Assistant Officer Grade in the Department of Overseas Trade.

Evidence of Training.—Candidates who desire to offer any of the subjects 23, 37–51 or 53 (Physical Anthropology branch only) must send to the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, so as to arrive not later than 11th April, 1939, the evidence of training described on pages 281 and 282. Such evidence should be in the form of a certificate signed by a responsible officer of the institution. In the case of an institution not situated in the British Isles, the certificate must state that the institution in which the work has been done is authorized to prepare candidates in that subject for a degree.

SECTION A.

1. *Essay.*—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.
2. *English.*—A paper of questions to test the understanding of English and the workmanlike use of words. An optional exercise in the writing of verse will be included.
3. *Present Day.*—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, political, and scientific. A liberal choice of questions will be given.
 - Elementary Economics* (for Foreign Office and Consular Service Groups only).—Organization of production; the association of land, labour, and capital in productive enterprise; the chief types of industrial units.
 - Demand and supply; organization of distribution; value.
 - Exchange; an elementary knowledge of the theory of money and the relations of money and prices, and of the nature of banks and their functions.
 - State action; taxation; tariff policy; unemployment.
4. *Vivá Voce.*—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his (or her) career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to enable the Board to assess his suitability for each of the Services for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and alertness, his vigour and strength of character, and his potential qualities of leadership.

SECTION B.

HISTORY: Subjects 5–9.—Candidates should know something of the original authorities, and have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history.

When a fixed date is given for the beginning of the period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached; similarly, when a fixed date is given for the end of the period, candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the subsequent development of movements which continued beyond the period.

- 5, 6. *British History*.—Period 1, to 1660; Period 2, 1660 to the present day. The subject will deal with the life of the people as a whole, political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific, with the main stress on the political and economic aspects. Candidates will be expected to know so much of European history as will make the external action of this country fully intelligible and will explain those movements at home which had their beginnings abroad, e.g., the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the reactions in this country of the French Revolution. In subject 6 the outstanding incidents and movements in the history of British possessions will be included.
7. *Scottish History*.—From 1057 to 1707, with special stress on the period from 1424 to 1567.
- 8, 9. *European History*.—Period 1, from 400 to 1494; Period 2, from 1494 to 1763; Period 3, from 1763 to the present day. The political, economic, social, literary, artistic, scientific aspects will all be included. The history of the United States of America, of India, and of the Far East will be included in so far as it influences European fortunes to an important degree.
- 10, 11. *Private Law*.—Part 1, the law of real and personal property (including the law of succession). Part 2, contracts and torts. This subject is confined to English law.
12. *Jurisprudence*.—Theories as to the nature of law, including the theory of sovereignty. The sources of law and its development, with particular reference to English and Roman law. The character and classification of rights and duties (legal and equitable). The analysis of the leading conceptions employed in law.
13. *Constitutional Law*.—The constitutional law of the United Kingdom, including the relations between the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire.
14. *Roman Law*.—Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial processes. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.
15. *International Law*.—Public international law.
- 16, 17, 18. *Metaphysics*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, questions on the period from Descartes to Kant, both included. Paper 3, questions on ancient philosophy and post-Kantian philosophy; this paper will be arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to Plato and Aristotle among the ancient philosophers or to post-Kantian philosophy.
- 19, 20. *Moral Philosophy*.—Paper 1, a general problem paper. Paper 2, a paper on ancient and modern philosophy arranged in such a way that a candidate can, if he wishes, confine himself to either.
21. *Logic*.—The subject will be interpreted in a wide sense. Epistemology in its bearing on logical problems will be included, together with formal logic and scientific method. Questions may be set on mathematical logic, i.e., on the logic of mathematics, symbolic logic, and the logic of probability; and also on the history of logic. A considerable choice of questions will be given.
22. *Psychology*.—Questions on the history of the subject may be included.
23. *Experimental Psychology*.—A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank.
24. *Political Theory*.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, including the theory of the state in its relation to kindred studies such as ethics, economics, and political history. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period beginning with the French Revolution.
25. *Political Organization*.—This will include constitutional forms (representative government, federalism, etc.) and public administration, central and local. The history of institutions is not included, but candidates will be expected to know the earlier stages from which existing institutions have developed.
26. *International Relations*.—The subject includes the study of the relations both between governments and between peoples, and of the principles underlying their development; in particular, the study, in connexion with twentieth-century history, of the machinery and processes of international co-operation, including the organization and activities of the League of Nations and other international bodies. A knowledge of the original authorities will be expected.
27. *General Economics*.—Economic theory in general. Candidates will be expected to illustrate theory by facts and to analyse problems by the help of theory. The history of economic thought will be included.
28. *Industry and Trade*.—The organization of industry and trade; the economic theories and practical problems involved.
29. *Money, Banking, and Exchange*.—Systems of currency, banking, foreign exchanges; the theories and problems involved.
30. *Public Finance*.—The subject will deal with matters connected with the raising and spending of revenue and loans by Governments (central and local).
31. *Social Economics*.—The economic aspect of matters affecting labour and social welfare, including social structure and legislation, with special reference to Great Britain.
32. *Economic History*.—Questions will be set on the economic history of England up to 1700; but the main stress will be on the economic development of Great Britain since 1700. So much knowledge of developments in the other parts of the British Empire, in the Continent of Europe and in the United States of America will be expected as is necessary to the full understanding of British economic history. A wide choice of questions will be given so that full credit can be obtained by candidates who confine themselves to the period since 1700.
33. *Economic Statistics*.—Elementary methods of handling numerical data. Tabulation. Frequency distributions, averages, deviations. Graphic methods, applied to groups and to time series. Simple interpolation. Index-numbers.
- Some knowledge of the nature of the statistical data available from British sources and the principal statistical publications of the League of Nations, in relation to prices, wages, incomes, trade, transport, production, consumption, population, births, deaths, marriages, migration, and of the methods usually applied to analysis of such data.
- Elements of the mathematical theory of statistics, with special reference to economic and sociological problems. The mathematical treatment of frequency groups and of time series. The more elementary parts of the method of correlation. Sampling, and measurement of the precision of its results. Such formulas as Pareto's for income and the logarithmic curve. Application of statistical methods to the analysis of elasticity of demand and other theoretical economic concepts.
34. *Lower Pure Mathematics*.—Geometry of two and three dimensions, synthetic and analytical; a specialized knowledge of particular curves and surfaces will not be required. Descriptive geometry. The method of vectors. Algebra and trigonometry, including series, complex numbers, the numerical solution of equations. Infinitesimal calculus of real variables, including development in series, partial differentiation, multiple integrals, ordinary differential equations, with applications to geometry.
- No great skill will be expected in solving complicated problems of an elementary character. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.
35. *Lower Applied Mathematics*.—Statics, hydrostatics, dynamics, elementary theory of electricity and magnetism, including the induction of currents. The questions will be of an elementary character, but will not be confined to two dimensions; they will involve the use of the calculus. Candidates are free to use differential equations, but a knowledge thereof will not be necessary to answer the questions. Attention will be paid to problems which arise naturally and to general principles; artificial problems will be avoided. The questions will involve the use of drawing instruments.
36. *Higher Mathematics*.—

- (1) Geometry, including differential geometry.
- (2) Analysis, including the elements of the theory of functions of real and complex variables.
- (3) The calculus of observations, including probability, and the solution of differential and finite difference equations.
- (4) Mechanics, including the elementary mechanics of fluids, but excluding elastic solids, the whole being treated from a physical standpoint.
- (5) The classical theory of electricity and physical optics.
- (6) Thermodynamics. The elements of the quantum theory and the theory of relativity.

Two question papers will be set. In each of them all sections of the syllabus will be represented and in each paper the same number of questions will be set on each section. There will be no restriction on the candidate's choice of questions; he can, however, obtain full credit by confining himself to any two of the sections.

37. *Astronomy*.—General and spherical astronomy, and the elements of astrophysics, including instruments and observatory practice.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of at least 20 hours' practical training in an observatory.

NATURAL SCIENCE : *Subjects 38-49*.—The standard of the higher division of a science will be that which is required in the main subject for an honours degree at the universities. The standard for the lower division of a science will be that required in a subject subsidiary to the main subject whether required at the final degree examination or at a preceding examination.

A candidate who desires to offer a science must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in that science in an institution of university rank ; the period of training required is one academic year, whether the candidate offers the higher division of the science or the lower division or both divisions.

44. *Lower Geology*)
45. *Higher Geology*) Mineralogy will be included in each division.

50. *Engineering*.—Strength of materials ; theory of structures ; mechanism and dynamics of machines ; heat and thermodynamics ; hydraulics, including hydraulic machines ; electrical technology.

Candidates will be expected to be familiar with graphical methods and to have some skill in drawing.

A candidate who desires to offer Engineering must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

51. *Geography*.—Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany and geology. There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

52. *General Anthropology*.—The study of human cultures, notably in their simpler forms, and the analysis of such cultures into their component aspects : social organization, economics including technology, education, political systems, law, magico-religious ideas and practices, games and recreation, knowledge, language, art ; the analysis should include the common elements in human institutions, customs, and beliefs, and the specific variations characteristic of individual cultures. The application of anthropological knowledge to practical affairs : in administration and economic co-operation ; in missionary and educational work. The candidate will be expected to have some comparative knowledge of anthropological methods and of anthropological theories, including for example the concepts of evolution, diffusion, function, and the influence of environment.

53. *Special Anthropology*.—Candidates will choose between Social Anthropology and Physical Anthropology.

Social Anthropology.—The social organization of human societies, with special reference to primitive societies at various stages of development and the effect of the modern conditions of world-wide contact of races and the spread of cultural ideas upon such organization. The constitution of domestic groups, wider kinship units, local communities and tribal systems. Political organization, including problems of leadership, tribal councils, rank ; the working of law and the administration of justice. Economic organization of primary pursuits and industries ; types of distribution, exchange, consumption and land tenure. Educational methods, native and introduced, including the influence of the family ; professional and technical instruction, initiation, age-grades, apprenticeship in occupational groups. Early forms of magico-religious beliefs and ritual in their sociological aspect : ancestor-worship, totemism, conceptions of the soul, eschatology, beliefs in mana, magic, and witchcraft. Tradition, oral or written, in its influence upon the collective behaviour of the group. Apart from a general knowledge of the literature candidates will be expected to have an acquaintance, first hand or from written sources, with at least one ethnographic area.

Physical Anthropology, with which are included prehistoric archaeology and technology. Candidates will be expected to have such knowledge as may be acquired by laboratory and museum work, consisting mainly in the handling and study of specimens and exhibits. The subject will be treated with special, but not exclusive, reference to peoples of rude culture, including prehistoric civilizations.

A candidate who desires to offer Physical Anthropology must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an institution of university rank.

54. *Old and Middle English*.—Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the following works :—the principal anonymous monuments of Old English verse, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle ; the Ancrene Wisse, the Owl and the Nightingale, Havelok, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight ; and of some part of the work or works of Cynewulf, Ælfric, Layamon, Langland, Gower, Chaucer. Questions will be set relative to these works and authors, and to other matters of literary history in the period.

Questions on the history of the language will be included, but will not be compulsory.

55, 56. *English Literature*.—Period 1, 1350 to 1700 ; Period 2, from 1660. Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the works of the following authors and of their place in the history of their country :—

Questions on other writers will not be excluded, but, on the whole, the questions will be directed to the best-known authors and their best-known works. Candidates should know so much of the history as is necessary to understand the literature in its relation to other activities of the nation.

Questions will be set on the history of the language, but will not be compulsory.

57. *Welsh Civilization*.—A general knowledge of the political, social and literary history of Wales from 1100 A.D. to the present day. Candidates will also be required to show a special knowledge of the literature of the period 1350 to 1650, and of the history of the period 1700 to the present day. Candidates will be required to write some of their answers in Welsh.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND CIVILIZATIONS : *Subjects 58-90*.—Greek Literature (61) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (58), Latin Literature (65) only by those who offer Latin Translation (62), and Buddhist Civilization (90) only by those who offer Pali Language (89). In subjects 69-88 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (69), German History (72), Spanish or Italian History (75), Russian History (78), may not offer either subject 8 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 9 (European History, Period 3).

In history candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also have such a knowledge of geography as is necessary to the proper understanding of the history. In literature candidates will be expected to have a first-hand knowledge of the authors. Passages of literature may be set for comment on matters of

social, literary, and historical interest. In French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, questions on philology and the older forms of the languages will be set, but will not be compulsory. The papers in both history and literature will deal with the life of the people as a whole, literary, political, social, economic, artistic, scientific.

59. *Greek Composition*.—The paper will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition, or, if they prefer, may take some prose and some verse.

60. *Greek History*.—The main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.; but candidates will be given an opportunity of showing knowledge of the period before 510 B.C.

63. *Latin Composition*.—As for Greek.

64. *Roman History*.—The outlines of the history and development down to 180 A.D. should be known; but the main stress will be laid on the period 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

66, 67. *Classical Archaeology*.—Paper 1, Greek and Roman sculpture and architecture. Paper 2, Greek coins down to 322 B.C., Roman coins down to 98 A.D.; Greek vases; Greek and Roman painting. A considerable choice of questions will be given in each paper.

68. *French Language*.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation.

69. *French History*.—The outlines of the history prior to 1589 should be known; the period from 1589 to 1660 in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1660 to the present day.

71. *German Language*.—As for French. For German composition candidates may use either German or English characters.

72. *German History*.—In history candidates should know in outline the history of the Medieval Empire, of the growth of the German cities, of the Reformation in Germany, and of the Thirty Years War; but the main stress will be on the period from the accession of Frederick the Great to the present day.

74. *Spanish, Italian Language*.—As for French.

75. *Spanish History*.—The main stress will be on the periods from the Union of Castile and Aragon under Ferdinand and Isabella to the liberation of the Netherlands, and again from 1800 to the present day.

Italian History.—The main stress will be on the 15th century and the first half of the 16th century, and again on the period from 1789 to the present day. Sufficient should be known of the earlier period to understand the position of the Pope and the Emperor in Italy, and the rise of the towns.

77. *Russian Language*.—As for French.

78. *Russian History*.—Only the broadest outlines of the history prior to Peter the Great will be required; the period from the accession of Peter the Great to 1800 should be known in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1800 to the present day.

80. *Arabic Language*.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

81, 82. *Arabic History, Arabic Literature*.—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period from the middle of the 6th century A.D. to the middle of the 13th century A.D.

83. *Persian Language*.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be in the modern language.

84, 85. *Persian History, Persian Literature*.—The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period 1000 A.D. to 1500 A.D. Candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of the history of Persia before 1000 A.D. and from 1500 A.D. to the present time.

86. *Sanskrit Language*. (For the Indian, Burma, and Ceylon Civil Services only)—Translation, prose composition, and questions on Vedic and Sanskrit grammar. Both Vedic and classical Sanskrit passages will be set for translation; composition will be required in classical Sanskrit alone.

87, 88. *Indian History, Sanskrit Literature*. (For the Indian, Burma, and Ceylon Civil Services only)—The history of the civilization and thought of India and Sanskrit literature from the Vedic period to 1200 A.D.

89. *Pali Language*. (For the Ceylon Civil Service only)—Translation from Pali, prose composition in Pali, questions on Pali grammar.

90. *Buddhist Civilization*. (For the Ceylon Civil Service only)—Pali literature and the history of Buddhist civilization and the growth of ideas in Buddhism from the time of the Buddha to 1800 A.D. in India, Ceylon, Burma, and Siam.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

Regulations for Admission to the Indian Civil Service.

* * * The following Regulations have been made by the Secretary of State for India. They are liable to alteration from year to year.

1. An examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in the summer of each year, for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. A Candidate must be a male and either:—

(a) a British subject of European descent, or of Indian domicile or descent, whose father (if alive) is a British subject or a subject of a State in India, or (if dead) was at the time of his death either a British subject or a subject of a State in India or a person in the permanent service of the Crown or a person who had retired from that service; or

(b) * a ruler or a subject of a State in India in respect of whom a declaration has been made under section 262 (3) of the Government of India Act, 1935.

Provided that in the case of a male British subject the requirements of this rule may be waived by the Secretary of State if he is satisfied that their observance would occasion exceptional hardship, and the Candidate is so closely connected by ancestry or upbringing with His Majesty's dominions as to justify special treatment.

3.† A Candidate must have attained the age of 21 and must not have attained the age of 24 on the 1st day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

4. Candidates must be prepared to produce evidence to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that their nationality and age conform to the requirements of Clauses 2 and 3 above. A candidate who is of Indian domicile or descent, and who is not in possession of a certificate of birth or of a baptismal certificate stating the date of birth, must submit a certificate of nationality and age issued in accordance with such Instructions as the Governor-General in Council may, from time to time, prescribe, and signed, should he be resident in British India, by a Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the division within which his family resides, or, should he reside in an Indian State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.

5. Candidates who are not of European descent must have passed an examination qualifying for an Honours Degree, or an examination which in the opinion of the Secretary of State is of equivalent standard, at an approved University in the British Isles, or at an approved Institution of University rank (other than a University) in the British Isles, after residence as full time members for at least two academic years at such University or Institution, or at one of the University Colleges enumerated in the footnote‡.

* The candidate referred to in Rule 2 (b) should apply to the local Political Officer for the issue of the necessary declaration.

† For examination in 1939 a candidate would not be eligible if born before 2nd August, 1915, or after 1st August, 1918.

‡ Candidates should be careful to see that the wording of this certificate is strictly in accordance with the appropriate form laid down in the instructions published in the Government of India, Home Department Notification No. F. 266/30 Ests., dated 21st February, 1931.

§ The following is a list of Universities and University Colleges approved for the purpose of this Regulation:—Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, Birmingham, Bristol, Durham, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Reading, Sheffield, Wales, Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Glasgow, St. Andrews; The Queen's University, Belfast; Trinity College, Dublin; The National University of Ireland; University Colleges of Exeter, Hull, Leicester, Nottingham, Southampton.

A candidate who at the date of application is not qualified in this respect, but is otherwise qualified, may be admitted provisionally to the examination, but his admission will not be confirmed, and he will not be eligible for appointment to the Indian Civil Service, if he has not fulfilled the prescribed conditions on or before October 10 of the year in which the examination is held.

Candidates will be required to produce documentary evidence showing that these conditions have been fulfilled.

6. A Candidate must be free from disease, constitutional affection or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Indian Civil Service.*

7. A Candidate must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Indian Civil Service.

8. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a Probationer for the Indian Civil Service or for the Burma Civil Service (Class I), and subsequently resigned his position as a Probationer, will be admitted to the examination.

9. No person will be admitted to the examination whose employment in the Indian Civil Service would in the opinion of the Secretary of State, acting with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, be detrimental to the public interest.

10. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the Candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination.

The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of their Certificate of Qualification, institute such further enquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such enquiries in the case of any Candidate shall be unsatisfactory in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Indian Civil Service, and, if he has already been appointed to be a member of the Indian Civil Service on probation, the Secretary of State may, after consultation with the Civil Service Commissioners, forthwith remove him from the Service.

11. The examination will include the following subjects.† The numerical value is shown against each subject.

* The Civil Service Commissioners will regard no person as constitutionally fitted for appointment to the Indian Civil Service who has not been satisfactorily vaccinated within the last seven years. Probationers are required to be inoculated against enteric fever before they proceed to India on first appointment; but exemption from this requirement may be granted to any Candidate of Asiatic domicile, unless he has been continuously resident out of Asia for five years prior to the date of his appointment.

† A Syllabus defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects is sent herewith.

Pamphlets containing reprints of the question papers set at certain previous examinations for Services of the Administrative Group may be purchased either directly from the following Branches of H. Stationery Office:—York House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2; 120, George Street, Edinburgh 2; 26, York Street, Manchester 1; 1, St. Andrew's Crescent, Cardiff; 80, Chichester Street, Belfast; or through any bookseller.

12. In Section B a Candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a Candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

13. The following restrictions apply to particular subjects in Section B.

International Relations (26), may not be taken by a Candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (9), or International Law (15).

Greek Literature (61), may be taken only by Candidates who offer Greek Translation (58), and Latin Literature (65) only by those who offer Latin Translation (62).

In subjects 69 to 88 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by Candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A Candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (69), German History (72), Spanish or Italian History (75), Russian History (78), may not offer either subject 8 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 9 (European History, Period 3).

14. A Candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (23), or any of the subjects 38 to 49 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (37), Engineering (50), Geography (51), and the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (53), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

15. From the marks assigned to Candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

16. Moreover, Candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a further deduction of marks on that account.*

17. Candidates must obtain such a mark in the *viva voce* (subject 4) and such an aggregate of marks in the written tests as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

18. A list of the Candidates shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each Candidate, and in that order so many European Candidates and so many Candidates of Indian domicile or descent, up to the determined number of appointments for each of these groups, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination in accordance with Clause 17, shall be appointed to be members of the Indian Civil Service on probation, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any Probationer become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy shall be filled or not.

19. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the Candidate at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE (PROBATIONARY SERVICE) RULES, 1938

In exercise of the powers conferred by paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of section 247 of the Government of India Act, 1935, the Secretary of State hereby makes the following Rules:—

1. These Rules may be cited as the Indian Civil Service (Probationary Service) Rules, 1938, and shall apply to all persons appointed under Rule 2 of these Rules.

2. A person selected, either in India or in the United Kingdom, and whether or not as the result of written examination, for admission to the Indian Civil Service, shall be appointed to be a member of that Service on probation, and a person so appointed is hereinafter referred to as a "probationer."

3. Every probationer shall spend one year after appointment at one of the following Universities: The University of Oxford; the University of Cambridge, or the University of London, School of Oriental Studies.

4. Unless the Secretary of State for special reasons otherwise directs in a particular case, the whole period of probation shall be passed at the same University.

5. A probationer who fails to comply with the provisions of these Rules or to obey any order which he may receive from the Secretary of State, the Civil Service Commissioners, a Supervisor of Probationers, or any other duly constituted authority acting on behalf of the Secretary of State, or who wilfully neglects his probationary studies or is guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer of the Indian Civil Service, will be liable to removal from the Service.

The Secretary of State shall decide any question arising under this Rule, and his decision shall be final.

6. Periodical reports on the conduct and progress of probationers shall be made to the Secretary of State by the Supervisor at each University and the Secretary of State, in cases of misconduct or unsatisfactory progress, will take such disciplinary action as he may consider necessary.

7. Any communication which a probationer may be required or which he may wish to make to the India Office, or to the Civil Service Commissioners, and, in particular, all applications for permission to join an Inn of Court or to pursue an extra course of study, all communications in regard to the payment of the probationary allowance or of the overland allowance, and all applications for permission to make his own arrangements for proceeding to India, shall, if circumstances permit, be addressed in the first instance, to the Supervisor at the University where the probationer is passing his period of probation.

8. Probationers shall, at or about the end of the year of probation, undergo an examination, to be called the Final Examination. The subjects of this examination and the marks respectively obtainable for them shall be as follows:—

(i) Indian Law	600
(ii) Indian History	400
(iii) A vernacular language, or, in the case of a probationer who is not required to offer such a language, an alternative subject approved by the Civil Service Commissioners	600
(iv) Riding	200

9. (1) Each probationer shall offer for examination the vernacular language shown in Column 2 against his Province in the following table unless he is already familiar with that language or with a language closely allied to it. A probationer assigned to Madras who is familiar with one only of the languages named shall offer the other.

(2) A probationer who is not required by sub-rule (1) to offer a language named in column 2 shall offer the language, if any, named in column 3 against his province, unless he is already familiar with that language or with a language closely allied to it.

* It is notified for general information that the number of marks deducted for bad handwriting may be considerable.

(3) A probationer who is not required under the preceding sub-rules to offer a vernacular language, shall offer an alternative subject approved by the Civil Service Commissioners. The alternative subjects which may be approved for this purpose are :—

- (a) Another approved vernacular ;
- (b) A classical language selected from Sanskrit, Arabic, and Persian ;
- (c) British History ;
- (d) European History ; and
- (e) Currency, Banking and Public Finance.

Any question as to the Interpretation and application of this Rule shall be decided by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. In addition to the Final Examination in riding, probationers may be required to attend for examination in this subject at such time or times during the probationary period as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

11. Such deductions shall be made from the marks assigned to probationers at the Final Examination as the Civil Service Commissioners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

12. Probationers may be required to attend lectures in other subjects, including Hindu and Muhammadan Law, Indian Social Welfare and Public Health, besides those which are prescribed for the Final Examination.

13. The Civil Service Commissioners shall prepare a list of the probationers in order of merit as indicated by the marks awarded at the Final Examination provided that in preparing the list no account shall be taken of marks awarded to a probationer in any subject in which he has failed to satisfy the Commissioners. The seniority of probationers *inter se* shall be determined by the order in which their names appear in this list.

14. The Civil Service Commissioners may, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification referred to in the next succeeding Rule, institute, or cause to be instituted, such enquiries as they may deem necessary in respect of the nationality, age, health, character and conduct of a probationer, and if the result of such enquiries is unsatisfactory in any of the above respects, the Secretary of State may, after consultation with the Civil Service Commissioners, forthwith remove the probationer from the Indian Civil Service.

15. The probationers whose performance in the subjects of the Final Examination is such as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners, and who have also satisfied the Commissioners as to their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character and conduct during the period of probation, shall be certified by the Commissioners to be qualified for further employment in the Indian Civil Service.

16. Every probationer in respect of whom the certificate referred to in the last preceding Rule is granted shall execute a Covenant in the form annexed to these Rules and shall pay the stamp duty of one pound thereon.

17. A probationer who fails to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Indian Civil Service unless the Secretary of State shall, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, allow him to sit for re-examination in the subject or subjects in which he failed. The marks awarded to a probationer on re-examination shall not be taken into account by the Commissioners in assessing the order of merit as prescribed by Rule 13.

18. If any probationer is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending, or from completing his course of study for, the Final Examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held in the following year, or may arrange for him to be specially examined in any or all of the subjects prescribed for the Final Examination after such interval as may seem to them suitable having regard to the circumstances of the case. The marks awarded to a probationer in respect of such a special examination shall not be taken into account by the Commissioners in assessing the order of merit referred to in Rule 13.

19. A probationer who wishes to join an Inn of Court or to pursue an extra course of study, in addition to the course prescribed in these Rules, shall first obtain the permission of the Secretary of State. Permission to pursue an extra course of study will be accorded only in exceptional circumstances, and, if accorded, will be subject to review at any time.

20. (1) No salary shall be payable to a probationer in respect of his service during the probationary period, but each probationer shall receive an allowance of £300, or, if he has an Asiatic domicile, of £350.

(2) The allowance shall be payable by the High Commissioner for India in 12 monthly instalments, the first of £65 (£90 in the case of probationers with an Asiatic domicile) on appointment, and the last, of £35, after signature of the Covenant. The remainder of the allowance shall be payable in ten equal instalments of £20 (£22 10s. in the case of probationers with an Asiatic domicile). The Secretary of State may, if he thinks fit, direct the continuation of the allowance to a probationer whose Final Examination is postponed, in circumstances over which he has no control, but in no circumstances shall additional payments be made to a probationer whose departure for India is delayed on account of his failure to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination.

(3) Each probationer shall intimate to the Under Secretary of State for India, Services Department, the address to which it is desired that the instalments of his allowance should be sent.

21. On appointment, each probationer shall execute an agreement binding himself and one surety jointly and severally to refund all moneys he may have received in pursuance of these Rules in the event of :—

- (a) the refusal of the Civil Service Commissioners to issue a certificate under Rule 15 in respect of the probationer ;
- or
- (b) the failure of the probationer to execute the Covenant prescribed by these Rules and to proceed to India at the time and in the manner directed by the Secretary of State.

22. (1) A free passage to India shall be provided by the High Commissioner for India for every officer who has been directed in accordance with these Rules to report for duty in India. If such an officer elects to travel overland from London to Marseilles, he may apply for payment of the overland allowance as fixed from time to time. No baggage expenses or other allowance will be admissible.

(2) An officer who desires to make his own arrangements for proceeding to India must first satisfy the Secretary of State that he has good reasons for wishing to do so and that the arrangements which he proposes to make are suitable. He may then be granted an allowance of such amount as may be determined from time to time by the Secretary of State.

23. Nothing in the foregoing Rules shall be construed as limiting the power of the Secretary of State to remove, at any time, a probationer from the Indian Civil Service if reasons exist which, in his judgment, justify such action.

FORM OF THE COVENANT REFERRED TO IN RULE 16.

This Indenture made the _____ day of _____ in the year of our Lord 19—, between _____ (hereinafter called "the Covenantor") of the one part and the Secretary of State of the other part. Whereas the Secretary of State has appointed the Covenantor to serve His Majesty as a Member of the Civil Service of India, in the Province of _____ in the East Indies (with the option to the Government of India at any time and from time to time to require him to serve elsewhere in India), such service to continue during the pleasure of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, to be signified under the hand of the Secretary of State for India, but with liberty for the said Covenantor to resign the said service, with the previous permission of the Secretary of State or of the Government under which he may for the time being be serving. Now this Indenture witnesseth, and the said Covenantor doth hereby covenant and agree with and to the Secretary of State, in this manner and form following ; that is to say,—

Recital of the terms on which the party enters into the service.

He covenants,

For his general fidelity.

1st. That while he shall be employed in the said service he will faithfully, honestly, and diligently do all such things as shall be lawfully committed to his charge by or on the part of the Secretary of State, or of the Government in India, or in execution of his duty.

2nd. That he will perform and obey all such general rules and regulations of the Secretary of State and of the said service as shall be in force in relation to all things to be committed to his charge or to be done by him, or to any rank, office, or station in which he shall act, and will observe and obey all such orders relating to himself or his conduct as he shall receive from the Secretary of State, or the Government in India, or any person who shall have lawful authority to command him.

To obey orders of a general nature, and specially relating to the party.

3rd. That he will regularly and justly keep all accounts touching his transactions for the Government in India, and will preserve and keep all such documents, chattels, and realty as shall be committed to his charge, or as it shall be his duty to preserve and keep, and shall not wilfully obliterate, cancel, or injure, nor permit to be obliterated, cancelled, or injured, any documents, chattels, or realty belonging to His Majesty, or in the custody of any person or persons on account of the Government, and will deliver all such documents, chattels, and realty as shall be in his custody or power to any person to whom he ought to deliver the same; and on demand made by or on behalf of the Secretary of State, or of the Government in India, will deliver to such person or persons as shall be authorised to demand the same, all documents whatsoever touching any of the affairs or concerns of the Government, or anything in which he shall have been engaged as a servant in the Civil Service of India,—such delivery to be made without obliteration or concealment of any part of the books, papers, or writings to be delivered up, and notwithstanding that they may not be the property of His Majesty, or that there may be any entry or entries relating to his own affairs or those of any other person, or any other reason whatever.

To keep regular accounts, to preserve and duly deliver over chattels and realty, and to produce private accounts.

4th. That he shall not make use of or apply the property of His Majesty which he may have, for any purposes other than those for which he ought to use and apply it in the course of his said service, save and except such furniture, goods, and chattels as he may be justly entitled to the use of for his own proper accommodation.

Not to misapply or employ for improper purposes the property intrusted to his care.

5th. That he shall not nor will divulge, disclose, or make known any matter relating to the affairs or concerns of the Government in India, or relating to any matter or thing in which he may act or be concerned or which may come to his knowledge in the course of his said service which may require secrecy and which ought to be kept secret (save and except as his duty may require), unless he shall be authorised or required to disclose and make known the same by the Secretary of State, or the Government in India, or some other person or persons having competent authority for that purpose.

Not to divulge secrets.

6th. That he shall not at any time, directly or indirectly, ask, demand, accept, or receive any sum of money, or security for money, or other valuable thing or service whatsoever, or any promise or engagement by way of present, gift, or gratuity, from any person or persons with whom or on whose behalf he shall, on the part of the Government in India, have any dealings or transactions, business or concern whatsoever, or from any person or persons from whom, by law or any orders or regulations of the Secretary of State, or of any of the branches of the Government in India, he is or shall be restrained from demanding or receiving any sum of money or other valuable thing as a gift or present or under colour thereof.

Not to accept corrupt presents or make corrupt bargains.

7th. That he shall not nor will by himself, or in partnership with any other person or persons, or by the agency of any other person or persons, either as principal, factor, or agent, directly or indirectly engage, carry on, or be concerned in any trade, dealings, or transactions whatsoever.

Not to trade contrary to law or regulations.

8th. That he shall not nor will at any time return to Europe, nor remove from or leave the Province within which he shall be serving, without the previous permission of the Government in writing; and previously to any such return or removal he shall pay, satisfy, and perform all such debts, sums of money, duties, and engagements as he shall owe or be liable to perform to His Majesty or to the Government in India, or any branch or department of the same.

Not to quit India without leave, and to satisfy all debts to His Majesty before departure.

9th. That he shall and will forthwith upon his arrival at the said Province, and from time to time, so long as he shall continue in the service of His Majesty, make such payments as, under the rules and regulations which shall be in force in India, shall become due or payable by him to the Indian Civil Service Provident Fund and for pensions to his wife or children, or shall, at the option of the Secretary of State or of the Government, allow the amount of such subscriptions to be deducted out of any money due or payable by the Government to him.

To make prescribed payments towards pension, &c.

10th. That for the purpose of calculating the pay admissible to him under the time-scale this Covenant shall have effect as from the 1st day of November, 19— . Provided that pay shall be drawn only from the date of disembarkation in India, subject to his proceeding to take up his duties without avoidable delay.

Date of commencement of service for the purpose of the time-scale.

BURMA CIVIL SERVICE (CLASS I).

Open Competition of 1939.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Burma Civil Service will be held in London in 1939. The *viva voce* tests will probably begin towards the end of June and the written examination early in July.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination has not yet been decided.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 11th April, 1939, an application in the candidate's own handwriting on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an Application Form or a letter respecting such Form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office Certificate of Posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk. A fee of £2, being an instalment of the prescribed fee of £8, must accompany the Application Form; this instalment is not returnable in any circumstances.

Acknowledgments of such Application Forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed Application Form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W. 1. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

*The Time Table of the written part of the examination will probably be posted early in June to the address given on the Form of Application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend. Candidates will be notified at the same time of the date and place fixed for the *viva voce* test and of the manner in which the balance (£6) of the prescribed fee of £8 is to be paid.*

NOTE.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following services, viz. :—

- Indian Civil Service ;
- Ceylon Civil Service ;
- Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service ;

should be held in 1939 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Burma Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, &c., will be admitted to compete for any two or more of these services, subject to the following conditions :—

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for one or more of the following services, viz., Indian Civil Service, Burma Civil Service, Ceylon Civil Service, as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma or Ceylon Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or Burma Service (or both) as well as for the Ceylon Service will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Burma Service or on the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Ceylon Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Burma Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for the Burma Service.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for any two or more of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8, of which £2 will be payable on application for permission to attend the examination and the balance (£6) on admission to the examination.

Regulations for Admission to the Burma Civil Service (Class I).

* * * *The following Regulations are made by the Secretary of State for Burma. They are liable to alteration from year to year.*

1. An examination for admission to the Burma Civil Service (Class I), open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in the summer of each year, for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. A candidate must be a male and a British subject of European descent, or of Burman domicile or descent, whose father (if alive) is a British subject, or (if dead) was at the time of his death either a British subject or a person in the permanent service of the Crown or a person who had retired from that service.

Provided that in the case of a male British subject the requirements of this rule may be waived by the Secretary of State if he is satisfied that their observance would occasion exceptional hardship, and the Candidate is so closely connected by ancestry or upbringing with His Majesty's dominions as to justify special treatment.

3. *A candidate must have attained the age of 21 and must not have attained the age of 24 on the 1st day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

4. Candidates must be prepared to produce evidence to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that their nationality and age conform to the requirements of Clauses 2 and 3 above. A candidate who is of Burman domicile or descent, and who is not in possession of a certificate of birth or of a baptismal certificate stating the date of birth, must submit a certificate of nationality and age issued in accordance with such instructions as the Governor of Burma may, from time to time, prescribe, and signed by the Secretary to the Government of Burma, or the Commissioner of the Division in which his family resides.

5. Candidates who are not of European descent must have passed an examination qualifying for an Honours Degree, or an examination which in the opinion of the Secretary of State is of equivalent standard at an approved University in the British Isles, or at an approved institution of University rank (other than a University) in the British Isles, after residence as full time members for at least two academic years at such University or Institution, or at one of the University Colleges enumerated in the footnote.†

A Candidate who at the date of application is not qualified in this respect, but is otherwise qualified, may be admitted provisionally to the examination, but his admission will not be confirmed, and he will not be eligible for appointment to the Burma Civil Service (Class I.), if he has not fulfilled the prescribed conditions on or before October 10 of the year in which the examination is held.

Candidates will be required to produce documentary evidence showing that these conditions have been fulfilled.

6. A candidate must be free from disease, constitutional affection or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Burma Civil Service‡.

7. A candidate shall satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Burma Civil Service.

8. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a Probationer for the Indian Civil Service or for the Burma Civil Service (Class I), and subsequently resigned his position as a Probationer, will be admitted to the examination.

* For examination in 1939 a candidate would not be eligible if born before 2nd August, 1915, or after 1st August, 1918.

† Candidates should be careful to see that the wording of this certificate is strictly in accordance with the appropriate form laid down in the instructions copy of which can be obtained from the Under Secretary of State, Burma Office, Whitehall, S.W. 1, or from the Secretary to the Government of Burma, Home Department, Rangoon.

‡ The following is a list of Universities and University Colleges approved for the purpose of this Regulation :—Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, Birmingham, Bristol, Durham, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Reading, Sheffield, Wales, Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Glasgow, St. Andrews ; The Queen's University, Belfast ; Trinity College, Dublin ; The National University of Ireland. University Colleges of Exeter, Hull, Leicester, Nottingham, Southampton.

§ The Civil Service Commissioners will regard no person as constitutionally fitted for appointment to the Burma Civil Service who has not been satisfactorily vaccinated within the last seven years. Probationers are required to be inoculated against enteric fever before they proceed to Burma on first appointment ; but exemption from this requirement may be granted to any candidate of Asiatic domicile, unless he has been continuously resident out of Asia for five years prior to the date of his appointment.

9. No person will be admitted to the examination whose employment in the Burma Civil Service would in the opinion of the Secretary of State, acting with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, be detrimental to the public interest.

10. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination.

The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of their Certificate of Qualification, institute such further enquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such enquiries in the case of any candidate shall be unsatisfactory in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Burma Civil Service, and, if he has already been appointed to be a member of the Burma Civil Service on probation, the Secretary of State may, after consultation with the Civil Service Commissioners, forthwith remove him from the Service.

11. The examination will include the following subjects*. The numerical value is shown against each subject.

12. In Section B a candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

13. The following restrictions apply to particular subjects in Section B:—

International Relations (26), may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (9), or International Law (15).

Greek Literature (61), may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (58), and Latin Literature (65) only by those who offer Latin Translation (62).

In subjects 69 to 88 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (69), German History (72), Spanish or Italian History (75), Russian History (78), may not offer either subject 8 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2) or subject 9 (European History, Period 3).

* A Syllabus defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects is sent herewith.

Pamphlets containing reprints of the question papers set at certain previous examinations for Services of the Administrative Group may be purchased either directly from the following Branches of H. M. Stationery Office:—York House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2; 120, George Street, Edinburgh 2; 26, York Street, Manchester 1; 1, St. Andrew's Crescent, Cardiff; 80, Chichester Street, Belfast; or through any bookseller.

14. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (23), or any of the subjects 38 to 49 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (37), Engineering (50), Geography (51), and the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (53), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

15. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

16. Moreover, candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a further deduction of marks on that account*.

17. Candidates must obtain such a mark in the *viva voce* (subject 4) and such an aggregate of marks in the written tests as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

18. A list of the candidates shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each candidate, and in that order so many Candidates up to the determined number of appointments as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination in accordance with Clause 17, shall be appointed to be members of the Burma Civil Service on probation, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any Probationer become disqualified, the Secretary of State for Burma will determine whether the vacancy shall be filled or not.

19. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

BURMA CIVIL SERVICE (CLASS I) PROBATIONARY RULES, 1938.

In exercise of the powers conferred by paragraph (a) of subsection (1) of section 105 of the Government of Burma Act, 1935, the Secretary of State hereby makes the following Rules:—

1. These Rules may be cited as the Burma Civil Service (Class I) (Probationary Service) Rules, 1938, and shall apply to all persons appointed under Rule 2 of these Rules.

2. A person selected, either in Burma or in the United Kingdom, and whether or not as the result of written examination, for admission to the Burma Civil Service (Class I), shall be appointed to be a member of that Service on probation, and a person so appointed is hereinafter referred to as "a probationer."

3. Every probationer shall spend one year after appointment at one of the following Universities: The University of Oxford; the University of Cambridge; or the University of London, School of Oriental Studies.

4. Unless the Secretary of State for special reasons otherwise directs in a particular case, the whole period of probation shall be passed at the same University.

5. A probationer who fails to comply with the provisions of these Rules or to obey any order which he may receive from the Secretary of State, the Civil Service Commissioners, a Supervisor of Probationers, or any other duly constituted authority acting on behalf of the Secretary of State, or who wilfully neglects his probationary studies or is guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer of the Burma Civil Service, will be liable to removal from the Service.

The Secretary of State shall decide any question arising under this Rule, and his decision shall be final.

6. Periodical reports on the conduct and progress of probationers shall be made to the Secretary of State by the Supervisor at each University and the Secretary of State, in cases of misconduct or unsatisfactory progress, will take such disciplinary action as he may consider necessary.

7. Any communication which a probationer may be required or which he may wish to make to the Burma Office, or to the Civil Service Commissioners, and, in particular, all applications for permission to join an Inn of Court or to pursue an extra course of study, all communications in regard to the payment of the probationary allowance or of the overland allowance, and all applications for permission to make his own arrangements for proceeding to Burma shall, if circumstances permit, be addressed, in the first instance, to the Supervisor at the University where the probationer is passing his period of probation.

8. Probationers shall, at or about the end of the year of probation, undergo an examination, to be called the Final Examination. The subjects of this examination and the marks respectively obtainable for them shall be as follows:—

(i) Burmese Law (Indian Penal Code, Code of Criminal Procedure, and Indian Evidence Act as adapted for Burma)	600
(ii) Burmese History	400
(iii) Burmese, or, in the case of a probationer who is not required to offer Burmese, English together with an additional subject approved by the Civil Service Commissioners	600
(iv) Riding	200

9. (1) Each probationer shall offer Burmese for examination unless he is already familiar with that language.

(2) A probationer who is not required by sub-rule (1) to offer Burmese shall offer English together with a subject approved by the Civil Service Commissioners from among the following alternatives:—

- (a) Urdu;
- (b) Pali;
- (c) British History;
- (d) European History; and
- (e) Currency, Banking and Public Finance.

Any question as to the interpretation and application of this Rule shall be decided by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. In addition to the Final Examination in riding, probationers, may be required to attend for examination in this subject at such time or times during the probationary period as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

11. Such deductions shall be made from the marks assigned to probationers at the Final Examination as the Civil Service Commissioners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

12. Probationers may be required to attend lectures in other subjects, including Burmese Buddhist Law, Social Welfare and Public Health, besides those which are prescribed for the Final Examination.

13. The Civil Service Commissioners shall prepare a list of the probationers in order of merit as indicated by the marks awarded at the Final Examination provided that in preparing the list no account shall be taken of marks awarded to a probationer in any subject in which he has failed to satisfy the Commissioners. The seniority of probationers *inter se* shall be determined by the order in which their names appear in this list.

14. The Civil Service Commissioners may, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification referred to in the next succeeding Rule, institute, or cause to be instituted, such enquiries as they may deem necessary in respect of the nationality, age, health, character and conduct of a probationer, and if the result of such enquiries is unsatisfactory in any of the above respects, the Secretary of State may, after consultation with the Civil Service Commissioners, forthwith remove the probationer from the Burma Civil Service (Class I).

15. The probationers whose performance in the subjects of the Final Examination is such as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners, and who have also satisfied the Commissioners as to their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character and conduct during the period of probation, shall be certified by the Commissioners to be qualified for further employment in the Burma Civil Service (Class I).

16. Every probationer in respect of whom the certificate referred to in the last preceding Rule is granted shall execute a Covenant in the form annexed to these Rules and shall pay the stamp duty of one pound thereon.

* It is notified for general information that the number of marks deducted for bad handwriting may be considerable.

17. A probationer who fails to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Burma Civil Service (Class I) unless the Secretary of State shall, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, allow him to sit for re-examination in the subject or subjects in which he failed. The marks awarded to a probationer on re-examination shall not be taken into account by the Commissioners in assessing the order of merit as prescribed by Rule 13.

18. If any probationer is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending, or from completing his course of study for, the Final Examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held in the following year, or may arrange for him to be specially examined in any or all of the subjects prescribed for the Final Examination after such interval as may seem to them suitable having regard to the circumstances of the case. The marks awarded to a probationer in respect of such a special examination shall not be taken into account by the Commissioners in assessing the order of merit referred to in Rule 13.

19. A probationer who wishes to join an Inn of Court or to pursue an extra course of study, in addition to the course prescribed in these Rules, shall first obtain the permission of the Secretary of State. Permission to pursue an extra course of study will be accorded only in exceptional circumstances, and, if accorded, will be subject to review at any time.

20. (1) No salary shall be payable to a probationer in respect of his service during the probationary period, but each probationer shall receive an allowance of £300, or, if he has an Asiatic domicile, of £350.

(2) The allowance shall be payable by the High Commissioner for India in 12 monthly instalments, the first of £65 (£90 in the case of probationers with an Asiatic domicile) on appointment, and the last, of £35, after signature of the Covenant. The remainder of the allowance shall be payable in ten equal instalments of £20 (£22 10s. in the case of probationers with an Asiatic domicile). The Secretary of State may, if he thinks fit, direct the continuation of the allowance to a probationer whose Final Examination is postponed, in circumstances over which he has no control, but in no circumstances shall additional payments be made to a probationer whose departure for Burma is delayed on account of his failure to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the Final Examination.

(3) Each probationer shall intimate to the Under Secretary of State for Burma, the address to which it is desired that the instalments of his allowance should be sent.

21. On appointment, each probationer shall execute an agreement binding himself and one surety jointly and severally to refund all moneys he may have received in pursuance of these Rules in the event of—

- (a) the refusal of the Civil Service Commissioners to issue a certificate under Rule 15 in respect of the probationer; or
- (b) the failure of the probationer to execute the Covenant prescribed by these Rules and to proceed to Burma at the time and in the manner directed by the Secretary of State.

22. (1) A free passage to Burma shall be provided by the High Commissioner for India for every officer who has been directed in accordance with these Rules to report for duty in Burma. If such an officer elects to travel overland from London to Marseilles, he may apply for payment of the overland allowance as fixed from time to time. No baggage expenses or other allowance will be admissible.

(2) An officer who desires to make his own arrangements for proceeding to Burma must first satisfy the Secretary of State that he has good reasons for wishing to do so and that the arrangements which he proposes to make are suitable. He may then be granted an allowance of such amount as may be determined from time to time by the Secretary of State.

23. Nothing in the foregoing Rules shall be construed as limiting the power of the Secretary of State to remove at any time, a probationer from the Burma Civil Service (Class I) if reasons exist which, in his judgment, justify such action.

FORM OF THE COVENANT REFERRED TO IN RULE 16.

This indenture made the _____ day of _____ in the year of our Lord 193—, between _____ (hereinafter called "the Covenantor") of the one part and the Secretary of State of the other part. Whereas the Secretary of State has appointed the Covenantor to serve His Majesty as a Member of the Burma Civil Service (Class I), such service to continue during the pleasure of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, to be signified under the hand of the Secretary of State for Burma, but with liberty for the said Covenantor to resign the said service, with the previous permission of the Secretary of State or of the Government of Burma. Now this Indenture witnesseth, and the said Covenantor doth hereby covenant and agree with and to the Secretary of State, in manner and form following; that is to say,—

1st. That while he shall be employed in the said service he will faithfully, honestly, and diligently do all such things as shall be lawfully committed to his charge by or on the part of the Secretary of State, or of the Government in Burma, or in execution of his duty.

2nd. That he will perform and obey all such general rules and regulations of the Secretary of State and of the said service as shall be in force in relation to all things to be committed to his charge or to be done by him, or to any rank, office, or station in which he shall act, and will observe and obey all such orders relating to himself or his conduct as he shall receive from the Secretary of State, or the Government in Burma, or any person who shall have lawful authority to command him.

3rd. That he will regularly and justly keep all accounts touching his transactions for the Government in Burma, and will preserve and keep all such documents, chattels, and realty as shall be committed to his charge, or as it shall be his duty to preserve and keep, and shall not wilfully obliterate, cancel, or injure, nor permit to be obliterated, cancelled, or injured, any documents, chattels, or realty belonging to His Majesty, or in the custody of any person or persons on account of the Government, and will deliver all such documents, chattels, and realty as shall be in his custody or power to any person to whom he ought to deliver the same; and on demand made by or on behalf of the Secretary of State, or of the Government in Burma, will deliver to such person or persons as shall be authorized to demand the same, all documents whatsoever touching any of the affairs or concerns of the Government, or anything in which he shall have been engaged as a servant in the Burma Civil Service (Class I),—such delivery to be made without obliteration or concealment of any part of the books, papers, or writings to be delivered up, and notwithstanding that they may not be the property of His Majesty, or that there may be any entry or entries relating to his own affairs, or those of any other person, or any other reason whatever.

4th. That he shall not make use of or apply the property of His Majesty which he may have, for any purposes other than those for which he ought to use and apply it in the course of his said service, save and except such furniture, goods, and chattels as he may be justly entitled to the use of for his own proper accommodation.

5th. That he shall not nor will divulge, disclose, or make known any matter relating to the affairs or concerns of the Government in Burma, or relating to any matter or thing in which he may act or be concerned or which may come to his knowledge in the course of his said service which may require secrecy and which ought to be kept secret (save and except as his duty may require), unless he shall be authorized or required to disclose and make known the same by the Secretary of State, or the Government in Burma, or some other person or persons having competent authority for that purpose.

Recital of the terms on which the party enters into the service.

He covenants,

For his general fidelity.

To obey orders of a general nature, and specially relating to the party.

To keep regular accounts, to preserve and duly deliver over chattels and realty, and to produce private accounts.

Not to misapply or employ for improper purposes the property entrusted to his care.

Not to divulge secrets.

Not to accept corrupt presents or make corrupt bargains.

6th. That he shall not at any time, directly or indirectly, ask, demand, accept, or receive any sum of money, or security for money, or other valuable thing or service whatsoever, or any promise or engagement by way of present, gift, or gratuity, from any person or persons with whom or on whose behalf he shall, on the part of the Government in Burma, have any dealings or transactions, business or concern whatsoever, or from any person or persons from whom, by law or any orders or regulations of the Secretary of State or of any of the branches of the Government in Burma, he is or shall be restrained from demanding or receiving any sum of money or other valuable thing as a gift or present or under colour thereof.

Not to trade contrary to law or regulations.

7th. That he shall not nor will by himself, or in partnership with any other person or persons, or by the agency of any other person or persons, either as principal, factor, or agent, directly or indirectly engage, carry on, or be concerned in any trade, dealings, or transactions whatsoever.

Not to quit Burma without leave, and to satisfy all debts to His Majesty before departure.

8th. That he shall not nor will at any time return to Europe, nor remove from or leave Burma, without the previous permission of the Government in writing; and previously to any such return or removal he shall pay, satisfy, and perform all such debts, sums of money, duties, and engagements as he shall owe or be liable to perform to His Majesty or to the Government in Burma, or any branch or department of the same.

To make proscribed payments towards pension, &c.

9th. That he shall and will forthwith upon his arrival in Burma, and from time to time, so long as he shall continue in the service of His Majesty, make such payments as, under the rules and regulations which shall be in force in Burma, shall become due or payable by him to a Provident Fund and for pensions to his wife or children, or shall, at the option of the Secretary of State or of the Government, allow the amount of such subscriptions to be deducted out of any money due or payable by the Government to him.

Date of commencement of service for the purpose of the time-scale.

10th. That for the purpose of calculating the pay admissible to him under the time-scale this Covenant shall have effect as from the 1st day of November, 19 Provided that pay shall be drawn only from the date of disembarkation in Burma, subject to his proceeding to take up his duties without avoidable delay.

**General description of Foreign Liquor Licences ;
Amendment of Refreshment Room or
Restaurant Licence.**

IT is hereby notified that Excise Notification No. 218 published in *Gazette* No. 7,845 of April 17, 1931, is, with the approval of the Governor, amended by the substitution, for paragraph 11 thereof, of the following new paragraph, with effect from October 1, 1939 :—

11. *Refreshment Room or Restaurant Licence* (issued only to respectable Applicants to cover the sale of foreign liquor, including locally-made malt liquor).

This licence may be issued on a fee of not less than Rs. 300 in Municipal towns and Rs. 150 elsewhere, to be assessed by the Excise Commissioner according to the estimated consumption of liquor on the premises.

Under this licence liquor must not be sold except for cash, and except for consumption on the premises.

Service of, or proof of receipt of payment for, a meal with each order for liquor will not be insisted on, but cooked or tinned eatables must be available to customers at all times and meals of rice and curry freshly cooked

at least twice a day must be kept ready to be served within 15 minutes to any customer demanding such meal at any reasonable hour of the day.

If the service of drinks is carried on to such an extent or in such a manner as to deprive the premises of the character of a Refreshment Room or Restaurant and to convert it into an establishment in the nature of a tavern, the licence will be liable to cancellation at the sole discretion of the Government Agent. The decision of the Government Agent on this question will be subject to an appeal to the Governor under section 8 of the Ordinance.

Before payment is demanded from any customer at the Refreshment Room/Restaurant, whether such customer has had a meal, or liquor, or a meal with liquor, the original of a bill prepared in duplicate must be presented to him. The duplicate must in every case be a carbon copy of the original, and every such bill and duplicate must be prepared in a book of forms so bound as to enable the original and the duplicate to be written with the aid of carbon paper at one and the same time. All duplicate must be left intact in the book of forms, shall be kept in the Refreshment Room/Restaurant for six months from the date of issue of the respective originals, and must be made available for inspection to any Excise Officer not below the rank of Inspector. A daily account of the proceeds of the sale of meals at the Refreshment Room/Restaurant must be kept in such form as the Excise Commissioner may prescribe. The opening hour must be 8 A.M. and the closing hour will be fixed from time to time by the Government Agent and his Advisory Committee, and will not in any case be later than 11 P.M. Liquor must not be consumed on the premises after the closing hour.

PART I.

Notices.

1. The notice to be issued by the Government Agent for the purposes of section 14 of the Ordinance shall—

- in the case of a general election of a Committee be substantially in the form A 1 in the Schedule hereto; and
- in the case of the election of a member to fill any casual vacancy in a committee, be substantially in the form A 2 in the Schedule.

2. The notice to be issued by the Government Agent under section 15 (4) of the Ordinance for the purpose of cancelling a meeting of the voters shall be substantially in the form A 3 in the Schedule hereto.

PART II.

Election of Members.

1. Every nomination of a candidate for election under section 15 of the Ordinance shall be substantially in the form B in the Schedule hereto.

2. Where two or more candidates are duly nominated for any ward, the Government Agent shall allot to each candidate a colour by which the ballot box or boxes set apart for that candidate may be distinguished at the poll.

3. At the place fixed for the meeting of the voters of each ward the Government Agent shall provide polling booths for the voters and may in his discretion provide separate booths for male and female voters.

4. (a) At each polling booth there shall be one ballot box for each candidate.

(b) Each candidate's ballot box shall be coloured with the colour allotted to that candidate under rule 2.

5. The Presiding Officer shall before the commencement of the poll—

(1) affix in a conspicuous place outside each polling station a notice showing:—

- the name of each candidate, and
- the colour with which his ballot box is coloured.

(2) display the empty ballot boxes to be used at the polling station to such persons as may be present in the polling station,

(3) lock the empty boxes securely, and

(4) so place the ballot boxes at each polling booth that a voter can without being observed insert the ballot-paper in any such box.

6. The Presiding Officer shall declare the poll open and proceed to issue to each qualified voter presenting himself as a voter a ballot-paper substantially in the form C in the Schedule hereto bearing on its back the official mark previously selected by the Presiding Officer for the purpose of authenticating the ballot-papers.

7. The voter shall thereupon place the ballot-paper without undue delay in the box bearing the colour allotted to the candidate of his choice.

8. The Presiding Officer or any person authorized by the Presiding Officer may on the application of a voter who, in the opinion of the Presiding Officer is incapacitated by blindness or other physical cause from voting in the manner prescribed by these rules himself give such assistance to the voter as may be required to enable him to vote, or direct any other person to give such assistance.

9. The Presiding Officer may at any time while a poll is proceeding enter any polling booth and take any steps that may be necessary to ensure—

- that the ballot boxes are conveniently placed for the reception of ballot-papers in accordance with these rules;
- that no voter delays unduly in any such polling booth; and
- that not more than one voter at a time is in any such polling booth.

10. A candidate may with the approval of the Presiding Officer appoint any other person to assist such candidate at the election.

11. When all the qualified voters present at the meeting have been given an opportunity to record their votes the Presiding Officer shall formally declare the poll closed and open the ballot boxes and count or cause to be counted the ballot-papers in the respective boxes of the candidates. Every candidate or his duly appointed agent will be entitled to be present during the opening of the ballot boxes and the counting of the votes.

12. The candidate whose box contains the largest number of authentic ballot-papers shall be declared duly elected.

13. In the event of the election being rendered indecisive by reason of an equality of votes, the matter shall be decided by lot cast or drawn in such manner as the Presiding Officer may in his discretion determine.

14. The Presiding Officer may take all such steps as may be necessary for the provision of suitable accommodation for the voters at the meeting, for the identification of voters, and for the orderly conduct of the election.

PART III.

Election of Chairman.

1. At the first meeting of any Village Committee or at any adjourned meeting held for the purpose of electing a Chairman, if there is only one candidate for election and the name of such candidate is formally proposed and seconded, the Presiding Officer shall declare that candidate to be the duly elected Chairman of the Committee.

2. (a) If there are two candidates for election and the names of such candidates are formally proposed and seconded, the Presiding Officer shall proceed to the election of one of the candidates by ballot.

(b) The Presiding Officer shall thereupon take a count and declare the candidate who obtains the larger number of votes the duly elected Chairman of the Committee.

(c) In the event of the election being rendered indecisive by reason of an equality of votes, the matter shall be decided by lot cast or drawn in such manner as the Presiding Officer may in his discretion determine.

3. (a) If there are three or more candidates for election, and the names of such candidates are formally proposed and seconded, the Presiding Officer shall proceed to hold the election in the manner provided by section 27 of the Ordinance. The Presiding Officer shall declare the candidate who thus obtains more votes in the final count the duly elected Chairman of the Committee.

(b) Where at any ballot among three or more candidates, two or more candidates obtain an equal number of votes, one of them shall be excluded from the election, and the determination as between the candidates whose votes are equal of the candidate to be excluded shall be by lot cast or drawn in such manner as the Presiding Officer may in his discretion determine.

(c) In the event of the election being rendered indecisive by reason of an equality of votes between the two candidates who remain after one or more ballots held in accordance with the provisions of section 27 of the Ordinance, the matter shall be decided by lot cast or drawn in such manner as the Presiding Officer may in his discretion determine.

Election of Vice-Chairman.

4. (a) The election of a Vice-Chairman shall in every case be by ballot and the candidate obtaining a majority of the votes of the members present and voting shall be declared to be duly elected as Vice-Chairman.

(b) In the event of the election being rendered indecisive by reason of an equality of votes, the matter shall be decided by lot cast or drawn in such manner as the Presiding Officer or Chairman may in his discretion determine.

5. For the purpose of a ballot under Part III. of these rules the Presiding Officer or Chairman shall give to each member present a ballot-paper on which the member may write the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote. Ballot-papers shall be folded so that the name written thereon shall not be seen. The Presiding Officer or Chairman shall collect or cause to be collected the ballot-papers and count them in the presence of the members of the Committee present at the meeting.

REGULATIONS.

1. *Short title.*—These regulations may be cited as the Filariasis (Prevention) Regulations, 1939.

2. *Interpretation.*—In these regulations unless the context otherwise requires—

“land” includes any depression, pit, pond, well, trench, tank, seepage area, swamp, paddy field, water-course, channel, canal or stream situated thereon.

“occupier” means the person in occupation of any land or having the charge, management, or control thereof, whether on his own account or as agent of another, but does not include a lodger.

“proper authority” means the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services acting through the Provincial Surgeon of a province or the Medical Officer of Health of a district for the Island as a whole; or in any area within the administrative limits of a Municipal Council, Urban District Council, Local Board or Sanitary Board, the Chairman of that Council or Board, and in any area where there is no such Council or Board, the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent within whose province or district that area is situated.

3. *Control Measures.*—It shall be the duty of the occupier of any land or where there is no occupier, of the owner or the lessee of that land, to take or adopt the following measures for preventing the breeding of *Mansonia* type mosquitoes upon that land :—

(a) The removal and destruction of the water plant having the botanical name *Pistia Stratiotes* and usually called locally as “Diya-parandel, Kondepasi, Tel-pasi, Barawa-pasi, or Nanayaviraddi” or of any other water plant or plants which may from time to time be found to afford breeding facilities to the *Mansonia* mosquito.

(b) The prevention of the spread of any plant referred to in paragraph (a) by the erection of suitable barriers which will stop such plant from floating down along any water-course.

4. *Right of entry for purposes of inspection.*—It shall be lawful for the proper authority or any officer specially or generally authorized in writing in that behalf by the proper authority to enter any land between the hours of sunrise and sunset and to inspect any part of it for the purposes of ascertaining—

(a) whether the requirements of regulation 3 have been complied with; or

(b) what measures, if any, are necessary for destroying mosquitoes and preventing the further breeding of mosquitoes therein.

5. (1) It shall be lawful for the proper authority or any officer specially or generally authorized in writing in that behalf by the proper authority after such inspection as he may deem necessary, by notice in writing to direct the occupier of any land or where there is no occupier the owner or lessee of that land, to take or adopt with respect to that land within such time as may be specified in the notice any of the measures referred to in regulation 3.

(2) Any notice referred to in paragraph (1) may be served on any occupier, owner or lessee by leaving the notice with some adult person living with such occupier, owner or lessee, as the case may be, or by posting up the notice on some conspicuous part of the land.

(3) It shall be the duty of every person so served with a notice to comply with the directions set out therein within the time specified therein.

6. Where any land is in the joint occupation of two or more co-owners, each of the co-owners shall be severally liable for any neglect or failure to comply with the requirements of regulation 3 or with the directions set out in any notice duly served under regulation 5.

7. No person shall knowingly or wilfully resist or obstruct the proper authority or any officer or servant authorized in writing in that behalf by the proper authority in the lawful exercise of his duty under any of these regulations.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Paddy Statistics Regulations, 1938.

2. All returns called for under these regulations shall be furnished to the Director of Statistics, Colombo, or to any other officer authorized by him.

3. Every Government Agent and Assistant Government Agent shall be responsible for the enforcement of these regulations within his Province or Revenue District, as the case may be.

4. Every Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent shall impose the duty of keeping records and collecting paddy statistics under these regulations upon such of his subordinate officers hereinafter referred to as Collecting Officers, as he may deem fit, and assign to each such Collecting Officer an area of paddy land for the statistics relating to which he is to be responsible.

5. Every Collecting Officer shall keep a record in the Form I. set out in the Schedule for the area of paddy land assigned to him.

6. Every cultivator shall whenever called upon to do so furnish the Collecting Officer with all the information necessary for the keeping of the records referred to in regulation 5.

7. The records referred to in regulation 5 shall be open to inspection by any superior officer of the Collecting Officers or by any officer authorized by the Director of Statistics.

8. Every Collecting Officer shall furnish in the Form II. set out in the Schedule a return of the total acreage of asweddumized land capable of cultivation and the total acreage sown in his area.

9. The return referred to in regulation 8 shall be made twice a year, and forwarded to the Director of Statistics—

(a) in the case of the Maha Season not later than the 30th day of October in each year, and

(b) in the case of the Yala Season not later than the 30th day of April in each year.

10. Every Collecting Officer shall furnish in the Form III. set out in the Schedule a return of the expected yield of paddy for each season.

11. The return referred to in regulation 10 shall be made twice a year in January and in May, and forwarded

to the Director of Statistics or other officer authorized by him not later than the 10th day of January and the 10th day of May respectively.

12. Every Collecting Officer shall furnish in the Form IV. set out in the Schedule, a return of the total acreage sown, the total acreage of paddy harvested, and the total yield of paddy realized.

13. The return referred to in regulation 12 shall be made twice a year, and forwarded to the Director of Statistics or other officer authorized by him—

(a) for the Maha Season not later than the last day of March, and

(b) for the Yala Season not later than the last day of August.

14. Where the return referred to in regulation 13 is made in terms of the local measures, a statement must be attached showing the relationship of such measure to the standard acre and bushel.

CHAPTER V.—RULES FOR THE INVESTMENT OF SURPLUS FUNDS ON LOANS UNDER THE HOUSE PURCHASING SCHEME.

1. It shall be competent for the Committee of Management to give a loan to any member who does not own a residential house and whose wife does not own a residential house in any of the areas within the limits mentioned in Rules 1 (i.) A and B of Chapter II. of the Association's Rules to assist such member in the purchase of a residential house in any such area. But such assistance shall not exceed Rs. 9,000.

2. Any member desirous of obtaining a loan should fill in and forward the application form (to be obtained from the Secretary), showing the amount of loan required and the nature of the property to be purchased, &c.

3. If an examination of the application form indicates that the applicant is able adequately to meet the liabilities contingent on the loan applied for being granted, his name will be placed on a waiting list.

4. When funds are available, applications will be dealt with in the strict order of priority.

5. The applicant must, as a condition precedent to receiving a loan, take out with such Life Assurance Company as the Committee of Management may determine an Insurance Policy on his life for the amount offered. Such policy should be assigned in favour of the Association by way of further security for the money lent.

6. An applicant whose turn on the list has arrived will then be required to send the title deeds to the Secretary with the fee payable to the Association's lawyers for an examination of the deeds.

7. If the title is reported to be satisfactory, the property will, on deposit of appraisement fees and travelling expenses of the appraisers, be appraised by the Appraisers appointed by the Committee of Management, one of whom shall be a member of the Committee and the other a professional appraiser, and their valuation will be affirmed or sworn to.

8. The appraisement report will be examined by the Committee of Management, who will decide on the amount of the loan to be granted. Such a loan will not exceed nine-tenths of the appraised value or the purchase price of the property whichever is the lower.

9. The amount of the loan shall be repaid to the Association in monthly instalments within 20 years of the granting of the loan with interest on the outstanding capital at the end of the previous month at 6 per cent. per annum.

10. The borrower will have to effect with such Fire Insurance Company as the Committee of Management may determine a Fire Policy to cover the premises to be mortgaged. Such policy should be assigned in favour of the Association, by way of further security for the money lent.

11. The Life and Insurance Premia will be paid annually by the Association and recovered monthly with other deductions due on the loan from the applicant. The applicant must consent to such deductions being made on his monthly pay sheet.

12. The borrower shall thereafter have executed at his own expense through the Association's lawyers a deed of transfer of the property in his favour, and shall thereafter also at his expense execute the necessary mortgage bond in favour of the Association. A remittance for the total sum granted will be forwarded only on completion of this deed of transfer and mortgage. The latter shall be a primary mortgage.

13. One per centum of the interest recovered on loans shall form a Reserve Fund to cover any irrecoverable debts.

14. Once in every period of two years the properties will be inspected by a member of the Committee of Management at the expense of the Association, to review the value of the property mortgaged. Properties have to be kept in good repair and otherwise the loan will be recalled.

MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION OF MERCANTILE CORPORATION, LIMITED.

1. The name of the Company is "MERCANTILE CORPORATION, LIMITED".
 2. The registered office of the Company is to be established in Colombo, Ceylon.
 3. The objects for which the Company is established are:—
 - (a) To carry on in the Island of Ceylon and elsewhere the following businesses that is to say:—Importers, exporters, traders, manufacturers, engineers, forwarding agents, carriers of passengers and goods by land or by water or by air, merchants, manufacturers' agents, both local and foreign dealers in manures, proprietors of motor vehicles, boats, vans, aeroplanes, and hydroplanes.
 - (b) To buy, import, manufacture, sell, retail, and deal in both forward and spot, rice, provisions, oil-manstores, general goods, spirits, wines, piece-goods, and other goods and articles.
 - (c) To buy, import, manufacture, sell, retail, and deal in machinery, rolling stock, iron, steel, metal implements, tools, utensils, fittings, and conveniences of all kinds.
 - (d) To act as and carry on the business of commission and general agents.
 - (e) To act as agents for and manage, supervise, or control the business, plantations, estates, property, or operations of any person, company, or undertaking, or any property in which the company may be interested and to act as secretaries to other companies.
 - (f) To transact or carry on all kinds of trust and agency business and in particular in relation to the investment of money, the sale of property and produce, and the collection and receipt of money.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF MERCANTILE CORPORATION, LIMITED.

The regulations contained in the table marked "C" in the Schedule to "the Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, No. 4 of 1861", shall apply with the following additions and alterations :—

1. After section 1—

(a) Shares may be registered in the name of a firm or partnership and any partner in the firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to give proxies in respect of shares registered in the name of the firm or partnership.

(b) Shares may be registered in the names of two or more persons jointly.

(c) In the case of the death of any one or more of the joint holders of any share the survivor or survivors shall be the only person or persons recognized by the Company as having any title to or interest in such share.

(d) The Certificate of Shares registered in the name of two or more persons not being a firm, shall be delivered to the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares.

(e) The joint holders of a share shall be jointly and severally liable for the payment of all instalments and calls due in respect of such share.

(f) Minors shall be entitled to hold shares and such shares can be bought, sold, or otherwise dealt with by the father, mother, or curator of such minor, provided the name of such parent or curator is registered in the books of the Company.

(g) The directors shall have the power at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion to reject any application for shares.

2. In place of section 6—

Any one of the joint holders of a share other than a firm or partnership may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but only one of such joint holders shall be entitled to the right of voting and of giving proxies and exercising the other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder and if the joint holders cannot agree among themselves as to who shall

vote or give proxies and exercise such other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares shall vote or give proxies and exercise those rights and powers, provided, however, that in the event of such first registered Shareholder being absent from the Island the first registered Shareholder then resident in Ceylon shall vote or give proxies and exercise all such rights and powers as aforesaid.

3. After section 7—

(a) The Directors shall have the power at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion to decline to register any transfer of share or shares whatsoever.

(b) The Directors shall in no case be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming the transfer of any share.

4. After section 10—

(a) The first Board of Directors shall determine and decide the number of shares to be issued during the first year at their discretion. Thereafter the Company in General Meeting may authorize the issue of further shares from time to time.

(b) The first Board of Directors may proceed to carry out the objects for which the Company is established or any one or more of them and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit and notwithstanding that the whole or any particular number of the shares authorized or issued shall not have been subscribed, applied for or allotted.

5. After section 11—

This is without prejudice to the provisions of Article 1 (c) of these Articles.

6. After section 15—

The provisions of sections 12, 13, 14, and 15 of Table "C" aforesaid, shall be without prejudice to section 3 (a) of these Articles.

7. After section 20—

(a) The Company shall have a first charge or paramount lien upon all shares of any holder or joint holders for all moneys for the time being due to the Company by such holder or by all or any of such joint holders respectively either in respect of such shares or of other shares held by such holder or joint holders or in respect of any other debt, liability or engagement whatsoever and whether due from any such holder individually or jointly with others and including all calls which the Directors shall have resolved to make although the time appointed for the payment thereof shall not have arrived; and when any share is held by more persons than one, the Company shall be entitled to the said charge or lien in respect of any money due to the Company from any such persons.

(b) Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executors or administrators or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company and default shall have been made for 28 days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder over whose share the lien exists be abroad 60 days' notice shall be given him.

(c) The nett proceeds of any such sale shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of such debts, liabilities or engagements, and the residue (if any) paid to such Shareholder or his representative.

(d) A certificate in writing under the hand of one of the Directors and of the Secretary that the power of sale given by Article (b) above has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated.

No business shall be transacted at any general meeting except the declaration of a dividend recommended by a report of the Directors, unless there shall be present or represented at the commencement of the business three or more Shareholders entitled to vote.

11. In place of section 39—

On a show of hands every Shareholder present in person or by proxy shall have one vote. In case of a poll every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share held by him.

12. In place of section 45—

(a) The Directors shall be not less than five nor more than nine in number.

(b) The qualification of every Director shall be the holding in his own name of fully paid shares to the value of Rs. 5,000.

(c) As remuneration for their services the Directors shall be entitled to appropriate such sum as they may determine from time to time to be divided among them in such manner as they may decide, but the Company in General Meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration granted for special or extra services rendered by the Chairman of the Board of Directors or by any other member of the Board.

(d) Except as otherwise provided by these Articles, all the Directors of the Company shall have in all matters equal rights and privileges and be subject to equal obligation and duties in respect of the affairs of the Company.

(e) The first Directors shall be—

with power to add to their number up to nine at their discretion.

(f) The Secretary of the Company shall be the said V. N. A. Subramanian and subject to his holding the necessary qualifying shares he shall be *ex officio* a Director of the Company.

(g) As remuneration for his services the said Secretary shall receive 10 per cent. of the nett profits of the Company yearly, besides salary, allowance, and any other payments to be authorized by the Board of Directors.

(h) The said Secretary shall be the chief executive officer of the Company and shall derive authority to carry on, manage, and control the business from the Board of Directors, who may delegate any or all of the powers vested in them to the said Secretary at their discretion, with power to vary, recall and cancel any or all the powers so delegated.

Improvements in or relating to liquid fuel burners.

Abstract.—The fuel injector tube is connected at its rear end to a carrier member, which is provided with a coned aperture for conducting the fluid. The fuel nipple is screw threaded transversely into a boss on the body of the burner, and has a coned end which co-operates with the coned aperture mentioned above. Mere slackening back of the nipple enables the injector tube assembly with its spindle valve, &c., to be withdrawn for cleaning and repair, without necessitating the disconnection of the fuel pipe. An adjustable air guide member is placed in the path of the primary air to impart to it a variable amount of whirling motion.

In a further modification the fuel is controlled by a spindle valve positioned at the rear of the injector tube. Inside the bore of the tube is placed a helically twisted strip of metal. This imparts a vortical motion to the fuel.

Improved process for the obtaining of parti-colour effects on textile threads and on fabrics woven therefrom.

Abstract.—The inventor states that the method of obtaining shade effects on fabric by "spotting" the threads at equal intervals, suffers from the disadvantage that the colour spots in the weft threads sometimes come together in the fabric. He accordingly describes a method by which this defect may be overcome. It consists in winding the thread on a foraminous spool, mounting the wound spool on a hollow mandrel, and passing dye liquor radially through such package to form colour spots of circular, oval, diamond or other shape. Adjacent threads on the spool thus receive different lengths of colour.

The mandrel can be put in communication with a vacuum pump. After the spool is mounted thereon, a container is lowered on the package, dye liquor is introduced and the connection is made to the vacuum in order to draw the liquor through. Holes in the container and co-operating holes in the mandrel determine the shape and the number of the spots. After one angular portion of the spool is thus dealt with, the spool is turned round and spotted with colour on another portion and so on till the whole spool is covered.

General Meeting.

The Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice, dated January 31, 1939.

Present : Dr. V. R. Schokman, the Mayor, presiding; Mr. M. Subbiah, Deputy Mayor; Dr. A. F. J. Casie Chitty; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. R. F. S. de Mel; Mr. Geo. R. de Silva; Mr. J. R. Dharmasena; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Dr. C. W. S. Fernando; Dr. S. D. Fernando; Mr. D. S. Fonseka; Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, M.S.C.; Mr. N. M. M. Ishak; Mr. C. G. C. Kerr, C.A.; Mr. Merrill W. Pereira; Dr. A. 1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of January 11, 1939, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. S. Saravanamuttu, M.M.C., presented a petition from midwife B. A. E. Perera regarding her discontinuance from service. The Mayor stated that the petition would receive due attention.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. S. Saravanamuttu, M.M.C., presented a petition from Mrs. D. A. A. P. Siriwardene of 5, Frankfort place, Bambalapitiya. The Mayor undertook to send it to the appropriate Committee for report.

4. The Mayor replied as follows to the questions of which due notice had been given by Mr. J. R. Dharmasena :—

(1) Q.—In view of the fact that last Christmas Day and New Year Day fell on a Sunday, may I know whether the daily-paid staff were entitled to Holiday Pay on these two days, and if so, whether they were so paid? A.—As last Christmas Day and New Year's Day fell on a Sunday—which is not a working day—no holiday pay was granted to the daily-paid staff. The question whether they are entitled to it will be placed before the Council shortly.

(2) Q.—What is the present position with regard to the proposal made some time ago to make permanent the daily-paid and skilled workmen in the Council's Service? A.—The proposal has received the close attention of the Municipal Engineer, Municipal Treasurer, and Commissioner and the Council will be afforded an opportunity of considering their reports in the near future.

5. The Mayor replied as follows to the questions of which due notice had been given by Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando :—

(a) Q.—When was the Special Committee on Relief of Distress first appointed and how many meetings has it held up to date? A.—On April 6, 1932. Forty-nine (49).

(b) Q.—What is the total number of items which have altogether been placed on the agenda of the various meetings of this Committee? A.—Two hundred and twenty-six (226).

(c) Q.—Of those items, how many were referred to this Committee by the Council at the meeting at which the Committee was first appointed? (d) Q.—What is the Municipal matter which this Committee was appointed to inquire into and report on as provided under section 11 (1) of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935? (e) Q.—When is this Committee sending in its final report and when is it to be dissolved? A.—(c), (d), and (e). A special committee regarding the Charity Commissioner's Department in its report, dated March, 1932, suggested the appointment of a Committee to be called the Relief of Distress Committee to supervise the work of the Charity Commissioner's Department and to deal with matters relating to distress. The Council accepted this report on April 6, 1932. The Committee submits its recommendations to the Council periodically and will continue to function until this Council decides otherwise.

6. The Mayor replied as follows to the question of which due notice had been given by Mr. R. F. S. de Mel :—

Q.—Will the Mayor kindly state the value of the contracts placed by this Council through its London Agents, Messrs John Pook & Co., during the years 1936, 1937, and 1938, respectively, and the total commission paid to them each year?

(1) Q.—Will the Mayor inform this House whether the Overseers who were employed by this Council on a temporary basis have now been placed on the permanent staff in accordance with the resolution adopted by this Council in the year 1937. A.—No.

(2) Q.—If not, will the Mayor explain the inordinate delay in implementing the said resolution of this Council? A.—The resolution passed by the Council in December, 1937, included daily-paid clerks and skilled workmen as well. The Municipal Engineer, Municipal Treasurer and Commissioner have expended great care in considering its implications and a report will be placed before the Council shortly.

(c) "This Council is of opinion that the Municipal Council of Colombo should sink wells immediately, especially in crowded areas to enable the poor ratepayers to have a regular supply of water during the present crisis". Mr. J. R. Dharmasena seconded.

At the suggestion of the Mayor, the mover agreed to the motion being referred to the Works and Sanitation Committees for report.

9. Pursuant to notice, Mr. V. R. Somanathan, M.M.C., moved :—(a) That in the opinion of this Council that the Pettah streets are insufficiently lighted and should be made brighter. (b) That in view of the fact that buses leave the Pettah Bus Stands after midnight and during the small hours of the morning, the Municipal lights should be allowed to burn throughout the night. Mr. Geo. R. de Silva seconded.

The motion was referred to the Works Committee for report.

10. Pursuant to notice, Mr. R. F. (c) *No rent to be increased without the permission of the Municipal Magistrate.* It is recommended that the suggestions of the Sub-Committee under 2, 3, 4, and 5 be approved.

One member of the Committee felt that there should be more protection given to the landlords generally.

Resolved that the Port Stalls in Edinburgh Market be removed from their present location to another part of the Market.

ANNEXURE "C".

Report of the Rent Restriction Sub-Committee.

A.

Of the two motions passed on October 6, 1937, viz., (1) that a Rent Restriction Ordinance should be introduced more or less in accordance with the terms of the draft Ordinance attached to the motion, and (2) that the law be amended relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo, the more important is undoubtedly the 2nd motion above named. After careful consideration, we are of opinion that the law relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo should be amended in the manner mentioned below.

As the law now stands, under section 120 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Municipality has got the right to ask for returns of the rent or annual value of properties from the owner or occupier only for purposes of valuation. Further the penalty is only a fine not exceeding Rs. 100 for a false return or a refusal to make a return. If we compare this section 120

with the Local Government Ordinance No. 11 of 1920, sections 179 and 180, it will be seen that so far as District Councils are concerned, the Local Authority has got much wider power. We are therefore of opinion that section 120 should be repealed and the law be amended giving—

- (1) the Municipality power to revise the assessments of properties in Colombo periodically, say once in every 5 years, ward by ward,
- (2) whenever the Municipality has given notice of such revision in any ward, the Municipal Assessor or the Commissioner should be given the power to require the owner, occupier and tenant of every house, building, or land to furnish a return of the rent or annual value thereof, the penalty for a refusal or for false return being Rs. 500 or six months rigorous imprisonment,
- (3) the power to call for returns should not only be for the purpose of the periodical assessment, but also at any time and from time to time for the purpose of "the ascertainment of any information which in the opinion of the Commissioner shall be necessary" (see section 179 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1920),
- (4) the Municipality should be given the right to enter and inspect and survey any house, building or land at reasonable times,
- (5) the Municipality should have the right also to summon and question any occupier, owner or tenant of the house, land or building for the above purposes with the same penalty mentioned above,
- (6) We are of opinion that objections to assessments should not be heard by the Assessment Department but by an independent Committee composed, say of three Members, to be appointed from amongst the Members of the Municipal Council as well as from outside the Council.

This Committee should also have the power of hearing proposals for the reduction of the assessments for the following year made by any person to the Assessment Department provided that such application shall be heard by the Committee only if the Assessment Department is not satisfied with the evidence placed before it for the proposed reduction of assessment. If the Assessing Department is satisfied that the proposed reduction of the assessment for the following year is justified on the evidence placed before it, the necessary alteration can be made for the next year. If the Assessing Department is not so satisfied, there should be a right of appeal to the Committee.

There should be a right of action in a Court of Law for the purpose of testing the decision of the Committee, as in the existing law.

B.

As regards the first motion, we have had several representations from landlords, but only one on behalf of the tenants of small buildings. The draft Ordinance was based on legislation passed in India, Rangoon and Singapore, and a notice was published inviting criticism from the public. It was not meant to be passed intact as it stood, but was drafted with the object of inviting public comments. We are satisfied that it will not be advisable to pass the bill as drafted for the reasons given by the landlords. In spite, however, of the vehement protests of the landlords, we are firmly convinced that some relief should be given to the tenants of small buildings. Such relief can be given without unsettling the existing law to a great extent.

1. (a) In the first place, we think the Small Tenements Ordinance, No. 11 of 1882, should be amended in two respects. The word "tenement" should mean a house or other building or room which may be rented, exclusive of all taxes, rates and assessments, for a sum of not exceeding Rs. 30 instead of Rs. 20 as at present.

(b) Some provision should be made in the Small Tenements Ordinance introducing the English Law relating to Landlords' lien.

We understand that owing to a decision of the Supreme Court a landlord has no right to stop a tenant from removing his furniture for arrears of rent due unless he has obtained an order of Court to back him up. We think that power should be given to landlords to stop the removal of property by a tenant who tries to evade payment of arrears of rent.

2. No landlord should have the right to increase the rent of a tenement, the monthly rental of which is Rs. 30 or under, above the assessed annual rent as assessed in the Municipal books, without getting the permission of the Municipal Magistrate. Such application should be dealt with summarily after notice to the tenants and the Municipal Authorities. Similarly no landlord should have the right to bring an action in any Civil Court in Ceylon to recover any sum above the assessed monthly rent as rent without getting the special permission of the Municipal Magistrate as stated above.

3. No action to recover rent in respect of a tenement not assessed with a separate number in the Municipal Assessment books should be allowed to be brought in any Civil Court, except with the previous sanction of the Municipal Magistrate obtained as stated above. This is to prevent a dwelling house being divided into cubicles for the purpose of being let.

4. A right of appeal should be provided from the decision of the Municipal Magistrate, say to the Commissioner of the Court of Requests, the party appealing furnishing security in a sum not exceeding Rs. 25, the cost of appeal being taxed as in an ordinary action in a Court of Requests.

5. There should be provision made that no premium is to be chargeable in respect of a tenancy and a penalty provided for disturbance of easements by the landlord in order to get rid of an unsatisfactory tenant.

C.

If this report is approved or modified by the Municipal Council, a draft bill or bills will be drafted by the Special Committee in terms of the resolution.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on December 17, 1938, at 8.45 a.m. in accordance with the notice dated December 13, 1938.

Present: Mr. M. K. T. Sandys, Chairman; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. W. Beven; Mr. M. A. S. Marikar; Dr. E. S. Godlieb; Mr. O. T. Nettelton.

1. The Minutes of proceedings of the meetings held on November 19, 1938, and of the special meeting held on December 10, 1938, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and copies thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted:—

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1937, to November 30, 1938, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for November, 1938.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of November, 1938.
- (e) The reservoir readings for the week ending December 17, 1938.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the Minutes of Proceedings of these meetings, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1930", be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies inspected during November, 1938.

4. Mr. Marikar inquired when the Chairman would certify the Voters' Lists.

The Chairman stated that two cases had gone in appeal and till they are decided he was unable to certify the lists.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. Usoof Ismail asked the following questions which the Chairman replied:—

Q.—(a) What total expenditure the Municipal Council has incurred in completing the construction of the Minor (River) Pumping Scheme at Peradeniya, exclusive of the duplication of the main which is now being undertaken and will be of use for the distribution of water even after the Hunasgiriya Scheme is introduced? A.—Rs. 189,219.25.

Q.—(b) What expenditure the Council has incurred in supplying water from the Pumping Scheme every year since its inception? A.—1937, Rs. 5,305.57; 1936, (part), Rs. 2,358.09; Total, Rs. 7,663.66.

Q.—(c) What did it cost the Council to supply water to residents by lorry and cart at times of drought during the four years immediately preceding the introduction of the River Scheme? A.—1936, Rs. 697.92; 1935, Rs. 26,878.77; 1934, Rs. 3,698.48; 1933, nil; Total Rs. 31,275.17.

Q.—(d) What it has cost the Council to supply water by lorry and cart to residents living in other areas not served by the Pumping Scheme, during the period the Pumping Scheme has been in operation? A.—It is not possible to give the cost of supplying water by lorry and cart to residents living in areas not served by the Pumping Scheme, because no separate record has been kept of this. However, practically all the money spent on supply water by lorry and cart after the inauguration of the Pumping Scheme has been spent on areas not served by the Pumping Scheme,—1936, nil; 1937, Rs. 1,232.37; 1938 (up to September 30, 1938), Rs. 146.82; October, 1938, Rs. 248.95; November, 1938, Rs. 403.36; December up to 16, nil; Total, Rs. 2,031.50.

Q.—(e) Whether it is not a fact that the Pumping Scheme has given considerable relief to the section of the town served by it during times of drought? A.—The answer is in the affirmative.

GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Friday, January 27, 1939, at 2.30 p.m.

Present :—Mr. W. J. L. Rogerson, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. E. M. Karunaratne; Mr. W. Dahanayake; Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab; Mr. A. Kahaduwa; Mr. F. Magdon Ismail; Mr. A. C. Mohammado; Mr. G. Ross Bell; Mr. J. C. Cooper; Mr. R. L. Ephraums; and Dr. A. T. Kuriyan.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting and of the Special Meeting held on December 16, 1938, copies thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya presented two petitions from D. Saranelis Appu and Sawwanath Umma of Steele road, Dangedera.

3. To elect, by ballot, members to form the Four Standing Committees for 1939, under Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

A ballot was taken and the Chairman declared that the following members had been elected :—

(1) *Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment*.—Mr. J. E. Perera, Mr. E. M. Karunaratne, and Mr. G. Ross Bell.

(2) *Standing Committee on Municipal Works*.—Mr. J. E. Perera, Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya, and Mr. J. C. Cooper.

(3) *Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects*.—Mr. F. Magdon Ismail, Mr. E. M. Karunaratne, and Mr. A. C. Mohammado.

(4) *Standing Committee on Markets and Sanitation*.—Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya, Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab, and Dr. A. T. Kuriyan.

4. Considered the reappointment of the following Special Committees :—(a) Special Committee appointed on January 18, 1934, to report on the future development of the Esplanade.—Resolved that this Committee be not reappointed for 1939; (b) Special Committee appointed on November 24, 1935, to report on the establishment of a Municipal Play Centre at the Galle Esplanade.—Resolved that this Committee be not reappointed for 1939; (c) Special Committee appointed on January 24, 1934, to report what steps should be taken to improve the housing and general conditions of the town.—Resolved that this Committee be reappointed for 1939; (d) Special Committee appointed on July 10, 1937, to report on ways and means of reducing expenditure and of increasing revenue.—Resolved that this Committee be reappointed for 1939.

5. To appoint a Tender Board for 1939 to deal with tenders for the supply of stores and materials for Municipal Departments.—Resolved that a Tender Board be not appointed.

6. To sanction the following revotes for 1939 :—(a) Rs. 1,922.02 being the unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 5,644 for reconditioning of roads; (b) Rs. 632.21 being the unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 7,102 for new drainage; (c) Rs. 6,853.94 being the unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 8,000 for the services of the Government Valuer; (d) Rs. 9,172.41 being the unspent balance on the vote of Rs. 45,000 for the H. T. and L. T. extensions to Kalegane and Bope; (e) Rs. 2,675 being the amount voted for the installation of twelve Mercury Vapour lamps at important junctions in the town.—Sanctioned.

7. To revise the present scale of salary attached to the post of Inspector of Works :—The Chairman moved that the salary scale be amended to Rs. 1,200 per annum rising to Rs. 2,300 per annum by ten annual increments of Rs. 60 and five of Rs. 100.—Carried by 11 votes to 2. Messrs. W. Dahanayake and A. Kahaduwa dissenting as they were not in favour of an increased scale of salary.

8. To approve the appointment of a temporary Inspector of Works with effect from January 19, 1939.—Approved with effect from January 19, 1939, on a salary of Rs. 2.50 per working day.

9. To approve the payment to Government of a sum of Rs. 272.13 being the salary, &c., of the Additional Municipal Magistrate, Galle, for the period October 17 to 31, 1938.—(1) Approved. (2) Resolved that a supplemental vote of this amount be sanctioned under Head 81.

10. Considered letter No. PW 206/38 of August 15, 1938, from the Hon. the Minister for Communications and Works regarding the widening and duplication of the main Colombo-Matara road.—Resolved to enquire from the Hon. the Minister what would be the cost of constructing the two pavements.

11. Considered tenders for the supply of double bullock scavenging carts for 1939.—Resolved to accept the tender of T. B. Carolishamy at Rs. 355 per cart.

12. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of October 28, 1938 :—

“Considered the draft by-laws relating to Eating Houses and Tea and Coffee boutiques.—Recommended that the draft by-laws, as amended, be approved”.

After discussion in Committee it was resolved that consideration be deferred till the next meeting.

13. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. Dahanayake presented a petition from Mr. K. G. B. de Silva, Trader, Gintota, and 37 other residents of Gintota, praying that the closed-up gate on the main road in the Dadalla cemetery be available for use.

14. To approve the purchase on behalf of the Council of the hypothecated property in D. C., Galle, case No. 35,202 at the appraised value, viz., Rs. 5,225 and to sanction a supplemental vote of this amount for 1938.

Mr. W. Dahanayake opposed the approval of the sale and stated that the property should not have been bought in by the Council without the prior consent of the Council. The Chairman explained that he had consulted the Members of

the Law Committee on the matter and had acted on their advice as there was no time to obtain the approval of the Council. Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, E. M. Karunaratne, and A. C. Mohammado also spoke. It was then resolved, by 12 votes to 1 (Mr. W. Dahanayake dissenting) that the purchase of the property by the Council be approved and that a supplemental vote of Rs. 5,225 be sanctioned for 1938.

15. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. Dahanayake asked the following questions :—(1) (a) When did the defalcation in the Galle Municipal Employees' Co-operative Society occur? (b) Is it not scandalous to be delaying payment of their moneys for so very long a time to the many very poor people who were members of this Society? (c) Will the Chairman, as the chief executive officer of the Council, please take steps to expedite payment?

(2) (a) When was the petition of five contractors alleging bribery against the *ex* Inspector of Works received by the Chairman? (b) When I moved in Council for a special committee to inquire into these allegations did not the Chairman undertake to make the inquiries on his own? (c) Why did the Chairman, without completing the inquiries on his own, allow the *ex* Inspector of Works to sidetrack the issue by making an application to the Attorney-General for sanction to prosecute the five petitioners? (d) Was not this action a breach of the undertaking given by the Chairman to the Council? (e) Was not this action also tantamount to hitting the petitioners below the belt? (f) When did the Attorney-General first refuse to grant the required sanction to prosecute the petitioners? (g) Why did the Chairman grant permission a second time to make a fresh application to the Attorney-General? (h) Is it true that the Chairman in arriving at these decisions was guided by the opinion expressed by a lawyer or lawyers who interviewed the Chairman on behalf of the *ex* Inspector of Works? (i) If not, by what considerations was the Chairman guided? (j) The Attorney-General having refused to grant the required sanction a second time, on what date did the Chairman write down his final finding? Was it on November 18, 1938? (k) Is it not the fact that the Chairman in his final finding of November 18, 1938, states as follows :—“ I am of opinion that the Inspector of Works has demanded illegal gratifications from Municipal contractors, and that he has shown gross incompetence and inefficiency in his work ”? (l) Having given his finding in such decisive manner, why was the Chairman indecisive in his attitude at the General Meeting on December 16? (m) Is it not the fact that at the General Meeting on December 16, the Chairman suggested that the whole question should be placed before a lawyer? (n) Why did the Chairman hesitate to recommend for dismissal an officer found guilty by the Chairman himself of bribery, incompetence and inefficiency? (o) When did the *ex* Inspector of Works tender his resignation and with effect from what date was the resignation accepted? (p) Was the Chairman justified in retaining in service for over 8 months, without suspension, an officer against whom the charge of bribery had been made and was being inquired into? (q) How was such extra consideration justified in view of the Chairman's promptness in suspending from duty the Council's Accountant, against whom the charge is one of temporary misappropriation and not of bribery? (r) Has not the Chairman acted over the whole subject of the allegation of bribery against the *ex* Inspector of Works, in such a way as to make the Council and the ratepayers lose confidence in his Chairmanship?

(3) What was the rainfall in each of the last five years at the Hiyare and the Bekke reservoirs respectively?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) (a) In 1935. (b) This question is disallowed under by-law 9 (d) of the by-laws relating to the Conduct of Business. (c) This is not a matter in which the Chairman can interfere. The member is referred to the Registrar of Co-operative Societies.

(2) (a) On April 29, 1938. (b) Yes. (c) It is not correct that the Chairman did not complete the inquiries “ on his own ”. The Chairman completed the inquiries. He did not allow the Inspector of Works to side track the issue. He has no authority to prevent the Inspector of Works from making the application to the Attorney-General. (d) No. (e) This question is disallowed under by-law 9 (d). (f) The Attorney-General made only one refusal, on November 8, 1938. (g) The Chairman did not do so. (h) The answer is in the negative. No lawyer interviewed the Chairman on behalf of the Inspector of Works. (i) See reply to question 2 (c). (j) The statement of fact is incorrect. There was no second refusal. The Chairman has not made any finding. He has stated his opinion to the Council in pursuance of his undertaking to do. (k) The quotation from the Chairman's minute is correct. (l) This question is disallowed under by-law 9 (d). (m) Yes. (n) See reply to 2 (j). (o) On January 10, 1939. (p) Yes. (q) The Chairman acted in pursuance of the powers vested in him under the Ordinance. (r) This question is disallowed under by-law 9 (d).

(3) A statement giving the information required is tabled.

16. The following motion, which stood in the name of Mr. W. Dahanayake, was, with the permission of Council, deferred for consideration at a later date :—“ The Municipal Engineer be asked to submit a preliminary report on the possibility of augmenting the town's water supply by tapping the Gin-ganga at Wakwella ”.

17. Considered tenders received for the High Tension Earth Leakage Protection Gear.—Resolved that the tender of Messrs. Brown & Co., for Rs. 13,277.49 be accepted and that the vote provided for the purpose in the Budget for 1939, be increased accordingly to Rs. 14,000 in order to provide for the payment of the 5 per cent. departmental charges to the Government Electrical Department.

18. To consider, in connection with the Galle Water Supply, the proposed Madola Augmentation Scheme.—Resolved that this matter be considered at a Special Meeting of the Council to be held on February 10, 1939, at 2.30 P.M. It was agreed that Mr. Dahanayake's motion with regard to the possibility of tapping the Gin-ganga should be considered at the same time.

19. To fix a date for the next General Meeting of Council.—Agreed that the next General Meeting be held on February 24, 1939, at 2 P.M.

20. The following documents were laid on the table :—

- (1) Revised tentative programme relating to the electoral arrangements for applying the Colombo Municipal Council (Constitution) Ordinance, No. 60 of 1935, to the Municipal Council of Galle.
- (2) Statement of receipts and disbursements to the end of December, 1938.
- (3) Progress report of works done on estimates during December, 1938.
- (4) Report of the Inspector of Vehicles on carriages plying for hire during December, 1938.
- (5) Report of the Superintendent, Electricity Department.
- (6) Diaries of (a) the Medical Officer of Health; (b) the Municipal Engineer; (c) the Inspector of Works; and (d) the Manager, Health Department.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held at the Municipal Office on Friday, February 10, 1939, at 2 p.m., pursuant to Notice dated February 3, 1939.

Present :—Mr. W. J. L. Rogerson, Chairman; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. G. Ross Bell; Mr. A. C. Mohammado; Mr. E. M. Karunaratne; Mr. Thomas Amarasuriya; Mr. W. Dahanayake; Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab; Mr. J. C. Cooper; and Dr. A. T. Kuriyan.

1. To consider, in connection with the Galle Water Supply, the proposed Madola Augmentation Scheme.

The Chairman made a statement with regard to the proposed scheme which he said had been approved by the Provincial Engineer and was estimated to cost Rs. 25,000. It was a simple gravitation scheme which did not require any expert engineering knowledge and he thought that if it was put through the present water supply would be increased by about 25 per cent. He was personally quite satisfied that the scheme was a good one, and the cost was not at all prohibitive. He then moved :—That this Council do adopt and carry out the proposed Madola Augmentation Scheme at an estimated cost of Rs. 25,000. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.

Mr. W. Dahanayake said he had some doubts about the scheme which he did not think would benefit those living in the higher areas of the town. He wished to know whether, after the scheme was completed, it would be possible for the Council to allow the large number of water service applications which were still awaiting consideration. The Chairman said he saw no reason why this should not be possible.

Mr. Wahab said he was not opposed to the scheme but he was of opinion that before adopting it the Council should obtain the services of a qualified Waterworks Engineer to examine the details of the scheme and report upon its feasibility.

He, therefore, moved as an amendment :—That this Council requests the Director of Public Works to lend it the services of a qualified Waterworks Engineer to examine the Madola Scheme, or any other scheme, in all its details and report upon the feasibility of its adoption. Mr. W. Dahanayake seconded.

Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. M. Karunaratne, Thomas Amarasuriya, and A. C. Mohammado supported the scheme which they all considered to be a sound one, and after further discussion Mr. Wahab with the permission of the seconder withdrew his amendment.

The Chairman's motion was then put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.

2. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. Dahanayake moved :—That the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit a preliminary report on the possibility of augmenting the town's water supply by tapping the Gin-ganga at Wakwella. Mr. Wahab seconded, and Mr. J. C. Cooper supported, the motion. The Chairman suggested the addition of the words "and also to report upon the feasibility of constructing a reservoir in the Madola area". The mover accepted the suggestion, and the motion, as amended, was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously.
