CONVENTION BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY IN RESPECT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM AND HIS MAJESTY THE KING OF THE HELLENES REGARDING LEGAL PROCEEDINGS IN CIVIL AND COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

London, February 27, 1936.

[Ratifications exchanged in Athens on November 16, 1937.]

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Majesty the King of the Hellenes;

Being desirous to render mutual assistance in the conduct of legal proceedings in civil and commercial matters which are being dealt with or which it is anticipated may be dealt with by their respective judicial authorities;

Have resolved to conclude a Convention for this purpose

and have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries:
His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India: For Great Britain and Northern Ireland:

The Right Honourable Robert Anthony Eden, M.C., M.P., His Principal Secretary of State for Foreign

Affairs; and

His Majesty the King of the Hellenes.

Monsieur Charalambos Simopoulos, His Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in London;

Who, having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed as follows:-

I.—Preliminary.

ARTICLE 1.

- (a) Except where the contrary is expressly stated, this Convention applies only to civil and commercial matters, including non-contentious matters.
 - (b) In this Convention the words:
 - (1) "territory of one (or of the other) High Contracting Party" shall be interpreted (a) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, as meaning England and Wales and all territories in respect of which the Convention is in force by reason of extensions under Article 15 or accessions under Article 16; and (b) in relation to His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, Greece

(2) " persons" shall be deemed to mean individuals and

artificial persons;
(3) "artificial persons" shall be deemed to include partnerships, companies, societies and other corporations;

(4) "subjects of a High Contracting Party" shall be deemed to include artificial persons constituted or incorporated under the laws of the territory of such

- High Contracting Party;
 (5) "subjects of one (or of the other) High Contracting Party" shall be deemed (a) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, to mean all subjects of His Majesty wherever domiciled, and all persons under His protection; and (b) in relation to His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, all Greek subjects.
- II.—Service of Judicial and Extra-Judicial Documents.

ARTICLE 2.

(a) When judicial or extra judicial documents drawn up in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties are required by a judicial authority situated therein to be served on persons in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such documents may be served on the recipient, whatever his nationality, by any of the methods provided in Articles 3 and 4 in all cases where such method of service is recognised by the law of the country of origin.

(b) In Part II of this Convention the expression " country of origin " means the country from which the documents to be served emanate, and the expression " country of execution" means the country in which service of documents is to be effected.

ARTICLE 3.

(a) A request for service shall be addressed and sent by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting such authority to cause the document in question to be served.

(b) The request for service shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution and shall state the names and descriptions of the parties, the name, description and address of the recipient, and the nature of the document to be served, and shall enclose the document to be served in

duplicate.

(c) The document to be served shall either be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin

(d) Requests for service shall be addressed and sent-

In England to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

In Greece to the Procureur of the Tribunal of First Instance within whose jurisdiction the person, on whom the documents are to be served, resides, or, in case of doubt, to the Ministry of Justice.

If the authority to whom a request for service has been sent is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(e) Service shall be effected by the competent authority of the country of execution, who shall serve the document in the manner prescribed by the municipal law of such country for the service of similar documents, except that, if a wish for some special manner of service is expressed in the request for service, such manner of service shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of that country.

(f) The execution of a request for service, duly made in accordance with the preceding provisions of this Article, shall not be refused unless (1) the authenticity of the request for service is not established, or (2) the High Contracting Party in whose territory is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a request for service is not executed by the authority to whom it has been sent, the latter will at once inform the Consular Officer by whom the request was sent, stating the ground on which the execution of the request has been refused or the competent authority

to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) The authority by whom the request for service is executed shall furnish a certificate proving the service or explaining the reason which has prevented such service, and setting forth the fact, the manner and the date of such service or attempted service, and shall send the said certificate to the Consular Officer by whom the request for service was sent. The certificate of service or of attempted service shall be placed on one of the duplicates or attached thereto.

ARTICLE 4.

- (a) Service may be effected, without any request to or intervention of the authorities of the country of execution, by any of the following methods:-
 - (1) By a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin;
 - (2) By an agent appointed for the purpose either by the judicial authority of the country of origin or by the party on whose application the document was issued:
 - (3) Through the post; or
 - (4) By any other method of service which is not illegal, under the law existing at the time of service, in the country of execution.
- (b) All documents served in the manner provided in (1) of the preceding paragraph shall, unless the recipient is a subject of the High Contracting Party from whose territory the document to be served emanates, either be drawn up in the language of the country of execution or be accompanied by a translation into such language, certified as correct as prescribed in Article 3 (c).

(c) The High Contracting Parties agree that in principle it is also desirable that the provisions of paragraph (b) of this ariso desirable that the provisions of paragraph (a) of this article should apply to documents served in the manner provided in (2), (3) and (4) of paragraph (a) of this Article. Nevertheless, in the absence of any legislation in their respective territories making translations obligatory in such cases, the High Contracting Parties do not accept any obligation in this respect.

(d) It is understood that the question of the validity of any service effected by the use of any of the methods referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article will remain a matter for the free determination of the respective courts of the High Contracting Parties in accordance with their laws.

ARTICLE 5.

(a) In any case where documents have been served in accordance with the provisions of Article 3, the High Contracting Party, by whose Consular Officer the request for service was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any charges and expenses which are payable under the law of the country of execution to the persons employed to effect service, and any charges and expenses incurred in effecting service in a special manner. These charges and expenses shall not exceed such as are usually allowed in the courts of that country.

(b) Repayment of these charges and expenses shall be

claimed by the competent authority by whom the service has been effected from the Consular Officer by whom the

request was addressed, when sending to him the certificate provided for in Article 3 (h).

(c) Except as provided above, no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the service of any documents.

III.—Taking of Evidence.

ARTICLE 6.

(a) When a judicial authority in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties requires that evidence should be taken in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such evidence may be taken, whatever the nationality of the parties or witnesses may be, in any one of the ways prescribed in Articles 7 or 8.

(b) In Part III of this Convention, the expressions-

(I) "Taking of evidence" shall be deemed to include the taking of the statements of a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person on oath or otherwise; the submission to a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person of any oath with regard to any legal proceedings; and the production, identification and examination of documents, samples

or other objects.
(2) "Witness" shall be deemed to include any person from whom any evidence, as defined above, is

required to be taken.

(3) "Country of origin" shall be deemed to mean the country by whose judicial authority the evidence is required, and "country of execution", the country in which the evidence is to be taken.

ARTICLE 7.

(a) The judicial authority of the country of origin may, in accordance with the provisions of the law of his country, address himself by means of a Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting

such authority to take the evidence

- (b) The Letter of Request shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Consular Officer for the country of origin. The Letter of Request shall state the nature of the proceedings for which the evidence is required, giving all necessary information in regard thereto, the names of the parties thereto, and the names descriptions and addresses parties thereto, and the names, descriptions and addresses They shall also either (1) be accompanied of the witnesses. by a list of interrogatories to be put to the witness or witnesses, or, as the case may be, by a description of the documents, samples or other objects to be produced, identified or examined, and a translation thereof, certified as correct in the manner heretofore provided; or (2) shall request the competent authority to allow such questions to be asked vva voce as the parties or their representatives shall desire to ask.
 - (c) Letters of Request shall be transmitted-

In England by a Greek Consular Officer to the Senior

Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.
In Greece by a British Consular Officer to the Procureur of the Tribunal of First Instance within whose jurisdiction the witnesses are resident, or, in case of doubt, to the Ministry of Justice.

In case the authority to whom any Letter of Request is transmitted is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(d) The competent authority of the country of execution shall give effect to the Letter of Request and obtain the evidence required by the use of the same compulsory measures and the same procedure as are employed in the execution of a commission or order emanating from the authorities of his own country, except that if a wish that some special procedure should be followed is expressed in the Letter of Request, such special procedure shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of

the country of execution.

(e) The Consular Officer, by whom the Letter of Request is transmitted, shall, if he so desires, be informed of the date when and the place where the proceedings will take place, in order that he may inform the interested party or parties, who shall be permitted to be present in person or to be represented, if they so desire, by barristers or solicitors or by any representatives who are competent to appear before the courts either of the country of origin or of the country

of execution.

(f) The execution of a Letter of Request which complies with the preceding provisions of this Article can only be refused-

- (1) If the authorticity of the Letter of Request is not established;
- (2) If, in the country of execution, the execution of the Letter of Request in question does not fall within

the functions of the judiciary;
(3) If the High Contracting Party in whose territory it is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a Letter of Request is not executed by the authority to whom it is addressed, the latter will at once inform the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted, stating the grounds on which the execution of the Letter of Request has been refused, or the competent authority to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) When a Letter of Request has been executed, the competent authority to whom it was transmitted or forwarded shall send to the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted the necessary documents establishing its

execution.

ARTICLE 8.

(a) The evidence may also be taken, without any request to or the intervention of the authorities of the country of execution by a person in that country directly appointed for the purpose by the court of the country of origin. A Consular Officer acting for the country of origin or any other suitable individual may be so appointed.

(b) A person so appointed to take evidence may request the individuals named by the court appointing him to appear before him and to give evidence. He may take all kinds of evidence which are not contrary to the law of the country of execution, and shall have power to administer an oath. The attendance and giving of evidence before any such person shall be entirely voluntary and no measures of compulsion shall be employed.

(c) Requests to appear issued by such person shall, unless the recipient is a subject of the High Contracting Party for whose judicial authority the evidence is required, be drawn

up in the language of the country of execution or be accompanied by a translation into such language.

(d) The evidence may be taken in accordance with the procedure recognised by the law of the country of origin, and the parties will have the right to be present in person or to be represented by barristers or solicitors of that country or by any representatives who are competent to appear before the courts either of the country of origin or of the country of execution.

ARTICLE 9.

The fact that an attempt to take evidence by the method laid down in Article 8 has failed owing to the refusal of any witness to appear or to give evidence does not preclude a request being subsequently made in accordance with Article 7.

ARTICLE 10

(a) Where evidence is taken in the manner provided in (a) Where evidence is taken in the manner provided in Article 7 the High Contracting Party, by whose judicial authority the Letter of Request was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any expenses incurred by the competent authority of the latter in the execution of the request in respect of any charges and expenses payable to witnesses, experts, interpreters, or translators, the costs of obtaining the attendance of witnesses who have not appeared voluntarily, and the charges and expenses payable appeared voluntarily, and the charges and expenses payable to any person whom such authority may have deputed to

act, in cases where the law of the country of execution permits this to be done, and any charges and expenses incurred by reason of a special procedure being requested and followed. These expenses shall be such as are usually allowed in similar cases in the courts of the country of execution.

(b) The repayment of these expenses shall be claimed by the competent authority by whom the Letter of Request has been executed from the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted when sending to him the documents establishing its execution as provided in Article 7 (h).

(c) Except as above provided no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the taking of evidence.

IV .- Judicial Assistance for Poor Persons and Security for Costs.

ARTICLE 11.

The subjects of one High Contracting Party resident in the territory of the other High Contracting Party shall not be compelled to give security for costs in any case where a subject of such other High Contracting Party would not be so compelled.

ARTICLE 12.

(1) The subjects of one High Contracting Party shall enjoy in the territory of the other High Contracting Party a perfect equality of treatment with subjects of the latter High Contracting Party as regards free legal assistance for poor persons.

(2) The provisions of this Article apply to criminal as well as to civil and commercial matters, but do not apply to

artificial persons.

V.—General Provisions.

ARTICLE 13.

Any difficulties which may arise in connexion with the operation of this Convention shall be settled through the diplomatic channel.

ARTICLE 14.

The present Convention, of which the English and Greek texts are equally authentic, shall be subject to ratification. Ratifications shall be exchanged in Athens. The Convention shall come into force one month after the date on which ratifications are exchanged and shall remain in force for three years after the date of its coming into force. If neither of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice through the diplomatic channel to the other not less than six months before the expiration of the said period of three years of his intention to terminate the Convention, it shall remain in force until the expiration of six months from the day on which either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to terminate it.

ARTICLE 15.

(a) This Convention shall not apply ipso jure to Scotland, Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, nor to any of the Colonies, overseas territories or Protectorates of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, nor to any territories under His suzerainty, nor to any mandated territories in respect of which the mandate is exercised by His Government in the United Kıngdom, but His Majesty may at any time, while this Convention is in force under Article 14 by a notification given through His Minister at Athens, extend the operation of the Convention to any of the above-mentioned territories.

(b) Such notification shall state the authorities in the territory concerned to whom requests for service under Article 3 or Letters of Request under Article 7 are to be transmitted, and the language in which communications and translations are to be made. The date of the coming into force of any such extension shall be one month from

the date of such notification.

(c) Either of the High Contracting Parties may, at any time after the expiry of three years from the coming into force of an extension of this Convention to any of the territories referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article, terminate such extension on giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel.

(d) The termination of the Convention under Article 14 shall, unless otherwise expressly agreed to by both High Contracting Parties, *ipso jure* terminate it in respect of any territories to which it has been extended under paragraph (a)

of this Article.

ARTICLE 16.

(a) The High Contracting Parties agree that His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, may at any time, while the present Convention is in force, either under Article 14 or by virtue of any accession under this Article,

by a notification given through the diplomatic channel, accede to the present Convention in respect of any other Member of the British Commonwealth of Nations whose Government may desire that such accession should be effected, provided that no notification of accession may be given at any time when His Majesty the King of the Hellenes has given notice of termination in respect of all the territories of His Majesty to which the Convention applies. The provisions of Article 15 (b) shall be applicable to such notification. Any such accession shall take effect one month after the date of its notification.

(b) After the expiry of three years from the date of the coming into force of any accession under paragraph (a) of this Article, either of the High Contracting Parties may, by giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel, terminate the application of the Convention, to any country in respect of which a notification of of accession has been given. The termination of the Convention under Article 14 shall not affect its appli-

cation to any such country.

(c) Any notification of accession under paragraph (a) of this Article may include any dependency or mandated territory administered by the Government of the country in respect of which such notification of accession is given; and any notice of termination in respect of any such country under paragraph (b) shall apply to any dependency or mandated territory which was included in the notification of accession in respect of that country.

- 4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. R. Dharmasena, M.M.C., presented a petition from W. D. Leyon Singho, a former employee of the Council, and requested the Mayor to refer it to the appropriate Committee for consideration. Registered No. 728.
- 5. Mr. A. E. Goonesmha with the permission of the House presented a petition from the residents of Campbell Terrace, Borella, and requested that it be referred to the appropriate Committee for consideration and report.
- 6. Mr. J. R. Dharmasena with the permission of the House presented a petition from the ratepayers of Nalanda place regarding water service and requested that it be referred to the appropriate Committee for report
- The Mayor replied as follows to the question of which due notice had been given by Mr. R. F. S. de Mel:-Q.—Will the Mayor be so good as to state what duties are assigned to the Dispensary Medical Officers of this Council and their hours of work? Registered No. 738.
- A.—The duties assigned to the Dispensary Medical Officers of this Council and the hours of work, as reported A.—Ine duties assigned to the Dispensary Medical Officer of this Council and the notics of work, as reported by the Chief Medical Officer of Health, are as follows:—(1) To treat the poorest classes only who are unable to pay even the smallest fee of general practitioners. (2) To refer chronic cases and cases requiring major surgical treatment to the General Hospital. (3) To notify the Medical Officer of Health all cases of infectious diseases. (4) To visit patients when summoned for the first time. Cases requiring intensive home treatment to be advised to go to the hospital. Cases that can be treated at the dispensary to be requested to come to the dispensary. (5) To be responsible for the general state of the dispensary, the furniture, instruments, drugs, &c. To keep the keys of almirahs, &c., in his own charge. (6) To keep a diary at the dispensary and to record therein the time of his arrival and departure. If he should be called away the hours fixed for his attendance at the dispensary, to enter the time of his departure the time of his return, and during the hours fixed for his attendance at the dispensary, to enter the time of his departure, the time of his return, and the reason for his absence. (7) To see that the greatest economy is observed in the use of drugs. Cases which in his opinion require expensive drugs are to be referred to the General Hospital. (8) To keep an inventory or tool book of the furniture, appliances, drugs, &c., and to see that it is brought up to date and sent to Municipal Stores for verification once a month. (9) To keep oppum preparations, quinine, Santonine, Ext. Ballad., Pot. Iodide, Sod. Saleyllate and other costly drugs under his personal charge and to issue to the Apothecary only as required. To keep a register of the above drugs accurately and up to date. (10) To attend to the Municipal servants at the dispensary and to debit them for the cost price of medicine supplied. (11) To give anti-typhoid inocculation to those who seek to be inocculated. (12) To attend Medical Boards or Medical Examinations at the Public Health Department. (13) To give medical certificates to Municipal employees and those working in the Unemployment Relief Scheme. (14) To attend to cases referred to him by the Medical Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare. (15) To submit the following returns:—(a) Influenza and Pneumonia daily. (b) Monthly return of sick. (c) Monthly return of cost of drugs supplied to the Municipal Service. (d) Monthly return of leave. (e) Quarterly return of drugs. (f) At the end of the year to submit a report of the work done for the year. (16) Medical Officer, Maradana, to visit City Refuge weekly. (17) Medical Officers to examine new entrants to City Refuge sent by Charity Commissioner. (18) To dress minor surgical cases at dispensaries. (19) To answer emergency calls from the City Refuge. (20) Medical Officer, St. Paul's, to examine annually all the Fire Brigade officers as to their general fitness for dutios. (21) Special duty during epidemics as necessitated. Dispensaries are open daily from 7.30 A.M. to 11.30 A.M. and from 3 P.M. to 4 P.M. except on Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year Day, and Good Friday. I should like to mention that the above hours are only for admittance of patients. The Medical Officers have invariably to attend to them for at least half an hour beyond closing time for admittance of each period. once a month. ANNEXURE "C".

REPORT OF THE RENT RESTRICTION SUB-COMMITTEE.

Α.

Of the two motions passed on October 6, 1937, viz., (1) that a Rent Restriction Ordinance should be introduced more or less in accordance with the terms of the draft Ordinance attached to the motion and (2) that the law be amended relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo, the more important is undoubtedly the 2nd motion above-named. After careful consideration, we are of opinion that the law relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo should be amended in the manner mentioned below.

As the law now stands, under section 120 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Municipality has got the right to ask for returns of the rent or annual value of properties from the owner or occupier only for purposes of valuation. Further the penalty is only a fine not exceeding Rs. 100 for a false return or a refusal to make a return. If we compare this section 120 with the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, sections 179 and 180, it will be seen that so far as District Councils are concerned, the Local Authority has got much wider power. We are therefore of opinion that section 120 should be repealed and the law be amended giving-

(1) the Municipality power to revise the assessments of properties in Colombo periodically, say once in every 5 years, ward by ward;
(2) whenever the Municipality has given notice of such revision in any ward, the Municipal Assessor or the

Commissioner should be given the power to require the owner, occupier, and tenant of every house, building, or land to furnish a return of the rent or annual value thereof, the penalty for a refusal or for

false return being Rs. 500 or six months' rigorous imprisonment;

(3) the power to call for returns should not only be for the purpose of the periodical assessment, but also at any time and from time to time for the purpose of "the ascertainment of any information which in the opinion of the Commissioner shall be necessary" (see section 179 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1920);

(4) the Municipality should be given the right to enter and inspect and survey any house, building, or land at reasonable times;
(5) the Municipality should have the right also to summon and question any occupier, owner, or tenant of

the house, land, or building for the above purposes with the same penalty mentioned above.

(6) We are of opinion that objections to assessments should not be heard by the Assessment Department but

by an independent Committee composed, say of three Members, to be appointed from amongst the Members of the Municipal Council as well as from outside the Council.

This Committee should also have the power of hearing proposals for the reduction of the assessments for the following year made by any person to the Assessment Department provided that such application shall be heard by the Committee only if the Assessment Department is not satisfied with the evidence placed before it for the proposed reduction of assessment. If the Assessing Department is satisfied that the proposed reduction of the assessment for the following ear is justified on the evidence placed before it, the necessary alteration can be made for the next year. If the Assessing Department is not so satisfied, there should be a right of appeal to the Committee.

There should be a right of action in a Court of Law for the purpose of testing the decision of the Committee, as

in the existing law.

B.

The draft Ordinance was based on legislation passed in India, Rangoon, and Singapore, and a notice was published inviting criticism from the public. It was not meant to be passed intact as it stood, but was drafted with the object of inviting public comments. We are satisfied that it will not be advisable to pass the bill as drafted for the reasons given by the landlords. In spite, however, of the vehement protests of the landlords, we are firmly convinced that some relief should be given to the tenants of small buildings. Such relief can be given without unsettling the existing law to a great extent.

1. (a) In the first place, we think the Small Tenements Ordinance, No. 11 of 1882, should be amended in two respects. The word "tenement" should mean a house or other building or room which may be rented, exclusive of all taxes, rates and assessments, for a sum of not exceeding Rs. 30 instead of Rs. 20 as at present.

(b) Some provision should be made in the Small Tenements Ordinance introducing the English Law relating to Landlords' lien.

We understand that owing to a decision of the Supreme Court a landlord has no right to stop a tenant from removing his furniture for arrears of rent due unless he has obtained an order of Court to back him up. power should be given to landlords to stop the removal of property by a tenant who tries to evade payment of arrears of rent.

- 2. No landlord should have the right to increase the rent of a tenement, the monthly rental of which is Rs. 30 or under, above the assessed annual rent as assessed in the Municipal books, without getting the permission of the Municipal Magistrate. Such application should be dealt with summarily after notice to the tenants and the Municipal Authorities. Similarly no landlord should have the right to bring an action in any Civil Court in Ceylon to recover any sum above the assessed monthly rent as rent without getting the special permission of the Municipal Magistrate as stated
- No action to recover rent in respect of a tenement not assessed with a separate number in the Municipal Assess ment books should be allowed to be brought in any Civil Court, except with the previous sanction of the Municipal Magistrate obtained as stated above. This is to prevent a dwelling house being divided into cubicles for the purpose of
- 4. A right of appeal should be provided from the decision of the Municipal Magistrate, say to the Commissioner of the Court of Requests, the party appealing furnishing security in a sum not exceeding Rs. 25, the cost of appeal being taxed as in an ordinary action in a Court of Requests.
- 5. There should be provision made that no premium is to be chargeable in respect of a tenancy and a penalty provided for disturbance of easements by the landlord in order to get rid of an unsatisfactory tenant.

If this report is approved or modified by the Municipal Council, a draft bill or bills will be drafted by the Special ·Committee in terms of the resolution.

Cellulose Holdings, Limited.

Improvements relating to Yarns, Threads, Textiles and other Fibrous Products or Structures.

Abstract.—The inventor describes a method of making strong textile yarns out of a mixture of fibres at least one of which can be rendered adhesive afterwards by physical or chemical means. The activated material is subjected to a compacting treatment which binds the fibres close together, and then deactivated. The inventor claims that by this process a strong textile is produced and that the appearance, finish, &c., of the woven cloth is improved and the resistance to wear and laundering increased.

The fibres used in this invention may be naturally occuring vegetable, animal or mineral fibres; artificial fibres such as cellulose or cellulose derivatives, and synthetic resins; natural or synthetic rubber, glue, &c.; fibres and filaments obtained by cutting and shreading non-fibrous matter.

The activating treatment consists in making at least one of the fibres tacky by chemical solvents or by chemical agents which convert the fibres into fibres which are tacky or by heat and/or irradiation. The activating treatment may be done at any stage in the production of the cloth after the mixing of the fibres. The treatment may also be such as to destroy the fibrous nature of the adhesive fibres.

The compacting treatment follows at any stage later than the activating state and consists in applying pressure during twisting or any of the finishing operations.

Simultaneously with or subsequently to the compacting treatment the deactivating treatment is applied. For instance, if the fibres had been activated by the use of chemicals deactivating may be accomplished by evaporation, neutralization or coagulation of the chemical agent.

Among the specific objects attained by the use of the

invention as claimed by the inventor are:

The production of a tyre cord having superior strength, lower stretch and increased scorch resistance, a sewing thread of higher strength and fabrics less liable to "running" and "laddering"; the utilization of shorter fibres than used heretofore; the manufacture of collar cloth of increased stiffness.

The inventor states that the new products show an exterminating action on the malarial parasites which propagate sexually (gametes). In very low concentrations they have a selective action on the male gametocytes, reducing them to impotency.

Process for stimulating the formation of roots and acting upon secondary meristems.

Abstract.—The inventor describes a process of stimulating the development of meristemic and bark tissue by the application of a preparation composed of an "excipient" and an activating agent. This preparation would be advantageous in (1) layering, grafting, propagation by off-shoots and in all other forms of vegetative reproduction, and (2) aliminating dead toggies and measures the growth and (2) eliminating dead tissue and increasing the growth of calluses.

The "excipient" may be any suitable material, e.g., water, solid or liquid hydro-carbon, animal or vegetable

fat and may be acid, neutral, or alkaline in reaction. best results are, however, obtained with a weak acid reaction. To this may be added small quantities of antiseptic substances, and traces of bivalent metals. The activating substance is a mixture of etheroauxines or their derivatives. Alternatively, if it is of a different chemical composition, should have an action similar to that of these derivatives, e.g., derivatives of indol, phenol, napthaline, anthracine. The activating substance may also be a synthetic auxine or a substance capable of evolving ethylene, acetylene or carbonic oxides slowly.

A typical formula for the composition would be:

Improvements m or relating to the manufacture of refractory materials.

Abstract.—The invention relates to the manufacture of refractory material from Magnesite for lining furnaces in the basic open hearth process, and in other similar processes. The addition of a small percentage of iron compound to the raw magnesite has been known to facilitate the sintering process, but this involves the use of a rotary kiln, which is

comparatively expensive.

The object of the present invention is to avoid the use of the rotary kiln by calcining the magnesite first at about 850°C. to expel the carbon dioxide, grinding it to fine powder and adding a small percentage of iron in the form of sesquioxide, or the magnetic oxide, the quantity form of sesquioxide, or the magnetic oxide, the quantity depending on the specification of the finished product. The calcined magnesite being cementitious is readily formed into briquettes which can be fired at about 1750°C. in ordinary kilns. A binding medium may be used in forming the briquettes.

Abstract.—The invention relates to tea rollers provided with reversing electric motor for operating the cap.

According to the invention the cap is provided with a top limit switch to stop the upward motion of the motor, and a pressure limit device depending for its operation on the reacting pressure of the tea in the container to stop the

downward motion of the cap when a predetermined adjustable pressure has been attained.

The duration of the "on pressure" period is determined by the setting on a bar which climbs step by step in response to timed impulses from a suitable generator; when the bar has climbed a distance determined by the setting, electrical circuits are changed so that the motor is started on its upward motion. Similarly the duration of the "no pressure" and "total rolling" period are controlled by impulses from the same generator. During the "on pressure" period if the pressure should fall due to the compression of the leaf, the timed impulses start the motor again to move in the downward direction till stopped again by the pressure limit switch. When the total predetermined rolling time has elapsed the cap is automatically taken up and at the same time audible and visible signals are given to the attendant.




