REGULATIONS.

1. No person in a state of intoxication shall enter or remain within the Customs premises.
2. No person shall loiter, expectorate, behave in a disorderly manner, fight, indecently expose his person or commit any nuisance within the Customs premises.
3. No person shall damage or deface any goods or property within the Customs premises.
4. No person shall within the Customs premises prevent or attempt to prevent any other person from doing any work or act in connection with the landing, shipping, or handling of goods which that person is legally entitled to do.
5. Any Customs or Police Officer may call upon any person within the Customs premises to state his reasons for

entering or remaining therein, and if he considers that the reasons given by such person are unsatisfactory, may order such person to leave the Customs premises forthwith.

6. Every person upon being ordered by a Customs or Police Officer to leave the Customs premises as provided in regulation 5 shall immediately comply with such order.

7. The Collector of Customs may after notice in writing to any person, prohibit such person from entering the Customs premises without a special permit from the Collector of Customs and no person so prohibited shall enter the Customs premises without such special permit.

8. No person shall, for the purpose of bathing, enter the sea from the foreshore opposite the Assistant Master Attendant's boat house or from No. 1 Jetty without the permission of the Collector of Customs, Galle.

Revision of Registers.

THE registers of voters of the Colombo Town electorates are being revised for the year 1939 and attention is invited to the relevant provisions of the Ceylon (State Council Elections) Order in Council, 1931, and in particular those provisions whereby persons not possessing Ceylon domicile of Origin are qualified to have their names entered in the register of voters.

2. Persons not possessing Ceylon domicile of origin can register themselves as voters under—

- I. Article 7—By virtue of a Ceylon domicile of choice.
- II. Article 8—By virtue of the special literacy and property qualification.
- III. Article 9—By virtue of the special qualification by certificate of permanent settlement.

Persons who claim to be registered under Article 8 or Article 9 are required to apply in writing in accordance with the instructions contained in the Notification published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* of July 28, 1939, and in the newspapers.

Persons who claim to be qualified for registration under Article 7 by virtue of a Ceylon domicile of choice should give their names to the enumerators who will visit them for the purpose of revising the registers. They will be required to furnish proof to the satisfaction of the Registering Officer that they—

- (i.) have resided in Ceylon for total period of/or exceeding 5 years; and
- (ii.) have determined to make Ceylon their sole and permanent home.

3. Names will be entered in the Register only if proof is produced to the reasonable satisfaction of the Registering Officer and any person whose name has been omitted may apply to have it inserted in the register in terms of Article 17 of the Order in Council.

CODE OF REGULATIONS FOR ASSISTED ENGLISH SCHOOLS.

THE following amendments to the Code of Regulations for Assisted English Schools, which have been approved by the Board of Education are hereby published for general information in accordance with section 10 (2) of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920.

AMENDMENTS REFERRED TO.

Clause 31A.—

Delete condition (1) in lines 6–13 of this clause and substitute :—

(1) Schools which have an average attendance of not more than 200 eligible pupils in the primary classes will be allowed to count one teacher for every 25 units of average attendance. When the average attendance of eligible pupils in the primary classes exceeds 200, the allowance will be 8 teachers for the first 200 units and one teacher for every additional 30 units.

The allowance of teachers for the post-primary classes shall be determined separately in accordance with the following rule.

Schools which have an average attendance of not more than 100 eligible pupils in the post-primary classes will be allowed to count one teacher for every 20 units of average attendance. For the units of average attendance over 100, one teacher will be allowed for every 25 units. In Girls' Schools which have an average attendance in the post-primary classes exceeding 50 and not exceeding 250 units one extra teacher may be allowed at the discretion of the Director.

Average attendance shall be reckoned for the school year, viz., the 12 months preceding the usual date of collection of the annual returns. Fractions of over one half the quota shall count for an additional teacher.

Managers of Senior Secondary Schools shall furnish two sets of annual returns, one for the primary classes and one for the post-primary classes.

This rule shall come into force from the date on which it has been confirmed by His Excellency the Governor and published in the *Government Gazette*.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule a vacancy may be filled by the appointment of a teacher who is undergoing training in the Government Training School at the time this rule comes into force, or who has, not more than two years before the date of this rule, completed a course of training in the Government Training School and has been unemployed since the date of completion of such course, provided that such teacher has, prior to the commencement of his course of training, been employed as a member of the staff of a registered school for at least one year, and provided that the filling of such vacancy does not permit the school to have a larger staff than that allowed by the conditions in force before the date of this rule.

Clause 41.—

Insert a new Sub-clause :—

(f) A period of no-pay leave not exceeding two years may be granted to any teacher for the purpose of undergoing training at the Government Training School. Before granting such leave the Manager shall supply the Director with an undertaking to re-employ the teacher at the end of his course of training. During such leave a substitute may with the permission of the Director be appointed.

Appendix B.—

In the heading to the first part of Appendix B delete the words "in Boys Schools and Men Teachers in Mixed Schools".

Delete note "For Bilingual Schools Scale C."

Delete the heading and scales in the second part of Appendix B. (Fixed contributions from Managers towards the salaries of Women Teachers in Girls' and Mixed Schools and in the Kindergarten classes of Boys' Schools.)

Add a New Clause 30B.—

Any teacher appointed to a school after the date on which this rule comes into force will be placed on the salary scale appropriate to his qualifications and the class in which he fills a vacancy.

There shall be five classes of teachers to which the salary scales for new appointments and scales of Managers' contributions in Appendix D shall apply.

No appointment to any class shall be made without the approval of the Director.

(b) For the purpose of allotting the proportion of teachers in the various classes there shall be a standard staff fixed for each school. The standard staff for any school shall be as shown in Appendix E and shall be fixed by the average attendance of eligible pupils for the previous school year. The attendance of average pupils in accordance with Clause 31A (2) sub-paragraph (a) shall be taken into account in assessing the standard staff. In the case of new schools the Director shall decide the standard staff for the first school year.

In Senior Secondary Schools the standard staff shall be determined separately for the primary and post-primary classes. The Director shall decide which teachers shall be counted as belonging to the primary classes and which to the post-primary classes.

In Junior Secondary Schools the standard staff shall be determined by the total eligible staff obtained by adding the eligible staff for the post-primary classes to that for the primary classes.

(c) For the purpose of assessing the quality of the staff of each school at the date on which this rule comes into force the eligible staff shall be allocated to classes, as follows:—

Class I.	..	Special post-holders and Head Teachers of C Scale schools
Class II.	..	Other Trained Graduates, 1st Class Trained and Graduate Teachers
Class III.	..	Any teacher coming under any of the other scales of the former classes I. and II. of Appendix A of the Code or the corresponding scales of Appendix C or the special grades of Appendix A
Class IV.	..	3rd Class Certificated Teachers and holders of the 1st Class Drawing Certificate or the Ceylon Commercial Certificate
Class V.	..	Any other teacher

As long as such teachers continue to fill the posts occupied by them at the time of grading, or if they exchange places with teachers of the same class in other schools or fill posts in registered new schools with the approval of the Director, their salary scales will continue to be those of Appendix A or C of the Code with Managers' contribution as in Appendix B and they will be eligible to be placed on any other scale to which they may become entitled by reason of improvement of qualification.

But when a vacancy occurs in any school it shall be filled by the appointment of a teacher to a class in which there is a vacancy.

A vacancy shall not, however, be deemed to have arisen in any particular class in any school unless the aggregate number of teachers in that class and all higher classes is less than the aggregate shown in the table of standard staffs. In exceptional cases, however, a vacancy for a Head Teacher may be filled by the appointment of a teacher to the highest class allotted to the school in the table of standard staffs provided the Director is satisfied that the vacancy cannot be filled satisfactorily by the appointment of one of the existing staff of the school.

(d) Managers of schools shall not transfer teachers from one school to fill a vacancy in a lower class in the same or another school, unless the consent of the teacher has been obtained or good reasons are shown on disciplinary grounds for the transfer.

Teachers shall not be transferred from the post-primary to the primary section of a senior secondary school without the permission of the Director.

(e) A manager may make application to the Director to have the entire staff of his school brought under the provisions of this clause, but such request shall not be granted, unless the quota of teachers is in accordance with the amendment to Clause 31A of the Code and the teachers have consented to the proposal.

(f) No new school shall be registered unless the staff conforms to the minimum qualifications of the standard staff specified in Appendix E.

(g) Nothing in this rule shall prevent a Manager from employing teachers in excess of the standard staff subject to the approval of the Director.

This rule shall come into force from the date on which it has been confirmed by His Excellency the Governor and published in the *Government Gazette*.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule a teacher who is undergoing training in the Government Training School at the time this rule comes into force, or who has, not more than two years before the date of this rule, completed a course of training in the Government Training School and has been unemployed since the date of completion of such course, shall, on appointment to a school, be placed on the salary appropriate to his qualifications in Appendix A or C of the Code with Managers' contribution as in Appendix B, provided that such teacher has, prior to the commencement of his course of training, been employed as a member of the staff of a registered school for at least one year. Such teacher may, however, be given the option of coming under the provisions of this rule, if he so desires.

CODE OF REGULATIONS FOR ASSISTED VERNACULAR AND BILINGUAL SCHOOLS.

THE following amendments to the Code of Regulations for Assisted Vernacular and Bilingual Schools, which have been approved by the Board of Education are hereby published for general information in accordance with section 10 (2) of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920.

AMENDMENTS REFERRED TO.

Clause 39A.—

Delete the first part of condition (1) in lines 6 to 47 of this clause. (Quota for Vernacular Schools, Bilingual (non-boarding) Schools, and Bilingual Girls Boarding Schools down to the words “. . . except in the case of English Teachers”) and substitute the following :—

(1) *Vernacular Schools and Bilingual (Non-boarding) Schools.*—Vernacular schools and bilingual (non-boarding) schools which have an average attendance of not more than 210 eligible pupils in the primary classes will be allowed to count one teacher for every 30 units of average attendance. When the average attendance of eligible pupils exceeds 210 the allowance will be 7 teachers for the first 210 units and one teacher for every additional 35 units.

The allowance of teachers in the post-primary classes shall be determined separately in accordance with the following rule.

Schools which have an average attendance of not more than 200 eligible pupils in the post-primary classes will be allowed to count one teacher for every 25 units of average attendance. For the units of average attendance over 200, one teacher will be allowed for every 30 units.

Bilingual Girls Boarding Schools.—Bilingual Girls boarding schools which have an average attendance of not more than 200 eligible pupils will be allowed to count one teacher for every 25 units of average attendance. For the units of average attendance over 200 one teacher will be allowed for every 30 units.

Average attendance shall be reckoned for the school year, viz., the 12 months preceding the usual date of collection of the annual returns.

In Bilingual Schools the quota of English teachers included in the above staff shall be 30 units of average attendance of pupils learning English in classes above and including Standard IV. for one full-time or part-time teacher.

Fractions of over one half the quota shall count for an additional teacher except in the case of English teachers in Bilingual Schools.

This rule shall come into force from the date on which it has been confirmed by His Excellency the Governor and published in the *Government Gazette*.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule a vacancy may be filled by the appointment of a teacher who is undergoing training in a Government or Assisted Training School in Ceylon at the time this rule comes into force, or who has, not more than two years before the date of this rule, completed a course of training in such training school and has been unemployed since the completion of his course, provided that such teacher has, prior to the commencement of his course of training, been employed as a member of the staff of a registered school for at least one year, and provided that the filling of such vacancy does not permit the school to have a larger staff than that allowed by the conditions in force before the date of this rule.

In sub-paragraph (a) line 3 after the words "last day of the school year or over" delete "18" and substitute "17".

Clause 40.—Delete and substitute :—

The grant payable on account of English teachers on the eligible staffs of Bilingual Schools shall be the difference between the approved salaries of these teachers in accordance with Appendices B or D and the Manager's contribution as shown in Appendix C.

The above appendices shall continue to apply to those teachers who are on the staffs of Bilingual Schools on the date on which this rule comes into force for the rest of the period they are in service in the same schools or when two such teachers in different schools change places with the approval of the Director, or when one such teacher changes places with a similar teacher in an English School with the approval of the Director or is transferred to a registered new school with the approval of the Director. But when a vacancy occurs for an English teacher in a Bilingual School after the date on which this rule comes into force it shall be filled in the manner indicated in Clause 36A and the grant payable shall be the difference between the approved salary in accordance with Appendix G and the Manager's contribution as shown in the same Appendix.

This rule shall come into force from the date on which it has been confirmed by His Excellency the Governor and published in the *Government Gazette*.

Clause 55.—Insert a new Sub-Clause :—

(f) A period of no-pay leave not exceeding two years may be granted to any teacher for the purpose of undergoing training in a registered Government or Assisted Training School. Before granting such leave the Manager shall supply the Director with an undertaking to re-employ the teacher at the end of his course of training. During such leave a substitute may, with the permission of the Director, be appointed.

Appendix C.—Delete the heading to the first part of Appendix C and substitute the following heading :—

"Fixed contributions from Managers towards the Salaries of English Teachers in Bilingual Schools."

Delete note "This contribution is Scale C for English Schools."

Delete the heading and scales in the second part of Appendix C (Fixed contributions from Managers towards the salaries of Women Teachers in Vernacular and Bilingual Girls' and in Vernacular and Bilingual Mixed Schools).

Insert a New Clause 36A.—

(a) Any teacher appointed to a school after the date on which this rule comes into force will be placed on the salary scale appropriate to his qualifications and the class in which he fills a vacancy.

There shall be five classes of teachers to which the salary scales in Appendix E for new appointments shall apply.

No appointment to any class shall be made without the approval of the Director.

(b) For the purpose of allotting the proportion of teachers in the various classes there shall be a standard staff fixed for each school. The standard staff for any school shall be as shown in Appendix F and shall be fixed by the average attendance of eligible pupils for the previous school year. In vernacular schools and bilingual (non-boarding) schools which have post-primary as well as primary classes, the standard staff shall be determined by the total eligible staff obtained by adding the eligible staff for the post-primary classes to that for the primary classes. In the case of new schools the Director shall decide the standard staff for the first school year.

(c) The Director shall fix the standard staffs for Bilingual Schools by substituting for posts indicated in Appendix F posts for English teachers according to the number of English teachers allowed by attendance. The highest post in the standard staff shall be one of those substituted. English teachers shall be classified according to the rules of Clause 30B of the Code for Assisted English Schools and the posts for English teachers substituted by the Director shall in no case allow the school to have a higher classification of English teachers than that indicated for an English School of the same total staff.

(d) For the purpose of assessing the quality of the staff of each school at the date on which this rule comes into force the eligible staff shall be allocated to classes as follows :—

Class I.	..	Teachers on any of the Head Teachers' Scales of Appendix A
Class II.	..	Other 1st Class Trained and 1st Class Certificated Teachers
Class III.	..	Other 2nd Class Trained and 2nd Class Certificated Teachers
Class IV.	..	3rd Class Certificated Teachers, English teachers appointed under sub-clause 37d (ii.) and holders of 2nd Class Provisional Certificate (Trained)
Class V.	..	Any other teachers

Existing English teachers in service in Bilingual Schools shall be classified according to the rules in Clause 30B sub-paragraph (c) of the Code for Assisted English Schools.

As long as such Vernacular and English teachers continue to fill the posts occupied by them at the time of grading, or if they exchange places with teachers of the same class in another school or fill posts in registered new schools with the approval of the Director, their salary scales will continue to be those of Appendices, A, B, or D of the Code, and they shall be eligible to be placed on any other scale to which they may become entitled by reason of improvement of qualifications. But when a vacancy occurs in any school it shall be filled by the appointment of a teacher to a class in which there is a vacancy.

A vacancy shall not be deemed to have arisen in any particular class in any school unless the aggregate number of teachers in that class and in all higher classes is less than the aggregate shown in the table of standard staffs.

(e) Managers of schools shall not transfer a teacher from one school to fill a vacancy in a lower class in the same or another school unless the consent of the teacher has been obtained or good reasons are shown on disciplinary grounds for the transfer.

(f) A Manager may make application to the Director to have the entire staff of his school brought under the provisions of this Clause, but such request shall not be granted, unless the quota of teachers is in accordance with the amendment to Clause 39A of the Code and the teachers have consented to the proposal.

(g) No new school shall be registered unless the staff conforms to the minimum qualifications of the standard staff specified in Appendix E.

This rule shall come into force from the date on which it has been approved by His Excellency the Governor and published in the *Government Gazette*.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule a teacher who is undergoing training in a Government or Assisted Training School in Ceylon at the time this rule comes into force, or who has, not more than two years before the date of this rule, completed a course of training in such training school and has been unemployed since the date of completion of his course, shall, on appointment to a school, be placed on the salary scale appropriate to his qualifications in Appendix A of the Code, or, if an English teacher in a bilingual school, Appendix B or D with Manager's contribution as in Appendix C, provided that such teacher has, prior to the commencement of his course of training, been employed as a member of the staff of a registered school for at least one year. Such teacher may, however, be given the option of coming under the provisions of this rule if he so desires.

Insert a new Appendix—Appendix E.

Classification of teachers and Salary Scales for Teachers appointed to Vernacular Schools and Vernacular staffs of Bilingual Schools from and after the date on which this Appendix comes into Force.
