BY-LAW.

The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 7,765 of March 7, 1930, and therein called "regulations" are hereby amended in Chapter IV-E thereof by the addition, immediately after by law 8, of the following area by law 8. by-law 8, of the following new by-law 8A:

- 8A. (1) No meat shall be transported from any slaughter-house to any butcher's stall except in a box or vehicle which satisfies the following conditions:—
 - (a) Every box must have the inside lined with zinc or other impermeable material and be fitted with a
 - (b) Every vehicle must be provided with-
 - (i.) a roof to protect the meat from the sun or rain or from contamination by flies or
 - (ii.) a covering at any open end to screen the meat from public view,
 - (iii.) a compartment, the inside of which is lined with zinc or other impermeable material for storing the meat
 - (iv.) a hinged door with staple and hasp.
- (2) Every butcher to whose stall any meat is transported shall cause the box or the compartment in which such meat is transported to be washed immediately after the meat has been removed therefrom.
- (3) Where any meat is transported in contravention of the provisions of paragraph (1), the person liable for such contravention shall be the butcher to whose stall or on whose behalf or at whose directions such meat was so transported."

THE HOUSING AND TOWN IMPROVEMENT ORDINANCE (CHAPTER 199).

THE following resolution passed by the State Council at a meeting held on September 21, 1939, is published for general information:

This Council resolves under the provisions of section 3 (b) of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, (Chapter 199), that from and after the first day of October, 1939, the aforesaid Ordinance shall be in force within the limits of the village of Blackpool in the Nuwara Eliya Four Gravets division of the Nuwara Eliya District in the Central Province, situated within the following boundaries:-

North: A line drawn from a point at the centre of Nanu-oya near the 411 milestone on the Nanuoya-Nuwara Eliya road eastwards along the centre of Nanu-oya op to the point of its conflu-ence with the Mahagastota-ela.

East: A line drawn from the last-mentioned point southwards along the centre of Mahagastotaela to a point due east of the south-eastern corner of lot 22 in P. P. 7,217.

South: A line drawn from the last-mentioned point

westwards and southwards along the centre of Mahagastota-ela to a point east of the southeastern corner of lot 69 in P. P. 7,217, thence westwards along the southern boundaries of lots 69 and 68 in the said plan up to the landmark at the south-western corner of lot 68.

West: A line drawn from the last-mentioned point northwards along the outer boundaries defined with landmarks and rock landmarks of lots 68, 67, 66, 65, 64, 63, 62, 60, 59A, 59, 1, 1A, and 1B to the landmark at the north-western corner of lot 1 in P. P. 7,217, thence northwards to the starting point of the northern limit.

Regulations.

REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE DIPLOMA OF LICENTIATE IN DENTAL SURGERY.

(L.D.S., Cey.).

Section I.—General.

- 1. The curriculum of post-graduate study extends over two years. Instruction shall be given and all practical work carried out in the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School.
- 2. The final examination shall be held on the completion of the full course of studies.
- 3. Every candidate who fails to satisfy the Board of Examiners at the final examination shall repeat such course
- of study as may be prescribed by the Board of Examiners.

 4. No candidate who fails to satisfy the Board of Examiners in any examination shall present himself for re-examination unless he has paid again the fees (a) for the course of studies for the coversion of the same of the sam course of studies for the examination, and re-examination.
- 5. A candidate does not become a Licentiate in Dental Surgery on his passing the final examination. It rests with the Council of the Ceylon Medical College to confer the diploma of Licentiate in Dental Surgery on those candidates who have passed the examination and complied with the regulations. Until the diploma has been granted a candidate is not entitled to have his name entered in the Dental Register.
- 6. The examination fee shall be paid not less than three days before the date of the commencement of the examination.

- 7. The certificates of professional study issued in book form must be signed or counter-signed by an authorized Official of the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School, and will be required for the purpose of showing that the candidate has attended such examinations as are conducted during the several courses.
- 8. Application for admission to the several examinations, and any inquiries or correspondence relating to the courses of studies and the examinations for the diploma of Licentiate in Dental Surgery must be addressed to the Registrar.

Section II.—The Final Examination.

- 1. The subjects of the final examination are-
- Part 1.—Dental Mechanics and Prosthetics and Dental
- Metallurgy.

 -(a) Special Anatomy and Physiology of the teeth Part 2.-
- and associated parts.

 (b) Dental Histology and Patho-Histology.

 Part 3.—(a) Dental Surgery and Pathology (including Patho-Histology).
 - Operative Dental Surgery.
 - Orthodontics.

 - (d) Radiology.(e) Anaesthetics.
 - (e) Anaesthetics (f) Prosthetics.

(Note.—The student is liable to be examined in Prosthetics in the final stage with Dental Surgery, &c. Lectures are however delivered during the early part of the studies in association with Dental Mechanics-vide 1 and 2 above).

The examination consists of-

(a) A written examination of three hours' duration in Metallurgy and a practical examination in Dental Mechanics referred to in Part 1. (b) A written examination of three hours duration and

- an oral examination in each of the subjects specified in Parts 2 and 3, and a practical examination in Dental Surgery and Pathology (including Patho-Histology) and Orthodontics.
- Every candidate shall enter for all three parts of the final examination at one and the same time. A candidate who satisfies the Examiners in the subjects comprising Part 1 or Part 2 shall not be required to sit for such subjects a second time. A candidate who fails to satisfy the Examiners in both Part 1 and Part 2 of the examination shall, notwithstanding that he has satisfied the Examiners in Part 3, be required to sit for all three parts when he presents himself for re-examination.
- 4. Every candidate who seeks admission to Part 1 of the final examination shall submit with his application, certificates to the effect that he has-
 - (1) been engaged during a period of not less than two years in acquiring practical skill in Dental Mechanics; and
 - (2) attended-
 - (a) the prescribed course of lectures on Dental Mechanics and Prosthesis;
 - (b) the prescribed course of lectures on Dental Metallurgy;
 (c) the prescribed course of Practical Dental Metal-

 - lurgy; and
 (d) the prescribed course of instructions in
 Practical Dental Mechanics including the construction and adjustment of six dentures and the construction of various types of orthodontic appliances.
- Every candidate who seeks admission to Part 2 of the final examination shall produce a certificate to the effect that he has attended-
 - (a) a course of instruction in special Anatomy and Physiology of the teeth and associated parts; and (b) a course of instruction in Dental Histology, including
 - the preparation of microscopical sections.
- 6. Every candidate who fails to satisfy the Examiners in any subject at the final examination shall, when applying for admission to re-examination, produce evidence that he has studied that subject at the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School to the satisfaction of the Registrar, for a period of not less than three months, subsequent to the date of his failure. Where a candidate has failed to satisfy the Examiners in the subjects comprising Part 1 of the final examination, he shall also produce evidence that he has, since the date of his failure, followed a course of instruction in Practical Dental Mechanics.
- 7. At the examination in Dental Mechanics every candidate shall provide himself with the following instruments:—Wax spatula, double-ended; sculptors; gouge; vulcanite files; gold files; pliers (pin-roughing, bending and

collar); metal cutting shears; plate cutters; plate perforatons; broaches; chasing punches; rivetting hammer; frot saw frame and saws; Melotte's moldine outfit; mouth blowpipe; solder tweezers; crown holder; borax slab;

The following instruments will be supplied by the Hospital at which the candidate is examined :- Hammer for striking up plates; horn mallets; ordinary casting

materials and apparatus; Bunsen burner.

8. Every candidate who seeks admission to Part 3 of the final examination shall produce a certificate to the effect that he has attended at the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School-

(a) a course of instruction in Dental Surgery and Pathology (including Patho-Histology);

(b) a separate course of instruction in practical Dental Surgery (Operative Dental Surgery);

(c) a course of instruction in Orthodontics

(d) a course of instruction in Radiology in relation to Dental Surgery; and

(e) the practice of Dental Surgery for two years.

Candidates may be examined in Dental Bacteriology and

Dental Materia Medica in Part 3 of the examination.

9. At the clinical and practical part of the examination, every candidate shall provide himself with the Dental Engine and the usual instruments common to dental work in the Conservation Room.

In the regulation "Conservation Room" means the

room where teeth are treated and conserved by restoration methods, as for example, by fillings, inlays, crowns, &c.

Section III.—Students.

- Students entering the practice of the Dental Hospital and School must conform to the regulations set out in this section.
- 2. All fees must be paid in Colombo, into the Chartered Bank, or at outstations into a Kachcheri, to be credited to general revenue, and a receipt obtained therefor. receipt must be handed personally to the Registrar.

3. A student desirous of communicating with the Principal or with the Council of the College shall do so

through the medium of the Registrar.
4. The Registrar is in attendance daily in his office from 10 A.M. to 11 A.M. to give advice to students, their parents or guardians.

5. Every student will receive from the Registrar at the commencement of each session an enrolment card signed by the Registrar. No student shall attend any course other than a course which is entered on his enrolment card and in the Students' Register.

6. Every student shall take his enrolment card to the lecturer on each specified subject and have it signed by such lecturer as evidence of the fact that the student has been entered on his roll.

7. At the end of a course of lectures or other classes of instruction every student who has attended regularly and has satisfactorily performed the work of the class, will receive a Class Certificate. This certificate is to be produced

when entering for any professional examination.

- 8. A student who fails to attend regularly or to perform satisfactorily his work in the class shall be refused a class certificate by the lecturer and shall be called upon to take the course over again. No allowance for absence from Hospital practice or lectures or mechanical work will be made unless a medical certificate is produced in the case of illness or unless special leave is obtained from the Registrar.
- 9. Irregular attendance or neglect of work will be reported to the Registrar.

The actual attendance of every student must amount to not less than 50 per cent. of the total possible attendance.

11. No student who is suffering from any infectious or

- contagious disease shall be allowed to attend the Dental Hospital or School.
- 12. A lecturer may suspend temporarily any student or students from his class, pending a report to the Registrar.
- 13. The Registrar may suspend any student for misbehaviour pending reference of his case to the Council which may inflict such punishment, including dismissal from the Dental Hospital and School as it may consider necessary.

 14. Apparatus lost or broken by a student must be
- replaced or paid for by that student within fourteen days of the occurrence, otherwise such student will not be allowed to attend the class at which the damage was done. In the case of valuable apparatus the Registrar may extend the time of payment. In any case payment must be made before a certificate of attendance is issued. Payment shall be made to the Registrar who shall give a receipt therefor.
- 15. Every student entering for an examination or a term is particularly warned to see that receipts for fees and all certificates are brought to the Registrar personally at least twenty four hours before the last day mentioned in the Calendar.

- 16. A student who fails to present personally the certificates required on or before the last day and hour prescribed, shall not be allowed to enter for the session or examination.
- The onus of producing the certificates of attendance rests with the student. If a certificate is lost, another may
- be obtained on payment of Rs. 5.

 18. The premises of the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School will be closed daily at 4.30 p.m. (Saturdays 2 p.m.). Special sanction must be obtained from the Registrar if the use of any part of such premises is required after closing hours.
- No student shall undertake any operation until he has attended a course of demonstrations to the satisfaction of the Dental Surgeon in charge of the Department.
- 20. Students must arrange with the Registrar about Dresserships; they must be punctual and regular in their appointments with patients, and must be in attendance on the days on which they hold Dresserships; otherwise other

students will be appointed.

21. All instruments and appliances which are the property of the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School must be returned to their places by the student who has been

using them.

22. Students must consider themselves strictly under the control of the Registrar and the other Medical Officers of the Hospital and School. All unnecessary conversation must be avoided, and quietude and gentlemanly bearing before the patients observed.

23. Lockers are provided in the Cloak Rooms for students' personal belongings, and the School cannot accept

responsibility for any losses occurring.

24. Students must prepare their own manikins (extracted teeth set in plaster to represent upper and lower jaws). Operations (fillings, &c.), on these models must be performed to the satisfaction of the Registrar and must be signed up before operations on the mouth are allowed.

25. Every student shall provide himself with white

jackets for Dental Hospital Practice and overalls or aprons

for work in the Mechanical Laboratory.

Every student shall attend the courses of instruction regularly and sign his name in the Attendance Book. Leave of absence can only be obtained from the Registrar. Any student unavoidably absent must immediately send written notice of such absence to the Registrar.

- 27. Every student entering the Ceylon Dental Hospital and School shall provide himself with the necessary instruments, according to the list provided for the purpose.

 28. Punctuality in keeping appointments will be strictly enforced. The transfer of patients is not permitted, nor is a student allowed to introduce anyone for treatment without the consent of a member of the staff.
- 29. Instruments and drugs belonging to the School must on no account be removed by any student. A student is liable to dismissal for any breach of this regulation.
- 30. Every student shall attend the Lectures and Practice during two consecutive years unless the special permission of the Registrar has been obtained.
- 31. Dental Hospital Practice and Mechanical work are continuous throughout the year. Not more than two weeks leave will be granted to any student during the year. Application for such leave shall be made to the Registrar.

DENTAL MECHANICS.

Lecturer: A. Annesley Gomes, F.R.C.S.I., D.P.H.; L.M.S. (Cey.), L.D.S. (Eng.).

The course of study in Dental Prosthetics and Dental Mechanics includes a series of lectures together with practical and clinical teaching.

The student is first instructed in the use of materials and tools in the Laboratory by being required to construct a series of practice cases to master models. Denture construction in metal and vulcanite is taught, using tube teeth, soldered back teeth, diatoric and pin teeth, gum sections and veneers.

In the Clinical Room the Anatomical Articulator and face bow are taught together with balanced occlusion and the technique of muscle-trimmed composition and plaster impressions. The principles of full and partial denture stability and methods of reproduction of the natural arrangement of the teeth are demonstrated.

For partial denture construction sectional composition impressions and the use of Plaster of Paris and elastic impression materials are taught and dentures are constructed in vulcanite and gold and practice metals involving the use of lingual bars, continuous clasps and various cantilever designs. Obturator, splint, crown and removable bridge construction is undertaken by advanced pupils.

In order to equip the student more completely, he is required to attend a course of Dental Metallurgy at the School, and to carry out himself the preparation and manufacture of solders, &c., that he may require for his

Pupils must obtain their own tools. The "kit" of instruments and tools required by the School is obtained from the Registrar at a special rate.

THE PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF DENTAL PROSTHETICS.

Fashioning the occlusal surface to utilize the muscles of mastication in stabilizing full dentures. Balanced occlusion.

Modelling the polished surface to adapt it to the msucles of the cheeks, lips and tongue.

Arrangement of the teeth to reproduce the natural

appearance.
Partial dentures; design of the base and attachments,

choice of materials, &c.

Cast metal bases. Vulcanite substitutes and veneers. Gum sections. Obturators and splints.

DENTAL METALLURGY—THEORETICAL AND PRACTICAL.

Lecturer: S. L. Cramer, L.M.S. (Cey.), L.R.C.P. & S. (Edin.), L.R.F.P. & S. (Glas.), L.D.S. (Edin.).

The course of instruction in Dental Metallurgy is designed to explain and illustrate those processes in the preparation and treatment of metals which find employment and application in dental work. The history and theory of these processes is discussed in the lectures and the necessary details of manipulation are demonstrated in the laboratory where the student performs a series of suitable practical exercises including :-

The extraction of a metal from its ore; the preparation of a fusible alloy and the determination of its melting point; the preparation of an amalgam and the testing of the amalgam for change of volume; the cupellation of a silver alloy; the parting of gold and silver; the assay of dental alloy; the testing of tenacity, brittleness, &c., of metals. The complete course provides full preparation for Part 1 of the 1st Professional Examination (L.D.S.).

CURRICULUM AND SYLLABUS.

Dental Anatomy and Physiology.

(Human and Comparative.)

Lecturer: Prof. W. C. O. Hill, M.D., Ch.B. (Birm.).

An introduction to, and an exposition of, the general principles which underlie the study of the Anatomy and

Physiology of the teeth of Fishes, Reptiles, and Mammals.
The Morphology of the Teeth. Their relative values with regard to the animal economy.

Homologies of the Teeth, and general processes of their evolution.

The minute Anatomy of the Dental tissues, and the associated parts.

Development and growth of the Jaws and Teeth of man. The chief characteristics of the Masticatory Apparatus of the various orders and families of the class Mammalia.

The facts and theories connected with the above which have a direct bearing on the science and art of Dental Surgery.

Every step of this course is fully illustrated by actual preparations, blackboard and other diagrams, and table specimens in addition to lantern slides projected on the screen by means of the epidiascope.

PRACTICAL DENTAL HISTOLOGY AND PATHO-HISTOLOGY. Lecturer: Prof. W. A. E. Karunaratne, M.D.,

B.Sc. (Lond.). The grinding and preparation of hard tissues.

Methods of mounting—In Canada balsam, and in Farrant's solutions.

The fixing and preservation of soft tissues in various reagents—Chromic acid, Osmic acid, Formaldehyde Solutions, &c.

Decalcification methods.

Dehydration and embedding in Gum, Paraffin and

Section cutting, serial and other-cutting of frozen sections.

Staining en masse and in sections-various stains.

Clearing and mounting of sections—various methods. Koch's (Weil's) process.

The demonstration of the Dental Tissues, normal and pathological.

Histological technique in general.

Students attending the class will be provided with microscopes on payment of Rs. 5 for the course, but will have to

provide themselves with glass slides, cover-glasses, half a dozen watch glasses, three small drop bottles, two small covered glass dishes, a pair of forceps, two or three mounted needles, and a section lifter. Material, stains, and other reagents will be provide for them.

- (5) direct that for the purposes of this Order:-
 - (a) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
 - (b) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail; and
 - (c) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one-thirty-second part of a bushel.
- (6) direct that every trader who sells any article mentioned in the First Schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that article on demand a receipt on which there shall be set out:—
 - (a) the description and grade of article sold,
 - (b) the quantity of the article sold,
 - (c) the date of the sale,
 - (d) the price paid for the article sold, and
 - (e) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail as the case may be.

Sreekandath Raman Kutty Menon, a scientific research worker of Sreekanta Vilas, Parur, Travancore State in India, presently of the Coconut Research Scheme, Lunuwila, Ceylon, seeks leave to amend the Specification of Application numbered and dated as above for "The manufacture of pulp from coconut husk and/or coir fibre " alleging as the reasons: -Ever since the filing of the original specification, research work on the subject has been proceeding under the joint auspices of the Ceylon Coconut Board and the Coconut Research Scheme. As a result, some important further observations have been made, and since these do not constitute an invention substantially larger than or substantially different from the original invention, but form a natural supplement to the original specification leave is sought to amend the latter.

The proposed amendments are as follows:-

In the 3rd stage of manufacture described on page (3), it has been stated that the chemicals used for pulping the purified fibrous matter are caustic soda and sodium sulphide, or a mixture of the two.

In order to prepare extremely cheap grades of pulp, fit for making packing papers and paperboards, milk of lime (aqueous calcium hydroxide) or a mixture of lime and soda ash (sodium carbonate) may be substituted for caustic soda and/or sodium sulphide. The quantity of burnt lime (calcium oxide) required for 100 parts of airdry fibrous matter may be between 10 parts and 20 parts, and the quantity of soda ash that may be added to the burnt lime may be 3 to 5 parts, when the mixture is applicable to the parts when the may be 3 to 5 parts, when the mixture is applicable. may be 3 to 5 parts, when the mixture is employed to prepare a better grade of pulp. The quantity of liquor for digestion is only 3 to 5 times the weight of the fibrous matter. The period of digestion may vary from 6 to 10 hours, and the temperature range is the same as already claimed.

A preliminary digestion of the fibruous matter with water alone for a brief period of half an hour to two hours within the temperature range already claimed permits of a considerable reduction in the consumption of the burnt lime and soda ash in the subsequent digestion with chemicals. After the preliminary digestion with water, the aqueous extract which is highly acidic is blown off from the digester and the solution of lime and soda ash pumped in.

In addition to the four claims already made in the specification I make the following claim:

(5) The preliminary digestion of the purified fibrous matter with mere water for a period of half to two hours within the temperature range claimed in claim No. (3) and the subsequent digestion of the fibrous matter after the removal of the acidic aqueous extract with milk of lime or a mixture of milk of lime and soda ash in quantities specified already.

(1) Q.—How many labourers are engaged for the work in the Municipal Dumping Ground at Nittawela? A.—12 labourers. (2) Q.—How many families are living in Nittawela labour lines? A.—10 families. (3) Q.—Is there sufficient accommodation for these labourers and their families to live in those labour lines? A.—No, but the housing conditions of the Municipal labourers are being gradually improved by annual instalments beginning with the Mahayaya labour lines. (4) Q.—Is there a latrine provided for the use of the labourers living in these lines? A.—There is a public latrine close by which they use. (5) Q.—Are the Municipal authorities aware of the inconvenience these labourers have latrine close by which they use. (5) Q.—Are the Municipal authorities aware of the inconvenience these labourers have to undergo for want of an electric light near the lines? A.—No complaints have been received. The provision for a light near the lines appears to be desirable. The Municipal Electrical Engineer estimates Rs. 56 for erecting a light. (6) Q.—Will the Council consider the desirability of installing a lamp post on the road near the said labour lines? A.—Vide above. (7) Q.—Will the Mayor be pleased to table a list of paddy fields situated within the limits of the Municipal Council, Kandy, with their assessment numbers and state what the amount of assessment rates recovered on the same are? A.—An existing list of paddy fields is being revised and brought up to date. It will be submitted as soon as it is completed. (8) Q.—Will the Mayor be pleased to state as to what income is received from the coconut crop of the trees standing on the Municipal Cemetery at Mawilmada. If no income is received, will a proposal be made to lease the coconut cultivation standing thereon? A.—The produce of this land forms part of the remuneration of the Cemetery keeper according to his letter of appointment dated November 30, 1931. The Cemetery keeper is paid Rs. 5 per mensem in addition to the produce. There are—59 coconut trees (of which 45 are in bearing), 3 arecanut trees and 1 jak tree, and the total produce of these trees is valued at Rs. 18·30 per annum. (9) Q.—What income is received from the Municipal land situate at Mawilmada? trees is valued at Rs. 18.30 per annum. (9) Q.—What income is received from the Municipal land situate at Mawilmada? If no income is received, will steps be taken to lease out the right to take the produce of the plantation standing on the said land and for grazing the cattle till such time as the Municipal Council can make use of the said property? A.—This land was vacated by the unemployed who had been settled on this land in January, 1939, and all trees had been denuded of produce before they left. The Arachchie of Mawilmada was asked to look after the land pending the commencement of building operations for purposes of the slaughterhouse. As there is delay in commencing the buildings and there is produce

now available—the produce can be leased on a monthly rent. The entire produce is valued at Rs. 42.50 per annum.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on September 2, 1939, at 8.35 a.m., in terms of a Resolution passed by the Council on August 19, 1939, to consider Report of 4 Members of the Public Health Committee on the Kandy Market.

Present: Sir Cudah Ratwatte, Mayor; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa; Gate Muhandiram N. Canaganayagam; Mr. B. H. Dunuwille; Mr. R. S. S. Goonewardane; Mr. S. Halim Deen; Mr. L. B. Mawilmada; Mr. V. D. Paul Raj; Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra; Mr. A. M. Spaar; Mr. P. M. Talwatte; Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne; and the Municipal Commissioner.

The Mayor made a statement that he had taken the precaution of inquiring from the Government Agent who was the Local Food Controller of what action he had taken. He was told that the Food Controller had asked the Sinhalese, Tamil, and Muslim Arachchies to pay house to house visits and find out requirements of the householders. Statistics were collected and the work is well in hand for the issue of Food Control tickets when emergency arose.

The Mayor desired that the Commissioner should read the report, but as copies of the report and of the Medical Officer of Health's observations on the report had been circulated and copies sent to each member, it was thought not necessary to read the report. It was agreed that the recommendations be taken one by one.

Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Deputy Mayor, addressed the Council and stated that he was not in favour of the Council spending any money on the improvements except for sanitary requirements.

Mr. A. Morley Spaar spoke in support of the report and asked that it be considered in all its bearings and the

expenditure on the improvements be spread over a number of years as funds permit.

The Mayor stated that only recommendations would be considered and estimates will be called for. Gate Muhandiram Canaganayagam inquired about the Scheme to rebuild the Market.

The Mayor replied that after making a plan the Scheme was abandoned as it was too expensive.

Mr. M. A. S. Marikar spoke and inquired who asked the 4 members to submit the report.

Mr. W. A. B. Soysa explained the reason why he had not signed the report.

Mr. Spaar in reply stated that the Committee inspected the Market and found certain improvements were necessary and therefore a report was sent.

At this stage the Mayor moved the Council should go into Committee and discuss the recommendations, on the report of 4 members.

APPENDIX I.

Report of the 4 Members of the Public Health Committee on the Kandy Market.

We, the undersigned, Members of the Health Committee inspected the Kandy Market on the morning of the 3rd instant, together with the Medical Officer of Health and the Veterinary Surgeon.

The market building was planned and designed to meet the requirements of the town 50 years ago or more. It was presumably constructed originally for the sale of beef, mutton, fish and vegetables, but it appears now to serve the requirements of a Central Market where every commodity is exposed for sale, without any order or classification. Stalls for old clothing are located cheek by jowl with fruits and vegetables stalls. Eating houses, tea and cigar boutiques and sundry other stalls are mixed up, with the result that confusion, disorder and insanitary conditions prevail to an alarming extent. extent.

The allocation of stalls appears to have been carried out in a haphazard way, adding to the existing insanitary condition of things. The cubicles or partitions making up the different stalls have been made of inflammable material and the tea kiosks show their location by the chimneys which emit smoke above the lofts. Should a fire break out by the accumulation of soot in these chimneys, the whole Market will be gutted with fire before any steps can be taken to control it.

There are, we were informed, 28 beef, 10 fish and 10 mutton stalls. These vary in size, shape and construction.

There are, we were informed, 28 beet, 10 fish and 10 mutton stalls. These vary in size, shape and construction. Primitive methods of sanitation prevail in these stalls. The beef and mutton stalls are enclosed with wooden partitions. It is amazing and appalling to think that such conditions prevail in a Market which has existed for over half a century and one which supplies provisions of all kinds to the town of Kandy and the Planting Districts.

A merciful providence has benignly watched over the town and its people and safeguarded them from epidemics of a serious nature, while the Council lulled itself into a smug spirit of complacency, apathy, and indifference.

Whenever the Council receives an application from a prospective butcher within the suburbs of the town, strict conditions are laid down and enforced for the provision of impervious concrete floors, cement plastered walls to a height of 6 feet and proper drainage. Light and ventilation are also essential conditions. These elementary principles of sanitary conditions are entirely lacking in the Kandy Market, and it bears no comparison to markets maintained by of sanitary conditions are entirely lacking in the Kandy Market, and it bears no comparison to markets maintained by Sanitary Boards in minor towns in this Province.

We would recommend that immediate action be taken by the Council to standardize the length and breadth of

stalls and that they be built in a uniform manner.

All the beef stalls which now face the northern side of the Market should face the inner quadrangle, if not for

anything else, for aesthetic reasons. There does not appear to be any need for the provision of 28 beef stalls. The cattle slaughtered in a day do not

amount to more than 30, not even on special days, and many of the licensees are purchasers of more than one carease. The conclusions we have arrived at are that there is a ring formed by one or two of the licensees who are the owners of several stalls, many of which are not put to any use, but retained with the object of keeping other competitors out of the

We feel that the by-laws relating to the sale, letting and sub-letting of stalls need very careful revision. Although the stalls for beef appear to be confined to a defined area, this is not so where the vegetable and fruit stalls are concerned. They are found on the east, west, and southern sides of the market. These should be confined within one section, as far as it is practicable.

The beef stalls practically utilize the entire outer northern side of the market facing the Byrde Memorial Building

and the two sides of the square facing the inner quadrangle.

There are three rows of stalls on the eastern side, the first line of these stalls faces the rice depot and is occupied almost entirely by fruit and vegetable venders, the next line of stalls is separated by a narrow passage, and this chiefly is occupied by sundry provision dealers; the third, which has its back to the second line is a row of beef stalls facing the inner quadrangle.

On the southern side, the outer stalls facing the vegetable market are entirely occupied by vegetable vendors. Here too there is a passage between the second line of stalls occupied by tea, rice, cigar, oilmanstores, and sundry other boutiques. The third line facing the inner quadrangle comprises mutton and sundry provision dealers.

The front line of stalls facing the Power Station is occupied by fruit and vegetable sellers, sweetmeat sellers and dealers in cloth and other miscellaneous goods and venders of old clothes.

The second line, divided by a passage, is occupied again by tea kiosks, eating houses, and oilmanstores vendors. The third row, at the back of the second line, is occupied by fish mongers and it faces the inner quadrangle. The stalls along the outer sides of the market shut out any light and air which should find its way to the inner line of stalls. of these first line stalls or spaces are piled up with goods and made up of partitions from 6 feet to 9 feet in height.

The passages between the first and second rows of stalls are obstructed with provisions, the space between the

floor and the platforms provided for merchandise, along the second line of stalls, is used for storing provisions and other

articles, making a fruitful place for the breeding and harbouring of rats and other vermin.

The lofts over the stalls are piled up with soiled linen, gunny bags, packing, cases, &c., and at night they serve as sleeping berths for the tired and weary occupants of stalls. We are informed that by-laws have been passed, restricting the height to which provision dealers may stack their provisions, and to prevent the obstruction of passages. These by-laws are observed more in the breach. It is not an uncommon sight to find a vendor's clothing and other. paraphernalia hanging up in the beef, mutton and provision dealers stalls.

In fact this lurid picture of the appalling conditions of the market is not by any means overdrawn.

One cannot visualize existing conditions until the place is thoroughly and carefully inspected.

The Council will not be in a position for many years to build a larger and up to date market on the site which the Council has in view, owing to the more urgent schemes which are likely to materialize in the near future. The existing market buildings can be used to advantage for a number of years yet, if certain improvements are effected to them.

We therefore submit the following suggestions for the careful and thoughtful consideration of Council

(1) Extensive provision should be made for the refrigeration of carcases and fish and for the storage at low temperature of fish and other meat products. It would cost about Rs. 8,000 according to the report of the Electrical Engineer and this original capital expenditure could be liquidated from money received from stall holders by letting

(2) That the beef, fish, and mutton stalls be built to uniform dimensions to conform to sanitary requirements

and that they should all face the inner quadrangle.

(3) That proper standardized cubicles and platforms be built for the sale of fruit, flowers, and vegetables and other merchandise, and that each commodity be confined to defined sections in the market.

(4) That the flooring which is broken and irregular and sections of which have sunk should be relayed.

(5) That the drains round the building be rebuilt deeper and with a good fall, and that they should be provided with a continuous passage of water which can be supplied from the lake.

(6) That the lawns in the quadrangle be carefully tended and planted with a border of flowering plants.

(7) That the lighting system in the market be increased to meet the requirements of the place. At present, in addition to the electric lights, many stalls are lit with kerosene oil lamps.

(8) That at least 50 refuse bins be provided in and around the Market at close intervals, made of a standard size

and pattern. These are conspicuous by their absence now, and what there is of them, is of all sizes and shapes.

(9) That six or even four water hydrants be provided for the requirements of the Market. There are only two at present, and these are not conveniently situated. The necessity for an ample supply of water is of vital importance

in a market.

(10) This suggestion may perhaps meet with strong disapproval and horror, but in spite of all the notices "Spitting is Prohibited" the habit is as bad as ever, and still exists. We therefore suggest the provision of about 20

pails to serve the votaries who indulge in betel chewing and those who expectorate at every turn.

(11) Provision should be made within easy distance of the Market for the storing of the large number of packing cases in which fish is brought to the Market. These are at present piled up for days in the quadrangle within the market and do not add to the orderliness of its precincts.

(12) The 12th and final suggestion is the most important of all and that is the closing of the entire market, by the erection of a 3-feet high wall with expanded metal above it and the provision of glazed or fixed venetians to admit light

in lieu of the tats which prevent light from filtering into the market.

Four doors from 6 to 8 feet wide should be provided as entrances on the four sides. These would also serve as

air currents and facilitate cross currents in the entire premises.

The most important feature of the suggestion will be the closing of the entire market, preventing its occupation at night by hundreds of stall-holders—a practice which is highly undesirable.

When the Shop Act comes into force, the closing of the market premises will be a necessity and be enforced.

The additional market which was built some years ago to serve the purpose of a vegetable market is now an eye sore in the town, being occupied by betel sellers, sellers of pots and pans, oilmanstores and a variety of other commodities. The same disorder and insanitary conditions prevail here as in the main market and reorganization and allocation of sale of provisions is as imperative here as in the Central Market.

The provision of space for the fairs on the two days in the week is woefully inadequate. Most of the provisions

exposed for sale are piled in quantities on the road leading to the Lake Spill and the Bogambara Esplanade.

The sheds and concrete pavements provided for the purpose are sufficient to meet only a fraction of the requirements. It need hardly be pointed out that fruit and vegetables liable to be bruised are dumped for sale on a much polluted road surface and this is highly undesirable and insanitary. There is an area of ground of about 2,000 square feet available, between the Rice Depots and one of the open sheds on the eastern side, which can be paved and made more hygienic for the sale of fruit and vegetables. Other provisions such as coconuts and arecanuts, &c., not liable to contamination, may be exposed for sale on the road.

We would also like to throw out the suggestion that the section of the road between the two markets be closed to traffic and that open sheds, similar to those in existence, be built over the road to meet the requirements on Fair Days.

The closing of this section of road will not in any way cause hardship to pedestrians and other users of vehicles.

There appears to be great slackness in the administration of the markets.

By-laws limiting the height to which stall holders are permitted to erect partitions are not observed. The blocking of passages, the encroachment of spaces beyond that allowed stall-holders, insanitary conditions and the violation of other regulations are permitted with impunity, despite the fact that there is a marketkeeper and two assistants, and the Medical Officer of Health, the Veterinary Surgeon, Sanitary Inspectors and the Revenue Inspector are, at present, required and supposed to make frequent inspections of the place, enforce regulations and general supervision, to see that the by-laws are observed and that sanitary condition prevail. This brings us to the crux of the whole situation. Dual responsibility, divided between the Medical Officer of Health and his staff and the Revenue Inspector has been the cause of the very unsatisfactory conditions which exist. has been the cause of the very unsatisfactory conditions which exist.

Supervision of the market should be controlled by one authority.

It passes our comprehension why the Accountant's Department should have any hand in its administration. We are of opinion that the entire supervison should be under the Medical Officer of Health. The Medical Officer of Health should be the expert to decide on the dimensions of stalls required for the sale of any commodity. He should be the judge regarding the allocation of space and the requisite amount of light and ventilation required. We feel that

be the judge regarding the allocation of space and the requisite amount or ignt and ventuation required. We see that the duties of the Accountant's Department in the Market should be limited only to the valuation of the space allotted to each stall-holder, in conjunction with the Medical Officer of Health.

Rents of stall-holders are paid direct to the Municipal Office and Distraining Officers have been appointed to issue notices and collect rents which fall into arrears. There are hard and fast rules for the allotment of stalls when a vacancy occurs, so that once the rents have been fixed the duties of the Accountant's Department cease, until such time as revision of rents is necessary again. We feel that the one and only object of Council was to treat the Market as a revenue-earning proposition, hence the deterioration of its condition, making it one of the most insanitary places in the town.

We feel that if our suggestions are carried out that there may be a small fall in the revenue, if rice, tea and other stalls are removed, but it will be nothing compared to the advantage gained by bringing the market to up to date sanitary conditions and order.

What is more, the Council will merit the approval and gratitude of taxpayers of all classes and conditions of people. We suggest that the Works Engineer be requested without delay, in consultation with the Medical Officer of Health, to prepare plans and estimates for giving effect to the recommendations suggested, all of which are practicable, so that the improvements may be considered with the Budget for the coming year.

We do not think that the improvements suggested will cost more than Rs. 15,000. Any expenditure, however, would be fully justified, by changing to method and order from chaos and confusion, and more than all, by changing from squalor and insanitation to cleanliness, sanitation and hygienic conditions.

APPENDIX II.

M. O. H's Observations on the Report of 4 Members of the Health Committee.

Commissioner,—I have very carefully considered the recommendations made for the improvement of the Market with the M. V. S. We agree with the proposals made, subject to minor modifications. We fully agree on the desirability, on sanitary grounds, of avoiding the necessity of allowing stall-holders to sleep within the Market for the protection of their goods.

Modern markets in Colombo are designed with walls all round and a single or at most a double row of stalls facing a quadrangle, and they are intended exclusively for the sale of meat, fish and vegetables. Even there it has been found

that they are not very popular with the traders or the public unlike Central Markets.

But the Kandy Market cannot be remodelled on these lines without very extensive and costly structural alterations, such as those indicated in our previous plan of 1934, and furthermore ours is a Central Market. Therefore we make the following recommendations:

I. Extend the floor towards the quadrangle on all sides to a width of about 8 feet by either extending eaves or providing a new roof at lower level and supported on brackets to dispense with pillars. The space thus obtained can be used for widening the gangways and for increasing the space allotted to stalls and spaces, where necessary. This extension can be dispensed with on the northern wing, unless it is found necessary to make provision for extra stalls and on grounds of economy.

- The gangways be made uniform and 8 feet wide throughout.
- Adequate skylights be provided over the inner gangways. 3.

Two gateways be provided on the northern and southern sides instead of four each to be about 15 feet wide and provided with shutters.

5. Rearrangement of stalls is recommended in accordance with sketch annexed, which makes provision for cold storage as well. Not only will this be a source of appreciable revenue to the Council but it will also supply a deficiency

- storage as well. Not only will this be a source of appreciable revenue to the Council but it will also supply a deficiency in the public market for the keeping of fish in particular under proper conditions and ridding the place of the unsightly fish boxes now used by stall holders. The matter has previously been repeatedly represented to the Council.

 6. The following dimensions are recommended for the different stalls. All stalls, excepting vegetable, fruit and fish stalls which need have no roof, should be of a uniform height of 9 feet roofed over with asbestos sliceting with a slope to prevent articles being placed thereon:—Beef stalls, 12 ft. by 10 ft. deep, mutton stalls, 8 ft. by 10 ft. deep; eating-houses, 12 ft. by 10 ft. deep; sundry goods, 12 ft. by 10 ft. deep; miscellaneous stalls, 8 ft. by 10 ft. deep.

 Fruit and vegetable stalls 9 ft. by 9 ft. by 6 ft. at which height a suitable guard about 3 feet wide should be provided as a check against stall-holders piling goods beyond this height.

 7. With a view to reducing the cost of enclosing all four sides the Eastern and Northern external walls might be made self-contained. In the case of the beef stalls on the northern side (and all meat stalls inculding those facing quadrangle) a dwarf wall 2\frac{1}{2}\$ feet high with glass front protected with iron rods above it (iron rods may be dispensed with in the internal walls to reduce cost) and fan light ventilation and fly proof mesh is strongly recommended. In the case of other stalls on the eastern side (and all others excepting vegetable, fruit and fish, which are open stalls) wooden shutters and fan light ventilation to be provided. and fan light ventilation to be provided.
- 8. Eating-houses, beef and mutton stalls to be built of masonry walls—6 feet of internal walls to be of glazed tiles.
 9. Western and southern sides be provided with collapsible gates to a height of 7 feet and the existing tats to be replaced by glazed shutters (fixed). If the cost of collapsible gates is too high we recommend the following alternative for enclosing these two sides: A masonry dwarf wall about 18 in. and expanded metal or other iron fretwork above it to a height of 7 feet from floor level with large doors at frequent and suitable intervals for the convenience of the public and the facility of traders.

10. Reconstruction of floors and surface drains.

- Adequate sheds with expanded metal sides be provided behind the public latrines for empty fish boxes.
- 12. Provide racks and additional water taps for cleansing and washing vegetables to stop this being done on the road.

13. The small market to be dealt with on similar lines. All stalls facing the roads to be properly constructed and self-contained. Two suitable entrances be provided on the northern and southern sides. The spaces in the middle might remain as they are.

14. We entirely agree with the proposals made regarding the arrangements for fair days.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Saturday, September 9, 1939 at 8.30 a.m. upon the written requisition signed by three members, to wit, (1) Mr. M. A. S. Warikar, (2) Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, (3) Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra to consider the desirability of the Council controlling the Food Supply within the Municipal Limits.

The Mayor addressing the Council said: Before we go into the business for the purpose of which this meeting is summoned, I would like, with your permission, to propose a vote of loyalty and in doing so I do not think many words are necessary from me, as it is known—we all know—that the people of this Country are the most loyal of His Majesty's subjects. I therefore move at this meeting that—"This Council, on behalf of the citizens of Kandy, assures His Excellency the Governor of its abiding loyalty to His Majesty the King—Emperor and of its readiness to co-operate with and assist

the Authorities in any measure which they deem it expedient to adopt in the interest of the Empire."

Mr. R. S. S. Goonewardane said:—"I have great pleasure in seconding the motion. I do not think many words are necessary. We are all loyal people. Apart from other factors, this is certainly a war in which the freedom of the people is at stake. It is a challenge to civilization. It is a challenge to the self-respect of nations. We as a unit of the British Empire have a part to play. We can in a small way extend out sympathy and assurances of loyal support to His Majesty the King". The resolution was unanimously carried.

Coming to the business for which the meeting was convened, the Mayor said he would ask the Commissioner to

make a statement in regard to food control work.

The Commissioner stated that the question of food control was first considered by the Council at their meeting held on September 17, 1938, and it was decided that the Scheme that had been started by the Council should be handed over to the Government Agent of the Central Province, who had written to the Council stating that on instructions from the Food Controller he was preparing a Scheme for the whole of his Revenue District and that the cost of it would be borne by Government, and that in the event of it being necessary to introduce food control, the Council would be asked to appoint an advisory board for the town.

The Commissioner continued and made a statement regarding the present position of food control in Kandy and that all help necessary was given to the Deputy Food Controller. The services of the M. O. H. and 5 Sanitary Inspectors were already given to assist in getting details required by the Deputy Food Controller. He further stated that he had received a telegram from the Food Controller asking him to issue certificates to retailers in the Municipal area who cannot get supplies locally to enable them to obtain supplies.

The Mayor stated that the work of food control in the District and Town has been arranged as one unit. The

Deputy Food Controller has ordered 2,000 bags of rice to be kept in Kandy. He asked members of the Council to give all assistance to the Deputy Food Controller.

Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne inquired whether the Colombo practice cannot be followed. Mr. M. A. S. Marikar arrived at this stage.

The Mayor proposed the Council into Committee.

The following took part in the discussion that followed:—Mr. V. D. Paul Raj, Mr. B. H. Dunuwille, Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne.

Mr. R. S. S. Goonewardane said that with regard to the steps taken by the Colombo Municipal Council to open depots, it was done in order to assist the authorities on account of the state of panic that prevailed at the time owing to the difficulty of obtaining supplies. The position in Kandy was different and he did not think that depots were necessary and expenditure could not be justified.

There were several proposals regarding the appointment of the Advisory Committee and latterly agreed to the resolution of Mr. R. S. S. Goonewardane to appoint the following:—Mr. V. D. Paul Raj, Gate Muhandiram Canaganayagam, Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, and Mr. S. Halim Deen. Seconded by Mr. A. Morley Spaar,—Carried. Mr. A. Morley Spaar proposed that rice advances be given to the Municipal labourers as was done during the rice

Mr. B. H. Dunuwille seconded.—Carried.

The Council having resumed adopted the two resolutions.

THE GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

General Meeting.

Thursday, August 17, 1939, at 2.30 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 2.30 P.M., pursuant to notice dated August 11, 1939.

Present.—Mr. W. Dahanayake, the Mayor, presiding; and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor; J. E. Perera; F. Magdon Ismail; R. L. Ephraums; A. H. E. Fernando; E. de S. Wijeratne; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed; and T. W. Roberts.

1. At the request of Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne the minutes of the General Meeting of July 13 and 31, 1939, were amended (1) as regards item 6 (2) by the addition of the following words after the word "motion" in line 4:—"the latter pointing out that the motion in its present form was obnoxious to the provisions of section 4 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935"; (2) as regards item 8 (1) by the deletion of the words "and E. de S. Wijeratne" in line 9 and the substitution of the words "Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, T. W. Roberts, and E. de S. Wijeratne supported the amendment" for the words "Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail and T. W. Roberts supported the amendment"; and (3) as regards item 19 by the addition of the following words at the end thereof:—"The Mayor stated that Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne would be invited to attend the meetings of the Standing Committees at which his motions would be discussed."

At the request of Mr. A. William Wijeratne, the minutes of the same meeting were amended, as regards item 6 (2) by the addition of the words "for the time being" after the word "motion" in line 9.

At the request of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera, the minutes of the Special Meeting of August 10, 1939, were amended by the addition of the words "as a protest against the recommendations of the Special Committee" after the words "Mr. D. S. Goonesekera left the Meeting at this stage."

With regard to item 21 of the minutes of the General Meeting of July 13 and 31, 1939, Mr. D. S. Goonesekera raised the point that the Special Committee was not properly constituted as required by section 11 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 and that its recommendations were not, therefore, in order. The Mayor ruled that the point raised by the Member was not in order.

The minutes of the General Meeting of July 13 and 31, 1939, and of the Special Meeting of August 10, 1939, as amended, were taken as read and confirmed.

- 2. Before proceeding with the next item on the Agenda, viz., "Final consideration of applications for the post of Accountant," the Mayor stated that he wished, with the permission of Council, to take up for consideration two motions on the subject, one of which was on the Supplemental Agenda and the other a motion by Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya notice of which had just been given. This was agreed to.
- 3. The motion on the Supplemental Agenda, which stood in the name of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera, was as follows:—
 "That (a) whereas the Special Sub-Committee appointed to consider the applications for the post of Accountant by the Special General Meeting held on July 31, 1939, at 2.30 p.m., violated Clause No. 11 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 60 of 1935; (b) whereas that Sub-Committee has recommended applicants who have not satisfied the conditions stipulated in the notice calling for applications; (c) whereas a member of that Sub-Committee informed the Special General Meeting of August 10, 1939, that the certificates attached to the application of one of the recommended applicants were forgeries and thereby openly condemned the decisions of that Sub-Committee. The recommendations submitted by that Sub-Committee be set aside and that all the fifty applications be considered afresh by the whole Council at a General Meeting."

This motion was ruled out of order by the Mayor on a point raised by Mr. Wahab that it did not comply with the provisions of by-law 10 (e) of the by-laws relating to the Conduct of Business at Meetings.

4. With the permission of Council Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya then moved:—That in view of certain information regarding qualifications of Accountants being available now, I move that the name of Mr. Terence Perera, who is an applicant to the post of Accountant, be added to the list of those who are to be interviewed by this Council. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded. Mr. D. S. Goonesekera said he did not oppose the motion but what he wanted the Council to note was that the Special Committee had erred in its recommendations. Mr. A. H. E. Fernando said the Special Committee had selected the names of seven candidates and the Council had decided to interview five of them. He could not, therefore, understand the purport of the present motion. The mover, in reply, explained that the motion was not contrary to the previous resolution of Council but merely supplemented it.

The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 8 votes to 1. Mr. A. M. Saheed called for a division which resulted as follows:—For.—Messrs. W. T. Wijekulasuriya, P. Dahanayake, T. W. Roberts, F. Magdon Ismail, A. William Wijeratne, E. D. Nagahawatte, E. de S. Wijeratne, and A. M. Saheed. Against.—Mr. A. H. E. Fernando. Declined to vote.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, J. E. Perera, R. L. Ephraums, and D. S. Goonesekera.

5. Final consideration of applications for the post of Accountant.

The Mayor moved Council into Committee to interview the selected candidates. Mr. Wahab seconded.—Carried Council in Committee.—

Council in Committee interviewed the following candidates:—Messrs. Abideen, Goonetilleke, Herat, Jayatilleke, Perera, and Wickramasuriya.

After the interview Mr. A. M. Saheed moved that Council in Committee do first ballot for two out of the six candidates. Mr. T. W. Roberts seconded.

Mr. P. Dahanayake moved that Council in Committee do first ballot for three out of the six candidates. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded.

Mr. Saheed's motion was carried by 8 votes to 2, four members declining to vote.

At the first ballot Mr. Goonetilleke received 10 votes and Messrs. Herat and Wickramasuriya 3 votes each. At the final ballot Mr. Goonetilleke received 10 votes and Messrs. Herat and Wickramasuriya one vote each.

The Mayor then moved that Mr. W. A. Goonetilleke be appointed to the post of Accountant on one year's probation with effect from September 1, 1939, and that he be required to stand a test in Sinhalese to the satisfaction of the Mayor, at the end of one year. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne seconded.—Carried.

Council resumed, and the Mayor moved that the above resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

6. The Mayor moved:—(1) That all the powers, duties, and functions delegeted to the Mayor by the Council by resolution dated July 13, 1939, be also conferred upon and performed by the Deputy Mayor. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne said he was in sympathy with the motion, but he did not think it was in order under section 9 of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935. He could not, therefore, support it in its present form. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail supported the motion and stated that he was of opinion that it did not contravene the provisions of section 9. Mr. A. M. Saheed suggested that the motion be referred to the Law Committee for consideration. The Mayor, in reply, said he saw no objection to the motion and he did not think it necessary to refer the matter to the Law Committee. The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne declined to vote and stated that he would be sending in a written dissent on the matter. (2) That in terms of section 9 (4) of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 the Council consents to the delegation by the Commissioner to any Municipal officer of any of the powers, duties, or functions delegated to him by resolution of Council dated July 13, 1939, or conferred or imposed or vested in him as Commissioner by the Ordinance or by any other written law. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded.—Carried.

- 7. Pursuant to notice Mr. P. Dahanayake moved :—(1) This Council is of opinion that the Galle Friend-in-Need Society be requested to include 4 members of this Council in their Executive Committee—to be nominated at a later date—to look after Municipal interests, so long as this Council makes contributions for poor relief. Mr. Wahab seconded. The Mayor supported the motion. Mr. J. E. Perera moved as an amendment that the Society be requested to include two members of this Council in their Executive Committee. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya opposed both the motion and the amendment on the ground that the proposal was not practicable. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne supported the motion. Mr. D. S. Goonesekera opposed it on principle. Mr. A. William Wijeratne agreed with Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya and opposed the motion for the same reason. The mover replied. At this stage Mr. J. E. Perera, with the permission of Council and the consent of the seconder, withdrew his amendment. The motion was then put to the Meeting and resulted in 6 members voting for and 6 members voting against. The Mayor thereupon gave his casting vote for the motion which was accordingly declared carried. The voting was as follows:—For.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, E. D. Nagahawatte, A. H. E. Fernando, E. de S. Wijeratne, and P. Dahanayake. Against.—Messrs. J. E. Perera, A. M. Saheed, R. L. Ephraums, D. S. Goonesekera, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, and F. Magdon Ismail. Declined to vote.—Mr. A. William Wijeratne. (2) The Minister for Communications and Works be requested to take immediate action to protect life and property from being destroyed any further by sea erosion between Mahamodera bridge and Kaluwella, as neglect would also affect the P. W. D. road and the Civil Hospital at Mahamodera. The Mayor seconded and stated that he had already taken action in the matter and was now awaiting a reply from the Hon. the Minister. The motion, however, if passed, would strengthen his case. Messrs. J. E. Perera and E. de S. Wijeratne
- 8. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya moved:—(1) In view of the unsatisfactory state of the Council's finances which has in the past prevented the Council from attending to certain very urgent needs of the town, this Council do request all Municipal employees receiving a salary of over Rs. 100 a month, to consent a voluntary cut from their salaries. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded. Mr. J. E. Perera said the matter required careful consideration before any decision was arrived at. He did not think that the officers of the Council were overpaid, as would be seen from a comparative statement of the salaries paid by the Kandy and Galle Councils. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne moved as an amendment that a Special Committee be appointed to go into the question of salaries and report to the Council what savings could be effected. Mr. Wahab seconded. The mover accepted the amendment, which was then put to the Meeting and carried. Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of the Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, E. de S. Wijeratne, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, P. Dahanayake, A. William Wijeratne, and D. S. Goonesekera. (2) In view of the distress and suffering prevalent in this town consequent on poverty and unemployment, this Council is of opinion that a "Central Kitchen" for the relief of the distressed should be opened immediately at Galle, and for that purpose that the Government be asked for a reasonable subsidy. Mr. Wahab seconded.—(1) Carried. (2) Resolved that the matter be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report. (3) It is the opinion of this Council that, with a view to relieving the problem of unemployment and poverty within the town, a Special Committee consisting of the Mayor, Deputy Mayor, and five other members of the Council be appointed to consider the practicability of having all work given out by Council hitherto on contract attended to by workmen engaged by the Council on daily pay under the direct supervision of the Municipal Engineer, preference being given to those living withi
- 9. To consider the following extract from the minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of July 3, 1939:—
 "Considered whether any action should be taken as regards the non-Ceylonese labourers employed by the Council:—
 Recommended that no action be taken in the case of the 15 non-Ceylonese labourers already in service, but that in future no non-Ceylonese be employed by the Council either as permanent or substitute labourers".

The Mayor moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted. Mr. D. S. Goonesekera seconded.

- Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya moved as an amendment that of the 15 non-Ceylonese labourers now in service those who have served the Council for a period of less than 5 years up to the end of July, 1939, be discontinued and that they be given a month's salary, and also third class rail fare if they wish to return to their homes. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne seconded.
 - Mr. J. E. Perera supported the recommendation of the Standing Committee.

The amendment was put to the Meeting and declared lost, 3 voting for and 7 against.

The Mayor's motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 7 votes to 3. The division was as follows:—For—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, A. William Wijeratne, F. Magdon Ismail, J. E. Perera, E. D. Nagahawatte, and R. L. Ephraums. Against.—Messrs. W. T. Wijekulasuriya, E. de S. Wijeratne, and P. Dahanayake.

- 10. To nominate, in terms of Regulation 3 (b) of the Galle Street Collections Regulations, 1938, two persons to serve on the Board of Control established under the said regulations for the year 1939:—The Mayor moved that Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab and W. T. Wijekulasuriya be nominated to serve on the Board of Control for the year 1939. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded.—Carried.
- 11. To appoint a Tender Board for 1939 to deal with tenders for the supply of Stores and Materials for Municipal Departments:—The Mayor moved that the following do constitute the Tender Board for 1939 to deal with tenders for the supply of Stores and Materials for Municipal Departments:—The Mayor, and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, D. S. Goonesekera, E. D. Nagahawatte, A. H. E. Fernando, and F. Magdon Ismail. Mr. R. L. Ephraums seconded.—Carried.
 - 12. To sanction the grant of 12 days leave to Mr. M. Lekamge, Chief Clerk, in excess of 6 weeks.—Sanctioned.
- 13. To submit the report of the Auditor-General for the year ending December 31, 1938.—Resolved that submission be deferred till the next Meeting.
- 14. With the permission of Council Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved the following motion, notice of which was received after the prescribed date:—That this Council requests the Government to substitute a spiral staircase to the new Light House on the Ramparts in place of the ladder there. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.
 - 15. The following extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—
 - (a) Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of August 3, 1939.
- (3) Considered the question of appointing a watcher for the Municipal Engineer's Office.—Recommended that no watcher be appointed, as the Committee considers that such an appointment is unnecessary.
- (4) Considered the question of compensation for the damage caused to premises No. 50, Dangedera, as a result of the excavations made for the construction of a Municipal culvert.—Recommended that the owners be informed that the Council does not accept any liability for the damage caused, which was due to natural causes and not to any negligence on the part of the Council's officers. Recommended, further, that the owners be asked whether they agree to accept a sum of Rs. 40 in full satisfaction of their claim and furnish a written undertaking that they will have no further claim on the Council.
- (7) Considered the question of retaining water meters at the seven premises where it was decided that meters should be fixed under Water Works by law No. 20 on the ground of excess consumption.—Recommended that the meter at Clark Spence's bungalow be removed at the end of the current quarter as the consumption during the last three quarters has not exceeded the quantity allowed free.—Recommended, further, that the meters at all the other premises be retained.
- (8) Considered the question of retaining water meters at premises which have the water carriage system.—Recommended that water meters be retained at all premises which have the water carriage system.

(9) Considered an application from the Southern Volley Ball Club for permission to use a portion of the "Minor Esplanade" for Volley Ball.—Recommended that permission be granted to use a portion of the "Minor Esplanade" on payment of a rent of Re. 1 for 1939.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

- (b) Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of August 3, 1939.
- (2) Considered the question of remedying the sewer nuisance in the Fort.—Recommended (i.) that the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit a report on the irregular levels, if any, of the sewers along Lighthouse street from its junction with Middle street to its junction with Pedar street; (ii.) that for the present the sewers be cleaned out regularly once in two months, the first cleaning to be done before the end of August.
- (5) Considered the rents charged for the stalls in the Municipal Green Market and the present procedure of recovering same.—Recommended that the stall holders in the Green Market be informed that with effect from 1940 the rents for their stalls should be paid on or before the 10th day of the month following that in respect of which the rents are due. Recommended, further, that no action be taken with regard to the present rents, which are considered to be reasonable.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

- (c) Extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of August 4, 1939.
- (2) List of demolished buildings in Ward 5.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.
- (3) Considered the question of waiving the rates of the following properties for 1938 and 1939 on the ground of poverty of the owners:—258, Colombo road; 370, Colombo road; 128/4, Colombo road; 354/2, Colombo road; and 595, Colombo road.—Recommended that the rates due on the above properties for 1938 and 1939, amounting to Rs. 10·40, be waived on the ground of poverty of the owners.
- (4) Considered the question of writing off rates due for 1939 on the ground of poverty of the owners.—Recommended that the rates due for 1939 on 197 properties in the town (as per lists submitted) amounting to Rs. 347.09, be waived on the ground of poverty of the owners.
- (6) Considered what action should be taken with regard to the lease for 1940 of the two tennis courts in the Fort which are now leased to the Y. M. C. A. and Fort Tennis Club, respectively.—Recommended that the Fort Tennis Club and the Y. M. C. A. be each requested to pay an increased rental of Rs. 24 per annum from January 1, 1940.—Recommended further, that the Park Tennis Club be requested to pay an increased rental of Rs. 36 per annum from January 1, 1940, for the lease of the two courts in the Park.
- (7) Considered whether any reduction should be made in the fee of Re. $1\cdot50$ now paid to the licensed cattle seizers for each head of cattle seized.—Recommended that the fee be reduced to Re. $1\cdot25$ with effect from August 1, 1939.
- (8) Application from P. V. Charles and L. G. Sarnelis, watchers in the Electricity Department, for an increase of salary.—Recommended that the salary of the watchers be increased to Rs. 22·50 per mensem with effect from July 1, 1939, and that they be placed on the following incremental scale from that date:—Rs. 270—Rs. 12—Rs. 450.—Recommended further, that the watchers be supplied with khaki coats (two a year) and badges of authority.
- (9) Considered a claim for travelling by Mr. L. B. Simon de Silva, Acting Inspector of Works, from January 19, 1939, to June 2, 1939.—Recommended the payment of a travelling allowance of Rs. 50 for the whole period.
- (10) Considered the question of providing raincoats for the two patrols employed in the Water Works Department.—Recommended that no raincoats be provided.
- (11) Considered the question whether compensation should be paid for all trees required to be removed by the Electricity Department on account of interference with the distribution system, irrespective of whether such trees are overhanging the road or not.—Recommended (1) that compensation be paid in the case of all trees required to be removed by the Electricity Department; (2) that the amount of compensation be determined by the Commissioner on the valuation of the Superintendent of the Electricity Department; and (3) that the present practice of giving over the trunks to the owners and deducting the value thereof be continued.
- (13) Considered a report of the Medical Officer of Health regarding the services of the Public Health Nurses for maternity cases.—Recommended (1) that a fee of Rs. 10 be charged for the services of the Public Health Nurses in all cases where the patient, the patient's husband, or the chief occupant of the house is in receipt of a monthly income of Rs. 120 and over; (2) that the Public Health Nurses be instructed not to attend on any maternity case except when required by the Municipal midwife who is attending on the case.
- (14) Considered a request made by four stall holders of the Fruit Market that grain bins for their stalls be provided by the Council and that they be allowed to repay the cost thereof by monthly instalments.—Recommended that grain bins be supplied by the Council and that the cost thereof plus 10 per cent. be recovered from the stall holders in not more than 12 monthly instalments.—Recommended, further, that a supplemental vote of Rs. 250 be sanctioned for the purpose.
- (16) Considered what policy should be followed in filling vacancies and making temporary appointments in the Council's daily paid staffs.—Recommended that whenever there is a suitable vacancy in any department for a daily paid labourer preference be given to the Canal labourers employed by the Municipal Engineer.
- (17) Considered whether, in terms of Ordinance No. 73 of 1938, any increased tax should be levied on bicycles, tricycles, &c., which are used for trade purposes.—Recommended, Mr. D. S. Goonesekera, dissenting, that, with effect from January 1, 1940, an increased tax of Rs. 2 be levied on all bicycles, tricycles, &c., used for trade purposes.
- (19) To recommend a supplemental vote of Rs. 200 under Head 21—Contingencies (Administrative Charges).—Recommended.
- (20) Considered what scale of charges should be levied for temporary lighting in the case of consumers outside Municipal limits.—Recommended that the following scale of charges be levied.—1 to 10 units, 55 cents; 11 to 25 units, 50 cents; 26 to 50 units, 45 cents; 51 to 75 units, 40 cents; over 75 units, 35 cents.
- (21) Application from K. L. Cornelis, Assistant Gardener, Victoria Park, to be placed on a monthly salary.—Recommended that the application be refused.

Resolution.

With regard to item (7) Mr. P. Dahanayake moved as an amendment that the fee be reduced to Re. 1 with effect from August 1, 1939. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded. The amendment was put to the Meeting and declared lost, only the mover and seconder voting for it. The recommendation of the Standing Committee was then put to the meeting and adopted by 6 votes to 1, Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne being opposed thereto as he was not in favour of any reduction.

With regard to item (16) the Mayor moved as an amendment that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted subject to the addition of the words "other than in the Health Department" after the word "labourers". Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

With regard to item (17) the recommendation of the Standing Committee was adopted by 9 votes to 1, Mr. D. S. Goonesekera being opposed thereto.

With regard to item (21) it was resolved, on the suggestion of Mr. J. E. Perera, that the matter be referred back to the Finance Committee and that the papers be circulated to the Members.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

- (d) Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of August 10, 1939.
- (3) Considered the question of passing a by-law controlling the construction of wells within Municipal Council -Recommended that no action be taken in the matter for the present.
- (4) Considered papers relating to the proposed acquisition of the Salvation Army premises (lot 1 in P. P. 12,178) for extension to the Power House.—Recommended that the necessary steps be taken under the Land Acquisition Ordinance to acquire the rights of the Salvation Army to the strip of Crown land which has already been encroached upon by the Council for extensions to the Transformer Room at the Power House.
- (5) Considered what action should be taken to prohibit the hawking for sale of fish, fruits, and vegetables in the vicinity of the Municipal Markets.—Recommended that a notification be published under section 203 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance prohibiting the sale or exposure for sale of fish, fruits, and vegetables within a radius of 25 yards of the Fish Market, or the Fruit Market, or the Vegetable Market.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

- 16. Pursuant to notice Mr. D. S. Goonsekera asked the following questions which the Mayor answered: Q.—(1) Did or did not the Mayor promise the member for Ward No. 3, in answer to a question of his on the occasion of the appointment of the Special Sub-Committee to consider the applications for the post of Accountant, that, if any member of the Council recommended any one of the applicants for consideration that name would be considered by the Council along with those recommended by the Special Sub-Committee? A.—Yes. Q.—(2) If the Mayor did give such a promise did he not break that promise at the meeting held on August 10, 1939? A.—No, I did not break my promise. The Member for Ward 3 recommended several applicants and all of them received consideration, though not in the way the member wished.
 - Mr. D. S. Goonesekera stated that he was not satisfied with the answer given to question (2).
- 17. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera was, with the permission of Council, withdrawn by the mover:—"That this Council should pass a by-law prohibiting the sale of vegetables, fruits, and fish in any place other than a Municipal market within a radius of a quarter of a mile from the Green Market."
- 18. Pursuant to notice Mr. D. S. Goonesekera moved :--It is the opinion of this Council that cut-stones should be used wherever possible in all repairs and new works, such as culverts and bridges, undertaken by this Council in the future instead of using concrete and iron. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. (1) Carried. (2) Resolved that the matter be referred to the Works Committee for consideration and report.
- 19. To consider whether there should be a Standing Committee to deal with all matters relating to the Council's Electricity Department:—The Mayor moved that there should be a Standing Committee on Electricity with effect from January 1, 1940, and that action be taken to amend Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 so as to permit of this being done. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded.—Carried.
 - 20. The following motions were postponed for the next Meeting owing to want of time:-
- Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya.—"That the following amendments be made to the by-laws regulating the conduct of business of the Council as proclaimed by *Gazette* Notification dated March 24, 1938:—(a) By the deletion of section 27 (2); (b) By the insertion of the words "in English or Sinhalese or Tamil" after the word "Chairman" in section 27 (2)."
- Mr. T. W. Roberts.—"That this Council do pay the widow of the late W. H. Wijetunge, Overseer, Health Department, a gratuity of the same amount as would have been paid if he had died in service.
- Mr. P. Dahanayake.—(1) "As the Galle Esplanade is the only open space available to the tax payers and others for sports and similar amusements, its present lessees be given three years' notice to vacate it and find their own grounds."

 (2) "This Council is of opinion that with a view to take suitable action, a Special Committee be appointed to investigate and report on the prevalence of bribery and corruption among the subordinate servants of the Council.'
- Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne.—(1) "That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed to investigate and report to this Council on ways and means of increasing its revenue." (2) "That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed for the purpose of inquiring and reporting to this Council on ways and means of improving the rural and suburban areas of this town."
- Mr. D. S. Goonesekera.—" That, in the case of appointments made by this Council, applications for any post should not in the future be left to the consideration of a Special Committee but should be considered by the whole Council either at a usual meeting or at a Special Meeting convened for the purpose."
- At the conclusion of the meeting, in reply to a question by Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte, notice of which was received after the prescribed date, the Mayor stated that the loss sustained by the Council's Electricity Department as a resuls of the operation of the Shop Act was approximately Rs. 48 per day from August 1 to 15, 1939".
 - 22. The following documents were laid on the table :-

 - Statement of Receipts and Disbursements to the end of July, 1939.
 Progress Report of Works done on estimates during July, 1939.
 Report of the Inspector of Vehicles on Carriages plying for hire during July, 1939.
 - (4) Report of the Superintendent, Electricity Department.
 - (5) Diaries of (a) the Medical Officer of Health; (b) the Municipal Engineer; (c) the Inspector of Works; and (d) the Manager, Health Department.
- 23. In connection with item 6 (1) of the minutes, Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne submitted, in terms of by-law 16 of Chapter 2, the following dissent from the opinion of the majority of the Council:—"1. This Council had by its resolution dated July 13, 1939, delegated the powers in question to the Mayor. Such delegation had the effect of divesting this Council of those powers. Therefore this Council cannot delegate again the same powers to the Deputy Mayor without first recalling those powers on the principle that you cannot delegate power that is not in your possession. 2. Section 9 (1) of Ordinance 60 of 1935 is the provision of law regulating the mode and manner in which a Municipal Council can delegate its powers. The use of the word "or" in that section is, I think, a distinct pointer to the intention of the legislators. It was never the object of the legislature to vest the same powers both in the Mayor and the Deputy Mayor. One can conceive of circumstances arising when such joint delegation will lead to confusion and chaos. Vicarious responsibility in a public body is to be condemned. My opinion is that if the legislature's intention was otherwise the word "and" would have been used in place of "or". It is possible to delegate powers to the Mayor and the Deputy Mayor but such powers must be delegated to them separately. 3. An argument in support of the Mayor's motion can be based on the following words of the said section "The Council may by resolution delegate to the Mayor or Deputy Mayor or to the Commissioner or to any one or more of its Officers Such an argument is intrinsically unsound in view of the well known principle of law that where an officer or officers have been specifically referred to the general term used later on does not include the officers specifically mentioned. The motion referred to is therefore obnoxious to law and should not have been passed." therefore obnoxious to law and should not have been passed."


