## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

### THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE.

#### *Regulations for the Munnessaram Festival.*

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 2 of the Pilgrimages Ordinance (Chapter 133), I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Notification make the regulations set out hereunder, in anticipation of the customary pilgrimage to Munnessaram for the Festival commencing in August, 1939.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. In these regulations the expression "camp area" shall mean the space within the boundaries specified in the schedule hereto,

and "Assistant Government Agent" shall mean the Assistant Government Agent of the Puttalam and Chilaw Districts.

2. No person shall camp in any place within the camp area where camping is prohibited by special or general order of the Assistant Government Agent.

3. No person shall ease himself within the camp area, except at the places provided for that purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

4. No person shall deposit any liquid or solid refuse or any rubbish within the camp area, except in the places or receptacles provided for that purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

5. (a) No cattle shall be kept in the camp area, and no cattle shall be kept in the vicinity of the camp area except at a place specially appointed as a cattle gala or at a place approved for such use by the Assistant Government Agent.

(b) The person in charge of cattle shall cause their droppings within the camp area to be removed to a place provided therefor and he shall at all times keep clean the place occupied by his cattle.

6. All prepared foods sold within the camp area shall be protected from flies and dust by being (a) wrapped in or covered with clean paper or cloth, or (b) kept in closed glass cases, or (c) kept in other covered containers approved by the Medical Officer, or by the Sanitary Officer in charge of the camp area.

7. No person who is likely to affect prejudicially the cleanliness of the camp area, and no person who is suffering from an infectious disease shall be permitted to enter the camp area.

8. In the event of an epidemic breaking out in the camp area during the festival, the Assistant Government Agent may direct the pilgrims to leave the place of pilgrimage and may prescribe the routes and methods for their conveyance.

9. (a) Every person within the camp area who is suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and (b) every person who resides with him knowing that he is so suffering shall report the case to the Medical or Sanitary Officer in charge of the camp area.

10. When any tank or well within the camp area is set apart for any particular purpose and a notice to that effect is exhibited on the spot, no person shall use the tank or well for any purpose other than that for which it is set apart.

11. No person shall keep bakeries, aerated water manufactories, or galas within the camp area without previously obtaining a licence from the Assistant Government Agent, permitting him to do so. The licence shall be issued free of charge.

12. No person shall without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, construct any booth or extend any building within the camp area so as to encroach on the main or other streets of the camp.

13. No person shall, without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, discharge fireworks and firearms within the camp area, or within a radius of one mile from the boundaries of such area.

14. No person shall slaughter animals within the camp area, except in the place provided for the purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent, and every person slaughtering animals in such a place shall be responsible for its cleanliness.

##### *Boundaries of Munnessaram Festival Camp area.*

North by Palakulam, Kohombaspitiya, Muttarandaluwa, and Munnessaramkulam; south by Munnessaramvela and Nallanayagamakulam; east by Munnessaramkulam, main road from Chilaw to Kurunegala and Nallanayagamakulam; west by Munnessaramvela main road from Chilaw to Kurunegala and Palakulam.

#### THE REGISTERED STOCK AND SECURITIES ORDINANCE.

BY virtue of the powers in me vested by section 4 of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance (Chapter 289), I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Order direct that of the sum of one hundred million rupees for the raising of which by way of loan authority has been given by the Public Works Loan (1937) Ordinance (Chapter 285), the sum specified in the schedule hereto shall be raised in Ceylon in the mode and upon the terms and conditions specified in that schedule.

## SCHEDULE.

1. The sum of money to be raised shall be 16 million rupees and it shall be raised partly by way of a short term loan and partly by way of a long term loan.

2. Each of the loans shall be raised in either or both of the following modes :—

- (a) by the creation and issue of registered stock ;
- (b) by the issue of securities in the form of Government promissory notes.

3. The rate of interest payable shall—

- (a) in the case of the short term loan, be  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per centum per annum ; and
- (b) in the case of the long term loan, be  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per centum per annum.

4. The dates in each year, on which the half-yearly interest on each of the loans shall be payable, shall be the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October.

5. The half-yearly contribution out of the general revenue to the sinking fund to be established for each of the loans shall be at the rate of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per centum per annum, and shall commence—

- (a) in the case of the short term loan, on the 1st day of October, 1941 ; and
- (b) in the case of the long term loan, on the 1st day of October, 1942.

6. The date of redemption of the registered stock or securities issued for the purpose of raising the loan shall—

- (a) in the case of the short term loan, be the 1st day of October, 1951 ; and
- (b) in the case of the long term loan, be the 1st day of October, 1964 :

Provided, however, that the Government shall have the option of redeeming any such registered stock or securities at par—

- (a) in the case of the short term loan, on such date subsequent to the 1st day of October, 1949 ; and
- (b) in the case of the long term loan, on such date subsequent to the 1st day of October, 1959,

as may be appointed by the Governor by notification published, not less than six months prior to that date, in the *Gazette* and in two Ceylon newspapers.

*The list will be opened on August 28, 1939, and will be closed at 1 p.m. on September 2, 1939, or earlier, if the loan is fully subscribed.*

### ISSUE OF Rs. 16,000,000 CEYLON GOVERNMENT LOAN.

THIS LOAN WILL BE RAISED IN TWO ISSUES AT THE OPTION OF THE APPLICANT :—

- (a)  $3\frac{1}{4}$ % Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on October 1, 1951, but the Ceylon Government will have the option of redemption at par on or after October 1, 1949, on giving six calendar months' notice.
- (b)  $3\frac{1}{2}$ % Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on October 1, 1964, but the Ceylon Government will have the option of redemption at par on or after October 1, 1959, on giving six calendar months' notice.

The allocation between the two issues will not be fixed, but the total amount issued will not exceed Rs. 16,000,000.

**Authority :** The loan is raised on the authority of the Public Works Loan Ordinance, 1937 (Chapter 285), and under the provisions of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance, 1937 (Chapter 289).

**Purpose :** The loan is raised to meet the cost of construction or acquisition of certain public works in Ceylon.

**Form of Issue :** The loan will be issued at the option of the applicant in the form of Registered Stock or Promissory Notes. [Leaflets containing the general conditions applicable to Registered Stock and Promissory Notes are available on application to the Public Debt Office—see page 1217 for a summary of these conditions.]

**Issue Price :** Both issues of the loan will be made at Rs. 99 for Rs. 100 stock, and will be payable as follows :—

**Application and Allotment :** Applications will be received by the Registrar, Public Debt Office, General Treasury, Colombo, on or after August 28, 1939, and until the list is closed. Applications must be on the proper form and must be accompanied by the first deposit or by a receipt for the first deposit from a Kachcheri or Bank—for mode of payment see under "Payment for stock".

When the first deposit is paid into a Kachcheri or a Bank, the application form may be forwarded through such Kachcheri or Bank. Depositors of the Ceylon and Post Office Savings Banks may by arrangement with the Savings Banks forward their applications through those Banks.

In the case of partial allotment the balance of the amount paid on application will be applied towards the payment of the amount due on allotment. If there should be a surplus after making that payment such surplus will be refunded by cheque.

All instalments remaining due may be paid in full on any instalment date under discount at  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum. When the full amount of the loan allotted is paid within one week of the date of allotment, the discount allowed will be  $\frac{3}{8}$  per cent.

Interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum will be charged on instalments in arrear, and non-payment of any instalment at its due date will render the deposit and instalments previously paid liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

*A commission of  $\frac{1}{8}$  per cent. will be allowed to bankers, recognized stock-brokers, and brokers registered under the Coconut Products Ordinance on allotments made in respect of applications bearing their stamp.*

**Payment for Stock :** Payments may be made personally or by post in cash or by cheque at the General Treasury, Colombo, or at any Kachcheri, or to the credit of Ceylon Government account in any of the following banks in Colombo :—

- National Bank of India, Limited.

Payments from subscribers in India may be made at any of the branches of the Imperial Bank in India to the credit of Ceylon Government account in the Imperial Bank, Madras, or by cheque on any Indian Bank. Payments so made will be accepted at par of exchange and without deduction of bank commission.

**Letters of Allotment :** Letters of Allotment, which will be negotiable by endorsement, will be issued immediately after allotment. Stock Certificates or Promissory Notes will be exchanged for Letters of Allotment after all the instalments have been fully paid.

**Interest :** Interest on the 1949-51 issue at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. per annum and on the 1959-64 issue at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum will be payable half-yearly on the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October in each year, the first full six months' interest being payable on October 1, 1940.

*A first payment of interest of Re. 1 per Rs. 100 stock will be made on April 1, 1940, and a warrant for this interest, cashable on or after April 1, 1940, will be attached to the Stock Certificate or Promissory Note exchanged for the Letter of Allotment.*

**Taxation :** All documents used in the issue, exchange, transfer or redemption of the loan will be free from stamp duty. The holding is, however, subject to deduction of Ceylon Income Tax (current rate 12 per cent. in the case of non-resident individuals and 15 per cent. in the case of non-resident companies and Hindu undivided families), except in the case of holdings by Charities and by Governments of countries within the British Empire. Persons who are exempt from Ceylon Income Tax will be entitled to repayment of the tax deducted.

**Security :** The loan is secured on the general revenues and assets of the Government. Two separate sinking funds will be formed for the redemption of the two issues of the loan under the management of the Deputy Chief Secretary and the Deputy Financial Secretary who are the trustees of the sinking funds. Half-yearly contributions at the rate of 2½ per cent. per annum to the Sinking Fund of the 1949-51 issue will be commenced on October 1, 1941, and to the Sinking Fund of the 1959-64 issue on October 1, 1942.

These contributions may be increased and will only be discontinued if and when the Trustees are satisfied that no further contributions will be required to ensure the repayment of the loan at the due date.

**Public Debt :** The public debt of Ceylon on September 30, 1938, amounted to Rs. 194,191,333. The approximate market value of the accumulated sinking fund amounted to Rs. 66,306,780. The net public debt is thus Rs. 127,884,553, which is slightly more than a normal year's revenue.

**Application Forms :** Application forms may be obtained at the Public Debt Office, General Treasury, Colombo, or at any Kachcheri, or at any of the Banks mentioned above.

#### SUMMARY OF GENERAL CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO REGISTERED STOCK AND PROMISSORY NOTES.

**Registered Stock.**—Full particulars of every holder of registered stock are entered in the Public Debt registers and a Stock Certificate issued.

**Promissory Notes** are issued in fixed denominations of Rs. 100, Rs. 200, Rs. 500, Rs. 1,000, Rs. 5,000, Rs. 10,000, Rs. 50,000, and Rs. 100,000.

**Payment of Interest.**—Interest will be paid half-yearly by means of interest warrants issued by the Public Debt Office. In the case of registered stock, interest warrants will be made out from the registers and posted to the address of the holders or where they are joint holders to the first named joint holder. In the case of promissory notes, interest warrant will be issued only after the holder has tendered the notes for examination.

**Cashing of Interest Warrants.**—Interest warrants may be presented in person or sent by post or through a Bank for payment at the General Treasury, or at any Kachcheri, or by the Crown Agents for the Colonies in London. In India interest warrants are cashable at any of the Branches of the Imperial Bank at par without deduction.

**Enfacement of Promissory Notes.**—For the convenience of holders in India promissory notes will, at the request of such holders be enfaced for payment of interest at the Imperial Bank of India at Calcutta, Bombay, and Madras. This means that notes so enfaced may be tendered for examination and payment of interest at the Bank instead of being sent to the Public Debt Office at Colombo.

**Transfers or Sales.**—A transfer or sale of registered stock can only be made by means of an instrument of transfer available at the Public Debt Office. The transfer is effected free of stamp duty. Promissory notes are transferable free of stamp duty by endorsement, spaces for which are printed on the back of each note.

**Consolidation, Subdivision and Exchange.**—Stock Certificates and Promissory Notes can be consolidated, subdivided or exchanged at any time at the option of the stockholder, subject to the condition that in the case of stock certificates, the new certificate is for Rs. 100 or a multiple of Rs. 100 and in the case of promissory notes, the new note is in the usual denominations.

**Loss of Stock Certificate or Promissory Note.**—A duplicate stock certificate or promissory note in place of

one lost, stolen or destroyed will be issued only after satisfactory evidence has been produced that the stock certificate or promissory note has been actually lost, stolen or destroyed.

**Renewal of Promissory Notes.**—A promissory note may be renewed—

- if no room remains on the back of the note for more than one further endorsement, or
- if the cages provided on the back of the note for entries relating to payment of interest have been completely filled, or
- if a note is mutilated, or torn, or in anyway damaged or defective, or
- for any other sufficient reason, either at the instance of the Registrar or of the holder.

**Fees.**—The following are the prescribed fees :—

- for consolidation, subdivision and exchange of stock certificates and promissory notes, for transfer of stock certificates and for renewal of promissory notes—Re. 1 for each new stock certificate or promissory note to be issued.
- for duplicate stock certificate or promissory note—Rs. 2 for each certificate or note.

#### Text.

#### CONVENTION BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY IN RESPECT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM AND HIS MAJESTY THE KING OF IRAQ REGARDING LEGAL PROCEEDINGS IN CIVIL AND COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

*Bagdad, July 25, 1935.*

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Majesty the King of Iraq :

Being desirous to render mutual assistance in the conduct of legal proceedings in civil and commercial matters which are being dealt with or which it is anticipated may be dealt with by their respective judicial authorities ;

Have resolved to conclude a Convention for this purpose, and have appointed as their plenipotentiaries :—

His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India ;  
For Great Britain and Northern Ireland :

Sir Archibald John Kerr Clark Kerr, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, his Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at Bagdad ; and

His Majesty the King of Iraq :

Nouri Pasha El Said, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Order of the Rafidain I Class Military.

Who having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed as follows :—

#### I.—Preliminary.

##### ARTICLE 1.

(a) Except where the contrary is expressly stated, this Convention applies only to civil and commercial matters, including non-contentious matters.

(b) In this Convention the words :—

(1) " territory of one (or the other) High Contracting Party " shall be interpreted :—

(i) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, as meaning England and Wales and all territories in respect of which the convention is in force by reason of extensions under Article 16 or accessions under Article 17 ; and

(ii) in relation to His Majesty the King of Iraq as meaning Iraq.

(2) " persons " shall be deemed to mean individuals and artificial persons ;

(3) " artificial persons " shall be deemed to include partnerships, companies, societies and other corporations ;

(4) " subjects of a High Contracting Party " shall be deemed to include artificial persons constituted or incorporated under the laws of the territory of such High Contracting Party ;

(5) " subjects of one (or of the other) High Contracting Party " shall be deemed :—

(i) in relation to His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, to mean all subjects of His Majesty wherever domiciled, and all persons under His protection ; and

(ii) in relation to His Majesty the King of Iraq, to mean all persons of Iraqi nationality.

#### II.—Service of Judicial and Extra-Judicial Documents.

##### ARTICLE 2.

(a) In Part II of this Convention the expression " country of origin " means the country from which the documents to be served emanate, and the expression " country of execution " means the country in which service of documents is to be effected.

(b) When judicial or extra-judicial documents drawn up in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties are required by a judicial authority situated therein to be served on persons in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such documents may be served on the recipient, whatever his nationality, by any of the methods provided in Articles 3 and 4 in all cases where such method of service is recognised by the law of the country of origin.

##### ARTICLE 3.

(a) A request for service shall be addressed and sent by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting such authority to cause the document in question to be served.

(b) The request for service shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution and shall state the names and descriptions of the parties, the name, description and address of the recipient, and the nature of the document to be served, and shall enclose the document to be served in duplicate.

(c) The document to be served shall either be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin.

(d) Requests for service shall be addressed and sent :—

In England to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

In Iraq to the Ministry of Justice.

If the authority to whom a request for service has been sent is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(e) Service shall be effected by the competent authority of the country of execution, who shall serve the document in the manner prescribed by the municipal law of such country for the service of similar documents, except that, if a wish for some special manner of service is expressed in the request for service, such manner of service shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of that country.

(f) The execution of a request for service, duly made in accordance with the preceding provisions of this Article, shall not be refused unless (1) the authenticity of the request for service is not established, or (2) the High Contracting Party in whose territory it is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a request for service is not executed by the authority to whom it has been sent, the latter will at once inform the Consular Officer by whom the request was sent, stating the ground on which the execution of the request has been refused or the competent authority to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) The authority by whom the request for service is executed shall draw up a certificate proving the service or explaining the reason which has prevented such service, and setting forth the fact, the manner and the date of such service or attempted service, and shall send the said certificate to the Consular Officer by whom the request for service was sent. The certificate of service or of attempted service shall be placed on one of the duplicates or attached thereto.

##### ARTICLE 4.

(a) Service may be effected, without any intervention of the authorities of the country of execution by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin, in any manner permissible by the law of the country of origin provided that no physical compulsion is used.

(b) All documents served by a Consular Officer shall, unless the recipient is a subject or citizen of the High Contracting Party from whose territory the document to be served emanates, either be drawn up in the language of the country of execution or be accompanied by a translation into such language, certified as correct as prescribed in Article 3 (c).

(c) The fact that an attempt to effect service in accordance with this article has failed does not preclude a request being subsequently made in accordance with Article 3.

##### ARTICLE 5.

(a) In any case where documents have been served in accordance with the provisions of Article 3, the High Contracting Party, by whose Consular Officer the request for service was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any charges and expenses which are payable under the law of the country of execution to the persons employed to effect service, and any charges and

expenses incurred in effecting service in a special manner. These charges and expenses shall not exceed such as are usually allowed in the courts of that country.

(b) Repayment of these charges and expenses shall be claimed by the competent authority by whom the service has been effected from the Consular Officer by whom the request was addressed, when sending the certificate provided for in Article 3 (h).

(c) Except as provided above, no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the service of any documents.

### III.—Taking of Evidence on Commission.

#### ARTICLE 6.

In Part III of this Convention, the expressions—

(1) "Taking of Evidence" shall be deemed to include the taking of the statements of a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person on oath or otherwise; the submission to a plaintiff, defendant, expert or any other person of any oath with regard to any legal proceedings; and the production, identification and examination of documents, samples or other objects.

(2) "Witness" shall be deemed to include any person from whom any evidence, as defined above, is required to be taken.

(3) "Country of origin" shall be deemed to mean the country by whose judicial authority the evidence is required, and the "country of execution" the country in which the evidence is to be taken.

#### ARTICLE 7.

When a judicial authority in the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties requires that evidence should be taken in the territory of the other High Contracting Party, such evidence may be taken, whatever the nationality of the parties or witnesses may be, in any one of the ways prescribed in Article 8 or 9.

#### ARTICLE 8.

(a) The judicial authority of the country of origin may, in accordance with the provisions of the law of his country, address himself by means of a Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution, requesting such authority to take the evidence.

(b) The Letter of Request shall be drawn up in the language of the country of execution, or be accompanied by a translation into such language. Such translation shall be certified as correct by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin. The Letter of Request shall state the nature of the proceedings for which the evidence is required, giving all necessary information in regard thereto, the names of the parties thereto, and the names, descriptions and addresses of the witnesses. Letters of request shall also either (1) be accompanied by a list of interrogatories to be put to the witness or witnesses, or, as the case may be, by a description of the documents, samples or other objects to be produced, identified or examined, and a translation thereof, certified as correct in the manner heretofore provided; or (2) shall request the competent authority to allow such questions to be asked *viva voce* as the parties or their representatives shall desire to ask.

(c) Letters of Request shall be transmitted—

In England by an Iraqi Consular Officer to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court of Judicature.

In Iraq by a British Consular Officer to the Ministry of Justice.

In case the authority to whom a Letter of Request is transmitted is not competent to execute it, such authority shall (except in cases where execution is refused in accordance with paragraph (f) of this Article) of his own motion forward the Letter of Request to the competent authority of the country of execution.

(d) The competent authority of the country of execution shall give effect to the Letter of Request and obtain the evidence required by the use of the same compulsory measures and the same procedure as are employed in the execution of a commission or order emanating from the authorities of his own country, except that if a wish that some special procedure should be followed is expressed in the Letter of Request, such special procedure shall be followed in so far as it is not incompatible with the law of the country of execution.

(e) The Consular Officer, by whom the Letter of Request is transmitted, shall, if he so desires, be informed of the date when and the place where the proceedings will take place, in order that he may inform the interested party or parties, who shall be permitted to be present in person or to be represented, if they so desire, by barristers or solicitors or by any representatives who are competent to appear before the courts either of the country of origin or of the country of execution.

(f) The execution of a Letter of Request which complies with the preceding provisions of this Article can only be refused—

- (1) If the authenticity of the Letter of Request is not established;
- (2) If, in the country of execution, the execution of the Letter of Request in question does not fall within the functions of the judiciary;
- (3) If the High Contracting Party in whose territory it is to be executed considers that his sovereignty or safety would be compromised thereby.

(g) In every instance where a Letter of Request is not executed by the authority to whom it is addressed, the latter will at once inform the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted, stating the grounds on which the execution of the Letter of Request has been refused, or the competent authority to whom it has been forwarded.

(h) When a Letter of Request has been executed, the competent authority to whom it was transmitted or forwarded shall send to the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted the necessary documents establishing its execution.

#### ARTICLE 9.

(a) The evidence may also be taken, without the intervention of the authorities of the country of execution by a Consular Officer acting for the country of origin.

(b) The Consular Officer may request individuals named by the court of the country of origin to appear before him to give evidence. The attendance and giving of evidence before him shall be entirely voluntary and no measures of compulsion shall be employed.

(c) Requests to appear issued by a Consular Officer shall, unless the recipient is a subject of the High Contracting Party for whose judicial authority the evidence is required, be drawn up in the language of the country of execution or be accompanied by a translation into such language.

(d) The evidence may be taken in accordance with the procedure recognised by the law of the country of origin, and the parties will have the right to be present in person or to be represented by barristers or solicitors of that country or by any representatives who are competent to appear before the courts either of the country of origin or of the country of execution.

#### ARTICLE 10.

The fact that an attempt to take evidence by the method laid down in Article 9 failed owing to the refusal of any witness to appear or to give evidence does not preclude a request being subsequently made in accordance with Article 8.

#### ARTICLE 11.

(a) Where evidence is taken in the manner provided in Article 8 the High Contracting Party, by whose judicial authority the Letter of Request was addressed, shall repay to the other High Contracting Party any expenses incurred by the competent authority of the latter in the execution of the request in respect of any charges and expenses payable to witnesses, experts, interpreters, or translators, the costs of obtaining the attendance of witnesses who have not appeared voluntarily, and the charges and expenses payable to any person whom such authority may have deputed to act, in cases where the law of the country of execution permits this to be done, and any charges and expenses incurred by reason of a special procedure being requested and followed. These expenses shall be such as are usually allowed in similar cases in the courts of the country of execution.

(b) The repayment of these expenses shall be claimed by the competent authority by whom a Letter of Request has been executed from the Consular Officer by whom it was transmitted when sending to him the documents establishing its execution as provided in Article 8 (h).

(c) Except as above provided, no fees of any description shall be payable by one High Contracting Party to the other in respect of the taking of evidence.

### IV.—Judicial Assistance for Poor Persons and Security for Costs.

#### ARTICLE 12.

The subjects of one High Contracting Party resident in the territory of the other High Contracting Party shall not be compelled to give security for costs in any case where a subject or citizen of such other High Contracting Party would not be so compelled.

## ARTICLE 13.

(1) The subjects of one High Contracting Party shall enjoy in the territory of the other High Contracting Party a perfect equality of treatment with subjects of the latter High Contracting Party as regards free legal assistances for poor persons.

(2) The provisions of this Article apply to criminal as well as to civil and commercial matters.

## V.—General Provisions.

## ARTICLE 14.

Any difficulties which may arise in connexion with the operation of this Convention shall be settled through the diplomatic channel.

## ARTICLE 15.

The present Convention, of which the English and Arabic texts are equally authentic, shall be subject to ratification. Ratifications shall be exchanged in London. The Convention shall come into force one month after the date on which ratifications are exchanged, and shall remain in force for three years after the date of its coming into force. If neither of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice through the diplomatic channel to the other not less than six months before the expiration of the said period of three years of his intention to terminate the Convention, it shall remain in force until the expiration of six months from the date on which either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to terminate it.

## ARTICLE 16.

(a) This Convention shall not apply *ipso facto* to Scotland or Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, nor to any of the Colonies overseas territories or Protectorates of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, nor to any territories under His suzerainty, nor to any Mandated territories in respect of which the mandate is exercised by His Government in the United Kingdom, but His Majesty may at any time, while this Convention is in force under Article 15, by a notification given through His Ambassador in Iraq, extend the operation of the Convention to any of the above-mentioned territories.

(b) Such notification shall state the authorities in the territory concerned to whom requests for service under Article 3 or Letters of Request under Article 8 are to be transmitted, and the language in which communications and translations are to be made. The date of the coming into force of any such extension shall be one month from the date of such notification.

(c) Either of the High Contracting Parties may, at any time after the expiry of three years from the coming into force of an extension of this Convention to any of the territories referred to in paragraph (a) of this Article, terminate such extension on giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel.

(d) The termination of the Convention under Article 16 shall, unless otherwise expressly agreed to by both High Contracting Parties, *ipso facto* terminate it in respect of any territories to which it has been extended under paragraph (a) of this Article.

## ARTICLE 17.

(a) The High Contracting Parties agree that His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, may at any time, while the present Convention is in force, either under Article 15 or by virtue of any accession under this Article, by a notification given through the diplomatic channel, accede to the present Convention in respect of any other member of the British Commonwealth of Nations whose Government may desire that such accession should be effected, provided that no notification of accession may be given at any time when His Majesty the King of Iraq has given notice of termination in respect of all territories to which the Convention applies. The provisions of Article 16 (b) shall be applicable to such notification. Any such accession shall take effect one month after the date of its notification.

(b) After the expiry of three years from the date of the coming into force of any accession under paragraph (a) of this Article, either of the High Contracting Parties may, by giving six months' notice of termination through the diplomatic channel, terminate the application of the Convention to any country in respect of which a notification of accession has been given. The termination of the Convention under Article 15 shall not affect its application to any such country.

(c) Any notification of accession under paragraph (a) of this Article may include any dependency or mandated territory administered by the Government of the country in respect of which such notification of accession is given,

and any notice of termination in respect of any such country under paragraph (b) shall apply to any dependency or mandated territory which was included in the notification or accession in respect of that country.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 4 (1) (a) of the Food Control Ordinance (Chapter 132), I, George Claude Stanley Corea, Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce, do by this Order prohibit the transport or removal from the Maritime pattus of the Mullaittivu District, of paddy grown in the said pattus or of rice made from such paddy, except under the authority of a permit issued by the Deputy Food Controller for the District of Mullaittivu.

REGULATION made by the Executive Committee of Labour, Industry and Commerce, under section 15 of the Essential Commodities Reserves Ordinance, No. 5 of 1939.

## REGULATION.

The Essential Commodities Reserves (Rice) Regulations, 1939, published in *Gazette* No. 8,442 of March 27, 1939, as amended by regulation published in *Gazette* No. 8,452 of May 19, 1939, are hereby further amended as follows:—

(1) in regulation 4—

- (a) by the renumbering of that regulation as paragraph (1) of regulation 4, and  
(b) by the addition at the end thereof of the following new paragraph:—

“ Nothing in paragraph (1) shall be deemed to limit or restrict the power of the Director under section 6 (5) of the Ordinance to refuse to register any person who applies for registration as an importer.”;

(2) in regulation 6, by the omission of paragraph (b) thereof and by the renumbering of paragraph (c) as paragraph (b) of that regulation;

(3) in regulation 7, by the addition, at the end thereof, of the following proviso:—

Provided however that the Director may in his discretion exempt any importer from the duty to keep any such day-book or register.

(4) in regulation 13—

- (a) by the omission of the words “ under section 6 ” in the caption above that regulation; and  
(b) by the substitution for the words “ section 6 (5) ” of the words “ section 6 (5) or section 11 ”.

(5) in regulation 14, by the substitution, for the word “ Director ”, of the word “ Minister ”;

(6) in Form 1 set out in those regulations, by the addition at the end of that Form of the following new paragraph:—

8. \*I/We hereby declare that \*I/We have not, during the preceding six months, had any interest as partner or otherwise in any business carried on by any person or firm as a registered importer of rice, other than the one in respect of which the application is made.

\* Strike out if inapplicable.

(7) in Form 2 set out in those regulations, by the substitution for the words “ for a period of six months commencing on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_,” of the following “ during the period commencing on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 19\_\_\_\_, and ending on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_.”

## REGULATIONS.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Essential Commodities Reserves (Sugar and Flour) Regulations, 1939.

*Registration of Importers of Sugar or Flour.*

2. Every application for the registration of any person as an importer of sugar or flour shall—

- (a) be substantially in Form 1 set out in the Schedule to these regulations and shall contain the particulars required to be set out in that Form; and  
(b) be signed by the applicant or by his duly authorized agent.

3. Every person who is an applicant for registration as an importer of sugar or flour shall, if he is required so to do by the Director, produce such documents as may be necessary to prove the correctness of any statement made by that person in his application.

4. (1) Where application for registration as an importer of sugar or flour is made by any person who should, in the opinion of the Director, be required in accordance with the provisions of section 7 of the Ordinance, to keep a reserve stock of sugar or flour, as the case may be, the Director may refuse to register that person as an importer—

- (a) if he is satisfied that that person will be unable to maintain a reserve stock of sugar or flour in accordance with such provisions; or  
(b) if he is satisfied that that person is not in occupation of a store at which the reserve stock can be stored to the satisfaction of the Director.

(2) Nothing in paragraph (1) shall be deemed to limit or restrict the power of the Director, under section 6 (5) of the Ordinance, to refuse to register any person as an importer.

5. Upon the registration of any person as an importer of sugar or flour the Director shall enter or cause to be entered in the register of importers of sugar or flour such particulars as he may deem necessary relating to that person, to his business as an importer and to the registered store, if any, at which reserve stocks of sugar or flour, as the case may be, will be kept by him.

*Permits to Import Sugar or Flour.*

6. A permit to import sugar or flour which is issued under section 7 of the Ordinance—

- (a) shall be substantially in Form 2 set out in the Schedule to these Regulations; and  
(b) shall be subject to the conditions set out in that Form and to such other conditions as the Director may, under section 7 (2) of the Ordinance, insert in such permit.

7. Every registered importer shall keep and maintain in the English language—

- (a) a register of imports which shall be substantially in Form 3 set out in the Schedule to these Regulations; and  
(b) a day-book which shall be substantially in Form 4 set out in the Schedule to these Regulations;

Provided, however, that the Director may in his discretion exempt any importer from the duty to keep any such day-book or register.

8. Every registered importer shall, whenever called upon to do so by the Director or by any person authorized by him, transmit to the Director a copy or extract from the register kept under Regulation 7.

Every such copy or extract shall be accompanied by a declaration signed by the importer to the effect that the particulars contained therein are true and accurate.

9. Notwithstanding anything contained in any conditions inserted in a permit issued under section 7 of the Ordinance, the Director may in his discretion and subject to such conditions as he may impose, authorize the holder of the permit to sell or otherwise dispose of any specified portion of the stocks required to be held by him as a reserve. Any conditions so imposed shall be deemed for all purposes to be a condition inserted in the permit by the Director.

Clause 24 (i.)—Add as a new condition the following:—  
(g) There is need for more Training schools.

Clause 25 (b) *Second paragraph*—Add the words "and completing the study of academic subjects" at the end.

*Third paragraph*—Substitute "180 hours" for "90 hours" in line 10 and delete the words "each of" in the same line. Substitute "120 hours" for "60 hours" in line 12/13.

Add the following new Clause 55a after Clause 55:—

Clause 55A (1) The Director may, whenever he considers it necessary, open a school attached to a place of religious worship, and appoint a temporary part time teacher provided that:

- the previous consent of the owner of such school has been obtained,
- the school building provides sufficient accommodation and is in sanitary condition, and
- facilities for seating and writing exist in such school.

(2) The Director may—

- provide such school with school books and stationery to an amount not exceeding 50 cents per unit of average attendance per annum,
- pay the salary of the teacher employed in such school on the non-incremental salary scale of Rs. 240 per annum.

(3) (a) The Director shall require the teacher to keep registers of the pupils attending such school,

(b) Such register shall be correctly and properly kept and shall contain a record of the entrance, attendance and departure of each pupil of such school.

(4) Any session of such school shall be of not less than 2 hours duration.

(5) This clause comes into force with effect from October 1, 1935.

Clause 58 (b)—Delete last paragraph and substitute—

"Result grant will not be paid unless at least 75 per cent. of the average attendance of pupils or 75 per cent. of the number on the roll on the day of annual inspection, whichever number is less, have been presented at the annual inspection."

Clause 60 (a)—Delete all the words from "or 15" in line 4 to the end.

Clause 60 (b) (i.)—Delete and substitute—

"The salary cost of the approved staff.  
The staff will be approved for grant on the following basis:—

- 30-50 residential students—3 teachers.
- 51-70 residential students—4 teachers.

Teachers with English qualifications may be employed on the staff provided they have an adequate knowledge of Sinhalese or Tamil, and should not be more than one in a three-teacher school and not more than two in a four-teacher school.

Any teacher in excess of the numbers allowed by the above regulations, who is already employed in a Training school, shall not be adversely affected by these amendments so long as he remains in the Training school."

Clause 65—Insert the words "or destitute child" after the word "orphan" in line 15.

Appendix A, B, and D—In the amendment published in the *Government Gazette* of March 25, 1938, delete the sentence "The Head Teachers' . . . for grant" and substitute the following:—"The Head Teachers' salary scales will be applicable only when the number of teachers for which the school is eligible for grant is not less than five."

## LOCAL LOANS AND DEVELOPMENT FUND.

## Report for the Year 1937-38.

THE annual report of the Local Loans and Development Commissioners for the year 1937-38 is submitted, together with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet, duly audited and certified by the Auditor-General.

*Loans.*—Loans amounting to Rs. 1,231,004·02 were granted during the year, made up as follows :—

*Interest.*—Interest received during the year amounted to Rs. 301,319·20.

*Rate of Interest.*—The rate of interest on loans to local authorities continues to remain at four per centum per annum and that for Co-operative Societies and Government Officers for building houses at five per centum per annum.

*Receipts.*—The receipts for the year amounted to Rs. 1,381,536·13, exclusive of Rs. 5,385·15 recovered as legal and inspection fees and inclusive of Rs. 485,000 obtained as a loan from Government.

*Borrowing.*—In the report for the last year it was mentioned that the Commissioners were finding it more and more difficult to meet applications from local authorities for their water supply, electric light and power schemes from funds at their disposal and that application would have to be made for additional grants from the central revenue with a view to provision of the necessary funds to meet these increasingly heavy calls. Government did not agree however to a further outright grant to the Fund from general revenue, but had no objection to the grant of an interest bearing loan. Accordingly, a loan of Rs. 485,000 was received from Government carrying interest at 3½ per cent. per annum, the principal being repayable as and when convenient to the Fund. It was arranged that further funds required by the Commissioners would be available on loan from the proceeds of Government Cash Savings Certificates.

*Expenses of the Fund.*—The expenses for the year amounted to Rs. 1,417·68, exclusive of fees paid to the legal advisers and to the Inspecting Officers of the Public Works Department which were recovered from Government officers.

*Bad Debts.*—During the year a sum of Rs. 832·13 was written off as a bad debt out of the income of the Fund representing the amount outstanding from the Mailapitiya and Hammillawetiya Co-operative Societies. Reference to these two societies will be made in a subsequent paragraph of this report.

*Net Profit of the Fund.*—In terms of section 7 (3) (b) of the Local Loans and Development Fund Ordinance and of a decision of Government to appropriate the net profits of the Fund, an amount of Rs. 261,449·67 being net profit for the year 1936-37 became payable to Government revenue. Of this sum, only a sum of Rs. 240,000 was transferred to revenue during the year under review, as the cash balance in the Fund at the end of the year was very low. The sum of Rs. 21,449·67 still due to Government has subsequently been paid during the current financial year.

The net profit for the year 1937-38 was Rs. 299,069·39.

*Cash Balance.*—The cash balance lying in the Treasury on September 30, 1938, was Rs. 5,598·62.

*Capital of the Fund.*—The capital of the Fund stood at Rs. 6,723,200·55, of which Government grants amounted to Rs. 4,193,094·27, and the accumulated interest to Rs. 2,530,106·28. Of the latter amount Rs. 320,519·06 was at the end of the financial year due to Government, as stated above, representing the net profit for the year 1937-38 and a part of the profit for the year 1936-37 which was not paid in 1937-38.

*Arrears of Repayments.*—The arrears due to the Fund on September 30, 1938, in respect of instalments and interest were as follows :—

Of the sum of Rs. 92,044·88 due from local authorities Rs. 90,027·49 was in respect of the Urban District Council, Chilaw, and the present position of the loan to this Council will be mentioned in detail in a subsequent paragraph of this report. The balance of Rs. 2,017·39 was in respect of repayments due in September, 1938, but paid in the following month.

Of the amount due from Co-operative Societies Rs. 91,054·93 was the liability of the Jaffna-Malayalam Tobacco Co-operative Sale Society. The amount has subsequently been paid and at the date of this report there were no arrears due from this society.

The amount outstanding from Government officers represents instalments due in September, 1938, which were paid early in October.

## GENERAL.

*Local Authorities : Urban District Council, Chilaw.*—Reference was made in the last year's report to the delay in the installation of the purification plant, until which the question of the commencement of the repayment of the loan had been deferred. The work of installation was completed in March, 1938, and at a meeting of the Commissioners held on February 21, 1938, the question of the commencement of repayment was discussed at length and it was decided to appoint a Sub-Committee of the Commissioners to advise whether the Commissioners would in all the circumstances of the case be justified in recommending to the Governor the release or reduction of any part of the loan under the power granted to them by section 27 of the Local Loans and Development Fund Ordinance. The report of the Sub-Committee was

8. Contracts may not be assigned, sublet, or otherwise transferred without the previous written sanction of the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services. "An improved and simplified kiln for producing hot-air dried copra".

Abstract:—

An improved type of drying kiln for copra characterised by having four drying tables placed round a central chimney with two furnaces, each of which serves two tables. Heating pipes are arranged with adjustable dampers under each table, and between each set of pipes and table is interposed a curved perforated baffle so shaped as to secure an even temperature over the entire table.

Shutters are arranged to control the air which after coming into contact with the pipes rises by convection to the baffle plates and tables; suitable shutters are also provided to control the air that mixes with this air to carry off the moisture from the copra. A funnel shaped ventilator fitted round the chimney ensures an up-draught that keeps up the circulation of drying air.

The inventor states that by this arrangement maximum flexibility of operation is attained. Copra can be readily transferred from table to table, as is necessary when the shells are being removed. A larger volume of air can be passed in the early stages of drying by suitably adjusting the shutters. Adjustments of the dampers over the main chimney keeps down the fuel consumption to a minimum.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of June 7, 1939, were taken as read and confirmed.
2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, M.S.C., M.M.C., presented a petition from the residents of Dematagoda praying for the widening of Dematagoda road, and requested the Mayor to refer it to the appropriate Committee for report.
3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. C. W. S. Fernando, M.M.C., presented a petition from the residents of, and about, Kollupitiya lane, praying that this lane be improved, and requested the Mayor to refer it to the appropriate Committee for report.
4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. J. R. Dharmasena, M.M.C., presented a petition from the residents of Maradana, requesting that the tramway route be shifted from the present site to the centre of the road, and requested the Mayor to refer it to the appropriate Committee for report.
5. The Mayor replied as follows to the question of which due notice had been given by Mr. R. F. S. de Mel, M.M.C.:—

Will the Mayor kindly state:—

(a) Q.—The number of unlighted roads and lanes in the City and the respective Wards in which they are situated? A.—There are sixty-eight unlighted streets or sections of streets maintained by the Council in the City and they are in the following wards:—Fort, 2 streets; Pettah, 3 streets; Kotahena, 5 streets; Mutwal, 9 streets; New Bazaar, 1 street; Maradana North, 6 streets; Dematagoda, 8 streets; Slave Island, 5 streets; Kollupitiya, 4 streets; Cinnamon Gardens, 1 street; Bambalapitiya, 5 streets; Timbirigasyaya, 9 streets; Wellawatta, 10 streets. Of these twenty-two will be taken up for lighting this year under Estimate K 116, Rs. 15,000.

(b) Q.—Whether he will take the necessary steps in order to provide these roads and lanes with lights and make adequate provision for this purpose in the budget for 1940? A.—This will be considered when the Budget for 1940 is prepared.

6. The Mayor replied as follows to the questions of which due notice had been given by Mr. R. F. S. de Mel, M.M.C.:—

(c) Q.—How are the children selected for free meals and by whom? (c) A.—The children who receive free meals were selected by the Head Teachers and approved of by the Chairman, Municipal Education District Committee.

(d) Q.—What supervision is exercised by the Council in connection with the feeding that is carried out in each of these schools? (d) A.—The Charity Commissioner is in charge. The nine fulltime Playground Instructors make regular inspections during meal time. *Note*.—A comprehensive memorandum on the question of the selection of those to be fed, suitable diet, proper supervision, &c., has been submitted to the Relief of Distress Committee—*vide* C. C. 955 of December 13, 1938.

(e) Q.—What is the diet that is now being provided? (e) A.—Diet—Mondays: \*bread, ghee, sugar, plantains; Tuesdays: bread, ghee, groundnuts, plantains; Wednesdays: bread, ghee, sugar, plantains; Thursdays: bread, ghee, carrot, plantains; Fridays: bread, ghee, sugar, plantains. *Note*.—Tenders have been called for, rice and curry is to be substituted as soon as possible.

(f) Q.—Whether it is not possible for the Council to make arrangements to feed all the pupils attending each school rather than only a limited number as at present? (f) A.—It would be possible if funds were available.

(g) Q.—What will be the approximate cost to the Council if this is carried out over and above the present expenditure of Rs. 21,440? (g) A.—The approximate cost would amount to over Rs. 100,000 to feed all the children attending the 46 free schools at which meals are now being provided. If all the children in all the free schools in the City are to be fed the sum required would necessarily be very much larger.

(h) Q.—On what principle or principles are schools selected for free mid-day meals? (h) A.—The schools at which free meals are provided were selected by the Municipal Education District Committee on the following basis:—All Government Free Schools existent at the time feeding was undertaken and a few denominational Free Schools on a proportionate basis as funds permitted. No new schools have been taken on since 1936.

7. Pursuant to notice, Dr. R. Saravanamuttu, M.B., M.M.C., moved that:—“The motion carried in this Council at its meeting on June 7, 1939, by which a Committee was appointed to inquire into and report upon the circumstances connected with the transfer of the Workshop Foreman, Mr. Nanayakkara, on the orders of the Commissioner, be rescinded.”

In terms of the provision of section 10 (e) of Chapter II. of the Municipal By-laws, the notice of above motion bears, in addition to the signature of the mover, the signatures of the following five Members:—(1) Mr. N. The Mayor with the permission of the Council read a note from Mr. A. R. A. Razik, who though present was not in a fit condition to speak, containing his views on the motion. Dr. R. Saravanamuttu spoke in reply.

The motion was then put to the House and declared lost by the Mayor's casting vote.

Operations on horses and cattle, Rs. 75. Injections : Intravenous Hypodermic, &c.—from 1 to 4 animals, Re. 1 ; for every additional animal, 50 cents. Owners requiring Tuberculin tests Rs. 10 for each animal as this entails at least 3 visits, and in all cases owners have to supply the necessary medicine. Registered No. 686.—Recommended.

*The following Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of October 14, 1933, was considered.*

## MUNICIPAL ASSESSOR'S DEPARTMENT.

(2) With reference to the resolution of Council of August 3, 1938, to consider the report of the Rent Restriction Sub-Committee, *vide* Annexure "C". Registered No. 240.

After considering the report paragraph by paragraph the Committee resolved to report as follows :—

## A.

  - (c) *No Rent to be increased without the permission of the Municipal Magistrate*. It is recommended that the suggestions of the Sub-Committee under 2, 3, 4 and 5 be approved.
- One Member of the Committee felt that there should be more protection given to the landlords generally.

## DISSENT.

As Chairman of the Committee, I strongly dissent from this recommendation. I feel that this officer in the course of the inquiry has deliberately spoken an untruth when he stated that, owing to the loss of a sum of Rs. 400 on August 6, 1938, he was unable to pay up the whole amount till March 13, 1939, when he borrowed a large amount from Proctor, Kadingamar. This officer fails to realize that he was acting on this job from August 6, 1938, till September 9, 1938, for his first period when he was taken off, due either to ill-health or for some other reason, and only put on again on this particular job on December 3, 1938. It must be noted that on September 13, 1938, in spite of the loss of Rs. 400 stated by him in August, he made good the whole amount which had been collected on that date; so that when he commenced in December, 1938, he had no debt to pay, as the whole sum of Rs. 920·25 handed to him by the Caretaker was in his possession. I feel that this officer deliberately misappropriated these funds and that he should be dealt with in the usual manner, and that is, that this matter be handed over to the Police for investigation and prosecution if they think it necessary.

## ANNEXURE " C ".

*Report of the Rent Restriction Sub-Committee.*

## A.

Of the two motions passed on October 6, 1937, viz., (1) that a Rent Restriction Ordinance should be introduced more or less in accordance with the terms of the draft Ordinance attached to the motion, and (2) that the law be amended relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo, the more important is undoubtedly the 2nd motion above-named. After careful consideration, we are of opinion that the law relating to the assessment of properties in Colombo should be amended in the manner mentioned below.

As the law now stands, under section 120 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Municipality has got the right to ask for returns of the rent or annual value of properties from the owner or occupier only for purposes of valuation. Further the penalty is only a fine not exceeding Rs. 100 for a false return or a refusal to make a return. If we compare this section 120 with the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920, sections 179 and 180, it will be seen that so far as District Councils are concerned, the Local Authority has got much wider power. We are therefore of opinion that section 120 should be repealed and the law be amended giving—

- (1) the Municipality power to revise the assessments of properties in Colombo periodically, say once in every 5 years, ward by ward.
- (2) whenever the Municipality has given notice of such revision in any ward, the Municipal Assessor or the Commissioner should be given the power to require the owner, occupier and tenant of every house, building, or land to furnish a return of the rent or annual value thereof, the penalty for a refusal or for false return being Rs. 500 or six months' rigorous imprisonment.
- (3) the power to call for returns should not only be for the purpose of the periodical assessment, but also at any time and from time to time for the purpose of "the ascertainment of any information which in the opinion of the Commissioner shall be necessary." (see section 179 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1920).
- (4) the Municipality should be given the right to enter and inspect and survey any house, building or land at reasonable times.
- (5) the Municipality should have the right also to summon and question any occupier, owner or tenant of the house, land or building for the above purposes with the same penalty mentioned above.
- (6) We are of opinion that objections to assessments should not be heard by the Assessment Department but by an independent Committee composed, say of three Members, to be appointed from amongst the Members of the Municipal Council as well as from outside the Council.

This Committee should also have the power of hearing proposals for the reduction of the assessments for the following year made by any person to the Assessment Department provided that such applications shall be heard by the Committee only if the Assessment Department is not satisfied with the evidence placed before it for the proposed reduction of assessment. If the Assessing Department is satisfied that the proposed reduction of the assessment for the following year is justified on the evidence placed before it, the necessary alteration can be made for the next year. If the Assessing Department is not so satisfied, there should be a right of appeal to the Committee.

There should be a right of action in a Court of Law for the purpose of testing the decision of the Committee, as in the existing law.

## B.

As regards the first motion, we have had several representations from landlords, but only one on behalf of the tenants of small buildings. The draft Ordinance was based on legislation passed in India, Rangoon and Singapore, and a notice was published inviting criticism from the public. It was not meant to be passed intact as it stood, but was drafted with the object of inviting public comments. We are satisfied that it will not be advisable to pass the bill as drafted for the reasons given by the landlords. In spite, however, of the vehement protests of the landlords, we are firmly convinced that some relief should be given to the tenants of small buildings. Such relief can be given without unsettling the existing law to a great extent.

1. (a) In the first place, we think the Small Tenements Ordinance, No. 11 of 1882, should be amended in two respects. The word "tenement" should mean a house or other building or room which may be rented, exclusive of all taxes, rates and assessments, for a sum of not exceeding Rs. 30 instead of Rs. 20 as at present.

(b) Some provision should be made in the Small Tenements Ordinance introducing the English Law relating to Landlords' lien.

We understand that owing to a decision of the Supreme Court a landlord has no right to stop a tenant from removing his furniture for arrears of rent due unless he has obtained an order of Court to back him up. We think that power should be given to landlords to stop the removal of property by a tenant who tries to evade payment of arrears of rent.

2. No landlord should have the right to increase the rent of a tenement, the monthly rental of which is Rs. 30 or under, above the assessed annual rent as assessed in the Municipal books, without getting the permission of the Municipal Magistrate. Such application should be dealt with summarily after notice to the tenants and the Municipal Authorities. Similarly no landlord should have the right to bring an action in any Civil Court in Ceylon to recover any sum above the assessed monthly rent as rent without getting the special permission of the Municipal Magistrate as stated above.

3. No action to recover rent in respect of a tenement not assessed with a separate number in the Municipal Assessment books should be allowed to be brought in any Civil Court, except with the previous sanction of the Municipal Magistrate obtained as stated above. This is to prevent a dwelling house being divided into cubicles for the purpose of being let.

4. A right of appeal should be provided from the decision of the Municipal Magistrate, say to the Commissioner of the Court of Requests, the party appealing furnishing security in a sum not exceeding Rs. 25, the cost of appeal being taxed as in an ordinary action in a Court of Requests.

5. There should be provision made that no premium is to be chargeable in respect of a tenancy and a penalty provided for disturbance of easements by the landlord in order to get rid of an unsatisfactory tenant.

C.

If this report is approved or modified by the Municipal Council, a draft bill or bills will be drafted by the Special Committee in terms of the resolution.

**The Dog Registration Ordinance.**

BY-LAWS for the area within the administrative limits of the Kotte Urban District Council, made under section 4 of the Dog Registration Ordinance (Chapter 334) by the proper authority in that behalf, to wit, the Chairman of the Kotte Urban District Council.

Urban District Council Office, DONALD OBEYESEKERA,  
Kotte, August 10, 1939. Chairman.

BY-LAWS.

1. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Kotte Urban District Council;

“Council” means the Kotte Urban District Council;

“the annual registration fee” means the annual registration fee to be charged under section 4 of the Ordinance; and

“the owner” in relation to a dog includes the person having custody or possession of that dog.

2. The annual registration fee shall be paid at the office of the Council, by the owner of each dog and shall—

(a) in the case of a dog which has been in his possession before March 31, of any year, be paid on or before March 31 of that year; and

(b) in the case of a dog which comes into his possession after March 31 of any year, be paid within fifteen days of the date on which such dog comes into his possession.

3. On payment of the annual registration fee, the Chairman shall issue to the owner of the dog—

- (i) a certificate of registration ; and
- (ii) a metal ticket or collar with the number of the certificate stamped thereon ;

Provided that the Chairman may require the production of any dog for the registration of which an application is made, and may refuse to issue a certificate of registration and a metal ticket or collar for that dog—

- (a) if that dog is not produced ; or
- (b) if that dog is, in the opinion of the Chairman, so maimed or diseased as to be unfit to live ; or
- (c) if that dog is habitually ill-treated or neglected by its owner.

4. The Chairman may, after notice to be left at the address of the owner of any dog for which a certificate of registration has been issued, cancel such certificate—

- (a) if that dog becomes, in the opinion of the Chairman, so maimed or diseased as to be unfit to live ; or

(b) if that dog is habitually ill-treated or neglected by its owner ; or

(c) if that dog is permitted by its owner, at a time when it is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease to associate with any other dog.

5. (1) The owner of any dog, for which a certificate of registration has been refused under by-law 3 or has been cancelled under by-law 4, shall on being served with a notice in that behalf by the Chairman, produce that dog at a time and place appointed by the Chairman, and specified in the notice.

(2) Every such dog may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Chairman may think fit.

6. The owner of any dog for which a metal ticket or collar has been issued shall take all necessary steps to ensure that the metal ticket or collar is fastened securely round the neck of that dog at all times during the period for which the certificate of registration issued in respect of that dog is in force.

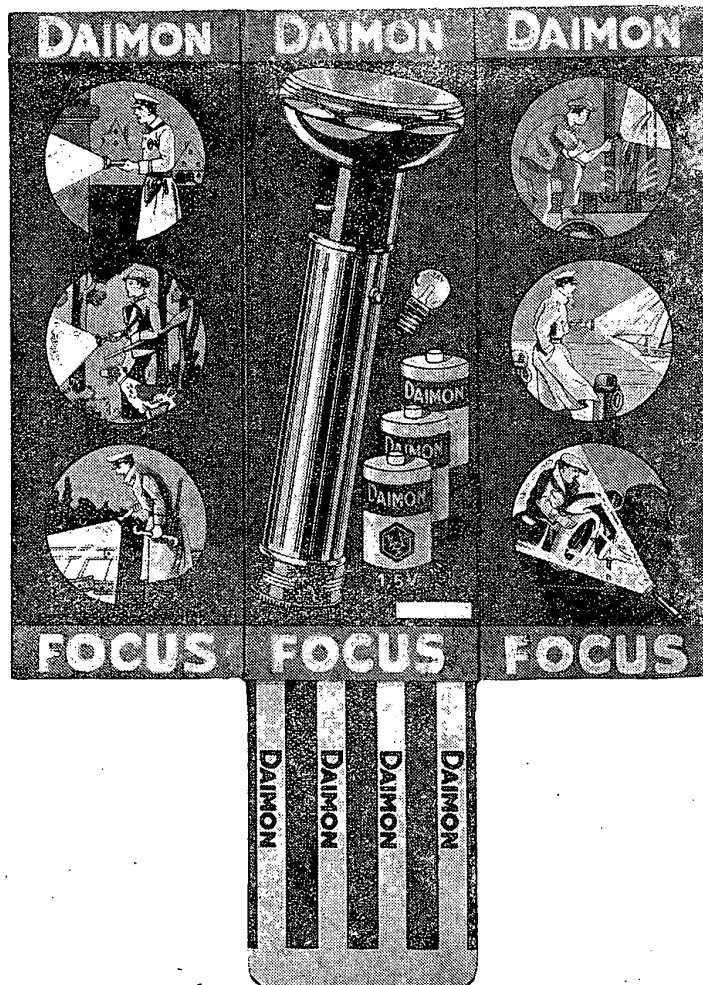
7. The Chairman may authorise in writing any person to exercise any or all of the powers vested in the Chairman by these by-laws.

8. The by-laws made by the Council and published in *Gazette* No. 7,989 of June 23, and in *Gazette* No. 8,259 of December 4, 1936, are hereby revoked.
