THE QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASES ORDINANCE.

THE following rules governing the qualifying examination for Probationary Divisional Revenue Officers are published for general information :—

QUALIFYING EXAMINATION FOR PROBATIONARY DIVISIONAL REVENUE OFFICERS.

Every Probationer will be required before he can receive a substantive appointment as a Divisional Revenue Officer to pass (a) an examination in the work he has learnt while under training and (b) an exacting test in the Vernacular chiefly spoken in the District and (c) a test of a less exacting standard in the other vernacular.

Scheme of Examination (a).

The subjects and scheme of the examination in the work learnt by him while under training are as follows :—

(1) Criminal Procedure Code and Ceylon Penal Code.

The examination will consist of a two hour paper designed to test the candidate's knowledge of the main principles of these codes.

(2) Crime work.

The examination will consist of a two hour paper composed of questions on practical crime work, prevention and detection.

(3) Kachcheri accounts.

The examination will consist of a simple two hour paper on Kachcheri Accounts so far as they affect the duties of a Divisional Revenue Officer.

(4) Instructions to Headmen.

The examination will consist of a two hour paper based on the Manual "Instructions to Headmen".

(5) Land Ordinances and Regulations (including Forest Regulations).

The examination will consist of a three hour paper on the main features of these Ordinances and regulations and on their practical application.

(6) A general paper of three hours which may include questions on Excise, Irrigation, Agriculture, Sanitation, Health, and any other matters which fall within the scope of a Chief Headman's duties.

The marks required for a pass in each paper will be 40 per cent.

This examination will be held in each Kachcheri in April and October every year the papers being however set and marked centrally. Every Probationer will be required to take the examination in the April following his appointment provided that he has completed at least nine months service on the date of the examination. Thereafter he will be required to take the examination every six months until he passes in all the subjects. Should he fail to pass in all subjects after three attempts, the question whether it is worth while continuing him in training will be considered.

Candidates will be required to take all six subjects at their first attempt, but should they pass in any one or more subjects and fail in the remainder they will not be required to sit again for the subjects in which they have passed.

Scheme of Examination (b) and (c).

The scheme for the language examinations (b) and (c) is as set out below. The scope of both examinations is the same except that no grammar paper will be set for the examination in the second language and the percentage of marks required for a pass is lower.

Written Examination.

1. Sinhalese or Tamil Language— The paper will consist of questions relating to vocabulary, compilation of sentences, idiom, precis-writing and other forms of prose composition. The candidate's proficiency in grammar will be judged less by formal tests than by the range and precision of his general vocabulary, and by his power of applying grammatical knowledge to the interpretation of words and constructions	60	No paper
Translation—		
2. Translating into English two out of three short reports from Headmen or petitions written in different running hands	60	33
3. Translating a short passage from an official paper or document into Sinhalese or Tamil	60	33

These language examinations will be held quarterly in Colombo generally in the third week of February, May, August, and November. Applications from Probationers to take these examinations should be forwarded through the Government Agent to reach the Deputy Chief Secretary not later than the last day of January, April, July or October as the case may be. The exact dates of the examination will be notified in the *Gazette*.

Probationers will not be allowed to take these examinations until they have completed at least nine months service. After that they will be allowed to take the examinations every three months. Attention is drawn in this connection to Financial Regulation 1239.

REGULATION.

The regulations under section 10 (1) of the Ordinance published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,332 of November 26, 1937, as last amended by regulation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,501 of September 11, 1939, are hereby further amended as follows:—

(1) by the substitution for regulation 4 of the following:—
Permanent “4. (1) The permanent staff of the Force staff will consist of—

- one Officer Instructor and one Chief Petty Officer Instructor;
- the minor staff specified in Appendix E, and such other minor staff as the Governor may from time to time approve.

(2) The permanent staff shall form part of the Force and shall be liable to be called into actual service in the same manner as the volunteer members of the Force.

(3) The Officer Instructor and Chief Petty Officer Instructor will be selected by the Admiralty in consultation with the Colonial Office.

(4) The Governor will grant local ranks in the Force to the Officer Instructor and Chief Petty Officer Instructor if he thinks it proper to do so.”;

(2) by the substitution, for regulation 5, of the following:—

“5. The training year will commence on October 1st in each year and end on September 30th in the succeeding year.”;

(3) in regulation 6—

(a) by the substitution for the word “Ratings” in paragraph (2) thereof, of the words “Petty Officers, leading seamen and able seamen”;

(b) by the substitution for the word “Probationers” in paragraph (4) thereof, of the words “Signalmen and Gunners”;

(4) in regulation 7, by the omission of the words “Probationers will be required to carry out a minimum of 7 days' training afloat and perform in addition a minimum of 21 drills ashore during each year.”;

(5) in regulation 10, by the omission of the words “and ratings”;

(6) in regulation 12, by the substitution for the words “officers, ratings, and probationers”, of the words “officers and ratings”;

(7) in regulation 13, by the substitution for the words “probationers and other ratings”, of the word “ratings”;

(8) by the addition at the end thereof, of the following new regulation :—

Corps Fund. “ 26. (1) There shall be a Corps Fund into which shall be paid, out of the general revenue of Ceylon, such sums as may from time to time be voted for the purpose by the State Council.
(2) The Commanding Officer shall be responsible for the administration and application of the Corps Fund, and will be assisted by a Finance Committee consisting of the Commanding Officer as Chairman, the Officer Instructor, and such other persons not being less than three in number, as may from time to time be appointed by the Commanding Officer.

(3) All sums paid into the Corps Fund must be deposited by the Commanding Officer in an account at a Bank, and cheques drawn on the account must be signed by the Commanding Officer and two other members of the Finance Committee authorized in that behalf by the Committee.

(4) All accounts relating to the Corps Fund are subject to audit by the Auditor-General.

(5) Moneys in the Corps Fund may be expended for the establishment and conduct of institutions for providing recreation and entertainment for members of the Force, and for such other purposes as may from time to time be approved by the Commanding Officer on the advice of the Finance Committee.” ;

(9) in Appendix D, by the omission of paragraph (2) of that Appendix ;

(10) by the addition after Appendix D of the following new Appendix E :—

RESOLUTION UNDER SECTION 9 OF THE CUSTOMS ORDINANCE.

IT is hereby notified that the following rule made by the Executive Committee of Home Affairs in pursuance of the powers vested in that Committee by section 83 of the Prisons Ordinance (Chapter 44) has been approved by the State Council and ratified by the Governor.

RULE.

The general rules published by Notification dated August 12, 1926, in *Gazette* No. 7,542 of August 20, 1926, are hereby amended as follows :—

(1) by the deletion of Rule 297 and the substitution of the following new rule therefor :—

“ 297. (1) Any day spent in hospital on account of illness will be counted as a day spent in the class to which the prisoner belongs, if the illness was not contributed to or caused by the prisoner's own default, neglect or vice.

(2) The period during which a prisoner is specially treated as an appellant under the next following rules will not be counted for purposes of promotion to a higher class unless the Court by which the appeal is heard directs that such period be treated as part of the sentence ; and where the Court so directs, the prisoner shall also be credited for that period with remission marks in accordance with the rules relating thereto.” ;

(2) by the insertion immediately after Rule 297 of the following new rules :—

“ APPELLANTS.

297A. (1) Where any prisoner gives, under the Court of Criminal Appeal Ordinance, No. 23 of 1938, notice of appeal or of application for leave to appeal or of application for extension of the time within which such notice may be given, the provisions of Rules 297B to 297F shall apply to that prisoner during the period commencing on the date on which such notice is despatched from the prison or, where it is despatched from any other place, the date on which information is received by the Superintendent from the Registrar of the Court that the notice has been received, and ending on the date on which notice is received by the Superintendent from the Registrar that the appeal has been determined or that the application has been dismissed or, where the application is granted, that any appeal preferred in pursuance of the grant of the application has been determined.

(2) Where any prisoner appeals to the Supreme Court under Chapter XXX. of the Criminal Procedure Code, the provisions of Rules 297B to 297F shall apply to that prisoner during the period commencing on the date on which the petition of appeal is despatched from the prison or, where it is despatched from any other place, the date on which information is received by the Superintendent from the Court of trial that the petition has been lodged in that Court, and ending on the date on which notice is received by the Superintendent from the Registrar of the Supreme Court or from the court of trial that the appeal has been determined.

(3) A prisoner to whom paragraph (1) or paragraph (2) relates is hereinafter in rules 297B to 297F referred to as an "appellant".

297B. (1) Every appellant who—

- (a) is taken to any place at which he is entitled to be present for the purposes of an appeal under the Court of Criminal Appeal Ordinance, No. 23 of 1938, or to any place to which that Court or any Judge thereof may order him to be taken for the purposes of any proceedings of the Court, or
- (b) is ordered to be produced before any Court for the purposes of any appeal preferred by him under the Criminal Procedure Code,

shall, during the period when he is outside the prison be kept in the custody of the officer or officers directed by the Superintendent of the prison to convey him to such place or Court.

(2) Every appellant must, during the period when he is outside the prison for the purposes of any appeal, wear his private clothing: provided that where such clothing is not available or cannot be used, the appellant shall be provided with and must wear civilian clothing of the type usually worn by him before his admission to prison.

297C. (1) Every appellant shall, if it is necessary for the purposes of his appeal, be entitled to interview his legal advisers at any time during such hours as may be fixed for the purpose by the Superintendent.

(2) Any appellant may, if it is necessary for the purposes of his appeal, be permitted to interview a registered medical practitioner selected by himself or any relative, friend or legal adviser, at any time during such hours as may be fixed for the purpose by the Superintendent.

(3) Every interview under this rule shall take place in the sight of a prison officer, and, unless the prisoner otherwise requires, within hearing of such officer.

297D. (1) The Superintendent shall supply to every appellant such stationery as may be necessary for the purpose of the preparation of any documents in connexion with the appeal.

(2) Every appellant shall be entitled to write such letters, to any of his relatives, friends or legal advisers, as may in the opinion of the Superintendent, be necessary for the prosecution of his appeal.

(3) Where any appellant prepares any written communication and states that it contains confidential instructions to his legal adviser in connexion with his appeal, such communication—

- (a) shall not be examined by any officer of the prison unless the Superintendent has reason to believe that it contains matter not relating to the appeal; and
- (b) shall be delivered by the Superintendent or by an officer of the prison to the legal adviser or his authorized clerk, or transmitted by the Superintendent to the legal adviser.

The provisions of rule 20 shall apply in the case of any other communication written or prepared by any appellant.

297E. (1) Any appellant may be required—

- (a) to make his own bed,
- (b) to sweep and clean the cell, ward or yard occupied or used by appellants,
- (c) to clean or arrange any furniture or utensils appropriated for the use of appellants, and
- (d) to help, to such extent as the Superintendent may think necessary, in the preparation of food.

(2) No appellant shall be compelled to perform in the prison any work which is not referred to in paragraph (1).

297F. The provisions of all other rules for the time being relating to prisoners shall, except in so far as they may be inconsistent with any of the foregoing rules 297A to 297E, apply in the case of every appellant.

OFFENDERS DETAINED IN CUSTODY UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 318 (1) OF THE CRIMINAL PROCEDURE CODE.

297G. A prisoner detained under the provisions of section 318 (1) of the Criminal Procedure Code, shall be given the diet prescribed for unconvicted prisoners, and shall be permitted to wear his private clothing: provided that where such clothing is not available or cannot be used, he shall be provided with and must wear during the period of his detention, civilian clothing of the type usually worn by him before his admission to prison."

Objections under Section 46.

1. Every objection in respect of an application for a licence for an omnibus or lorry shall be made by a written statement on good and suitable paper which shall be signed by the person making the objection. Where the objection is made by any body corporate or firm it shall be signed by a person duly authorized in that behalf by such body or a partner of the firm, as the case may be.

2. Every objection shall be made in duplicate and the original shall, where the objection is made by any person other than a licensing authority, bear stamps to the value of Rs. 2.50.

3. Every statement of objection shall set out the specific grounds on which the objection is based and shall indicate, by reference to the name of the applicant for the licence and to the distinctive number of the motor car, the application in respect of which the objection is made.

4. No objection relating to more than one motor car shall be made in any one statement of objection.

5. The Commissioner may refuse to consider any objection if it does not comply with the provisions of any of the foregoing regulations.

6. The Commissioner may refuse to consider any objection which is received by him after the date specified in the list of applications published in the *Gazette* under section 46 (1) of the Ordinance.

7. The Commissioner shall send the duplicate copy of every objection received under these regulations to the applicant for the licence in respect of which the objection is made.

8. The fee payable under section 46 (4) in respect of the inspection of any application for a licence shall be Re. 1.

9. The Regulations under section 46 (3) of the Ordinance, published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,466 of July 21, 1939, are hereby rescinded.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the right to fell trees, convert them into sleepers, timber in the log, sawn timber, &c., and collect and remove these from the areas referred to in the annexed schedule, at the rates shown for the respective classes offered for sale, and will be received by the Chairman, Tender Board, General Treasury, Colombo, up to mid-day on Tuesday, November 21, 1939.

2. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover and should be addressed to the Chairman, Tender Board, General Treasury, P. O. Box 500, Colombo.

3. Tenders should be marked "Tender for the Right to Exploit Crown Forests for Sleeper Supply, &c." in the left hand top corner of the envelope and should reach the General Treasury not later than mid-day on Tuesday, November 21, 1939. *Each area shown separately in the annexed schedule should be tendered for separately.*

4. Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the General Treasury, Room No. 223, Second Floor, Galle Face Secretariat, Colombo, or be sent through the post preferably under registered cover.

5. Tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at any of the Divisional Forest Offices in Jaffna, Kurunogala and Nuwara Eliya, or the Head Office, and no tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form.

6. All alterations and erasures in tenders must be initialled by the tenderers.

7. A deposit of Rs. 50 must be made either in the office of the Conservator of Forests or in a Kacheheri, and a receipt produced for same before any form of tender is issued. If a person to whom a tender form has been issued fails for no satisfactory reason to submit his tender within the time fixed in Condition 3 above, his tender form deposit of Rs. 50 will be liable to be forfeited at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests.

8. A tenderer shall before making his tender, examine in the office at which he obtains the tender form a copy of the agreement he will be required to execute in the event of his tender being accepted and shall sign and deliver a statement at the time of applying for a tender form to the effect that he has fully acquainted himself with the terms of such agreement and that in the event of his tender being accepted he will, within the time fixed in Condition 13 below, execute an agreement in terms of the specimen agreement. As evidence of his having examined the specimen agreement the tenderer shall sign, his name on it in the space provided for the purpose.

9. A tenderer who has not previously held a Forest Department contract, when applying for tender forms, should furnish the Officer issuing the forms with a written statement giving his full name and permanent address, stating in which district or districts he owns landed property or other interests. The extent of landed property, and the nature and extent of other interests should also be given.

A tenderer, who has carried out contracts with the Department but not in the Division or Districts concerned in the notice calling for tenders, should state in which Division or District or Divisions or Districts he has held contracts.

A tenderer, who has carried out Government contracts with any other department should state the name of such department and the District in which the service was rendered, as well as the other information required.

No tender form will be issued to any person or on behalf of any person whose name appears in the list of defaulting contractors.

10. No tender will be considered unless the conditions laid down above have been complied with.

The Government reserves to itself the right without question to reject any or all offers and to accept any portion of an offer. No offers will be entertained from persons whose names appear on the list of defaulting contractors.

11. Tenderers should, before tendering, satisfy themselves as to the timber contents of the area of exploitation; no representations as to adequacy or quality of such contents will be entertained after an offer has been accepted for the right to exploit the area.

12. The tenderer should quote a lump sum (or premium) both in words and in figures, which shall indicate and include the amount of money the tenderer is prepared to pay for the exclusive right to exploit the area in question, but shall not include the value of the material which the purchaser of the right shall pay to the Forest Department at the time of removal at the royalty rates specified in the schedule annexed. The attention of tenderers is specially drawn to the minimum premium, that will be considered, for each area shown in the annexed schedule.

13. The successful tenderer for each area shall within ten days of being informed in writing that his tender has been accepted, pay in full the amount of his offer and enter into the necessary agreement. He shall supply at his own cost a stamp of the value of Rs. 10 to be affixed to the original copy of the agreement. He shall also deposit before signing the agreement the amount shown in the schedule annexed thereto, as security for the due and punctual performance of the agreement. Should he fail to comply with these requirements his tender form deposit may be forfeited to the Crown; he may render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract in future, and to make good any resultant loss; further the service may be offered to another tenderer in which case no claim for any profit that may accrue to Government by such offer will be entertained. Notice of acceptance of the tender will be deemed to have been received by the tenderer if it has been sent by post addressed to, or left at, the address given by the tenderer. All other tender form deposits will be returned upon signature of the agreements.

14. The agreement shall be entered into by the successful tenderer (hereinafter called the contractor) with the Divisional Forest Officer within whose jurisdiction the area of operation lies, acting for and on behalf of HIS MAJESTY THE KING, and the designation of such officer shall mean and include the officer for the time being holding such office and his successors in office for the time being under the Government of Ceylon.

15. After execution of the agreement the contractor may commence the felling and conversion of trees and the collection of timber at the Wayside Depots established by him in the area with the consent of the Divisional Forest Officer and referred to in the agreement, where, subject to reservation specified in Special Condition 3, payment must be made at the royalty rates referred to in the attached schedule, for the respective classes. Final removal will only be permitted on removal permits in the prescribed form, under the hand of a Forest Officer, and only in respect of timber which bears the Government hammer mark "S". Material transported outside the area of operations shall bear a distinctive property mark, indicating ownership of such material by the contractor, who shall register such property mark with the Divisional Forest Officer at the time of signing the agreement on payment of a fee of Re. 1 annually. In the case of any part of the timber which is permitted to be utilized as firewood, however, the Divisional Forest Officer may authorize the issue of removal permits without the necessity for stamping of or affixing any property mark to such material. The material found in the area will for purposes of payment be divided into the following classes:—

A.—Railway Sleepers.

- (i.) Broad Gauge : Satinwood, palu, milla, ranai, and na.
- (ii.) Narrow Gauge : do.

B.—Timber in the Log and Timber converted in the Forest.

- (i.) Ebony (cleaned).
- (ii.) Satinwood, nedun, jak, halmilla and margosa.
- (iii.) Palu, milla, ranai, na, hulanhik, kumbuk, kolon, tamarind, pihimbiya, kon.
- (iv.) Other species.

C.—Firewood.

(i.) Firewood.

Royalty, at rates laid down in the annexed schedule, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee for Agriculture and Lands, will be recovered on:—

"B" (timber converted in the forest) per cubic foot calculated by multiplying the length, breadth, and thickness; and on

"C" (firewood) per cart load.

15. (a) The contractor shall supply labour for enumeration of trees; stacking of timber in depots for purposes of taking stock or measurement with a view to recovery of royalty, &c., and for any other work connected with the agreement deemed necessary by the Divisional Forest Officer concerned. If the contractor shall fail to supply labour for such work, it shall be lawful for the Divisional Forest Officer (if it shall appear to him expedient to do so), to take the work into his own hands, after giving one week's notice in writing to the contractor that the said work will be completed by the Divisional Forest Officer and thereupon to employ sufficient workmen, overseers, and materials to finish and complete the same. And the contractor shall be liable to pay and make good such sum or sums of money, if any, as may be spent by the Divisional Forest Officer in the completion of the said work and the contractor shall authorize the Divisional Forest Officer to recover such amount from moneys that may become payable to the contractor under this agreement.

15. (b) The contractor shall not in any manner do, cause, or procure to be done, any act, matter, or thing whatsoever to delay or impede the completion of any works under clause 15 (a) above which may be carried out by the Divisional Forest Officer or to obstruct the person or person so employed by the Divisional Forest Officer or to prevent them from using the implements, tools, &c., which shall have been or shall be provided for the execution of any of the said works, and shall not in any way molest or cause to be molested, the Divisional Forest Officer or any person employed by him.

16. The agreement may not be assigned or sublet without the authority of the Tender Board. The Tender Board reserves to itself the right to refuse to recognize a power of attorney issued by the contractor to any person authorizing him to carry on the agreement on contractor's behalf. In the event of the Tender Board refusing to authorize assignment or subletting of agreement or to recognize a power of attorney and the contractor not being prepared to carry on work on his own, the right of exploiting the area shall be re-advertised and on its resale the contractor's rights shall automatically cease, and he shall not be entitled to refund of any sums paid by him or to any claim whatsoever on account of the resale.

17. The contractor shall not employ any person whose name is on the list of defaulting contractors. The Conservator of Forests may, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, give notice in writing of his objection to the employment by the contractor of any person specified in such notice, and no such person shall be employed by the contractor.

18. Special rules for felling, conversion, and removal of material which are to be observed by the contractor are more fully outlined in the Special Conditions given below. Nothing in those Special Conditions will exempt the contractor from liability under the Forest Ordinance, No. 16 of 1907, should he be responsible for the commission of a Forest Offence.

19. The contractor shall indemnify the Crown against any claim, by or in respect of any employee of the contractor under the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1934.

20. The payments to which the contractor may render himself liable under the agreement may be deducted by the Divisional Forest Officer concerned from all moneys then due or that may become due to the contractor under this or any other contract he may hold under Government and/or from the security deposited by the contractor and hypothecated to the Crown under clause 13 hereof or be recovered from him by action at law.

21. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of ejecting the contractor's employees and of rescinding the agreement if the above conditions are not adhered to.

22. In case of any disagreement arising between parties to the agreement it shall be referred to the Tender Board whose decision in every case shall be final and binding on the parties to the agreement.

23. For any further information, application should be made to the officer issuing tender forms.

Special Conditions.

(1) The Forest Department will, as far as possible, assist contractors in disposing of material extracted from their areas. The Railway Department will buy direct from the contractors, subject to stipulations shown below, sleepers of the correct specification (copy attached) in respect of species, quality, and dimensions, brought from the felling area to the Railway line sides or station yards. The Railway Department will pay the contractors for all accepted sleepers at the following approximate rates:—

It should be understood by tenderers that no guarantee is held out that payment will be made by the Railway Department at the above rates as they are subject to revision. Narrow gauge sleepers should not be converted except on the orders of the Forest Department which will issue such orders after ascertaining the requirements of the Railway Department. The contractor shall extract as many sleepers as his coupe could yield. Should he fail to do this he shall be liable to forfeit his security in full or in part.

(2) A Forest Department representative will pass all sleepers for species at the same time that the Railway Department's Inspecting Officer passes them for specification and payment; and the Forest Department will generally advise the contractor during the course of the work as to the specification and standard of sleepers required, but the onus of supplying sleepers which comply with the Railway Department's specification rests on the contractor alone.

(3) Royalty at the rates given in the schedule will be recovered on timber in the log, converted material other than sleepers and firewood at the Wayside Depot, as and when required by the Divisional Forest Officer, and in any case at intervals of not longer duration than one month. The time and place of recovery of royalty on sleepers will be fixed by the Conservator of Forests and his decision on all aspects of this question shall be final.

(4) Sleepers should be delivered at an agreed point on the line side or station yards in batches or parcels of not less than 600, and as sufficient quantities become available for handing over, the Forest Department will intimate the Railway Department to this effect.

(5) The contractor shall, if required by the Divisional Forest Officer, deposit with that officer such sum of money as may be required to secure the due payment of the royalty; and in case of default being made in the payment at the prescribed time of any royalty accrued under the agreement the sum so accrued may be withdrawn by the said officer from the sum deposited and shall then be credited to Forest Revenue.

(6) A plan will be attached to the agreement showing the working area delineated by a red outline. The boundaries of the area and subdivisions of it, as the Divisional Forest Officer may deem necessary, shall be demarcated by the contractor and work shall be confined to such subdivisions as the Divisional Forest Officer may from time to time lay down.

(7) The conditions regarding felling operations, &c., are as follows:—

(a) (i.) In areas which are not Reserved Forests or Proposed Reserves and in areas which are released for the requirements of the Revenue Officer, halmilla trees which exceed 3 ft. 6 in. in girth at breast height and all other trees which exceed 4 ft. 6 in. in girth at breast height may be felled, except in the case of Pekulam forest where trees in claimed lands as indicated by the headman concerned shall not be felled and the right is reserved for villagers to clear paddy and kurakkan chenas within the boundaries of this forest on the authority of the Revenue Officer concerned.

- (ii.) The right is, however, reserved to the various Government Agents and Assistant Government Agents, in whose provinces or districts the areas of exploitation lie, to issue therefrom, if necessary, grants for requirements of villages within or adjacent to these areas of exploitation and for public purposes, in respect of trees of any species or girth. The contractor shall not be entitled to any payment for any materials thus granted.
- (b) In Reserve Forests and Proposed Reserves no halmilla tree below 4 ft. in girth and no tree of other species below 5 ft. 6 in. in girth at breast height shall be felled, nor shall any tree be felled which has not been previously stamped for felling by a Forest Officer.
- (c) The Forest Department shall have the right to select for supplies to the Central Timber Depot, Public Departments, or other purposes any trees felled in any forest included in the schedule annexed hereto. Any satin log over 5 feet in girth at the butt end, which has not been so selected, shall be converted into sleepers or scantlings or both. Any satinwood log having a girth at the butt end less than 5 feet or any log of other species of any girth not selected by the Forest Department may be removed by the contractor in log or scantlings, as he may desire.
- (d) When satin trees are selected for the supply of logs to the Forest Department, the contractor shall convert, bark, and trim them according to instructions that may be issued to him and supply the logs at the nearest Railway Station loaded into Railway trucks and shall be paid for this service at the following rates:—

An additional sum of 10 cents, 15 cents, 20 cents, or 25 cents per c. ft. corresponding respectively to the distances shown under (a), (b), (c), and (d) above will be paid for logs over 18 ft. in length and/or over 8 ft. in mid-girth.

- (8) (i.) If a contractor in the performance of his agreement does anything contrary to its terms or omits to do anything required thereby, the Conservator of Forests may:—

- (a) in any case in which he is of opinion that such act or omission is a serious irregularity, cancel the said agreement and forfeit, for the use of the Crown, the contractor's security deposit and all timber in the area and the wayside depot, whether paid for or not;
- (b) in any case in which he is of opinion that such act or omission is a minor irregularity, fine the contractor.

(ii.) The Conservator of Forests may give the contractor time to pay such fine. If such fine be not paid within the time allowed for its payment, it will be recovered from the security deposited under General Condition No. 13.

(9) The contractor shall make good any deductions made from the security deposit within such time as the Conservator of Forests may fix. If he fails to do so the Conservator of Forests may cancel his agreement and forfeit the balance of the said deposit.

(10) The contractor shall be liable to pay, at rates obtaining under the agreement for logs left lying in the area at the termination of the agreement which in the opinion of the Divisional Forest Officer are marketable or capable of being converted.

Any trees which stand unfelled in the coupe at the termination of the agreement shall be the property of the Crown and the contractor shall have no claim whatever to them.

(11) All demands for timber and firewood in the vicinity of an area under working shall be met from that area and the contractor will be required to meet those demands and will be allowed to charge any rate not in excess of Full Royalty prescribed by law for standing timber or firewood. The contractor shall issue licences for felling and removal on his own printed forms, which shall be subject to the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Materials thus sold shall bear the Government "S" hammer mark and the contractor's property mark side by side.

(12) All produce removed by the contractor or his licensee may be stopped and examined by any Forest Officer, anywhere, and, if there is reason to believe that money is payable to Government in respect of any portion of it, may be detained until such money is paid, or until inquiry regarding it has been made. The contractor shall not be entitled to claim compensation for any loss occasioned by such detention.

(13) The contractor shall have the right to appeal to the Conservator of Forests in the event of the enforcement of any of the penalties specified in these conditions and the decision of the Conservator of Forests shall be final.

(14) Felling, conversion, collecting, and removal rights under this sale shall commence on January 1, 1940, or the date of signing the agreement whichever is later.

(15) The first consignment of not less than 600 broad gauge sleepers must be ready for delivery to the Railway not later than May 31, 1940. In the case of delay a penalty of Rs. 25 may be imposed for every month or part of a month, after May 31, 1940, and until the first consignment is ready for delivery at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests.

(16) Felling conversion, collection, and removal rights shall cease on December 31, 1940, in all cases except Tambala and Dolagalala in which case they shall cease on December 31, 1941. Applications for extensions of time will only be considered in exceptional circumstances and granted at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests, whose decision shall be final. Such extension shall be subject to payment by the contractor of 25 per cent. of the accepted premium for every period of extension of 3 months or less. The Conservator of Forests shall, however, have the power to waive this payment in full or in part, at his sole discretion, but this power will only be exercised in cases where the contractor has displayed commendable zeal and energy, or where his operations have been hindered by circumstances outside his control. Extension of time for felling purposes, however, will not be granted under any circumstances in respect of Akkiriyan, Puvarasankulam, and Andankulam forests which are comprised within a working plan.

Copy of Railway Department's Specification for Sleepers.

(a) The broad gauge sleepers are for the 5 ft. 6 in. gauge lines and are to be 9 ft. long, 10 in. wide, and 5 in. deep, subject to a variation in length of 1 in. The narrow gauge sleepers are for the 2 ft., 6 in. gauge lines and are to be 5 ft. long 9 in. wide, and 4½ in. deep, subject to a similar variation in length.

(b) All sleepers shall be cut from well matured trees of the true species of timber. Sleepers must be sawn, and shall be of good sound timber free from heartshake, sapwood, except as provided in (c), dry rot and knot holes shall be cut square out of winding and straight.

(c) Allowance may be made for small surface sunshakes, end shakes up to 6 in. ; a few pinholes but not in groups, sound and firm knots up to 2 in., in diameter ; sap or wane must not exceed 2 in. on either face and not come under the rail seat.

(d) The sleepers shall not be cut on full quarter and shall be cut with an allowance of $\frac{1}{4}$ in. in width and $\frac{1}{8}$ in. in thickness to allow for shrinkage and no further allowance on account of size, except as provided above for length, shall be made.

Abstract.—A portable apparatus for administering gaseous anaesthetics comprising a case in which are mounted a small gas cylinder, gas pressure reducing valve, pressure gauge and diaphragm controlled inlet valve to breathing mask. Resilient means are provided for holding the cylinder in position ; in addition, a screw clamp presses the outlet of the cylinder into gastight engagement with the inlet to

the reducing valve. A key for operating the cylinder is mounted on the case ; this can be brought in and out of engagement with the cylinder when required. An exhausted cylinder can be quickly and easily withdrawn by disengaging this key, undoing the spring clamp and slipping the cylinder out of the resilient mounting.

The breathing mask is connected to an adjustable air control valve and to a chamber covered by a diaphragm. The outlet from the reducing valve also enters this chamber. The action is such that it allows the gaseous anaesthetic to be drawn into the chamber by the patient on inhaling but cuts off the supply during exhalation. The air supply is controlled by a non-return valve and a slotted disc valve which is adjustable.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance, I, Murari Prasad, Deputy Controller of Prices, Batticaloa District, do, by this Order :—

- (1) fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Schedule hereto to be respectively the maximum wholesale price per bag, the maximum wholesale price per bushel, the maximum retail price per kottu and the maximum retail price per seer above which rice of the description and grades specified in the corresponding entry of column 1 of the Schedule hereto shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, for the area within the Urban District Council limits of the town of Batticaloa ;

- (5) direct that for the purpose of this Order :—
 - (a) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale,
 - (b) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail,
 - (c) " Measure " shall be deemed to be the standard quart-dry measure equivalent to 1/32nd part of a bushel,
 - (d) " Kottu " shall be deemed to be equivalent to 1/24th part of a bushel,
 - (e) " Seer " shall be deemed to be equivalent to 1/28th part of a bushel,
 - (f) a bag of rice other than broken raw rice shall contain not less than 76 measures and 157 lb. nett excluding the weight of the sack, and
 - (g) a bag of broken raw rice shall contain not less than 115 measures and 239 lb. nett excluding the weight of the sack.
- (6) Rescind my Order relating to the maximum price of rice dated October 4, 1939, and published in the *Gazette* No. 8,522 of October 6, 1939.

 - (c) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
 - (d) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
 - (e) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one-thirty-second part of a bushel;
 - (f) the maximum price which may be demanded within any area mentioned in the First Schedule hereto for a quantity of rice which is less than a bag but not less than one bushel shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag prescribed by this Order, in respect of that area, for rice of that description and grade;
 - (g) the maximum prices fixed by this Order for rice of any description and grade which is sold in a quantity of one bushel or more shall include the container in which such rice is sold.
