- (e) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was wholesale or retail as the case may be.

 - (a) a bag of any rice other than Broken Raw Rice shall contain not less than 76 measures and 158 pounds by weight;
 (b) a bag of Broken Raw Rice shall contain not less than 115 measures and 239 pounds by

 - (c) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
 - (d) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
 - (e) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one thirty-second part of a bushel;
 - (f) the maximum price which may be demanded within any area mentioned in column 1 of the Second Schedule hereto for a quantity of rice which is less than one bag shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag fixed by this Order, in respect of that area, for rice of that description and grade;

THE GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

General Meeting.

Thursday, September 14, 1939, at 2.30 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 2.30 P.M., pursuant to notice dated September 8, 1939.

Present.—Mr. W. Dahanayake, the Mayor, presiding; and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor; J. E. Perera; F. Magdon Ismail; R. L. Ephraums; A. H. E. Fernando; E. de S. Wijeratne; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed; and T. W. Roberts.

- 1. The minutes of the General Meeting held on August 17, 1939, copies thereof having been sent to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.
- 2. The Mayor moved:—"On behalf of the citizens of Galle this Council desires to convey to His Excellency the Governor an assurance of its loyalty and devotion to His Majesty the King and of its readiness to co-operate in any measures which the authorities may consider necessary to adopt in the prosecution of the War". Mr. A. I.-H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor seconded. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya drew the attention of the Mayor to by-law 10 (d) of the by-laws regulating the procedure at meetings, and said that the motion was not in order as it had no bearing at all on Municipal administration. The Mayor ruled that the motion was in order under the by-law quoted by the Member. Mr. T. W. Roberts suggested the insertion of the word "reasonable" before the word "measures" in line 4, as he said he could not support any unreasonable measures, such as the present "black-out". The Mayor said he was unable to agree with the suggestion made and was not prepared to insert the word "reasonable" before the word "measures". The motion was the present "black-out". W. T. W. Pelevisted and was not prepared to insert the word "reasonable" before the word "measures". The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried, Messrs. W. T. Wijekulasuriya and T. W. Roberts declining to vote.
- 3. The Mayor announced that he had suggested to the Government Agent, Southern Province, the creation of special constables or a town guard unit in Galle and read out to the meeting the reply he had received which was to the effect that those persons who desired to serve as special constables could register their names with the Superintendent of Police. Such persons would then be called upon to supplement the local police force if the need should arise.
- 4. Pursuant to notice Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte asked the following questions which the Mayor answered

Q.—Will the Mayor be pleased to supply the following information:—(a) What is the total amount of revenue derived from the Fish Auction Shed? (1) for the year 1938, (2) for the first six months of 1939. A.—Rs. 6,098·39 for the year 1938, and Rs. 2,734·91 for the first six months of 1939.

Q.—(b) What is the total amount of expenditure in detail incurred on the Fish Auction Shed—(1) for the year 1938, (2) for the first six months of 1939? A.—Rs. 2,100 for the year 1938, and Rs. 1,050 for the first six months of 1939. These sums represent the salaries paid to the Clerks and Criers, which is the only expenditure incurred.

Q.—(c) What is the total amount realized by the last sale of the Auction Shed rent? A.—Rs. 17,904.92 in 1921.

Q.—(d) How many stalls are there in the Fish Market? A.—44.
Q.—(e) How many of them are occupied for—(1) Fresh fish, (2) dry fish, (3) converted into boutique rooms? A.—All the stalls in the Fish Market are intended for the sale of fresh fish, but the occasional sale of dried fish in these stalls is not prohibited. No stalls have been converted into boutique rooms, but there are three rooms adjoining the Fish Market which are known as Fish Market Boutique No. 1, Fish Market Boutique No. 2, and Fish Market Boutique No. 3 respectively.

Q.—(f) What are the total amounts of revenue derived from (1), (2), and (3) above for the year 1938? A.—The total revenue derived from the Fish Market Stalls for 1938 was Rs. 2,599·11 and the total revenue from the three boutique

Arising out of the above replies Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne asked the following supplementary question to which the

Mayor replied :-Q.—In view of the great disparity between the revenue derived from the Fish Auction Shed in 1921 and 1938, showing that the Council is losing to-day about Rs. 11,000 from the Auction Shed, will the Mayor please explore the possibilities of bringing the revenue back to its old figure? Mayor: The matter is being considered by the Sanitation

and Markets Committee.

- 5. Pursuant to notice Mr. T. W. Roberts asked the following questions which the Mayor answered: --
- Q.—(1) Did not this Council instal water meters under the regulation which authorizes the Council to instal meters where it has reason to suspect that a household consumes more than the statutory maximum?

-(2) Is not that regulation the only regulation which authorizes installation of meters in respect of water

consumed for domestic purposes? A.—Yes.

consumed for domestic purposes? A.—Yes.

Q.—(3) Now that the meter readings of several months have, as admitted by the Mayor, proved that all the householders in question, except one, consume less than the statutory maximum, is not the Council's further claim for rent an illegal exaction in all these cases except one? A.—I do not think so. As long as a meter is installed in any premises meter rent is payable under Waterworks Regulation No. 38; and by its resolution of August 17, 1939, the Council decided that water meters should be retained at all premises which have the water carriage system.

Arising out of the reply to question (3) Mr. T. W. Roberts asked the following supplementary question:—Is not the Regulation just quoted by the Mayor some two or three years later in date than the original regulation under which the Council installed the meters? Mayor: I need notice of that question.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. A. William Wijeratne asked the following questions which the Mayor answered:—

-(1) (a) Will the Mayor please make a statement showing the overtime pay received by all Municipal employees during the last three months? A.—A statement giving the information required is tabled. (2) Will the Mayor be pleased to obtain, if possible, a report on the diet given to patients in the Non-paying Wards of the Galle Civil Hospital? A.—Mr. F. Magdon Ismail, Member for the Fort Ward, who is the Visitor appointed by the Council to the Galle Hospital, reports as follows:—"According to the Medical Superintendent of the Galle Hospital the diet given to patients in the Non-paying Ward is as follows:—Ordinarily there are three meals. In the morning, hoppers, plantains, sugar, and tea. At 12 o'clock is the midday meal. This consists of beef, fish or dry fish, rice, and vegetables, or rice with two vegetables, sambal, and what is called "Mirishody". Beef and fish are given on two days in the week, dry fish on one day, and the vegetable diet on two days. To those who do not cat beef is given mutton, fish or eggs. The final meal is at 6 P.M. Patients are given eggs, soup, and other things specially ordered by the doctor and after the 6 o'clock meal also they are given anything specially ordered. Those who are on low diet are given milk, malted milk, "cunji", soup, &c., according to each case. This meal is repeated and the final one is at 5 o'clock. When specially ordered by the doctor these patients are given albumen water and things of this nature". malted milk, "cunji", soup, &c., according to each case. This meal is repeated and the final one specially ordered by the doctor these patients are given albumen water and things of this nature"

7. With the permission of Council the following motions on the Agenda dealing with food control and profiteering in Galle were next taken up for consideration:—

(1) A motion by Mr. A. William Wijeratne reading as follows:—This Council appeals to the authorities to take immediate steps to prevent the excessive profiteering that is now going on in the sale of curry stuffs, provisions, and other articles of food; and all other necessaries, such as iron-ware, chinaware, building materials, motor necessories, &c.

(2) A motion by Mr. F. Magdon Ismail reading as follows:—That this Council do open a Municipal Market for rice

and other foodstuffs.

The Mayor moved the Council into Committee to consider these two motions and to discuss generally the question of food control and profiteering in Galle. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee-

The Mayor explained to Council in Committee that although the matter did not strictly come within his purview he had drawn the attention of the Deputy Food Controller in Galle to the necessity for fixing reasonable prices for the sale of rice and other foodstuffs with a view to preventing profiteering which was being carried on in the town on a very large scale. He had also suggested that a conference should be held for the purpose, representative of all classes of the public, but so far no action had been taken. The Mayor went on to explain that on his own responsibility and by arrangement with the lessees he had fixed the prices of rice and other foodstuffs in five stalls of the Municipal Market which might now be considered as check stores, as the sales therein were being carried on under the supervision of Municipal Inspectors. Beyond that he did not think the Council could do anything more at present except to urge on the authorities to take action without any delay to control the prices of foodstuffs and other necessaries in Calle.

After a full discussion on the matter Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne moved:—This Council requests the Food Controller to appoint an Advisory Board consisting of the Members of this Council for all measures in connection with food control within the Municipal limits of Galle. The Mayor seconded.—Carried.

Mr. A. William Wijeratne then moved the motion standing in his name. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded.—Carried. With the permission of Council Mr. F. Magdon Ismail amended his motion to read as follows:—"That this Council do open Municipal Markets for rice and other foodstuffs, if necessary." Mr. A. M. Saheed seconded.—Carried.

Council then resumed and the Mayor moved that the above resolutions of the Council in Committee be adopted.

Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

8. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya moved:—That the following amendments be made to the by-laws regulating the Conduct of Business of the Council as proclaimed by Gazette Notification dated March 24, 1938:—(a) by the deletion of section 27 (1); (b) by the insertion of the words "in English or Sinhalese or Tamil" after the word "Chairman" in section 27 (2). The Mayor seconded. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne pointed out that at the July Meeting he had raised the question as to whether it was in order under the by-laws for a member to address the Council in Sinhalese as he was of opinion that all business should be conducted in English in accordance with by-law 27 (1). The Mayor, however, had ruled that in terms of section 15 (2) (b) of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 it was in order for a Member to speak however, had ruled that in terms of section 15 (2) (b) of Ordinance No. 60 of 1935 it was in order for a Member to speak in Sinhalese. If that ruling was correct and there was provision in the new Ordinance, then it seemed to him that the present motion was neither relevant nor necessary. He also thought that if it was necessary to pass that motion, the proceedings of all meetings at which speeches were made in Sinhalese, relying upon the Mayor's ruling, would be null and void. The Mayor explained that in giving his ruling on that occasion he had interpreted the intention of the Legislature. He thought that the member's fears were unfounded. Mr. P. Dahanayake said he was in agreement with Mr. Wijeratne, and that he was unable to support the motion in its present form. Mr. A. M. Saheed moved as an amendment that by-law 27 (1) be allowed to stand but that by-law 27 (2) be amended by the insertion of the words "in English or Sinhalese or Tamil" after the word "Chairman". Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Mr. A. William Wijeratne supported the original motion. The mover replied. The amendment which was agreed to by the mover and the seconder, was then put to the Meeting and carried, Messrs. E. de S. Wijeratne and T. W. Roberts declining to vote.

9. On the suggestion of the Mayor the following extract from the minutes of the Finance Committee of Septembers.

H. E. The Mayor moved that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, A. M. Saheed, D. S. Goonesekera, E. D. Nagahawatte, J. E. Perera, T. W. Roberts, and E. de S. Wijeratne opposed the recommendation of the Finance Committee. Messrs. P. Dahanayake, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, A. H. E. Fernando, A. William Wijeratne, and the Mayor supported it. The Mayor's motion was then put to Council in Committee and declared lost, six voting for and eight against. Mr. P. Dahanayake called for a division which resulted as follows:—
For: The Mayor, and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, A. H. E. Fernando, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, P. Dahanayake, and A. William Wijeratne. Against: Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail, A. M. Saheed, D. S. Goonesekera, E. D. Nagahawatte, J. E. Perera, T. W. Roberts, and E. de S. Wijeratne. It was then resolved by eight votes to six that he recommendation be not adopted. be not adopted.

Council then resumed, and the Mayor moved that the above resolution of the Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded,---Carried.

10. Pursuant to notice Mr. T. W. Roberts moved: -That this Council appeals to His Excellency the Governor to sanction the payment of a sum of Rs. 180 to the widow of the late W. H. Wijetunge, Overseer, Health Department,

Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried. who died 3 days after his retirement from service.

Considered the following extract from the minutes of an emergency meeting of the Finance Committee held on August 25, 1939: - "Considered the purchase of an electric siren in connection with Air Raid Precautions:-Recommended that an electric siren and wailer be purchased from Messrs. Brown & Co., Ltd., at a cost of Rs. 871 and that a supplemental vote of Rs. 1,000 be sanctioned for the purpose in order to allow for the cost of installing same at the Power Station.

Mr. A. M. Saheed moved that the above recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted. Mr. E. D.

Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried.

Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne said that such expenditure should not be incurred in future without the consent of the Council.

12. Considered the following extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Tender Board held on September 1, 1929:—"Considered quotations received for the supply of House Conservancy buckets.—Recommended that the quotation of M. A. Abdulla be accepted for buckets of 24 in. gauge galvanized sheets at Re. 1:10 per bucket; each bucket to conform with the sample forwarded by him. Recommended, further, in view of the present international situation,

that an order be placed for 1,000 buckets to be supplied within one month of the date of order."

The Mayor explained that since the recommendation of the Tender Board all the persons who had submitted quotations for the supply of conservancy buckets, including M. A. Abdulla, had intimated to him that, owing to the present unsettled state of the market, they were unable to supply the buckets at the rates quoted by them. He had, therefore, on his own responsibility, placed an order for 400 buckets with A. R. A. Hassen who was prepared to supply them at the rate of Re. 1.35 per bucket.

It was accordingly resolved to approve the action taken by the Mayor.

At this stage Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne moved the adjournment of the Meeting till September 18 at 3.30 p.m.

In asking the permission of Council to withdraw this motion Mr. P. Dahanayake said that at the time he gave notice of it he had evidence of bribery and corruption, but there was no such evidence now and it was not possible for anyone in the employ of the Council to give or take bribes under present conditions. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail opposed the withdrawal of the motion and asked for a ruling from the Chair as to whether it was in order for a member to make such remarks and then ask permission to withdraw the motion. Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne opposed the withdrawal of the motion and objected to the remarks made by the member. Mr. T. W. Roberts, also opposing the withdrawal of the motion, and objected to the remarks made by the member. said that the remarks made by the mover implied that bribery and corruption had existed before, but did not exist now.

Nobody, he said, would believe that. The Mayor ruled that in withdrawing a motion a member was entitled to state his reasons for withdrawing it. The question as to whether the Member should be given permission to withdraw the motion was then put to the meeting and carried by seven votes to six. The motion was accordingly withdrawn.

(3) This Council is of opinion that immediate steps be taken to equip and maintain a motor ambulance for the conveyance of the sick and injured to hospitals and similar institutions within Municipal limits. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahabseconded. With the permission of Council the mover amended the motion to read as follows:—"This Council appeals to the Honourable the Minister for Health to equip and maintain a motor accoulance for the conveyance of the sick and injured to hospitals and similar institutions within the Municipal limits." The motion, as amended, was then put to the Meeting and carried Meeting and carried.

Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded. Resolved to refer the matter to the Works Committee for consideration and report.

16. Pursuant to notice that Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne moved:—(1) That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed to investigate and report to this Council on ways and means of increasing its revenue. The Mayor seconded.—(1) Carried. (2) Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of the Mayor, and Mossrs. E. de S. Wijeratne, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, A. William Wijeratne, E. D. Narahawatte, T. W. Roberts, F. Magdon Ismail, and P. Dahanayake.

(2) That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed for the purpose of inquiring and reporting to this Council on ways and means of improving the rural and suburban areas of this town. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded. (1) Carried. (2) Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of the Mayor, and Messrs. E. de S. Wijeratne, E. D. Nagahawatte, P. Dahanayake, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, A. William Wijeratne, and A. H. E. Fernando.

17. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. S. G conesekera moved:—That in the case of appointments made by this Council, applications for any post should not in the future be left to the consideration of a Special Committee but should be considered by the whole Council either at a usual meeting or at a Special Meeting convened for the purpose. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded. Messrs. E. de S. Wijeratne, A. I. H. A. Wahab, and W. T. Wijekulasuriya opposed the motion on the ground that it was quite unnecessary as all such appointments were eventually made by the whole Council. The Mayor stated that if the motion was passed in its present form he would in future rule out any attempt to refer applications for any post to a Special Commi

- applications for any post to a Special Committee. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the Meeting and declared lost, three voting for and eight against.

With regard to item (17) Mr. D. S. Goonesekera moved as an amendment that copies of the Budget in English and Sinhalese be sold to the public at 50 cents and 25 cents per copy respectively. The Mayor seconded.—Carried.

With regard to item (19) Mr. T. W. Roberts moved as an amendment that the hours of lighting be reduced by half an hour in the evenings only. Mr. F. Magdon Ismail seconded.—Carried.

With regard to item (20) Mr. E. de S. Wijeratne moved as an amendment the substitution of "Rs. 3" for "Rs. 2" and the deletion of the words "that the applicant be called upon to pay Re. 1 per plan to the Council." The Mayor seconded. After discussion of the matter in Committee the amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost, four voting for and ten against. Mr. A. M. Saheed then moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted with the addition of the words "for one year from October 1, 1939", after the word "appointed." Mr. E. D. (3) This Council is of opinion that as the sanitation in the neighbourhood of the Green Market is very unsatisfactory—(a) adequate steps be taken to improve the sanitary conditions of this area; (b) the Cross road from the Bazaar Mosque to the Green Market be widened, tarred, and kept clean. The Mayor seconded. Resolved to refer the matter to the Works Committee for consideration.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Galle Municipal Council held at the Municipal Office on October 4, 1939, at 3.30 p.m., to discuss the question of Food Control and to request the Central Government to hand over the fixing of Prices for Rice and other Foodstuffs within Municipal Limits to this Council.

Present.—Mr. W. Dahanayake, the Mayor, presiding; and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor; E. de S. Wijeratne; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed; and T W. Roberts.

The Mayor in opening the proceedings, said that he had sent a notice of that meeting to the Deputy Food Controller Galle, with a request that he or a representative should be present. The Deputy Food Controller, however, had declined to comply with the request and had stated that, as far as he was aware, the Central Government had no intention of handing over the control of food prices to local bodies.

The Mayor also read out a letter received from the Government Agent, Southern Province, regarding the appointment of a liaison Committee for the Galle Municipal area.

Continuing, the Mayor said that he had given instructions that certain portions of the Victoria Park should be utilized for the growing of sweet potatoes and manioc. He had also requested the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer to report what other open spaces belonging to the Council could be utilized for the growing of foodstuffs.

The Mayor then read out the notice convening the Meeting and moved the Council into Committee to consider the

After a full discussion in Committee Council resumed, and Mr. E. de S. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded. Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, D. S. Goonesekera, and T. W. Roberts opposed the motion. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by six votes to four. Mr. A. M. Saheed called for a division which resulted as follows:—For: The Mayor, and Messrs. E. de S. Wijeratne, A. William Wijeratne, W. T. Wijekulasuriya, E. D. Nagahawatte, P. Dahanayake. Against: Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, D. S. Goonesekera, T. W. Roberts, and A. M. Saheed.
