General Clerical Service Examination, March, 1940.

Date of Examination—

1. A competitive examination for candidates wishing to enter the General Clerical Service will be held in Colombo, Kandy, Galle, and Jaffna, on March 16, 1940.

Salary and conditions of service—

- The salary and conditions of service on which successful candidates will be appointed will be those fixed for the lowest grade of the General Clerical Service after a decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Retrenchment Commission on the structure, salary, and conditions of service of the General Clerical Service. If any candidates take up duties before a decision has been reached they will receive a provisional salary of Rs. 480 per annum with annual increments of Rs. 30 and their other conditions of service will be those applicable to officers recruited to Class III. of the General Clerical Service after June 1, 1934. Candidates must clearly understand however that the salary scale and conditions of service which will be finally applicable to them will be those fixed by Government when a final decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Retrenchment Commission and that they will have no claims to special consideration on the ground that they have been appointed before a final decision has been reached on their terms of service.
- The number of appointments to be made will be notified later. The names of successful candidates will be published in the Ceylon Government Gazette, and they will be given appointments as suitable vacancies occur.

Applications-

- Applications for admission to the examination must be addressed to the Director of Education on forms which may be obtained from his office up to January 12,
- 5. Applications must reach the Director of Education not later than 2 P.M. on January 19, 1940. Any applications received after that hour will be rejected.
- The Director of Education will return those applications which are approved to the candidates concerned. Such applications will constitute the candidates' tickets of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Education. A candidate not producing such form will be refused admittance to the examination.

- 7. Candidates must be of Ceylonese or mixed Ceylonese and British descent and their permanent homes must be in Ceylon.
- 8. Candidates must furnish proof when forwarding their applications that they have previously passed at
 - (a) The Cambridge Senior or the London Matriculation or the Senior School Certificate (English) Examination; or
 - Final Examination for the Commercial Certificate of the Ceylon Technical College; or
 - (c) The Cambridge Junior or the Junior School Certificate (English) Examination and either (i) the Higher Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce, or (ii.) the Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce.

Their applications must also bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10.

- (i.) A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be not less than 17 nor more than 22 years of age on August 1, 1940, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person, to the satisfaction of the Director of Education, must be attached to the form of application.
- (ii.) Certificates of birth issued for the purpose of the Code for Assisted Schools will not be accepted for this examination.

- (iii.) Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted as substitutes for birth certificates.
- (iv.) In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past births, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which a candidate is known, (a) the parent or guardian, in the case of a candidate under the age of 21 years, should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 21 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1895, and (b) in the case of a candidate over the age. of 21 years, he should produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Director of Education that the certificate of birth forwarded applies to him.
- (v.) If the candidate has been educated at a Government or Assisted School, a certificate must be from the Principal of the last Government or Assisted School which he has attended; otherwise it may be from the candidate's teacher or schoolmaster by preference, or a member of the Public Service, a Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Advocate, Proctor, or Notary, or, generally speaking, some person whose name is known and to whom reference can be readily made.
- 10. Clerks who are paid directly from "Personal Emoluments" Votes in the Government Estimates (other than members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, Harbour Engineer's, or Railway Departments, Draughtsmen and Stenographers), if within the age prescribed in these regulations will be admitted without fee provided that they have passed the examination or examinations prescribed by Regulation 8 above and that their services since employment under Government have been throughout satisfactory.

Withdrawals and Refunds—

- 11. (a) If a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission to the examination a refund will be made of 3/5 the value of stamps affixed to his application.
- (b) If a candidate, who has been admitted to the examination, gives notice of his withdrawal to the Director of Education at least 7 days before the date of the examination, a refund will be made of \(\frac{1}{2} \) the value of stamps affixed to his application provided his form of admission to the examination is returned with his notice of withdrawal.
- (c) A candidate who has been admitted to the examination and wishes to withdraw on account of illness, should forward notice of his withdrawal to reach the Director of Education at least one day before the examination. A refund of the full value of stamps affixed to his application will then be made, provided his notice of withdrawal is accompanied by a certificate from a qualified medical officer to the effect that he is unfit to sit for the examination.
 - (d) In no other case will a refund be granted.

Leave to Government Officers to attend Examination-

12. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications have been returned to them approved by the Director of Education, leave to present themselves at the examination

Subjects-

- .13. The subjects for examination are as follows:—
- (1) English Language and Composition-
 - A one and half hour paper which will include an essay, a precis and questions to test the correct use of the English Language ...

(2) General Paper-

- A two hour paper in three sections as follows:
 - (a) 20 minutes. A test of accuracy with figures
 - including Tots and additions of various kinds
 (b) 50 minutes. A test of general intelligence.
 (c) 50 minutes. A test of general and local knowledge

(3) *One of the following :-Marks. Sinhalese Tamil

One hour paper 100 Arabic English (Special Paper)

- (4) Viva Voce Test 100
- * In and after 1943 Arabic or English (Special Paper) may be taken only by those candidates whose nationality is neither Sinhalese nor Tamil.
- The examination is held in two parts. written examination is first held and on the results of it candidates are selected competitively to attend the Viva Voce. The number to be called for the Viva Voce examination will be fixed by the Deputy Chief Secretary in consultation with the Director of Education. In all written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling. Candidates whose writing is illegible are liable to be disqualified. The Viva Voce examination will be held in Colombo.

Medical Examination—

The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

The Rules of Criminal Procedure for Village Tribunals and Village Committees published in Gazette No. 7,568 of February 18, 1927, as last amended by rule published in Gazette No. 8,413 of November 18, 1938, are hereby further amended as follows:

- (1) in the heading immediately before rule 40, by the substitution, for the words "REGISTER AND FINE BOOK", of the word "REGISTERS";
- (2) in rule 40, by the substitution, for the words "fine book", of the words "register of fines";
- (3) by the substitution, for rule 41, of the following new rule—
 - "41. The register of fines for each month, together with a duplicate copy thereof shall be forwarded by the President or Chairman to the Government Agent before the tenth day of the succeeding month";
- (4) by the addition, immediately after rule 41, of the following new rule 41A:-
 - "41a. The Government Agent may issue such directions as he may deem fit to the President or Chairman in regard to the remission to him of fines recovered by the President or Chairman. In the absence of any directions to the contrary from the Government Agent, all fines recovered at any place at which the sittings of a Village Tribunal or Committee are held shall be remitted by the President or Chairman as the case may be, to the Government Agent at the end of the sittings at that place or, where the sittings continue for more than one week, at the end of each week"; and

RULES.

1. The rules for the investment of surplus funds on loans under the House Purchasing Scheme, published in Gazette No. 8,438 of March 10, 1939, are hereby cancelled.

2. The rules dated June 14, 1892, and published in Gazette No. 5,147 of June 17, 1892, and last amended by

rule published in Gazette No. 8,426 of January 13, 1939, are hereby further amended by the addition, at the end thereof, of the following new chapter:—

"Chapter V .- Rules for the Investment of Surplus Funds on Loans under the House Purchasing Scheme.

(1) It shall be competent for the Committee of Management in their discretion, subject to the conditions prescribed in this Chapter, to give, to any member who does not own a suitable residential house within any of the limits mentioned in Rules 1 (1) A and B of Chapter II., a loan for the purpose of assisting such member in the purchase of a residential house within any such limits: Provided that no such loan shall be given to any member whose wife owns a suitable residential house within any such limits: Provided further that the amount of any loan granted under this Chapter to any member shall be limited to Rs. 9,000 or to a sum on which the total monthly payments due under Rule 9 do not exceed either onefourth of the member's salary or (in the case of officers who are 40 years or over at the time of the grant) one-fourth of the hypothetical pension payable to such member on retirement at the age of 55.

- (2) The amounts which the Committee of Management may issue on loans under this chapter for the purchase of residential houses shall be deemed to be invested on securities of landed property, and the provisions of Rule 1 (ii.) of Chapter II. shall apply thereto accordingly.
- 2. Any member wishing to obtain a loan under the provisions of this Chapter shall make application therefore to the Secretary of the Association on such form as may be provided for the purpose by the Secretary, and shall specify on such form the amount of loan required, the nature and details of property to be purchased, and such other particulars as the Committee of Management may require.
- 3. Every application made under rule 2 shall be submitted by the Secretary to the Committee of Management and if the Committee is satisfied that the applicant will be able, subject to the second proviso to Rule 1 and to any conditions imposed under Rule 4 (2) adequately to meet the liabilities contingent on the loan applied for being granted, the name of the applicant shall be placed on a waiting list.
- 4. (1) When funds are available, the applications placed on the waiting list shall be considered in the strict order of priority.
- (2) As a condition precedent to the grant of a loan under this Chapter the Committee of Management may require any applicant for such loan—
 - (a) to make such arrangements as they deem adequate for the settlement of any other debts whatever due to the Association by the applicant, and in default of such settlement may restrict the amount of the loan to be granted to such sum as they deem fit; and
 - (b) to give such undertaking as they deem necessary to limit the amount of any other loan which the applicant may in future be granted under rule 12 or rule 13 of Chapter I. or under Chapter II.
- 5. No loan shall be granted to any applicant under this chapter until the applicant has—
 - (a) taken out with such Life Assurance Company as the Committee of Management may determine an Insurance Policy for the amount of the loan; and
 - (b) taken out with such Fire Insurance Company as the Committee of Management may determine a Fire Policy for a sum not less than the amount of the loan; and
 - (c) assigned both the policies taken out under clauses (a) and (b) above to the Association by way of further security for the money to be lent.
- 6. An applicant whose turn on the waiting list has arrived shall on being required to do so by the Secretary, send the title deeds relating to the property to be purchased, fogether with certified extracts of encumbrances relating to such property, to the Secretary, with the fee payable to the Association's lawyers for an examination of the deeds and of title. If the title is accepted as satisfactory by the Committee of Management, the applicant shall undergo any medical examination required by the Insurance Company.
- 7. If the title is reported to be satisfactory, the property shall, on deposit by the applicant of appraisement fees and travelling expenses of the appraisers in accordance with Rule 8 of Chapter II., be appraised by the appraiser appointed by the Committee of Management, one of whom shall be a member of the Committee and the other a professional appraiser and their valuation shall be affirmed or sworn to.
- 3. The report of the appraisers shall be considered by the Committee of Management who shall determine, subject to the provision of Rule 4 (2) the amount of the loan to be granted. The amount of a loan granted under this Chapter shall in no case exceed nine-tenths of the appraised value or the purchase price of the property whichever is the lower.
- 9. (a) The applicant shall before the amount of the loan is paid authorize the deduction, from his monthly salary or pension on the official pay or pension abstract beginning from the month following that in which the loan is granted, of all sums due on account of life and fire insurance policies, interest and repayment of capital.
- (b) Payments on account of life and fire insurance shall be made annually in advance by the Association and the amount paid plus three per cent. shall be recovered from the respective policy holders in twelve equal monthly instalments.

- (c) Payments on account of the capital due from the recipient of a loan under this chapter, with interest at six per cent. on the amount granted, shall be equated and recovered in equal monthly instalments until the maturity of the life insurance policy when any balance that may be then due on the capital and interest due on the mortgage bond referred to in rule II. shall be paid and satisfied out of the money recoverable under the said life insurance policy. The capital and interest due on the said mortgage bond shall, in the event of the death of the applicant before the maturity of the life insurance policy be forthwith paid and satisfied out of the money recoverable under the said life insurance policy.
- 10. Loans shall be repayable at the option of the applicant over a term of fifteen or twenty years: Provided that—
 - (u) the Committee of Management may determine that any applicant shall be offered only a loan repayable over a term of fifteen or twenty years as the case may be;
 - (b) any applicant who is of the age of forty years or over at the time when a loan is granted shall be required to repay it over a term of fifteen years;
 - (c) no loan shall be granted to any pensioner or any applicant of the age of forty-five or over.
- 11. As soon as the Committee of Management have approved the grant of a loan under this chapter and the applicant has obtained at his own expense through the Association's lawyers a deed of transfer of the property in his favour, he shall, also at his expense mortgage such property to the Association and execute the necessary mortgage bond in favour of the Association. The mortgage shall be a primary mortgage. A remittance for the total sum granted by way of loan shall not be forwarded to the applicant until—
 - (a) the deed of transfer and the mortgage bond have been duly executed; and
 - (b) the insurance policies referred to in rule 5 have been duly assigned.
- 12. Once in every period of two years all loans granted under this Chapter shall be reconsidered by the Committee of Management with reference to the then state and value of the properties mortgaged; and if it be thought necessary the Committee shall depute one or more of its members to inspect and report upon the state and value of properties mortgaged. The expense, if any, of such inspection shall form part of the working expenses and be paid from the funds of the Association.

THE EXCISE ORDINANCE.

Excise Notification No. 349.

IT is hereby notified that the following rules regulating the manufacture of vinegar from toddy, made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 31 (2) (e) of the Excise Ordinance (Chapter 42) have been confirmed by resolution of the State Council on 28th November, 1939, and shall have the force of law from the 31st day of December, 1939.

- 1. Vinegar shall not be manufactured by any person other than the holder of a licence (hereinafter referred to as the "licensee") in Form A set out in the schedule hereto, granted by the Government Agent of the Province or the Assistant Government Agent of the District in which the manufacture of vinegar is to be carried on.
- The licensee shall carry on the manufacture of vinegar at a site and in a building (hereinafter referred to as the "manufactory") approved by the Government Agent or the Assistant Government Agent, and shall set apart a portion of that building for the storage of completely manufactured vinegar.
 - The licensee shall
 - (a) have at least two receptacles in the manufactory for keeping toddy;

keep each day's supply of toddy in a separate receptacle;

- (c) keep each day's supply of toddy separate from any acetifying toddy for at least 48 hours from the time such toddy was received at the manufactory; and
- (d) cause such receptacles to be conspicuously marked with the word "Toddy" and with the equivalent of that word in Sinhalese.
- The licensee shall take steps to ensure that-

 - (a) only wooden casks or vats, or earthenware or glass vessels are used as receptacles in the manufactory; (b) no wooden cask or vat the capacity of which is less than 50 gallons and no earthenware or glass vessel the capacity of which is less than 4 gallons is used in the manufactory as a receptacle for any purpose other than the keeping of toddy under rule 3;
 - (c) no receptacle which is fitted with a tap of any material containing copper or lead is used in the manufactory;
 - (d) every receptacle which is used in the manufactory is provided with (i.) an orifice for the insertion of the dip-red perpendicularly to reach the deepest point in the receptacle, and (ii.) a bung, easily removable by hand, made of a hard wood, and of a conical shape to fit the orifice, for closing the orifice
 - (e) the aggregate storage capacity of the receptacles in the manufactory is sufficient to hold a quantity equivalent to at least 4 months' supply of toddy calculated at the rate of 12 drams a day for each tree mentioned in the tapping licence granted for the supply of toddy to the manufactory.
 - (f) the Excise Commissioner may at his sole discretion waive the observance of this rule, wholly or partly in the special circumstances of any manufactory.
- 5. (1) No licensee shall keep any toddy drawn for supply to the manufactory, in the topes or collecting stations after 12 noon on any day.
- (2) The licensee shall remove all toddy referred to in paragraph (1) to the manufactory by such hour as may be prescribed by the Superintendent of Excise on the toddy transport pass or passes.
- 6. No licensee shall destroy or permit the destruction of any toddy or vinegar except in the presence of an Excise Officer.
 - The licensee shall keep the manufactory open to inspection at any time between the hours of 7 A.M. and 7 P.M.
- No licensee shall remove or cause to be removed any vinegar from the manufactory except on a written permit from the Superintendent of Excise of the area in which the manufactory is located. The licensee shall have such permits consecutively numbered and filed of record in the manufactory.
- 9. The licensee shall enter accounts daily, in accordance with condition No. 18 of the General Conditions applicable to all Excise Licences, in respect of all receipts of toddy and other transactions. Such accounts shall be entered *immediately* after such receipt or transaction, in Forms B and C set out in the Schedule hereto. Books, either stitched or bound, of Form B drawn by hand or printed shall be kept. Form C shall be purchased in bound registers from the local Kachcheri.
- 10. When the manufactory is closed, the licensee shall himself keep, or nominate an authorized employee to keep, the keys of the manufactory at a place within 100 yards of the manufactory and shall take steps to ensure that the keys are available at any time of the night or day to any officer authorized to inspect the manufactory under condition No. 21 of the General Conditions applicable to all Excise Licences.
- 11. No toddy from any tree, other than a tree mentioned in the tapping licence granted for the supply of toddy to the manufactory, shall be brought to or used in the manufactory.
 - 12. The licensee shall keep a copy of these rules exposed to view in a conspicuous place in the manufactory.
- 13. The rules contained in Excise Notification No. 166 published in Gazette No. 7,595 of July 22, 1927, are hereby rescinded.

11. Duration of tapping licences for vinegar manufactories.—Every tapping licence granted for the supply of toddy to any vinegar manufactory shall be in force during the period commencing on the first day of May in the year in which it is granted or such later date as may be specified in the licence and ending on the thirty-first day of December next following.

12. Period during which trees not to be tapped for vinegar manufactories.—During the period commencing on the first day of January and ending on the thirtieth day of April in any year, no person shall tap any tree mentioned in any tapping licence granted for the supply of toddy to any vinegar manufactory.

- (1) by the substitution for rule 1 of the following new rule:—-
 - "1. (i.) All employees of the Rubber Research Board (not being pensionable officers of the Government seconded for service with the Rubber Research Scheme), drawing a salary of forty rupees per merisem or over shall as a condition of their employment by the Board become members of the Fund as from the date of their joining the service of the Board.
 - (ii.) Monthly paid employees drawing a salary of less than forty rupees per mensem may become members of the Fund after the completion of a period of six months in the service of the Board ": and
- (2) by the substitution for the words "the Board of Management" wherever they occur, of the words "the Board".

RECULATIONS.

Section 4.

- 1. For the purpose of convening a Tribunal of Appeal for the hearing of any appeal, the Commissioner shall, by notice, summon any three of the persons on the panel constituted under section 4 (1) of the Ordinance to a sitting of the Tribunal.
- 2. The names of the persons to constitute any Tribunal of Appeal and the place at which appeals shall be heard shall be chosen in accordance with such special or general directions as the Minister for Local Administration may issue for the purpose.

3. (1) Every notice under regulation 1 shall be despatched not less than three days before the date fixed

for the sitting of the Tribunal of Appeal.

(2) Where any person summoned under regulation 1 to a sitting of a Tribunal is unable to attend that sitting he shall forthwith inform the Commissioner to that effect, and in any such case, any other person on the panel may be summoned to that sitting at any time before the time fixed for the sitting.

The persons summoned to any sitting of a Tribunal of Appeal shall elect one of their number to be the Chairman

of the Tribunal for that sitting.

- (1) Every appeal under section 50 of the Ordinance gainst any decision of the Commissioner shall be signed by the appellant and shall-
 - (a) Be made by a written petition in the English, Sinhalese or Tamil language;

(b) Contain a concise statement of the grounds upon which the appeal is preferred;

- (c) Bear uncancelled revenue stamps to the value of Rs. 5, provided, however, that no fee shall be payable in the case of any appeal preferred by any public servant or any officer of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces in the discharge of his duties.
- (2) Two additional copies of the statement of the grounds upon which the appeal is preferred shall be sent by the appellant with each petition of appeal.

(3) Every petition of appeal referred to in paragraph (1) shall be substantially in the following form:—

(1) Every petition of appeal referred to in regulation 5 (1) shall be sent to the Commissioner by registered post, or delivered at the Office of the Commissioner.

(2) In any case, where a petition of appeal is personally delivered at the Office of the Commissioner, the Commissioner or an officer authorized by him shall issue a written

acknowledgment of the receipt thereof.

(3) No petition of appeal which is received by the Commissioner after the expiry of the period of ten days specified in section 50 of the Ordinance, or which is not duly stamped shall be considered by the Tribunal of Appeal: provided, however, that the Tribunal may in its discretion, on application made by the appellant in that behalf, entertain such petition of appeal, if the Tribunal is satisfied that the delay in sending the petition of appeal was due to any accident, misfortune or other unavoidable cause.

- The Commissioner or an officer authorized by him shall keep and maintain a register of appeals and shall on the receipt of a petition of appeal assign a number to that petition and cause that number and the date on which the petition is received to be entered on the register together with such other particulars as the Commissioner may deem necessary or as a majority of the persons forming the panel may direct at any annual meeting referred to in regulation 17.
- 8. (1) The Commissioner shall, as soon as may be after the receipt of a petition of appeal, inform the appellant by written notice sent by registered post of the date on which and the time and place at which the appeal will be heard by a Tribunal, and where the appeal is preferred against a decision to issue a licence, shall in addition despatch a like notice to the applicant for that licence.

(2) Every notice under paragraph (1) shall be posted not less than six days before the date specified therein as the date on which the appeal will be heard by a Tribunal of

Appeal.

Where an appellant fails to appear on any date fixed for the hearing of his appeal, the Tribunal may consider the appeal and make such order thereon as to it may seem

The appellant and the Commissioner and, in the 10. case of an appeal against a decision to issue a licence, the applicant for the licence shall be entitled to be present and to be heard at the hearing of the appeal either in person or by representative authorized in writing for the purpose. Where the Commissioner or any applicant for a licence or any such representative is heard in support of any decision, the appellant or his representative shall have the right of reply.

A Tribunal of Appeal may during the hearing of any appeal call for such evidence, oral or documentary, as it may consider necessary for the decision of any matter or

matters at issue in the appeal.

12. In case of any difference of opinion among the members of a Tribunal of Appeal, the decision of the majority of them shall be deemed to be the decision of the Tribunal.

- 13. The decision of a Tribunal of Appeal, whether it be given at the close of the hearing or on some day thereafter, shall be reduced to writing, dated as of the date on which it is given, and a copy thereof shall be forthwith transmitted or delivered by the Commissioner to each of the parties.
- 14. (1) Where a Tribunal of Appeal is satisfied that any appeal preferred against the decision of the Commissioner is frivolous or is conducted in a frivolous or vexatious manner, it may order the appellant to pay a sum not exceeding Rs. 50 as costs.

(2) The sum ordered by a Tribunal to be paid by any appellant as costs in any appeal shall be paid by such appellant within fourteen days from the making of the

order by the Tribunal.

15. The remuneration payable to each member of a Tribunal of Appeal shall be Rs. 50 for a working day exceeding two hours and Rs. 25 for a working day not exceeding two hours.

16. The fee payable on an application to the Tribunal to state a case on a question of law for the opinion of the

Supreme Court shall be Rs. 10.50.

17. The persons appointed to form a panel from which Tribunals of Appeal shall be constituted may be summoned once in every year by the Commissioner, on the direction of the Minister for Local Administration, to attend a meeting to discuss and advise on all matters relating to the

conduct of appeals.

18. The regulations relating to the Tribunal of Appeal, published in the Supplement to Gazette No. 8,466 of July 21,

1939, are hereby rescinded.

Section 6.

The Commissioner of Motor Transport may authorize by written permit the use on any highway in Colombo of any motor car the overhang of which exceeds the limits specified in regulation 1 (b) in the First Schedule to the Motor Car Ordinance, No. 45 of 1938, if such motor car had been registered and licensed before October 3, 1938.

Section 42 (3).

The Commissioner may issue a permit authorizing the use of any motor car for any of the following purposes:

- (a) the advertisement of or the provision of information
- relating to any agricultural produce of Ceylon;
 (b) the provision, by or on behalf of the Government, of medical services or of information relating to public health and sanitation.

Section 53 (2) (b).

Every appeal to the Commissioner under section 53 (2) (b) against the finding of an examiner shall be made within a period of twelve days (exclusive of Sundays and public holidays) from the date on which the finding is communicated to the applicant for the licence.

Section 55B.

The Commissioner may in his discretion, in the case of any lorry of any description set out hereunder, issue a licence authorizing the use of the lorry in any part of Ceylon without restriction as to the area in which the lorry may be used:—

- (1) a lorry used in the service of any of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces;
- (2) a lorry used for the transport of articles of food or fuel in times of emergency;
- (3) a motor hearse;
- (4) a motor ambulance having a tare not exceeding one and a half tons;
- (5) a lorry having a tare not exceeding one and a half tons, which is used for the advertisement of, or the provision of information relating to, any goods, articles or produce;
- (6) a lorry having a tare not exceeding one and a half tons, which is used for the provision, by or on behalf of the Government, of medical services or of information relating to public health and sanitation;
- (7) a lorry having a tare not exceeding one and a half tons, which is used for the purposes of towage or repair in the case of a breakdown of a motor car.

Section 81B.

Every motor car which is of any description set out hereunder and which belongs to or is exclusively employed in the service of His Majesty or of any local authority shall be exempted from the provisions of section 79 of the Ordinance:—

- (a) any fire-fighting or fire brigade vehicle;
- (b) any motor ambulance
- (c) any motor car used for the purposes of the police force.

Section 109.

- (1) The conductor of an omnibus shall, on the completion of a journey, search the omnibus for any article accidentally left therein by any passenger, and shall without undue delay take such article, if not claimed by the owner, to the nearest police station.
- (2) Where any article referred to in paragraph (1) is claimed by the owner within one month after the date on which it was brought to the police station, such article shall be delivered to the owner on such owner paying to the Commissioner or an officer appointed by the Commissioner, a sum (by way of reward to the finder of such article) equal to one-tenth of the value of such article: Provided that the reward shall not be less than fifty cents or more than fifty rupees. In the event of any dispute as to the value of such article, the decision of the Commissioner shall be final.
- (3) Where any article referred to in paragraph (1) is not claimed and removed by the owner within the period of one month referred to in paragraph (2), such article shall be sold by public auction in accordance with the directions of the Commissioner and the net proceeds, after deducting all expenses and the reward to the finder, shall be paid into general revenue.
- (4) The reward shall be paid to the finder of the article. In the event of any dispute as to the disposal of the reward, the decision of the Commissioner shall be final.

Section 118.

- 1. (1) The Commissioner or a police officer of a rank not below that of Assistant Superintendent may, by special permit authorize an omnibus to use a route other than an approved route for the carriage of a party of tourists or of a private party of passengers, if he is satisfied that the omnibus has been hired by or on behalf of the party and that no person other than a member of the party will be carried in the omnibus for fee or reward.
- (2) No officer shall issue any special permit under paragraph (1) for any omnibus unless he is satisfied that the services ordinarily provided by the owner of that omnibus will be not be unreasonably curtailed by reason of the issue of the permit.
- ominous will be introduced by reason of the issue of the permit.

 (3) There shall be specified on every special permit issued under paragraph (1) directions as to the route to be used by the omnibus, the places to and from which the omnibus may travel, and the date on which and the period during which the permit will be valid.

- 2. The Commissioner or any licensing authority may, by written permit, authorize a lorry to be used outside its area of operation for a stated period not exceeding one week in any case if he is satisfied that the lorry will be used—
 - (a) for the carriage of goods otherwise than for fee or reward, or
 - (b) in the service of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces, or
 - (c) for the carriage of goods to or from any place where adequate transport facilities are not available.
- 3. (1) The Commissioner or any licensing authority may by written permit authorize an omnibus or a lorry to be driven for the purposes of effecting repairs or alterations during such period and to or from such places as may be specified in the permit.
- (2) No passengers or goods shall be carried on any omnibus or lorry which is used under a permit issued under paragraph (1) unless such carriage is necessary for the purpose of effecting such repairs or alterations.

Section 123.

The Commissioner or a police officer of a rank not below that of Assistant Superintendent may in his discretion issue a special permit authorizing the carriage in a lorry of four or more persons on any specified occasion, if he is satisfied that the lorry will be used on that occasion—

satisfied that the lorry will be used on that occasion—
(a) for the carriage of livestock, heavy machinery, or

articles of special value;

- (b) for the carriage of labourers from one estate to another where no other adequate transport facilities are available; or
- (c) for the carriage of any sick person to a hospital.

Section 125.

- 1. (1) The Commissioner may at any time require that any omnibus licensed for a regular service shall be run on all or any one or more of the routes approved for that omnibus, in accordance with a time table approved by the Commissioner.
- (2) Every time table approved by the Commissioner under paragraph (1) in respect of any route shall specify the times at which the omnibus shall depart from and arrive at the termini of the route and the intermediate stopping places thereon.
- (3) Where a time table has been approved by the Commissioner for any omnibus, the licensing authority who issues or, as the case may be, has issued the licence for that omnibus shall deliver to the owner of that omnibus the time table so approved
- table so approved.

 2. (1) The owner of any omnibus to whom a time table has been delivered under regulation 1 shall cause the time table or a copy thereof to be posted in a conspicuous position inside the omnibus.
- (2) The conductor of an omnibus shall not remove or cause or permit any other person to remove the time table or copy thereof which is posted inside an omnibus under paragraph (1).

paragraph (1).
3. It shall be the duty of the driver of an omnibus, when that omnibus is driven on any route in respect of which a time table has been approved under these regulations, to observe the time table.

- 4. The driver of an omnibus shall not halt or stop the omnibus at any place on any route in respect of which a time table has been approved under these regulations unless such place is a stopping place specified in the time table.
- 5. Where a time table has under these regulations been approved for any omnibus in respect of any route, the provisions hereinbefore contained shall apply in the case of any other omnibus which may for the time being be used in substitution for the omnibus in respect of which the time table is approved.
- 6. The driver of an omnibus shall not be deemed to be guilty of an offence by reason of any contravention of any provision of regulation 3 or regulation 4 if it is proved to the satisfaction of the court that such contravention was due to an accident in which that omnibus was involved or to mechanical or other derangement of the omnibus.

Section 125A.

- 1. The provisions of sections 79, 114, 115 and 123 shall not apply in the case of any lorry which is for the time being used in the service of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces in times of emergency.
- Forces in times of emergency.

 2. (1) The Commissioner may, in his discretion, grant exemption from the provisions of sections 114 and 115 in respect of any omnibus or lorry of any description set out hereunder:—
 - (a) any fire-fighting or fire brigade vehcile, motor ambulance or motor hearse;
 - (b) any lorry which belongs to any local authority and which is used for the purposes of any conservancy service;

(c) any omnibus or lorry which, while under repairs, is being used for the purpose of being tested;

(d) any lorry for the time being used on any highway for the carriage of goods or of produce from any part of any estate to any other part of that estate.

(2) No exemption shall, at any time, be granted under paragraph (1) in respect of any period exceeding one year.

(3) Any exemption granted under this regulation may

be revoked by the Commissioner at any time by writing under his hand.

THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE.

THE AIR NAVIGATION (COLONIES, PROTECTORATES AND MANDATED TERRITORIES) ORDER, 1927.

REGULATION made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) Order, 1927, as last amended by the Air Navigation (Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories) (Amendment) Order, 1939.

REGULATION.

The Air Navigation Regulations, 1938, published in the Supplement to Gazette No. 8,358 of March 11, 1938, as last amended by the Regulation published in Gazette No. 8,458 of June 16, 1939, are hereby further amended by the insertion, immediately after regulation 45, of the following new regulation 46:—

46. Every British flying machine registered in Ceylon and used for the carriage of passengers or goods for hire or reward on flights by night between India and Ceylon shall carry as a member of its personnel a navigator holding either a first class, or second class, navigator's licence:

Provided, however, that where the pilot of any such machine is the holder of a first class or second class navigator's licence and performs the duties of a navigator, nothing in the preceding provisions of this regulation shall be deemed to require the carriage of a separate navigator on that machine.

BARBED WIRE AND CEMENT.

THE CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, No. 39 OF 1939.

Order.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Noel Edward Ernst, Deputy Controller of Prices, Kurunegala District, do by this Order:—

(1) fix the price which is for the time being fixed by Order of the Controller of Prices under section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance as the maximum retail price above which any article of the description and grade specified in the schedule hereto shall not be sold within the Municipal limits of the Town of Colombo, increased by the amounts specified in Columns 2 and 3 of the schedule hereto, as the maximum retail price above which any article of that description and grade shall not be sold in the area mentioned in the corresponding entry of Column 1 of the schedule hereto;

(2) direct that for the purposes of this Order any sale of any quantity of the article specified for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;

(3) direct that every person who at any premises within the areas mentioned in Column 1 of the schedule hereto sells by retail any article of the description and grade specified in the schedule hereto shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises the maximum prices fixed by this Order for such article;

(4) direct that no person shall sell any variety of cement or barbed wire specified in the schedule hereto except in the packing in which it is imported;

(5) direct that in the case of barbed wire imported in single coils of 28 lb. weight of any variety specified such coils shall be sold as imported at half the corresponding price for coils of 56 lb. weight of the same variety;

(6) direct that every person who sells any article of the description and grade specified in the schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that article a receipt in which shall be set out—

(i.) the quantity and description of the article sold;

(ii.) the price paid for the quantity sold; and

(iii.) the date of sale.

THE MOTOR CAR ORDINANCE, No. 45 OF 1938.

List of Applications for Licences for Omnibuses and Lorries, 1940.

IN terms of section 46 (1) (b) of the Motor Car Ordinance, No. 45 of 1938, as amended by Ordinance No. 38 of 1939, a notice of applications for licences for omnibuses and lorries for 1940 is published hereunder for general information.

The following extract from the Motor Car Ordinance applies to objections against the issue of licences, &c. :---

"46 (2) (a) Any licensing authority within whose area any part of any route, proposed by any applicant for a licence for an omnibus, or any part of the area of operation proposed by any applicant for a licence for a lorry, is situated, may make objection against the issue of that licence.

46 (2) (b) Any person who is the holder of a valid licence or who is himself an applicant for a licence, for an ornibus in respect of any route, or part of any route, or for a lorry in respect of the whole or any part of the area of operation, which is proposed by any other person in an application for a licence for an omnibus or a lorry, as the case may be, may, on payment of the prescribed fee, make objection against the issue of the licence to such other person.

46 (4) Any person, who is entitled under sub-section (2) to make objection to the issue of any licence, may, on payment of the prescribed fee * inspect the application for that licence at any reasonable time at the Office of the Commissioner: Provided, however, that no fee shall be payable by any licensing authority in respect of the inspection of any application.

Objections must be made to the Commissioner of Motor Transport, Colombo, in the manner prescribed by the following regulations (published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,533 of October 20, 1939), so as to be received by him not later than 3 r.m., ON WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1939. Any objection not conforming to these requirements will not be considered:—

"Regulation 1.—Every objection in respect of an application for a licence for an omnibus or lorry shall be made by a written statement on good and suitable paper which shall be signed by the person making the objection. Where the objection is made by any body corporate or firm it shall be signed by a person duly authorized in that behalf by such body or a partner of that firm, as the case may be.

Regulation 2.—Every objection shall be made in duplicate and the original shall, where the objection is made by any person other than a licensing authority, bear stamps to the value of Rs. 2.50.

Regulation 3.—Every statement of objection shall set out the specific grounds on which the objection is based and shall indicate, by reference to the name of the applicant for the licence and to the

distinctive number of the motor car, the application in respect of which the objection is made. Regulation 4.—No objection relating to more than one motor car shall be made in any one statement of objection".

N.B.—If the application is for an omnibus or lorry "under construction" the serial number given to the application in the list should also be quoted.

THE GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

General Meeting.

Thursday, October 12, 1939, at 2.30 p.m.

The Council met this day at 2.30 P.M., pursuant to notice dated October 6, 1939.

Present:—Mr. W. Dahanayake, the Mayor, presiding; and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor; J. E. Perera; F. Magdon Ismail; R. L. Ephraums; A. H. E. Fernando; E. de S. Wijayaratne; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed and T. W. Roberts.

- 1. At the commencement of the Meeting, in reply to a question by Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte, the Mayor made a statement on the resolution passed at a recent meeting of the Akmeemana Mahajana Sabha with regard to the licensing of vehicles from outside Municipal limits. The majority of cases, he said, had been instituted by the Police and he had no power to ask the Police not to prosecute. Since July 14 the number of cases filed by Municipal Inspectors was only 12 whereas the prosecutions instituted by the Police exceeded 200. Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne said that the law on the subject was very unsatisfactory and should be revised. The Mayor agreed and said that he would place the matter before the Law Committee.
- 2. With regard to item 32 of the Minutes of the General Meeting of September 14, 1939, Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya pointed out that the dissent submitted by Mr. T. W. Roberts in terms of by-law 16 was contrary to what took place at the Meeting. According to the Minutes Mr. Roberts had declined to vote on the whole resolution but there was no indication of this in the dissent. Mr. Wijekulasuriya asked that item 32 be deleted as it was not in order. Mr. Roberts, explaining of this in the dissent. Mr. Wijekulasuriya asked that item 32 be deleted as it was not in other. Mr. Roberts, explaining his dissent, said that owing to his arrival at the meeting towards the end of the Mayor's speech and owing to the noise which was going on at the time, he (Mr. Roberts) did not hear clearly what the Mayor said and, therefore, got a wrong impression that the first part of the resolution was over. He added that he was in complete agreement with the expression of loyalty conveyed by the motion in question. The Mayor ruled that item 32 in the minutes be deleted, but that Mr.

of loyalty conveyed by the motion in question. The Mayor ruled that item 32 in the minutes be deleted, but that Mr. Roberts's explanation offered at this meeting be recorded.

With regard to item 24 of the Minutes of the same Meeting, Mr. R. L. Ephraums reminded the Mayor of his statement at the last Meeting that the Municipal Engineer had consented to a temporary levy on his salary and of his (the Mayor's) undertaking to obtain the Engineer's written consent if necessary. The Mayor, in reply, explained that he was made to understand by the Municipal Engineer that the latter would agree to the levy if his present post was made permanent, which, of course, the Mayor said was not possible as the Engineer was an officer serving the Council on a three year agreement. The Mayor stated that the matter could be further discussed when item 15 on the Agenda was taken up

for consideration.

At the request of Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne item 11 of the Minutes of the same Meeting was amended by the addition of the following words at the end thereof:—"Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne said that such expenditure should not be incurred in future without the consent of the Council."

The Minutes of the General Meeting of September 14, 1939, as amended, and of the Special Meeting of October 4, 1939, were then taken as read and confirmed.

- 3. Pursuant to notice Mr. T. W. Roberts asked the following question which the Mayor answered :--
- -Is not Waterworks Regulation No. 38 which fixes the rent payable for water meters some two or three years later in date than Waterworks by-law No. 20 under which the Council is authorized to instal meters in respect of water consumed for domestic purposes? A.—Nc. Waterworks Regulation No. 38 appears in a Schedule to the Water Service by-law published in Government Gazette No. 6,489 of February 16, 1918. Hence, Regulation No. 38 and by-law No. 20 are of the same date.
 - 4. Pursuant to notice Mr. P. Dahanayake asked the following questions which the Mayor answered :--
- -(1) Did the Council get a petition from P. Edward R. de Silva against one Regis Wekunagoda alias Ali Mudalali of Bope? (2) Did the petitioner complain of the latter having put up a grain store without any sort of permission from the Council? A.—A letter dated April 3, 1939, was received from Mr. P. Edward R. de Silva complaining that Mr. W. H. Regis Appuhamy alias Mr. R. Wekunagoda of Bope had erected a building behind his house in Wekunagoda road without permission.

Q.—(3) Did the Inspector of Buildings make inquiries and report to the Engineer that the man should be prose? A.—On a report by the Building Inspector dated March 28, 1939, the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer cuted? inspected the premises and called upon the owner to submit plans for the new building on pain of prosecution. Buildings Inspector did not recommend prosecution.

Q.—(4) Why did not the Engineer recommend a prosecution against this individual? A.—Because plans were submitted, as requested, on April 28, 1939.

Q.—(5) Why was such discriminatory treatment meted out to nim : A.—Does not arise. Q.—(6) Did the Inspector find that he had put up a wall also without permission? A.—It was found that he had raised by 2 feet the existing boundary wall of a well on the premises.

Q.—(7) Will the Council prosecute him oven now as a lesson to others? A.—It is not proposed to prosecute him as the plans submitted have since been approved and certificate of conformity issued.

Arising out of the above replies Mr. P. Dahanayake asked the following supplementary question:—Will the Council in future not prosecute persons for building houses without submitting plans? Mayor: I need notice of that question.

- Assessment rates for 1940.—The Mayor moved:—(a) To make and assess for the calendar year 1940 a uniform assessment rate of 7 per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the Municipal limits of Galle, a water rate of 6 per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the water-served area, and a lighting rate of 42 per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the area lit with electricity, as required by section 115 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, and in accordance with the provisions of section 2 of Ordinance No. 31 of 1938, payable by four instalments on or before the following dates:— First instalment, on or before March 31, 1940; second instalment, on or before June 30, 1940; third instalment, on or before September 30, 1940; fourth instalment, on or before December 31, 1940. (b) To adopt the valuation of properties for the current year subject to such alterations as the Mayor may from time to time find necessary to make for the purpose of rating for the calendar year 1940. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne asked the Mayor to have in mind the neglected areas of the town, and particularly the Dadalla area, with a view to improving the conditions in these areas during 1940. The Mayor replied that he would always have this in his mind. The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried.
- Pursuant to notice Mr. T. W. Roberts moved: -That the Sanitation Committee should prepare a scheme to reduce the incidence of phthisis in Galle, particularly, (a) by facilitating early diagnosis; (b) by subsidies to patients or other means likely to produce more thorough isolation of patients and likely to reduce the spread of infection. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded, and Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. de S. Wijayaratne, and A. William Wijeratne supported the motion which was then put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.
- 7. The following motion which also stood in the name of Mr. T. W. Roberts was deferred for the next Meeting: "That the Council should remove its meter from each house in which the meter readings since March have shown that consumption of water is less than the statutory maximum."
- Pursuant to notice Mr. D. S. Goonesekera moved:--That this Council resolves that in the appointment of Special Committees the number of Members on each such Committee shall be less than half the number of the Members of the entire Council. Mr. T. W. Roberts seconded. The motion was put to the Meeting and carried by seven votes to six, Mr. A. M. Saheed declining to vote.
- 9. Pursuant to notice Mr. A. William Wijeratne moved :-That a Revenue Inspector be immediately appointed
- 9. Fursuant to notice Mr. A. William Wijeratne moved:—That a Revenue Inspector be immediately appointed as several sources of revenue are now untapped; and that in so doing, if possible, a person already in service be selected with the suppression of a clerical post. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded.

 Mr. A. M. Saheed moved as an amendment that a Revenue Inspector be appointed and that applications for the post be called for in the usual manner. Mr. R. L. Ephraums seconded. The Mayor, and Mr. A. H. E. Fernando opposed the amendment and supported the motion. Messrs. J. E. Perera, E. de S. Wijayaratne, and P. Dahanayake supported the amendment. The amendment was first put to the Meeting and carried by nine votes to five. The motion was then put to the Meeting and declared lost, five voting for and nine against, and the division being as follows:—For.—The Mayor, and Messrs. A. I. H. A.Wahab; W. T.Wijekulasuriya; A. H. E. Fernando; and A.William Wijeratne. Against.—Messrs. J. E. Perera; F. Magdon Ismail; R. L. Ephraums; A. M. Saheed; D. S. Goonesekera; E. D. Nagahawatte; E. de S. Wijayaratne; P. Dahanayake; and T. W. Roberts.

The Mayor then moved Council into Committee to consider the salary scale and allowances of the post, and other details. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee-

Council in Committee recommended, after discussion, (1) that the salary scale of the post should be Rs. 720-Rs. 80-Rs. 1,520 per annum together with a house and bicycle allowance of Rs. 360 per annum; (2) that the qualification should be the Cambridge Senior or other equivalent examination; (3) that the age limit should be 35 years; (4) that candidates should be required to give particulars of their previous experience and forward copies of not more than three recent testimonials; (5) that canvassing should be strictly prohibited; and (6) that the appointment should take effect from January 1, 1940.

Council then resumed, and the Mayor moved that the above recommendations of the Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried. Mr. A. M. Saheed refrained from voting as he was of opinion

that the salary scale fixed for the post was too high.

- 10. Pursuant to notice Mr. P. Dahanayake moved:—That the construction of drains on the sides of Richmond Hill road be included in the 1940 budget. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Resolved that the matter be considered at the Budget Meeting of the Four Standing Committees.
- The following motion, which also stood in the name of Mr. P. Dahanayake, was, with the permission of Council, withdrawn by the mover on the Mayor pointing out that the construction of the drain in question had been approved by the former Chairman of the Council and that steps were being taken now to carry out the work:—"This Council is of opinion that immediate steps be taken to construct the drain along Pedurugewala Junction boutiques as approved by the former Chairman of this Council, in order to prevent flooding of the place when it rains."
- 12. Pursuant to notice Mr. A. H. E. Fernando moved:—(1) That the annual licensing fee for tea and coffee boutiques and eating-houses be reduced from Rs. 6 to Rs. 3 with effect from January 1, 1940; (2) That the annual tax and stamp duty on a vehicle drawn by two bullocks and by one bullock respectively be recovered as follows with effect from January 1, 1940:—Tax Rs. 2 in either case; stamp duty Rs. 4 for the former and Rs. 2 for the latter. (3) That the annual licensing fee for every bullock or ass be reduced from Re. 1 to 50 cents with effect from January 1, 1940. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Resolved to refer these matters to the Finance Committees for consideration.
- To consider the following extract from the minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of September 1, 1939:—"Considered the question of investing the Council's surplus funds as provided for in section 74A of the Municipal Councils Ordinance:—Recommended that a sum of Rs. 20,600 be invested in debentures of the Ceylon State Mortgage Bank, bearing interest at 3½ per cent. per annum, when the present fixed deposits for Rs. 20,000 and Rs. 750 are due to be payable to the Council." The Mayor moved as an amendment to the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the full amount available from fixed deposit, viz., Rs. 20,750, be invested in debentures of the Ceylon State Mortgage Bank at the rate of 4 per cent. or more per annum, and that the application money of 10 per cent. be paid for from current account. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.
- 14. To consider the following extract from the minutes of the Standing Committee on Works of September 4, 1939:—"Considered the following motion of Mr. P. Dahanayake at the General Meeting of Council on July 31, 1939:—"This Council is of opinion that immediate steps be taken to construct the Galketiya-Bope road, and the western tracing be adopted as it would open out the place and would be of greater advantage to people than the eastern tracing, which

would serve the requirements of 5 families and, further, as there is every possibility of getting all the land necessary along the western tracing free of any cost to the Council."—Recommended that action be taken under the Land Acquisition Ordinance to acquire the necessary land on condition that all the landowners agree to give their land free for the purpose.—Recommended, further, that similar action be taken in the case of land required for the construction of other new roads as well." The Mayor moved that the recommendation of the Works Committee be adopted. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

- 15. To consider the following extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Tender Board held on September 22, 1939, as regards the supply of House Conservancy buckets:—"Recommended (1) that the requirements for 1940 as regards House Conservancy buckets be obtained without delay in view of the international situation; (2) that an order for 400 buckets be placed with A. R. A. Hassen and for another 400 with M. B. Mohamed, at Rs. 1 35 each, the order to be executed before the end of the year." The Mayor moved that the recommendation of the Tender Board be adopted. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.
- 16. To consider letter No. T. P. 12 of September 27, 1939, from the Commissioner of Local Government regarding the preparation of a detailed survey of the tenement areas of China Gardon, Talapitiya, and Kaluwella:—Mr. J. E. Perera moved that tenders be called for from private surveyors for (a) a civic survey of the town and (b) a detailed survey of the tenement areas of China Garden, Talapitiya, and Kaluwella as defined in the Town Planner's report. The Mayor seconded.—Carried.
- 17. To consider letter No. B. 1592 of October 3, 1939, from the Commissioner of Local Government regarding the amendment of the Galle Street Collections Regulations, 1938:—The Mayor moved that Regulation 3 (b) of the Galle Street Collections Regulations, 1938, be amended to read as follows:—"Two persons nominated from time to time by the Galle Municipal Council." Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.
- 18. To consider the present practice with regard to the seizure of stray cattle within Municipal limits:—Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab moved that full responsibility for the seizing of stray cattle within Municipal limits be taken over by the Council and that not more than twenty general licences be issued with effect from November 1, 1939. Mr. A. M. Saheed Seconded.—Carried.
- At this stage Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne, with the permission of Council, moved that the question of controlling stray cattle in private gardens be referred to the Law Committee for consideration. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried.
- 19. Pursuant to notice Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved:—"That the Acting Municipal Commissioner be confirmed in his post or in the alternative appointed Municipal Commissioner with effect from November 1, 1939." Mr. T. W. Roberts seconded.

The Mayor moved Council into Committee to consider the matter. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee-

Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab moved as an amendment that consideration of the question be deferred till January, 1940. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded. Messrs. A. M. Saheed; E. de S. Wijayaratne; and J. E. Perera supported the motion. The Mayor and Messrs. W. T. Wijekulasuriya and A. William Wijeratne supported the amendment. Mr. D. S. Goonesekera suggested that the question be deferred for the next General Meeting. The mover replied. The amendment was then put to the Meeting and carried by the Mayor's casting vote. Mr. A. M. Saheed called for a division which resulted as follows:—For.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; P. Dahanayake; A. William Wijeratne; E. D. Nagahawatte; and A. H. E. Fernando. Aguinst.—Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail; J. E. Perera; E. de S. Wijayaratne; A. M. Saheed; D. S. Goonesekera; T. W. Roberts; and R. L. Ephraums.

Council then resumed, and the Mayor moved that the above resolution of the Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. Wahab seconded.—Carried by the Mayor's casting vote, the division being the same as in Committee.

(Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail and T. W. Roberts left the Meeting at this stage.)

- 20. Pursuant to notice Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab moved:—"That the daily water service to householders be extended by two hours (one hour in the morning and one hour in the evening), and that a further hour in the night be given during the Ramazan season." Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried.
- 21. Pursuant to notice Mr. D. S. Goonesekera moved:—(1) That this Council is of opinion that immediate steps be taken to extend the Electricity service along Colombo road up to Gintota bridge and Maitipe road and other roads within the Municipal limits that have not been supplied with lights. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded. The Mayor and Messrs. E. de S. Wijayaratne and E. D. Nagahawatte opposed the motion. Mr. A. William supported it. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 4 votes to 3, the division being as follows:—For.—Messrs. D. S. Goonesekera; P. Dahanayake; A. William Wijeratne, and W. T. Wijekulasuriya. Against.—The Mayor and Messrs. E. de S. Wijayaratne, and E. D. Nagahawatte. Declined to vote.—Messrs. A. M. Saheed; A. I. H. A. Wahab; J. E. Perera; R. L. Ephraums; and A. H. E. Fernando.
 - (Mr. R. L. Ephraums left the Meeting at this stage.)
- (2) That this Council is of opinion that the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer should be requested to submit an estimate immediately to extend the water service along Gintota road, up to the bridge, and also such other roads that have not been supplied with water. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded pro forma. The Mayor and Messrs. E. de S. Wijayaratne; E. D. Nagahawatte; and A. I. H. A. Wahab opposed the motion. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the Meeting and declared lost, 2 voting for and 4 against. The division was as follows:—For.—Messrs. D. S. Goonesekera; and A. H. E. Fernando. Against.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; E. de S. Wijayaratne; and E. D. Nagahawatte. Declined to vote.—Messrs. W. T. Wijekulasuriya; J. E. Perera; A. M. Saheed; A. William Wijeratne; and P. Dahanayake.
- (A motion for the adojurnment of the Meeting at this stage, moved by Mr. A. M. Saheed and seconded by Mr. D. S. Goonesekera was defeated by 6 votes to 5. Messrs. J. E. Perera and A. M. Saheed then left the Meeting.)
- (3) That this Council do import rice to sell to the local dealers, and vote a sum of not less than Rs. 25,000 to start with. This motion fell through for want of a seconder.
- (4) That this Council do take steps to encourage cultivation of curry stuffs within the Municipal limits by donating twenty-five cash prizes. This motion also fell through for want of a seconder.
- (5) That this Council do take immediate steps to cultivate at least ten acres with red onions as an experiment with the services of unemployed people of the Municipal area. Mr. A. William Wijeratne seconded. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab opposed the motion. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the Meeting and declared lost, 2 voting for and 6 against.
- 22. Pursuant to notice Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne moved:—(1) That the authorities be requested to stop the removal of sea sand from the mouth of the river at Mahamodera as a precautionary measure against sea erosion in the vicinity of the Mahamodera river. The Mayor seconded and suggested the insertion of the words "from either side of" before the word "mouth" in line 2. The mover agreed and, with the permission of Council, amended the motion accordingly. Mr. P. Dahanayake opposed the motion. The motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 6 votes to 1.
- (2) That a Special Committee of this House be appointed to suggest ways and means of enlarging, improving, and better maintaining the Dadalla Cemetery. The Mayor seconded. Mr. P. Dahanayake moved as an amendment that the Works Committee be asked to report on ways and means of enlarging, improving, and better maintaining the Dadalla Cemetery. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded and Mr. D. S. Goonesekera supported the amendment. The mover replied. The amendment was then put to the Meeting and carried by 5 votes to 2.
 - (Mr. P. Dahanayake left the Meeting at this stage.)

- (3) That the present road running from near the Vidane Arachchi's house at Dadalla to the Bope Cross road near the Piyadigama Mosque be widened and maintained as a cart road by this Municipality. The Mayor seconded. Resolved to refer the matter to the Works Committee for consideration.
- (4) That provision be made in the next year's budget for the construction of cemented drains on either side of the road at Dadalla from near the Provincial Engineer's bungalow to the Segregation Camp and at Piyadigama Bazaar from near the overhead bridge to the culvert beyond the Mosque. The Mayor seconded. Resolved to refer the matter to the Works Committee for consideration.
- 23. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya moved:—"That those daily-paid labourers in the Health Department who have been seriously affected by the discontinuance of the 'dual system' be paid at the rate of Re. 1 a day for a period of three months from the date of such discontinuance." Mr. D. S. Goonesekera seconded. With the permission of Council the mover amended the motion by substituting the words "from October 1, 1939," in place of the words "from the date of such discontinuance." The motion, as amended, was then put to the Meeting and carried. (Mr. D. S. Goonesekera left the Meeting at this stage.)
- 24. Considered a letter from the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer requesting that he be exempted from the temporary levy on salaries approved by the Council on September 18, 1939;—Resolved that, in view of this letter, no temporary levy be made on the salary of the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer, as previously decided by resolution dated September 18, 1939, as he is an officer serving the Council on agreement and on specified terms and conditions.
 - 25. The following extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—
 - (a) Extrates from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Works of September 28, 1939.
- (2) Considered, together with the Standing Committee on Finance, the following motions in connection with the construction of model tenements:—(1) Mr. P. Wijayaratne co-opted thereon, be asked to submit a scheme for the construction of 25 model tenements and that the cost be met from the Council's surplus balances and a subsidy from Government.
- (3) Considered together with the Standing Committee on Finance, the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on July 13, 1939:—"That the Works and Finance Committees together be asked to report on the feasibility of converting the land in Bazaar Ward (3) now vested in the Council into a playground, or, in the alternative of earmarking it for model tenements."—Recommended, in view of the recent resolution of Council to move the cattle pound temporarily to this site, that no action be taken in the matter.
- (4) Considered the Municipal Engineer's Schedule of Rates for 1940 for departmental estimates.—Recommended that the Schedule of Rates be approved subject to any change which the Works Committee might make in the course of 1940.
- (6) Considered the following motion of Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne at the General Meeting of Council on July 13, 1939:—"That immediate steps be taken to remove the Infectious Diseases Hospital and the Segregation Camp at Dadalla to some area outside the town."—Recommended that representations on the matter be made to the Honourable the Minister for Health.
- (7) Considered the following motion of Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne at the General Meeting of Council on July 31, 1939:—"That six public bathing wells be established in Dadalla Ward for convenience of the poor ratepayers of the Ward."—Recommended, in view of the recommendation already made by the Special Committee on rural reconstruction, that no action be taken in the matter.
- (11) Considered the following motion of Mr. P. Dahanayake at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"This Council is of opinion that the Municipal Engineer be requested to submit within two months a report on the dangerous corners, and bends and places that require widening in the Municipal streets of the town in consultation with the Members of the respective wards, so that steps may be taken to improve them."—Recommended that the motion be accepted.
- (12) Considered the following motion of Mr. A. William Wijeratne at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"That the Municipality do maintain the following roads:—(a) the road from near the Bogahagodella "Ambalama" in Wakwella road, through Alapalawa, and falling into Elliot road near Mahinda College (known as Alapalawa lane No. 1); (b) the road from Wakwella road near Mr. A. Kahaduwa's house, through Parangiyawatta and Meegahawatta, and falling into Hume road opposite the entrance to the Galwadugoda Vihare; (c) the continuation of (b) from Hume road near the entrance to the Galwadugoda Vihare and falling into Wakwella road opposite the Municipal Engineer's residence (this is known as the Galwadugoda Temple lane).—Recommended, in view of the recommendation already made by the Special Committee on rural reconstruction with regard to roads, that no action be taken in the matter.
- (13) Considered the following motion of Mr. A. William Wijeratne at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"That the following roadside drains be immediately constructed as the areas referred to are marshy, get flooded, and the people in them are subject to malaria:—(a) along Wakwella road to Joolgaha Junction; (b) along Elliot road on the side of the Atapattan Vihare; (c) along Hume road from Pedurugewala Junction to Wakwella road."—Recommended, with regard to (a), that provision be made in the budget for 1940 for the continuation of the drains along both sides of Wakwella road up to the turn off to Alapalawa; and with regard to (b) and (c) that no action be taken for the present.
- (14) Considered the following motion of Mr. A. William Wijeratne at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"That the dangerous bend near the Minuwangoda level crossing at the junction of Wakwella road and Cripps road be removed."—Recommended that no action be taken in view of the recommendation contained in item 11.
- (15) Considered the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on September 18. 1939:—" With a view to avoid congestion of traffic on the Matara road and to facilitate the transportation of goods to and from the stores of some business firms situated at Pettigalawatta, this Council resolves that the footpath running for about 33 chains through the strip of Crown land along the Pettigala-ela from near the Pettigalawatta Cross road bridge to Talapitiya road, be converted to a public road and the wall on the right bank of the Ela be raised by 2 feet."—Recommended that the Municipal Engineer be asked to submit a report and estimate.
- (16) Considered the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"This Council resolves that a portion of the old bus stand be converted to a bus halting place for buses plying from Galle to Matara, Baddegama, Udugama and Deniyaya and the period allowed for halting be extended to not less than 30 minutes."—Recommended that the Superintendent of Police be requested to allow buses to halt at the old bus stand for a longer time than is allowed at present, such time not to exceed 10 minutes.

- (17) Considered the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"This Council is of opinion that as the sanitation in the neighbourhood of the Green Market is very unsatisfactory, (a) adequate steps be taken to improve the sanitary conditions of this area; (b) the Cross road from the Bazaar Mosque to the Green Market be widened, tarred and kept clean."—Recommended that the Medical Officer of Health and the Works and Waterworks Engineer be asked to report on (a) and (b) respectively.
- (18) Considered the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on September 18, 1939:—"In view of the fact that the area lying between Havelock road and China Garden Middle road is very insanitary and crowded with small dwellings, this Council resolves that necessary steps be taken forthwith to construct, along the "Rope-walk" of China Garden, a lane at least 6 feet wide and have it provided with electric lights and for the present a concrete drain on one side."—Recommended that provision be made in the budget for 1940 for the acquisition of sufficient land in "Rope-Walk" to allow for the construction of a lane 15 feet wide.

- (11) Considered the question of waiving, in certain cases, the fees payable to the Council for putting up posters on Municipal boards.—Recommended that the matter be left to the discretion of the Mayor.
- (13) Considered the following motion of Mr. E. D. Nagahawatta at the General Meeting of Council on July 31, 1939:—"This Council requests the Finance Committee to consider the question of the large expenditure incurred on the Conservancy service, and recommend a scheme of contract or other means to reduce the expenditure."—Recommended, in view of the vital importance of the Conservancy service, that the present system do continue.
- (14) Considered the following motion of Mr. D. S. Goonesekera at the General Meeting of Council on July 31, 1939:—
 "That the commission paid for the collection of taxes be reduced by one per cent. with effect from August 1, 1939."—

Mr. Wijayaratne's amendment was first put to the Meeting and declared lost, 2 voting for and 5 against.

The Mayor's amendment was then put to the Meeting and carried by 5 votes to 2.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

- (3) Considered a request by the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer for the following supplemental votes:—
 (a) Rs. 400 under vote 49—Maintenance of buildings; and (b) Rs. 300 under Vote 52—Upkeep of Carts.—Recommended with regard to (a) a supplemental vote of Rs. 250, and with regard to (b) a supplemental vote of Rs. 200.

Resolution.

With regard to item (1) it was resolved that the matter be referred back to the Standing Committees on Finance, and Markets and Sanitation for further consideration.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to items (2) and (3) were adopted, Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne stating, as regards item (2), that a special effort should be made to purchase the furniture as cheaply as possible.

- (4) Considered the enforcement of the proposed regulations under the Shops Ordinance, No. 66 of 1938.—Recommended that the Controller of Labour be informed that under present circumstances the Council is not in a position to grant the necessary permission to its Medical Officer of Health to undertake the duties prescribed by the Shops Regulations Ordinance, No. 66 of 1938, and the draft regulations proposed to be made thereunder.
- (6) Considered the following motion of Mr. T. W. Roberts at the General Meeting of Council on September 18. 1939:—"That in view of sundry cases of malaria recently revealed in the Fort of Galle, the Sanitation Committee should prepare a thorough scheme (a) for better drains and better flushing of drains; (b) for any other measures calculated to cradicate the present plague of mosquitoes."—Recommended that the Municipal Works and Waterworks Engineer be asked to prepare a scheme for rebuilding the Fort sewers section by section and that provision be made in next year's budget for one of these sections.

A. de S. Adihetty, Mr. C. H. Wickremanayake and Mr. C. D. A. Gunawardene, be appointed to collaborate with the Central Government in all matters connected with the successful prosecution of the War, such as the proper distribution of food, recruitment of volunteers for local purposes, increase of food production, &c.
- Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya dissented from this resolution as he was not in agreement with the object in view, viz., the successful prosecution of the War.

# NOTIFICATIONS UNDER "THE PATENTS ORDINANCE, 1906."

THE following Specifications have been accepted:-

John Costa Gonsalves.

"A new method of extracting coconut oil and the apparatus to filter it."

Abstract.—The inventor states that the oil produced from copra is not of a good quality owing to the fact that copra as bought in the market is impure. He also states that much loss is caused to trade as oil mills and fibre mills are not established in the same locality. One of the advantages of his invention is that by producing coconut oil from the nut instead of from copra, the oil producer is enabled to engage in the manufactures of other coconut products also.

The method consists in making an emulsion of the ground nut and allowing it to stand for about an hour, so that the water which separates at the bottom can be drawn out. Four to six per cent. of carbonate of soda is now

added to the cream. This chemical dissolves the gums, neutralises the acid and absorbs any water that remains in the cream. These impurities are removed after settling for twenty-four to forty-eight hours. The cream is now put into a semi-circular pan and heated. The oil that is discharged is carofully filtered through an elaborate filtering arrangement. This is described in the specification and claimed separately. The residue that is left in the pan is pressed out for the two per cent. of oil which it contains.

Elekuttige Peregrinus Fernando.

"An apparatus for facilitating and expediting polling by voters and also recording the number of votes polled by each candidate separately and the total polled by all candidates together at each station."

Abstract.—The inventor describes a machine for recording votes at an election which enables the results to be announced immediately after polling is over and which eliminates the use of ballot papers.

The machine consists of a cubicle which is fitted with a number of corridors, each of which is assigned to a candidate. A voter by passing through a corridor allotted to a candidate registers his vote by stepping on a board

which is placed in that corridor. The weight of the voter depresses the board, and this causes the general meter showing the total number of votes polled to be operated and at the same time actuates the meter that indicates the number of votes polled for that particular candidate. The stepping board that is depressed is kept down by a catch and at the same time the stepping boards in all other corridors are held up, so that it is impossible for any other vote to be registered till the mechanism is released by the same voter depressing a stepping board placed at the exit passage of the cubicle.

When the stepping board in a corridor is depressed a bell is rung to indicate to the presiding officer that a vote has been recorded, and at the same time an "engaged" sign appears at the entrance to the cubicle. When the stepping board in the exit passage is depressed another bell is rung, and the "engaged" sign disappears; this indicates that the cubicle is ready for use by the next voter.

The whole apparatus can be put out of action by a "dead lock" so that the corridor can be inspected by the presiding officer without operating the meters.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Controller of Prices by section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Edward Heron Ryan Tenison, Acting Controller of Prices, do by this Order:—

- (i.) rescind the Order dated November 24, 1939, published in Gazette No. 8,552 of November 24, 1939, in so far as it relates to the maximum prices fixed in respect of milk food of any description and grade specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
- (ii.) fix the prices specified in columns 3, 4, and 5 of the Schedule hereto to be respectively the maximum wholesale price per case, the maximum retail price per case and the maximum retail price per tin above which the brand of milk food of the description named and specified in the corresponding entry in column 1 of the Schedule hereto and of the standard pack specified in the corresponding entry in column 2 of the Schedule hereto shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail as the case may be, in any part of Ceylon;

(iii.) direct that paragraphs 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the said Order published in Gazette No. 8,552 of November 24, 1939, shall apply in the case of any milk food of any description and grade specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto as though those paragraphs were incorporated in this Order.

(3) direct that no such trader shall sell any article mentioned in the first schedule which is adulterated with any other article or with any article of an inferior description or quality;

(4) direct that where any article mentioned in the first schedule to this Order is sold by wholesale or retail, the sale shall be made according to the measure of capacity (liquid measure) and concentration specified in the first schedule;
(5) direct that every trader who sells an article of any description and grade mentioned in the first

schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that article a receipt on which there shall be set out

(i.) the description and grade of the article sold; (ii.) the price for the quantity of the article sold;

(iii.) the date of the sale; and

- (iv.) the nature of the sale, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail;
- (6) direct that for the purposes of this Order-
  - (a) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
  - (b) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail.
