THE INDIAN CRIMINAL TRIBES IMMIGRATION ORDINANCE, No. 19 OF 1939.

IT is hereby notified that the following regulations made by the Chief Secretary under section 9 (1) of the Indian Criminal Tribes Immigration Ordinance, No. 19 of 1939, have been approved by the State Council and ratified by the Governor.

REGULATIONS.

1. Every permit authorizing the entry into Ceylon of a member of a Criminal tribe shall be issued by the Inspector-General of Police, and shall be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto.

2. Every member of a criminal tribe entering Ceylon, or resident in Ceylon and registering himself under regulation 3 shall be subject to the following restrictions and conditions:—

- (a) He shall not enter into or depart from Ceylon except through the ports of Talaimannar or Colombo;
- (b) He shall preserve the Permit issued to him under these regulations and produce such permit when called upon to do so by a Judge, Magistrate, or Peace Officer;
- (c) He shall abstain from any violation of the law;
- (d) He shall not habitually associate with persons of notoriously bad character;
- (e) He shall not lead an idle life or be without visible means of obtaining an honest livelihood;
- (f) He shall, within 48 hours of landing in Ceylon personally notify the place of his residence to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district in which he is going to reside, and shall thereafter within 48 hours report his arrival to the Officer in charge of the appropriate Police Station, or where there is no Police Station to the Chief Headman.
- (g) Whenever he intends to change his residence or move for any period whatsoever out of the area within which he is liable to report himself, he shall personally notify such intended change or move to the Officer in charge of the Police Station in the area in which he is resident, or where there is no Police Station to the Chief Headman of the division at least 48 hours beforehand, and he shall also within 48 hours of his arrival at his new residence or the place to which he has moved as aforesaid, if in another division notify such arrival to the Officer in charge of the Police Station of that division, or where there is no Police Station to the Chief Headman of that division.
- (h) Whenever he intends to change his residence or move for any period whatsoever from one district to another he shall personally notify such intended change or move at least 48 hours beforehand to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the former district, and within 48 hours of his arrival in the new district, he shall report himself to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of such district.
- (i) Whenever he intends to leave the Island, he shall, at least 48 hours before leaving, personally notify the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district which he is leaving or the person deputed by such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent to receive such reports, and shall whenever he returns to the Island, report himself personally within 48 hours of his arrival to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of the district in which he lands, or to the person deputed by such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent to receive such reports.
- (j) He shall once a month report himself personally at such time and place as may be ordered by the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district in which he resides to such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent or to a person deputed by him.
- (k) If the conduct of any permit holder under these regulations has been satisfactory for a period of six months after his arrival in Ceylon, the Inspector-General of Police may authorize such permit holder to report himself at longer intervals than those specified in paragraph (j).

3. Every member of a criminal tribe resident in Ceylon on the date on which these regulations come into force shall, within one month of such date register himself at the Police Station of the area in which he ordinarily resides, and shall for this purpose, give his correct name and address both in Ceylon and in India and shall submit to have his finger prints taken. No such person shall do any act so as to prevent the accurate taking of his finger prints.

4. Particulars of all persons registered under the Ordinance shall be retained in a Register to be kept by the Registrar of Finger Prints, Colombo.

5. The Inspector-General of Police shall issue to every member of a criminal tribe resident in Ceylon and registering himself under regulation 3 a permit substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto.

- (a) shall not enter into or depart from Ceylon except through the ports of Talaimannar or Colombo,
- (b) shall preserve the permit issued to him and produce such permit when called upon to do so by a Judge, Magistrate, or Peace Officer,
- (c) shall abstain from violation of the law,
- (d) shall not habitually associate with persons of notoriously bad character,
- (e) shall not lead an idle life or be without visible means of obtaining an honest livelihood,
- (f) shall, within 48 hours of landing in Ceylon personally notify the place of his residence to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district in which he is going to reside, and shall thereafter within 48 hours report his arrival to the Officer in charge of the appropriate Police Station, or where there is no Police Station to the Chief Headman.

- (h) shall whenever he intends to change his residence or move for any period whatsoever from one district to another, personally notify such intended change or move at least 48 hours beforehand to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the former district, and within 48 hours of his arrival in the new district, he shall report himself to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of such district.
- (i) shall whenever he intends to leave the Island, at least 48 hours before leaving personally notify the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district which he is leaving or the person deputed by such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent to receive such reports, and shall whenever he returns to the Island, report himself personally within 48 hours of his arrival to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of the district in which he lands, or to the person deputed by such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent to receive such reports.
- (j) Shall once a month report himself personally at such time and place as may be ordered by the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Police of the district in which he resides to such Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent or to a person deputed by him.
- (k) if the conduct of any permit holder under these regulations has been satisfactory for a period of six months after his arrival in Ceylon, the Inspector-General of Police may authorize such permit holder to report himself at longer intervals than those specified in paragraph (j).

EXAMINATION FOR INTERPRETERS.

APPLICATIONS are invited from officers of the General Clerical Service holding appointments as Interpreters in Courts and from officers in Classes II. and III. of the General Clerical Service who wish to sit for an examination in both Sinhalese and Tamil with a view to qualifying for appointment as Court Interpreters. The examination will be held in Colombo on January 26, 1940, and the following day.

2. Applications, which should be forwarded through the Heads of the Departments concerned, should reach the Director of Education not later than January 9, 1940.

3. Batta and travelling expenses will be paid to candidates who attain a reasonable standard of interpretation in both vernaculars at the examination.

4. The syllabus of the examination will be as follows:—

Written Examination.

A. ENGLISH LANGUAGE (one paper of 2 hours).

Questions will be set to test the candidates' (a) power of expression, (b) comprehension of passages of average difficulty (selected from newspapers, official publications, or books by modern authors), and (c) knowledge of idioms of the language.

(N.B.—No questions in grammar will be included.)

B. (i.) TRANSLATION FROM ENGLISH INTO SINHALESE (one paper of 1½ hours).

(ii.) TRANSLATION FROM ENGLISH INTO TAMIL (one paper of 1½ hours).

Candidates will be required to translate one or more of the following:—

A judgment in a Police Court or District Court case; an extract from an Ordinance, by-law, Gazette Notification or Hansard or other Government Publication.

Candidates will also be required to translate English idiomatic phrases.

C. (i.) TRANSLATION FROM SINHALESE INTO ENGLISH (one paper of 1½ hours).

(ii.) TRANSLATION FROM TAMIL INTO ENGLISH (one paper of 1½ hours).

Candidates will be required to translate into English—

(i.) An article from a newspaper or modern prose book; (ii.) A manuscript letter, petition, deed or report of average difficulty.

Questions will also be set to test the candidates' ability to translate idiomatic expressions into correct idiomatic English.

Oral Examination.

Candidates will be further tested by an oral examination. The following will receive attention:—

Translation of ordinary technical terms in current use; facility of expressions in both languages; pronunciations, knowledge of idioms and idiomatic phrases in both English and the vernacular.

Candidates will be expected to dictate off-hand the translations of an English letter, report, or other official paper put into their hands for the first time.

5. The rules relating to the payment of allowances to Court Interpreters are as follows:—

(1) An allowance of Rs. 10 per mensem will be paid to officers of the General Clerical Service other than members of the Special Class of that Service, who pass examinations in both Sinhalese and Tamil and *who are employed as Court Interpreters*. Officers employed as Additional Interpreters will not, however, be eligible to draw the allowance.

(2) The payment of the allowance will be subject to the following conditions:—

(a) no Interpreter shall draw the allowance until he has passed the examination to be held by the Education Department in both Sinhalese and Tamil;

(b) he shall have interpreted to the satisfaction of the Judge during a period of three months. If he does not satisfy the Judge he shall not draw the Interpreter's allowance even though he has passed the examination. Failure to satisfy the Judge will generally mean transfer to some other post in the Clerical Service, but not necessarily;

(c) if an officer who has passed the examination and drawn the allowance is transferred and employed on other work he may, on being re-transferred to an Interpreter's post, be paid the allowance without further examination provided that his absence from a post of Court Interpreter is less than one year. If the period of absence is over one year he must interpret to the satisfaction of the Judge during a period of three months before the allowance can be paid.

(d) the allowance shall be paid from the date of passing the examination or the date of appointment to a post of Interpreter, whichever is the later;

(e) the allowance in question will not be paid during the period of three months referred to in (b). If the Interpreter satisfies the Judge, he will draw the allowance retrospectively as from the date laid down in (d).

(3) Officers now employed as Interpreters will be required to take the examination before they can draw the allowance.

(4) Absence on the days taken up by the examination will be regarded as on duty.

1. (i.) In pursuance of this licence no tree shall be tapped, no spadix of any tree shall be prepared, no toddy shall be drawn from any tree, and no pot shall be attached to any toddy-producing tree, even by way of experiment, until that tree has been marked by an officer of the Excise Department.
- (ii.) In any land where licensed trees are situated, no licensee shall place, or cause or permit any other person to place on any tree not mentioned in cages 3 and 4 of the application, any mark or marks resembling those made by an officer of the Excise Department under the last preceding condition.
2. (i.) The licensee may either tap the trees and draw the toddy himself, or may employ the tapper mentioned in cage 5 of the application to tap the trees and draw the toddy for him.
- (ii.) The licensee or the aforesaid tapper may, by endorsement duly signed and dated in cage 5 of the application employ a temporary substitute for that tapper :
Provided that no such endorsement shall be deemed to be valid, and no substitute shall be employed in pursuance thereof,—
 - (a) after the fifteenth day from the date of the endorsement, or
 - (b) after the licensee is informed in writing by any officer of the Excise Department not below the rank of Inspector that the substitute is for any reason unsuitable for such employment.
- (iii.) The licensee, or the authorized or substituted tapper, if any, shall bring or cause to be brought down for inspection, on the demand of any Excise Officer or a Headman, any pot or other vessel attached to any tree marked under this licence.
3. (i.) When the licensee himself taps the trees, this licence shall be kept on the person of the licensee at all times when he is engaged in tapping or in selling the toddy or while the toddy is in his possession or in his control.
- (ii.) Where the licensee employs a tapper, this licence shall be kept on the person of the tapper at all times when he is engaged in tapping or in selling the toddy or while the toddy is in his possession or in his control.
4. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be sold at any place whatsoever other than in—
 - (i.) a spot within 20 feet of the foot of a tree licensed in the garden specified in cage 4 of the application ; or
 - (ii.) any other land or toddy booth, mentioned in cage 4 of the application and duly approved by the Government Agent.
5. No spirits shall be manufactured from the toddy drawn under this licence.
6. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be transported in excess of 16 drams to any place other than the approved place of sale mentioned in cage 4 of the application except on a special permit for transport and possession in Form T. T. 7.
7. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be sold or given to any other person who holds a licence to sell fermented toddy either under the tree tax or the tavern system, or to any tapper licensed to tap trees either under the tree tax system or for the supply of toddy to a toddy tavern.
8. No toddy drawn under this licence shall be supplied to any toddy tavern, even though such supply be free of charge.
9. Neither the licensee nor his tapper shall possess any toddy drawn under this licence in any quantity exceeding _____ gallons of coconut toddy and _____ gallons of palmyra toddy on the land where the licensed trees are situated **L** the approved place of sale mentioned in cages 3 and 4 of the application.
10. All toddy sold, or kept or exposed for sale under this licence, shall be of good quality, and be pure and unadulterated. Any Excise Officer not below the rank of Inspector shall have power to order the destruction of any stale toddy and the licensee shall cause such order to be carried out immediately.
11. No person (a) suffering from leprosy, or from any infectious or contagious disease, or (b) under the age of sixteen years, shall be permitted to possess, transport or sell any toddy drawn under this licence.
12. No abusive language, drunkenness, disorder or gaming shall be permitted in any land where licensed trees are situated or in the approved place of sale mentioned in cage 4 of the application.
13. No person, who is abusive, drunk, violent, quarrelsome or disorderly, shall be permitted to enter or remain in any such land or approved place of sale, and no such person shall be served with any toddy.
14. The approved place of sale, and all vessels, measures and other articles used for the storage or sale of liquor thereat shall be kept scrupulously clean. Every glass, measure, vessel, utensil, and receptacle used for serving the toddy to customers shall immediately after its return by the customer, be washed with clean water.
15. The substitution of a new tree for a tree already marked may be allowed at the discretion of the Assistant Commissioner of Excise provided that the tree so substituted is of the same kind and on the same land (but not on another land) and application is made to him or to the Superintendent of Excise—
 - (a) on or before the third day after marking and before the commencement of tapping, or
 - (b) within 10 days after the marking of a palmyra (male or female) or within 20 days after the marking of a coconut tree, which has been tapped.
16. Pecuniary dealings of any kind whatsoever between the licensee or his representative, agent or employer and Excise Officers or Headmen are absolutely prohibited.

Notes for the information of the applicant :

- (a) Excise Officers may assist applicants by explaining the requirements, but may not fill in cages 1 to 7 overleaf.
- (b) Excise Officers are forbidden to receive, and applicants are forbidden to pay to them, any money in any form under any pretext whatsoever.
- (c) Applications for licences to tap trees should be made at least 2 weeks before the date on which it is intended to commence tapping and *in duplicate*, the original and duplicate forms being filled in by the applicant. Separate applications (also in duplicate) should be put in, if trees are on different lands, or if the application is for both coconut and palmyra trees.
- (d) Applications should be presented at the Excise Station within the area of which the trees are situated. The Inspector will inspect the tree applied for (if necessary), make his report on Part A of the Report Sheet and hand the application back to the applicant to be presented by the applicant at the Kachcheri with the required amount or to be sent by post to the Government Agent, Jaffna, with a money order or postal order for the required amount.
- (e) If the application is taken by hand to the Kachcheri, the applicant should obtain a receipt in item 12 of the Report Sheet before leaving the Kachcheri. If application is sent by post, the applicant should see that he receives the receipt by post.
- (f) No applicant will be allowed more than 20 trees of any one kind at any time, whether on one or more applications, but an applicant may be allowed 20 coconut trees and 20 palmyra trees (either male or female or both together), or 20 male palmyras and 20 female palmyras at any one time on different applications for the two kinds of trees. In certain congested areas, like Jaffna Town, and in the case of trees for the supply of toddy to a licensed toddy booth, the maximum of 20 may be raised at the discretion of the licensing authority.
- (g) If any applicant wishes to transport toddy in excess of $\frac{1}{2}$ of a gallon to his own house for consumption and not for sale, and/or to the house or houses of his customer or customers, and/or to a licensed toddy-booth, or other land, he should make an application in form T. T. 10 to the Superintendent of Excise through the Excise Station, for a special transport permit.
- (h) No tree will be licensed or place of sale approved in places which are considered to be objectionable or unsuitable by the licensing authority.

"Method and Apparatus for the treatment of Rubber Latex."

Abstract.—Rubber Latex has been concentrated by the use of centrifugal bowls with intermediate discs. The bowls are of substantially the same shape as those in a milk separator. It has been found, however, that the centre part of the bowl becomes clogged with concentrate, thereby making frequent stoppages for cleaning necessary.

The disadvantage is overcome by the use of a separator having a pile of discs with a central opening. The first part of the concentration takes place in the inner portions of the intermediate discs. Here the concentration is not high enough to cause the rubber particles to adhere to the discs.

The second stage of the concentration takes place in the central space in the discs. The outlet for the concentrate is situated at a suitable distance from the axis greater than the outer surface of the central inlet tube of the bowl, so that the concentrate forms a free liquid surface separated from the centre tube. This is advantageous as the viscous concentrate can flow out more readily.

If desired, the central portion in the pile of discs may be provided with discs spaced at greater distance apart than those in the pile or with a larger top angle, so as to avoid clogging.

"Improved apparatus for the Cleaning of Tea and other Materials."

Abstract.—The inventor claims a method and apparatus for cleaning manufactured tea as follows :—

An expansion chamber is fitted with an exhaust fan on one side and a vertical air duct on the other. The action of the fan induces a vertical current of air into this chamber. Manufactured tea is fed on to a chute by means of a serrated roller associated with a feed hopper, adjustable feed control baffle and guide plate. The tea coming down the chute has a substantially horizontal velocity when it meets the upward current of air from the duct. The mass of tea is broken up by the air stream but extraneous heavy matter falls down the duct. A curved adjustable baffle is fixed midway in the chamber. The air stream passing the leading edge of the baffle is deflected in a horizontal direction between the baffle and the under side of the top of the casing.

The air under the baffle is in a quiescent state, and the particles of tea delivered by the chute which are too heavy to be caught up by the air stream are delivered into this space. "Greying" of tea is avoided as there is no rubbing action.

The air stream passing over the baffle contains dust and small particles of tea. The small particles are deposited owing to the reduced velocity of the air. These eventually find their way to the same receiving hopper that collected the heavier particles. The air-borne dust is drawn through the exhaust fan into a settling chamber from whence the air is discharged to the atmosphere at low velocity.

There are nine claims and one sheet of drawings.
