- (a) obeying any traffic sign or notice erected or exhibited on that street or part thereof by any officer or authority; or
- (b) following in due order the movement of any traffic on that street or part thereof at that time; or
- (c) allowing any person to alight from or to enter such vehicle; or
- (d) loading goods into or unloading goods from such vehicle.

3. For the purposes of any prosecution for an offence under these by-laws, every notice within the administrative limits of the Council, purporting to be exhibited under by-law 1 or by order of the Municipal Commissioner, shall unless the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been lawfully exhibited by the Municipal Commissioner.

4. Where the halting or parking of vehicles on any street or part of a street is not prohibited or restricted by any notice exhibited under by-law 1, verbal directions or signals may be given by a police officer for the purposes of the regulation of traffic on that street or part of a street, and the driver of a vehicle shall not allow that vehicle to stand on that street or part thereof otherwise than in such position or for such time as may be indicated by the police officer.

5. In these by-laws—

“parking” means the bringing of a vehicle to a stationary position or causing it to wait for any purpose other than that of immediately taking up or setting down persons or goods;

“vehicle” means any artificial contrivance, whether propelled mechanically or otherwise, which is used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on land, but does not include—

- (a) a tram car; and
- (b) a motor car as defined in the Motor Car Ordinance, No. 45 of 1938.

**Text.**

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION CONCERNING THE USE  
OF BROADCASTING IN THE CAUSE OF PEACE.

*Geneva, September 23, 1936.*

Albania, the Argentine Republic, Austria, Belgium, the United States of Brazil, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Chile, Colombia, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, Egypt, Spain, Estonia, France, Greece, India, Lithuania, Luxembourg, the United States of Mexico, Norway, New Zealand, the Netherlands, Roumania, Switzerland, Czechoslovakia, Turkey, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and Uruguay.

Having recognised the need for preventing, by means of rules established by common agreement, broadcasting from being used in a manner prejudicial to good international understanding:

Prompted, moreover, by the desire to utilise, by the application of these rules, the possibilities offered by this medium of intercommunication for promoting better mutual understanding between peoples:

Who, having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following provisions:—

## ARTICLE 1.

The High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to prohibit and, if occasion arises, to stop without delay the broadcasting within their respective territories of any transmission which to the detriment of good international understanding is of such a character as to incite the population of any territory to acts incompatible with the internal order or the security of a territory of a High Contracting Party.

## ARTICLE 2.

The High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to ensure that transmissions from stations within their respective territories shall not constitute an incitement either to war against another High Contracting Party or to acts likely to lead thereto.

## ARTICLE 3.

The High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to prohibit and, if occasion arises, to stop without delay within their respective territories any transmission likely to harm good international understanding by statements the incorrectness of which is or ought to be known to the persons responsible for the broadcast.

They further mutually undertake to ensure that any transmission likely to harm good international understanding by incorrect statements shall be rectified at the earliest possible moment by the most effective means, even if the incorrectness has become apparent only after the broadcast has taken place.

## ARTICLE 4.

The High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to ensure especially in time of crisis, that stations within their respective territories shall broadcast information concerning international relations, the accuracy of which shall have been verified—and that by all means within their power—by the persons responsible for broadcasting the information.

## ARTICLE 5.

Each of the High Contracting Parties undertakes to place at the disposal of the other High Contracting Parties, should they so request, any information that, in his opinion, is of such a character as to facilitate the broadcasting, by the various broadcasting services, of items calculated to promote a better knowledge of the civilization and the conditions of life of his own country as well as of the essential features of the development of his relations with other peoples and of his contribution to the organisation of peace.

## ARTICLE 6.

In order to give full effect to the obligations assumed under the preceding Articles, the High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to issue, for the guidance of governmental broadcasting services, appropriate instructions and regulations, and to secure their application by these services.

With the same end in view, the High Contracting Parties mutually undertake to include appropriate clauses for the guidance of any autonomous broadcasting organisations, either in the constitutive charter of a national institution, or in the conditions imposed upon a concessionary company or in the rules applicable to other private concerns, and to take the necessary measures to ensure the application of these clauses.

## ARTICLE 7.

Should a dispute arise between the High Contracting Parties regarding the interpretation or application of the present Convention, for which it has been found impossible to arrive at a satisfactory settlement through the diplomatic channel, it shall be settled in conformity with the provisions in force between the Parties concerning the settlement of international disputes.



In the absence of any such provisions between the Parties to the dispute, the said Parties shall submit it to arbitration or to judicial settlement. Failing agreement concerning the choice of another tribunal, they shall submit the dispute, at the request of one of them, to the Permanent Court of International Justice, provided they are all Parties to the Protocol of the 16th December, 1920, regarding the Statute of the Court; or, if they are not all parties to the above Protocol, they shall submit the dispute to an arbitral tribunal, constituted in conformity with The Hague Convention of the 18th October, 1907, for the Pacific Settlement of International Disputes.

Before having recourse to the procedures specified in paragraphs 1 and 2 above, the High Contracting Parties may, by common consent, appeal to the good offices of the International Committee on Intellectual Co-operation, which would be in a position to constitute a special Committee for this purpose.

## ARTICLE 8.

The present Convention, of which the French and English texts are both authentic, shall bear this day's date and shall be open for signature until the 1st May, 1937, on behalf of any Member of the League of Nations, or any non-member State represented at the Conference which drew up the present Convention, or any non-member State to which the Council of the League of Nations shall have communicated a copy of the said Convention for that purpose.

## ARTICLE 9.

The present Convention shall be ratified. The instruments of ratification shall be sent to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, who shall notify the deposit thereof to all the Members of the League and to the non-member States referred to in the preceding Article.

## ARTICLE 10.

After the 1st May, 1937, any Member of the League of Nations and any non-member State referred to in Article 8 may accede to the present Convention.

The notifications of accession shall be sent to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, who shall notify the deposit thereof to all the Members of the League and to all the non-member States referred to in the aforesaid Article.

## ARTICLE 11.

The present Convention shall be registered by the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, in conformity with the provisions of Article 18 of the Covenant, sixty days after the receipt by him of the sixth ratification or accession.

The Convention shall enter into force on the day of such registration.

## ARTICLE 12.

Every ratification or accession effected after the entry into force of the Convention shall take effect sixty days after the receipt thereof by the Secretary-General of the League of Nations.

## ARTICLE 13.

The present Convention may be denounced by a notification addressed to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations. Such notification shall take effect one year after its receipt.

The Secretary-General shall notify the receipt of any such denunciation to all Members of the League and to the non-member States referred to in Article 8.

If, as the result of denunciations, the number of High Contracting Parties should fall below six, the present Convention shall cease to apply.

## ARTICLE 14.

Any High Contracting Party may, on signing, ratifying or acceding to the present Convention, or at any subsequent date, by a written document addressed to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, declare that the present Convention shall apply to all or any of his colonies, protectorates, overseas territories, or territories placed under his suzerainty or mandate. The present Convention shall apply to the territory or territories specified in the declaration sixty days after its receipt. Failing such a declaration, the Convention shall not apply to any such territory.

Any High Contracting Party may at any subsequent date, by a notification to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, declare that the present Convention shall cease to apply to any or all of his colonies, protectorates, overseas territories, or territories placed under his suzerainty or mandate. The Convention shall cease to apply to the territory or territories specified in the notification one year after its receipt.

The Secretary-General shall communicate to all Members of the League and to the non-member States referred to in Article 8 all declarations received under the present Article.

## ARTICLE 15.

A request for the revision of the present Convention may be made at any time by any High Contracting Party in the form of a notification addressed to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations. Such notification shall be communicated by the Secretary-General to the other High Contracting Parties. Should not less than one-third of them associate themselves with such request, the High Contracting Parties agree to meet with a view to the revision of the Convention.

In that event, it shall be for the Secretary-General of the League of Nations to propose to the Council or Assembly of the League of Nations the convening of a revision conference.

## REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE TEA COUPON BANK.

1. The Tea Coupon Bank heretofore established and in existence at the date of the commencement of these regulations shall be and be continued as the Tea Coupon Bank for the purposes of these regulations.

2. In these regulations—

“Bank” means the Tea Coupon Bank;

“cheque” means an order signed by any customer directing the Bank to debit his coupon account with a specified quantity of tea coupons and to credit that quantity in favour of a specified person or for a specified purpose, and “cheque book” has a corresponding meaning;

“credit note” and “sub-credit note” mean respectively a credit note and a sub-credit note issued under the regulations published by notification No. 8 in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,362 of April 1, 1938;

“coupon” means a tea coupon issued under section 20 of the Tea Control Ordinance and includes a credit note or a sub-credit note;

“coupon account” means the account maintained with the Bank by a customer;

“customer” means a person or body of persons in whose name an account is maintained with the Bank.

3. The business of the Bank shall be administered under the general direction and control of the Controller and in accordance with these regulations.

4. The Controller may in his discretion open a coupon account in the name of any person or body of persons, being a proprietor, dealer, shipper, broker or estate agent.

5. Every application by a person or body of persons desirous of opening a coupon account with the Bank shall be made to the Controller in writing and shall be accompanied by a fee of fifty rupees.

6. Where a coupon account is opened in the name of any customer, the Controller shall—

(a) cause the name of the customer to be registered in the books of the Bank;

(b) issue a cheque book to the customer; and

(c) open a pass book for the entry of transactions relating to the customer's coupon account.

7. Where valid coupons duly issued under the Ordinance are surrendered for deposit at the Bank, or a cheque duly drawn or endorsed is paid into the Bank, in favour of the coupon account of any customer, there shall be credited to his coupon account, the amount of the coupons so surrendered or, as the case may be, the amount of the coupons in respect of which the cheque is drawn.

8. A cheque drawn by any customer in favour of any person may be endorsed by that person in favour of any other person and may be further negotiated by subsequent endorsement.

9. Where a cheque drawn by a customer in respect of any coupons is paid into the Bank the coupon account of the customer shall be debited with the amount of the coupons, and an entry of the debit shall be made in the customer's pass book.

10. Where any coupons standing to the credit of any customer cease to be valid under the provisions of the Ordinance the coupon account of the customer shall be debited with those coupons, and any cheque drawn by the customer in respect of any such coupons shall be deemed for the purposes of these regulations to be a cheque which has not been duly drawn.

11. (1) Such expenses as the Controller may deem to be expenses incurred in the administration of the Bank shall be borne by the customers of the Bank in equal shares.

(2) The share from time to time payable by a customer under paragraph (1) shall be paid out of the sum paid as a fee by that customer under regulation 5, and where the whole or any part of the sum so paid has been expended, the Controller may require the customer to pay such further fees as may be necessary to meet the share of the expenditure which is due from that customer.

12. Every account which has been opened at the Bank before the commencement of these regulations and which is being maintained at that date shall be deemed to be a coupon account duly opened in accordance with these regulations and the provisions hereinbefore contained shall apply accordingly.

13. The Controller may at any time close the coupon account of any customer and shall in any such case issue to that customer the amount of coupons standing to the credit of the customer's account.

BY-LAWS.

Interpretation of Terms.

1. In these by-laws—

“the Council” means the Nuwara Eliya Urban District Council;

“the Chairman” means the Chairman of the Nuwara Eliya Urban District Council;

2. (1) The following area (hereinafter called the “market area” within the administrative limits of the Nuwara Eliya Urban District Council is hereby declared to be the market area assigned to the Nuwara Eliya Town Market.

The area within the following boundaries:—

*North.*—From a point at the centre of the junction of Uda Pussellawa road and Badulla road, near the Queen's Cottage main gate, eastwards along the centre of Uda Pussellawa road to its junction with James street, thence north-eastwards along the centre of the road leading to the Roman Catholic Church premises, to its junction with Long street, thence eastwards along the centre of Long street to its junction with Cross street, thence north-eastwards along the centre of Cross street to its junction with Lady McCallum's Drive, thence eastwards along the centre of the said Drive to a point at its bend three chains east of Police Station road junction.

*East.*—From the last-mentioned point southwards along the centre of Lady McCallum's Drive, Church road and Railway Station road to a point at the bend of the last-mentioned road due south of “Grimsthorpe.”

*South.*—From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre of Railway Station road and Grand Hotel road to a point at the southern entrance to the Grand Hotel north of the Petrol Depot.

*West.*—From the last-mentioned point northwards along the centre of Grand Hotel road and Badulla road to the starting point of the northern limit.

(2) Where a road or junction forms the boundary of the market area, the centre of such road or junction as the case may be, shall be deemed to be the boundary.

3. No person shall use or occupy any stall, seat, or space in a public market, unless he is the holder, or the servant or agent of the holder, of a permit or a ticket issued under these by-laws by or by the authority of the Chairman.

4. (1) A permit in form A of the schedule hereto shall be issued in every case where the tenancy of a stall, seat, or space in a public market is to be for a period of not less than one month.

(2) The use or occupation of a stall, seat, or space in a public market for any period less than one month shall be authorized by a ticket issued daily in form B of the schedule hereto and available for the period of issue only.

5. If the Council does not employ an officer to collect the rent and fees payable for the use of the market premises, it may lease the right of collecting such rents and fees to any approved person—(a) by private treaty, (b) by calling for tenders, or (c) by putting up the right to public auction.

6. (1) The rent or fee for each stall, seat, or space in a public market, shall be paid in advance at the time stated hereunder to the Chairman or to the officer appointed by the Council to collect such rent or fee or to the lessee, or to the person appointed by the lessee, as the case may be.

(2) Such rent or fee shall be paid—

(a) where a permit is issued, either at the time of the issue thereof or in monthly instalments on the first day of each calendar month of the period for which the permit is issued; and

(b) where a ticket is issued, at the time of the issue thereof;

Provided, however, that any holder of a permit may, for good cause, be allowed time not exceeding one week for the payment of any rent due from him; and every such holder shall, after the lapse of such time, be liable to pay the amount due on demand together with an additional rent of 10 cents for each day of the term of the permit during which the rent was in arrears.

7. Every permit or ticket shall be subject to the conditions set out thereon.

8. (1) No holder of a permit or ticket shall without the written permission of the Chairman—

(a) transfer such permit or ticket to any other person; or

(b) sublet any part of the stall, seat, or space allowed to him; or

(c) permit any person, other than his servant or agent, to use or occupy any part of the stall, seat, or space.

(2) No person shall use or occupy any part of any stall or space under any alleged sub-lease without the written permission of the Chairman.

9. Every holder of a permit for any period exceeding one month shall, when he decides to terminate his tenancy, give the Chairman one calendar month's notice of his intention to terminate such tenancy or pay one month's rent in lieu of such notice.

10. Every holder of a permit shall—

(a) cause every bench, shelf, counter or table, on which articles of food or drink are kept or exposed for sale, to be thoroughly cleaned daily, and every board on which meat or fish is kept or exposed for sale, to be scraped and washed daily;

(b) sweep or cause to be swept, daily the stall or space occupied by him and any open space forming the approach or entrance to his stall or space, and

(c) keep near his stall or space a flyproof receptacle with a close fitting lid, and place or cause to be placed all sweepings, rubbish, and refuse matter therein.

11. No holder of a permit or ticket shall—

(a) subject any person resorting to the market to any insult, vexation, annoyance, or delay; or

(b) occupy his stall, seat, or space or take part in any sale therein, while he is suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or employ or permit any person suffering from any such disease to occupy the stall, seat, or space or to take part in any sale therein; or

(c) enclose any part of his stall, seat, or space, or erect any screen or awning, or make any alterations whether temporary or permanent in such stall, seat, or space, without the written permission of the Chairman; or

(d) bring into, or keep in, his stall, seat, or space any box, table, chair, or other similar furniture, which is not the property of the Council, or construct any shelves or other fixtures in such stall, seat, or space, without the written permission of the Chairman, or

(e) expose or keep for sale in his stall, seat, or space, any article which is not specified in his permit or ticket, or which is prohibited by the Council, or which is unwholesome or in any way injurious to the public health; or

(f) throw any bones, fins, or scales of fish, or any refuse, or any rubbish or sweepings, in any drain or on any part of the market premises; or

(g) expose the skin or hide of any animal, for the purpose of drying or curing, in any part of the market premises.

12. No person shall, within a public market or its premises—

(a) carry on any cooking; or

(b) be found drunk or behaving in a disorderly manner, or create any noise or disturbance, or fight with any other person or use insulting, abusive, or obscene language; or

(c) beg; or

(d) loiter without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, or remain after being ordered to leave by the market keeper or an officer of the Council, or headman or police constable, or any person acting under the lawful orders of the Chairman.

13. No person shall—

(a) damage or deface any part of the market buildings or the furniture, lamps, or other property of the Council in or about a public market; or

(b) defile, pollute, or waste the water provided for use in a public market, or wash himself or any animal, clothes, or article in that water.

14. (1) The Chairman shall cause a list of the rents or fees, payable for the occupation of a stall, space, or seat, at a public market, to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in that market.

(2) No market keeper, lessee, or person appointed by the lessee to collect the rents or fees shall—

(a) demand or take any higher amount, by way of rent or fee than that specified in the aforesaid list; or

(b) subject any person to unnecessary or vexatious treatment under pretext of performing any duty or exercising any authority imposed or conferred upon him.

15. The Chairman shall have power to inquire into any dispute relating to any rent or fee, and make such order thereon as to him may seem just.

#### *Private Markets and other Authorized Premises.*

16. (1) Within any market area no person shall sell or expose for sale, any meat, poultry, fresh fish, fresh fruits, or vegetables except in the stalls set apart for that purpose at a public market.

(2) No licence shall be issued for any private market within any market area and no other premises within any such area shall be authorized for the sale of any of the articles specified in paragraph (1) of this by-law.

(3) Nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to prohibit or in any way to affect—

(a) the sale of poultry, fruits, or vegetables by itinerant vendors as defined in section 163 (5) of the Ordinance, or

(b) the sale by the licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique, of fruits for consumption on the premises, or

(c) the sale by any person of oranges, ripe plantains, or young coconuts.

17. Within the market area no person shall hawk for sale any meat or fresh fish.

#### **GENERAL.**

18. No person shall bring into, or expose for sale, or sell at any public market or at any licensed market or other premises within the administrative limits of the Council any carcass or meat of any animal not slaughtered at a public slaughter-house or at a licensed slaughtering place: provided that this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat imported into the Island or of game.

19. (1) It shall be the duty of every holder of a permit in respect of a stall at a public market to keep such stall open to the public for business between the hours of 6 A.M. and 9 P.M.

(2) No such permit holder shall wilfully neglect or refuse to serve the public for two or more consecutive days without the written leave of the Chairman.

(3) Any contravention of paragraph (2) above, shall be punishable on the second or any subsequent conviction with the suspension or cancellation of the permit in addition to such fine as may lawfully be imposed for the breach of this by-law under by-law 23.

20. The Chairman may in his discretion refuse to issue a fresh permit to any person whose permit has been suspended or cancelled, or who has been convicted of any breach of these by-laws.

21. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or for any officer of the Council acting under the authority of the Chairman, to inspect any market and to seize any article of food introduced into or exposed for sale therein, which appears to him to be unwholesome and to convey such article to the Medical Officer of Health, Nuwara Eliya, and if that officer certifies that any article of food so seized is unwholesome, such article may be destroyed without payment of compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

22. No person shall resist, obstruct, hinder, or molest, any market keeper, or any officer or person appointed by the Council to superintend any market or to collect rents or fees therein, in the execution of his duty.

23. Any contravention of any of these by-laws shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and with an additional fine not exceeding ten rupees for each day during which the offence is continued after a conviction thereof or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

24. The following by-laws made by the Board of Improvement, Nuwara Eliya, and continuing in force by virtue of the provisions of section 246 of the Local Government Ordinance, are hereby revoked:—

(a) By-laws 2, 3, 3A, 4, 5, 21, and 22 published in *Gazette* No. 5,509 of November 5, 1897.

(b) By-laws 1 and 2 published in *Gazette* No. 6,090 of December 1, 1905.

#### BY-LAWS.

##### *Preliminary.*

1. In these by-laws—

- "Council" means the Matale Urban District Council;
- "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Matale Urban District Council;
- "domestic purposes" means domestic purposes as defined by section 145 of the Local Government Ordinance, No. 11 of 1920.
- "quarter" means a period of three months ending on March 31, June 30, September 30, or December 31 in any year.

2. No water shall be drawn from the Council's water-works except from the public standpipes or fountains or from a private service pipe, or otherwise than in the manner prescribed by these by-laws.

##### *Public Standpipes.*

3. No person shall take water from a public standpipe—

- (a) in a cart or barrel or in any vessel other than a bucket or other similar receptacle carried, and capable of being ordinarily carried, by hand, or
- (b) in any quantity or in any manner likely to cause any waste of water.

4. No person shall attach any hose-pipe, pipe, tube, shoot or other contrivance of any nature whatsoever either temporarily or permanently to any public standpipe.

5. No person shall interfere with the automatic self closing valve or other automatic appliance attached to or forming part of any public standpipe, or do any other act likely to prevent either temporarily or permanently the automatic action of such valve or appliance.

6. No person shall take water from a public standpipe for other than domestic purposes.

7. No person who is suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease and no person who has recently been in attendance on any such person, shall draw water from any public standpipe.

8. (1) No person shall bathe or wash any part of his body or wash any animal or any clothes, utensil or other article whatsoever, at or near any reservoir, standpipe, fountain, cistern, well, pipe or other waterworks for the time being vested in or maintained by the Council.

(2) No person shall wash any vehicle at any standpipe other than a standpipe or well which has been set apart for that purpose by the Council.

##### *Requirements as to Private Service Pipe and Fittings.*

9. Without the written approval of the Chairman first had and obtained, on application made to him in the Form "A" set out in the schedule hereto, no person shall—

- (a) construct a new service or lay any new service pipe from the Council's mains or waterworks to any private premises, or commence any work for that purpose; or
- (b) alter, extend, clean out or renew any existing service pipe connected to the Council's mains or waterworks or commence any work for any such purpose.

10. Any work approved by the Chairman under by-law 9 shall be carried out in accordance with the written instructions of the Chairman and no fittings or appliances shall be used in such work unless approved by him.

11. Not more than one service pipe for the supply of water to any premises within the same curtilage and assessed by the Council as one property shall be connected to the Council's mains or waterworks.

12. (1) All pipes used in the construction of private services shall be either of cast iron coated with bituminous composition or of galvanized wrought iron and shall be of such thickness and quality as may have been approved by the Chairman or an officer or person authorized by the Chairman in that behalf.

(2) Wrought iron service pipes shall be of the quality known as "best water piping" and of the following weights:—

$\frac{1}{2}$ in. internal diameter	88 lb. per 100 lineal feet.
$\frac{3}{4}$ in. "	125 " "
1 in. "	181 " "
$1\frac{1}{4}$ in. "	256 " "
$1\frac{1}{2}$ in. "	320 " "
2 in. "	405 " "

(3) Cast iron pipes shall be substantially jointed with lead and yarn; wrought iron pipes shall have screwed joints and sockets.

13. All draw-off taps fitted on any premises shall be of a pattern and size approved by the Chairman.



14. The Council shall whilst consulting the wishes of the applicant as far as practicable, determine all matters concerning the construction or the alteration of the service such as the diameter of the pipe to be used, the manner in which it is to be laid, and the number, size, and position of the taps, and such determination shall be final and conclusive.

15. The inlet or supply pipe to every cistern shall be placed so as to have its delivery level above the highest water level of such cistern.

16. Every storage tank to which water is supplied from the waterworks shall be provided with an "equilibrium" ball valve of approved pattern, and the ball valve shall be so adjusted as to close the supply when the water level in the tank is two inches below the edge or overflow.

17. The inlet of every bath, lavatory-basin or sink shall be separated and kept distinct from the outlet, and the inlet shall be situated at the top of or above such bath, lavatory-basin, or sink.

18. The overflow pipe of every cistern or tank shall be brought to the outside of the building and shall terminate in a conspicuous position, so that any leakage may be easily detected. No overflow from any cistern shall on any account be connected with any drain or sewer or with the waste-pipe of any bath, sink, or any other sanitary appliance or with the overflow from any other cistern. Each cistern or tank shall have a separate overflow pipe.

19. After the date on which these by-laws come into force—

(a) no cistern or tank exceeding 400 gallons in capacity shall be installed or constructed on any premises for holding any part of the water supplied for domestic purposes; and

(b) no cistern or bath shall be installed or constructed in any premises unless the size and design thereof and the number that is to be installed or constructed, have received the prior approval of the Chairman.

20. The service pipe, cistern, or other service fittings on any premises shall not be connected with any service pipe, cistern, or other service fittings of any other premises bearing a separate assessment number.

21. No pipe forming part of a private water service shall be directly connected with any boiler, condenser, or other mechanical appliance without the express sanction of the Chairman.

22. Every private water service shall be provided—

(a) with a strong brass, gun-metal, or cast iron gland stopcock with a solid bottom, and if the stopcock is of cast iron the plug shall be asbestos packed, or

(b) with a screw-down stopcock with a loose valve; or

(c) in the case of service by a pipe larger than two inches in diameter, with a sluice or a slide valve.

The stopcock or valve shall be fixed under the pavement, if there is any pavement on that street, as near as practicable to the premises served and shall be provided with a cast iron or cement concrete surface box and lid so that the stopcock or valve may at all times be accessible.

23. No pipes, valves, or other fittings forming part of a newly constructed service to any premises shall be covered up until they have been inspected and approved in writing by the Chairman or an officer or person authorized by him in that behalf.

24. Where any special fittings, constructions, appliances, or arrangements of any kind are allowed for the supply of water to any premises for other than domestic purposes (such as taps for building operations, garden taps, tanks, hose, &c.), the owner of such premises shall, whenever a change of occupier occurs, either himself pay the charges previously agreed upon, or procure their payment by the new occupier, or remove at his own expense the said special fittings, constructions, appliances, or arrangements to the satisfaction of the Chairman.

25. The service pipe from the street main and up to and including the stopcock or valve shall be the property of the Council and the cost of the necessary repairs to such service pipe shall be paid by the Council but where any damage is done to the stopcock or valve on the service pipe to any premises, such damage shall be made good by the Chairman at the expense of the owner or occupier of such premises and the cost of the repair of such damage shall be paid to the Council, and the Chairman may discontinue the supply of water to such premises until such payment is made.

26. After a private service is connected to the Council's mains or waterworks, an account shall be rendered to the applicant in the form B set out in the schedule hereto and the unexpended balance, if any, of the sum deposited by him to meet the cost of making the connection shall be returned to the applicant. In the event of the actual cost exceeding the estimated cost, the applicant shall upon

receipt of the aforesaid account, forthwith pay to the Council the amount of such excess.

27. No water supplied for any private service shall be used unless an agreement in the form C in the schedule hereto has been previously entered into with the Chairman.

28. No water supplied for domestic purposes shall be used for any other purpose. Charges at the following rates shall be paid in advance for water supplied for domestic purposes:—

Where the internal diameter of the service connexion is	Rs. c.

29. For water supplied for other than domestic purposes the charges shall be paid in advance as follows:—

(1) Premises occupied wholly or in part—

(a) as an eating-house (not including a hotel) or a bakery, Rs. 7 50 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ½ inch, Rs. 10 50 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ¾ inch.

(b) as a tea kiosk, Rs. 8 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ½ inch, Rs. 10 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ¾ inch.

(c) as a common lodging-house, hotel or boarding-house, Rs. 10 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ½ inch, Rs. 12 50 per quarter or part thereof for a service pipe, the internal diameter of which is ¾ inch.

(2) Where any appliances falling within the meaning of by-law 24 are used—

(a) Rs. 20 per quarter or part thereof for ½ inch tap or hose for building construction work and an additional fee for tanks as specified in clauses (c), (d), and (e) hereunder.

(b) Rs. 3 per quarter or part thereof for ½ inch garden tap, and Rs. 3 50 for ½ inch hose.

(c) Rs. 6 per quarter or part thereof for storage tank for distribution the capacity of which does not exceed 100 cubic feet.

(d) Rs. 7 per quarter or part thereof for storage tank for distribution the capacity of which exceeds 100 cubic feet but does not exceed 200 cubic feet.

(e) Rs. 10 per quarter or part thereof for storage tank for distribution the capacity of which exceeds 200 cubic feet but does not exceed 300 cubic feet.

#### Earthing Connections.

30. No person making any earthing connections from the casings of transformers dealing with electric current of a pressure of 500 volts or more, shall do so except by means of a proper and efficient earthing plate fixed not less than two feet from any pipe or apparatus forming part of the Council's waterworks or of any private service connected to the Council's waterworks.

31. Where any earthing connection is necessary for a wireless set supplied with electric current from the electric lighting system, such earthing connection shall be made by means of an earthing plate fixed not less than two feet from any pipe or apparatus forming part of the Council's waterworks or of any private service connected to the Council's waterworks.

#### Prevention of Waste.

32. (1) The Chairman may, whenever he has reason to believe that the arrangement, size, position, nature, or condition of any pipe, tap, valve, or other fittings forming part of the private water service on any premises connected with the Council's waterworks is likely to lead to waste, misuse, undue consumption, or contamination of the water supplied from the waterworks for public or private use, or is likely to be prejudicial to the proper control and distribution of water from the waterworks, serve a notice in the form D set out in the schedule hereto upon the owner of the premises.

(2) Every such notice must specify the alterations which the Chairman considers necessary, and such alterations shall be made by the owner to the satisfaction of the Chairman within such period as may be specified in the notice.

(3) In the event of the name or residence of the owner being unknown, the notice shall be deemed to be duly served on the owner if it is affixed in a conspicuous place upon the premises to which it relates.

33. The Chairman may withhold, suspend, or diminish the supply of water to any premises or disconnect the private service pipe on those premises from the Council's mains or waterworks—

- (a) at the request of the owner or occupier of such premises; or
- (b) if default be made in the payment of any money due under the provisions of these by-laws from the owner or the occupier of such premises; or
- (c) if the construction or laying of any such service pipe by the owner or occupier of such premises is not carried out or altered in accordance with the provisions of these by-laws; or
- (d) if any act or thing is done or omitted to be done by the owner or by the occupier of such premises contrary to the provisions of these by-laws relating to damage to or pollution of the waterworks or waste or abuse of the water.

34. No person who is supplied with water from the waterworks, shall wilfully or negligently cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair or to be so used or contrived that the water supplied to him from the waterworks is or is likely to be wasted, misused, unduly consumed or contaminated or so as to occasion or allow the return of foul air or other noisome or impure matter into any pipe belonging to or connected with the pipes of the waterworks.

35. The occupier of a house or premises to which a private water service has been laid from the Council's waterworks shall immediately notify the Chairman whenever water is running to waste from any tap, pipe or other fittings forming part of such service. Whenever a change of occupier takes place in such house or premises, the incoming occupier shall notify such change to the Chairman within 48 hours after the change takes place.

36. Whenever water is found running to waste from any tap, pipe or other fittings forming part of the private water service on any premises, the Chairman or any person authorized by him in that behalf may at once disconnect the service from the Council's main and such service shall not be reconnected until the cause of the waste is eliminated by the owner or occupier of the premises.

37. The amount estimated by the Chairman as the cost of reconnecting to the Council's main or waterworks, any private service pipe disconnected on any of the grounds set out in by-laws 33 and 36 shall be paid by the owner or occupier of such premises in advance to the Council. The unexpended balance, if any, shall be returned to the owner or occupier on the completion of the work. In the event of the actual cost exceeding the estimated cost, the amount of the excess shall be paid by the owner or occupier forthwith on the completion of the work.

*General.*

38. The Chairman may, without prejudice to any water rate or other sum which may be or become due under the Ordinance or these by-laws, withhold, suspend, diminish or divert the supply of water through any mains, public fountain, service pipes or other appliances connected to the Council's waterworks either wholly or in part whenever the Chairman is satisfied—

- (a) that the water available in the waterworks is insufficient; or
- (b) that such action is expedient or necessary for the purpose of extending, altering or repairing the mains or waterworks or for the purpose of the connection of service pipes to mains; or
- (c) that such action is expedient or necessary by reason of any damage caused to a public standpipe or any pollution or waste of water thereof; or
- (d) that damage is caused or likely to be caused to the waterworks by an outbreak of fire.

39. The approval of any private water service pipe or fittings under by-law 23 or the grant of any permission or concession under any of these by-laws to the owner or occupier of the premises on which that service pipe is laid, shall not be deemed for any purpose to attach to the Council any liability for any damage caused by the bursting of any part of the pipe or the overflow of water from any part of the pipe or fittings.

40. The Council shall not be liable in damages for failure on its part to supply water, whether under a contract or agreement or otherwise, if such failure is due to unusual drought, or to any temporary interference with the supply caused by carrying out any work, or to any other unavoidable cause or accident.

41. (1) The Chairman, or any officer of the Council authorized in that behalf by him in writing, may, after giving not less than one hour's notice of his intention to the occupier of any premises served by a private water service connected to the waterworks, enter such premises at any

time between sunrise and sunset for the purpose of examining the condition of the pipes and other fittings relating to such service and of ascertaining if there is any waste of water supplied by such service.

(2) When such notice cannot for any reason be given or served personally on the occupier of the premises, the affixing of such notice in a conspicuous place upon the premises shall be sufficient service of such notice for the purpose of this by-law.

42. All moneys payable to the Council under these by-laws shall be paid at the Office of the Council to the Chairman or the officer of the Council authorized to receive such payment.

43. Every contravention of any of the provisions of these by-laws shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees and, in the case of a continuing offence, with an additional fine not exceeding ten rupees for every day during which the offence is continued after conviction or service of written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

44. The by-laws made by the Local Board of Matale and published in Gazette No. 7,223 of November 4, 1921, and Gazette No. 7,323 of April 12, 1923, and continuing in force by virtue of the provisions of section 246 of the Local Government Ordinance, are hereby revoked.

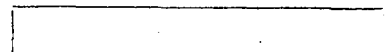

The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 8,040 of March 23, 1934, as amended by by-law published in *Gazette* No. 8,468 of July 28, 1939, are hereby further amended by the addition, immediately after by-law 16, of the following new by-law 17 :—

" 17. (1) The Council may, with the approval of the Governor, pay a gratuity in accordance with the provisions of this by-law to the widow or to the children or to the dependants of any officer or servant who dies in the service of the Council after he has completed five years' public service as defined in by-law 13 (2) and while he is in receipt of a salary of not less than Rs. 360 per annum.

(2) (a) In the case of any officer or servant referred to in paragraph (1) who was holding a post on the fixed establishment of the Council at the time of his death, the gratuity payable under this by-law shall be a sum equal to twelve times the monthly salary drawn by him in respect of that post at that time.

(b) In the case of any officer or servant referred to in paragraph (1) who was not on the fixed establishment of the Council at the time of his death, the gratuity payable under this by-law shall be a sum equal to three times the monthly salary of the post held by him at that time, and an additional sum equal to such monthly salary for each minor child surviving him: Provided however that such additional sum shall not be payable in respect of more than nine such minor children in any one case.

(c) In the case of any officer or servant referred to in paragraph (1) who was holding a post on the fixed establishment of the Council at the time of his death but was in receipt of a salary of less than Rs. 360 per annum, the gratuity payable under this by-law shall be a sum equal to three times the monthly salary drawn by him in respect of that post at that time, and an additional sum equal to such monthly salary for each minor child surviving him: Provided however that such additional sum shall not be payable in respect of more than nine such minor children in any one case.

(3) The gratuity shall be payable—

(a) where the widow of the deceased officer or servant survives him, to such widow, whether or not there is any child of such widow surviving him; or

(b) where the widow, whether with or without children, and also children by a previous marriage of the deceased officer or servant survive him, to the widow and to the children of such previous marriage in such manner and in such proportion as the Council may determine; or

(c) where there is no widow surviving, to the children of the deceased officer or servant in such manner and in such proportion as the Council may determine; or

(d) where there is no widow or child of the deceased officer or servant surviving him, to the dependants who were living with and maintained by him at the time of his death.

(4) Where any child, to whom the amount of any gratuity or share of a gratuity is payable under this by-law, is a minor, such amount may be paid to some person approved by the Council, for the use and benefit of such child."

(1) under the heading "A.—Establishment and Regulation of Public Markets and Supervision and Control of Private Markets" by the addition, immediately after by-law 1, of the following new by-law 1A :—

" 1 A. (1) After any such public market is established and opened, no person shall, without a licence granted

by the Board, expose for sale any meat, poultry, fish whether fresh or salted, fresh fruit, or vegetables in any boutique, private market, stall, or place within a radius of  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile from the Sanitary Board Public Market, other than the said public market: Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of fresh fruit or vegetables within the aforesaid limits of the town by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places or do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on public roads or other public places.

(2) Every licence referred to in paragraph (1) shall be in the form set out hereunder, and shall be in force for such period not less than one month and not exceeding twelve months, as may be specified therein.

*Form of Licence to sell outside Market.*

(3) In respect of each licence, a fee shall be payable in advance at the rate of fifty cents for each month of the period for which the licence is to be in force: Provided that in any case where the licence is restricted to the sale of fresh fruit and vegetables only, the fee payable in advance in respect of such licence shall be one rupee per annum.

(4) No licence under this by-law shall be granted by the Board unless the boutique, private market, stall or place—

(a) in which any meat or fish (whether fresh or salted) is exposed for sale is in conformity with the conditions relating to butchers stalls and fish stalls respectively specified under the heading "B—For the Supervision and Control of Bakeries, &c. (a)—General"; and

(b) in which poultry, fresh fruit or vegetables are exposed for sale, is in conformity with such of the conditions set out hereunder as are applicable thereto:—

**POULTRY STALL.**

*Conditions of Issue of Licence.*

(i.) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open must not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(ii.) The walls in every room must not be less than 7 feet in height and must be lime plastered and lime washed except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement.

(iii.) The eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground.

(iv.) The woodwork must be oil painted or lime washed.

(v.) The floor must be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered and emptying into a bucket.

(vi.) Every table on which poultry is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

(vii.) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(viii.) The premises must be at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap or open sewer.

(ix.) There must be no cesspit, latrine or ashpit within, or directly communicating with, the premises.

(x.) There must be a yard cemented and properly drained, for a poultry run.

(xi.) The yard must be detached from any building.

(xii.) For live poultry, such number of crates or other receptacles must be provided so as not to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to poultry confined therein. Such crates or other receptacles must be mounted on legs, or must be capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning.

**FRESH FRUIT OR VEGETABLE STALL.**

*Conditions of Issue of Licence.*

(i.) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted and every room must be provided with windows capable

of being opened, the area of which when open must not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

(ii.) The walls in every room must not be less than 7 feet in height and must be lime plastered and lime washed except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement.

(iii.) The eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground.

(iv.) The woodwork must be oil painted or lime washed.

(v.) The floor must be cemented throughout.

(vi.) Every table on which fruits or vegetables are kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

(vii.) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(viii.) The premises must be at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap or open sewer.

(ix.) There must be no cesspit, latrine or ashpit within, or directly communicating with the premises."

(2) Under the heading "For the Supervision and Control of Bakeries, &c. (a) General", by the addition at the end of by-law 1, of the following:—

"Save as otherwise expressly provided in by-law 1A

(4) under the foregoing heading A, nothing in this by-law shall be applicable to a butchers stall or fish stall established within a radius of  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile of a public market."

## The Gampola Street Collections Regulations, 1939.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Gampola Street Collections Regulations, 1939.

2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Board” means the Board of Control established by these regulations for the area within the administrative limits of the Gampola Urban District Council;

“Charity” means the charitable institution or purpose for the use or benefit of which a collection or sale is held;

“collecting committee” means the body of persons organizing or promoting and conducting or supervising any collection or sale;

“collection” means the collection of money for any charitable or other similar purpose;

“collector” means a person participating in any collection by taking money from the public for the purposes of such collection;

“Fund” means the fund which is or is to be set apart for any charitable or philanthropic purpose and for which a collection or sale is held;

“sale” means a sale of articles held for any charitable or other similar purpose;

“vendor” means a person participating in any sale by selling to the public the article or articles provided for the purposes of such sale.

3. For the purpose of supervising and controlling the collection of money or sale of articles for charitable or other similar purposes in any street or other public place within the administrative limits of the Gampola Urban District Council, there shall be a Board of Control, which is hereby established, consisting of—

(a) The Chairman of the Gampola Urban District Council, as Chairman of the Board,

(b) Two persons nominated from time to time by the Gampola Urban District Council with the approval of the Executive Committee of Local Administration, and

(c) Two persons nominated from time to time by the Executive Committee of Local Administration.

4. (1) No person shall organize or promote any collection or sale in any street or public place within the administrative limits of the Gampola Urban District Council—

(a) unless he is a member of a collecting committee of not less than three persons appointed with the object of organizing or promoting such collection

or sale by any society or association, or by the managing body of any Charity or Fund, or by a representative meeting of the section of the public interested in any charitable purpose or institution; and

(b) unless such collecting committee has obtained from the Board, in the manner hereinafter prescribed, a permit authorizing the collection or sale; Provided, however, that nothing in this regulation shall be deemed to prohibit or affect in any other way—

(i) any collection taken at an open-air meeting or

(ii) the sale of any article in any street or public place in the ordinary course of trade; or for the purpose of earning a livelihood, without any representation being made by or on behalf of the seller that any part of the proceeds of sale will be devoted to any charitable purpose.

(2) No person who is a member of a collecting committee to which a permit is issued under these regulations shall cause or permit the collection to be taken or the sale to be held otherwise than in accordance with the conditions of the permit.

5. Every application for a permit shall—

(a) be substantially in Form A set out in the Schedule hereto;

(b) signed by every member of the collecting committee organizing the collection or sale for which the permit is required;

(c) be addressed to the Chairman of the Board; and

(d) be made not later than the first day of the month preceding the month fixed for the collection or sale;

Provided, however, that the Board may in the special circumstances of any case entertain an application notwithstanding that such application is made later than the aforesaid date.

6. The following shall be conditions attached to every permit issued by the Board:—

(1) The collection shall be taken or the sale held only on the day and between the hours and in the districts, streets or places specified in the permit.

(2) No person under the age of fourteen years shall be authorized or permitted to act as a collector or vendor.

(3) Every person authorized to act as a collector or vendor shall, before the hour fixed for the commencement of the collection or sale, be given a written authority in that behalf under the hand of the secretary or other member empowered by the collecting committee to issue such authority.

(4) All boxes or other receptacles in which the collection or the purchase money is to be placed shall be numbered serially and shall be securely closed and sealed in a manner capable of preventing the extraction of money placed therein without breaking the seal, and a record shall be kept of the serial number of each box or receptacle issued to each person who is authorized to act as collector or vendor.

(5) Every such box or receptacle shall bear prominently displayed thereon—

(a) the name of the Charity or Fund or the purpose for which the collection is taken or the sale is held;

(b) the date of the collection or sale; and

(c) the serial number assigned by the collecting committee to that box or receptacle.

(6) No payment shall be made or reward given—

(a) to any collector or vendor for his services in connection with the collection or sale; or

(b) directly or indirectly to any other person connected with the promotion or conduct of the collection or sale, unless the name of that person and the nature of the payment or reward have been specified in the application made for the permit.

7. No person shall act as a collector or vendor in connection with any collection or sale—

(a) if he is under fourteen years of age; or

(b) if he is not the holder of a written authority in that behalf under the hand of the secretary or other member empowered by the collecting committee to issue such authority; or

(c) if he knows or has reason to believe that the collection or sale has not been authorized by a permit issued by the Board.



8. No person acting as a collector or vendor in connection with any collection or sale shall—

- (a) carry or use any collecting box or receptacle for money which is not securely closed and sealed and which does not bear prominently displayed thereon—
  - (i.) the name of the Charity or Fund or the purpose for which the collection is taken or the sale is held ;
  - (ii.) the date of the collection or sale ; and
  - (iii.) the serial number assigned by the collecting committee to that box or receptacle ;
- (b) carry on the collection or sale on any date, or at any time, or in any district or street or place, other than that specified in the permit issued in that behalf ; or
- (c) carry on the collection or sale in any part of the carriage-way of any street, or in such manner on any part of the foot-way of a street or in any public place as to cause obstruction or annoyance to any person lawfully using such street or public place ; or
- (d) use for the purposes of the collection or sale any table exceeding 30 inches in length or 20 inches in width, or use any table in a manner which causes or is likely to cause obstruction to the public ; or
- (e) keep any animal with him at the place where he is to carry on the collection or sale ; or
- (f) in the course of the collection or sale importune any person to the annoyance of that person ; or
- (g) fail to place any money received in the course of the collection or sale in the sealed box or receptacle or one of the sealed boxes or receptacles issued to him for the purpose ; or
- (h) fail or refuse for any reason after the close of the collection or sale to deliver each of the boxes or receptacles issued to him, with the seals intact, to the person authorized by the collecting committee to take charge of such boxes or receptacles.

9. Every person acting as a collector or vendor shall produce forthwith for inspection, on the demand of any Police Officer not below the rank of Sub-Inspector the written authority issued to him by the collecting committee.

10. (1) Within one month after the date of any collection or sale the collecting committee shall—

- (a) cause a statement of the amount received and the expenditure incurred in connection with such collection or sale to be prepared substantially in Form B set out in the Schedule hereto, and to be signed by two of the office-bearers authorized in that behalf by the committee ;
- (b) cause the statement to be audited by the auditor appointed by the committee, or where there is no such auditor, by a responsible person who is not a member of the committee ; and
- (c) forward to the Chairman of the Board the original of the statement so audited, together with receipts or vouchers in proof of the items of expenditure set out in the statement.

(2) In any case where the expenses of a collection or sale are defrayed wholly or in part by any contributions distinct from the amount collected or realized, particulars of such contributions shall be inserted in the statement both under the head "Receipts" and under the head "Expenditure".

11. Every collecting committee shall, if required so to do by the Board, produce proof to the satisfaction of the Board as to the due application of the proceeds of the collection or sale to the Charity or Fund or the purpose for which the collection or sale was conducted.

REGULATION made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by sections 2 and 3 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance (Chapter 173).

REGULATION.

The Quarantine Regulations made under sections 4 and 5 (now sections 2 and 3) of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance (Chapter 173), and published in *Gazette* No. 8,029 of January 26, 1934, as last amended by regulation published in *Gazette* No. 8,548 of November 10, 1939, are hereby further amended in the schedule thereto as follows :—

(1) under the heading "1—Medical Visit and Inspection of Vessels", by the substitution, in paragraph B, for the note appearing under the sub-heading "Colombo" of the following :—

"Note.—Of this fee Rs. 6 is credited to revenue and the balance of Rs. 15 is distributed equally among the Port Health Officers."

(2) under the heading "7—Observation in Quarantine Stations or elsewhere"; by the substitution, for paragraph E, of the following new paragraph :—

"E. Tataparai Camp (South India) :—

For each child under 12 years other than an infant in arms half the above rates.

On leaving the Camp for Ceylon, a travelling diet is issued free to each passenger (other than an infant in arms), half such diet being issued to each child under 12 years of age.

- (v.) Use of each resthouse including water and lighting for full period of quarantine (in addition to the usual charge at (i.)) .. 2 rupees

Note.—(1) No charge is made for infants in arms for housing and medical attendance. Infants are not supplied with diets.

(2) The resthouses are not furnished. Passengers have to use their own bedding and linen.

(3) These fees are credited to the Accommodation Fund, which is maintained for the purpose of meeting housing and quarantine expenses and the cost of meals and other expenses incurred in catering. The above diet does not include morning and evening tea which may be purchased from the boutiques there if required"; and

(3) under the heading "9—Bills of Health", by the substitution, for the words and figures "For issuing an outward Bill of Health . . . Rs. 10.50", of the following :—

"A. For issuing an outward Bill of Health, Rs. 10.50

B. For vessels paying the consolidated rate one Bill of Health is issued free by day only. If the Bill of Health is issued between 6 P.M. and 6 A.M. the fee of Rs. 10.50 has to be paid for each Bill of Health, although the consolidated rate has also been paid.

C. Bills of Health are issued free to the following vessels :—

- (a) British warships and Royal Fleet Auxiliary (British) oil tankers ;  
(b) Foreign warships and foreign naval oil tankers ;  
(c) Vessels chartered by British and foreign Governments".

Saravanamuttu, M.M.C. :—Q.—Whereas at the Meeting of the Council on February 8, 1939, the Mayor, in reply to a query addressed to him by me, stated that on the question of placing temporary overseers, clerks and skilled workmen on the permanent staffs, in accordance with the resolution of December, 1937, a report of the implications, carefully considered by the Municipal Engineer, Treasurer and Commissioner, would be placed before this Council shortly, will the Mayor inform this House why a report which was stated to have been almost ready eight months ago has not yet been placed before this House? A.—The reports of the executive are ready and will be placed before the Salaries and Cadres Committee at its next meeting.

5. Pursuant to notice, the Mayor moved :—That the Council do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the following extracts and the report from the proceedings of the Committees annexed to the Agenda. Dr. R. Saravanamuttu seconded.—Carried.

## ANNEXURE "C".

Report of the Special Committee appointed to inquire into and report upon the circumstances that led to the transfer of the Municipal Workshop Foreman.

1. Pursuant to a resolution of the Council on June 7, 1939, reading as follows:—"That a Committee of the House be appointed to inquire into and report upon the circumstances that led to the transfer of the Municipal Workshop Foreman", the following members were appointed a Special Committee:—Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando, B.A., L.L.B.; Mr. A. E. Goonesinha, M.S.C.; Mr. John A. Pye, B.Sc.; Mr. N. M. M. Ishak; and Mr. R. Doresamy.

2. The first meeting of this Committee was held on June 15, when Mr. A. E. Goonesinha was elected Chairman. Five meetings of this Committee were held on June 15, June 29, July 1, July 4, and August 11, respectively. At the first meeting held on June 15, a letter of the same date from Mr. R. Doresamy to the Chairman and members of the Committee, was tabled. In this letter Mr. Doresamy states that he is unable to participate in the deliberations of this Committee and asks that the letter be embodied in the report in the event of a report being submitted. We have acceded to his request—see Annexure "A". The Committee visited the Municipal Workshops to acquaint themselves as to actual working conditions and recorded the evidence of the following officials and subordinates:—

Mr. S. P. Wickramasinha, Municipal Commissioner; Mr. Stanley Fernando, Acting Municipal Engineer; Mr. H. H. Collette, Acting Chief Assistant Municipal Engineer; Mr. H. L. de S. Kulatilleke, Acting Mechanical Engineer; Mr. G. Edwin Nanayakkara, Workshop Foreman; Mr. A. Ferdinando, Surveyor, now officiating as Acting Foreman; Mr. A. P. Ranawake, Special Overseer, Municipal Workshops; Mr. E. R. de Silva, Timekeeper, Municipal Workshops.

3. It is established that the Workshop Foreman, Mr. Nanayakkara, was well qualified in Mechanical Engineering Workshop practice before he was engaged by the Municipality as Workshop Overseer, in charge of what was known at that time as the small Workshop, in July, 1922.

4. On January 24, 1934, the Works and Finance Committees met jointly and invited applications for the post of Workshop Foreman with Mechanical training and experience—a memorandum from the Municipal Engineer, reading as under, having been tabled for the Committee's guidance:—

“ The applicant should have had training in the handling of machinery and be possessed of previous substantial experience in the maintenance of steam and motor vehicles, steam rollers and road making plant, steam boilers and pumps, motor pumps, oil engines and quarry plant, motor launches and barges, steam cranes and all portable Municipal plant. He should be capable of supervising and carrying out repairs at the site at which any of the above-mentioned plant is installed, and be able to position and erect portable plant where required. He should be acquainted with the various parts of machines and be able to specify spare parts for renewals. He should have had experience in organizing and arranging transport work and will be required to take charge of the operation of all transport services. He should be capable of making an intelligent report on the conditions of any machinery and also of any road accident after visiting the scene. He should be able to control and direct skilled labour.”

Out of the nine applicants for the post the Works and Finance Committees, on March 21, 1934, recommended Mr. Nanayakkara and the Council on April 11, 1934, approved of this recommendation.

5. On April 17, 1939, Mr. Kulatilleke a *Civil Engineer* who admits he has only “ a little knowledge about mechanical work ” and has not been mechanically trained, was appointed as Acting Mechanical Engineer. (*Note*.—Council minute, pp. 35 of Salaries Scheme, requires that the Mechanical Engineer shall have special mechanical qualifications) *vice* Mr. Collette who holds Mechanical Engineering qualifications and who has been in charge of the Workshop for 19 years, during which period the latter Officer held the highest regard for the Workshop Foreman's work and capabilities.

6. On Sunday, May 7, the Workshop Foreman was advised, at about 4.30 p.m. that the Kelani river was rising and he immediately set out in search of fitters in order to proceed to Ambatale to remove a pump, belonging to the Socony Oil Co., on hire by the Municipality. On his way he met the Acting Municipal Engineer (Mr. H. H. Collette,) who was also interesting himself in the matter on a similar report having been made to him. He had earlier in the day left a note for the Acting Mechanical Engineer at the Municipal Workshops apprising him of the situation and asking him to take necessary action the following day (Monday morning) that he was to “ send a gang of reliable men first thing in the morning to have the pump removed.” These two officers went in search of fitters but as none were to be found they proceeded to Ambatale in order to ascertain conditions on the spot.

7. The Workshop Foreman did not advise the Acting Mechanical Engineer (Mr. H. L. de S. Kulatilleke) of the position that afternoon as he had been in company of a *Senior Officer* (Mr. Collette), whose decision was that the matter could be left until the next morning. The Committee reject the suggestion of the Acting Mechanical Engineer that the Workshop Foreman should have advised him as to what had transpired on the afternoon of the 7th and, further, they are of opinion that the Acting Mechanical Engineer had no right to criticise, before the Committee, the action of a superior officer in leaving a note on his desk advising what steps should be taken.

8. The Workshop Foreman states that he arrived at the Workshops early on the morning of May 8, that he had arranged for the men to get ready to go to Ambatale and was instructing the remainder in their tasks for the day when the Acting Mechanical Engineer arrived. The evidence of this Officer does not disprove but actually gives support to the Workshop Foreman's statement and the Committee are of opinion that, had the acting Mechanical Engineer had any practical experience of workshop routine, he would have realized it is not unusual for a number of employees to hang around awaiting new tasks on a Monday morning, especially with intermittent working conditions as existent in the Municipal Workshops.

9. The Committee can only conclude, from all the evidence laid before them, that the receipt of the Acting Municipal Engineer's note on Monday morning caused the Acting Mechanical Engineer to become unduly excited (an attitude that was accentuated by the Workshop Foreman's confidence and calmness born of long experience and practical knowledge) and take the work out of the Workshop Foreman's hands.

10. During the course of collecting men and materials for Ambatale it was necessary to draw petrol and the Acting Mechanical Engineer sent a requisition order No. 14,629, initialled by him, as Acting Mechanical Engineer, to the person who issued petrol. This latter person, quite correctly, refused to issue the petrol as the requisition note did not bear the Workshop Foreman's signature as required by regulations (copy of requisition note attached). The Committee are agreed that Petrol Storekeeper's action was strictly correct. In any case the incident had nothing to do with the Workshop Foreman and the Committee are of opinion that the Acting Mechanical Engineer's complaint against his subordinate only serves to illustrate his excited state of mind on this occasion as well as his total lack of knowledge of the usual practice in the Workshop under his control.

11. During the course of the inquiry the Acting Mechanical Engineer hinted at other unspecified reasons for recommending that the Workshop Foreman be transferred but, when called upon to substantiate his allegations, he could only refer to one matter? This concerned the question of granting privileges in respect of employment to certain favoured employees. The Acting Mechanical Engineer stated that the Workshop Foreman gave three weeks work per month to some and four weeks work and overtime (in excess of Municipal requirements) to the more favoured employees. Investigation proved, and the Acting Mechanical Engineer was compelled to admit, that the responsibility was not the Foreman's but the Acting Mechanical Engineer's and that his allegations were without foundation. Much was made by the Acting Mechanical Engineer of the overtime records which he stated purported to show that he had considerably reduced the amount of week-end work for which overtime had to be paid; a perusal of the file, however did not convince the Committee that such reductions as were made were of any consequence or that they were not doubtful economy; certainly the allegation *re* overtime in excess of Municipal requirements was *not* proved.

12. It is considered strange that the Acting Mechanical Engineer should conclude his report with a request to the Acting Municipal Engineer that his report be submitted to the Commissioner “ for his information and any action he may deem necessary.” It was a Departmental matter and the Committee are of opinion that the Acting Municipal Engineer was the one to decide what steps if any were to be taken. The Committee have since established, without any shadow of doubt, that, after handing his report to the Acting Municipal Engineer (Mr. Collette), the Acting Mechanical Engineer called upon the Commissioner and acquainted him privately with his own side of the story so that before the Acting Municipal Engineer could report officially upon a matter under his jurisdiction, he was advised by the Commissioner that the Workshop Foreman was to be transferred. This action of the Acting Mechanical Engineer is contrary to established practice and is subversive to discipline.

13. The Acting Mechanical Engineer having initiated the movement to transfer, the Acting Municipal Engineer (Mr. Stanley Fernando who had been absent, up to this date, on leave) takes up the matter and states that he is able to make the suggested transfer “ which however, I consider as experiment at this stage.” The experiment was to transfer the Workshop Foreman, on a monthly salary of Rs. 250 to the pumping stations to replace a *daily paid overseer* who was being transferred to a new post in the drainage section, a post which no apparent efforts had been made to fill, and not provided for in the Establishment Vote for payment of Salaries to Officers in the Permanent Staff. In order to boost up this new appointment (not sanctioned by Council) a part of the Chief Inspector's work was to be delegated to Mr. Nanayakkara. In this connection it is interesting to note that it has not been necessary in the past to have such a post despite the fact that up to five years ago these Pumping Stations were worked by oil engines requiring much more attention than they do to-day with electrical working.

14. Had there been no one to succeed Mr. Nanayakkara the transfer could not have been made so the Committee considered it necessary to examine his successor to ascertain his suitability for this highly skilled post requiring the qualifications mentioned in paragraph 4 of this report. It was found that Mr. Ferdinando a highly paid Surveyor drawing

approximately Rs. 100 per mensem more than the Workshop Foreman, was not qualified for the post as his sole qualification lay in the fact that he had, in 1918 attended a year's course of lectures at the Ceylon Technical College in Motor Engineering and had obtained a diploma as a result of his work. Since that date he had not taken any refresher classes or undertaken practical work. Simple elementary questions regarding the work in both the machine shop and the foundry proved to the Committee that Mr. Ferdinando had no knowledge whatever of the work he was supposed to control. The Committee considered it significant that the Acting Mechanical Engineer had proposed the name of Mr. Ferdinando and that apparently no effort had been made to find a more suitable successor. It is interesting to note that Mr. Ferdinando was closely associated with the Acting Mechanical Engineer, in the latter Officer's previous employment on Municipal Works, as Works Inspector.

15. The Committee regret to record that they were not impressed with the evidence of the Acting Mechanical Engineer who gave many signs of his excitable nature under examination. They also regret to record that the Acting Mechanical Engineer showed considerable animosity towards the Officer, Mr. Collette acting as Municipal Engineer, at the time of the incidents referred to, and accused him of complicity in the matters referred to in the Acting Mechanical Engineer's report; the Committee are of opinion that there was no justification for this wild accusation or for the Officer in question to "carry tales" to the Commissioner regarding Departmental matters.

16. This Committee has carefully gone into the evidence given by the several persons who have appeared before it and after a perusal of the evidence and the relative papers are definitely of opinion:—

- (a) That the charges of neglect of duty, non-co-operation and inefficiency made against the permanent Workshop Foreman have not been proved. On the contrary the permanent Workshop Foreman appeared to be perfectly competent by training and experience of 29 years in the mechanical line to be pre-eminently suited for the post he was appointed by special resolution of Council on April 11, 1934.
- (b) That the Acting Mechanical Engineer and the Acting Foreman were by training and experience totally unsuited for their respective posts and that the panic created by the proved excitable temperament of the Acting Mechanical Engineer on being unexpectedly faced with a situation of emergency resulted in a hasty report requesting the transfer of the Workshop Foreman.

#### DISSENT.

*Report of the undersigned member of the Special Committee (appointed to inquire into and report upon the circumstances that led to the transfer of the Municipal Workshop Foreman) who is not in agreement with the other members of the Committee.*

1. As I am in total disagreement with the views embodied in the majority report, I consider it necessary to submit a separate report of my own.

At the outset, I would like to state that owing to the refusal of the Chairman and the other members of the Committee to accede to my request to defer their deliberations till Dr. R. Saravanamuttu's motion to rescind the motion previously passed by the Council on June 7, 1939, was disposed of, I was unable to attend the meetings of the Committee (*vide* my letter to members dated June 15, 1939). I made it clear to the Chairman that I had not resigned from the Committee and that my refusal to participate in the Committee's deliberations held good only until Dr. Saravanamuttu's motion was disposed of. The latter was debated upon and rejected at a meeting of Council held on July 5, 1939. The report which was completed subsequently (*viz.*, on August 11, 1939), was not at first sent to me by the Chairman for my signature in spite of my request. It was sent to me only on August 25, after I pointed out to the Chairman and the Mayor that it was incomplete until it was referred to every member of the Committee including myself and that the withholding of the report from me would be irregular.

Although in consequence of my not attending the meetings of the Committee I labour under the disadvantage of not having seen or heard the witnesses, I have carefully examined the evidence that has been recorded and have perused the memoranda and the reports of the different witnesses and also the majority report of this Committee, and therefore I am in a position to form my own opinion on the different questions at issue.

The only function that has been entrusted by the Council to this Committee according to the terms of reference is to ascertain the circumstances that led to the transfer of the workshop foreman. I therefore think that it is not within the Committee's purview to consider the question whether the transfer was justified or not or to express any opinion on the qualifications of the officers concerned in this affair.

2. The circumstances that led to the transfer were clearly the report against the Workshop Foreman, Mr. Nanayakkara, forwarded to the Commissioner by the Workshop Engineer and the Commissioner's agreement with that report particularly in regard to the complaint of non-co-operation on the part of Mr. Nanayakkara with the Workshop Engineer. The two incidents (out of many) in consequence of which the request for the transfer was made, relate to—

- (a) the Ambatale Pumping Engine.
- (b) the Petrol issue.

3. No specific charges of obstruction or non-co-operation were made but the evidence recorded provides ample and abundant material to prove such charges. The Acting Municipal Engineer (Mr. Collette) leaves a note on the Sunday afternoon in question at the Workshop addressed to the Acting Mechanical Engineer (Mr. Kulatilloke) pointing out the gravity of the flood situation. On his return from the workshop the Acting Municipal Engineer casually meets the Foreman who apparently gives him more up to date news with regard to the floods. They then go out to look for fitters.

It is most strange that between these two officers each of whom had had over 15 years' experience at the workshop that not a single fitter could be discovered. It is stranger still that they did not think of employing any fitters other than Municipal fitters if the work was considered so very urgent.

4. However, finding none available, they then go to Ambatale where Mr. Collette satisfies himself that the situation was not so very serious and that it could be tackled on the following day. He however gives very specific instructions to the Foreman with regard to the urgency of the work on the Monday morning. He tells him that he has left a note to the Mechanical Engineer apprising him of the urgency of the work, but if the Engineer were to delay the Foreman is requested to go to Ambatale on the instructions of the Acting Municipal Engineer.

5. These are orders which might be regarded as indiscreet coming as they did from the Acting Municipal Engineer to the Foreman who is directly subordinate and responsible to the Acting Mechanical Engineer. However, one aspect of the orders should at least have impressed the foreman—and that is—the urgency of the removal of the pump.

6. The Foreman according to his own evidence, arrives at the workshop a few minutes before the Acting Mechanical Engineer and makes certain arrangements—He details the men (fitters) that are to go to Ambatale when the Acting Mechanical Engineer arrives. The Foreman, however, does not inform him of the very serious situation that has arisen on account of the floods. He does not think it necessary even to tell him that a note has been left for him at his office. He does not mention to him that the Acting Municipal Engineer and himself failed to find fitters the previous evening to have the engine removed. In fact, the foreman simply does nothing.

7. When the Acting Mechanical Engineer comes out of his office after having seen the note, he asks the Foreman how many fitters were present. This Foreman who has had so many years service both as Overseer and Foreman that he should be in a position to know every fitter working in the workshop, replies that he does not know and that the inquiry should be addressed to the Timekeeper. The Foreman was obviously aware that the Engineer wanted this information in view of the note of the Acting Municipal Engineer and the flood situation but even at this juncture he does not so much as tell his superior officer, "I have already detailed suitable fitters for the Ambatale job, they will be leaving at once—the Acting Municipal Engineer was of opinion that the work was urgent and in fact he wanted me to get to Ambatale the first thing in the morning." A clearer case of non-co-operation it is difficult to make out.

8. This same atmosphere is apparent in respect of the petrol incident. The Acting Municipal Engineer who was for several years in charge of the workshop admits that petrol when urgently required used to be issued on informal chits, the official prescribed document being perfected later and that it was not unusual for the driver or some other party to acknowledge receipt instead of the foreman whose signature is required according to the official form in use. In this particular instance, the prescribed form was used and was actually signed by the Acting Mechanical Engineer. The driver did not sign the receipt and the petrol was not issued as the Foreman had not signed the receipt portion of the form. Unfortunately the parties do not appear to have been questioned on certain material aspects of the matter. A few simple questions should have been ample to elucidate the position.

9. But it is utterly unbelievable that the Foreman was unaware of the fact that the petrol keeper refused to issue the petrol even though the Engineer himself had signed the issue form. It is admitted that the Foreman was in the premises at the time and even assuming that there was a sudden insistence on the correct form and procedure one should have expected the driver, who took the note to the petrol keeper and whose signature had hitherto been accepted, to acquaint the Foreman of the petrol keeper's insistence on the foreman's signature and the foreman could have, one would have imagined, settled the issue straightaway by signing the form himself. Instead, the Engineer is told that the petrol keeper refused to issue the petrol and it was left to the Engineer to obtain the petrol. The Foreman's evidence on this matter is both significant and expressive—"He got the petrol anyhow . . .".

10. As pointed out earlier, the Foreman is second in command at the workshop—always in close touch with the workmen and it is apparent to any person with the most casual acquaintance with conditions in the workshop that this petrol incident could not have occurred without the knowledge of the Foreman. This aspect, as remarked earlier, has unfortunately not been pursued but even in the light of the evidence recorded there is ample material to prove, at least, that the Foreman was not pulling his weight in the workshop and that he was definitely not giving his superior officer the assistance expected from him.

11. Having dealt with the main issues involved in this inquiry, I would now revert to the observation I made at the end of paragraph 1 of this report, viz., that it is not competent for this Committee to sit in judgment on the qualifications of the officers concerned in the unfortunate incidents alluded to above. In the majority report, strictures have been passed on the Acting Mechanical Engineer and his fitness for the acting post has been called into question. I am emphatically of opinion that these strictures are wholly unjustified and that it is futile for the members of this Committee to express any opinion on the technical qualifications or the experience and capacity of an officer like Mr. Kulatilleke who bears an unblemished record of service and whose professional qualifications and ability cannot be disputed. Such unjustifiable criticism will merely undermine the morale of the Municipal service.

12. I also fail to see the relevance of the comments on the qualifications of the Acting Workshop Foreman who was in no way connected with the incidents that led to the transfer of Mr. Nanayakkara. Here again, not only is this question outside the purview of the Committee but I also think that it is preposterous for members of the Committee to assume the role of technical experts and cross-examine officers with regard to their engineering qualifications. There is nothing in the evidence to support the view that Mr. Ferdinando is not suited for his present appointment. On the contrary, if we have any confidence in the judgment of his superior officers who were responsible for his appointment, there is every reason to believe that he is quite competent to discharge the duties of his new office.

13. In view of the definite conclusions I have reached earlier in this report, in regard to the part played by Mr. Nanayakkara in this affair, I need hardly state that the encomiums showered on him both in the course of the inquiry and also in the majority report are wholly unwarranted. On the contrary, he deserves to be severely censured for the unhelpful attitude he has adopted towards his superior officer Mr. Kulatilleke during an emergency.

14. I realize that like the other members of the Committee I have gone beyond the terms of reference in making the observations reported in paragraphs 11, 12, and 13 of this report. But in view of the strictures and encomiums recorded in the majority report and in justice to the officers concerned I had no alternative but to give expression to my views even at the risk of transgressing the limits within which this inquiry is circumscribed.

15. One wonders whether any useful purpose has been served by this inquiry. There is, however, one thing that it has revealed, viz., the unsatisfactory state of affairs in the Workshop, e.g., the lack of co-operation, discipline, &c. Had the scope of the inquiry been wider, it is possible that serious irregularities like "granting privileges in respect of employment to certain favoured employees" alluded to in the majority report, might have come to light. In the circumstances, I am strongly of opinion that a searching inquiry into the working of the Municipal Workshop is essential.

ANNEXURE "A" REFERRED TO IN THE REPORT.

*To the Chairman and Members of the Special Committee appointed to investigate into the circumstances connected with the transfer of the Workshop Foreman Mr. Nanayakkara.*

DEAR SIRS,—I REGRET that I am unable to participate in the deliberations of this Committee as I am of opinion that the Committee should not function till the motion of Dr. R. Saravanamuttu to rescind the motions which had been passed at the last meeting of Council and by virtue of which this Committee had been appointed is disposed of.

It would appear from a circular letter of Dr. Saravanamuttu a copy of which was sent to me for my information that due notice of his motion has already been given. In view of this I don't think that any one will be prejudiced if this Committee defers its deliberations till Dr. Saravanamuttu's motion has been debated upon on the 5th proximo. This question is not one of such extreme urgency that a delay of twenty days will affect the position in any way. On the contrary ordinary courtesy demands that a reasonable request made by our colleagues should be acceded to.

There is a further consideration which must not be lost sight of. If Dr. Saravanamuttu's motion is passed by the Council all proceedings of this Committee prior to the passing of this motion (including the issue of a report) will be invalidated. Therefore the functioning of this Committee before the next meeting of Council will not only be discourteous and hasty but may also prove to be futile.

I would also like to point out that neither the petition of Mr. Nanayakkara addressed to the Mayor and the Members of the Council nor the report of the Commissioner on the circumstances relating to the transfer was made available to the members before the question of appointing this Committee was debated in the Council. Those papers should have been placed before the Council if they were then available. If they were not available, the decision about the appointment of this Committee should have been deferred till they were available. As it happened, there was only an ex-parte case presented to the Council on the strength of which the motion to appoint a Committee was passed. I would submit that the views of the Commissioner and the other officials concerned should also have been presented to the Council before it was called upon to give its decisions. Had this been done it is possible that the decision might have been different.

In view of the foregoing considerations I would strongly urge that the inquiry be postponed and if my view does not find favour with the rest of the Committee I shall thank you to record my dissent and annex this letter to any report you choose to issue.

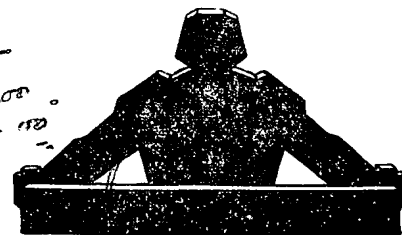

### STATUTORY RULES AND ORDERS 1939 No. 1709

#### REPRISALS RESTRICTING GERMAN COMMERCE

ORDER IN COUNCIL FRAMING REPRISALS FOR  
RESTRICTING FURTHER THE COMMERCE OF  
GERMANY.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace the 27th day of  
November, 1939.

*Present,*

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas His Majesty has been compelled to take up arms against Germany in defence of the fundamental right of nations to a free and peaceful existence:

And whereas German forces have in numerous cases sunk merchant vessels, British, Allied and neutral, in violation of the rules contained in the Submarine Protocol, 1936, to which Germany is a party:

And whereas merchant vessels, British, Allied and neutral, have been sunk by mines laid by German forces indiscriminately and without notification, in contravention of the obligations of humanity and the provisions of the Hague Convention No. VIII of 1907 to which Germany is a party:

And whereas the sinking of these vessels has been effected without regard to their nationality or destination or to the nature, ownership or destination of their cargoes:

And whereas these acts have already resulted in grave loss of non-combatant life, British, Allied and neutral:

And whereas it is manifest that the German Government have deliberately embarked on a policy of endeavouring to destroy all seaborne trade between the Allied and other

countries by a ruthless use of the forces at their disposal, contrary to the laws and customs of war, the rights of neutrals and the obligations of humanity :

And whereas this action on the part of the German Government gives to His Majesty an unquestionable right of retaliation :

And whereas the Allies of His Majesty are associated with Him in the steps now to be announced for restricting further the commerce of Germany :

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. Every merchant vessel which sailed from any enemy port, including any port in territory under enemy occupation or control, after the 4th day of December, 1939, may be required to discharge in a British or Allied port any goods on board laden in such enemy port.

2. Every merchant vessel which sailed from a port other than an enemy port after the 4th day of December, 1939, having on board goods which are of enemy origin or are enemy property may be required to discharge such goods in a British or Allied port.

3. Goods discharged in a British port under either of the preceding Articles shall be placed in the custody of the Marshal of the Prize Court, and, unless the Court orders them to be requisitioned for the use of His Majesty, shall be detained or sold under the direction of the Court. The proceeds of goods so sold shall be paid into Court.

On the conclusion of peace such proceeds and any goods detained but not sold shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may in the circumstances deem just ; provided that nothing herein shall prevent the payment out of Court of any such proceeds or the release of any goods at any time (a) if it be shown to the satisfaction of the Court that the goods had become neutral property before the date of this Order, or (b) with the consent of the proper officer of the Crown.

4. The law and practice in Prize shall, so far as applicable, be followed in all cases arising under this Order.

5. Nothing in this Order shall affect the liability of any vessel or goods to seizure or condemnation independently of this Order.

6. For the purposes of this Order the words " goods which are of enemy origin " shall include goods having their origin in any territory under enemy occupation or control, and the words " goods which . . . are enemy property " shall include goods belonging to any person in any such territory.

7. Proceedings under this Order may be taken in any Prize Court having jurisdiction to which the Prize Court Rules, 1939 (a), apply.

8. For the purposes of this Order the words " British port " mean any port within the jurisdiction of any Prize Court to which the Prize Court Rules, 1939, apply.

THE DEFENCE (TRADING WITH THE ENEMY)  
REGULATIONS, 1939.
